Nursery Education



Exactly a year ago, we featured on the front page (January 1994) the sterling work of the local Playgroup for the under fives in the Village, in the absence of any educational provision by Central Region.

The scene is now completely different! We are able to announce that a **full time educational provision for the Pre-fives** will start in Killin School after the Summer holidays.

Following the setting up of a Project Development Team under the Chairmanship of Eileen Hutton, of Central Region Education Department and a Questionnaire to parents in the District, it was finally decided to choose Killin School for the first rural Pre-five "Pilot" Project in the Region.

A Flexible Provision

The Project will provide a range of services, including full day, part day and even "out of school" care for older children. The idea is to pilot on one site, a full range of services, very much determined by parents' needs and their

work patterns. The core of this provision will, of course, be a **nursery class** or classes, but providing care and social/educational activity out with the normal nursery age range.

Staffing and Costs

The seriousness of Central Region's intentions can be measured by their decision to appoint the following staff to the project, a **co-ordinator**, who will work with the parents in the District and try to provide for their varied needs, a part time trained **Nursery Teacher**, **three full time Nursery Nurses** and a **Clerical Assistant**. The total cost, at least for the first year, is in the region of £100,000. We understand that part of this cost may be met by European money.

The Playgroup

Needless to say, the Region has not forgotten the work that has been carried out for years by the local Playgroup. We understand that there will be consultation with them and the Scottish Pre-School Play Association, to determine what contribution they may be able to contribute to the Project.

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Cold Comfort for Community Council

Despite meeting in an inexplicably unheated Lesser McLaren Hall on the coldest night of the year, the meeting of 9 February 1995 proceeded normally, bar a shiver or two. Dr Mairi MacColl was in the Chair; Councillors Mrs S Duke (Central Region) and Mr I Martin (Stirling District) and Mrs J Mallinson (Traders' Association) were in attendance.

Apologies from Mr K Taylor and Constable I Donaldson. One member of the public was present.

1. Housing at the former Mart; In response to an invitation, Mr R J Craig of Lynfern Developments spoke about the housing proposals for the Mart area. Mr Craig's aim, with the backing of Scottish Homes, is to erect 16 good quality homes for local people. The houses, mix of two and three bedroomed semi-detached, would be for sale on a low cost home ownership scheme. Mr Craig admitted in discussion that he would like further information on how much demand there would be for home ownership related to local need. Present estimates were based on figures from the Local Authority and Scottish Homes.

2. Funding for the re-siting of the play area: was not yet confirmed by Stirling District Council. Application towards cost should have been made for European funding by Central Region in January. We are awaiting further confirmation in funding and the likely site of the play area.

3. Car Parking at the Capercaillie Restaurant/Filling Station: The most recent plan/proposal is that there be parking for five buses in front of the Monemore Houses and for 30 cars on

the ground to the side of the restaurant. The Community Council felt that although not entirely satisfactory, the plans represented an improvement on previous years.

4. Pre-School Education: Plans for a centre of pre-school education at Killin Primary School are likely to go ahead.

5. Proposed Folk Festival, Killin 16-18 June 1995: Plans are progressing towards holding a Folk Festival in Killin. Mr Mallinson (Traders' Association) reported some funding commitments have been received.

6. McLaren High School: Proposed Swimming Pool/Leisure Centre: Mr Alan Reid of the School Board gave a presentation of plans for the new project stressing that the complex would serve the Community, not just the School.

The next meeting of the Council will be Thursday 13 April 1995.

Tyndrum Village Hall Association

The Chairman reports that grants of £12,000 from the Scottish Office and £6,000 from Stirling District Council were awarded for refurbishment of the Village Hall. The total cost will be in the region of £24,000 for refurbishment.

John Riley states that the Committee hope that refurbishment will encourage greater numbers of people to use the Hall and to become involved in Hall activities. Strathfillan Community Council

Gold Mining and Gold Centre

John Riley, the Secretary, reports that "Caledonia" is now the majority shareholding company of Fynegold, with Ennex having maintained a small shareholding.

In a meeting with Mr MacLeod of Caledonia, Mr MacLeod stated that his company hope to see things underway in six months, build the mine in the following 18 months, the first commercial operation in Scotland!

The company has other mining rights around the Tyndrum area and foresee the mining operation continuing into the foreseeable future.

There is a policy of employing as many local people as possible although skilled staff will have to be brought in from elsewhere. There is intention to open a Gold Centre to manufacture and sell gold and silver products, with the possibility of employing and training a number of people.

Kate's Bite

The Council unanimously recommended that this operation be given planning permission.

