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Killin and District Resilience Plan

The Community Council has completed a Resilience Plan for the village and the local area. The plan will be continuously reviewed and amended as the need arises, but key personnel have been identified and recruited and the plan is now operational. Due to data protection issues many of those volunteering to provide additional help and resources will only be listed in the full (and restricted) plan. We are immensely grateful for their volunteered service.

The main purpose of the plan is to provide an organisational structure for relief efforts in the event of an emergency or local crisis event, such as occurred during Storm Arwen in late November 2021. The Resilience Team will give support to the emergency services in the event of a major incident. The team will also organise and co-ordinate the community response, seek to mitigate risks and attendant hazards, and assist local residents and visitors, particularly the elderly and vulnerable. The default muster point and contact point in the event of a breakdown in communications will be the McLaren Hall. The McLaren Hall will also provide a refuge for those who may need it. 
It is useful to take some simple precautions in the event of an emergency situation, such as a prolonged power cut. Keeping a torch and spare batteries and a simple camping gas stove in the event of a power cut is highly recommended. It is important to keep warm and hydrated during cold weather, so warm clothing, tins of soup, Bovril, etc. are also recommended. Other items worth consideration include battery operated LED camping lanterns, a mobile gas heater and Hi-Viz jackets.

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

Housing

Housing was the major issue at our recent meeting. The National Park held an MS Teams meeting in June which focused on 'Housing Pressures in the National Park Area'. This was very well attended both by stakeholders and by local agencies. It was also very well researched and presented by the National Park authority and its consultancy partners. There is a serious shortage of affordable housing in the Park area. This is being driven by two trends; the first is house price inflation, and the second is changes in the ownership and usage of the existing housing stock. The National Park's research indicated that Killin was above average in house price inflation, but it was the change in usage that compounded Killin's problems. Throughout the Park, longterm rental properties are being repurposed as holiday lets or sold, often ending up as second homes. Existing owner-occupied housing is also suffering from this trend, further fuelling house price inflation by reducing the available residential housing stock. This has numerous ramifications. Young people cannot get on the housing ladder and are forced to move away. Businesses cannot get employees and go parttime or close. Neighbourhoods wither and the high street dies shop by sorry shop. This is a phenomenon I am sure you will recognise here in Killin. There are no simple solutions to this problem. Government intervention rarely helps. Private rental controls capping rents and giving tenants greater security - have backfired badly in almost every country in which they have been introduced, leading to a further reduction in the available rental housing stock. The government's 'Help To Buy' scheme for new homeowners mainly helped to raise the price of starter homes. There has been talk of a 'Local Lettings Initiative' - an idea floated

by Stirling Council months ago, which has not yet even left the drawing board. And would this really help? The Housing Department representative was quite candid about the challenges she faced. Killin has a massive queue for social housing, far longer than she has ever seen, and though she did not say it, I suspect she despairs of significantly reducing it in the near future. There are, however, signs that the staycation frenzy of the Lockdown years is finally abating, and this may see some growth in the residential housing stock. Planning rules could be loosened, and new housebuilding encouraged. Lastly, owners of holiday lets should see that it is in their longterm interests to allocate a certain percentage of properties to residential letting, enabling young people to have a home in the village, thus ensuring local businesses have adequate staffing and securing the continued vitality of the village over the long term.

Traffic

There was quite a lot of feedback on Stirling Council's proposal to reduce the speed limit through the village to 20mph. The feedback, both emailed and oral, was quite mixed, but a slight majority was opposed to the plan. At the Community Council meeting, it was proposed to ask Stirling Council to keep the existing 30mph limit but to extend this to the Killin Golf Club, with speed limit approaching signs similar to Strathyre and other villages. This was passed unanimously by the Community Council and supported by all members of the public in attendance.

