#### The Big Hoof Ride Across Scotland Visit Killin



The Big Hoof promotes adventure and wellbeing through long distance horse rides and on 3rd July started their 205 mile journey from St Andrews to the island of Iona on the St Columba's Way in 13 days.

The group are fundraising for the Venture Trust, a Scottish charity that focuses on individuals facing homelessness, addiction, trauma, isolation and prison.

At time of publication they have so far raised £5,600



The Big Hoof gang walked, rode, cycled and swam their way across Scotland with a total of six horses, 2 dogs and over 40 people taking part along the way to the finish.

Over the main journey, two Arabian horses Sasha and Istia were ridden, accompanied by Kirsty a welsh pony and Moy a Highland packhorse from Ardverikie Estate.

Arriving in Oban, the horses and ponies had a well-earned rest, stayed at a farm outside Oban while the humans crossed to Iona on bikes to complete their journey.

#### Killin Mountain Rescue Team

We are now over halfway through the year with just over 25 callouts so far. The months of July and August give the team a brief respite with only informal training taking place and rescues tending to be thinner on the ground with the better weather.

#### **Callout Summary**

An example of some of the callouts we have attended are below.


26<sup>th</sup> March – Two walkers were misplaced on Meall Glas above Glen Dochart in benign conditions.

Several team members used local tracks and 4x4's to guide them off the hill

11<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> April - A missing persons search was initiated for a solo male walker suspected to be on the hills surrounding Tyndrum. Multiple Mountain Rescue teams as well as dogs and drones were involved in the search over several days. Sadly the casualty was found deceased on the third day.

27<sup>th</sup> April – Female Crag fast (stuck on difficult ground) on Ben Oss. She was cold after waiting several hours for assistance but did the correct thing by not moving from her location. She was safely helped off the hill.

6<sup>th</sup> May – Two males were lost on Stuc a' Chroin in the late

evening/night. Team members walked to their last known location where they found the casualties, who were then able to walk off the hill safely.

19th May - Male walker feeling unwell on Beinn Chabhair. With no direct communication with the casualty possible, and therefore unable to ascertain the severity of the symptoms, a Coastquard Rescue helicopter was requested. Rescue 151 from Inverness was tasked and located the casualty quickly, with a subsequent airlift to hospital. Team members who were deploying on the hill track were then stood down. The team have also responded to several callouts to assist the Scottish Ambulance Service on difficult to access tracks and areas. We have been busy with several callouts to Ben A'an for lower leg



injuries. In all cases, team members have had to stretcher the casualties down for at least an hour before transferring over to the ambulance service.

#### Other News

In addition to attending callouts, team members have been attending regular training with our first aid specific nights being well attended. We currently have 4 new trainee members who are progressing well through their training. As with all charities, there is a lot of behind the scenes work that is always on-going and praise should be given to all those who help keep the team operating and helping those in distress. It is a time-consuming, voluntary job. We send our thanks to Will Diamond for the tireless hard work he has done over the last year as Secretary.

#### American Takeover?

Facebook users will be well aware of the threat to the Kenmore end of Loch Tay by the takeover of Taymouth Castle grounds, properties round Kenmore and also large areas of Glen Lyon by American companies proposing to build houses and provide facilities and amenities solely for the American buyers.

This means the potential exclusion from or limited access to areas which have been used by locals for generations. We know already that locals will not be allowed to use the golf club and that helicopters and speed boats may well become more common all along Loch Tay, affecting access and fishing and increasing noise pollution to the disadvantage of both wildlife and Lochside residents.

Exactly who now owns what is hidden in a maze of company names but it is important that local people and organisations have a lot more information and find out exactly what is planned before it is too late.

A new group on Facebook - 'Protect Loch Tay' - has been set up to try and find out exactly what is proposed. If you are as concerned as the hundreds of people who have already signed up, please join them.

The present committee are busy arranging a Centenary Birthday Party to mark this wonderful milestone.



#### CRUACHAN – End of an Era

Cruachan Caravan and Campsite has been a very special place for so many people since its doors were opened in the 1950s by Jim and Jess Campbell. Year after year, families



have been spending their treasured holiday time here, enjoying the quiet, relaxed atmosphere, meeting up with regular visitors and making new friends. It was also a working farm and the visiting children enjoyed interacting with the animals, feeding lambs, chickens, ducks (and more recently the donkeys) and playing with the family dogs; Rab, who had ground down his front teeth carrying stones, Gypsy, Tula to name a few. Many, now adults, will

remember as children helping Jim with the 'buckets', sitting on his knee and 'driving' (or so we thought!) 'Fergie' the Tractor around the site, or helping make haystacks in the back

fields, getting pulled from one side to the other through the middle to allow ventilation and boy, we were proud as punch and felt 'very important'! There was always Jess's warm, friendly hospitality (regularly putting the kids' wet clothes on the pulley to dry when they'd been playing in the duck pond). It really has been a haven for generations of families and it was the little things from the whole Campbell family that made your stay so special.

