2nd Killin Traditional Music & Dance Festival

It's clear now, if there ever was any doubt, that The Killin Traditional Music and Dance Festival is here to stay. It has become an annual fixture in the folk music world. This second one in Killin was in nearly everybody's view even better than last year.

Over the weekend some 4 - 5,000 people were in Killin, roughly 1,000 of them in the Breadalbane Park campsite {and again little or no trouble). Shops, hotels, guesthouses and restaurants all did well; indeed a lot of money was spent in the village. But, while the village economy got a brief boost, it must be remembered that such a Festival is an expensive event to put on, and without sponsorship would leave the Killin Festival Committee deeply in debt; in fact sponsorship is essential. John Mallinson and his band of helpers were glad this year to have good sponsorship from Scottish Brewers, C J Lang Caterers, but mainly from Forth Valley Enterprise

who came up with £5,000 to make the whole thing successful

It should be remembered that the purpose of events of this kind is to bring people to Killin and put the place on the map so that there maybe in the long-term a clear improvement in the economy of the village. But apart from all that, let it be said that the Festival brought much enjoyment, friendliness and by any standard great music. The McLaren Hall was full, that is over 400 people for all three of the evening concerts. It's significant too that a very large part of the audiences on these nights were village people - of all ages. Danny Kyle, the Festival Director, commented on how much support the local people gave to almost all the events in the programme. It seems the villagers in the main gave the Festival their approval, and if some found the place too busy and noisy, well, it's only one weekend in the year.

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Killin Medical Practice - Times Change.....

As most of you will be aware, there have recently been a number of changes to the medical practice in Killin. There are more to come! It might be an idea to explain what has happened and what is round the corner.

With funding from Forth Valley Health Board we have employed Eileen McCarron to help run the dispensary. The number of drugs dispensed has increased over the years and the extra pair of hands is most welcome.

We have taken on responsibility for managing a budget which covers "community" services. The main effect of this is that any savings made will be used locally to improve services. A great deal of administration is involved and Michelle Manzie, from Lochearnhead, is now working half-time to help.

We have been approved as a Training Practice. This means that we will have a fully qualified doctor attached to the practice, usually for a year. They need to gain experience in general practice before they can set up as GPs in their own right. Dr Angus Cameron joins us in August. I'm sure you will all make him welcome during his time here.

As the population of the area has increased, there is more to do, and we expect that Dr Elaine Turner will increase her hours to full time.

All of these changes will be to the benefit of the practice and the area. I have heard the argument that Dr MacColl managed to look after the area with only one receptionist whereas we will shortly have four doctors and five reception staff! I have also heard that the doctors can't be busy because when you attend the surgery there are only one or two other patients waiting.

I can speak from experience, having done the twenty four hours a day, seven days a week, kind of work. It can be done, but only to the detriment of any family or social life. In fact, we are busier than ever. We saw 600 visitors last year, which is the equivalent of a surgery a week. There are more patients needing monitoring of their drug therapy, for example some 16 patients on anticoagulants, the equivalent of a surgery each month. The hotels in Tyndrum are now open from March to November with over 400 guests and staff between them.

The appearance of quiet is because, if the appointment system is working well, there should only be a few patients waiting at any time. I now feel intensely guilty if I am running 20 minutes late, whereas in the old days it was not uncommon for patients to have to wait for an hour to be seen.

We still guarantee to see urgent problems the same day and provide appointments within 24 hours. We do almost all our own on-call so that you see a "kent face" in the middle of the night. We deal with most minor, and some major, accidents. We are continually striving to improve the way we provide care, for example we will soon be giving "clot-busting" drugs to heart attack victims, at home, to minimise the delay in receiving treatment.

The present arrangement also allows country doctors like us to have some influence outside our own patch. David Blaney is active in teaching young doctors at Dundee University and in setting standards for the examination for the Royal College Of General Practitioners. Elaine Turner is on a national committee looking at the care of patients with asthma and how this can be made more rational as well as developing guidelines for medical care with Forth Valley Health Board. I help to provide medical input to mountain rescue and to ways of improving mountain safety, both nationally and internationally.

By employing more staff we are also bringing money into the area, which helps the local economy.

All in all, I feel we are being successful in combining the needs of doctors, staff and patients. But, we are not complacent, and if you feel there is an area we are falling short in, or not addressing, then we would wish to hear about it.

