Killin is a small village in beautiful surroundings and a long way from the nearest town. Over the years it has developed many organisations to help with the disadvantages this brings and to make the most of the advantages. Public transport is limited and hospitals far away - so we have the Hospital Car service and there is the Community Bus which groups can use to go on outings such as to theatres, shows or shopping trips. There are now not many shops - but there is the Community Hub which, as well as being the Post Office, has fresh fruit and veg from local sources. The Reuse Shop, as well as selling all manner of things for reuse, collects food from the Co-op which would otherwise be thrown out and anyone passing can help themselves to whatever is there. There is the Recycling/Repair group to help with various tools. Sports lovers have the Golf Club, football activity and bowls as well as groups who run or swim in the loch.

There is the Youth Group for young people, the Tuesday Club for older folk, Walk in the Park for anyone who wants company and a walk. We are surrounded by hills and we have the Mountain Rescue on hand for emergencies. We have our own Fire Brigade, Drama Club, Choir and Community Council. What do all these valued organisations have in common? They all depend on volunteers or groups of people who are willing and able to give time to them. Volunteers are always needed so why not consider whether you can give time to one or more and help our community to continue to be a really desirable place to live.

There has been a lot going on for the Nurseries since our last submission.

The children celebrated World Book Day by dressing up as book characters. They went through to the Primary School to see their costumes and watch their parade and a photo opportunity. Our Mental Health week was very well orchestrated by staff and they had organised a plethora of activities and experiences for the children for each day. These were linked to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) and our Health and Social Care Standards. Our Facebook page and the children's ejournals displayed lots of images to support parents with ideas to continue this at home.

The older children learnt about Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday which was closely followed by the festival Holi, an



Indian celebration for the end of winter and the beginning of spring, a time to meet, play and laugh and repair broken friendships. Powder paint is thrown and each colour





depicts its meaning, for example, love, new beginnings and health.

The younger children have been learning some early numeracy through the story of The 3 Little Pigs, using playdoh, den building at the pavilion, using the sandpit and by visiting the library.



All children have been regularly reviewing our values of Respect, Kindness and Honesty.

The first week of March saw Killin Nursery welcome their peers from Crianlarich Nursery. For some children, it has been the ideal opportunity to rekindle relationships made during transition activities. The staff and children have been sharing their skills and knowledge and are embracing this change with enthusiasm. This is a temporary amalgamation to support our staffing shortages.

New Market Garden at Tombreck



Hello! We are Rachel and Ian, two veg growers who have recently moved to Tombreck Farm on the Killin-Kenmore road, and are setting up a market garden.

Our plan is to grow organic vegetables for sale to the local community, initially from the farm shop at Tombreck, but also via the Neighbourfood organisation and possibly some other outlets. In time we intend to set up a veg box scheme and will be looking at various models for community involvement. However, all we have to start with is an empty field so it will take some time to get fully established!

Most of our efforts at the moment are going into setting up infrastructure, working out business accounts and preparing the first growing areas for planting with the arrival of Spring. This has included lots of dock-digging, making compost from the abundant bracken and shifting boulders the old-fashioned way.

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Fiona McGregor, Health Walk Coordinator for the Loch Lomond & The Trossachs Countryside Trusts' Walk in the Park programme shares some updates since the last edition and some welcome news now the days are getting longer.

We are here more than ever to support you to get outdoors!

In early March our lovely Killin group returned to one of their favourite routes, the beautiful Glen Ogle Viaduct, one of our many walks our health walk programme offers to those living with dementia.

For anyone living with this illness will know only too well the isolation and loneliness often associated with it, as well as other symptoms such as difficulty with movement or just doing simple daily activities. Our health walks are even more important especially for anyone who might need a little extra support for getting outdoors for some fresh air, conversation, and gentle exercise. Individually and regularly checked for their suitability, our routes mean everyone and anyone in the community can join in. Our volunteer Walk Leaders also receive dementia friendly training to help equip them to support those who may need a little



extra help or gentle words of encouragement. Just look out for our programme and weekly walks with the 'dementia friendly' logo that welcomes anyone living with dementia and their carers.

We always love to hear our walkers' stories and we were especially delighted when Fiona kindly shared this lovely photo of Isobel and Rosie, two of our Dementia Friendly Volunteer Walk Leaders, supporting Sandra whilst enjoying one of their favourite walks.

