

Stirling Provost Douglas Dodds joined the people of Killin in celebrating the true worth of friendships - young and old. The Provost was guest of honour as the community hosted a party to showcase their pride in the relationship between Killin Nursery and the Falls of Dochart Retirement Home.

The children and residents were feted in March at the 'Generations Working Together Excellence Awards' in Glasgow, winning an award for Valuing Generational Diversity.

The nursery and retirement home have been working together informally for 20 years. However, since 2015 weekly visits to the retirement home have been a formal part of the children's learning and development.

Warmth

The children regularly put on shows, tell stories and play board games

with residents. In return, the residents pass on gardening tips, help with arts and crafts and teach the children noughts and crosses. Provost Dodds said: "The warmth of the Killin community shines through in the relationship between the children and residents.



"It was great to share in the success of the recent reward, which reflects so well on the hard work of the nursery and retirement home. "They say age is just a number and it's clear the residents take as much pleasure from the visits of the

children as the younger ones take from learning new skills from the more experienced members of the community.

The Killin and District Volunteer Car Scheme

We are currently very busy. In the last 12 months we have carried out almost 400 journeys, covering over 28,000 miles. We are also fundraising to enable us to purchase a second-hand vehicle with disabled access. There are no community-owned wheelchair-accessible vehicles in our area, able to take someone who cannot transfer from a wheelchair into a car, nor one that can take people with very poor mobility, struggling with both pain and physical incapacity. Having such a vehicle will make such a difference to many people using the car scheme, who currently only just manage to get into our cars.

This is a very real concern for our drivers and although they try to help, as much as they are able, it is often a worry that the passenger or driver may end up injuring themselves.


The ways in which we are fundraising include applying for grant funding, where we are doing quite well, although this takes time. We are also using Givey, a fundraising platform on the Internet. There is currently a collection box in the re-use shop and we have been lucky enough to have some donations from local people, including one very generous amount from an anonymous donner, whom we would like to thank very much.

We are looking for a total of £25,000 and currently have approximately a third of this amount.

Tombreck Market Garden



It's all been a bit of a mad rush on our new market garden here at Tombreck. Ideally, we would have had our growing spaces cultivated and under cover over winter, but since we only arrived here in February, we've had to do what we can to prepare the ground in a much shorter space of time. The silage tarp just about had enough time to kill off the grass on the first growing plot, and we hired in a rotavator, spread lime and manure, and tilled that plot and two more over the course of a week, one sown to green manure and the other to go under the tarp. It looks like we'll now have space to start planting out all our seedlings, which is a relief!

We've also experimented with a 'lazy bed' for new potatoes. This is an old technique which was common among subsistence farmers in the Highlands and Ireland, well suited to rocky or boggy soils where you couldn't pull a plough. Basically, you cut and flip the turf into the middle of the bed, dig a trench on both sides and use the spoil to build the bed up into a gentle curved profile. The potatoes then get planted through the upside-down turf.

'Lazy' didn't feel like the right adjective at the time, but it's a comparatively quick way to create a growing space from scratch. One day I'd like to try using a 'cas chrom' (literally 'crooked foot') which uses a long, curved handle, a step on one side and angled iron blade to cut and lever up the sods without the bending over you have to do with a spade.

Strathfillan Seasonal Rangers

Fortunately, we managed to secure funding from NatureScot to employ rangers for a third season. We're happy to announce that Gavin Macnab will be again donning the high-vis jacket and litter picker for a third season, and he will be joined by Diane Mailer as our second ranger. We would like to welcome them again to the SCDT fold and wish them a good season. The funding for the rangers is limited to visitor impact management. This means they will be dealing with litter and waste, talking with and advising visitors on how to behave in relation to the Scottish Outdoor Access Code, reporting and recording any antisocial behaviours to the Trust, the National Park and the police, and undertaking small scale path maintenance works, such as trimming back vegetation and perhaps helping

our woodland officer with some path works on Trust owned land. They are not employed to undertake maintenance works around the villages or on private land. This project is supported by NatureScot through the Better Places Fund.