Councillor Gillie Thompson, chairman of the Community Committee of Stirling Council, thanked all those who had contributed for their efforts and vision, Gillie Thompson went on to say 'These facilities will be of enormous importance to the High School and feeder primaries, and will provide the much needed

facilities for the community and tourists and visitors'.

The leisure centre, due to open in the autumn of 1997, will include: Swimming pool, sports hall, indoor bowling hall, fitness suite, climbing wall, squash courts, sauna/solarium/spa bath, cafeteria, floodlit all weather surface for tennis, 5 aside, basketball etc.

Project funding

Initial funding for this project came from the Regional Council supported by the District Council, and the Rural Economic Partnerships, together with Forth Valley Enterprise. Since 1st April, 1996, the new Stirling Council is the main funding body. There are a number of other very important funding bodies, most of which were represented at the sod cutting ceremony.

Lottery funding through the Scottish Sports Council, Forth Valley Enterprise, European objective 5B, and important continuing fund raising from the schools in the catchment area, and from the communities who will be able to use these facilities.

Killin Community Council

The Council met in the McLaren Hall on 13th June, 1996. Dr Mairi McColl was in the chair. Stirling Councillor, Kenneth Campbell was present. One member of the public also attended.

Council noted that work on the *new children's play area* had been delayed; it has since then been started.

Management of Loch Lomond and Trossachs Area

This matter is still under discussion. Mr J Gauld agreed to attend a meeting at the Dreadnought Hotel, Callander, on 24th June to hear of further development.

Entrance to Breadalbane Park

In view of the frequent random parking of cars in the entrance area, the Council took the matter up with Stirling Council. Apparently it had been agreed with the property owners in this area, *Killin Crafts, the Laundrette and Shutters Restaurant,* to accommodate a limited amount of parking. A sign to this effect would shortly be erected.

Rubbish Skip

Stirling Council wrote to say that resources would not stretch to the provision of a permanent/regular skip in Killin. Councillor Kenneth Campbell agreed to look into the question of rubbish on the south side of Loch Tay. The Council will also be asked to undertake repairs to road verges in the Cloichran area.

Dochart Bridge

Councillor Kenneth Campbell agreed to look into the matter of cutting trees to aid visibility. He also agreed to take up the matter of the urgent repairs to the bridge. Constable Donaldson had approached the



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Chairman about instituting a trial period of traffic lights on the bridge. The Council felt that lights would cause even more chaos since there would be a build up of traffic at peak periods. However, lights would no doubt be in use when the bridge was being repaired, and would provide some evidence of the efficacy of the suggestion.

Community Council Election.

The chairman asked that people be encouraged to stand for election. The Council had received a letter from Helen Munro, informing us that the Community Council Administration Grant would this year be reduced to £350. She also drew attention to the Community Council Project Grant Scheme. It was agreed that an application should be made for a grant to assist in the purchase of a new Community Bus. Mr J. Gauld agreed to handle this.

Strathfillan Community Council

Strathfillan Regeneration Strategy

Almost a year ago, the Corron Trust held a seminar in Crianlarich bringing together local people, organisations and government agencies to highlight iissues, needs and aspirations important to people living and working in Strathfillan.

A report resulted, highlighting many areas of opportunity. Due to lots of hard work, over £35,000 has been put together to research and pursue these opportunities. The funding partners (largest first) are The Corron Trust (in the name of us, the Strathfillan community) European Union 'Leader 2' programme, Forth Valley Enterprise, Scottish Homes and Stirling Council.

Forestry Behind Crianlarich

Chris Ryder of Forest Enterprise gave a fascinating presentation to our June meeting about their plans for the harvesting and replanting of Inverardran Forest on Cruach Ardrain. This area took only three years to plant in the 1960's when huge areas of same age, same species trees was the norm. Now however, they plan to harvest and replant small blocks over the next twenty years. Although Forest Enterprise still has to make money they give serious consideration to the look of new plantings, the mix of trees, the use of open spaces and footpaths, cycleways etc. Chris Ryder is keen to have input from locals on anything in the forest they feel should be specifically incorporated into the replanting plan (e.g. special plant or animal communities, shielings, pathways, viewpoints etc.)

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 7th August in Tyndrum Village Hall at 7.30 pm.



De-Centralise & Fraternise

Following advice/direction from St. Andrew's house asking the new all purpose Councils to go forth and de-centralise, Stirling Council set up 48 meetings with the public. "What for?", I hear you cry well, current thinking is that our local government is too remote, does not listen, responds by a bit of buck passing and shuttling decisions up and down the line.

