Memorial Service for RAF Tornado Crew



On the afternoon of Wednesday 22 March, on the hillside, high in Glenogle, swept by wintry winds, a large number of people gathered to take part in the Thanksgiving Service for Flight Lieutenants Patrick Peter Harrison and Peter John Michael Moseley, who lost their lives in the tragic crash of their aircraft in September of last year.

As well as the parents, friends and relatives, there was also a large contingent from No 13 Squadron RAF Marham. Also represented were the villages of Killin, Lochearnhead and Balquhidder, and all local services that had been involved.

The Service was introduced by the Rev. David McNaughton of Killin and hymns were sung to music provided by the RAF Kinloss Voluntary Band. Ministers from Callander and Balquhidder also took part, as did Padre Ian Greenhalgh, Station Chaplain RAF Marham.

Following the Bugler's Last Post, an Act of Dedication of a Memorial Stone took place involving the parents of the two airmen; and the proceedings were concluded by the playing of Flowers of the Forest and Mo Dhachaigh (My Home) by lone piper Duncan McKinnon of Ardeonaig.



Rising costs of the Killin News!

Those of you who attended our recent Annual General Meeting will remember that there was considerable discussion about the costs of your local newspaper. The last issue, for example, cost about 75p per copy! Although it was slightly larger than usual, it merely illustrates the recent trends. The production costs have risen by more than 60% and in spile of the great support of our advertisers we are currently running at a loss. In the short term, therefore, we will have to increase our advertising rates, probably by about 20 to 25%, and be somewhat less generous about extra copies. In the longer term, we are examining how we might reduce our production costs by trying to do ourselves some of the work, currently done by the SDC Resource Centre. When we started some four years ago, the Resource Centre operated as a "service relatively cheap to communities". About a year ago, the Council decided it had to "pay its way"; hence the 60% increase in production costs.

In forthcoming issues, therefore, we are going to be dependent on the continuing goodwill (and generosity) of **our** advertisers. Meanwhile we shall do our best to improve on the present production methods.

The Council met on Thursday 13 April in the McLaren Hall and Dr M McColl was in the chair. Councillor Susan Duke, CRC and Councillor Ian Martin, SDC were present.

Breadalbane Park Play Area: II was reported that the European Grant for this work has not materialised. Councillor Duke, however, though! that there were still possibilities for re-siting and improving it. Estimates for the repair of the fence between the Schoolhouse Garden, Glenairlie and the Park had not yet been received. SDC to be asked to contribute.

Dumping Refuse at Mart or opposite: Anyone doing so to be reported to the Police.

Killin Folk Festival: 16-18 June: It was agreed that camping in Breadalbane Park during this event should be allowed. It was suggested, however, that those using the facility should be asked to make a payment to the Community Council Funds. The Traders' Association to be contacted about this.

Revaluation of Commercial Properties: It was agreed to write to Michael Forsyth MP about the excessive increase in the above.

Rights of Way: Now that Dunmuir was to be sold, some effort should be made to re-establish the right of way in this area, it was agreed that Mr Holmes. Killin and Tim Dickson, Principal Countryside Ranger should be consulted.

Mr Ian McGregor, Retiral: Dr McColl presented Mr I McGregor with a cheque for $\pounds 250$ as an expression of the community's appreciation of his various helpful activities.

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Strathfillan Community Council

By-Election

II has been decided by Stirling District Council Community Services Department in consultation with community councils to postpone Community Council Elections from May 1995 until October 1996. However, Strathfillan Community Council decided at its meeting on 7 December 1994 by a majority of four votes to two that they would prefer to hold an Election to enhance their credibility with the community. Accordingly, a By-Election has now been arranged for 27 June 1995 and the timetable is summarised below:-

Last Dale for Lodging Nominations 29 May. Last Dale for Withdrawal of Nominations 5 June, Polling Day (if required) 27 June, Inaugural Meeting to be advised.