In the 1980s, their eldest son and daughter, Hamish and Maureen returned to help their parents; Hamish ran the farm side of the business, dealt with general maintenance and was regularly seen on his ride-on mower keeping the grass pristine; Maureen ran the campsite side of the business and started a restaurant at the site entrance. Many a good night was had at the restaurant and Mo's steak pie was legendary in the area. It was good home cooking and was appreciated by visitors and locals

alike. There was always an "End of Season Do" in November with a bonfire and a stunning display of fireworks, followed by Kippers and Oatcakes provided by Nancy 'fae Buckie' the following morning and all proceeds going to various charities, both local and further afield – and by God there was many a 'sair heid' the next day!

So much can be remembered and



written about the Campbell family and Cruachan that it would fill a whole edition of the Killin News (and much more)! Treasured memories, happy times and an absolute privilege to have known the Campbell Family – thank you from all who have loved this treasured place.

Aikido arrived in Killin, at the McLaren Hall, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> April this year, with the help of the local community, Stirling Council and Active Stirling, all of whom we would like to thank.

Aikido is a dynamic form of selfdefence, whereby the attacker's energy is diverted using techniques involving circular motion.

Aikido promotes flexibility of the body, increases self-confidence and manages conflict peacefully.

#### **Breadalbane Heritage Society**

The Breadalbane Heritage Society's summer programme of excursions to various places of interest in the area continued last month with an all-day visit to Mar Lodge Estate near Braemar on Royal Deeside. Some members continued up to Clais Ffearnig looking at the montane scrub vegetation and 'alpine' plants typical of higher altitudes.

Membership of the BHS numbers is nearing 120 and has now more than recovered to its pre-Lockdown levels. The BHS's website https://breadalbane-heritage.org.uk features a video of local scenes of interest, and provides up-to-date information about talks and activities, events and publications. Ongoing Society projects include the maintenance of the Killiehassie private burial ground in Strathtay, and the recent publication, in association with the Aberfeldy Museum Group, of an illustrated leaflet, The Aberfeldy and Weem Heritage Trail, with a trail map and information on the many places of interest in the area. QR codes with information at each of these sites are currently being installed. The BHS also provides a free service of assistance with family history research. Recordings of all the recent talks are available on the website.

**Woodlands**: After the heat of June and now some rain, our woodland vegetation has really sprung into life. Llinos, with some help from our rangers, has been working hard to keep paths clear for the summer. She has put up some bat boxes in the woods and plans to hold a walk later in the summer with Lomond Bat Group.

over to pick things up. A hamstring stretch can be done at the kitchen table in the morning or maybe as a starter before dinner? The key is to be warm (the muscle anyway!), to move into the position slowly and then hold it (not your breath! And no bouncing!) for up to 20 seconds. You only need to do this a couple of times each day and you will feel you can move into the stretch further and further as the weeks progress. You never know, you might end up reaching past those toes?

#### **Back of thigh stretch**

- Make sure you are right at the front of the chair
- Straighten one leg placing the heel on the floor.
- Place both hands on the other leg then sit really tall.
- Lean forwards with a straight back (and looking straight ahead) until you feel the stretch in the back of your thigh.
- Hold for up to 20 seconds.
- Relax and repeat on the other leg.

#### **Killin Community Council**

#### Membership

Following the April elections for regional community councils, and our own Annual General Meeting held in May, the new Killin Community Council has six duly elected members. They are: Andy Aitken (Chair), Charlie Grant (Vicechair and Planning), Frances Inglis (Secretary), Pamela Grant (Treasurer), Stuart Inglis and Susan McRobbie.

At the public meeting held in early July, Jillian Lawrence was welcomed aboard as a co-opted member of the Community Council. It was agreed at this meeting that a further co-optee would be recruited, and that an advert to this end would be published locally. Further information and an application form can be obtained by emailing the Community Council (see email address below). The closing date for applications is 18th August.

#### **Defibrillator**

At the following public meeting of the reconstituted Community Council the issue of the village defibrillator was raised. The current one has reached the end of its operating life, and a new one has been ordered. Finance has been raised partly through two modest donations, one from the Killin Masonic Lodge and one from us. However, the bulk of the finance has come from the Killin Highland Games and we wish to extend our thanks to the KHG Committee for this generous contribution. The Community Council has also agreed to take over the care and maintenance of the defibrillator and raise funds for its ongoing costs and eventual replacement. Pamela Farquharson and Susan McRobbie have agreed to take on this responsibility and we thank them very much. We have since heard that SSE has gifted £500 to this fund – a very welcome contribution which is greatly appreciated.

