Killin Mountain Rescue Team

The team has recently undergone changes in the leadership. At the AGM in July five out of the six trustees stood down. Another five new faces were duly elected. Our first thanks must go to those who have stood down: Billy Stitt (Team Leader), Bill Rose (Secretary), Ted Inglis (Deputy Team Leader), Angus Cameron (Deputy Team Leader) and Kevin Burnett (Treasurer). Particular thanks to Billy, Bill, Ted and Angus who have all been members of the team since 1975 and in their leadership roles since 1987.

The team has been handed over to Nat Felgate (Team Leader), Will Diamond (Secretary), Kirstine Inglis (Deputy Team Leader), Richard Eadington (Deputy Team Leader) and Richard Morris (Treasurer). They are ably assisted by Calum Menzies, who has served as a Deputy Team Leader and trustee for a number of years, and he was gratefully re-elected to his position again this year.

For those of you who don't already know, Killin Mountain Rescue Team are a group that are based between Callander and Killin, and cover from Doune to Tyndrum, and pretty much all in between! We currently have around 50 team members who are all volunteers and come from all walks of life, adding to the diverse mix of skills and experience. The primary functions for the team are saving lives, locating those who are lost, injured or missing, and assisting the emergency services where our resources can be of benefit.

In 2022 alone, our team has so far responded to 27 separate incidents in the hills and mountains within the areas where we live and work. In total, during these incidents we have rescued 29 people and recovered two people who sadly died.

Our intention going forward is to provide a brief report every couple of months to give an idea of what rescues and activities the team have been involved in.

During July and August to date, we have attended 7 incidents as follows: 12th July - female fell at Bracklinn Falls, Callander where she suffered an injury. Recovered and handed over to paramedics. 22nd July - group of 8 students on Ben More, one suffered a knee injury and was airlifted off to an awaiting ambulance. Team members located the rest of the party and walked off. 31st July - female slipped on Beinn a'Chroin and dislocated her shoulder. Airlifted by R199 and other 6 party members escorted off the hill by team members.

22nd August - male with ankle injury near Ben Ledi. Managed to walk to

the hill track in Glen Casaig where team members met him and treated his injury, before



his friend took him to hospital. 22nd August - as we arrived home from above, call to Ben More for a walker lost and disorientated in the mist. Team members located him using PhoneFind and escorted him off the hill.

26th August - we were requested by Police Scotland to attend an overdue walker on Ben Ledi. Just as members arrived, the individual returned to their vehicle safe and well and the team stood down.

29th August - female became cragfast on Stuc a' Chroin. Members made their way up the hill and met the female, safe and well with two passing walkers who had assisted her to safe ground.

In addition to the above, the team assisted at the Killin Show, where we had an information stand and provided First Aid cover at the event and assisted with marshalling at the Killin 10K. Our annual training programme is about to kick in again in September and will run through to June.

The Old Co-op

We are absolutely delighted to have been successful in our funding bid to the Scottish Land Fund. We are also very hopeful about securing funding from Stirling Council's Place Based Investment Programme, which would give KAT the necessary funding both to purchase the old Co-op building and refurbish it to meet our needs. As you can read more fully elsewhere in this edition our plan is to use the building as a Business and Reuse Hub. This will provide space to expand the Reuse Shop and develop the Tool Library as well as allowing us to deliver training & learning opportunities and community events & workshops. We are also keen to encourage and support further social enterprise activity in the building and will provide rental space to do so. The building is currently very much a shell, and there is a substantial amount of work to do, which will take some time. As such KAT have extended our current Reuse Shop lease with the George Hogg Trust for a further 9 months. We plan to have the Old Co-op fully reoccupied by Summer 2023.

This is a fantastic opportunity for the community and huge endorsement of the work KAT do. Our thanks to all those who supported the bid and responded to the various consultations, and thanks also to the KAT staff who have supported this work.