We also have some other great news if you are looking to get your week off to a good start, with our Killin evening walks. Now if you are chomping at the bit in between our walks, we always have our weekly 'Strength & Balance' sessions every Wednesday from 2pm to 3pm in the Killin & Ardeonaig Parish Church.

These simple exercises are perfect for keeping your muscles and joints supple. Some of our participants have found that with the help of these sessions they have become more confident to go out by themselves, giving them greater independence. As with our walking programme, if you have a health problem, please check with your GP first.





Killin Mountain Rescue Team

Last year was one of the busiest on record, and the team attended 44 separate incidents across the area. 2023 is already shaping up to be a busy one and, to date the team have attended 11 incidents so far!

A break down of the incidents we have attended so far in 2023 is as follows:

02/01/23 - Male climber fell on Ben Lui, resulting in a serious injury. Rescue 199 also mobilised, and they located the casualty quickly as the team were deploying and uplifted the male and flew directly to hospital.

03/01/23 - Called out to a male walker who had become lost on Ben Ledi. Team members deployed into a number of groups and searched the hill, and eventually located the male and returned him to his vehicle, uninjured.

15/01/23 - Two climbers fell on Ben More and luckily were uninjured. They were however cragfast and required a technical rescue to recover them to safety.

22/01/23 - Male walker became lost on Beinn Chabhair due to poor visibility. Team deployed and when he was located, he was found to be cragfast so a technical rescue was required.

28/01/23 - Team deployed to Ben More after a report that a male had fallen. Sadly, the male was found dead and the team assisted in recovering him.

05/02/23 - The team were called to Beinn a' Chroin for a male suffering cramp. Whilst we were deploying, we were updated that the male had met with other walkers and was managing to get off the hill slowly. The team remained at the bottom of the hill until he was off safely.

10/02/23 - The team received a request for assistance from a farmer in Balquhidder after he located a sheep stuck in a deep gorge and he was unable to get to it. The team carried out a technical rescue to recover the sheep back to safety.

16/02/23 - Called to Falls of Dochart after a female had fallen on rocks and broken her ankle.

16/02/23 - Notified by Police of a male requiring assistance on Ben Vorlich. One of our team leaders made contact with the male and it was ascertained it was the Ben Vorlich in Arrochar MRTs area, so call passed to them.

26/02/23 - Called to Beinn nan Eachan after reports of a male who'd fallen after slipping on ice. Rescue 199 was also mobilised and as the team were deploying, they located the male and recovered him before flying him to hospital.

27/02/23 - Team deployed to Ben Vorlich after a male had become lost in the mist. Quickly located as he provided his location and he was escorted off the hill.

In addition to the callouts, our members have continued with regular training sessions. Each month, our members attend a number of training sessions, which include a monthly first aid night, a full day on the hill, as well as one evening training session.


Our members will also attend national training courses and in February we had a number of team members who attended a Casualty Care course and passed successfully. These members are qualified to provide a higher level of medical care and administer various medications to our casualties when required.

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
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Killin Youth Group

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Killin's Post Office and Newsagent - Help Needed!

There have been a few articles in Killin News about Killin's Post Office and Newsagent. They are both part of MacGregor's Community Hub Ltd or MCH for short. MCH is a Community Benefit Society. Profits made are either re-invested in the business or used for the general good of the local community.

MCH relies on the continuing support of the volunteers who help to run the business alongside the paid employees that we have. MCH also relies on the support of the local community to use the Post Office and shop as much as possible. There is no longer a 'salary' for running the Post Office. Indeed Killin's Post Master is a volunteer. The Post Office remunerates MCH through commission payments. For example, withdrawing money from the Post Office instead of from a cash dispenser earns MCH a small commission payment. The same is true if you pay money into your bank account via the Post Office or pay bills at the Post Office or buy stamps at the Post Office. It all helps and it could mean the difference between survival and

closure.

Selling newspapers and magazines brings in some income, but margins on newspapers are notoriously low. Buying confectionery, drinks, food, general stationery and fishing items help MCH enormously as the margins are higher. Gifts and souvenirs are also profitable for us. MCH is not able to compete with the Co-op simply because we don't have the buying power. Apart from a few staple items, the intention with food items in the shop is to stock items that you are unlikely to find in the Co-op or items that have been locally produced. There is also a "refill station" with an array of different items ranging from washing up liquid to flour, so you can buy as little or as much as you need, and these are very competitively priced too!