Community Council Elections are different from those for Local Councillors or MPs in that an Election only takes place if the number of nominations exceeds the maximum number of Councillors defined in the Constitution.

In Strathfillan this maximum number is 14 and there were only seven nominations for the May 1993 Elections, the remainder of our Councillors having been co-opted. Many people are doubtful about the credibility of a community council which has been appointed without the need for an Election. However, others consider that providing an Election and the opportunity for nominations have been well publicised then the council appointed, without an Election, is just as valid. Effectively those people who wish to serve the community are given that opportunity. In order to promote this Election on 27 June 1995 we have decided to print a special By-Election

issue of the "By the Way" newsletter. Our wish is that the Strathfillan community will lake an active interest in this Election and ensure that the number of nominations exceeds 14, thus necessitating an Election and assuring the credibility of the new council.

Tyndrum Village Hall Association

I am pleased to announce that we have been awarded a grant for refurbishment of the Village Hall of approximately £12,000 from the Scottish Office and £6,000 from Stirling District Council. The cost of the project will be approximately £24,000 the remaining £6,000 being provided from Hall funds plus an overdraft at the Bank. The Village Hall is the property of all residents on the electoral role of Tyndrum, all of whom are entitled to attend all committee meetings and vote on issues raised. The purposes of the village hall are:-

1 To provide recreational facilities of a social, educational, cultural and sporting nature.

2 To promote a spirit of friendship and enhance community life, being welcoming to all members and their friends.

3 To improve conditions of life in the community, without distinction of race, sex or political opinions.

It is the hope of the committee that the presence of a newly refurbished hall will encourage much greater numbers of people to enthusiastically and energetically take part in both rejoining and enjoying our activities. 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Killin Village Enhancement Project

At present Stirling District Council's Planning Department are consulting residents and proprietors of homes and shops adjacent to the Breadalbane Park entrance. This process will assist in ensuring that revised environmental improvements for this area have the full support of the community. We will know by 11 May 1995 the outcome of this project's bid for European funding under the European Regional Development Fund. Once this information is available we will know what resources can be deployed. Negotiations are continuing for the purchase of the ground beside the Capercaillie restaurant. This site has been designated as the preferred site for a new car park for the Village. The Rural Stirling Partnership will endeavour to talk to the various Coach Tour operators who visit Killin to establish what would encourage them to stay longer and thereby allow their passengers access to more of the villagers amenities. This will be done prior to any final decision on coach parking to ensure that all parlies have been adequately consulted. Once all these threads have been pulled together it should be possible to hold the next meeting of the Killin Village Enhancement Group to discuss the next moves.

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Salmon Fishing Dispute Settled

Owners of salmon rights on Loch Tay have been in dispute with the Tay District Salmon Fisheries Board. Briefly the storm on the Loch has been over the number of rods a single fisherman with a salmon right might use to troll for salmon. Traditionally on Loch Tay a single rightholder or someone with the rightholder's permission could fish with three rods. Recently a policy of one rod only was being promulgated by the Board. After intense pressure from salmon right holders, pointing out the provenance of rights, preceding the 1951 Salmon Scotland Act, the Board according to a report in the Courier of 25 April 1995, has accepted that salmon right holders on Loch Tay may continue to fish with three rods, but no more than three per boat.

This ruling means that revenue from renting out salmon rights will not be lost. Anglers would be loath to rent a right which would allow only one rod to the individual fisherman. The Board, according to the Courier, wishes to commend proprietors and anglers who have in the past restricted and will continue to restrict the total number of rods used in their boats to a maximum of three.

It is unfortunate that the Board did not discuss the matter with the West Loch Tay Salmon Fishers Association before attempting to put policy into action or indeed give notice to salmon right holders, many of whom were harassed by the Bailiffs employed by the Board.

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A bad Winter for the Sheep

When asked to write a bit about the effect of the Winter on sheep, we had just had three very wet months with over 30 inches of rain since 1 January. Cold, wet weather over a long period is just about the worst a sheep has to stand.