Stirling Council wants to find out what services the public need or wish locally what part folk want in decision making how can services be improved etc.

Back to Killin and the Public meeting (one of the 48) held in the McLaren Hall on the 8th of May. Head of Council, Corrie McChord, senior officials, including Keith Yates the Chief Executive Officer and Ken Campbell our Local Councillor who chaired the meeting were in attendance. After explanation of the reasons behind the meeting, the public were asked to join in discussion. The following points amongst others were made by the public:-

- 1. Community Forums (these are public meetings for folk to meet officials and Councillors direct) might be seen as yet another layer or bureaucracy, there were too many working parties in existence.
- 2. Hope expressed that Stirling Council would be more efficient than its predecessors.
- 3. Concern was expressed about the need for Stirling Council Staff to grasp the service requirements of village communities. The closure of the library was cited when the librarian was on holiday for a week. Ken Campbell was able to assure the meeting that this would not happen again.
- 4. It was suggested that a PC be made available in the library, this would aid the library to become an information point for access to all Council services. Software packages on benefits could be included. There would be implications for training a key operator on how to access the system.
- 5. Quarterly provision of a rubbish skip was totally inadequate to meet the communities needs. Other long term complaints about unauthorised dumping were raised.

- 6. Information was requested about the long delay in repairing the Dochart Bridge.
- 7. Litter and its attendant problems was a matter of concern.

A number of other issues were raised. The greatest response and interest was shown to a suggestion by Corrie McChord that it might be possible for a suitably deputised Council Officer to visit Killin weekly to receive and respond to the communities complaints, access information on behalf of residents and work with and on behalf of the community to make Council services accessible.

All told, the meeting was informative and cordial. Killin as usual was not overly represented - about twenty people altogether.

After some keen and hard fought races, the result was that Lochay House were the winners.




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Opening of Moirlanich Longhouse

Following a long conservation repair project, the National Trust for Scotland on 28th June officially opened Moirlanich Cottage, but in fact the building is a rare survivor of a traditional Scottish longhouse - a dwelling and byre combined. It is therefore more correctly now known as Moirlanich Longhouse.

After some words of explanation of the nature of the building and the conservation repair work, we went inside where Alison, the grand-daughter of Sheriff Prain of Perthshire, marked the '*rebirth*' of

Moirlanich by lighting a fire in the kitchen grate. (see photograph)

The purchase of the property and much of the repair work was made possible by a generous donation from the family of the late Sheriff Prain, in his memory.

The Longhouse, and a small exhibition in the adjacent shed, will be open to the public on Wednesday and Sunday afternoons between 2pm and 4pm, and will be staffed by a team of volunteers from the Killin Heritage Society.



In May the Green Team visited Queen Victoria's tree at Kinnell by kind permission of Group Captain Dowling and Mr Duncan. This giant sequoia towers above the other trees around it and was reputedly planted by Queen Victoria in 1892.

The Green Team were set the challenge of trying to measure the height of the tree, by estimating how many of them would have to stand on each other's shoulders to reach the top. It turned out that it would take almost 31 of them, making the tree over 120 feet tall! They also tried to work out the age of the tree by measuring the girth of the trunk by joining hands around it. Their answers were very close to the age suggested by the plaque beneath the tree.

A Tradition Of "Freedom To Roam"? Yes - But With Responsibility

The heading to Mike Mackey's article tells only half the story. The first principle of the Access Concordat states - "Freedom Of Access Exercised With Responsibility And Subject To Reasonable Constraints For Management And Conservation Purposes."

The signatories to the Concordat, all of whom were represented on the Access Forum were the Association Of Deer Management Groups (ADMG), the Convention Of Scottish Local Authorities (COSLA), the Mountaineering Council OfScotland(MCS), the National Farmers' Union For Scotland (NFUS), the Ramblers' Association Scotland (RAS), the Scottish Countryside Activities Council (SCAS), the Scottish Landowners' Federation (SLF), Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH), the Scottish Sports Association (SSA) and the Scottish Sports Council (SSC). Therefore, the consultation and representation were very much wider, with equal emphasis on 'Users' and 'Providers' (ADMG, NFUS, SLF) than he suggests. Furthermore, it was Paul van Vlissingen who initiated the "Letterewe Accord" which, I understood, is so much admired by the Ramblers' Association ...