There are different ways in which you can help:

Please use the Post Office and shop as much as possible. Come in and pay rent, bills, road tax on a regular basis – it all helps. Don't just use the Post Office to withdraw cash when the ATM is out of order: come in every week and get cash here – we get a small commission which helps keep the Post Office open.

Become a member of MacGregor's Community Hub by buying shares. Some people just buy one share, some buy many more and some people buy a regular number of shares every month. Membership applications are available in the shop. Membership entitles you to attend MCH's annual general meeting and to contribute to how the business is run and moves forward.

Become a volunteer. You can help out as little or as much as you like by working in the shop or by joining the management committee. Please ask any of the volunteers or staff working in the shop to take your details and we'll get back to you.

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Our regular pharmacist Laura has also undergone additional clinical training to become a Pharmacist Independent Prescriber. This means she is able to provide advice and treatment for a wider range of common clinical conditions. COLLECTING PRESCRIPTIONS

Unfortunately due to pharmacy laws we are unable to hand out prescriptions whilst there is no pharmacist on the premises. To avoid you having to make a repeat trip we'd advise avoiding between 12.30-1.30 as the pharmacist may pop out during this time.

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Killin Community Council

On Tuesday, 7th March, the Community Council held its last meeting prior to the new elections scheduled to be held in April this year. It doesn't feel like five years since the last elections, but these have been strange times for all of us. For two of these years, we largely communicated by Zoom, WhatsApp and social media – locked down and forbidden from meeting properly as a community council. It was a difficult time for everyone, soon to be followed by Storm Arwen, the war in Ukraine and the cost of living crisis.

Throughout it all the Community Council operated pretty much as normal as could be expected under the circumstances. During the 'lockdown years', we liaised with various local and national bodies. We obtained generous supplies of hand sanitiser from Deanston Distillery and distributed this throughout the village. We obtained funding from SSEN, which was used to help purchase a patient hoist for the care home, provide PPE for the Mountain Rescue team and fund the renovation of the war memorial and garden.

During Storm Arwen, the Community Council helped to assist and coordinated efforts to maintain contact with all members of the community and ensure that warm and safe refuges were available for any that required them, though any and all credit is due to the wonderful response of the community to that event, and the innumerable volunteers who knocked on doors, provided warm spaces and delivered gas heaters, camping stoves and candles, often at their own expense. Morgan Sindall provided mobile generators to maintain heating in the care home and many other businesses provided whatever help they could.

The brutal war in Ukraine saw an exodus of refugees across Europe, many of whom came to Scotland. The Killin Hotel was requisitioned by the Scottish Government for the accommodation of some sixty to seventy refugees, mainly, if not exclusively, women and children. Once again, the community rallied round magnificently. English language classes were held in the Church community rooms by a cohort of a dozen volunteers, many retired, and most of whom had teaching qualifications and experience, either in ESOL or standard primary and secondary education. Activities and visits were arranged, and a festival of Scottish and Ukrainian music was held in the McLaren Hall, with the proceeds going to humanitarian relief in Ukraine. Many of our Ukrainian guests have since left, but some still remain, having found work and community here in Killin, and I am sure that those who have relocated to more sustainable accommodation elsewhere will always have warm and happy memories of their time here, and of the community that welcomed them and gave them sanctuary.

That war also precipitated a rapid escalation in prices for oil, gas and many other commodities. The rocketing price of raw energy supplies impacted everything from electricity prices to transport and basic foodstuffs. In October, the Community Council applied for and won a Cost of Living Fund Grant of £8,000 which has enabled the Pavilion to provide a warm space one day a week for residents and access useful support services such as Citizens' Advice. A further grant of £3000 was awarded to us to provide other warm spaces, coffee, soup and sandwiches across different venues throughout the village on other weekdays. In this latter provision

we are immensely grateful for the participation of a wide range of volunteers who have made these warm spaces welcoming and friendly.

These are just a few highlights of our work over the last five years. There are others, as well as lots and lots of mundane stuff that no-one really wants to hear about, other than "it's getting done", which brings me back to the point of all this. Elections will be held in April for a new Community Council. Nomination forms will be available from the 3rd April and can be obtained by emailing. The closing date for returned forms is 17th April. If you care about the local community and want to be involved, please do put your name forward for election. We always need new blood - sweat and tears optional. There will be no Community Council report in the next issue of the Killin News, but we expect it to return in the summer, although whether by the same author is now entirely in the hands of the electorate.

