When the last edition of Killin News went to print, the front-page title was very appropriate. Whatever we felt about the rights or wrongs of the headline 'Killin Is Closed', (and isn't hindsight a wonderful thing?), the great majority of things villagers enjoy, and that people normally come to Killin to do, were closed to them. The article quite positively stated that Killin has much to offer the tourist - but you had to travel out of the village to do most of it at that time. If you relied on tourism for any part of your income, you did not need to see your name on the front page to feel empathy with the general cross section of businesses that were named.

A high percentage of visitors to this village like to walk. They are of all ages and abilities and their chosen routes vary from a gentle stroll down the old railway line and round the head of the Loch, to climbing Ben Lawers, the Tarmachans, and every 'Munro' in sight. At that time, all possible "off road" routes were closed, and we were being positively discouraged from walking even on public roads! Those who enjoy other types of outdoor activities were very limited as to what was available. Even those who just like to tour, and sit and enjoy the views, found that they were not welcome on some of their favourite routes, and the picnic spots and lay-bys were closed.

### When Will The Visitors Return? (continued from front page)

Sadly, as this very article is being written, there are still signs in our locality, pronouncing areas closed, and requesting that you keep out/off. Most of the hill land remains closed to walkers. Everyone is very much open for business, but for the number of tourists around during the past few weeks, other than on coach tours, most of the accommodation providers, cafes and retailers might as well have been closed because there has been little or no trade coming through their doors.

For any one now to say that Killin and the surrounding area does not rely on tourism for most of its livelihood, they must live in a very blinkered world. For a time, it felt as though Foot and Mouth Disease was in our very midst, and things could not have been much worse if it had been. Yes, we need to remain vigilant about the risk of spreading it, but it has come no closer to us, and the risk of tourists spreading it have remained the same - absolutely minimal!

However, the risk from within the agricultural community was brought home to us in early May, with the placing of a supervision order on a farm on Loch Lomondside, following the unauthorised movement of sheep into the area. How many cases, throughout the past few months, have been directly linked to the agricultural community?

The scientific evidence available, and the 'risk assessment plans', indicate quite clearly, that the 'risks', particularly on hill land, north of the Forth - Clyde line are negligible. Sadly, it would appear that over considerable areas of Perthshire and Stirling, there are many that continue to disregard that evidence and refuse access.

Throughout the 'crisis', Killin and District Tourist Association, along with other local associations and the area Tourist Boards, has been active on behalf of the communities in trying to improve the situation. Committee members have continued to lobby MP's, SMP's, Stirling Council, in fact everyone who they felt it was worth writing to - and some they thought it was not, but they lived in hope. They have produced posters informing visitors of the routes they could walk, and listed other activities available and generally attempted to give out a very positive message about the area. Despite all the efforts, cancellations for accommodation

continue to be received, the passing trade is non-existent, and the day visitors have been very limited at weekends.

In early April and May, the Association organised meetings between land owners/farmers and a cross section of businesses in the area. The meetings were to be a sharing of information with a view to possibly freeing up some access to the surrounding countryside. Sadly, there was considerable reluctance from those members of the land owning/farming community present, to consider opening up any land, as they felt the 'risk' was just too great.

The 'risk' to the whole of the rural community is even greater. It is not scare mongering to suggest that should the present scenario continue for much longer, businesses may be forced to close. If that was to be a retailer or a specific service provider there can be no doubt that those queuing up to take over will be few and far between. And, once such a service disappears from this village, it is highly unlikely that it would ever be replaced.

Since early May there have been some positive moves, and thanks to the efforts of the local NTS staff, the Ben Lawers Trail/Visitor Centre Nature and Moirlanich Longhouse opened. With the walks in Acharn Forest open for the past few weeks, as well as the cycle route from Killin to Glen Ogle, and the West Highland Way, this has helped a little. Now that the Tarmachan Ridge and Ben Lawers are open, and there is access to Sron a Clachain, we can only hope that others will follow suit in allowing access to the countryside again. However, the fact remains that people are generally unable to walk on the local hills, and have to drive to Glen Lyon, Schiehallion, Glencoe, Arrochar and much further afield. These areas are all within travelling distance, but it has been very difficult to comprehend why the local hills are not 'open' too, and there can be no doubt that before much longer, people will begin to ignore the advice to 'keep off' and just go anyway. If they are not already doing so!