Playpark

Progress continues with the playpark with an additional two new pieces of equipment being installed over August. It is great to see the change in the play facilities in the village over the last few months. However, the funding that has been raised over recent years has now been allocated and there is a need to look again at how we raise the funds to complete the project. A new giving page has been set up, with details available elsewhere in this edition, and if you would like to help support the fundraising effort please contact Theresa@killincdt.co.uk to discuss.

Pump track

After a short hiatus we are seeking to refocus on the plans for a pump track. Both KAT and the newly established Sport & Recreation Hub will be meeting to discuss how we take the project forward. Membership

Ukranian Guests

Members of the Community Council have been involved in helping our Ukrainian quests settle in and participate in village life. We have a large cohort of volunteers helping with community activities, English language sessions and fundraising. We are grateful to the Highland Games Committee, KAT, Balquidder community, the Outdoor Shop, and many others, for generous donations of time, resources and funds. A benefit Ceilidh is being jointly organised by our two communities to raise funds for humanitarian relief, and the

KCC Report September 2022

Ukrainian community is continuing its own fundraising for direct support of those in the front line. Many of our Ukrainian quests have taken up employment with local businesses, others are working to improve their English with a view to finding work, not just in the local area, but throughout Scotland. Many have found sponsored accommodation within the Stirling region and further afield. These are being replaced with new arrivals, and the focus, nationally, is on finding sponsored accommodation for as many of them as possible.

Resilience Planning

We are delighted to report that a joint application by ourselves and the McLaren Hall Committee to the SSEN Resilient Communities Fund for a back-up generator for the Hall has been partially successful. We have been awarded £10,000 towards the cost of this installation, but that still leaves a shortfall of around £12,000, so we shall be embarking on a round of fundraising this autumn. This is given added urgency as the continuing war in Ukraine may lead to power cuts and blackouts this winter as fuel shortages take effect across Europe.

Housing

Further to my report in the last issue of the Killin News, I am pleased to report that Rural Stirling Housing Association have identified Killin as a priority housing need and are looking into the feasibility and costs of a small scale social housing development in the Killin area. This is a welcome initiative but should, ideally, be complimented by private housing developments to properly address the needs and aspirations of the local community.

Flooding

Once again, in early September, there was a flood on Lyon Road, with water poring out of drains at the junction of Station Road and Main Street. A couple of people remarked on the strong smell of what seemed to be sewage coming from it. The Community Council has reported this to Stirling Council and to Scottish Water, but Cllr Martin Earl recommends that residents report these issues themselves directly, as the more people complain, the quicker this will be dealt with. There were efforts to solve this problem shortly after last November's flooding, but it may need more extensive work on the drainage infrastructure at this location.

The next meeting of the Community Council will be held in the primary School on Tuesday 1st November 2022 at 7pm. Members of the public are aways welcome to attend. Issues can be raised at any time by emailing;

The Health Board have asked us if we will undertake the flu and covid booster vaccinations again this year and we have agreed they will be held at the practice.

We are undertaking covid booster vaccines alongside the flu vaccine. However we have no authority on which vaccine we receive. We currently have Moderna in stock but that may change dependant on availability. Unfortunately with Moderna the 15 minute waiting time is still advisable We will be working from the list of patients which is provided by the Health Board. This means not everyone will be invited at the same time. Please be patient we will get to you as soon as we are able.

We are in the process of learning how to make the most of our Text messaging service. In the future you may get messages other than appointment reminders from us via text.

Telephone Appointments

Many of you like the telephone appointments and they work very well. I'd just like to remind you they may show up on your phone as an unrecognised number, therefore are sometimes not answered. When this happens it is often difficult for another time to be allocated on the same day and you may be asked to re-book.

We are busy at the Old Mill this year. Since June, we have had the doors open, and the wheel turning three times a week, and there are information displays and a wee honesty shop and tourist info inside the Mill.