Strathfillan Community Garden



Keeping strong and balanced at home

As we progress into better weather and get out a bit more, this issue we bring you 'toe raises'.

This exercise will help ensure you lift your toes more easily when stepping over things and reduce your chance of tripping or falling backwards.

It works the muscles at the top of the foot and challenges your balance and core strength to stay upright.

Just ensure you have something solid to hold on to if you need to – it's harder than you think! Try to keep your body straight (no bums out backwards).

Once you have mastered the toe raise, see if you can walk about for a few steps on your heels.

Toe Raises

- Stand tall holding your support
- Raise your toes taking your weight back into your heels without sticking your bottom out
- · Hold for a second
- Lower your toes with control
- Repeat 10 times

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

The Future of Rural Hospitality and Tourism

An exciting new initiative is being developed in and around the National Park that is aimed at helping rural hospitality and tourism businesses to be seen, Scotland wide, as 'Employers of Choice'. The vision is to attract highly motivated job seekers and provide a fulfilling career for those already working within the sector.

In her role as Regional Food Tourism Ambassador for Stirling and Forth Valley, local resident and business owner Sarah Heward has initiated the pilot project that aims to address the staff recruitment and retention issues that are currently crippling rural hospitality and tourism businesses in our area. Sarah, founder and coowner of the Real Food Café in Tyndrum, is very passionate about the impact the new project will have after sadly witnessing a significant number of local businesses recently having to close their doors, due to the acute challenges that we are all aware of including Brexit, Covid and energy price rises, to name a few. Such closures are never taken lightly and obviously have a profound impact on the business owners themselves. However the knock-on

effects of losing such facilities in a rural area also impact greatly on the local communities who live there, with fewer places to meet up and less on offer to attract visitors.

The aim of the 2 year pilot project is to create a package of training, wellbeing and financial benefits all wrapped up in an easy to access website that will be offered to local business owners at a super affordable price for the benefit of their workers. Those businesses who buy into the package will be equipped with the necessary tools to ensure their staff's welfare is a priority and will have access to a pathway that offers exciting career choices and opportunities for their employees to develop and grow.

This unique project offers a fresh and positive approach to the current recruitment and retention issues our rural region is facing. The Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park together with the Forth Valley Food and Drink Network will participate in the pilot project and once the concept has been proven successful, it has the potential to be rolled out to benefit other rural areas within

Scotland.

A project development manager, also one of Scotland's Regional Food Tourism Ambassadors, was appointed in January. In addition a working group of business owners has been formed to ensure the design fully meets the industry requirements and adds tangible value. Working group members include Tom Lewis who owns Mhor 84, Mhor Bread and Monachyle Mhor.

This is a very exciting time, as we embark on an initiative that will start to change the image of the industry that is core to life in the National Park. We aim to put our region on the map as an excellent place to work in a fulfilling career within forward thinking businesses who care and nurture the growth of their employees.

We look forward to sharing more details over the coming months about the package and the benefits it will bring to employees within the sector.



After lots of hard effort and nail-biting applications, we successfully gained funding from the Scottish Land Fund to buy the building, and then obtained further funding from the Place Based Investment Fund through Stirling Council for refurbishment. The Reuse shop will have much more room to showcase and browse for all those treasures.

The back of the building will become a business and learning hub, allowing us space for a 'co-working' area. This is where you'll be able to hire a desk space to work and meet others, there'll also be private room hire for folk to have one-to-one meetings, as well as formal and informal learning. There'll also be room to rehome our wonderful KAT workers; much warmer and great to be at the centre of things.

Not only, but also ... we'll be renting out the adjacent space to a local business and will soon be on the lookout for prospective tenants. Aside from the Co-op, there are so many more initiatives KAT is working on to make Killin and Ardeonaig the best place to live and visit.

Reuse shop

We know our Reuse shop has become a focal point for locals. It's not uncommon for queues to be forming well in advance of opening hours, not just for the amazing treasures held within, but for a friendly blether and the chance to catch up on neighbourly news.

In addition to the Community Fridge, which continues to be a triumph, the

Reuse shop is now hosting a Seed Swap for all you budding gardeners (see Food Growing below); and when popping in for your veggie seeds or Morning rolls, remember to look out for an Easter hamper and tombola which will be helping to raise funds for the Car scheme.

