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Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park

At a recent meeting regarding proposals for the National Park, it was intimated by Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH) that they had appointed Mr Alex Downie, Consultant, to meet with interested parties and report back to SNH with the views put to him. This is to enable SNH to report back to the Scottish Parliament with all the views expressed.

In light of the above Mr Downie intends to hold, during November and December, local surgeries in various locations, including Killin. It is expected that these surgeries would be spread over two days, involving visual displays, and the opportunity, if desired, to discuss any matter relating to the proposed National Park, on a one to one basis with a member of Mr Downie's team. Mr Downie also intends holding a public meeting in the area during January 2001 before finalising his report.

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Strathfillan Community Development Trust

We said goodbye to Jen Marshall in June. We thanked her for all her hard work and wished her well in her new career.

On 23rd October we appointed Sue Wyllie as our new Development Manager. Sue is well known to the Trust and has led our Housing Group since its formation. It was her endeavours that enabled us to buy and refurbish the four houses in Crianlarich. She has been our Housing Officer, but by the time this is printed we should have a new local person in place

We are also very excited to at last have our own office. It is in the grounds of the Invervey Hotel, and was once the Tourist Information Centre. Sue is hoping to be resident on Tuesdays and Fridays from 9 am -2.15 pm, and on Wednesdays all day. Now an up-date on other recent developments. If you take a walk in Tyndrum Community Woodlands you'll see there has been a lot of activities; new pathways, interpretation boards, and sculptures. There have been two artists in

residence. Gilbert Ward has done the stone sculptures and Jeremy Cunningham works with wood and has been involving the local school children. Nicole Robertson a P5 pupil at Crianlarich Primary School wrote:

"The School Clock

The sculptor brought in 12 wedge shaped pieces of wood and told us we were making a clock. First we made paper birds and animals, then he sawed them out of wood. Then he stuck them on (at his home). Then we made trees out of paper and stuck them on ourselves. We made the wood into 12 months (I did February). Then he took all of it home and put it together on another round piece of wood. It is in the wee ones classroom. It still needs the hands and the workings. The End."

Self-build has finally got under way. Community Self-Build Scotland held their launch on the 11 October in Tyndrum, and all those that were interested were invited to a meeting on the 18 October, to start the exciting, yet totally committing journey to owning their own house. The scheme is targeted at those who would be unable to buy a house on the open market; these houses will be affordable mainly because the self-builder will be putting in hours of hard work, (known as sweat equity) combined with Rural Home Ownership Grants. The participants will undergo a training programme, which includes management and building skills. This is the pilot scheme and there are others planned for Killin and Crianlarich.

The new season of Heritage Society meetings got off to a splendid start, in October, with a performance by The Quern on the 'Life of Robert Service'. This was an ambitious financial project for the Society, but the large audience was rewarded with a most entertaining and enlightening evening.

Wallace Lockhart was the raconteur, his researches into Robert Service having taken him from Ayrshire to the Yukon. Connie Park delighted us with her singing, as did Roy Benson, a distinguished tenor. Fiddles, flute, accordion, mandolin, guitar and other instruments contribute to the sound of Quern, all under the direction of accompanist Amy Donaldson.

It was not long before feet were tapping and voices were singing along to the familiar tunes from the early years of the last century, as a music hall atmosphere filled the room. Quern also include music from places and events with which Robert Service is associated and the audience were delighted with authentic pieces such as "Off to the Yukon" and "Arctic Brotherhood". This was interspersed with narrative about his life and the evocative words of his poems, written whilst on his wanderings around the Yukon, during the First World War, on his travels through eastern Europe and his retirement in France.

It would be fair to say that the members of the audience were both entertained and educated during the performance. Quern has an extensive repertoire, frequently playing the music of other lands with strong fiddle connections and the Heritage Society hopes to arrange a return visit in the future.

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Seasons Greetings to all customers

Killin Community Council

A meeting of the Killin Community Council took place on Tuesday 10 October 2000.

John MacPherson, Chairman, announced that the contract to prepare, surface and fence the new civic amenity site had been won by Stitt Bros, Killin. The work was due to start week beginning 2 October.

The meeting with Forth Valley Health Board and the Forth Valley Acute Hospitals NHS Trust, regarding proposed changes was regarded as useful and successful. It was accepted that it was impossible to please everyone, however, our concerns were made clear regarding maternity and paediatric services being moved to Falkirk.