There has been a steady flow of visitors through the doors and a steady trickle of donations coming in! We have been doing some hands-on exploration of the Mill's history. Many of you may already know that the Mill was a hand loom mill for a period of its history in the 1920s. Don and Alicja Fraser have kindly lent us their loom, and we have it set up downstairs in the mill where volunteers and staff have been learning to use it. Visitors have also been having a go. If you would like to try it, just give us a shout before popping down on a Tuesday, Thursday or Friday and we'll show you what to do! We have also been

trying out some natural dyeing using a tannin bath made from buckthorn bark, an idea given to us by The Crannog Centre when they came along to our 'Have-a-go Textiles Day'. We are experimenting with using these heritage craft skills using upcycled material and clothing. We plan to do more of this. At the beginning of September, we had local author Linda Cracknell give a talk on her 2020 novella: The Other Side of Stone about life in and around a 19th century mill. She read from her book, gave us an insight into the research behind it and compared it to the history of our Old Mill, after which an interesting discussion ensued and many of us went home with a new book in hand.

Have-a-go Textiles Day

We held our biggest event this year at the Old Mill on Sunday 28th August and the sun was shining! It was lovely to see some local faces at the event, thanks to all who came and joined in!

We had the Scottish Crannog Centre, doing the aforementioned tannin bath dyeing with members of the public. They were experimenting with tying small unidentified objects, such as we often find in the bottom of bags Reuse Shop donations, into pieces of cloth, as the objects leave shapes on the fabric. Downstairs we had our intrepid locals, Don and Alicja Fraser, weaving on various looms, Linda Anderson with her spinning wheel and drop spindles, and Kerrie and James helping out on various tasks including tote bag making on the 98 year-old Singer Sewing Machine. All the activities were have-a-go and people of all ages got stuck in! As the icing on the cake, upstairs we had professional storyteller Amanda Edmiston, with her mum (a retired professional storyteller) as part of our Story-Spinning Project, telling stories that wove together old legends and some of the stories she's been collecting from people in Killin,

as well as collecting a few more! A Facebook commenter said "We loved the storytelling, just wonderful!"

Nursery & School

Amanda has also been working with the nursery and the school exploring the tales she's collected, but also using some of the information from them to look at how our past can inform our future, especially as a response to local service losses, climate change and the energy crisis. The nursery heard a story about how corn dollies used to be made locally to protect homes, looked through a hag stone and made a 'corn' dolly out of nettle string; the schoolchildren heard a longer, more complex tale and learnt a (probably!) Perthshire waulking song, made one of their own, tasted nettle tea and discovered some natural remedies as well as how to cause mischief with plants! (Because what child doesn't want to know that!)

P6-7 have 'Witches, Wizards and Magic' as their theme at the moment, so this work fits in well with what they are learning in the classroom. We will have done further sessions together by the time you read this, making a story blanket with the children and hearing the tales, and seeing the objects they have collected.

We are still collecting local stories so if you have a good tale about Killin that you'd like to share with us at the Old Mill and with Amanda, we would love for you to get in touch! We will be doing a final performance with Amanda in November involving the children, keep an eye out for the date.

mince pie plate decorating, decorations, stockings. We will let you know more soon! Cake, mulled wine and Christmas cheer provided! Sat 24th December - Rebedding of the Healing Stones 2022 - Come along for our traditional Rebedding of the Healing Stones Ceremony, an ancient tradition unique to Killin and the Old Mill! The Healing Stones are said to have been gifted to the people of Killin in 777AD by St Fillan on his death and have been held and used in the village ever since. As is traditional, all the children present at the ceremony can take part. There will be refreshments (maybe more mulled wine!) an introduction to the stones and the ceremony, a chance to handle the stones, and maybe a story or two.

We have been kindly gifted a new memorial bench (in memory of Alan and Helen Skelton) and some wrought iron garden furniture from Portnellan, but are still on the look



out for large outdoor pots and furniture if anyone wants to find a home for their 'spares'. We have just ordered in some wood to make six large outdoor planters and in the spring we will invite people to 'adopt a plot' and make use of the plot, a bit like an allotment.



