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
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

Tickets will be available around the beginning of October so please look out for Facebook posts and notices in the Co-op and P.O. to find out where you can get your tickets.





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Shops in Killin

In the last Killin News, Margaret MacIver suggested that it would be interesting to record the history of buildings in the village that are or have once been shops or businesses. Several people agreed we should not let the knowledge slip away and Killin Heritage Society has offered to help bring the information together. The Society has many records and Killin Past and Present posts fascinating pictures on the Killin Facebook page, but there are many villagers with fond memories who can help to build that history. The Society has agreed to put together a plan of the buildings along Main Street from the Bridge of Dochart to the Maclaren Hall as a start, with a guide to encourage contributions from anyone with information. We hope to make the plan and guide available in the Library and other venues for completion. We will also put up posters inviting information and

giving contact details. Killin Heritage will collect all the responses and eventually hold an event presenting the information and inviting you to come and talk about it. A similar event a few years ago on the Killin Railway turned into a lively afternoon stimulating many amusing stories and surprising details which had largely been forgotten.

Shops and businesses are the backbone of a village and history often stimulates ideas for the future. Collecting this history will stimulate memories and encourage us to get back together. Of course we will have to work within Covid restrictions and the timing of the presentation event is uncertain, but we are working out how best to begin collecting the information and will circulate further news on the project.

Old Mill

We are delighted that the Thrift Shop at the Old Mill is now open once more. At present it's opening Friday afternoon, Saturday afternoon and Sunday, and the Honesty Stall is also set up outside.

The first task in bringing Heritage back to the Old Mill is to get the wheel turning and also to tidy up the space around the Mill. A volunteer day on Saturday 18th September helped with this. We are continuing to fundraise to further our heritage offerings and recently received just over £9k from the Scottish Government's 'Adapt and Thrive' programme.

RecyKillin

KAT is delighted to support the RecyKillin programme in its development and we are pleased to see members beginning to join up. A RecyKillin launch is arranged for Sunday 10th October from 1-4pm at the Old Mill, where you can pick up a membership for just £10, find out more about the project and feed in your own ideas as to how it develops.

Breadalbane Park

Progress on the Park play area is continuing with a new slide recently installed by Stirling Council and the removal of the fence. Thanks to the fantastic community fundraising efforts and support through the Coop's community giving scheme we believe there will soon be sufficient funds to add another new piece of equipment, and discussions will be held shortly to agree timescales with Stirling Council for this.

We are also continuing to seek further details on the Scottish Government's pledge to invest in play areas and have strongly set out Killin's case for funding to the local MSP and Stirling Council.

Scottish Land Fund/Community Right to Buy

The Scottish Land Fund have recently received a Stage 1 Bid for funding from KAT, and we are continuing to liaise with the Scottish Government's Community Right to Buy Team with regards to the current Co-op building. It is hoped that the Stage 1 SLF application will be accepted by November. Initial discussions, through Alyn Smith MP's office, have established that the Co-op are willing look at a community ownership bid and we will seek to pursue these discussions when SLF funding is secured. KAT were also pleased to support the Ardeonaig and Ardtalnaig Community Association, in discussions with the SLF. The Association has recently set up a steering group of local residents to look at the future of the Abernethy Outdoor Centre.

Funding: Dochart Bridge Lights & Friends of the Cemetery

The funding application to help reinstall lights to the Bridge was successful and the project will receive £1500 from Stirling Council. The new Friends of Killin Cemetery group were also successful and were awarded nearly £600 from the Community Pride Fund.

Sports Pavilion

Following the recent request by KDSLC that KAT take over the lease of the Pavilion, attempts have been made to engage with Stirling Council on this issue and examine how local sports facilities can be brought up to a modern standard. Cllr Martin Earl has now taken up this issue and is seeking to facilitate discussions with

senior Stirling Council officers.