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The Tapestry of the Highlands and Islands

Groups and individuals in Killin have been involved in helping to create and stitch one of the panels for the new Tapestry of the Highlands and Islands. The Heartland group includes those living in the area of Highland Perthshire which is bounded by Killin, Rannoch and Pitlochry, although originally being part of a larger group that covered the area from Kingussie to Perth and beyond, called the A9 Stitch-up group. However the numbers and area involved became too large and therefore a second panel was provided for those further west and living in the Heartlands of Highland Perthshire.

This Heartland Stitchers, made up of around 40 adults and more than 40 primary school children across Highland Perthshire including 20 from Killin, have been busy over the last few months, with embroidery, applique and cord making, which is being used to create the 1m square panel, one of 52 being produced for the Tapestry of the Highlands and Islands project. The youngest stitcher, age 4, also from Killin, the oldest however age 96 lives nearer Pitlochry, and the project has involved individuals from all decades of

The design and theme of the panel is Faith, based around a Celtic Cross, which is surrounded by smaller individual pieces of

embroidery called
"Journey Stones" which
include the myths and
legends, local history
and topography, as well
as various aspects of
Faith. In particular there
are Journey Stones
embroidered with images
of the Falls of Dochart,
Killin and Ardeonaig

Parish Church, the Killin Healing stones, Glen Lochay rock art at Duncroisk, the Praying Hands in Glen Lyon and Ben Lawers.

The Heartland Panel should be finished within the next couple of months and we understand that the

completed tapestry panels will be exhibited at Inverness Castle in due course, as well as within community venues across the Highlands and Islands, on a rotating basis and possibly as part of a Tapestry Trail.

The whole tapestry is being created as part of



the Spirit of the Highlands and Islands project, a partnership between Highland Council and High Life Highland in collaboration with



VisitScotland. This project is supported by a grant from the Natural and Cultural Heritage Fund led by NatureScot and funded by the European Regional Development Fund.

Gardening for Wildlife & Climate

There can be no doubt that the nature crisis, which includes climate change, is real and is entirely associated with human activity. The Living Planet Report, released in 2021, revealed that, sadly, globally populations of mammals, birds, fish, amphibians and reptiles have declined by an average of 69% since 1970.

Insects, which play vital roles as pollinators, decomposers and prey, are doing no better. Research from Germany and France indicates that insects have declined by around 75% across Europe since the 1970s, while a

recent study from the UK found that we have lost 60% of our insects in the last 18 years.

While there is an onus on each one of us to do our bit to address biodiversity loss, the scale and complexity of the nature crisis can seem confusing and daunting. What can we as individuals actually do to help? It turns out that

there are many things including saving energy, minimizing food waste, responsible shopping, environmental voting and dietary choices, but perhaps the most satisfying is wildlife gardening.

So how can we improve our gardens for wildlife? Probably the best single thing that can be done is putting in a pond, even if it is no more than a garden sink sunk into a corner of your garden, adorned with pebbles, stones and aquatic plants. Wildlife including frogs, newts, and a variety of aquatic insects will soon move in – but this isn't always feasible and there are plenty of other easy things that can be done. Here are some ideas:

1. Cultivate a small meadow or leave all or a patch of your lawn unmown through May or even better until the end of summer – you will be amazed by the flowers that emerge and the wildlife they attract. 2. Put up bird boxes, bat boxes, bird feeders and bee hotels. 3. Leave piles of wood for frogs, toads, newts and beetles to shelter and over-winter under. 4. Avoid using pesticides and herbicides, which cause significant damage to wildlife. 5. Grow caterpillar food-plants such as nettles, buckthorn, hops and lady's smock for butterflies and moths. 6. Plant a hedge for invertebrates, birds and voles and avoid cutting it each year. When you do cut it, do so after the berries and seed have been eaten. 7. Allow some brambles to grow. 8. Avoid cutting down plants in autumn that could be harbouring caterpillars or pupae. 9. Leave dead wood on trees to provide breeding habitat for beetles. 10. Sweep fallen leaves under your hedge or into a pile for overwintering beetles and their prey. 11. Tolerate aphids, which many hoverfly species rely on for food. 12. Make a pile of grass clippings to provide shelter and breeding habitat for hoverflies. 13. Add climbing plants to walls and fences, benefitting invertebrates such as spiders and millipedes. 14. Build a bug hotel.