Keeping strong and balanced at

home: Continuing with our theme of exercises you can do in your own home with no equipment, this issue we bring you 'knee bends'. Important for safe lifting as we should all be keeping our backs straight and taking weight of things to lift through our legs to protect our back. This knee bend is also the best way to pick things up off the floor, so keep those legs strong! You can do this at the kitchen sink or in the garden in between chores, or set aside a few minutes every day for a few weeks and see the difference it will make.

Knee bends

» Feet should be hip width apart, toes facing forwards.







» Bend the knees and push your bottom backwards as though you were going to sit down.

» Ensure the heels do not lift and the knees do not roll inwards.

» Come back up to the start position slowly.

» Use a support if you need to but try first with hands near support but not holding on.

 » Don't go too low, make sure you can comfortably stand again without too much strain on the knees, as time goes on and you strengthen the muscles around the knees with this exercise you may be able to drop lower without discomfort.
 » Repeat up to 5 times, eventually build to 10 times.

THE KILLIN CONNECTION

The Last Maharaja

British colonialism, stolen jewels, foreign espionage and lost empires. These subjects do not feature often in the timeline of small places, especially that of rural Perthshire. Yet despite the disparities of distance, climate and culture, Killin's connection with Indian history is more significant than you might expect.

When the twenty-year-old Duleep Singh arrived at Auchlyne House in the summer of 1858, he had the distinction of being the first Indian monarch to set foot in Scotland. He had also become its first Sikh settler - and not through his own making. How and why this came about is a remarkable story.

In 1843, at the age of five, Duleep Singh was crowned King of the Punjab and head of the Sikh nation, his mother Maharani Jind Kaur ruling on his behalf. However, by age nine he found himself signing away his kingdom to the British following a short but bloody war, and with it the Koh-i-Noor, the world's most celebrated diamond. Separated from his mother, converted to Christianity and exiled to Britain by fifteen, the young king's turbulent beginnings would come to define his entire life.

Duleep was placed in the care of a Scottish couple, Dr John Login, a surgeon in the Bengal Army and his wife, Lady Lena Login. They brought him to nearby Castle Menzies, where in compensation for the loss of his lands, estate and possessions, he lived off an annual allowance of £40,000 from the British Government. Here he found a passion for shooting and fishing, becoming a renowned marksman and angler. Along with his fondness for Highland dress, his sporting talents earned him the nickname of 'Black Prince of Perthshire'. Having swapped turban for top hat, Duleep quickly moulded into a new life as a gentleman, and his royal status opened the doors to high society. Queen Victoria, to whom Duleep was presented, became one of his closest friends and later godmother to his children. For his own mother, Jind Kaur, the reality had been much

starker. Estranged from her only son for thirteen years, she had been imprisoned by the British but continued to plot for the return of Duleep's birthright.

Believing all threat of rebellion quashed in India, the British allowed Duleep to finally reunite with his mother and together they stayed at properties in Perthshire, including Auchlyne House. Thanks to her influence, Duleep began a rekindling of his Sikh values, and soon the memories of his lost heritage were burning bright in his mind. This



continued after Jind Kaur's death in 1863, and when Duleep set up home at Elveden Hall in Suffolk, he embarked on a tireless campaign of appeal. He attempted returning to his homeland, but was arrested enroute and held in captivity in Aden. With incredible defiance, he arranged his own reconversion to Sikhism - right under the noses of

his captors.

Events took an even stranger turn when Duleep was released in Britain. This time he tried for Russia, and was drawn into the Great Game being played out by the Tsar and British Raj on the North-West Frontier. He had nefarious dealings with government conspirators and spies, hoping to enlist the Tsar's help in starting an uprising in the Punjab and reclaiming his kingdom. Though Duleep's plans caused alarm in British circles, they were little more than fantasies. His demands for the return of the Koh-i-Noor diamond. which he intended to use to finance the rebellion, fell on deaf ears.