In cold, dry weather the fleece provides excellent insulation so the sheep needs less energy to keep herself warm. She therefore has more chance of giving birth to and rearing a healthy lamb.

In wet weather the sheep uses all her energy trying to keep warm. It is also harder to get a dry place to lie and the ground becomes very soft, making it harder for her to get about.

The sheep give birth at the end of April until mid-May. The six weeks prior to this are the most important.

Fortunately, this year, although the sheep were lean at the beginning of April, it has been a better month with little rain or hard frost.

If the weather behaves for the next few weeks a reasonable lambing is hoped for.

As far as Chernobyl is concerned, another farm was released from the scheme in January. Levels continue to fall, but testing will probably continue for a few more years yet.

End of an Era

With the retiral of George and Paddy after 47 years, Smith's Joinery firm closed, the last of four including the Breadalbane Estate Joinery that once flourished in Killin. Fred Smith took over the business in 1942 from Ronnie Fraser. When George and Paddy started in their present premises the machinery was worked by two mill wheels, water driven. Electricity was put in the 1950s. George started his apprenticeship at 10/- a week working on the wooden clinker built Estate and Hotel fishing boats.

The firm saw social changes, worked and made the last cart wheel and produced the last working mill wheel for Edramucky and provided shuttering for the Hydro Electric schemes formative buildings. At one time employing eight people, work took the firm to Glen Etive and Blackmount for estate projects. George remembers carrying



materials up to the Lawers/Ben Ghlas site hut for repair work. As well as keeping the books since 1947 Paddy looked after customers DIY needs, supplying nails, screws etc.

Although the business has closed, joinery work is being undertaken by John Sinclair who worked with the Smiths for 32 years.

Weather

Not since the glorious April of 1984 has the lambing period passed without at least one disastrous day and night of cold, downpour, gale and highly unpleasant conditions. Although April was a month of contrasts with periods of cold north east winds, on the whole the weather was reasonably dry, which, coupled with warmer interludes, also dry overhead, was a boon to the new born lamb which stands a much better chance of survival when dry, though cold, than when conditions perhaps some degrees less cold are wet and stormy and where wind chill and exposure arc detrimental to survival.

March 1995 contained what was perhaps the worst of the winter's weather. The arrivals of spring migrants was more or less on cue. Although a notable absence in recent years is that of skeins of gees flying north over Ardtalnaig, this may mean that for some reason these birds are taking perhaps a more easterly route on their journey from the Solway, Morecambe Bay and other winter-ways to their nesting grounds in the Tundra's of Spitzbergen, Novaya Zembla and so on.

The members had been making plans for this occasion for some time and the last few weeks of hectic preparations culminated with the Centenary Meeting on Saturday 25 March in the McLaren Hall. There was a large attendance of Lodge Members and representatives from the Lodges in the Province, supported by friends of the Brethren from as far afield as Nottingham and Huddersfield.

The RWM Brother William L Stitt welcomed the assembled Brethren into the Lodge on this special day and hoped they would all enjoy (he proceedings. The deputation from the Provincial Grand Lodge of Perthshire West headed by Brother David H Cramb DPGM was then admitted and welcomed. The Deputation from the Grand Lodge of Scotland headed by Brother (he Right Honourable The Lord Burton MWGMM was received in due form and welcomed by Brother Stitt on behalf of the Lodge members.

The impressive ceremonial of re-dedication was then carried out by (he Grand Master Mason of Scotland Brother The Lord Burton and the Office Bearers of Grand Lodge.

The Centenary Dinner followed at the Killin Hotel when the traditional Toasts were honoured.

There are entries which mark members leaving the area from overseas; Canada, America, South Africa, New Zealand, Australia, India and Spain and to other parts of the UK.

it is also fact that visitors to our corner of Perthshire who had stayed for a few years joined the Lodge and there is mention in later Minutes that they continued their Masonic interest back in their home locality.