By encouraging insects and other invertebrates into your garden and varying the height of vegetation, you

benefit a wide range of wildlife. An additional bonus is that wildlife-friendly gardens provide their own natural defence system against unwanted garden pests. For example, hoverfly larvae eat large numbers of aphids, ladybirds feed on greenfly, wasps prey on aphids, flies and caterpillars considered to be pests and frogs, toads and some beetle species prey on slugs.

There is a wealth of information on wildlife gardening on the internet and some great books. Most of the above information has been taken from Kate Bradbury's The Wildlife Gardener (2013).

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Look for the Evidence

It was a sad day for many recently with the last ever episode in the TV Inspector Morse trilogy. To mark this there was an interesting documentary tracing the original 'Morse', followed by the up-to-date 'Lewis' and then the prelude 'Endeavour'. In this the great innovations in forensic evidence gathering during the last few decades were highlighted. Just the same has happened in the naturalist field. (Cue jokes about naturists in fields!). Such as the hidden cameras like those located amongst 60,000 hectares of the Cairngorms which have collected over 3,000 images of the endangered capercaillie in the hope that this non-disturbance way will help to study their behaviour and so help to conserve the caper. It's good to know that some effort is going into conserving the wonderful native wildlife which is under threat. Red squirrels come to mind. At the moment we seem to be seeing fewer along the road both towards Killin and Kenmore and only a couple have returned to the feeders. One of these we call Crazy squirrel as it runs up and down the window sills and attempts to climb up the glass door to the roof. This between sitting gazing inside with front feet up against the glass. If it wasn't for the dog, I'm sure it would be sitting at the table with a Nutella sandwich. Good luck with catching that one on camera.

Rentokil have developed the use of facial recognition techniques on rats to study behaviour and lead to the best eradication methods.

A previously unknown penguin colony in Antarctica has been discovered after the poo was seen from space.

Some techniques link to agriculture like a joint venture between The James Hutton Institute in Dundee and Leibniz Institute (no idea if this is where the biscuits were invented) in Gatersleben in Germany to reassemble the genome sequence of ancient Unst barley so that it can become a usable crop worldwide in manganese deficient soils. If this doesn't interest you then maybe the expected use as heritage ingredient in Shetland whiskies may spark your interest.

It's a bit 'back to the future' in some cases, which shows that we had it right before (and still do in Ardeonaig) as science has proved that, using carbon-rich farmyard manure on the land instead of inorganic chemical fertilizers, retains drastically more of the potent greenhouse gas nitrous oxide. Only trouble is where will we get our dung from when we only eat and farm quinoa?

Often proved evidence rubs the wrong way with what many wish to believe. Science and advice for Scottish Agriculture (SASA) are working with Nature Scot on D.N.A. analysis of toothmarks etc. on livestock especially lamb predation. This has proved that sometimes lambs are killed while others are scavenged after death by foxes, badgers and dogs. So dog owners be careful at this time of year to keep your pets under control, or they may find themselves in an interview room in need of a doggy lawyer. While some love the idea of peat preservation and restoration, which are some of the current buz words, it may not be as saintly as it seems. The Scottish Gamekeepers Association is urging the Scottish

almost blanket restrictions on muirburn. Defra has funded 'Peatland-ES-UK' along with The University of York to investigate this in Northern England and has shown that managed cycles of muirburn prevent the peatlands from drying out and thus storing less carbon. Has anyone considered the fuel emissions and ground damage caused by the machinery used to restore peat banks?

While many don't like some of the

scientific proofs as they have reputations and sometimes, careers, based on them they really must begin to see the true facts.

Mr. Fox has been on an early trip to Germany, not sure if he is skiing before coming home for the lambing but he has caused many tears after killing the four new kangaroos in Luckenwalde Zoo. There is no report, as yet, whether he has been extradited to Australia.

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Killin Community Bus

The Community Bus Committee held its AGM on February 28th this year. Unfortunately, there were not enough attendees to fill all the necessary positions, so it was decided to hold an EGM in Late April and publicise this as widely as possible to ensure the recruitment of sufficient members to safeguard the future of the bus.



A little about the origins of this service and its value to the community over the years needs to be said. The first Community Bus was purchased in 1968 and has been replaced, as new, several times over the last fifty-five years. All these buses have been funded by local and national charities and individual donations.