Sadly, the Maharaja never found the justice he sought and would not return to his native land. He died in 1893 in Paris at the age of 55. Despite his reinitiation to Sikh faith and desire for a traditional cremation, he was given a Christian burial at Elveden. To the last, his true identity had been denied him. Just over a century later, a statue of Duleep was erected near Elveden bearing a poignant inscription: "He died having re-embraced the Sikh faith while still engaged in a struggle to reclaim his throne." That, at least, will offer some comfort to Sikhs who see Duleep at once as a hero and tragic figure. He was, and still is, a symbol of the Sikh nation's aspirations for sovereignty.

Duleep's quest took him around the world, so it is all the more alluring that he had such strong ties to Killin and elsewhere in Perthshire. Bevond his written journals he left behind fragmentary mementos in the landscape. For example, the Maharaja paid for a headstone to his faithful servant James Cawood in the village's Old Cemetery. His first born - heir to the Sikh kingdom - lies in the churchyard of Kenmore, over sixthousand miles from his ancestral homeland. Castle Menzies still retains some possessions left during his time of residence there. All these landmarks are stepping stones on the nationwide Sikh Heritage Trail, celebrating the life of one of the Punjab's most fascinating characters.

After a second year with a lack of house martins nesting and seeing few martins or swallows flying and feeding over nearby fields, it has been a surprise to see a couple of hundred of them on the wires, feeding on the wing and even flying up to the house eaves looking at previous nest sites.

It surely can't be time for hibernation and the large number of frogs recently on the Ardeonaig road was probably them having a rain party/buffet after the many dry weeks that we have had. This last week we have seen two baby hedgehogs near the roadside, I doubt they are large enough to hibernate successfully but let's hope that they find plenty to eat and the cold comes late so that they can reach the necessary weight before hibernation.

They are like tiny round pincushions so please look out for them if driving up our road in the dark.

Something that will be very visible all year round up in the far North will be the space station to be built on the Sutherland coast. I must admit that, looking at an artist's impression, it doesn't look invasive at all. In fact, an awful lot less so than the RSPB monstrosity of a tower at Forsinard. The number of sika deer has recently been increasing in our area. On one estate three have been spotted recently and one shot.

Of course, another significant loss to the countryside has been the loss of Her Majesty who loved this land so much and did so much for conservation and was so knowledgeable. It was good to see that her coffin was made of native British oak, the single wreath of flowers were from Balmoral and included white heather and that the coffin was carried on its first short journey through Balmoral by six gamekeepers. It must be noted that it took eight military to do the same job! She was a constant supporter of rural workers and donated an undisclosed amount to the Gamekeepers' Welfare Trust. Whether or not you are a royalist, you must hope that King Charles will continue to support the countryside. He is said to have told his gamekeepers in his youth that he would love to have been a deerstalker. Maybe he could be recruited for all the extra culling that is planned.

Mr. Fox and his relations have been around again and are beginning to have some rather disgusting habits. In the wooded areas of the Cairngorms, it has been found by DNA analysis of fox poo by scientists at Aberdeen and Grenoble that foxes are eating a large amount of dog poo. Maybe this is due to lack of other food, just adaptation to more human interaction of dog walkers but apparently it contains as many





calories as wild prey. Also a couple in Worcestershire were disturbed one night by a racket in their bathroom and were very surprised to find a fox lurking on the inside windowsill. It is only to be sincerely hoped that these incidents are not at all connected!

If you are visiting the Highlands in the near future look out for giant wild boars. Apparently in at least one place they are killing and eating sheep and the extra protein is leading to extra size.

