Some of the highlights for our year can be supporting local events such as the Killin 10K with marshalling, or providing First Aid cover at the Killin Agricultural Show. It gives us a great opportunity to meet and greet people as well as showcase what the team is all about.

We have also been busy giving talks and presentations to Scout groups staying at Lochearnhead Scout station aiding them in completing some of their Activity Badges. It was also a delight to participate in the Emergency Services Day that was organised for the Primary 7s at Killin Primary School at the start of the school term. We do apologise however for being called away to a shout but it clearly showed us in action!

The trend of Ben More and Ben A'an being our incident hotspots has continued during the Summer. These are justifiably popular hills but this doesn't always explain the high incidence rates. As a member of



Scottish Mountain Rescue (SMR) we record all of our rescues with this data then being analysed by Statistics Officers at SMR. This is then published annually and fed back to other organisations such as the



Mountain Safety Action Group. As the saying goes, prevention is better than a cure.

Last month saw the regular programme of autumn and winter talks taking over from the summer programme of excursions, with topics ranging from the work of the Tayside Raptor Study Group and the history of the Black Watch to plans for the exciting new Scottish Crannog Centre, at present under construction on Loch Tay.

The talk this month will be held on Friday 20th October at 7.30pm in the Breadalbane Community Campus in Aberfeldy, when local businessman Donald Riddell, who has spent more than fifty years living and working in and around Glen Lyon, will give a talk on the mysteries, folklore and archaeology of the glen. Doors are open at 7.00 pm onwards for those who would like to meet beforehand and look at the various displays. Refreshments are available.

During January and February talks are held on Zoom, otherwise at the Breadalbane Community Campus. The BHS's website features a video of local scenes of interest, and provides up-to-date information about talks and activities, events and publications. Ongoing Society projects include the maintenance of the Killiehassie private burial ground in Strathtay, and the recent publication, in association with the Aberfeldy Museum Group, of an illustrated leaflet, The Aberfeldy and Weem Heritage Trail, with a trail map and information on the many places of interest in the area. QR codes with information at each of these sites are currently being installed. The BHS also provides a free service of assistance with family history research. Recordings of all the recent talks are available on the website.

Keeping strong and balanced at home

The focus on home exercise this month is strength. This exercise will strengthen the muscles around the knee, helping with arthritis and keeping the joint well protected. You can do this one while you are watching TV or while having breakfast. Ideally do a brief one minute march on the spot to warm up the muscles first. Try not to hold your breath while you lift the leg.

Front knee strengthener

• Sit back in the chair with your back supported and your feet under your



knees. • Lift the ankle slowly and straighten (but do not lock out) your knee.

Raise the whole leg another inch or so so you really feel the weight of the leg and hold for a slow count of 3.
Lower the foot slowly while bending the knee again.

• Repeat up to 10 times on one leg then change legs. If you have ankle weights, start with 5 times each leg and progress to more over time. Have a go and let us know how you get on – give us some feedback at dawn@strathfillancdt.org.uk or on the SCDT Facebook page.

Killin Community Council

It has been a fairly eventful few months. In the early summer, Stirling Council announced the withdrawal of 0-2 years nursery provision.

Around the same time, the renovation of Taymouth Castle and associated developments hit the news, both local and national.

Nursery Provision

In response to the former, at our meeting on 5th September, after Antonia Dowling was elected as a coopted member of the Killin Community Council, it was agreed that she would lodge a Participation Request to attend relevant meetings at Stirling Council relating to early years nursery provision.

Taymouth Castle & Kenmore Developments

In response to the latter, representatives from the Community Council have now attended several meetings in Kenmore to discuss the implications of ongoing developments in the area. There are now six local Community Councils actively engaging with the developer, Discovery Land Company, to monitor developments and assess the possible environmental, economic and social impacts these developments might have. These are: Killin CC, Kenmore CC, Glen Lyon and Loch Tay CC, Dull and Weem CC, Aberfeldy CC and Mid Athol CC. These CCs will meet on a quarterly basis to discuss mutual concerns. They will also meet separately, and again on a quarterly basis, with DLC to address issues arising from the developments around Taymouth Castle and associated projects. Simultaneously, the Loch Tay Association has been resurrected after a period of several years dormancy. The LTA will also monitor and advise on environmental impacts and draw up a Code of Conduct for Loch Tay users. The Killin Community Council has joined as a corporate member, as has the Killin and Breadalbane Angling Club, along with several other local businesses and individuals.

