The Price of Gold



In our July 1991 issue we made a note of a proposed gold mine near Tyndrum. Since that date we are now at the end of 5 years of exploration work.

Our photograph shows Cononish Farm and the scenic mountain background where the mine will be located. **The** mining company, a subsidiary of Ennex International pic, now estimates that the mine will produce 500 tonnes of ore per day which will yield by processing on site, over 30,000 ounces of gold per year, 20% of which will be in bars of gold with silver, the remainder being of a high grade concentrate. The mine will provide around 90 permanent jobs, a large proportion being local people.

So there you have it! At a public meeting held in Tyndrum on 28 September, attended by about 30 local people, there was unanimous support for the development. As the Secretary of the Strathfillan Community Council, J Riley, put it "Everyone here is very much in favour of the mine, it would be excellent for the local economy", an economy which at present is overdependent on tourism.

District Council Planning Permission Stirling District's Planning and Development Committee, on the casting vote of its Chairwoman **Catherine Organ**, has agreed in principle to the development. She said that in planning terms the issue was "finely balanced" and has set a first year bond of £800,000 to pay for restoration of the site; the bond will be increased in subsequent years. The matter, however, has now been passed to the Secretary of State since the development is departure from the Regional Structure Plan. Councillor Organ said "there is a considerable way to go before a final decision is given".

Risk to the Environment

It appears that the mining company are intending to adopt procedures and chemical processes which have satisfied the firm of consultants commissioned by the Council, to assess the mines environmental impact. "But" said Councillor Organ, "there are no cast iron guarantees".

Visual Impact

Objections to the *visual* impact of the mine buildings, beside Cononish Glen in the shadow of Ben Lui, have been lodged by Scottish Natural Heritage, the RSPB, Tay District Salmon Fisheries Board and the Scottish Wildlife Trust. But perhaps that and the small risk to the environment is an acceptable price to pay in return for the economic benefits to Tyndrum and district. But the "*price of gold*" may also delay the development until that price climbs higher on the commodities market! The mining company won't act until *the price is right*!

Killin Village Enhancement Initiative:

State of Play

The firm of consultants was commissioned to provide a plan "to improve the performance of the local economy of Killin by way of a 5 year development programme focusing on physical improvement to the village environment, visitor facilities and the economic improvement of local businesses". The firm **Tourism and Rural Initiatives Consultancy Ltd** has now produced a draft report after fairly widespread consultation with local organisations, businesses and individual people.

Realistic Solutions

At this stage it would be unfair to publicise in detail what is after all, a draft report about which many comments and criticisms will be made before the final report is submitted. The Killin News however, is able to say that the report, even at this stage, is the most encouraging plan for the village we have seen! It is realistic and offers possible solutions to many of the problems which have featured in our pages over the past two years, including the old chestnut of coach and parking and an attractive plan for the entrance area to Breadalbane Park! It will also highlight the need to improve the provision made for tourists and their treatment when in the village and emphasises the need to develop a trade or business association. But we are jumping the gun! Watch this space for a detailed account of the *final report* which will of course be presented to and discussed by a public meeting in the village.

COMMENT

The Tyndrum Gold Mine

We can understand Tyndrum's willingness to accept the gold mine. The probable boost to the local economy is attractive (jobs, housing, etc) and clearly the mining company are doing their best to minimise (or even exclude) any risks to the environment. But to get planning permission on the casting vole of the Chairwoman, suggests that there are those who find the development very worrying and as Councillor Organ says, referring to the claimed environmentally safe mining procedures, THERE ARE NO CAST IRON GUARANTEES!

As we write, the final decision rests with the Secretary of State and our guess is that he will approve. After all, a GOLD MINE sounds like a really attractive proposition! We sincerely hope that it turns out that way!



LOCH TAY FARM WATCH

It seems that the peaceful, untroubled tranquillity of Loch Tayside is a thing of the past. There have been, over recent years, a number of spectacular burglaries of remote houses, often farm houses temporarily empty, in which van loads of goods have been stolen.

In response to this, the local NFU and Tayside Police have set up a North Loch Tay Farm Watch initially covering the area Bridge



of Lochay Hotel to Fearnan. A Farm Watch is very similar to a Neighbourhood Watch, except that the properties tend to be more remote from each other, but both encourage good neighbourliness and techniques of observation and self help. In all they are intended to help the Police reduce crime.