Ukranian Refugees

The other big news of the day is the arrival of Ukrainian refugees in Killin. The Killin Hotel has committed all thirty-six of its bedrooms to housing the new arrivals. This is to be for a period of three months initially with

an option to extend. The hotel plans to remain open for meals and drinks for non-residents throughout this period and the manager has been promised extra staff by the new corporate owners. The Ukrainians are also being issued with work visas, which should enable them to take jobs in the local area, perhaps helping to solve some of the staffing issues mentioned above, albeit on a temporary basis. The community response has been very supportive, and a number of helpful initiatives have been launched. KAT is very involved through its various tentacles, as is the Sports Hub and, of course, the Community Council. We are currently seeking volunteers to befriend the new arrivals and to assist in some basic English lessons. If you think you might be able to help, please email us at the address helow

National Park Representative

Finally, we are delighted to announce that David Fettes has been elected as Representative for Ward 2 of the National Park Authority Board with a very strong showing of support. We congratulate David and look forward to working with him on National Park issues.



Killin Medical Practice

Wednesday Closure

From Wednesday 3rd August the practice will be closed between 12 midday and 2pm and will not accept routine telephone calls, the doors will be locked from 12midday to 2pm, this time is designated for uninterrupted staff training. If you call during these times there will be an option to press if you have an emergency.

Triage

We would like to explain a little about the triage system that is currently in place at Killin Medical Practice. Triage is designed to help you see the right clinician, at the right time to achieve the best outcome.

When requesting an appointment the

admin team may ask about your presenting complaint. This is to gather information so we can get you to the most appropriate clinician in a safe time frame. We ask what is wrong, how long it has been a problem for and, dependant on the complaint, questions pertaining to that specific issue. These questions are appropriate and helpful to the clinicians trying to ascertain if an emergency appointment is required.

We may safely signpost you to the pharmacy with common clinical conditions as Laura Bathgate at Davidsons chemist is an independent prescribing pharmacist and can help with many conditions.

If you feel your problem is new and

requires an urgent assessment please call the practice between the hours of 8am and 9am. We then have the availability to see you if it is assessed as necessary.

We may ask you to attend on the day for a face to face appointment with a clinician. We may assess that the situation can wait for a routine appointment on another day.

We aim to address your request for an emergency appointment within 3 hours as normal routine appointments have to run a timely as possible.

Moirlanich: wallpapers in a rural Scottish home By Emma Inglis, NTS Curator (South & West)



Stepping into Moirlanich Longhouse is like stepping into another world. Inside the thick stone walls, built centuries ago, the light is


low and the smell of peat fires still hangs in the air. It is easy to feel close to the people who once lived there, people whose lives

were governed by the land, their animals, and by the seasons.

The surprisingly decorative interior of the house reminds us that this humble place was also once a home. Each room is decorated differently, in a wonderfully random accumulation of pattern and



colour. In many places the wallpaper has survived several layers deep, preserving patterns from the 1890s all



Wallpaper had the advantage of being cheap to buy and could be replaced regularly to help keep the house looking clean and fresh. Delicate repeat patterns mingle with heavy florals, followed by the strong geometric lines of the 1930s. The layers are deepest in the back room where 46 different patterns have been counted, in some places layered 23 papersdeep. Each room in the house has its unique combination, with no paper used in more than one room at one time. The patterns must have brightened up the otherwise dark interiors.

With the coming of the railway to Killin in 1886, the



people of Moirlanich would have had easy access to an increasing range of cheap consumer goods, including wallpaper. The many layers show that it was refreshed regularly, a necessary course of action when damp walls and soot from the fire would make it difficult to keep the house looking clean. At some times, ordinary newspaper was used on the walls or ceilings instead of wallpaper. Visitors to the house in the 1930s remember newspaper hanging in the best room, and in other rooms it is found interleaved with the more decorative papers.

We're lucky that the interior decoration at Moirlanich has survived, becoming a special record of how people once lived. We can't plant directly into the ground as the Community Garden is on the old railway sidings and there is a risk of soil contamination.

We also have to thank Edward Mackay Contractors and Morgan Sindall for their generosity with materials and time to lay a new gravel road into the back of the gardens. This now allows access for

those with poor mobility and for deliveries. They also laid a path from the gate on the main road and scraped back the moss and growth to reveal a much larger concrete area and a circular pavement edging to the old goods yard. Thanks to them both for their kind contributions.

Keeping strong and balanced at home

Continuing with our theme of exercises you can do in your own home with no equipment, this issue we bring you the wrist strengthener. Important for being able to open those tough jars or bottles and also to grab something if you lose your balance. You can do this exercise with an elastic exercise band if you have one, or use a tea-towel, or even a bicycle inner-tube or thick elastic tights!



