See Three Lochs for the Price of One!



Formal Launch of Tay Trundler

The new "Loch Tay Trundler" country bus service started on 26th June with an offer no visitor to the Central Highlands should miss - see three lochs for the price of one! For the "Loch Tay Trundler" not only goes by Loch Tay but also trundles along the equally beautiful shores of Loch Lubnaig and Loch Earn. The picturesque circular route also includes the dramatic 'Sma Glen, Glen Ogle and the Falls of Dochart.

There will be services run in both directions round the route every Saturday, Sunday and Monday from 26th June until 20th September inclusive.

The Trundler buses, identified by a distinctive red and green logo, can be boarded at the holiday towns and villages linked by the service - Aberfeldy, Kenmore, Killin, Callander, Comrie and Crieff - or the buses can be stopped on request in the countryside. There will also be service links to the railheads at Pitlochry and Stirling.

The "Loch Tay Trundler" is one of three new services run as a multi-agency

project to test the demand for better access to the countryside and its attractions by **public transport.**

Target users for this new 130 mile cross-region link include not only local residents, but also hill-walkers and tourists who will be encouraged to leave their cars behind.

The operation of the "Loch Tay Trundler" is financially supported by both Central Regional Council and Tayside Regional Council with marketing support from tourist boards and development agencies. Marketing is funded by Forth Valley Enterprise and the Scottish Tourist Board with the participation of Loch Lomond, Stirling and Trossachs Area Tourist Board and Perthshire Area Tourist Board.

A colour leaflet, with timetable, giving full details of the "Loch Tay Trundler", the "Loch Lomond Trundler" and the "Trossachs Trundler" Summer services is now available from local tourist information centres, post offices and libraries.

Killin Enhancement Initiative

Good news for the people of Killin! It looks as if many of the problems and less attractive aspects of the village, such as coach and car parking and the entrance to Breadalbane Park, are to be the subject of a Village Enhancement Programme set up by the Rural Stirling Economic Partnership. To use their words "the Partnership wishes to improve the performance of the local economy of Killin through a five year enhancement programme, which will involve development of the village environment, visitor facilities and local businesses". Splendid words! But maybe this time they mean business! The partnership is a combination of Regional/District Councils and Forth Valley Enterprise/Tourist Board. Together they seem to have the resources that local Councils couldn't look at by themselves.

Ambitious Wide-ranging Plan

The plan is undoubtedly wide-ranging and ambitious taking in improvements to approaches to the village, the Main Street itself, coach and car parking (especially with the new Tourist/Heritage Centre at the Old Mill) access to tourist attractions (such as Finlarig Castle, McNab Burial Ground, Old Railway Viaduct, Loch Tay, Fingal's Stone etc), linking up with footpath and cycleway networks. Although they have in mind to promote tourism, they will also look at other economic elements in the village economy.

Consultants to Compete for the Work

The plan is to be achieved by commissioning consultants on a competitive basis to prepare an overall 5 year strategy and outline development programme, with more detailed proposals for the first two years. The entrance to Breadalbane Park and Monemore parking would be of high priority.

Already £10,000 has been set aside to commission the consultant's study, which would of course, be the subject of local consultation.

COMMENT

Things seem to be looking up for Killin! First there is the start of a new Bus service linking us to Kenmore and Aberfeldy, then we've got the Old Mill opening as a Tourist and Heritage Centre next Spring (which, incidentally, seems likely to be called "The Breadalbane Folklore Centre"! Any comments?). We think also that we've just about got Central Regional Roads Department to attend seriously to our parking problems. Now we've got a large scale **Village Enhancement Programme** going out to Competitive Tender to consultants. We think we hear small voices saying "NO! Not more planning studies! Please can we have some ACTION!" However this does look to be a promising development, although it **is** to be a five year strategy. Can we just emphasise priorities for the first two years: (1) Coach and car parking; (2) Village traffic (the bridge particularly, but also speed controls); (3) The entrance to Breadalbane park; and perhaps most important of all, can we impress upon the Rural Stirling Partnership the need to keep the Village itself involved through the Community Council and Public Meetings.

Finally, we should like to wish the two new Community Councils of Killin and Strathfillan every success in the years to come.

Lady collectors who wish, may collect boxes and poppies by weekend 5, 6 and 7 November allowing them nearly two weekends to allow for weather! As soon as they are seen on TV they may be stocked by establishments.

KILLIN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The first meeting of the new Killin Community Council, since the separation of Crianlarich and Tyndrum to form their own Council (Strathfillan), took place in the McLaren Hall on 16 June 1993. Councillor Ian Martin of Stirling District Council and Councillor Susan Duke of Central Regional Council were present.

The Council was formally set up by Mr Alex Downie of SDC, who explained that the new Council would consist of eleven members and that the boundary separating it from the Strathfillan Council would be based on the old education boundary.

Office bearers were elected as follows: -

Chairman: Dr E McColl; **Vice Chairman:** Mrs P Christie; **Secretary:** Ms H MacDonald (co-opted); **Treasurer:** Mr S Aitken

Mr Downie explained that a new constitution should be drawn up for the new Council and the SDC's Community Services Department would be involved.