Allotments

We are still awaiting a response from Stirling Council on the request to provide allotment and/or food growing space in the community. Under the Community Empowerment Act 2015 every community in Scotland has the right to access allotments/food growing space and Stirling Council's Food Growing Strategy outlines the Council's vision that everyone in the area has access to 'a range of growing opportunities'. It is hoped that Stirling Council will soon undertake an Open Space Audit to establish the availability of suitable land for the project. KAT have also applied for funding through the LLTNP Greener Recovery Fund to further examine the demand for food growing opportunities locally, and if successful it is hoped this will be able to link into any work Stirling Council are taking forward in order to meet their statutory responsibilities.





Pupil council

We are currently looking to recruit new drivers to the Killin and District Volunteer Drivers, to enable us to continue providing the same level of service we have for the past 3 years. As a driver for the scheme you can decide to drive as little or as much as you wish and you can set your own mileage limit. Some people only drive within the village, whilst others are prepared to drive longer distances to get people to essential appointments, and the more drivers we have, the fewer journeys each driver has to undertake.

To become a driver, you need a car which is taxed, insured and MOT'd. You will need to have a current approved PVG certificate, which is paid for by Volunteer Scotland. You will be supplied with any equipment you require, including a fire extinguisher, first aid kit and any appropriate PPE you will have to use, while driving, during this

current Covid Situation.

The Car Scheme was initially created to support those people within our community who cannot use public transport to get to places which support and maintain their wellbeing. Imagine not being able to visit family, your doctor, getting to an appointment, attending groups and being stuck indoors day after day. For many of our passengers, there is also a social aspect when out with one of our drivers. This is often the only time they get out of the house and is also an opportunity to have a good blether as well as meeting new people. For the drivers it is also a time to meet some interesting people, from the community, which they would not otherwise have done, so a positive, enjoyable experience for both parties.

Drivers receive 45p a mile to cover the cost of petrol and wear and tear of their vehicles. This is the amount volunteer drivers are able to receive without it affecting their tax. You will also be offered appropriate training, now and again and receive regular updates as well as get togethers, with other drivers. We are a very friendly, welcoming and supportive group of people, so if you think you might like to join us why not ring Don on 01567 820690 for more information.

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Killin Community Council



At the recent meeting of the Community Council the issue of overnight parking of campervans was raised. Many of you will have noticed the large signs erected by Stirling Council prohibiting overnight stays in the three village car parks. This is partly as a result of the Community Council expressing concerns about overnight stays, particularly in the parking bays on Dochart Road overlooking the falls. This last location is due to be attended to soon, hopefully with a somewhat more discreet sign.

Feedback on social media appears to be mixed, though most agree that the signs are a bit OTT. Have they made a difference? Not much, the number of campervans parking overnight in the Station Road car park remains largely the same, probably because they are aware, though social media of course, that this prohibition is unenforceable. There have also been complaints of campervans parking in the cemetery carpark, and at the end of Pier Road.

What's to be done? Well, there were suggestions that we could try to establish the Station Road car park as a campervan friendly parking area. This would probably require liaison with Stirling Council to provide waste disposal facilities, and ensure the toilets are kept clean and open 24/7. There could be a community benefit as we could ask for donations for the upkeep of the facilities from those using them, or we could ask Stirling Council to install a parking charge system and forego any financial benefit other than the increase in tourist footfall. It might also relieve pressure on these local areas that are manifestly unsuitable for overnight stays. We could, of course, petition Stirling Council for the introduction of bylaws enforcing these prohibitions, perhaps initiating a new era of responsible tourism or, more

probably, a weird and inevitably doomed game of whack-a-mole.