Wrist Strengthener

- » Fold or roll your band/tea towel into a tube shape
- » Sit tall then squeeze the band tightly with both hands, hold for a slow count of 5 then release
- Make this exercise more challenging by squeezing then twisting your band before holding for 5 seconds
- » Breathe evenly throughout and if you find it hard to breathe normally

then hum or sing as this will make you breathe

Changing Places Toilet for Tyndrum

Last year when a grant was offered by FV LEADER for the purposes of carrying out a feasibility study into a Changing Places toilet at Tyndrum, the Strathfillan CDT willingly stepped in and agreed to lead the project. This was important because at that time the Tyndrum Infrastructure Group (TIG) were just an informal band of people sharing the common goal of building a Changing Places toilet in Tyndrum and so couldn't process a grant.

Happily, things have moved on and TIG is now a formally constituted charity, registered with OSCR. We are fortunate to have a dedicated and experienced Board of Trustees to support me in our endeavour of making this a reality. They are Kim Kemp (secretary), Dougie Peddie (Treasurer), Professor Dawn Skelton and Dame Anne McGuire.

The long running background to this project has been an inability to acquire a suitable site to locate the loo in the small and busy village with largely uncooperative landowners. In March this year, the feasibility study concluded that out of the 8 options reviewed, none were suitable for a variety of reasons. Part

of this process also involved a public consultation into which 212 people contributed. 96% of the respondents were supportive of the idea and felt that Tyndrum was a good strategic location for a CP loo.

We have not been idle since publication of the feasibility study and so things are edging forward which, as I've learned, is good progress in this game!
Kim and I now sit on the cross-party group at Scot Gov for Changing Places toilets and the Minister and MSP's involved have given us specific advice about acquiring land. They too are keen to make this happen in Tyndrum as they see the strategic, community and economic advantages.

Additionally, we have been approached by a local enterprise that is considering making some space available which might be suitable, so there are a number of avenues being investigated and discussed.

I very much hope to have some concrete news of a definite site at long last, before the end of this year.

THE KILLIN CONNECTION

Peaks & Petticoats

April 18th 1908. Three women on an Easter walking holiday - Jane Inglis Clark, her daughter Mabel and Lucy Smith - are huddled in the lee of a massive boulder on the hillside by Lix Toll. Their typical Edwardian garb, all wide-brimmed hats, tweed jackets and ankle-length skirts, are at odds with the bleak, hard country that surrounds them. How and why these three ladies of upper crust Edinburgh society find themselves in such a spot is anyone's guess, but they are ready to make an historic pact. By fate of bad weather, a late coach or some other banal detail, here marks the beginning of the Ladies Scottish Climbing Club, one of the first of its kind in the world.



Clarks were hatching bold plans for an all-woman club in 1908. The year would prove eventful for pioneering women, both on and off the mountains. Annie Peck Smith claimed the women's altitude record of 23,000 ft upon climbing Peru's Huascaran, just as Fanny Bullock Workman was first to completely traverse Pakistan's Hispar Glacier. In England, the Ladies Alpine Club was officially recognised as an independent sports body; while the largest ever suffragette march took place in Hyde Park - incidentally almost exactly a month after the LSCC was founded. Climbing and women's fight for equality were thus one and the same, the uphill struggle literal and symbolic. The LSCC played a vital role in the "emancipation" of Scottish women, as Jane Inglis Clark later reflected.

It should however be made clear that in its earliest days the LSCC was guilty of putting class privilege before gender liberation. These were 'ladies' by definition, having learned climbing with their husbands and brothers (and hired guide) in the Alps, a pursuit only the wealthy could enjoy. Of course, they also dressed like ladies. "There were no sports clothes for women in those days," wrote Jane Inglis Clark. "It was almost impossible to get suitable strong boots, and for a long time I had to wear either boys' boots or buy them in Tyrol." It was not uncommon for women climbers to wear breeches underneath the skirt. which was discreetly removed behind some convenient boulder and slipped on again post-climb! The LSCC's first AGM recommends a 'Club Climbing Outfit' of rope, lantern, compass and maps to be made available on loan. Ropes then being made of twisted hemp, were heavy and cumbersome when wet and became as hard as steel rod when iced. The rope was simply tied around the waistline using a bowline knot, with no harness to comfort or support in a fall. Members of the Club were also encouraged to obtain 'Strong Boots, with Low Heels and Mountain Nails'. As an alternative to crampons, hobnailed boots were a popular choice of

climbers but came with their own set of problems. They blistered the feet, clamoured and sparked on rock and required great care on more technical sections; sometimes the boots were removed altogether and progress made in socks. A truly remarkable feat in today's age of ultralight, luxurious outdoor gear.