#### **Kenmore Developments**

Four members of the Community Council attended a drop-in presentation held in Kenmore to find out more about the proposed development of Taymouth Castle and surrounding areas. The focus of the presentation was on 'back of house' proposals – staff accommodation, laundry, etc. – so was only of limited value, but we were able to ask questions, and it appears that a great deal of money is being invested in the area to create a very expensive and exclusive holiday resort. Taymouth Castle is being extensively renovated and hundreds of luxury homes are planned. There is understandable concern about the effect this will have on the local area, particularly Loch Tay and its environs, but there are also opportunities - for local businesses, organisations and individuals. The Community Council, therefore, has taken the decision to interact proactively with all interested parties in the greater interests of the larger community until such time as a better understanding of the situation develops.

#### **Nursery Provision**

Another major development of note is the withdrawal of 0-2 years nursery provision in Killin. This is part of a package of cuts to Council provision in a number of areas. There appears to have been little advance warning or consultation with those affected, and it will have an impact not only on those with preschool children but on the community as a whole. The removal or reduction in pre-school educational provision is a disincentive for young families to move to the area, or for those already here to remain. It is entirely possible that this development will adversely affect the primary school roll, and the staffing levels of both the school and nursery. For all these reasons and more, the Community Council has pledged to support all efforts to restore this provision.

#### **Sewage Works**

There have been a number of complaints about the smell from the sewage treatment works in the 'helicopter field' just east of Lyon Road, and of continuing drainage problems in the area of the new Coop. These have been taken up by our new Secretary, Frances Inglis. As a result, Scottish Water have agreed to create a hydraulic model of the village's drainage network to identify possible choke points and solutions. She was also advised that members of the public should complain directly to Scottish Water about sewage issues as this is more effective than single complaints from the Community Council. The number to call is: 0800 077 8778.

#### **Traffic Issues**

In July 2022, the Community Council debated the issue of village speed limits. The meeting was well attended as we had asked for local feedback on a Stirling Council proposal to reduce the speed limit to 20mph. There was a lively and instructive discussion of several options, at the end of which the decision was taken, unanimously and with the full support of those members of the public attending, that the speed limit should remain at 30mph and be extended to the Golf Course entrance. At our recent meeting, this decision was called into question. It was agreed to revisit this issue at our next public meeting, where the 20mph proposal would be reconsidered, and this will be posted as an official agenda item closer to the time. Comments on this and other matters are always welcome and can be sent to communitycouncilkillin@gmail.com As always, members of the public are also welcome to attend in person.

#### Do You Have Solar Panels On Your House?


If the answer is yes, the next question is - are you making the most of them now summer is here? The more solar power we can use in real time the cheaper it is when we sell electricity to the grid we get just a few pence per kWh, but we buy it back for considerably more (as much as five times more). Here are a few examples of how you can use your own generated electricity:

- Put the washing machine, kettle etc on when the sun is out
- If you need to replace your kettle buy a 'low energy' one, which is slower but doesn't spike above what you're generating
- Often bigger appliances have an eco setting, which takes longer but has a lower
- Use only one appliance at a time when the sun is out if you use more your demand may be more than the solar is providing, so you will be buying the remainder from the grid
- Make the most of opening blinds and curtains on the sunny side of the house, in order to take advantage of the free 'solar gain' heat
- If you have a hot water cylinder you can fit a 'solar divert' which is programmed to read when there is excess solar, and uses the immersion element in the tank to heat your water - this is more affordable than batteries
- Check your export tariff some companies offer better rates

#### **Family Time**

The school holidays began a couple of weeks ago and everyone is having more family time. Not only the humans but the wildlife around is also very busy with their new families.

Fledgling birds are lined up on fences and branches to be fed. Fluffy sparrows, blue tits still with untidy jackets and random hairstyles, robins still with speckly chests and slightly ungainly brown blackbirds. It's a hard job for the parents keeping them satisfied, and all these long days after the earlier tasks of courtship and nest building. A tiny wren had been busy for days pulling pieces of moss from the stones for his beautifully made nest. It appears that it is the male's responsibility to make several "des reses" so that the female can select the best. So, remember, a wildlife garden needs plenty of spare moss. We have house martins back after a couple of no-show years. The first hatching was precariously balanced for two days when part of the nest broke away before they flew. The nest was repaired, and a second brood are well on the way. We have tried the artificial pre-formed nests, but the birds have, so far, refused to use them. Maybe the building work is a necessary part of the behaviour.