Strathfillan Community Garden

Spring is starting to show in the community garden. We have winter cabbages a plenty in the polytunnel which will be available in the next few weeks and garlic on the way. We have painted the container and most people have now started planting in the outdoor raised beds, a mix of vegetables and plants, rhubarb is especially plentiful. The school have sweet peas and dahlias on the go. We had a lot of interest from the local community, so ran out of raised bed plots! We approached the Killin Highland Games Committee and have to extend a huge thank you as they have now funded 4 additional raised beds with compost and topsoil and 2 large water butts for the garden. This contribution is much appreciated. We will have a couple of afternoons later in Spring to share ideas, plant together and continue to improve the site for all, maybe even a barbeque, so keep an eye on the SCDT facebook

Keeping strong and balanced at home

For many of us, sideways walking isn't something we do often. Yet if we want to get past people in a narrow space, or work our way along a wall painting, a sideways step is necessary. The

muscles down the sides of our legs and over our hips need regular work to keep tip top so.... in this issue we bring you 'sideways walking'.

Sideways walking

- Stand facing a long support (kitchen counter, wall, long windowsill?)
- Take some small side steps, one



direction then another

- Now try to do longer side steps and consciously put the ball of the foot down before the heel, transfer the weight over onto that foot and bring the other foot close to join it (ball then heel)
- Next time, face the direction you are moving rather than facing forward, or even the opposite direction. If you are feeling particularly brave, and with the support there, do this with your eyes closed Be careful though, this may make you feel a bit wobbly so have the support close to hand and make sure there are no trip hazards in the way!.

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

As usual the suggestions and ideas for the upcoming block activities were varied, wide ranging and imaginative. For our senior group we are focused on empowering young people to take charge and lead sessions. We have



some excellent young person led sessions coming up for example make-up and face painting with Kara and Noa, feel good and well-being with Isla and Japanese food tasting with Logan and Lieke. Young people will design and lead the sessions and will be as always supported by our wonderful Youth Work Volunteers.

Junior group has had a much more active and outdoors design in mind for their session block. Starting with good old dodgeball, an obstacle course session (possibly with Nerf Guns) and requests for sporting sessions. With the addition of a glitter make-up session there's something for everyone. Killin Youth Forum are working with



MacGregors to design and produce a community garden and have held lots of meetings and design sessions. The teamwork from the young people involved has been amazing to watch and they have enthusiastically participated in designing something wonderful for the community.



Through our partnership with CYP and an amazing team of local Youth Work Volunteers we have over the last 18 months brought youth work provision to the area. Our partnership with CYP was intended to support KAT to prepare for running the project independently in July 2023. We at KAT are delighted to announce that we have successfully secured funding from the National Lottery Young Start Fund to fund Killin Youth Project fully for 3 years.



This is wonderful news for the future and growth of the project allowing us to build on the youth work provision provided to date. The Young Start Fund will provide rental, equipment and activity costs for 3 years and enables us to employ a Sessional Youth Worker to support the project. As this block will be our last block working with our partners at CYP, we would like to thank them wholeheartedly for their guidance and support over the last 18 months. We also want to give our deepest thanks to the volunteers who have made it possible, without volunteers to run sessions the project would not have been possible.

Looking to the future Killin Youth Project will conduct the work it does with three outcomes at the core of the work we do:-

- 1. Children and young people, living rurally, have access to activities and opportunities to socialise, reducing isolation and loneliness.
- 2. The youth community are able to connect and engage with the wider community to have their voices heard, increasing feelings of support and connection.
- 3. Killin Youth Project will provide a safe and nurturing environment for young people to flourish, improving wellbeing.

Disappearing Ducklings and Pole Dancing Squirrels

After daily check-ins for several weeks to a nesting mallard along the road, it was evident that she had hatched her brood but they were nowhere to be seen. The next day she arrived in our garden with 12 little balls of fluff looking for



scraps beneath the bird feeders. Again, she disappeared but returned to the pond. This seems to be the daily routine but where they disappear to, we have no idea. This does mean that the dog's



activities are somewhat curtailed so it is good that Crazy squirrel is here more often. He (or she) tries to get in the windows, dance along the windowsill and get down the birdfeeder pole without skidding all the way down. Obviously would not



get a job as a pole dancer! We see him close enough to see the fleas

on him! Another squirrel is smart enough to ditch the coming in and out of the feeder and just sits in there for the duration although he does poke out his nose for breath of air now and again. It must get pretty sweaty in there.