The other major issue arising at our last meeting was the vexed question of the future shape and makeup of our Main Street, Patterns of consumption are changing and the pandemic has accelerated this process. Asda and Sainsburys vans are in the village every day, and more and more of us are ordering stuff online. The Hogg Trust is applying for a change of use for the shop that previously hosted the Post Office to a disabled friendly ground floor flat. The relocation of the Coop and the closure of the Bank of Scotland branch have created other gaps in the Main Street which the Killin and Ardeonaig Trust is valiantly trying to fill with community initiatives and start-ups. The erstwhile antique shop is now scheduled to be two single bedroom holiday lets and the previous pedestrian walkway along this section of Main Street has been closed off. This matters. Should we engage in what some people would say was a Sisyphean struggle to maintain the character of our village, or should we compromise with modernity and try to ensure that the inevitable changes are managed in a way that enhances

the appeal of the village and the quality of our individual and communal lives?

These are difficult questions, and we are seeking community guidance as to how best we approach them, never mind answer them. To this end we are asking the community to engage with us to provide advice, criticism and ideas. We are seeking feedback on these issues and have set up an email account: killinfeedback@gmail.com to receive your suggestions. You can also engage with our Facebook page or, if you have no access to digital communications, just let your nearest Community Councillor know your thoughts. We are hoping that we can initiate a conversation that will resolve these dilemmas and point the way forward for the local community as a whole.

Due to constraints of space and Killin News publishing deadlines, we have not been able, in this report, to give proper account of the many services and benefits your community council has rendered unto you over the last two months. Needless to say, they are many and wonderous. Trust me!

Well, what a strange 18 months it has been, adapting to lockdowns, working from home, home schooling, social distancing and for many people, including myself, shielding. For many it has been an awful time: losing loved ones, missing weddings and funerals, or simply being separated from our nearest and dearest - I just hope that we can get back to a safe and sustainable 'normality'. I don't normally put my own thoughts into the Killin News, just provide an update on the works of the Trust, but I would like to extend a heartfelt thanks to all the Trustees and members who have supported the Trust and myself over the past year or so. The Board have been a great support and have done an amazing job juggling their own disrupted lives and volunteering for the Trust thank you! I would also like to extend a special thanks to Theresa Elliot, our Chair, who has been a rock throughout.

Community Place Plan

As mentioned in the last edition, we are reaching the end of the Community Place Plan process. The final document is currently with the publishers, getting its final tweaks and being spruced up. We are hoping that it will be published by the end of this month. It will be available digitally on our website, and we will send round the link once it is completed. We will, however, print a small number of copies for those unable to access the internet, and for reference in the Trust office.

If you would like a hardcopy, please register your interest with Kelly. We would like to extend thanks to Derek Manson of the National Park Authority's Planning and Communities Team, who has supported us throughout the process, the National Park's Capacity Grant Scheme for funding the project, and a special thank you to Ron Allner from Killin, who at very short notice has provided fantastic photos for the publication. We would also like to extend a big thank you to all the residents and businesses who took part in the Place Plan consultations, we could not have done it without you.

Crianlarich Community Garden

By the time this goes out we will have erected our shed and cleared more areas of the site, with a view to installing raised beds and developing parking and turning areas. We have also submitted final plans to the National Park's Planning Team for the creation of a small vehicle access from Meadow Grove, and pedestrian access from the main road. Once they have given them the OK we will work on developing these over the coming months. We have been lucky enough to be donated some raised beds and road materials from Morgan Sindall, who have been working on undergrounding the local electricity cables. We don't expect to start growing much before next spring, however we hope to get everything ready to hit the ground running. If you're interested in getting involved in the Community Garden, then please get in touch with Kelly - it is

open to everyone across the Strathfillan area.

Strathfillan Seasonal Rangers

Our Seasonal Rangers' pilot has been going extremely well, and it has been noted how much cleaner and tidier the area is looking - from both locals and regular visitors. Clare West and Gavin Macnab have been doing a sterling job and have thrown themselves whole heartedly into the role - we could not have asked for better rangers. Their roles finish at the end of October however but we are hoping that with the success of the pilot, we can secure funding for next year and employ rangers from April to October, keeping our community cleaner and safer for longer.