There do not appear to be as many sand martins this year, certainly not at the Kenmore Courtyard. It is surprising how many nests we find in the garden as they are so well hidden. Even the birds using nest boxes can be so secretive. Blackbirds are usually the easiest to find as they don't seem to be so obsessed with hiding them and build them out of all sorts of random and more noticeable materials. Years ago, a pair built close toa printer's office and used entirely paper scraps. Good recycling! All feathered parents are not as attentive. We had a female mallard and 12 ducklings come to be fed several times a day. We had seen her on her roadside nest previously and now watched as day by day the numbers gradually reduced to 2. Several pheasant families have visited from the fields but the chicks

seem to wander off and either

perish or spend their time home alone.

We recently spent time in Caithness in a cottage with a huge, wooded garden but there were so few birds. One delight was hearing the skylarks which seem absent from here. It is lovely though to hear the oyster catchers and curlews - long may they thrive.

New furry friends have arrived too, a small squadron of squirrels (sure that's not correct, what is a group of squirrels?). The young ones come alone or in, what appears to be, sibling pairs without parents. How do they find our food stash quite a way from the woods? It could be a scent trail that they follow, or do they have a secret squirrel language?

Amongst the few rabbits is one with a white patch on its shoulders. Amongst her four kits is one with a white face blaze.

During our increasingly long cold drink breaks, our most surprising sighting was a tiny black and cream creature bobbing in and out of a crevice amongst large stones. It was a water shrew. We have either seen Walter several times or we have several Walters. Never near water! There must be two as we have seen a really tiny young one. Wee Willie must have been home alone too as we watched him for about half an hour with no sign of a parent.

They must have left Wee Willie for an outdoor adventure as he climbed up three feet of ivy. 22 wildcats are to be released from Kincraig wildlife park into the Cairngorms NP with GPS attached. Let's hope that the area is free of feral domestic cats as interbreeding is the main danger. As from this October, there will no longer be a closed season for shooting male deer in yet another attempt by NatureScot to reduce deer numbers. The food industry is encouraging the use of copper rather than lead bullets to avoid lead contamination of the venison. Have you noticed the warning on some fish for children and pregnant women not to eat too much because fish, some species more than others, contain mercury as a side effect of their metabolism. If you are planning your family time

the rain but for protection from mugging seagulls which have become a real danger in some areas. One was seen stealing a bag of rolls from an Iceland store. Maybe it was just suffering from the cost of living.

An additive derived from bananas is being trialled in sheep feed to reduce methane emissions. Would it work with humans? Is that why players are continually nibbling them at Wimbledon?

Mr. Fox is taking the family away for a gourmet break as he has heard that a woman in East Kilbride has been feeding three generations of a fox family for 25 years on sausage rolls, pizza and Chinese takeaway. Good reduction of food waste but there is no comment on how the garden smells.

#### **Nursery Cuts – Campaign**

#### **Campaigners seek to reverse** shock childcare cut

In a shocking turn of events Killin is losing the only childcare facility for 0 to 2 year olds within a 45 min drive of the village. Without warning, Stirling Council has decided to cut the service from Killin Nursery without consulting parents who only found out when they tried to register

their young children for nursery care. Local Mum and Dad Georgie and David Pelly have had to take the difficult decision to move away as they are expecting their second child and were relying on the nursery to provide care so Georgie could return to work.

They could be

the first of many working families forced to move away from Killin.

"This decision is short-sighted as it has a disproportionate impact on rural areas", said Andy Aitken, Chair of the Community Council in Killin. "We saw a much-needed increase in the number of families with young children moving here in recent years, but these same families are now being forced out, and those considering having children are having to rethink. This will have longterm consequences on rural communities across the area who rely on Killin Nursery."

Local parents, grandparents and other worried residents have set up a campaign to reverse the cut to this

vital service. They have warned the council that the flow of new families will dry up; working families will move out; and there will be fewer young people in the community.

Parents also fear that losing the childcare service will have a negative impact on local schools and businesses, pushing the community towards rural poverty and

for local parents to become childminders. However, local campaigner Clare Rudd says that is not a viable option. "Childminders are legally only allowed 3 kids under school age, and 1 under 1. Places would therefore be extremely limited." It is also shortsighted of the council to cut nursery care without ensuring that there were alternatives already in place.



deprivation. The campaigners have launched a petition, documented testimonials and emailed local councillors, MSPs and MPs.