A few swallows have arrived but, as yet, no martins. It's a dangerous time for ground nesting birds of all species. It has been proved that the safest place for curlews to nest is on grouse moors with their predator control. Even the R.S.P.B. are understanding the issue and are seeking to recruit 'appropriately qualified and experienced contractors' to control foxes and crows to protect the diminishing curlews in N Ireland. This will be done by trapping the crows, shooting the foxes and using dogs if foxes are injured. It is stipulated that this is all to be done out of sight of the public. Writing in The Telegraph, Lord Botham says 'This shows the need to move away from the Disney view of the countryside.'

It has been found that Britain has the third highest density of foxes in Europe. This is leading to a great negative impact on red listed birds. To find out what is sustaining them further studies need to be done and a charity has been set up to fund this. Details of 'the fox diet research appeal', can be found online.

We all know what Disney did for venison sales! The Bambi scenario is coming to the fore again as dealers are finding it hard to sell the huge amount of venison which is the result of the ongoing deer cull. Venison is a healthy food and what appeal does Bambi have that Babe the pig or Shaun the sheep doesn't have? This cull is mandatory and if landowners do not carry out the required cull then Nature Scotland come in to carry it out.

Of course, all these deer are to be shot to protect forests but it has been proved that the conifers planted are actually carbon positive. The wrong trees are being planted in the wrong places by the wrong methods releasing carbon as the peat is ploughed up. Some of us have known that for a long time but the so-called experts push their views. I'm sure that the remote tribe in Indonesia who are facing the extinction of their way of life due to nickel mining for electric car batteries feel much the same.

To something completely different - if you have around 10 million dollars going spare you could buy a 21,000 acre ranch in South Africa along with the 2,000 southern white rhinos which have been bred there as an answer to their loss due to poaching. The owner is now aged 81 and is retiring. I wish that I had the dollars, but then I expect that the food bills would be a bit steep. That at a time when many owners of slightly smaller pets such as dogs and cats are experiencing money worries about paying for food and vet bills.

One way of making your food go further is not to leave your rucksack unattended if walking on the Isle of Skye as it may get ripped open and the food stolen by ravens.

Equally unwelcome visitors were the beavers who dammed the wee lochan on Glen Ogle head. This resulted in the rising water level affecting local housing and cycle way. This re-introduced species is deemed to be advantageous to the environment. But it is hard to recognise what advantageous effect this incident had.

Mr. Fox is away to his cousins for the weekend as they have found a fabulous spa hotel. It's in a garden in Nottinghamshire where you can sleep in warm comfort underneath the hot tub and exercise in the moonlight with nine like-minded foxes on the trampoline. I wonder how long it will be before they use the hot tub.

Immunisation Message from Jamie

In March I celebrated my ninth year working at Killin Medical Practice. The first training I undertook was the administration of childhood immunisations. I have so many fond memories of meeting new parents, watching their children grow and having the opportunity to provide protection and, yes, make them cry. I often laugh at how covid and face mask wearing protected my identity from the under 5-year-old children, so they stopped running away from me in the Co-op.

I took over the development of the seasonal flu clinics, enjoying our time up in Crianlarich and Killin community halls enjoying the home baking of the skilled ladies on the Cancer Research Committee as they held their annual coffee mornings.

Covid had a significant impact on how we implemented the flu and the new covid vaccine and I take great pride in administering most of the vaccinations with the support of the Killin Paramedics. I even vaccinated in the wider hubs in Callander, Stirling and Killearn.

Now I am saddened to say vaccinations are no longer a service Killin Medical Practice will offer. A nationwide project to have much larger, experienced and dedicated immunisation teams is in place across every region in Scotland and now extending across rural Stirling.

The new team are currently focusing on under 5 years childhood vaccines and are visiting Killin as often as required. They are based in the Killin Nurses Station, not Killin Medical Practice, and are making appointments for children directly. Unfortunately Killin Medical Practice has no access to this appointment system so we cannot change or remind you when appointments are due.

Since January I have been endeavouring to vaccinate as many over 65s with the one-off pneumococcal vaccine as well as the 70s year olds with Shingles vaccine, however I could not reach everyone. If you are over 70 year's old and under 79 years you are entitled to the Shingles vaccine. This vaccine is

only given once (or as a course of 2 if you received the inactivated version). If you do not know if you have had this, we do still hold your vaccination record and the administration team can facilitate if you choose to enquire if you have had the pneumococcal and/or shingles vaccine.

From now on we must direct all immunisation queries including travel to NHS Forth Valley dedicated immunisation website available at: https://nhsforthvalley.com/health-services/az-of-services/immunisation

This new service provided by NHS Forth Valley will give a more dedicated service to immunisations and in time they will keep the community up to date with the forthcoming winter vaccination service.