The LTA is seeking input from all concerned groups, such as paddle boarders, kayakers, wild swimmers, anglers and riparian rights owners, etc. DLC has also joined and has stated its intention to sign up to the resulting Code.

The various developments at the other end of Loch Tay are likely to go on for years to come.

As well as the Taymouth Castle development, DLC has also secured the Glen Lyon Estate for recreational and associated use, and the Scottish Crannog Centre is being redeveloped at Dalerb with a museum and Iron Age village.

This is a much bigger and more ambitious venture than its ill-fated predecessor on the opposite shore and will be a major tourist attraction. All these developments, and the scale and expense of them, will have very significant economic and social ramifications within the wider region. They will bring increased employment and with it, greater demand for housing, educational provision, medical and other services.

We will not be unaffected here in Killin. There will be challenges and opportunities. The Community Council will actively engage with other organisations and agencies to promote the interests of our local community and protect the social and natural environment of Loch Tay.

Roads & Transport

Closer to home, members of the Community Council had a walk through the village with an officer



from Stirling Council's Roads Department. They identified a range of issues. These included overgrown hedges and bushes encroaching on the pavements, faded signs and road markings, and the need for further roadmarkings including yellow lines. Following a discussion at the recent CC meeting, the recommendation remains that the village speed limit should be set at 30mph, but extended to the golf course entrance. There is a threat to the C60 bus service to Callander, as Kingshouse travel are having difficulty recruiting drivers. Stirling Council are looking into re-tendering this service. Following many requests over the years, the South Loch Tay road has been prioritised for snow clearing and gritting, but only during daylight hours. This though should come as a relief to our residents between here and Ardeonaig, who suffered the threat of being cut off every time we had heavy snow.

Peatland Restoration

And finally, The National Trust have announced a 'Peatland Restoration' project on the high shoulder below the Tarmachan Ridge. I think this is an excellent idea. With the price of heating oil and electricity at an all time high, we should indeed consider heating our homes with fresh cut peat. Anyone for a peat-smoke BBQ?

LET'S DO NET ZERO

Beavers at Ben Lawers NNR

In late July a member of our ranger team came across several cut down trees and branches in one of our enclosures, and with closer examination saw the tell-tale markings of Beaver. This is the first time Beavers have been recorded on the reserve and was a wonderful surprise for the team!

Further investigation has shown that the beavers have now built a dam on the burn. This impressive structure has slowed the water in the stream considerably and has created an interesting new wetland area above it. Beavers are considered a keystone species due to their ability to shape freshwater habitats which benefits many other animal and plant species. They do this through the building of dams, the digging of canals, and the creation of dead wood.





Many readers will be well aware of the beavers found around Loch Tay and the rivers Dochart and Lochay. It seems as though some particularly adventurous beavers have managed to make it up into the Ben Lawers NNR which may be the highest altitude beaver colony in the UK at 460m.

The colonization by beavers would not have been possible without the pioneering work at NTS Ben Lawers team in the creation of montane woodland. The beavers are feeding on trees that were planted on Ben Lawers NNR within one of our enclosures and without this there would have been no food source for the beavers. The Beavers are feeding on a range of different species including Birch, Aspen and Willow.

Its still early days for this population and the number of Beavers in this population is still to be determined. We will continue to monitor the population and record any changes to the surrounding habitat.

Tombreck Market Garden

What a bizarre Summer it was! Hot dry June, miserably wet July, cool August and the unexpected warm spell in September. Preferable to the 40 degree temperatures and natural disasters in southern Europe, but still a challenge for growing. The veg didn't know whether they were coming or going - time to go to seed for the Autumn, or back to leaf growth for a second Summer? At Tombreck, despite our best efforts, this resulted in a lot of split carrots, bolted spinach, unripe squash and stubbornly green tomatoes.