volunteered as nurses and charity workers, displaying great acts of courage and selflessness. By 1919, the Club was emerging from the war, deeply scarred but alive. Something else changed: out went the charabancs, chauffeurs, and food hampers, and in came a new era of climbing for women: open, inclusive and looking towards higher summits.

The achievements of the Club in the intervening years are too numerous to document in such a brief article, but here are a few highlights. In 1919, Mary Lumsden spent three years in China exploring Yunan Province; Jane Inglis Clark made a pioneer traverse of over 400 miles of the Sahara, Eleanor Llyod undertook a solo botanising trip to Tibet when that area was still largely isolated from the West, while Helene Greiner was one of first three Western women to enter the High Atlas region of Morocco. In 1955, Monica Jackson, Betty Stark and Evelyn McNicol made history as the first all-women team to scale the Jugal Himal in Nepal. The story is best left to Jackson in her excellent book, Tents in the Clouds



Weekend outings were soon developed and four Meets a year were held at New Year, Easter, the Edinburgh and Glasgow holiday weekend in May and the September holiday weekend. Popular destinations included Crianlarich, Inveroran and Kingshouse in Glencoe, with three Meets also held at Killin between 1910 and 1928. With the outbreak of World War One, the club's existence was thrown into turmoil. Climbing holidays in Europe were dramatically cut short and some members found themselves stranded in a war zone. Many others

At 114 years old, the Ladies Scottish Climbing Club is still going strong. The Lix Toll boulder has been revisited on many anniversaries and after years hidden in dense spruce plantation has finally emerged thanks to recent felling operations. Still, how many who drive past it everyday know of its significance? Perhaps a little access path and plaque would at last give these trailblazers the commemoration they deserve.

The Race for The Space

On a recent visit to the north we were amazed once again at how very empty the land is up there. Last year we noted the lack of sheep, and the once bustling town of Lairg had all but turned into a ghost town. It seems even more noticeable now that there are no sheep, people or deer for mile upon mile. The only thing in one huge stretch of emptiness was a vast switching station accessing the wind and hydro power being generated in the area. This meant rows and rows of pylons over the hillsides to carry this power. Interesting when vast amounts of money are being spent around Killin to get rid of them! But then again, nobody lives up there to see them and visitors are few and far between. Off the main NC500 you see hardly any traffic.

Along with the pylons etc. come the hill roads. It appears to be acceptable to make access for renewables or forestry but estate owners are not granted permission for the same access tracks or roads. But the only lairds about in the future will be the 'green lairds' as they are known. Wealthy multinational firms cashing in on buying moorland and farmland to sell carbon offsets by planting trees. Many at Holyrood do not appear to realise that our food comes from farms which need land and that many iconic species (do we include stalkers, keepers and farmers in this category?) will disappear from the countryside. If they do eventually wake up and smell the bacon, then there will be no farmers left as young wannabe farmers are lucky to get a chance to train. Thank goodness

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Mairi McAllan, Scotland's land reform minister has realised that something is urgently needed to avoid another highland clearance.

Years ago, when our children were small, we had a lovely picnic at Spey Bay and were joined by a local crossbreed dog. After a while doggie dashed off to the edge of the estuary, grabbed a large salmon and brought it to us, something he had obviously been trained to do. It was quickly dispatched, hidden in the handy coolbox and was enjoyed. So the seals are not the only culprits. Earlier in the year in Sutherland, two separate occurrences happened close to each other of lone walkers going missing. Just disappearing completely. Just shows how empty and wild it is.

Some overdue good news is that BBC are to review the impartiality of Countryfile. It is to look into the freedom of expression for a diversity of voices on many countryside and environmental issues, and at fairness and accuracy of material broadcast. There have been numerous complaints and it is becoming known as 'Towniefile.' It's 'hip, hip, hooray' on hearing that BBC presenters are 'not to express personal opinions on matters of public policy, politics or controversial subjects.' I wonder if you are thinking of the same person as me?