The losses currently being suffered by all areas of the business community will never be replaced. And no one should underestimate the extent of those losses, not just in Killin but in surrounding communities. For some it is hundreds of pounds and for others it is thousands of

pounds. Just as business along the West Highland Way totally disappeared, one accommodation provider in the centre of Killin saw their March income do the same, as all those with reservations cancelled. All of these prospective guests were 'walkers', of one kind or another, who were not prepared to consider alternative activities. This resulted in a loss of income for that month of almost £3000. Other businesses, in all sectors, reported losses of between 60% and 90%. No business can sustain that kind of loss when there is little sign of a rapid recovery in the near future.

If we work on the assumption that all 50 members of the Killin and District Tourist Association incurred losses of £3000 in March, allowing for the huge range in size of business, the worst scenario could amount to a loss of income to Killin of over £150,000. Spread that over the 2001 season, and it amounts to over £1,000,000. Spread it over the Crianlarich, Tyndrum, Lochearnhead areas and you are talking vast sums of money. And this does not take into account the 'knock-on effect' to other businesses reliant indirectly on tourism for income, and non members. Those who service the agricultural industry have suffered too, and the farmers in the area have lost income from their self catering, B&B, and the livestock trade, but they can not deny that they still have their animals to sell, and their subsidies to claim. The income lost from visitors is gone forever.

What will happen during the rest of this year is anybody's guess and we can only hope for improvements on every front. Until confidence is restored in all areas of the rural community, some feelings of resentment will continue to be generated amid serious cause for concern for the future. And, until the visitors return to holiday in Scotland again, the local economy will continue to suffer.

We all love the countryside, but it is a sobering, and very worrying thought, that one sector of the rural community, which contributes a relatively small percentage to the rural economy, can influence the future of so many other And when advised to businesses. diversify, to which activity does a high percentage of the agricultural community turn? Tourism!

#### The Future of Council Housing

The Stirling Tenants Project came about because of the Scottish Executives policy regarding the manner in which affordable housing should be delivered in the future. New Housing Partnership is the Executives policy for councils to consider transferring housing stock to a Registered Social Landlord (operating on a voluntary, not profit basis).

Stirling Council applied for money from the Scottish Executive to investigate all the options for the future ownership and management of council houses.

Stirling Council wants to look at all the options in partnership with tenants. They held two Council Housing Conferences, and from this a steering group of tenants was formed. The steering group appointed the Tenants Participation Advisory Service and recruited the Stirling Project Team. Our aim is to make sure that tenants have all the information they need to make informed decisions. To do this we would like to set up Tenant Groups in all the communities affected in the Stirling Council area and to increase membership of the Steering Group so it becomes more representative of tenants as a whole.

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### **New Housing In Killin**

Readers will remember that the proposal is for approximately 30 houses, with some private and some council housing. In order to visualize the area to be covered we show an Indicative Site Plan. The darker black line running from Fingal Road shows the site to be developed.



### The 'Lone Ranger' Lives On

We heard recently about an incident involving a young badger trapped in a snare just outside Killin. The snare was concealed within a dry stone wall and the poor badger was caught around the waist. It had been in the snare for some time and had been making desperate attempts to free itself. The snare had cut into the animal's body. Fortunately, it was found, and with some difficulty it was released from the snare. Although it was confused and distressed, it did eventually wander off, we hope to live a long life.

We would like to take this opportunity to inform people that self locking snares are totally illegal. If you find one you should report it to the SSPCA or the police immediately. It is incredible to think that here in the year 2001 people are still setting snares. In Germany they have been outlawed since the First World War! The majority of the countries throughout Europe ban their use, except the UK.

John Cormack of the SSPCA had me cringing on the phone, when he described to me the distress suffered by animals caught in snares, and the horrific death they must

experience. John also said that snaring is extremely rife in Scotland, and that the SSPCA, who deplore and oppose all forms of snaring, are quite aware of the abuse. Recently John discovered in one area, over 300 illegally set snares, which had been specifically set to trap badgers.

And, to those irresponsible people who set snares – of the legal or illegal variety - remember they do not discriminate for rabbits or foxes. Cats, badgers, otters, deer, and other wildlife are all potential victims too. *Ed* 



### Green Team in Full Flow

The summer meetings of the Green Team began with members braving an icy north wind, and snow showers, to investigate the secrets of the Falls of Dochart. After establishing the 'hows and whys' of the Falls and seeing evidence of the power of the water, the science began. Did you know that residents of Stirling District produce 40,000 tons of household waste each year, and that this creates not only pollution but also massive problems of disposal? Or that 80% of the world's resources are consumed by only 20% of the population, and that 90% of these resources end up as waste? Or that if everyone who

leaves a TV set on standby switched it off each time, the power from one UK power station would be saved? Or that we each need

up to 85 tonnes of natural resources every year to support our lifestyle?