Crianlarich By-pass

The Community Council undertook a Questionnaire exercise/public opinion survey regarding the proposed by-pass scheme. From the results of this survey, the majority of those who took part felt that the Village needed a by-pass.

The survey also covered broader aspects of by-pass development, the findings were sent to the Scottish Office who expressed appreciation.

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Curling Club Burns' Supper

The Club held their Annual Burns Supper, once again at Suie Lodge, presided over by Douglas McRobbie. The haggis was presented by Gemma Reilly and piped in by Kenny Lang of Auchmore. Sinclair Aitken gave the address. Sandy Taylor from Ardeonaig gave an amusing "Toast to the Lasses" and Rachel Hunter gave as good as she got in her reply. The evening's entertainment was provided by Davie Thornton, at his best on the fiddle, ably supported by Pat and Gilbert Christie on keyboard and accordion. Nicola Cowmeadow, on a visit to Killin, sang a number of songs quite beautifully, as also did Ewan Campbell, Mary Masterson and Jim Cushley. A great night.

Breast Screening Caravan Returns

The Forth Valley Health Board Breast Screening Programme continues to try to detect Breast cancers at an early stage when they should be more easily treated. The Mobile Screening caravan will be in Killin from 20 to 25 April. All women aged between 50-65 will be invited for screening, those over 64 can refer themselves to the van. Last time, the attendance for screening was around 75%. For those women who did not attend, a common problem seemed to be difficulty in communication in order to change appointment times etc. The Surgery staff will be happy to liaise with the Mobile Unit. 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Comment

With this issue, Killin News completes its fourth year. Glancing through the back copies one can see that, even in a short time, much has happened in the Village and surrounding areas. 1991 saw the start of the St Fillan Mill Project, completed in 1994. Killin Leisure and Recreation Club was coming out of the planning stage. Killin Mountain Rescue celebrated a quarter of a Century. The Sport and Leisure Complex was opened in 1992. A new 125 bedroomed hotel opened in Tyndrum. First mention of the Goldmine. The ambulance staff turned out in new green uniforms. Crianlarich Village Hall opened in 1992. The new surgery opened at Ballechroisk.

1993 saw Killin win a top tourism award. The salmon fishing opening day saw the worst weather for years with a boat being overturned. A landslide blocked the Crianlarich road. Problems with dog fouling has been a hardy annual. The Loch Tay Trundler started. The MacLaggans took over the Post Office after three generations in the same family. Killin Kirk had its 250th anniversary.

The purpose in mentioning these odds and ends of news is that nothing stands still - new houses at Ballechroisk, Highland Games, projected Folk Music Festival. The more personal bits of news about the Village reflect a fairly active community, but there is a downside. Many local businesses, shops, hotels, etc have not had an easy time because of the recession, use of the big supermarkets competing with local shops. Vandalism is alive and well, much damage to property, uprooting of shrubs, older folk being harassed with unwelcome banging on doors and windows, litter (and it's not the visitors). A clutter of signs and notices advertising the delights of the Village. The inevitable build up of traffic. The Bank, a shadow of its former self.

The times they are a changing. It is up to old and new villagers to think what they can contribute to community life, not what they can take from it. Support local endeavours. There are obvious needs, such as something for the younger kids in the in-between time when they are too young for adult clubs - not easy. We know that the conclusion to Comment sounds like sour grapes, but think about it.

A new authority that will cover most of the present functions of the two will come into being in March 1996, probably called Stirling Council. Killin **will**, for electoral purposes, be in an area called North Queensland. Where this name comes from, no-one seems to know, however, before the new Authority comes into being, just to keep us on our toes, there will be a Shadow Council elected on 6 April 1995 this year. The Shadow Councillors will work in tandem with the present Local Authority Councillors until they take over in 1996. They will be in office then for three years, having had no power in their "shadow" year.

Visitors to the Killin Golf Club may have noticed a black and white sketch of the Loch Tay Giant, with an enormous golf club on the wall, purported to belong to him. This is, of course, a wee bit of fun, but Big Donald did exist and some stories attributed to his strength have come down.

What height he was we do not know, but nowadays, with several local men round about 6ft 3in to 6ft 6in, Big Donald might not stand out quite as much as in the early 1800's, when the average height for a man was about 5ft 6in to 5 ft 8in.

In 1850, a company of Royal Engineers surveying the countryside from Ben Lawers needed a box of instruments, weighing about two hundredweights, taken up to the top. The Captain looked for two strong local men to carry the box up. Big Donald asked the Captain if he could be paid two men's wages if he carried it up himself. This was agreed and sure enough, Donald, with help to get the box onto his back, carried it to the top. If we are to believe it, without stopping from Ben Lawers Hotel.