Killin Nursery is one of several across Stirlingshire to face budget cuts, but this is the only area that has no other childcare solutions available. It will be particularly damaging to families in the outlying communities of Lochearnhead, Strathyre, Crianlarich, Tyndrum, and Balquidder. Stirling Council leader, Chris O'Kane justified the decision, in an email to parents, saying "This year the scale of the financial challenge facing Stirling Council is of a magnitude which has never been experienced before", and the council's solution is

Several parents and guardians have suggested that, had they been consulted, they may have been able to agree to pay a higher fee than the current £4.50 per/hour to save the well-used service. Local campaigners are also wondering why the service is being cut completely in Killin, but only partially in other Stirlingshire nurseries. On 20th July local

parents and campaigners presented their petition to the council and released statements and pictures to the media in their efforts to get Stirling council to reconsider.

Construction works on SSEN Transmission's Killin VISTA project has now completed and has seen a total of 7.8km. of overhead line removed, including 32 steel lattice towers, between Killin substation and Lix Toll.

As we enter the final phases of reinstatement work on the project, we'd like to thank the local community, Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park, Stirling Council, and all other key stakeholders for their continued patience and support while we've delivered this project.

#### Progress on site

Q2 saw the dismantling and removal of the remaining overhead line tower infrastructure across the site. In May, the final tower was felled and removed within Acham Forest, adjacent to the Biomass facility. All temporary access tracks and bellmouths removed with final land reinstatement works completed across the Sindall Infrastructure have completed full demobilisation of their site offices.

#### Final tower felling

A small group from SSEN Transmission and representatives from the Loch Lomond and The Trossachs National Park gathered near Killin to watch the final of the 32 transmission towers felled.

The final tower felling on the Killin VISTA project is a fantastic milestone as the team heads towards completion, and it was great to welcome representatives from Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park, our contractor Morgan Sindall Infrastructure and designers BakerHicks to see the final tower structure come down.

Fochabers, Maureen asked if she'd be interested in helping her at the site in a 'meet and greet' role. Nancy had a ready smile and friendly manner and this was her dream job - answering the 'phone, selling ice creams etc

from the site shop, welcoming folk to Cruachan and helping to make sure they had a lovely stay - and the kettle was always on! 'Everyone knew Nancy, she was up with the lark, always cheery and added so much to our summer holidays. We'll miss our evenings sharing a Baileys with her Bradford pals'. Of course, the lockdowns kept Nancy away from Cruachan in 2020 so, knowing that Morayshire was about to be locked-down in May 2021 due to an increase in Covid cases in Elgin, Nancy (and her wee dog, Jackson) 'escaped' and motored down the A9. As soon as she arrived, everyone knew something was very wrong and, in August 2021, Nancy was diagnosed with terminal lung cancer (she had never smoked). She died peacefully at home in Buckie on 1 April 2023. She treasured her friendship with Maureen, Hamish and the Campbell family, made many dear friends over the years at Cruachan and had a lot of laughs and happy times at this very special, cherished place.

The new fence on the slopes of Ben Lawers lets us control grazing to add three hundred and fifty hectares to the size of our habitats under restoration. The expanded area runs from the edge of the thriving wildflower-rich open woodland on Meall nan Tarmachan, over Sron a Murchaidh, to the slopes of Beinn Ghlas, and surrounds the existing woods along the Ben Lawers path. This project is supported by the Scottish Government's Nature Restoration Fund, managed by NatureScot.

As summer sets the slopes alive with colour, our existing restoration areas show us what the new area may look like in a few years and decades' time. Our montane scrub is pink, yellow, blue, white and green with plants like wood cranesbill, roseroot, orchids, globeflower and dwarf trees. And it is full of sound too: birdsong, burbling brooks, grating calls of ring ouzels, buzzing insects, wind over leaves, ravens' cronks and much more. All of this would once have been common across Scottish mountainsides. Thanks to conservation work pioneered here, the habitat is expanding again at sites across Scotland.

Photos show this habitat at 800m altitude and some of the wealth of creatures who call it home: a specialised high-altitude butterfly, the mountain ringlet; and a ring ouzel's nest, with the second clutch of eggs this busy bird has reared since flying over from North Africa or southern Spain in April. The blue flower is alpine forget-me-not, one of many raritles growing 1100 metres above sea level.

Some of this work will take many years to bear fruit, but we also aim to make a few visible improvements to the landscape this year. An airlift of stone to the summits lets us reduce erosion from hillwalking routes. Visitors can also reduce erosion by walking on the main paths, not along lines of erosion beside paths. Meanwhile, we can now remove fences near the car park and lower part of the Ben Lawers path, opening out the woodlands and improving the views from the road. We may be looking for volunteers to help with this task in the autumn.