From the early days the Members have in supporting assisted local organisations and have been present at fund raising events, the first of these being a concert in the Drill Hall, now Killin Crafts and associated premises, in aid of local charities. Today the Lodge plays its part in carrying on the example set by our founders.

The present Lodge Members trust that they carry the hopes and aims of our founders with pride and it is our prayer that caring Masons will still be meeting into the millennium and for all time to come, in the Lodge Room at Manse Brae.

Incidentally among the different meeting places over the years, one cannot be accurately located, namely the Killin Armoury, where there was a meeting in March 1906; any thoughts on this would be appreciated.

There were two certificates presented for long standing membership of the Lodge. Brother William Allan received his certificate for 60 years and Brother John Lawrie his certificate for 50 years membership. Brother Allan joined on the 4 December 1933 and Brother Lawrie on the 5 February 1945.

At the invitation of Brother Stitt, Brother The Lord Burton handed over the signed documents and warmly congratulated the two worthy Brothers who received resounding applause in appreciation of their service to the Lodge from the assembled company.

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Killin and Breadalbane Angling Club

The trout angling club was founded in 1881 by permission of the Earl of Breadalbane who agreed to incorporate his name in the club name. There have been many notable members:-Peter Ross, a local shopkeeper, developed a trout fly which still bears his name, as does the corner of the island in the confluence of the Lochay and the Dochart. Danny Campbell, local newsagent for many years fished for Scotland many times, as indeed did Willie Allan, his successor at the newsagents. Mr Kynoch, the originator of the Kynoch Killer and the Split Kynoch, lived at Tir Artair within quite recent memory.

The Centenary Dinner was held in 1981, when 100 people celebrated 100 years of club life. The Guest of honour was Alistair Nicholl, Secretary of the Scottish National Angling Society and an international angler. In 1984 the local team progressed to the semi-finals of the Benson and Hedges National Competition at

Graffham Water, but failed to reach the final. The team comprised Willie Allan, John Elders, George More, Jim Simpson, the late Jim Christie and Tony Weaver. In 1981, early in the morning, two poachers were arrested with two salmon under the bridge on the Dochart. No owner could be found to take out an injunction. On investigation by Douglas Allan and Tony Weaver, it was found that, despite denials by Breadalbane's Solicitors, Countess Breadalbane still owned the Salmon Right for the water between the old mill and the bridge. This Right was purchased by the club for use by members who are permanent residents of the village.

Their number is limited by the extent of the water. Dr Tony Weaver resigned as President after serving 16 years, the present President is Alex Stewart.





Killin Traditional Music and Dance Festival

What a perfect place for it! Killin will resound to the sounds of folk music, culture and Appalachian clogs during the weekend of 16-18 June this vear with the arrival of the first Killin Folk Festival. Performers due to appear include Dougie McLean, Ali Bain and Phil Cunninghame, Jimmie MacGregor and Croabh Rua. There will be ceilidhs at several venues in the area and a "muckle Sangs" concert, sponsored by TMSA (Traditional Music and Song Association). Other artists appearing include The Sangsters, The Broads and Steve Carroll.

Workshops planned include ceilidh dancing with Bob Blair, women's voice with Sheena Wellington and fiddle playing with Aly Bain. The Appalachian Clog Dancing - come along and find out at a special workshop. Children have not been forgotten. There will be events for children over (he weekend - singing, dancing and great fun! Competitions have been organised for musical pairs and ceilidh bands. Entries invited.

The Folk Festival as it has come to be called is being run by the enterprising Killin and District Traders' Association in conjunction with Danger Inc, a firm of Celtic Music Consultants. The Festival Sponsorship has been secured from a number of sources including Scottish Brewers and Forth Valley Enterprise. The Festival has been designed to lift the economic profile of the area and considerable interest has been shown judging by the number of enquiries from the UK and overseas.

Breadalbane Park has been designated the official Festival campsite and there will be a Festival Office situated just inside the gates of the park. The organisers acknowledge the assistance