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












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The Plants and Wildlife of Loch Tay Marshes



Loch Tay Marshes

Loch Tay Marshes in Killin lie between Pier Road and the end of Loch Tay. Habitats include woodland, freshwater loch, river and fen with a diverse range of plants, birds, mammals and insects. John Holland, speaker at our Callander SWT talk in February, has spent an unbelievable number of hours recording its plants and animals since 2005: I will apologise now for being unable to do him credit!

The River Tay and its tributaries are a Special Area of Conservation (SAC), designated as a Natura 2000 site for Atlantic salmon and otters, along with protected freshwater pearl mussels and sea, river and brook lamprey. Loch Tay is included as an important clear water loch and at its head is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) with one of the most open water transition fens in Stirlingshire.

On a virtual walk down Pier Road the first stop is the ruins of Finlarig Castle with its beheading pit, standing on top of a large wooded mound. Built in the 1620's by Sir Duncan Campbell, it is now surrounded by large old yew and holly trees which provide roosts for several species of bats. Native plants include cuckoo pint, bluebells, wood sorrel, opposite-leaved saxifrage and the rare Moschatel (aka 'Town Hall Clock), an Ancient Woodland indicator species. Toothwort is parasitic on the sycamores and the Birds' Nest Orchid, without chlorophyll, is a parasite on a fungus. Woodland birds include spotted flycatcher, nuthatch, redwing, brambling, blackcap, warblers and great-spotted woodpecker.

The Carr woodland is very wet and dominated by alder and willows. Special plants include coral root orchid, water avens, wood club-rush and woody nightshade. Pendulate oaks at the edge of the loch are home to beefsteak and 'chicken of the woods' fungi.

This gives way to marshy grassland with snipe, meadow pipit and water rail plus occasional hunting shorteared owls, hen harriers, peregrine, merlin and barn owl. However, summer grazing with sheep has reduced tall herbs such as meadowsweet, valerian, angelica and melancholy thistle, now virtually restricted to the island.

Beavers have been there since 2014 and quiet observers are virtually certain to see them in the evening from late April to June. John has seen them 685 times, once a group

of 12 - don't expect to match that! On the island is their obvious, large, untidy lodge. They do not like alder but take a lot of willow which is good for the fen. Their favourite species is aspen, including those wrapped with chicken wire near the Killin Hotel! Otters like to fish around the lodge but a female taking in bedding was probably overstepping the mark! Beavers don't like otters and frequently chase them away but otters generally ignore them and continue to play close by. On the sandy, grassy ridge are silverweed, sneezewort, yarrow, ladies' bedstraw and harebell, dependent on sheep grazing and trampling by people. Within the SSSI are bladderwort, bottle sedge, lesser water plantain, cinquefoil, water avens and lesser water plantain which forms a pink carpet over the mud.

Ospreys regularly feed on the loch and if a lot of mud is exposed, may also get a variety of spring waders. In the wetlands are snipe, whimbrel, sanderling, knot, turnstone, rednecked phalarope, common sandpiper and an occasional Temminck's stint. Gulls nest on the sandbank: common, lesser blackbacked and black-headed, along with common, arctic and sandwich terns. A large number of curlew roost in March and 100's of sand martins, swallows and house martins go through in spring. Water birds seen include goldeneye, red-breasted merganser, goosander, long-tailed ducks, pintail, scoter, pochard, dabchicks, black-throated divers, cormorants and occasionally greatcrested and Slavonian grebes. Geese include barnacle, black-fronted bean, bar-headed and pink footed. Along the river Lochay there are kingfishers and wagtail while dippers nest under the old railway bridge.

'Natural' factors threatening this area include climate change, invasive NZ pygmy weed, spawning non-native roach and flooding. It is an easily accessible area and recreational disturbance can threaten habitat and its wildlife. A change from sheep to controlled cattle grazing would benefit plants but would not be a good mix with dogs. Dogs running through the fen or along the 'beach' disturb ground-nesting birds and may trample chicks. Speed boats and jet skiers on the loch disturb wildlife and waves erode the shoreline and wash up into the fen. More education of users to appreciate the wildlife is obviously needed to protect this special area.

Spring at BEN LAWERS NNR





The first of the mountain flowers are out: purple saxifrage, a low-growing and colourful plant most often seen around the rocks and crags higher up the hill. It's the most northerly flowering plant in the world where it also grows through the arctic.