These and other frightening facts were presented as parts of various displays at an Environmental Action Day presented by EAK at the McLaren Hall on 28 April. With the support and help of various organisations (John Muir Trust, Scottish Native Woodland Trust, Proven Engineering Products Ltd., National Wind Power Ltd., National Energy Foundation, R.S.P.B, and Stirling Council), they organised stands with facts on gardening, shopping, woodlands, energy efficiency and composting. All designed to promote awareness of how each of us can help prevent waste and pollution.

The event was well attended and the lectures by Billy Sloane of the Energy Saving Trust and David Hopper of Stirling Council on Waste Reduction were listened to intently. Stirling Council's compost bins at a greatly reduced price were eagerly snapped up and displays featuring wind and solar power, saving woodland and natural habitats provoked thought. We all know we ought to be doing something about the environment, but how many of us get further than thinking about it? If action is not taken now, it may soon be too late.

EAK has also been busy organising questionnaires and surveys about local paths around Killin, in order to get an idea of whether and where people would like either more paths, or improved paths. Together with Stirling Council's Access Office, Richard Barron, they hope this will result in developing a path network and focussing their practical work on the existing paths. *MM*

#### Syringes Keep Yourself Safe

It can be every communities nightmare to find discarded syringes/needles in public places such as parks etc. Stirling Family Support Service has launched a 'Syringe' Safety' leaflet which highlights some simple guidelines on what action to take and who to contact if you find discarded syringes/needles.

**Do not touch it**, inform Stirling Council 0800 23 23 23 or Central Scotland Police 01786 456000

**Do not panic**, squeeze wound so it bleeds, wash with soap and water, apply antiseptic, retain syring/needle if possible and contact Accident & Emergency as soon as possible.

A person who is pricked or scratched with a discarded needle has only a remote risk of being infected with HIV, Hepatitis C, Hepatitis B or tetanus.

### Killin Community Bus

The Annual General Meeting of the Killin Community Bus will take place on Monday 28 May 2001 at 7.30 pm in the Lesser McLaren Hall. All are welcome to attend.

### Killin Community Council

A meeting of the Killin Community Council was held on 8 May 2001.

The Chairman, John MacPherson introduced Helen Munro (Stirling Council), who explained the new booking system for Breadalbane Park which should now avoid any double bookings.

Mr Peter Pearson of Rural Stirling Housing Association gave a presentation explaining the various aspects of the proposed housing development at Fingal Road. He stated that the present plans envisaged a total of 32 houses on the site, of which 17 will be Association 3, 4, and 5 person houses for rental, 10 private development, and 5 self build. Allocation for the Association houses will be by means of a points system with local (Lochearnhead to Crianlarich) people, those with connections, work or family in the area, normally gaining most points.

Mr H Smith of Self Build Scotland, was also introduced. He stated that there were 5 plots earmarked for 'self-build' to this scheme. However mortgage facilities have to be available, so work would not start until the end of 2001 or early 2002

Following informal talks regarding the Nurses Clinic at Ballechroisk, it is hoped that a formal planning application will be submitted by next April.

National Park. In the latest consultation document, Killin is not included within

the boundaries of the proposed Park. The Bill will be debated in the Scottish Executive in June.

Civic Amenity Site. Stirling Council is concerned about the amount of industrial waste being deposited in the skip. Offenders are reminded that the site is under CCTV surveillance.

John MacPherson reported that a number of people had commented to him on the clean state of the Main Street. A letter of appreciation will be sent to the Village Officer (Jake) to thank him.

After negotiation with Stirling Council, extra refuse bins are to be provided at the car parks at Capercaillie, McLaren Hall and Old Station Yard. Also, a bin for disposal of dog fouling will be provided near the toilets at the Old Station Yard.

South Loch Tay Road. The Chairman reported that Stirling Council was aware of the situation, but felt there was no point doing repairs until the present timber extraction had been completed.

Roads Depot. The Chairman reported that at a recent Stirling Assembly meeting, 'Bear Scotland' had indicated that the winter maintenance of trunk roads would be as good if not better than before. John was assured by Stirling Council that they were urgently investigating the winter maintenance of non trunk roads in the Killin area.



A former shooting lodge, Suie Lodge is a fully licensed hotel overlooking the River Dochart midway between Killin and Crianlarich.

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The Trustees of McLaren Hall, had given a cautious response to approaches made by the KLS Steering group. A meeting of the KLS group is due to take place shortly, after which the public will hopefully become more involved and informed of the proposals.

The Killin Website is approaching its first anniversary, but still no success in obtaining a grant for a web camera.