Another feat was when a horse and cart full of peat stuck to the axles in soft ground. Big Donald unhitched the horse and pulled the cart out saying "No wonder the poor beast could not shift it, I could hardly manage it myself!" The giant died in 1870 aged 85.

The only likeness known is the black and white sketch drawn when Donald was 83 years old.

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Rural Access Service

Sponsored by Stirling and District Association for Mental Health

The Stirling and District Association for Mental Health is concerned with the rights and welfare of people who have experienced mental ill health or related mental health problems and promotes good mental health. Its services are designed to assist these groups and those who care for them, to live in the community. Its services include respite, guidance, counselling and friendship that are both complementary and an alternative to those offered by the statutory sector, benefiting from the Association's ability to be innovative and understanding the needs of its client group. Recently, it decided to actively address the needs of people who live in rural areas through the development of the Rural Access Service. This new service aims to help people living in rural areas who experience ongoing feelings of stress, acute unhappiness, anxiety or symptoms of mental illness. These feelings may have been triggered by a significant life event or change in lifestyle such as:-

- loss of a loved one
- starting or losing a job
- moving home
- difficult family relationship
- major accident
- long term illness or that of a loved one
- discharge from a mental hospital
- new or difficult medication

or sometimes *if only we knew!*

Such feelings often isolate people from the community, inhibiting their ability to cope with daily life and access to appropriate sources of help. Therefore, the Rural Access Service offers short to medium term assistance to such people living in the Western rural communities of Stirling District and specifically provides:-

Immediate personal contact

An opportunity to talk out problems and think through a possible solution

- A practical approach in resolving problems
- Basic advocacy to enable access to statutory services
- A means by which self help groups may be formed and meet to develop friendship and local support.

Dochart in Spate

Suspensions that the Dochart has been exceptionally high this Winter (see photo last issue) were confirmed when Mr R Allcock, Director of the Tay River Purification Board, reported to the Board that the River Dochart recorded its second highest flood since 1990, higher than the flood in January 1993.

Exercise - Is it for you?



Exercise. The very word conjures up images of lycra-clad young women doing step aerobics or muscle-bound posers pumping iron with the help of anabolic steroids. This need not be the case.

Recent work from America has shown the health benefits of a moderate amount of activity every day. Perhaps the most important findings are that activity can be accumulated and that around 30 minutes of activity every day, reduces the risk of stroke, heart attacks and so on, equivalent to stopping smoking 20 cigarettes. The sort of activity you should undertake is enough to make you slightly short of breath, but not so that you could not hold a conversation. Because you can accumulate activity, it is easy to fit it into your day. Take a walk. From the car park at the Roads Depot, along the railway line to the old level crossing and back will take about 15 minutes and should be within most people's capacity. (If not, you really are unfit!) Do some gardening. Do some bending/stretching or dance to your favourite music. Do the dusting or window cleaning as vigorously as you can. Dust down the bike and go for a spin, there are plenty of quiet roads and forestry tracks' around. Leave the car behind and collect the papers or the kids on foot.

Surveys in the UK show that exercise levels fall off progressively throughout life and that this is especially true of women, who seem to give up on any regular activity much younger than men - even taking into account the fact that women do most of the housework!

This sort of routine is not just important for the young, the elderly too can benefit from increasing their activity, even just in terms of being able to carry on doing the things they want to for longer. I am sure you can all think of examples of people who prove this point.

Weather



For the past five years or so, it would appear that during the late Winter, a weaker pattern has emerged of excessive rainfall and gales and a generally mobile, westerly regime. This latterly, has been projected into March, at one time one of the drier months. Time was when I came in covered in stour from the horse harrows and at night, the glow is what is known in the West as "fathloisgte", the reflection in the sky of uncontrolled muirburning, would add colour to March evenings. Not any more. Good drying spells in Spring seem to be scarce and brief.

The lack of "push" within the major high pressure area of the northern hemisphere would appear to be the cause. When the Siberian high extends far enough west to cover our islands, in Winter one can expect long spells of hard frost, in Spring periods of dry, barren conditions, not perhaps conducive to growth but great for getting on with the work!

Likewise, in Summer, should the Azores high push north sufficiently, we would expect the idyllic anticyclonic weather most of us enjoy. Perhaps a return to earlier patterns is overdue.

Healthy Eating - Recipes

Mushroom and Peppers Baked Potatoes

4 x 8oz Baking Potatoes
5oz mushrooms quartered
1 red pepper diced
½ yellow pepper diced
½ green pepper diced
4 medium tomatoes cut into wedges
2 tablespoons chopped mixed herbs
pepper and salt

Bake potatoes in pre-heated oven 220°C for about one hour.