Our wildlife is likewise waking up for spring. Common lizards are emerging when the sun comes out, as well as a host of colourful invertebrates like the oil beetle pictured. Young oil beetles wait on flowers for mining bees to pollinate them – then leap onto the bee's back, hitch a ride to its nest, and live there until adulthood, stealing food from the bee larvae.

We're also seeing the first migrants arrive. Wheatears have flown all the way from Africa – they're a pale, starling-sized bird with a distinctive white rump. Some of them will stop here to breed, feeding on the summer profusion of invertebrates on the hill. Others are just using us as a stopping point before flying on to the Canadian tundra – a colossal journey.

All of this wildlife will soon have even more space to grow. We've had an airlift of fencing materials to expand our native woodland, scrub and tall herb restoration areas, connecting up the woodland along the main Ben Lawers path with the restored areas of Meall nan Tarmachan. As part of this, we'll be trialling the use of a small herd of cattle to partly break up the grasses to hopefully promote tree regeneration.

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

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Welcoming a New Advertiser, WT Architecture

The support from local businesses to advertise in the Killin News enables our publication to thrive, and most importantly to remain free for locals. We welcome new supporter, WT Architecture, which is known to residents in the surrounds and share this insight to their rural work.

WT Architecture on their new Argyll studio

After twenty years of working throughout the highlands and islands of Scotland, South Queensferry-based architects WT Architecture decided it was time to be closer to their projects and set up a base in Mid Argyll. Principal Architect Wil Tunnell is no stranger to rural life having lived on the Isle of Coll in the past. 'Much of our work is in remote rural locations,' he says, 'so it has been fantastic to be able to be closer to so many of our clients and more of our building projects'. The practice has specialisms both in adapting old buildings for new uses and designing beautiful contemporary houses in sensitive landscapes. Their work has scooped many national awards and featured on Grand Designs House of the Year. This work for private clients sits along side many years of working with small communities to help them realise

their dreams for their community projects.

WT Architecture's Lottery funded village hall on Iona was completed in 2022 and has scooped awards including the Edinburgh Medal for Architecture. The new building was the result of years working closely with the Community Trust in

developing a sustainable brief for the building and ensuring that it fulfilled the real needs of the islanders. As a cold and windy place, where all the pubs and hotels are closed in winter, Iona's hall allows people to come together in a warm place, and provides a range of spaces for different activities from big concerts to a small book-binding group. The designs were developed in rounds of workshops with the people on the island, and had to be sensitive to the historic context and stunning coastal location.

This approach of designing with communities is one the WT team have used to great effect for the similarly ambitious community hub, An Crubh, on Skye. This building has a vibrant community-run cafe, and a well-stocked shop and post office, as well as a big new hall space for the people of the Sleat peninsula. In an area of widely spread houses this new building provides something of a village centre and focus, as well as catering for passers-by and hungry tourists. This means that money from tourism goes straight back in to the community's coffers, and can be used to sustain the whole operation.

The practice really enjoys taking on every new challenge says Architect Tamsin Cunningham, who heads up the Argyll studio in Kilmartin. Her team are currently working with communities on Eigg and Luing, and on buildings in Oban, Balquhidder and Mull. 'Whether we are working on an old house for a private client or a bigger public project each provides something new. We really enjoy working with different communities as well, and it's great to really get to know a place through the people who know it best - those who live there.'



Leave the Walls Alone

It seems to have become an ok thing to tear apart old walls and plunder their stone to erect pointless cairns, unnecessary benches and fake prehistoric monuments. It's not. Please stop it.

These walls may not look like much – time and the elements have taken their toll – but that's the thing about archaeological remains: they are the remnants of a lived past somehow, despite the odds, surviving into the present.

The walls are part of Killin's cultural heritage, weaving through the tapestry of our historic landscape, of farm and town, head dyke and sheep fold, sheiling and trackway, field and forest, mountain and glen. They divided the land, setting boundaries, organising farmwork, evolving as needs changed. They are the product of gruelling, backbreaking labour, young and old wresting the stones from the earth, carrying them, dragging them, piling them, laying them out in lines across the steeps and flats. And all for a vital purpose, because livelihoods depended on them.

It's perverse to destroy real archaeology to build fake archaeology. Please put the stones back where you got them. In time, maybe, only archaeologists will be able to see damage you did.

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