The proposal to set up the Access Forum was first mooted by SLF in 1991 and, in late 1993, ADMG approached Magnus Magnusson (Chairman SNH) who endorsed it and agreed to act as Chairman. Once formed, the Forum produced no less than nine drafts of an Access Concordat for discussion by the constituent bodies. This lengthy negotiation demonstrates not only the complexity and sensitivity of the issue, but also - and very significantly the commitment of all sides to reach an agreement which ADMG and SLF are recommending strongly to all their members. The Concordat was launched in January 1996 by the Earl Of Lindsay, Minister For Agriculture, Environment and Fisheries at the Scottish Office. The Forum has now designed standard notices and leaflets to advise everyone concerned as to the situation during the height of the deer stalking season. These will also have space to include local information so that visitors may act responsibly, by adhering to the advice given, so that both they may

enjoy their recreation and that the essential task of managing the wild deer herd is not compromised.

A possible problem may be that the Financing bodies (COSLA and SNH) are unable to give any guarantee that funding will be available. The Providers cannot be expected to meet it alone and there is a clear case for other signatories to the Concordat to contribute.

In an emphatic demonstration of commitment to the Concordat, the West Rannoch Deer Management Group, in conjunction with MCS and NHS, issetting up a pilot answerphone hotline system covering the area between the rivers Dochart and Lochay which will carry information, up-dated daily, as to where stalking is - or is not - taking place on each of the estates involved. It will indicate. when possible, preferred routes for those seeking access.

If this project is successful - and it will depend not only on the estates providing the information, but, more importantly, on the Users using it - it is hoped that the system will be extended throughout the deer range. (The telephone number will be Killin 01567 820886 from the end of July). However, like the Concordat itself, its success depends on the goodwill and forbearance of all concerned. The last thing any right minded person, whether landowner or hill walker wants is confrontation. Freedom has its price. That price is Responsibility.


Maire Ni Chathasaigh And Chris Newman

Killin Community Bus






1st Killin Guides

Killin and District Tourist Association

A special meeting was held on 9th May, chaired by Roger Bedwell, to discuss the costs being placed on trade members by the new Argyll, the Isles, Loch Lomond, Stirling and Trossachs Tourist Board. Trade membership subscriptions for those in the old Loch Lomond, Stirling and the Trossachs area have risen by around 40% and the cost of colour advertising in the 1997 Accommodation Brochure has risen, in some cases, by up to 140%.

The Committee decided to invite Mr James Fraser, Chief Executive, and Mr Donald Pow, Marketing Director, to address the meeting. All 80 members of the Association were invited and 14 attended. There was some lively discussion and members were able to express, in no uncertain terms, their discontent with the current situation.

Both Mr Fraser and Mr Pow gave reasoned answers for the increases and members appreciated the fact that there was a need for equality in membership fees between the four former Boards, but felt the increases could have been introduced more gradually. With regard to the massive increases in advertising costs, members were left unsatisfied as to the reasons for this, and expressed their grave concern as to how small businesses were expected to respond. Footnote

As a result of this and similar meetings called throughout the area, the new Board have introduced a cheaper option (£100 + Vat) for advertising accommodation, geared towards smaller businesses.

Kirk News

I am pleased to be able to report that progress has been made over the last month in respect of concluding the vacancy. The proposed linkage with Balquhidder has successfully gone through almost all the stages. It remains for a service of linkage to be held. This will conclude and confirm the linkage. The service of linkage will be held at Balquhidder on Thursday 29 August at 7 PM. (This is a change from a suggested earlier date in July.)

A linked charge is one in which both parishes remain separate, retain separate Kirk Sessions and manage their own affairs. They are linked in that they share the services of a minister. Clearly this requires an element of agreement over how things will work. In our case both parishes have morning services at the same time and in due course some change will have to be introduced to times of services. In a similar way both parishes have their own manse. In order to determine which manse will be the manse of the linked charge, a panel of arbiters have been appointed. They will consider all the circumstances and make a recommendation which both parishes have agreed will conclude the matter.

Once the linkage has been concluded a single Interim Moderator will oversee both parishes. This will be Rev. Rebecca Leask formerly the minister of Callander St Bride's and currently the Interim Moderator in Balquhidder. The next step will be for a joint vacancy committee to be formed to identify a suitable minister to be called to the linked charge.


Other things