Cook remainder of vegetables in a little water until tender. Split open potatoes and divide mixture between them. 200 cal per serving. Serves 4.

Winter Cauliflower, Cabbage and Apple Salad

5 oz Cauliflower (broken into florets)
1 dessert apple
2 tablespoons orange juice
1 oz grated carrot
3 oz white cabbage shredded
2 tablespoons natural yoghurt
2 teaspoons cider vinegar
pepper and salt

Core and dice apple (no need to peel). Toss in orange juice to prevent browning. Place all of prepared vegetables and apple in a mixing bowl. Mix together yoghurt and vinegar. Stir into salad making sure ingredients are well coated. 35 cal per serving. Serves 4.

Some local traders were not members of the Tourist Association and it was hoped that more people would join. Improvements planned for the Village resurfacing at the park entrance, car parking and a nature trail.

Change at the Church

The demission of Rev McNaughton as (he) Minister for Killin and Ardeonaig Church presents change and uncertainty. However, whatever the consequences of change, one thing is clear, there need not be undue concern - the God who is the focus of Church life is unchanging. Mr McNaughton's Ministry has been marked by his integrity, his evangelical fervour and by his genuine concern for the well being of his parishioners. His Ministry has been marked too, by the illness and death of Dorothy and his burning desire to mark in a book, Dorothy's Christian witness, in good health and poor, as they coped together with Motor Neurone Disease. It is understandable that David needs to be free of a Parish Ministry in order to fulfil this and other opportunities that may arise for Christian service. The future of the Ministry in Killin is the responsibility of the Presbytery. In turn, they have referred the matter to their Re-appraisal Committee who will visit us in the future to seek our views and consider the matter before reporting to the Presbytery. These are not faceless bureaucrats but experienced people who share a concern for the future of the Church. In the meantime, an Interim Moderator has been appointed. He is Dr Stuart Todd who is formerly the Minister of St Machar's Cathedral in Aberdeen and has retired to Balquhider. These steps may not fully alleviate the uncertainty about the future but it does mean that we are not going forward into a void.

A man of ideas, Mr McNaughton's time in Killin has left its mark in many ways, not the least in the BB, in visiting the sick, in arranging a week of Livelink meetings with Billy Graham and in leading pilgrimage walks, among other things. We wish him and his family well for the future.

These consultations will also seek to investigate the idea of a second park entrance from the McLaren Hall car park. In addition, a draft scheme for a village trail is currently being discussed with individual land owners. An investigation of the McLaren Hall car park had identified that the surface requires attention to enhance the condition of this area. This work is scheduled to commence in March but clarification is first being sought on the ownership of the car park.

It is encouraging to note that visitor numbers to the Folklore Centre have exceeded expectations, this includes 300 hardy souls who enjoyed a visit to the Centre on New Year's Day.

Killin Bowling Club

History has it that the first bowling green in Killin was situated where W Stitt now has his builder's yard and that about 1917/18, a green was formed beside the River Dochart between the sawmill (now G Smith, Joiner) and Wallace's Mill (now Millhouse). Apparently, bowlers had to constantly fight against the midges here - the midges eventually won and were left in possession of the "field" or rather green. After this there does not seem to have been any bowling activity in Killin until 1950 when, on 24 April, a bowling green formed on the present site was almost ready for play and a committee set up to manage its affairs.

Killin Development Committee gave a loan of £50 for the purchase of mats, jacks, rink markers, canvas sheets, etc and agreed to pay maintenance costs for the first year. New bowls cost £5-£6 a pair and annual subscriptions were set at 25/- for adults and 15/- for under 18 year olds. A day ticket cost 3/- and 1/6 and evening play after 6.00 pm, 2/- and 1/-. Hire of bowls cost 3d and hire of overshoes also 3d. The opening date for this new bowling green was 3 June 1950

- the opening ceremony being performed by Mrs Alfred Morris of Killin Hotel. Membership at November 1950 was 62 gents and 10 ladies - present membership is approximately 10 gents and 14 ladies!

The new Killin and District Sports and Leisure Club was opened on 11 July 1992 and this provides opportunities for tennis, football and putting, as well as bowling. Costs are very much higher now than when we had a wooden hut. Now we have a very attractive clubhouse with toilet facilities, showers, clubroom and small kitchen. All this costs money and the bowling club would dearly like to increase the membership. Anyone interested is warmly invited to contact the Secretary.

We would also like to encourage young people of 11 years and upwards to learn to play bowls and to this end, would be willing to arrange tuition - probably starting after the Easter Holiday.