Another piece of good news is that

the promised food additive to reduce methane production in dairy cows has had the go ahead. The next logical step may be to see if it reduces hot air production in politicians.

The picture below was sent this week from Speyside and at first it looks as though the wasp is trying to eat the ladybird. On consulting Google it appears that rather than eating them several species of wasp lay eggs inside the ladybird. When the larvae

So, if you want to join in the fun, the app is available to download free from the App Store and Google Play. Which reminds me of a few days ago when one of my sons was telling me that he had a webinar to discuss local beaver spreading. My wife began to giggle as she had thought he said 'a webinar for beavers and had a mental picture of beavers all over Scotland sitting at their laptops and chatting.

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Musings From The Manse

Even allowing for media hype, it is hard not to feel, at the very least, mildly depressed by both the national and global situation at the moment. Everywhere we turn there are struggles and conflicts and serious challenges facing the human race. In the first of his famous trilogy of books, Yuval Noah Harari, the Israeli historian, writes;

Seventy thousand years ago, Homo Sapiens was still an insignificant animal minding its own business in a corner of Africa. In the following millennia it transformed itself into the master of the entire planet and the terror of the ecosystem. Today it stands on the verge of becoming a god, poised to acquire not only eternal youth, but also divine abilities of creation and destruction..... We have advanced from canoes to galleys to steamships to space shuttles but nobody knows where we're going. We are more powerful than ever before, but have very little idea what to do with all that power. Worse still, humans seem more irresponsible than ever. Self-made gods with only the laws of physics to keep us company, we are accountable to no one. We are consequently wreaking havoc on our fellow animals and on the surrounding ecosystem, seeking little

more than our own comfort and amusement, yet never finding satisfaction. Is there anything more dangerous than dissatisfied and irresponsible gods who Don't know what they want? (Sapiens pp 465, 466)

A powerful and challenging reflection indeed, of the current status and role of our species and the challenges and questions that result from that. In the Biblical tradition, humans are said to be made in the Image of God. That has been interpreted three different ways: Attributional, Relational and Functional. The first one was common in the 19th Century especially post Darwin, as the emphasis was on attributes that humans had which set them apart from the animal Kingdom eq rationality. The second was a more traditional view which highlighted humanity's God-consciousness and our ability to have a relationship with the Divine. The last of the three options focuses instead on the role or function humans were to play in representing the Divine in nature and history.

Of course, why do we need to choose one of these when they fit together as a fulsome expression of what the Biblical writers were trying to convey?

If it is true that humans have a special identity and, therefore, a unique destiny, then it behoves us to explore fully what this means, especially if we are to avoid becoming in Harari's words above "dissatisfied and irresponsible gods who don't know what they want." In this role we need wisdom. In Genesis chapters 1-3 and in Psalm 8 humans are not given dominion for selfish, self-centred and exploitative purposes. We are called to be stewards of creation and are accountable to God for the way we handle this power and authority. Therefore, humility which seeks understanding and compassion would be a good and indeed, necessary start. In a world where everyone seems to be shouting and no-one is listening, there is a great need for moderation and self-control. It is doubtful that there are quick, easy and painless fixes to many of our problems and therefore realism will be absolutely essential here. May God grant us the grace to go forward into the future with faith, hope and love as we seek to make a difference in this wonderful, yet fractured, world in which we live and through which we seek to work out our destinies.



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Birks Cinema - A Year On

Situated on the corner of Aberfeldy's main square, from the moment it opens its doors at 10am, the Birks Cinema & Cafe is a place where locals from throughout Highland Perthshire meet for coffee and conversation, enjoying breakfast or lunch, or joining in with one of the many cultural, recreational or musical activities that the venue hosts each week. You can even see a film! A changing weekly programme includes independent releases, the latest blockbusters, live performances from New York, Covent Garden or the National Theatre and often something of special, local interest on natural history, landscapes or Scottish stories. The Cinema also facilitates a Gaelic Café, with guest speakers and the chance to hear, try and listen to conversations in Gaelic. It's popular! And so is their keenly supported Climate Café, seated exercise classes, not to mention a Lego club, games nights and the much-loved Craic and Craft sessions plus on Thursday evenings, it becomes a hive of sound as local and not-so-local musicians play acoustic, celtic inspired sessions that are free to all! Oh, and a beer club...the list is almost endless!