Councillor Ffinch indicated that Stirling Council had expressed concerns over the validity of some of the statistics that provided the basis for the proposals. The Council had put forward a whole package of statistics to back the case for maternity and paediatrics remaining at Stirling.

Water, Water Everywhere!?

A letter was written to East of Scotland Water expressing concerns over the recent water shortages, particularly after the substantial investment in the Killin

water system. A reply from R Graves, Customer Services Manager, indicated that an investigation would be carried out as soon as possible.

The problem may have been compounded by water leaking from Craignavie through a pipeline under Graham Wilson's house. Whether it was a contributing factor or not has still to be determined. However, it is clear from his letter to the Community Council that his complaint was not listened to sympathetically by Stirling Council until after our MSP intervened at Mr Wilson's request. Stirling Council, which seems to have the ultimate responsibility to repair this particular leak, took over 5 months to take action and appears to have caused Mr Wilson a considerable amount of frustration and concern over the period.

Christmas Lights

John Mallinson indicated that he had contacted Stirling Council and had collected several small sets of Christmas lights, which would be excellent for this year's Christmas celebrations. It was commented that the newly acquired lights may preclude the need for a Christmas Lighting Grant from Stirling Council - however this will be reviewed.

Killin Ambulance Service

Further to local and Community Council concerns and comments on this issue raised at the previous meeting, a letter had been received from Sylvia Jackson MSP expressing her support.

Council Car Park Rubbish

Stirling Council is now providing a weekly pick-up to help reduce the unsightly build up of rubbish. It was agreed that whilst this new service could not totally eradicate the build up completely, it was an excellent addition to the services provided by the Council.

SusTrans Cycle Way

A letter had been written expressing our concern about the safety of the A85 crossover point for bicycles at Glen Ogle, also funding for repair of the south Loch Tay road. Cllr. Ffinch will raise the matter with Stirling Council.

Community Planning Seminar

The above seminar was attended by John MacPherson representing Killin Community Council. John indicated that it was useful to understand the planning system and its complexities. One problem raised was the timing and frequency of Community Council meetings. Being once every two months, they were insufficient to allow complete interface with Stirling Council planning procedures. It was accepted that there was little that could be done about this unless there was a proposal for change. No proposal was put forward.

Highland Area Bus Services

John Mallinson expressed his concern over rumours of a reduction or withdrawal of subsidies that currently allow Post Buses to carry passengers. Cllr. Ffinch confirmed that these subsidies might be taken away if nothing is done. It was agreed that some effort needed to be directed to ensure continuation of the Post Bus Service.

Breadalbane Park

Cllr. Ffinch indicated that it is Stirling Council's contention that the park belongs to them. His comment only serves to emphasise that this issue needs early resolution by the newly elected Community Council members.

Local Ambulance Man Retires

The colleagues of recently retired ambulance man, John Stewart, have asked the Community Council to consider organising a village collection to commemorate John's 25 years of service. It was agreed that John MacPherson and Bill Douglas would take appropriate action to raise funds, as a thank you for his considerable contribution.

Suzanne Player raised a request from the organisers of the Killin Web Site for assistance from the Killin Community Council to back an application for funding for a Web Video Camera costing around £2,000. It was agreed that this project deserved support but that it should be left to the new Community Council members to make a final decision.

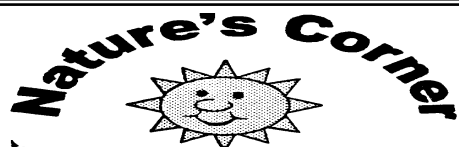
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Ardeonaig Hotel & Restaurant

Killin Man Receives Heart Transplant

Tony Whitehead and his wife Sue, sat and talked to us about the surgical operation Tony had undergone some three months ago, which gave him a new heart. He looked well and spoke with enthusiasm about our superb National Health Service which had done this for him.

Six years ago Tony was taken into the Western General Hospital in Edinburgh, and told he needed a new heart. Six years later, he was flown down to Newcastle where they "had a heart" which would be just right for him. The operation took seven hours, but he was on his feet again after just three days. Although he is doing very well, he has to attend the hospital frequently to check on the 'rejection situation'. He will be on medication indefinitely – but this is a small price to pay. We wish Tony and Sue all the very best for the future.

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“By The Way”

A meeting of Strathfillan Community Council was held in Crianlarich Village Hall on 4th October.