The photograph above shows Atholl Taylor of Duallin Farm, co-ordinator of the North Loch Tay Scheme beside one of the warning signs. The Tayside Police would like to know if there is enough interest to set up a similar South Loch Tay scheme. Although part of such a scheme would be in the area of Central Scotland Police, this need not prevent its formation. Killin Community Council

A meeting of the Council was held on 14 October in the McLaren Hall, chaired by Dr E M McColl. In attendance were Constable I Donaldson and Regional Councillor Susan Duke; there were two members of the public present.

Tenants' Association - **In** view of the lack of interest shown in response to posters and a note in the Killin News, it was decided to proceed no further with the formation of a Tenants' Association in Killin.

School Barrier - Central Region Roads Department notified the Council that no further measures were necessary. Constable Donaldson offered to discuss the matter with Sgt Ralph of Accident Prevention Unit, Central Scotland Police. **Parking at Monemore** - Work not yet started on proposed development of new junction at Craignavie Road and coach dropping off area. Council to write for information about delay.

McLaren Hall - Letter to be written to Community Development Officer, SDC to speed up renovation work.

Hospital Car Service - Council still unhappy, even confused, about 'the Scottish Ambulance Services' reply to their letter asking for information. Agreed to seek MP Mr Forsyth's help (see article elsewhere in this issue of Killin News).

Finance - The Treasurer indicated that the Council's funds were reasonably healthy and suggested that local 'good causes' might have some financial help. It was agreed to give £30 to help the children's fireworks party and £50 to contribute to the Christmas Party for Playgroup and Mothers and Toddlers. Other groups might wish to approach the Council for financial help.

Strathfillan Community Council

Village Enhancement - Forth Valley Enterprise have decided to spend £208,000 on enhancement of the two villages along the lines recommended by an independent consultant. Local tradesmen will be able to quote for the work which will be controlled by a Committee made up of representatives from Community Council, Tourist Association and appropriate Public Body Officials, including Sieve Rodrick of Rural Stirling Economic Partnership.

Management of Loch Lomond and Trossachs - The Council unanimously agreed to support the agency on the basis that its planning authority should be limited and Tyndrum and Crianlarich should both be included.

Houses - Manse Field, Tyndrum -Project to commence November 1993 expected completion July 1994. Allocations to be made before completion. All allocation problems must be discussed by the individuals concerned with the professional staff of the Housing Association at Doune.

Tenants' Association - A public meeting is being arranged to consider the possibility of a Tenants' Association.

Gold Mine - At a public meeting on 28 September 1993, after extensive debate, every vote proffered was in favour of the development - there was none against.

Playing Field - Despite all our efforts we failed to stop the sale of the Railway Yard at Crianlarich. However, we are hoping to get help to obtain a playing field in the not too distant future, particularly for use by the School.

District Councillor's Surgery - Ian Martin has asked to publicise the fact that his surgery is held prior to each Community Council meeting. His next surgery will therefore be at 7.00 pm in Tyndrum Village Hall on Wednesday 1 December 1993.



Church Memorial Window Appeal



As reported in the July issue of Killin News the War Memorial Window in the Kirk was in danger of collapse. As a matter of urgency the window was removed and has now been repaired and restored to its rightful place.

The stained glass was reset in new lead with a new steel framed support which should last well into the next century.

The cost of the restoration is in the region of £6,500. The Society of Friends of Killin and Ardeonaig Parish Church have pledged £3,000 and there have been some much appreciated donations but there is a shortfall of £2,000. We would appeal to the people of Killin and district on behalf of what is a monument to those of all denominations who died in two world wars.

Hospital Car Service

Time was until April of this year that we had a locally organised Hospital Car Service. This service was voluntary and had the advantage of being able to match car and patient on an immediate basis. Since April however, the Ambulance Service of which the Hospital Car Service was a support, has been recognised. The Car Service still exists but is organised from Motherwell and the patient service has deteriorated. There is also a Patient Transport Service using ambulances based in Stirling. There have been instances of patients arriving very early or too late for appointments and the ambulance has to travel to Killin and back twice, a round trip of 160 miles. This system is not satisfactory:- (a) the staff do not necessarily know the area and (b) patients do not find the ambulances comfortable.

Because of the change, the local Ambulance with trained crew has, from time to time, been used as non essential transport, depriving the area of local accident and emergency cover. We have lost the personal touch that matched local needs to a local resource.