The pandemic meant that progressing the Bikes Skills Park has been very delayed. However, we moved forward as best we could in the circumstances. Our final, technical plans and Feasibility Study were completed by March this year, and the project is currently going through planning. Our consultants

are doing a great job working with the planners with any questions and issues they might have. We have recently applied to National Park Authority's Green Recovery Fund for money to employ a dedicated project officer for the Bike Skills Park. We hope that by increasing the Trust's capacity we can keep up momentum and more easily secure the funding we need to build the trails. Hopefully, we will have heard if we have been successful by the time the Killin News is out.

Cycle Path

The Community Place Plan consultations have shown that completing the Tyndrum to Crianlarich cycle path is still a high priority across the whole community, from young people to local businesses. This has bolstered our endeavours to get the next phase progressed. As with many things, the pandemic has delayed much progress, with many agencies and organisations we would work with being unable/unwilling to interact. The Trust has agreed that to get the project moving we need to escalate it through the National Park Authority and beyond. We are also getting some support from NatureScot, who have been instructed by the Scottish Government to install core cycle paths across Scotland, which our cycle path forms part of one. We do not expect much immediate progress but hope to get the ball rolling again in the coming months.

Saplings

One small but important success this year has been our ability to host a couple of Saplings sessions in the



area. We held two sessions, canoeing on the River Fillan with Active Stirling, and Feltmaking with Heartfelt in Dalmally at Dalmally Community Orchard. 

THE KILLIN CONNECTION

Strangers on the Hill

One of the main reasons for starting this series of articles was to celebrate Killin's international heritage; the "connection" between a wee place and beyond. Whether going out to the world or inviting it in, Killin has always had a cosmopolitan spirit. The story of this issue is a textbook example - that of our once thriving Flemish community.

It's no secret that Scotland owes a lot to the Flemish, from textiles to architecture, masonry and glassblowing to language (kirk, scone, etc), surnames (Fleming) and possibly even national sports, golf and curling (sacrilege!). Less tangible but equally important was the mark these skilled people left on our own local industry, particularly weaving. Settling sometime between the 17th and 18th centuries, migrants from Flanders (now in modern Belgium) were introduced to teach native weavers the latest methods in linen production. They lived in the small township of Ard na Gaul, today a cluster of ruined buildings on the north bank of the Dochart river. This "height of the strangers", as the English translation suggests, goes largely unnoticed by drivers speeding toward Killin but was arguably the lifeblood of the village economy at one time.

The history of Flemish migration to Scotland goes back several hundred years; the initial wave following the Norman Invasion of Britain in 1066. David Canmore ascended the Scottish throne in 1124 (as David I) and his wife Maud, of Flemish stock, came north with him accompanied by a large retinue of her Flemish kinsfolk. These were people of knightly status, but soon others, notably merchants and craftsmen, made their way directly to ports on the east coast. Despite Flanders being the commercial powerhouse of medieval Europe, over-population, unfair inheritance practices and scarcity of land were driving many across the water. On the other hand, Scotland was the main supplier of wool to Flanders but had yet to

develop a textile industry of its own. The solution: bring Flemish weavers here and let them teach the population. And so began a partnership that would last over 500 years.

It is hard to determine exactly when these "strangers" arrived in Killin, as there exists no written evidence of their presence. The earliest mention of the settlement Ard na Gaul is from a charter dated 1613. If, as some sources claim, the correct translation is "hill of the foreigner" then there is little doubt of Flemish occupancy around this time. Another meaning, "height of the Lowlander" is more

puzzling but not wholly inaccurate, as many Flemish migrants travelled from south of the Highland line. Furthermore, the timeline matches closely with two significant events: the 1587 Act of Parliament which gave legal support to Flemish migrants and subsequent influx of

weavers in 1606. Could ours be among them?

