# **KILLIN WINS TOP TOURISM AWARD**

It seems from figures recently released that Scotland's tourist trade has weathered the recession better than many other businesses. The figures for last year's season show a fall of only one per cent in real terms.

Ian Grant, the STB Chairman, gave his view that it was a satisfactory performance. "I do think the industry has fared rather better than some of the doomwatch pundits had predicted".

It seems that favourable rates of exchange since our departure from the E.R.M. meant that Scotland was an attractive destination for overseas tourists but also more Brits seek a holiday in 'the hills and glens', and forego that package trip to foreign parts!

In this general context our own little neck of the woods has kept the flag flying. The photograph above shows members of our own Killin Tourist Association receiving the top Antartex Tourism Award for 1992! Namely Best Town or Village!

The awards are limited to the areas of Loch Lomond, Stirling and Trossachs Tourist Board, nevertheless it's an area of some

top class tourist competition, and our fulsome congratulations go to Killin for winning the 'best town or village award.

Sure we have an outstanding location -'sweeping mountains, beautiful lochs, tumbling waterfalls, and quaint (sic!) traditional villages' - and we quote from the Tourist Board Press Release!

Nevertheless credit must be given to the people and trades of Killin who (the evidence is) present a welcoming face to the visitors, and to the local Tourist Association and other organisations who provide attractive events for the tourist.

We should also recognise Paddy McKinnon's efforts over the years as chairperson of the local Tourist Association and in particular her development of the Floral Award Scheme which has done so much to make the village more attractive.

# All Change

Traffic will increase by 50% in the next 11 years! This startling figure was given by representatives of Central Region in a Public Meeting in the McLaren Hall on 8th December. The other startling figure was that only 5 members of Joe Public turned up.

An action plan on transport (not yet approved) was unveiled. What is in it for us? I hear you cry. - Well, precious little - Action is planned for the area round about Stirling - the Hillfoots area, Dunblane and Clackmannan (where a new railway is mooted), Park & Ride - bus service improvement Traffic calming (new name - 'to mak ye slow doon', might be a good thing for Killin).

Killin and District is in the northern panhandle fringe area - where alternative means of transport to the motor car are limited. However, Killin folk will be able to park & ride into Stirling (no new car parks are planned) so bus and laybys will be the order.

Killin's problems (remember 50% more cars in 11 years), congestion, parking, street lighting (bright but repulsive), aiming for heavy vehicles - are not addressed.

The plan can be seen in the Library - see Western Area Action Plan. (Killin is missed on the map). At last there is a flexi bus route marked including Tyndrum, Crianlarich, giving hospital linkage.

### St Fillans Mill

The last issue of the Killin News apparently put an optimistic gloss on the funding for the St. Fillans Mill project. As you will see from Helen McPhie's letter on page 4, while there is much good will and considerable planning activity, money is not yet on the line. Agreed in principle, yes, but not yet written into the budgets for 1993/94. Consequently, we apologise for jumping the gun, although given the money already spent on the building, we can't imagine that the project won't be carried through in the near future. The will seems to be there in the various organisations involved.

### Draft Killin Settlement Plan

At the time of writing, we have not seen the insert provided for you in this issue by Lesley Roger of S.D.C's Planning Department. We hope you will give it your careful consideration and make your views known. A public meeting will be held in the village soon, to hear your views. Attend the meeting, for **you** ought to have the biggest say in what happens to **your** village.

We understand that this draft plan is the outcome of the work of the SDC Planning Department which started about two years ago, and in fact, was previewed in Issue No. 2 of the Killin News. While we certainly approve of, and indeed applaud, the work that goes into such draft plans, we still long for some ACTION! Many of the items in the draft are old chestnuts; parking problems, improvement in Breadalbane Park entrance, improvement in children's play area, St. Fillan's Mill and others. We suspect that by the time this Settlement Plan is incorporated into the Stirling District Local Plan, and it too is adapted to fit the Central 2000 Plan, little will actually have been achieved on the ground.

The village of Killin has had many benefactors whose common purpose has been to alleviate the lot of people in the district who, through no fault of their own, have been suffering financial hardship.

Several Trusts have been set up, most before the days of the 'Welfare State', and are still in action. One of the trusts came into being in 1934 as the result of the Will of a local resident, Mr. George Hogg, a native of Morenish.

George Hogg spent his early years working in the Killin District, thereafter going to Ardrossan where he became a diver. For some 14 years he worked around Scotland and in Mexico. During the 1914-18 war he was employed by the Crown Agents for the Colonies at St. Helena, and then by the Admiralty on salvage work on torpedoed ships.

In 1912 Mr. Hogg built Morenish Place, Killin and resided there after the war until his death on **15th** August 1934. His Will placed his estate in the hands of Trustees with the stipulation that they maintain the property at Morenish Place and disburse any surplus funds to persons in the Killin District, known or believed, to be in need.