The Community Council is anxious to recruit a female youth member to the CC.

Skateboarding. The group visited a site at Kippen, which cost approx. £35,000. Enquiries are to continue, and the youngsters are currently fundraising.

Fassiefern Wall. The Co-op indicated that as a gesture of good will, they will contribute towards the cost of repairs.

The CC had no objections to the planning application by Killin and Ardeonaig Church, for alterations to the Vestry.

East of Scotland Water, Planned Capital Investment at Ardeonaig Water Treatment Works will be discussed at the CC meeting on 10 July.

Foot and Mouth. A member of the public stated that information about access to the countryside was misleading. It was stressed that local landowners and farmers were happy to provide local information and the local Tourist Office also had an up to date leaflet about this.

Following a complaint that parked vehicles were causing difficulties to residents of the Kirk Care, the Surgery Manager, will request that visitors do not park opposite the complex's car park.

It was agreed to look into the possibilities of holding a Farmers Market in Killin.

The next Killin Community Council meeting will be 10 July 2001, at 7.30 p.m. in Lesser McLaren Hall.

The Chairman John MacPherson gave a brief summary of some of the achievements and failures, which occurred over the last 12 months. John expressed thanks to both present, and former members of the community council, for their support. He also stated how gratifying it was to have a full complement of councillor's (12), plus one youth representative. Also encouraging was the assistance given by Suzanne Player (Community Animateur) and Tony Ffinch (Councillor). Their attendance at most meetings and information about Stirling Council business was invaluable.

Some of the achievements were: the location of a waste skip at the Old Station car park, the extension of a car-park in Craignavie Road, and the provision of handrails to assist disabled persons entering a Council house. We did not manage to further the proposal to extend the cemetery car-park at present, nor the much needed repairs to the South Loch Tay road, but are still pursuing these, and other matters.

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### Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park

At the end of March, Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH) issued a document, "The Report on the proposal for a Loch Lomond and The Trossachs National Park". This report runs to 92 pages, and is available on request from SNH, Battleby, Redgorton, Perth. PH1 3EW.

The report was published on behalf of the Scottish Executive under Section 3 of the National Parks (Scotland) Act 2000. The main point of interest, in as far as the area covered by the Killin News, is contained in pages 25 and 26, with regards to boundaries. In short, the Reporter recommends that the Strathfillan and Glendochart area, (including Killin) be **excluded** from the Park. The Reporter's conclusion reads as follows:-

"On the basis of the consultation we have undertaken, the arguments for inclusion and exclusion of this area are finely balanced. In the light of the frequently stated view that the whole of Glendochart and Strathfillan should be treated together, our conclusion is that the area should be excluded. This decision is grounded in the absence of any consensus in the area, or nationally, in favour of inclusion.

However, we note the strong and growing reliance of the communities of the area upon tourism, hill walking and mountaineering. This may mean that a future Park Authority will wish to work with Stirling Council and others on joint strategies for the management and development of opportunities in the area.

We note to, the particular local support in Killin for the Park to include that community."

It may be of some interest to readers to note the Reporter's conclusion in regard to the Loch Earn area. He states on page 27 as follows :-

"On the basis of the consultation we have undertaken, we conclude that Ben Vorlich, Glen Ogle and Loch Earn should be included in the park area, with the boundary drawn along the watershed boundary to the north."

#### Editors Note:

Just to add to John's report, I note in "The Villagers" newspaper (community newspaper for Balquhidder, Lochearnhead, Strathyre & St. Fillans) that the **Balquhidder residents voted to remain** OUT of the National Park. However, their views were "swept aside" by the reporter on the grounds that they (the reporters) "do not think that exclusion from the National Park would be in Balquhidder's interests". As "The Villagers" put it, "So much for consultation!"

I have to agree – why have they put on this fascade of consulting with locals when they will do just as they please? Killin voted to be within the Park – and is to be excluded. Balquhidder voted to remain out of the Park and is included. The bustling town of Callander was originally to be excluded, then there were objections from locals to the exclusion and some bits of Callander were then to be included. Then Callander residents kicked up such a fuss that it is now entirely within the Park.

Yet again, it would appear that the small voice of the rural village is given lip service. A copy of the full report, including maps showing the proposed boundaries, is available for inspection at Killin Library.