Contemporary texts state that the Second Earl of Breadalbane was responsible for encouraging Flemish immigration to the area, suggesting Ard na Gaul was occupied much later in the 18th century. Thomas Pennant, the traveller and historian, wrote of this time: "The country manufactures a great deal of thread. They spin with 'rocks' which they do as they watch their cattle on the hills, and £1600 worth of yarn was sold out of Breadalbane at Fairs during the year." Killin alone held six fairs annually and brought merchants from all over the country. The yarn was then taken to cities like Glasgow for manufacture into cloth. A statistical account from 1793 shows that in the Killin parish there were: 63 weavers, 38 tailors, 36 woodworkers, 26 shoemakers, 20 flax dressers, 10 smiths, 9 masons, 4 hosiers and 1 dyer. Undoubtedly, these skills were a result of Flemish influence. The spinning-wheel, once a luxury item of Flanders, was now found in every Scottish county and the raw material feeding it - flax could grow just as well in Killin as it did near Bruges. Another Flemish innovation, the weaving mill, brought an increasingly mechanised way of life to the district, with perhaps the first in the Highlands built at Lawers.

From the mid 19th century onwards the production of linen became confined to industrial hubs in the south. Demand for flax waned, as jute, hemp and cotton became far more profitable. Now the only commercial flax grown in Scotland is for linseed oil and there is only one mill left still weaving linen. Flanders remains a heavyweight in the industry; indeed "Belgian Linen" is a registered trademark of the Belgian Flax and Linen Association, comprising over 1500 artisans and companies growing and weaving flax. It is somewhat touching to think that their forebears may have once called a wee Scottish village home.

Unexpected encounters of the **Geoffrey Kind**

Recent nursery in service days brought a couple of childminding days. Granny had three children down on the beach at the Costa del Ardeonaig, a lovely sunny day prealgae. While carrying out the usual activities of collecting pretty pebbles and interesting bits of wood they suddenly noticed a half fledged duckling coming up to them. He was quite alone, not a parent in sight. As he was fairly fearless we assumed that he was part of a group of mallard who fed at the house and were the worst parents ever, regularly leaving their tiny babies to fend for themselves. The mallard branch of social services really needs to pull its socks up. As we left the children sang 'goodbye Geoffrey" and raced back to tell me all about this surprise. This got us thinking about the unusual events seen lately. Recently a beautiful long eared owl was twice seen happily sitting out on a local hill in broad daylight. The books say that, like most owls, they are active only at night but this guy had obviously not read the books.

Another owl encounter surprised us one afternoon in our garden just by the house. A barn owl was sitting quite nonchalantly under a rhododendron bush. Barn owls do hunt in the dusk and are really beautiful as they glide silently along but this was unusual.

We have had resident nuthatches for some years now and they have bred well this year but its only in the last few days that we have seen them burying seeds in plant pots, the veg plot and between paving. According to the said books this is normal behaviour and they can remember the location for up to 30 days but I expect that we will have a few

random sunflowers next year. And then there's Russell Crowe, oh sorry, I was meaning Russel's crow who is cleverly loosening the 'security bars' designed to keep him from stealing all the food on the manse bird table. This is a real problem all over the village and it's hard to keep ahead of these new behaviours. Not relying entirely on divine intervention wire netting has now been installed. Annoying also is the coal tit who repeatedly tosses out 99% of the mixed seed to find one special nugget that he wants. We call him Kevin. Maybe he is in the pay of the blackbirds and robins who benefit by the shower of easy food. Last year was the first time that we didn't have house martins nesting, this year the same - no interest at all

and hardly a martin to be seen. Just as we were thinking that our particular clan of birds must have met hard times on migration a huge flock of over a hundred made a late August dash to repeatedly examine old nests

too late. Why? I remember years ago seeing a hoopoe in Glen Lochay and godwits by Moirlannich but not all unexpected occurrences are feathered. One evening just at dusk the security light went on and we expected to see the hedgehog but a pine marten was confidently smiling at us, if pine martens do ever smile. They do

become very cheeky around buildings and are far more common than you may think.