However the good thing about a market garden is that you hedge your bets between multiple crops, so there's usually something that does well in compensation. In our case the cucumbers, fennel, new potatoes and lettuces have been especially productive, and there are some very healthy-looking cabbages, kale, parsnips and leeks lined up for the Autumn and Winter months. Sadly, the Killin Neighbourfood hub has now closed, but you can order veg boxes from our new website: tombreckmarketgarden.co.uk which has various subscription options for delivery to four local drop-off points, and we continue to supply the same outlets in Killin, Aberfeldy, Pitlochry and Tombreck Farm itself.

Killin Medical Practice

The year is moving quickly and already we have been made aware that local people are being called for their winter vaccinations. We continue to encourage people to attend their vaccines, although wish to apologise for the confusion that the letters stated the venue was Killin Medical Practice when in fact it was the Killin Nurses station. We hope that the vaccines are running smoothly, however we need to advise that Killin Medical Practice are unfortunately unable to assist with the re-scheduling of appointments. We can only advise that you contact the NHS Forth Valley Immunisation Team on 0800 130 3120. As we move into winter, we expect to see the common winter viruses reappear. The most common upper respiratory infection are ear infections which commonly last 8 days, sore throats that can last 7 days, sinusitis up to 21 days, the common cold 14 days and the more common viral cough or covid lasting 21 days. We strongly encourage selfmanagement in these limiting viruses. Drinking plenty of fluids, resting and understanding that a fever is a sign the body is fighting infection and usually gets better on its own. If you are seeking an urgent on the day appointment, we must emphasise the importance of calling early. Our unscheduled appointments



are primarily between 11am - 12pm. If you feel your problem is new and requires an urgent assessment, please call the practice between the hours of 8am and 9am. We then have the availability to see you if it is assessed as necessary. We may ask you to attend on the day for a face-to-face appointment with a clinician. We may assess that the situation can wait for a routine appointment on another day. We encourage review if you are more poorly than you expect to be, having new symptoms of shortness of breath, difficulty swallowing, or coughing up green or blood-stained mucus. Children are, of course, slightly different and we would happily discuss this with any parent. There is an excellent website for parents, which I use frequently, that provides a lot of excellent quality, NHS based advice

Ouite often parents call due to fever in children so I have chosen to share this information from the above website - "Fever is extremely common in children and usually suggests that your child has an infection. It's really important that you measure your child's temperature accurately - you should use a digital thermometer (under the armpit (axillary) for children 5 years and younger, and in the mouth for children over 5 years of age). The other option is to use an in the ear thermometer (tympanic), although these should not be used in babies below a month of age." If we have a doctor unwell and unable to work, we do our utmost to accommodate their patients. Recently we have had to shuffle some booked patients to another GP and maybe to a different time. We would ask for your understanding during these times and apologise for any inconvenience caused.

I would strongly encourage all patients if they are buying

thermometers or blood pressure machines to consider purchasing from a pharmacy to ensure the product is of a reliable and high standard. Mentioning blood pressure monitors, Killin Medical Practice have been issued 25 new blood pressure monitors from the health board to support a new online and text messaging service to facilitate home monitoring. We will now ask you to sign in and out your machines so we can keep a better track of our monitors. If you have a SureSign Automatic Blood Pressure and Pulse Monitor that you have previously been loaned from Killin Medical Practice, and are no longer using, we would be most grateful if that could be returned. Thank you.

Our Long Term Condition Reviews are running very smoothly, at this current time, and we are sending out written invitations on a monthly basis. If you feel you have been missed or unsure when you are due a review, please do not hesitate to contact the administrative team who will happily help you.