The Rev. Andy Campbell, Interim Moderator, was invited to discuss the closure of Strathfillan Church, and the lack of public consultation. Out of a population of 373, only 61 were members of the church. There were 4 buildings, [including the manse] to maintain, and the number of churches

in the parish (including Dalmally) was too much for one minister. The church could no longer afford the upkeep of all these buildings, and the cost of repairing the Strathfillan church had been estimated at £250,000. The decision to close the church was made by the Kirk session, who are all local people. Rev. Campbell finished by re-iterating that the church is not a building, people are the church, a church without walls. The local village halls could be used for services.

Crianlarich has been having trouble getting its bins emptied on the scheduled day; sometimes it has been up to 3 days later. It is believed that the size of the lorry is the main cause; it is not adequate in summer when there are tourists in the area. Cllr. Ffinch is to take it up and liaise with Roy Howard who has been pursuing the matter.

If a certain firm gets the contract for road maintenance, they are considering leasing the land opposite Crianlarich Station, Glenfalloch Road to use as a depot for storing their vehicles. It could mean 20 jobs, of which 6 would be local.

Moira Robertson/Suzanne Player are trying to set up a local focus group to involve the council tenants in Strathfillan, Killin, Lochearnhead and Balquhiddel. It will consider whether any improvements could be made to the service, and the future of council housing. It is hoped to deliver flyers to all council tenants in the next few weeks.

There are changes being introduced to the way the Housing benefit and Council Tax benefit is processed. The main changes are that specific forms to prove your National Insurance Number and identity have to be provided. All items must be original, but they do not want benefit books to be posted. Also a visiting officer is to be appointed to do home checks, which will be unannounced.

Is there any prospect of a cycle track in Crianlarich? In the short term, the answer is no, but it could form part of the Trailways project by the SCDT. It will be put as an aspiration in the new regeneration strategy.

Stirling's Biodiversity Action.

Biodiversity is the variety of life around us. It is all living things from trees to flowering plants, from birds to butterflies, from the common place to the greatly endangered. It is the multitude of all living things on earth and the places where they live. There is an alarming downward trend in the abundance of many plants and animals found in the UK. Biodiversity is a prime indicator of environmental quality, so if it is declining then it is likely that our health and wealth will suffer in the long run.

We need to improve the quality of the low biodiversity areas (most of Scotland) as well as expand the high biodiversity areas (nature reserves, semi-natural habitats). Biodiversity Action Plans (BAPs) will provide the advice on how to start doing this. These plans will be written by working groups, that consist of local experts and interested members of the public who have volunteered to join.

Our recently launched Biodiversity Audit has identified the species and habitats of local and national concern we find in Stirling and what their present status is. This gives us an idea of what species and habitats the first Biodiversity Action Plans need to be written for.

The writing of an action plan is not the end of the biodiversity process but the beginning. We intend the plans to be of practical help to those people on the ground wanting to do something. It is down to all of us to change our habits to include biodiversity in our lives and not to exclude it as we have done in the modern age.

Kate's Cakes

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Community Resource Centre Support from all Sides

Enthusiasm and commitment for the development of a Resource Centre in Killin has continuously been shown from local people and is now being matched by outside agencies. The Royal Incorporation of Architects in Scotland, Scottish Enterprise Forth Valley and Forth Valley Health Board have all offered funds for the feasibility stage. This is clear evidence of their support for a project which has grown out of what local people have said they need. Stirling Council are providing administrative assistance and the group are hopeful that they will also bring financial backing through a community grant.

It is important at this stage to write again of the background and process that has to be gone through to get from the Health & Social Care Study which showed the need for such premises, to actually getting some sort of building on the ground.

Colin Roxburgh of the Small Town & Rural Development Group was commissioned by the local GPs to look into the health and social care needs in this area - to document gaps in services and identify solutions with help from local people who took part in focus groups in the area.

The resultant report not only identified gaps, but also showed that organisations which provide the missing services are keen to work from a base in this area. Several local groups also felt that they would benefit from alternative premises.

With evidence of need, and of the desire by service providers to fulfil that need, this was an opportunity too exciting to miss. It was vitally important that the report did not gather dust but was used to improve facilities. A Steering Group of interested local people was formed in March 2000 to progress this.

The most obvious answer has been to look at a multi use resource centre which could house all the services in one place. It was clear that professional help would be required to look at the feasibility of such a centre. We need to know where it could be; who would use it; what it would look like; how much it would cost to run and where the money would come from to build and run such a place.