Over the years, the bus has been a mainstay of local community transport, serving all sectors of the local community and those in the wider area – Tyndrum, Crianlarich, Balquidder, Lochearnhead and Strathyre. It has been used by our local scouts and cubs (as well as other groups using the Lochearnhead Scout Station), youth groups, clubs and societies, groups of friends and senior citizens. It was used in the autumn of last year

to take groups of Ukrainian children on outings and visits.

It is an ideal vehicle for groups planning shopping or theatre trips to Stirling, Edinburgh and Glasgow, or even further afield. It can be used for outings and social events; shuttle runs and even overnight trips. It can hold 13 passengers as well as the driver, making 14 in total. Our current bus is a very modern Ford minibus, comfortable and easy to drive. Registered drivers only need a standard licence and be between the ages of 25 and 75, and our registration process is very easy. Ron Allner can guide you through this very quickly.

The community bus needs not only committee members, also but users and registered drivers. The bus is not being used by the local community to the extent it once was. Usage is actually very economical for groups of more than 8 people. At 75p per mile, a trip to Edinburgh for 8 would be £120 – for 10 it would be £12 each. Public Transport would cost a lot more, and would be fraught with delays, transfers and the now common disruptions.

Please look out for our EGM in late April and try to attend. We are hoping for a good turnout to ensure the continued health and continuity of this vital service.

Construction works continue on SSEN Transmission's Killin VISTA project which will see a total of 7.8km of overhead line removed, including 32 steel lattice towers, between Killin substation and Lix Toll.

Safety is always our first priority at SSEN Transmission and with this in mind, we ask that you please remain vigilant of signage or direction around the construction works and do not enter our working areas.

Users of the access tracks are asked to obey signage and are reminded that large vehicles and construction traffic are also using the tracks.

Office relocation

In order to complete all final restatement works north of the river in advance of the temporary bridge removal in March, Morgan Sindall Infrastructure have recloated their site office adjacent to the Acharn Biomass facility.

The highest mountain in the central highlands, Ben Lawers gives its name to the wider National Nature Reserve owned and managed by the National Trust for Scotland. Encompassing almost 4,500ha of the southern and/or eastern slopes of the Ben Lawers and Tarmachan ranges, it's managed for conservation and public access.

As well as celebrity status for its rich arctic-alpine flora, Ben Lawers NNR boasts seven Munros – the namesake mountain is the central high point of its massif; Meall nan Tarmachan is the pinnacle of the ridge taking its name. Overlooking Loch Tay, these mighty mountains offer spectacular views.

But you don't have to head for the summits to enjoy the scenic landscape – there are lower level options too. The picturesque Edramucky Trail can be enjoyed as a gentle walk and is great for families to explore all things natural. Ben Lawers is teeming with wildlife – from tiny insects to Scotland's largest mammal, the red deer.

The hills are also rich in archaeological remains and part of the story of past inhabitants is revealed on the Kiltyrie Hidden History Trail.










The car park is 2 miles up a hill road off the A827, north of Loch Tay.

Obituary

George Donald Coyne 07.10.1943 - 06.01.2023

George's parents (George and Catherine) married in 1942, and George was born in 1943, followed by his sister Catherine in 1946. His father was a shepherd and the family initially stayed at Marble Lodge, Glen Clova. Subsequent moves included stays at Straloch, Glen Clova, and Balnafuaran at Tulliemet. George's first job at the age of 15 was as a ghillie on the River Tay, and it was while working on the River Tay that he met his future wife Margaret pulling pints in the Ballinluig Inn.

George continued his work as a ghillie on the Tay, and thereafter briefly tried his hand at gamekeeping and rearing pheasants on Keir and Cawder Estates. However, this wasn't to be the chosen path, as the hills beckoned, and George secured employment as a ghillie on Meggernie Estate, Glen Lyon and thereafter as an under-keeper/stalker on the same estate.

George and Margaret married at Braco Church in October 1966 and settled at The Kennels, Meggernie. George continued his work on the estate and Margaret assisted with domestic duties at Meggernie Castle. Brother-in-law Calum would often visit Meggernie and would be asked to lend a hand – perhaps not the relaxing visit he had envisaged but enjoyable nonetheless!

Donald arrived on the scene in May 1969. However, the joy was quickly followed by sadness due to the sudden death of George's mother in July of the same year.