Kirsty Robertson has sadly left the administration team, she has moved to work in Callander. We wish her all the best in her new role. Sheila Campbell has successfully joined our team and we look forward to her meeting all the patients. Please remember that new staff may not know who you are, so checking in at reception is vital for the admin team as when we "check you in" it notifies the doctor or nurse that you are here, we so would appreciate it if everyone could let the reception staff know when you arrive.

Finally, I wish to thank the Patient Participation Group for their recognition of the work Killin Medical Practice has provided over the years in the form of our Immunisation Clinics. We are very sorry that we are no longer being given the opportunity to provide this in our community.

Harvest of Food and Truths

It's September and the turn of the year. Minus 2C last night in Altnaharra but a few late hatchings of sparrows and chaffinches are still pestering exhausted parents for food. Having had a good crop of sunflowers this year we are putting out the seedheads and, after some suspicion, the bluetits and nuthatches are pulling out the seeds. The squirrels are becoming less frequent visitors now that the wild crop of hazelnuts calls to them.

The sounds are changing too with the calls of oystercatchers and curlews gone, we are left with the robin's song and the scolding of wrens. While the wild animals are enjoying their own harvest its almost time to celebrate ours. As farmers work long hours to get in the grain and produce and sell lambs and cattle, let's remember what a constantly worrying time that they have to continue the life that they love and the food which they provide. In 'The Great Plant Based Con' by Jayn Buxton scientifically proven but previously hidden studies are brought to light. Her conclusion is 'the truth is often hidden by who can shout the loudest, which campaigns are best funded and what social influencers champion.

The European Agricultural Commission is wanting to cut food production to gain carbon zero by 2050. This has taken a recent about turn of popularity since the war in Ukraine has increased the cost of food. It's one thing for leaders and the better off to be sitting down to their expensively grown and imported avocados but another for the average and poorer off to afford basic food for their families. They would probably be kinder to the planet by not sending unnecessary emails creating carbon. The Dutch Farmers' Party recently won regional votes and may have enough votes to overthrow the Socialist/Green party. So you can believe as you will but think on what one ex Ardeonaig resident says – 'Why do we have the teeth to eat meat if we are not supposed to?'

A plan to breed sheep with a low carbon footprint leaves me imagining them nipping round the fields in wee slippers but, apparently, it is to do with DNA analysis! All the while not forgetting that sheep grazing helps to sequester carbon into the soil. Oh what a lot about carbon we are learning!

While anyone who spends even a short time in the countryside can see that a major pest is the spread of bracken, the government refused to authorise the use of Asulox. Then, of course, there is the old chestnut about trees. No, not chestnut trees, they are a valid part of the land as are most broadleaved. Its these pesky pines being planted everywhere. At last, the truth is coming out that the draining of peaty soil for planting, the emission of carbon from many plantations and the flushing of acidic drainage is nothing short of devastating. But then there are so many financial incentives to plant. If peatland isn't used, then it will be agricultural ground under siege for planting. We are not told how many of the trees being cut down for cycle tracks are natives. Nearly 500 trees in Edinburgh alone, bet most of those weren't conifers!

There is further threat to our moorlands with the government's plans to have discretionary powers to grant grouse shooting licences to estates.

But maybe help is at hand; Beaver man flies in to save the day? Or not! The Farm Advisory Service are going to help farmers use beavers to manage their land. I imagine that they want them to allow them to build dams etc not to become the factor. One place where beavers are being introduced is The Cairngorms. At the time of the last Killin News a plan was ongoing to reintroduce wildcats there. They are now there and doing well so far.

Its not only politicians who are no more intelligent in urban areas but foxes too. A recent study by Hull university using puzzles to gain treats has found that, while urban foxes were bolder to approach and touch the puzzles, they were no better at solving them than their country cousins.

The urban fox does seem to have mastered the trampoline as one garden in Nottinghamshire had 9 cubs playing on theirs. You can find it on youtube, go on, the children would love to see it.

But the foxes may have rivals for claims to fun as a sea otter in California is jumping onto surfboards.

Better than Mr Packham's idea which he told the BBC which was that it would be good to blow up the oil refineries. Now that's really helping the planet?