The Steering Group has now asked Colin Roxburgh to continue the work he began last year. He will assist the Steering Group through the process of producing a feasibility study, business plan and completed funding applications as well working with an architect to produce plans for the centre. However, it should be noted that if it becomes clear that this project is not feasible or an alternative way to improve services is identified, the work will not continue.

It has been agreed to call the group KLS (Killin, Lochearnhead, Strathfillan) Resource Centre Steering Group to reflect the fact that the centre would provide services for all these communities.

We have all at some time remarked when emerging fully laden from the grocers shop, "And I only went in for a pint of milk!" What of The Village Store at St. Fillan's - you go in for groceries and come out having bought a beautiful carpet!

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There's no one about, is there?

How often did we hear that phrase during the summer months of 2000? It was eerie to walk up the Main Street, in Killin, on a Tuesday afternoon in late July and see only one car parked and not one person on the pavement. We can take solace only from the fact that this was the picture over most of Scotland, and much of the UK, during the 'holiday season'.

It has been a strange year for tourism with some businesses maintaining results of previous years, some having a widely varying season, whilst others struggled to survive. Very few businesses will have exceeded their figures from the previous year. If they have, you can be fairly sure that it is either a relatively new venture just starting to build up trade, or an establishment, under new ownership, which had possibly been so bad - it could only get better! Or, perhaps, if we may suggest, a brand new Tourist Information Centre that is on the coach party itinerary, or doorstep!

As usual the figures published by the Scottish Tourist Board appear to bear little or no resemblance to what is happening in the real world. One has to question just where they gather their information. Perhaps they only ask those businesses that they know do well and therefore can always produce good figures! There can be little doubt that the continued influx of tourists to Edinburgh and Glasgow colours the picture. The STB's obsession with marketing short breaks, combined with the cheap flights from the south to both destinations, must give many the impression that this is all Scotland really has to offer. The national weather forecasts are no help either when, during a good summer such as this year, they continually give a false picture of what is really going on. It is only when the visitor ventures into our beautiful countryside that they begin to appreciate Scotland in a wider sense.

The poor exchange rate and the high cost of fuel in the UK have severely damaged the European market. That will take some time to recover and despite huge amounts of money being used at the present time to 'target' for example, the German market, this will not bring them to our shores if they can go elsewhere on a better exchange rate. The fuel protest, the motives of which, in principal, a large percentage of the population supported, was a disaster for many types of businesses, particularly in rural areas. Thousands of pounds of tourism business were lost as visitors went home early or cancelled because of the fuel shortage. In a reasonable year this could have been made up but not in a poor year like this one.

There is no doubt that quality and good value for money are high priorities for the majority of visitors. Unfortunately, many in the tourist industry have yet to learn what that means, particularly with regard to food, service and friendliness, and the tourists as well as the media continue to pick up on that point. A smile costs nothing. A meal cooked from fresh ingredients costs less than the mass produced 'freezer to microwave' food that you see in hotel bars and restaurants all over the country. A few minutes of friendliness to a visitor is often worth an extra nights stay or a repeat visit to you!

This summer has demonstrated how important tourism is to Scotland and to Killin. Sadly the reputation of a

community is too often, only as good as the worst establishment in it! Until all those who make their living in some way from tourism acknowledge that fact and make a determined effort to work together to provide a quality service, across the board, it will be an uphill struggle. For too long Scotland has marketed itself cheaply and not valued the qualities that it has to offer. It has the potential to be on a par for tourism with a country such as Switzerland, a quality destination offering quality service at all levels and charging appropriately for it.

There is something sadly wrong with Scotland's approach to tourism when banners at the Standard Life Loch Lomond 2000 golf competition, televised around the world, invite you to **visit Ireland!** **GF**

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Love Is All You Need

We live in a global society dominated by absolute selfishness and predatorial competition. The drive for profit, particularly by large global organisations is endangering all life on earth. It's damaging rural economies, farms, post offices, shops, banks and health, the atmosphere and the weather. This scenario was highlighted on Friday, 20 October 2000 in the 'Daily Mail' and 'Herald' with articles 'Earth will be used up in 75 years' and 'Why the Earth is Not Big Enough' which warned of declining natural resources due to over consumption.