Dr McColl then took the Chair for the first meeting. An item to do with parking at Monemore was discussed and the short term improvement to the junction of Craignavie Road with the Main Road would be undertaken in the Autumn. Mr Aitken also outlined the plans of the Killin Village Enhancement Initiative which would deal with parking among many other village problems.

An application for a fairground to be held from 3 July to 31 July 1993 in the, Capercaillie parking area was considered. The Council decided to oppose the plan on the grounds that parents had already shown their hostility to such fairs, it would be environmentally unacceptably close to a conservation area, the noise would be a serious problem, it would put pressure on the local car park at Monemore and being so close to the river it might be dangerous to children.

Councillor Martin reported that the new SDC logos showed the range of work the Council was responsible for. He also reported that window replacement in Council houses would be carried out in 1996/97. External decoration of wooden houses at Ballechroisk would be done this year.

The Treasurer presented his report for the year and pointed out that the main income of the Council was Breadalbane Park lets. This was now reduced since Caravan Rallies were limited to 40 vans, and some clubs were not booking.

Strathfillan Community Council

The formation of Strathfillan Community Council, representing Crianlarich/Tyndrum and surrounding areas, is the result of negotiation between local Councillors and Stirling District Council. For some time it had been thought that the issues relevant to Crianlarich and Tyndrum were sufficient to merit the creation of a more immediately focused Council. Dierdrie Elrick, Assistant Area Community Development Officer, represented the District Council at the inaugural meeting on 15 June. Dierdrie supervised the election of office bearers with the following result: - Convener - Paul Kelly; Deputy Convener - Watty Anderson; Treasurer - Bill Paulin; Secretary - John Riley. The other members of Council are May Clement, John Champion, Jock Henderson, Tommy Coffield and Jim Atkinson.

Following the adoption of the Constitution, and a statement outlining the policies and objectives of the new Council, various members were proposed as being responsible for particular areas of interest. The Strathfillan Community Council intend that this style of operation ie individual Councillors acting on behalf of Council dealings with a particular agency, will be the cornerstone of their operations.

Bracken

Bracken, a naturally occurring plant in the British Isles, has become a plague through a combination of intensive exploitation and lack of an acceptable solution.

In the diversity of plant species that once was the ancient forest, bracken was held in check by both the vigour of the rest of the forest and the trampling of wild cattle, the aurochs, bison, deer and wild boar.

The auroch's genes, although the species is extinct, I feel can still be glimpsed, spread through the many breeds of domesticated cattle and particularly highland cattle. So how can the problem of vast areas of bracken be dealt with?

If some bracken covered areas were planted up with diverse native wood and grazing in other areas changed to highland cattle, it is possible that the prosperity so generated by this enhancement of the environment and the sale of cattle, would be greater, than if the problem were tackled by chemical spraying.



Killin Kirk 250 Anniversary

In 1754, Thomas Clark, Mason, Dunkeld, built the Kirk at a cost of £3, 120 Scots, plus certain extras which included £3. 00 for "drink money when the Kirk was finished!"

In 1948 the large War Memorial/Window commemorating the dead of two World Wars was installed, replacing a window that had been destroyed in a storm. The present window, of considerable artistic merit, is in danger of collapse and must be restored, the cost of which is likely to be in the region of £6, 500.

The Society of Friends of Killin and Ardeonaig Parish Church is leading this project and has pledged £3, 000; a donation of £500 has already been received, but there is still a long way to go.

The Society will seek sponsorship and help from outwith Killin but asks all, whether auld Killin folk or those who have joined the Community more recently, to ensure that this worthy project is achieved. Donations may be given to the Society's Treasurer, Paddy MacKinnon or handed in at the Bank. Cheques should be made payable to The Society of Friends of Killin and Ardeonaig Parish Church.



In the field behind the School can be found a standing stone about 2½ feet high with a smaller stone cemented to the top. This has been known from time immemorial as Fingal's grave. However, the stone was re-erected in 1889 by Malcolm Ferguson and there was quite a ceremony. It is probable that the stone came from the mound above it which is reputed to be the site of the earliest church in Killin and also an ancient graveyard. Why the stone was put into, what is now a very boggy bit of the field, remains a mystery.

They were windsurfing in calm conditions and since many of them were falling off the boards, it was obvious that they were not enjoying the best of sport. There was a large tree trunk some fifteen feet long and approximately twelve inches in diameter lodged on the outside of the harbour wall. It had been washed up there during the high water. Ideal firewood material one would think? Not so! It was pushed into the Loch as a plaything, not in itself a dangerous act, but when they tired of this new found fun object it was left to float away. With luck it may come ashore and pose no threat, but should it become water logged and semi submerged, could endanger the many responsible Loch users. It is obvious that those responsible for the Centre rate safety as a high priority with rescue boats very much in evidence. They should also address the question of prevention in endangering other persons

by such irresponsible acts as was witnessed.