The Birks hasn't always been there. Having opened in 1939 and enjoyed many decades as a source of entertainment for local people, in 1982 it had closed its doors as a cinema. After a number years as an amusement arcade this iconic Art Deco building was finally put up for sale for redevelopment in 2005. This was a cue for a small group of Aberfeldy film-obsessed and cinema-deprived local residents, members of the Heartland Film

Society – to set about acquiring the building and reviving it as a community-run social enterprise. The dream came true and following an enormous fundraising effort The Birks opened its doors as a cinema again in 2013. This community spirit lives on in the army of volunteers and trustees who give their time and expertise to support a professional team lead by Chief Executive Giles Conisbee. Marking a year since reopening due to the pandemic, your local community Cinema has welcomed 20,000+ guests despite the continued impact of the covid-19 pandemic. "The support of the local and wider communities has been absolutely amazing" said CEO Giles Conisbee, adding "People have been so positive and have voted with their feet, for which we are extremely grateful. We recognise however that some of our regulars and local patrons may have lost the habit of going to the cinema and forgotten the unique enjoyment that a shared experience of watching a film in a cinema can bring. People may also have concerns regarding COVID. The Birks is fortunate as we have the benefit of a sophisticated, industry-leading ventilation system that is set to maximum! This results in refreshing the air in the auditorium every 8 minutes!" Giles adds: "And we still operate distanced seating arrangements. That means there is automatically a seat placed between parties when you book. We are listening to our patrons and visitors and we feel it's imperative to ensure we do everything possible to provide a safe and comfortable experience for our cinema-goers. But what next for the Birks Cinema? Giles is enthusiastic. "We will continue to provide a varied

film programme. We are in the process of launching a new series of intergenerational and intercultural films and events over the coming months. This is alongside the return of a full programme of Royal Opera and Ballet, National Theatre and RSC performances, plus a special screening from Glyndebourne of La Boheme in September. We also are pleased to be bringing back more film and book events from Edinburgh International Film and Book Festivals in August. And into Autumn, we are now in the advanced stages of some plans, which I will keep under wraps for the time being, that will power our ambition to extend beyond film and our physical walls. This is in response to what the communities we serve have told us they want, so look out for theatre, literature, workshops and music events coming soon."

"The Birks Cinema brings enormous benefits to our rural communities of Highland Perthshire, a truly inclusive environment of entertainment for all generations. For me it's a symbol of the pride we have in our community and what can be achieved when we all pull together".

First of all I'd like to thank the community for welcoming me in my new role as KAT Project Worker for The Reuse Shop, Recykillin Tool Library, and the Community Fridge. It's been a brilliant couple of months welcoming villagers and tourists alike.

I've been digging up a few stats for you that show how well we've done, as a community, to reduce waste and protect the environment.

Since we opened in March, we have saved 574 items of clothing from landfill. That's incredible. If you consider that it takes 2,700 litres of water to make just one cotton t-shirt, together we've potentially saved 1,549,800 litres of water or more!

How about bric-a-brac? Bric-a-brac is our most popular department and you have rehomed a whopping 1,363 items, from forks to ornaments to works of art!

The kids of Killin have played their part too, taking home 416 toys that would've otherwise ended up in landfill. Myself and everyone at KAT would like to say a huge thank you for all of your donations and your excellent efforts to reduce, reuse and recycle.

Works to date

The first power outage is underway at Killin substation to install new electrical plant and equipment ahead of energising the circuit in early August. Ducting works through Killin village are now complete with final re-surfacing works planned to be completed in August.

Morgan Sindall Infrastructure have submitted an application for a permit to Stirling council to undertake the final re-surfacing works through the village during night-time road closures.

These road closures are required for safety purposes due to the narrow width of the road which cannot safety accomposate the size of re-surfacing equipment needed within a single lane closure.