During the first decade of the Trust, when rents at Morenish Place were very low, some £150 was so disbursed. In the decade ending Jan 1992 disbursements totalled some£5000.

The Trustees are (1) the Parish Minister of Killin and Ardeonaig, (2) The Manager of the Killin Branch of the Bank of Scotland, (both ex-officio) and one other appointed by the Trustees from time to time. At present I am the 'Third Man'. The Secretary and Treasurer to the Trustees is Mr David Main.

On behalf of the many who have benefited from George Hogg's Trust the Trustees wish to record their appreciation of the benevolence of this kindly local man.

# Community Council

Local government is in the melting pot again, options are being considered by the Secretary of State. Community Councillors attended a conference in Doune on 5th December looking at the relationship between Community Councils and Local Authorities.

However, enough of the serious big issues and over to the smaller but no less serious local issues - highlights are:

### Ewich Phantom Strikes Again

Graffiti saying rude things about our southern neighbours in the Crianlarich area is obliterated and re-appears again. This is unhelpful to the tourist trade and unnecessarily hurtful to those who have settled here. Community Service is being considered to help remove the offending words.

### Cycling

Police will be taking action about dangerous cycling in Killin ie. along pavements and out of the one way street.

## Need for a Residential Home

- linked to an ageing population. This is being pursued. Old people unable to cope are having to move out of the area. Crianlarich is looking for Kirk Care type

#### provision.

### Flooding outside Killin Kirk

The congregation is in danger of surprise baptism with the water hazard at the front door. Land Registry in Edinburgh is being approached as no one admils to ownership of the land.

### Buses at Monemore

- the saga continues.

### Dirty Dogs

*Or is it the owners?* Park and street fouling - there is a suggestion of pooper scoopers being provided.

### Dalrigh turn off

- safety measures to be pursued.

### Conducted Tour

A Councillors "perk" was a tour of the Killin Sewage works. An intrepid group in the rain, plumbed the depths - be reassured, the works can be expanded for an additional 500 population.

# Campaign to Save Radio 4

Ever since the BBC was required to stop "simulcasting", that is broadcasting the same service on two different frequencies or wavelengths such as Long Wave and FM (or VHF), those parts of the country which are mountainous and sparsely populated have been at risk of losing one or other of their favourite programmes. Areas like Killin (population 600) may, within the next two or three years, lose their easy access to Radio 4, probably the most prestigious radio Channel.

The BBC's plan is to remove Radio 4 from the Long Wave and replace it with a 24 hour Newsservice. Radio 4 will be transmitted on FM only. FM reception is difficult in this area, if you can get it at all. Consequently we would be seriously deprived of the BBC's main Radio service. While FM reception is undoubtedly of a high quality, particularly suited to drama, music and stereo, it's only so, if you can get it!! And we can't. The BBC have informed us that it is "very unlikely" that they will be able to improve FM reception in our area, and they recommend that we install external FM aerials!

If you wish to take part in the protest you should write to your MP or MEP, or the national newspapers. Re: St Fillans Mill, Killin

I was surprised when 1 read the front page article in the Killin News, November 1992 entitled "Green Light for St Fillans Mill" at some of the inaccuracies and I would like to clarify certain points with regard to the above project.

Stirling District Council have at this time only an "in principle" commitment to the project as our capital programme for 1993/ 94 is as yet unknown. The Scottish Tourist Board contribution has also yet to be approved by the Board. Forth Valley Enterprise have also still to give Board approval to their contribution which it is anticipated will be considered at the January Board Meeting. Therefore the "pursuit of money is now solved!" is incorrect.

The ground floor will house the Tourist Information Centre operated by the Loch Lomond, Stirling & Trossachs Tourist Board including Booking Service, Retail, Free Literature, Bureau de Change etc. and the restoration of the Mill Wheel. In the current proposals the first floor will host exhibition space to the Clans Gregor, MacNab, Campbell and McLaren, and exhibition space for the Local Heritage Society and Folklore elements. The top floor will tell the story of St Fillan and house St Fillan's artefacts - crozier and bell.

We are currently using the name "St Fillan's Mill" as a working title - no decision has been made on the name of the centre as yet, and we are working with the Loch Lomond, Stirling & Trossachs Tourist Board on a title to use as an effective marketing tool.

The Healing Stones are in safe keeping with the Area Tourist Board.



*I*, too, look forward to the realisation of this project following the finalisation of the funding package.

### **Angling Club AGM**







### **Adult Groups**





# WWF AWARD For Green Team Walkers





Thanks to the Falls of Dochart for looking after us so well.


### Karate Club


The quarterly grading took place the following Sunday, with everyone passing. A demonstration took place later with a good attendance from parents and friends.