I believe most thinking people are aware of this situation, but feel helpless to precipitate a change. It is unlikely to be changed by governments or large corporations because they are primarily responsible for its creation. It can be

changed from the roots upwards, like a tree, by geographic communities who, afterall, comprise voters and taxpayers getting together and influencing factors affecting their lives. Communities, area wide, and ultimately throughout Scotland and the planet could work together, utilise communication technology and create a community orientated society.

A successful entrepreneur in Strathfillan referred to such a society as communism but, in fact, it could be better described as community-ism. Communism and capitalism are generally ruled from the centre by fear and money respectively whereas, community-ism is ruled from the outside or grass roots by love.

About 18 months ago I was one of the speakers at an event hosted by Stirling Council whose guests from over 40

countries, were the International Association for Community Development (IACD). I gave a speech about the success of the Strathfillan Community Development Trust which, evolved from our regeneration strategy. Afterwards both Carol Kelly – the secretary of the 'Trust' and I were independently questioned by a professor of sociology from Israel. He particularly wanted to know what motivated us, why did we spend all this time and effort on voluntary work for our community. We both thought deeply and gave him the answer 'Love'. He told us that the principles we were using were similar to those originally utilised by the Kibbutz who had in recent years lost their way due to privatisation.

Last weekend the Trust and our community hosted the annual meeting of 'Reforestation Scotland' from Friday night to Sunday lunchtime. During my introductory speech as a member of the panel on the Saturday night I related this theme of community-ism and asked the meeting, "How can you change a society?" I repeated the question a number of times to give it emphasis and then suggested that the easiest way of changing a society is to (re)-educate the children: Our society is deeply perplexed by many negative tendencies particularly with regard to young and impressionable people. We vainly endeavour to resolve these problems, such as, substance abuse, vandalism, theft, violence and bullying by increasing rules and laws to control and punish the perpetrators. However, before we can resolve such problems we need a better understanding of their root cause – which is possibly that they have little influence over factors affecting their lives and feel helpless.

A wonderful solution to this problem is 'Education in Human Values' (EHV) which can be taught to children from a very young age: Using techniques such as role playing, discussion groups, silent sitting, theme for the week and particularly by good example. The children are shown the application of 'Love' in their lives: Love in writing and speech is the truth. Love in action is right conduct and non-violence or non-violation of oneself, of others, of society, of all forms of life. The effect of love is peace – peace of mind, peace in the home, peace between nations and peace on earth: - 'Love is all you need'!

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Housing Development Plan for Killin

Plans for a further 30 houses to be built in Killin were revealed at a public meeting on the 5th September, chaired by John McPherson, Acting Chairman of the Killin Community Council. Clair Watts, of the Planning and Policy Services, Stirling Council, was the primary speaker.

The location of the site is to the north west of the village, off Fingal Rd. The area is roughly beyond the back garden walls of the Main Street properties, from the Bank House, Fishers Hotel and Rowancroft. Developers would comprise a partnership of Scottish Homes, Stirling Housing Association and the builder Ogilvie Homes. The objective is to increase the supply of reasonably priced housing. A mixture of private and council housing with a few self-build homes would accomplish this. Harry Smith, Development Officer for Community Self Build Scotland, spoke briefly about people being encouraged to build their own homes with advice and training opportunities (similar to the proposed set up for Crianlarich and that presently underway in Tyndrum – see Strathfillan Community Development Trust article on Page 4). There are grants available tied to certain criteria, the houses being in two different kit forms.

Mervyn's Weather

In the dissemination of knowledge, it is a far cry from the era of athletic man running many miles with a note stuck in a cleft stick, Town Criers, or even the crystal radio sets of the 1920's and 30's, to the modern media, radio, TV and internet. We now receive the latest news virtually as it occurs, visually and with the accompanying verbiage. The devastating eruption of the island of Krakatoa in the late 19th century had spread its subsequent dust cloud, which caused dramatic sunsets round the world, probably before most people knew the cause of the phenomena.

With present day efficiency, each weather occurrence, be it flood, snowfall or damaging gales, is available to the eyes and ears of everyone immediately. So indeed are discussions regarding change of climate, the content of which centres around 'Global Warming'.

When one considers the invisible air pollution released even in small cities, such as Perth or Stirling, and then multiply this by all the main centres of population throughout the world, the result must be horrendous. The other side of the coin however, is that there are huge areas of sea and land where little or no pollution occurs. In the Russian steppes or the Gobi desert, the odd sandstorm and possibly some methane gas emitted from the occasional Bactrian camel or yak constitute the only pollution. Likewise other empty quarters of this planet such as the Sahara and Australian deserts. Indeed the empty spaces could be said to be diluting pollution.