Discussions are ongoing with Stirling council to agree timings for amnesty periods during the closures:

Project milestones

Quarter one of 2022 saw the completion of the Horizontal Directional Drilling (HDD) works under the River

Dochart, this was a great milestone achieved by the project team, followed in quarter 2 with the completion of the cable duct installation in the carriageway of the A827. Quarter 3 will see the next milestones which consist of 3 out of 4 cable circuits energised in September along with the tower felling which is also anticipated to commence in September.

Regional Food Tourism Ambassador - Making Progress!

Last year I was fortunate enough to be selected as a Regional Food Tourism Ambassador for Stirling & Forth Valley by Scotland Food & Drink. This programme is a new initiative, so I'm something of a guinea pig in this first cohort! The position is voluntary and runs for a 2 year term.

One of the main aims is to carry out projects that help promote, support and encourage food tourism within our region. Here is an update:

Hospitality & Tourism Staffing Shortage

The staffing shortage is probably the most pressing and significant challenge in hospitality and tourism at this time and there is no shortage of such challenges to choose from. I'm aware that Scottish hospitality & tourism are not alone in facing severe recruitment and retention problems but this is the sector and geography that I am concerned with. Just using our wee village of Killin and the surrounding area as an example, the effects of the crisis are self-evident. The diminishing number of eating and drinking options and the limited hours that many are able to open is to the detriment of visitors and residents in an area heavily reliant on tourism.

If you scale this problem up and consider the whole of rural Scotland, it becomes a huge and serious issue for business owners, our rural communities, the wider economy, the Exchequer and the long-term future of Scottish Hospitality & Tourism.

After all, we do not want to see Scottish tourism reduced to day trips from London to Edinburgh and our villages left as soulless dormitories without beating hearts at their centres.

To my mind, doing nothing to attempt to tackle this problem isn't

an option because without sufficient people, Scottish food tourism simply cannot flourish.

My aim is to create a toolkit and then refine, test and measure the results. The toolkit consists of a variety of elements including

- Employee Well-Being support
- Access to a national benefits platform
- Specialist location training and knowledge building
- Development for aspiring managers
- Opportunity to try a local attraction or experience FOC.

The aim of the first phase is to set up and run a pilot project within the LLTNP and then depending on the success, I hope it may be adopted and scaled up more widely throughout rural Scotland. FV LEADER and LLTNP have been working with me and the Destination Group of NP businesses to support the development of this idea. An application has been submitted to Stirling Council for funding to finance the infrastructure needed to get this project off the ground. I am optimistic of success, so I keenly await the outcome of the funding application.

I have received great letters of support and advice from many people on this project, including Alyn Smith MP, Gordon Watson, CEO LLTNP, Kate Nicholls OBE, CEO Hospitality UK, Neil Christisen, Regional Director VisitScotland, Fiona Richmond, Director Scotland Food & Drink and leading the industry, James Fraser at Loch Katrine, Sir Walter Scott Steamship. 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Gluten Free Fortnight for Stirling and Forth Valley

Gluten Free Fortnight (GFF) is a food tourism campaign started at The Real Food Café, Tyndrum in 2019 and rerun due to its initial success in 2021. One of the most striking outcomes of the events held to date has been how far people have been prepared to travel to attend. Furthermore, some GFF visitors went further and booked accommodation to make a weekend of it

Working in partnership with Forth Valley Food & Drink, we are planning to widen the campaign within the region. We aim to gradually build up the reputation of the region as a destination for Coeliacs and people who follow a gluten free diet.

Our main aims are:

- Improve the knowledge and skill base of those involved in preparing and serving gluten free food and drink so there is a high level of confidence in its safety.
- Build a reputation for the region as a destination for people seeking safe gluten free food.

We plan to:

- Support FV Food & Drink members with specific Coeliac UK training for employees
- Support and mentor FV Food & Drink members with gaining Coeliac UK accreditation
- Create a GFF map and trail which will be launched in May 2023 during Coeliac Awareness Week.
- Create a digital, media and PR plan for promoting and marketing the event and the businesses taking part.
- Run GFF in October 2022 and again in 2023
- As part of GFF we plan to run cookery demonstration workshops at The Kitchen at 44 King Street, Creative Stirling. Some of the events will be aimed at the public and others specifically for trade. We will also offer a fully accessible on line event for those unable to attend in person.