Some time ago we found a large intact salmon lying in the field about thirty metres from the loch. We never did find out whether it was a four legged or two legged poacher who must have been surprised and had to run for it. My wife is surprised when a new wild orchid appears in the garden or seedling oak tree which are presumably the result of squirrel hoarding.

We remember when it was a real surprise to see a beaver but no longer. Once it was unusual to see Mr. Fox out and about in the village but no longer. He has been so bad of late breaking and entering hutches and eating several pet bunnies. Just remember if you feed wild animals there may be consequences to attracting them amongst houses. It must be Mr. Fox's cousin who is doing exactly the same in Crieff, wandering around the streets and stealing pet rabbits and hens. But it doesn't have to be an unusual sighting to interest us. The more commonplace sight of squirrels or hares playing and young speckled pom pom robins is always worth watching and we are so fortunate around here to see so much.

Scots never quite let their hair down, do they? I noted that the elation at Scotland beating Austria in a recent World Cup qualifying round was quickly followed with the customary warnings about messing up the next game and how it could all end badly! However, I think this is a common trait in the human race not just in those who live north of

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the border. Joy, in human experience is often tempered with mild to medium foreboding!

We have experienced one of the strangest periods we have known in living history with an unprecedented national lockdown. Great concerns resulting from this are ongoing. Strength and Balance is Back!!

Late Update: the sessions are unfortunately suspended for a while due to the Killin Hotel having to close during the day due to staff and supply issues.

The sessions will resume as soon as the hotel re-opens and alternative premises are being located in case it takes too long. Please keep an eye on the local social media for updates.

We are delighted to announce the return of our volunteer led sessions for folk who feel they could benefit from some gentle, but important exercise.

The Paths For All Strength and Balance programme was developed with expert input from Professor Dawn Skelton of Glasgow Caledonian University. It consists of 14 simple exercises that will improve strength and balance and reduce the risk of falls in adults with advice on walking to help adults stay active and independent.

Awareness of the benefits of regular physical activity is increasing, however there is less knowledge and understanding about the importance of activities that improve muscle strength and balance throughout our adult lives.

Strength and Balance is a great way to stay active, keep up your social connections and to meet the UK Chief Medical Officer's Physical Activity Guidelines which recommend that adults should:

- aim to be active daily.
- reduce and break up sitting time (ideally every 20-30 minutes)
- incorporate activity to improve muscle strength twice each week.
- should take part in activity that improves balance and coordination twice each week

If you or someone you know would maybe benefit from taking part in the weekly session, which lasts an hour and is FREE, please just come along to the Killin Hotel at 1.30pm on Wednesdays.

Dreadnought Pocket Place

Work is well underway for the development of a brand-new Dreadnought Pocket Place outside MacGregor's Community Hub and Post Office. The project not only improves the accessibility of the walkway but also creates a friendly space for locals and visitors to relax, recharge, and connect.



So, what is the Pocket Place programme and what can locals expect to see once the work is complete?

The programme gives communities the chance to shape the way their neighbourhoods look, and by making it a better place to walk, cycle and wheel, increasing accessibility for everyone. The Pocket Place is also a space to pause, and an opportunity to take a moment to gather up the beauty that surrounds us in this wee village.

We can expect a new bike rack with space for an adult tricycle or an adapted bike, a log wall made from locally sourced wood and corten steel, a seating area where locals and visitors can sit and relax while they wait for the Post Office, fill in the crossword from the day's newspaper or chat with a friend. An area will be created with low-level plants that will not only bring colour and life to the area, but also assist drainage. "This area of the village has been hazardous and an eyesore for a long time: this project will make the area safer and aesthetically more pleasant. People passing through the village can stop, order hot drinks from Shutters, buy cold drinks from us and eat their pieces in a relaxed environment" Katy told me when discussing the plans. "It'll be braw!"

The project is delivered by Sustrans Scotland in partnership with MacGregor's Community Hub.