Workspace in Killin

We are interested to hear from any business or individual who is looking for workspace in Killin.

The Rural Stirling Economic Partnership is trying to assess the potential demand for small factory and office units. Inevitably, if any workspace is to be developed in the rural area, it will be where demand is strongest. It is also worth noting that new businesses could move into the area if suitable premises are available.

The type of workspace that is being considered for the rural area generally is of units of 300 to 1,000 sq ft.

At this stage there are no definite plans to construct any workspace in Killin, but if there is a demand for them, plans would be developed as quickly as possible, dependent on being able to secure the necessary resources. Killin and District Agricultural Society held their 11th Annual Sheepdog Trials at Finlarig on Sunday 5 September 1993.



The Breadalbane Evictions 1834-1862

It was during the reign of the Second Marquis of Breadalbane "Johnie My Lord" that trouble started on the estate. The Laird was often in London or abroad and left the management to his factor, John F Wylie, who followed the example of the Sutherland Estates by introducing sheep farming into Breadalbane. He ordered the evictions of crofters in Glen Quaich in the east, Morenish, Carwhin and Carie on north Loch Tayside and Cloichran on south Loch Tayside. It was a sad state of affairs. The following poem appeared in the magazine "PUNCH".

Oh No! Not Another Grey Drey!

Red Squirrels are native to Britain but now only survive in a few scattered areas in England, with strongholds in the north and in Scotland. They are now legally protected.



Red Squirrel numbers have always fluctuated, widely affected by habitat loss, availability of food and disease. During the last century, the trend has been one of rapid decline and at the same time a continuing increase in grey squirrel numbers. These are not natives of Britain and were brought here from America about 100 years ago. They have spread rapidly since then. In areas where red squirrel numbers have naturally dropped, greys have moved in. They are now spreading well into Scotland potentially threatening some of the red squirrels last refuges and have been seen along the lochside. If this invasion is not halted, our native squirrel may become extinct in Britain.

Providing red squirrels with an adequate and varied food supply will help. In the short term this can involve putting out food for them and special feeding hoppers have been developed which can only be used by red squirrels. In the longer term it will mean sympathetic woodland management and removal of the grey settlers. Such measures need co-ordinated action and so Squirrel Management Groups are being set up in Scotland, including one in this area to try to slow the spread of the grey squirrel. These groups need to know how widespread red and grey squirrels are. So if you see either kind, note down where and when you saw it and let me know. Every sighting is useful and prompt reporting of the arrival of grey squirrels in an area could help to save red squirrels in Scotland.

NEWSFLASH - 15 AUGUST 1936

Loch Tayside men climb Ben Lawers twice a day for four consecutive days



John McDonald of Croftintygan Farm and Adam Clark of Killin undertook this feat in order to build the Trig Point on top of Lawers. Sand, cement, gravel and tools were carried on the backs of two Highland ponies but the men walked. The Trig or Triangulation point was necessary for the new ordnance survey of that time. The road to the mountain was heavy going without the metalled surface of today.

At a time when Trig points are outmoded and Ordnance Survey are looking for people to adopt them, it is worth remembering the two stalwarts and the hill ponies of fifty odd years ago.


Comrie Drama

Your correspondent "A M Stewart" claims that guests at Firbush have carried out a "dangerous and irresponsible act ... endangering other persons", presumably "the many responsible Loch users". Did they plant mines or stretch barbed wire across the river? No. They apparently were spotted playing with a piece of driftwood and failed to return it to shore. Well, Mr Stewart, if you spot any of our guests committing such a "heinous crime" again, please report it to the member of staff in charge at the time. I am sure we can deal with it straight away.

I am much more concerned by the activities of the so called "fishermen" (and it is almost entirely a male phenomenon) that do so much damage and leave so much filth and rubbish around the Lochside. Particularly bad are the groups camping and caravanning at the former Forestry Commission Picnic Site adjacent to Firbush and at the mouth of the Brechlach burn. The Trespass Act (Scotland) 1865 makes such camping illegal, but the local police are reluctant to move people without a specific request from the landowner. I have not yet managed to track down the owner(s) who are clearly not local.

Could the District Council not take over such sites as parking/picnic sites and look after them? It is sad that people coming to enjoy the beauty and peace of the area should find the place looking like a rubbish tip.