The opportunity arose for George to become Head Keeper/Stalker on Auchlyne and Suie Estate and the family moved to Auchlyne in May



1973. Unfortunately, this was to become another year of mixed emotions as George's father passed in August 1973.

Donald married Gillian in December 2003 and George and Margaret were proud grandparents when Jamie was born in September 2005. George and Margaret were always excited to see grandson Jamie, beaming smiles as they watched him play at Auchlyne and at Ballechroisk, Killin. It wasn't all work for George though, he enjoyed playing carpet bowls, curling, fishing, and clay-pigeon shooting in his spare time, and was Secretary of the Killin Gun Club for many years.

George continued his working life on the estate until eventual retirement in 2010. Life had become more difficult as Margaret had been diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis, and thereafter George was diagnosed with Parkinsons. They both fully appreciated and valued the support provided by nearby friends and carers when living at Auchlyne, and following retirement, in Killin. Margaret sadly passed in September 2013.

The latter years became physically

challenging and after a spell in 2019 in the Forth Valley Royal Hospital, followed by rehabilitation at the Bellfield Centre, Stirling, George moved into The Falls of Dochart Retirement Home in December 2019.

The Covid pandemic and

restrictions arrived shortly afterwards. This didn't stop George, always one to push the boundaries, he 'broke out' of the Falls garden on a few occasions, returning with a cheeky grin on his face when he was reprimanded!

George was much loved and will be greatly missed by family and friends. The family take this opportunity to thank Emma Paterson and family for the friendship and support George and Margaret received over the years at Auchlyne, and extend their thanks to all friends, carers, Killin Medical Practice, the NHS, and Stirling Council for their support over the years.

Many thanks also to Ross Anderson and his team for their excellent and professional service when arranging the funeral and to Reverend Jeff McCormack for his guidance and for delivering the service.

And a big thank you to Mandy and all the staff and management at The Falls of Dochart Retirement Home for providing George with comfort and laughter during his 3 years in the home - an excellent facility for the local community. Finally, thank you to everyone who came along to the services at Perth Crematorium and Killin Church and to the Killin Hotel for providing the funeral tea - very much appreciated. The Falls of Dochart Retirement Home is grateful for the collections at the crematorium and church which raised £505.



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

Bird and Animal Watching

Like many other people, we have a bird table and get a lot of enjoyment watching the birds. Recently, however, we have had a period of ten days without a single bird, something we have never experienced before. In the past the appearance of a sparrowhawk would frighten them away for a few hours but then they would then return so we weren't sure this was the cause

of their absence. However just as they began to return, we did see a sparrowhawk which frightened them off and we now wonder whether our birds will ever return permanently - a depressing thought.

For the past twenty two years we have kept a very unscientific record of the birds and animals we've seen here at Auchmore, ticking off each month the species but not the number of times we see them each month and the recent lack of birds made me look at the records such as they are.

The most varieties of bird we saw in one year was 37 in 2002 and the fewest 26 in 2008 and 2016. We haven't seen a greenfinch since 2014. In only one month each since 2001 have we seen - a brambling, a chiffchaff, a redshank, a garden warbler, a wood warbler, a yellowhammer - and recently a crossbill. In two months we saw a starling and a woodcock and in three months a

redpoll and a swift. Goldcrests were seen rarely until 2005 and in only two months since then but recently a nuthatch has made several visits. The swallows went missing last summer after being seen once and pied wagtails have been missing. The animal records also show fewer

and fewer sightings. We haven't seen a hedgehog since 2010, a toad or a weasel since 2017 and a stoat in only two months since 2006. Frogs and toads have been missing since 2018 but before that the pond was filled with frogs as soon as the

melted - though I did see one frog twice last year. Fortunately, we haven't had moles for several years and we do still see hares but sadly the red squirrels who used be regular visitors have been missing since last autumn whereas usually we had several on the nuts and chasing each other round the garden, We really miss them. It would be good to think that the birds and animals now rare would make a comeback. But will they?

supplied us with tea, biscuits and cakes. We all came away feeling that we had learned a lot and are ready to put this into practice.

We are also very aware of the fact that if we had a vehicle with ramped access it would make a massive difference to a number of our passengers. They would then not have the problem of trying to get into a vehicle which is difficult for them and is often painful and not comfortable. Because of this we are looking for funding to buy an accessible vehicle to use when

transporting people who are finding it difficult to transfer into our cars. We still have a long way to go to be able to afford this, but feel this is a very necessary way to go.