Stop Press - Beaver damage has just been pointed out to us by a neighbour. For a few days a beaver has been tackling a large tree on the roadside at Ardeonaig. We should have listened to the dog when he tried to tell us that something unusual had plopped into the burn the other day. It was maybe the heavy rain which led them further from the loch. Maybe he's made a home in the old curling pond so look out for floods along here. **Tim Frost**

August and September were busy months for the car scheme, mainly due to the fall in cases of Covid, which in turn meant services, both NHS and social, were opening up more and more. The arrival of the new dental practice, Infinityblu, in the village has also meant an increase in people needing to use our services. We do not charge for short journeys within the village whether it be to the dentist, doctors or other more social groups that you may wish to attend.

Killin & District Volunteer Car Scheme

We have also decided to remove the screens from our vehicles, which separate the passenger from the driver, although this is up to the individual driver to decide whether or not they are happy to do so and, of course, if Covid cases start to rise again we will have to consider using screens again. We are still asking passengers to wear facemasks at the present time.

We are looking for a new coordinator to join our team. The co-ordinator's role is to take telephone calls from people needing to use the car scheme, then finding them a driver. We use the schemes mobile to take calls and arrange journeys, with an easy form to complete for recording purposes. The amount of time they will spend doing this depends on how many calls they receive and these vary from day to day. The length of time coordinators do this for depends on their availability. Ideally it would be for four weeks in every three months, but this is not always possible if other co-ordinators are not available. We currently have two people doing this but could do with at least one more. If you like talking to people this will suit you down to the ground and you will be helping those people in your community who need to use the car scheme. We are absolutely delighted to have been successful in our funding bid to the Scottish Land Fund. We are also very hopeful about securing funding from Stirling Council's Place Based Investment Programme, which would give KAT the necessary funding both to purchase the old Co-op building and refurbish it to meet our needs. Now, you'll probably be wondering what's going to happen with the building.

Well, following community consultation and masses of less formal chats to find out what you want it to be and how the village can best benefit; it'll be converted into a Business and Reuse Hub.

What does that mean?

The interior will be divided up into more manageable sections to make best use of the whole building.

The front shop will be a bigger reuse shop; yes, a lot bigger.

This means you'll be able to see loads more goodies.

There'll be a larger store room and some separate, really great spaces for people to "have a go" at projects with experienced support nearby.

The extension to the side at the front will be a self-contained shop unit and available for rent. So, if you know someone like-minded, whose business activity complements ours, get in touch – we'd love to hear from you.

The back of the building will become a business and learning centre. This area will provide you with rooms for meetings, workshops, formal and informal training opportunities, plus additional office space and hotdesking for hire. There'll also be a handy printer so you can photocopy, scan or print whenever the need arises, and KAT will carve out a little area for their office. There'll be storage for a remakery

and tool library to allow these initiatives to expand, and of course your Community Food Fridge will find a new home here too. Exciting times, and is just the start of the journey.

All this is just an outline of what's planned, and rest assured as things progress these plans will evolve and change to ensure every effort is made to meet our community needs and wants.

What happens next?

Discussions now begin in earnest with the Co-op to buy the building asap and start renovations. Funding is still needed to fit out the different areas, so after a wee time to celebrate, it's back to tracking down more money.

We hope to be open by summer 2023, which you may think is an awfully long time, and believe us we're champing at the bit to get going, but these things take time and must be done right.

Behind the Killin News

During the Covid epidemic many celebrations and anniversaries were either not celebrated or marked in a different way.

One that deserves a mention is that it was the 30th anniversary of Killin News in 2021 and another is the fact that two of the original committee members had also then been on the committee for 30 years - and both still play a part in 2022.

She has now retired from the committee and handed the pursuit of adverts to others but she still continues to deal with mailing copies of the paper to subscribers. Killin News owes a lot to both Judy and Angus so very many thanks to them both.

There are many different tasks involved in keeping Killin News going. Adverts need to be acquired, articles are needed and need checking and, where necessary, editing. Items are then placed on pages using a software package called Quark, checked by proof readers, sent for printing and then delivered all over Killin (and - since the inclusion of `Strathfillin by the Way' some years ago - also to Crianlarich and Tyndrum.)