Other factors involved in climate and weather 'hiccups' would include the various fluctuations in the temperature of the seas and oceans, El Nino and submarine volcanic activity. Other components could be said to be sun spot activity. These gigantic eruptions of gases, often hundreds – even thousands – of square miles in size occurring, it would appear, every eleven years or so on the surface of the sun. They send out streams of particle dust across the ninety two million miles or so of space between their source and earth and home-in on the magnetic poles causing the phenomena of Aurora Borealis and Aurora Australis. Could this be contributing to the 'holes' in the ozone layer?

Coming back to Earth, so to speak, September just past was less wet than that of 1999 with only 164 mm rainfall as compared with 209 mm. October 2000, with 11 days to go, is fast catching up on the same month in 1999 rainfall wise, and the price of fuel is up yet again.

Do you own, or want to own a pet? Maybe you have a problem with your pet, or are unsure as to what pet to get. Perhaps you have a funny story you want to share with other pet owners - if so - then read on!

I am Gill Hunt, and I moved with my family to the Killin area over a year ago. I have been keeping and rescuing animals since I was eight years old. I have worked with Wildlife and also done a course on the care of animals at College - I am happy to say I passed and got my certificate. I want to share with you some of the things I have learned and would love to hear your experiences.

Of course the golden rule of taking on any animal is that you **MUST** discuss it with your parents. With Christmas coming soon, you must also remember that unlike a toy, a pet is for life. The next important rule is **NEVER** buy on impulse. Always, plan for your animal first. When you think you know what you want, it is vital that you first find out all you can about it. Buy a book, or go to the library, if you have access to the internet there is a lot of information about animals on there. You may well read something that will tell you that this is, after all, not the pet for you. On the other hand you may learn that you have indeed made the right choice. Next talk to friends who already have the pet of your choice. Find out all the good points and - very important all the bad things.

You next need to decide what you are going to put your pet in, and where this housing is going to go - parents will definitely have something to say about this. You must be very honest with yourself and decide if you have the time, each and every day, to take your pet

out for play and exercise. You will need to check for food and water every day and clean out soiled bedding several times a week. If a caged animal is not kept clean it will smell and you will not be popular with mum and dad. If you continue to not clean out the cage then your pet will become stressed, sick and die - imagine being shut in your bedroom with a loo you could never flush - yuk! Most important there is the big cost of setting up and keeping your animal. The ongoing costs of food and bedding, worming and de-fleaing, yearly vaccination costs and of course the vet bill.

Finally when you go to get your pet, try to take someone with you who knows about the creature you are buying. Once you have your pet home and settled it in to its new surroundings check it often, but don't handle it for 24 hours - everything will be strange, and it will need time to adjust. After that spend time to get to know your pet - don't rush it, and eventually you will have a special friend to spend many wonderful hours with.

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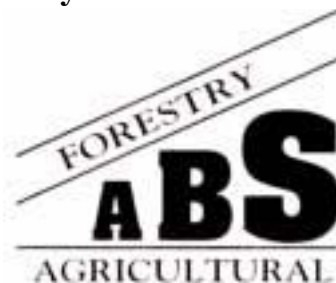

The Frost Report

It was very gratifying to watch the gold medal being won by Richard Faulds at the Olympics for double trap clay pigeon shooting, also the silver by Ian Peel for Olympic trap. For once cricket, football and tennis took a back seat bringing out shooting expertise as something both enjoyable and rewarding. Shooting could

not wish for two better ambassadors for the sport. It is to be hoped that this will not be our last ever in these medals as proposed government legislation could close the door on any new young people taking up the sport. 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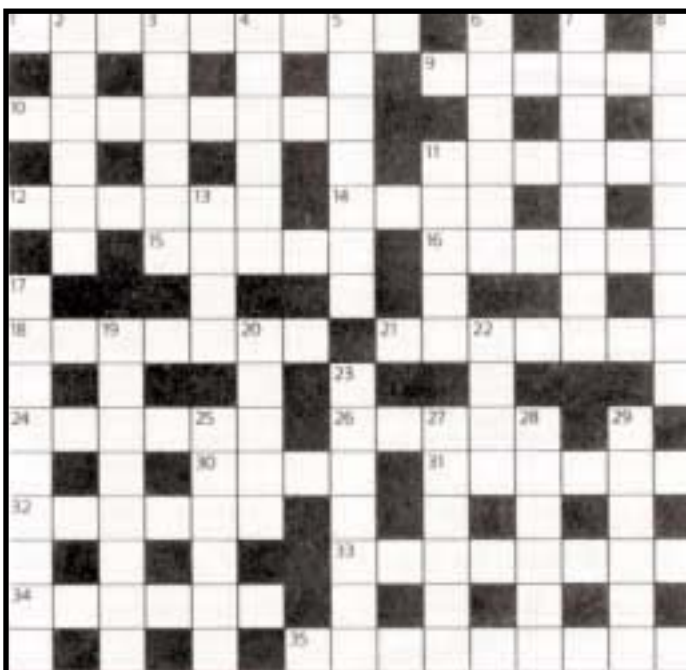

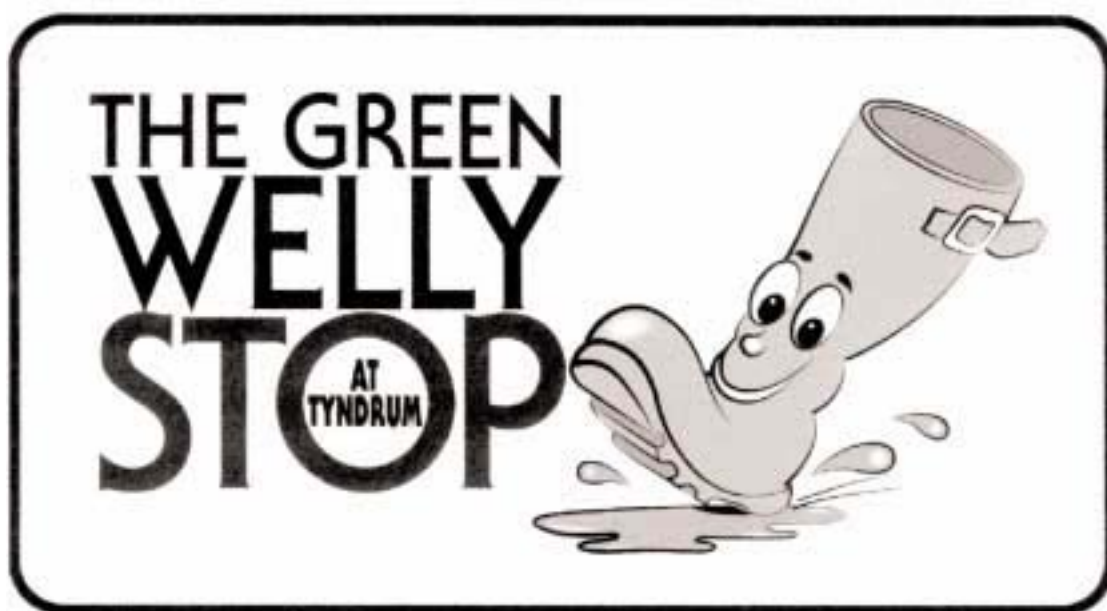

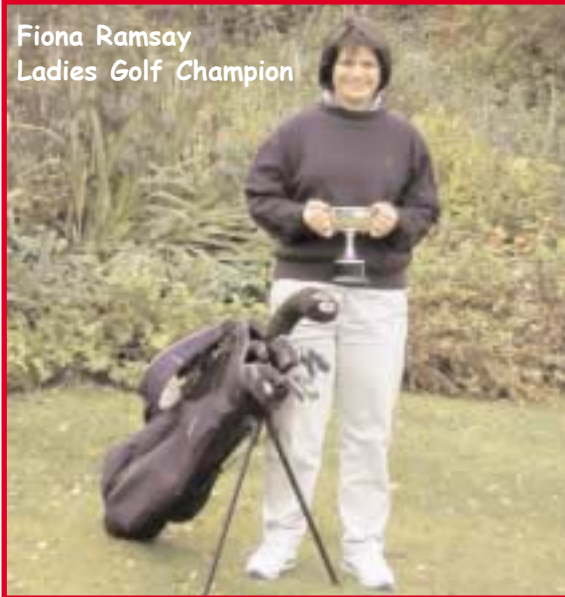
For These Are Our Mountains