### Loch Tay Liaison Committee

The committee have been successful in getting access to about 55% of what is available to Trout Anglers on the Tay system. Of course there are restrictions, but true anglers are accepting these and making use of what is open for access. In general terms obey notices, and if fishing from a boat - do not go ashore. There are few reports of catches but as the weather warms up the trout will be on the take. Coarse anglers will be able to get similar access and we hope they will enjoy good sport. For the record in the Killin area anglers are able to access the loch shore below Cruachan and can fish by boat from Loch Tay Highland Lodges or from the River Lochay slipway. All other parts of the loch and river are not yet available but both the liaison web site, and the Killin Initiative web site will publish dates on availability. Local angling club members and visitors are requested to abide by the rules of access.

On the Trout Warden front, we have been very busy sorting out anglers who blatantly ignored warning notices, and did not buy permits. Grant Tigwell is coordinating this duty in Killin, and the TLC thank him for his efforts, and the local wardens who give freely of their time. All Wardens and Bailiffs should co-operate and go out and carry out their designated period on duty, as by so doing they share the time involved. Hopefully there will soon be a resumption in training sessions, and letters will be circulated when the next course will be held.

The thanks of TLC is due to the land owners for co-operating with the committee in giving access where possible, and in return the committee, and the wardens, will try their best to steer anglers away from restricted areas.

### **Spring Biodiversity Report**

After 6 months the Biodiversity Working Groups, the Steering group and myself have finished compiling the 18 page draft Habitat and Species plans, that will make up the first volume of Stirling Council Area's Biodiversity Action Plan.

This plan will provide a consistent, area wide conservation strategy relating to Stirling's most important, threatened or declining species and habitats. We believe that the actions contained in these plans will expand and improve habitats, and increase or safeguard populations of rare or threatened species. We also aim to improve the biodiversity of common habitats, making sure that these habitats and the species found there stay common.

We will be inviting comments on the plans, concentrating on the content of the plans and their suggested actions. The consultation will last from early May till late June. Thereafter we will produce the first volume in September. Two further volumes are planned.

Implementing the ACTIONS contained in the Biodiversity Action Plan is most important. We need to involve as many people as possible in taking forward the actions. If you would like to see a copy of the consultation draft they will be available from the beginning of May from Killin Library, and local council offices. Please let us know if there are changes needed and what you think of the plan.

### Obituaries

**Margaret Hargreave** died peacefully in St Leonard's Hospice, York on 30 April 2001, after a lengthy battle with cancer. She had remained in her home at Fingal Road, until just before Christmas 2000, when she went south to be near to her family of six children, twelve grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Margaret was born into a Quaker family in the Cotswolds in 1926, and enjoyed a rural upbringing and education at the school where her father was the Crafts Master. After leaving school she worked as a nurse in the Quaker Mental Hospital in York where she met her future husband, Norman, who also worked there. They married in 1943 and worked together for several years as wardens of an evacuation hostel near Keighley, before moving with their young family, to care for Norman's elderly parents in Sheffield.

The family grew to six and kept Margaret busy at home while they grew up in the 'Steel' city. She worked for many years as manageress of a home bakery while being active in the local Sorby Natural History Society, and taking increasingly regular holidays in Scotland.

Shortly after Norman's untimely death in 1977, Margaret moved to Stirling to live with her son, Michael, and quickly absorbed herself in a range of local activities. She joined the Clackmannan Field Studies Society, the Scottish Wildlife Trust, Stirling Field & Archaeology Society and Stirling Astronomical Society and was a keen participant in the Countryside Ranger walks. She joined the Stirling Oxfam shop as a volunteer, and for about 20 years spent two days a week working in their shop. Even when her illness made it difficult, she would set off on the 8am bus from Killin to Stirling and put in a hard days work before returning to Killin in the afternoon - often sharing the bus with the village youngsters she so admired for their spirit and friendliness.

Her move to Killin arose when Michael at last found himself a wife, and Margaret took the opportunity to come to the village when a bungalow became available in Fingal Road. She quickly settled into the village and made many very special friends, involving herself in several local organisations and thriving on the endless opportunity to indulge her passion for exploring the countryside. Her incredible knowledge of plants and particularly wild flowers made her a great asset on organised walks and she was often to be found on solo expeditions to widely scattered corners of the Breadalbane area, usually identifiable by her bright red coat and woolly hat !

Her years in Killin were surely the happiest of times amongst a neighbourhood of real characters and, as her illness progressed she gained marvelous support and affection from them. Her regard for Dr De Laat and the rest of the health centre staff was immense, and several times in her last few months, she wished they had been at hand in York. Her neighbours and friends in Killin kept up a steady stream of loving messages which she cherished dearly. Jessie McLeod's weekly letters would keep her up to date with village affairs while she eagerly awaited the next Killin News.

By the time this appears in print, Margaret's ashes will have been scattered on the top of 'her' hillside in sight of her old back door. I know she will be remembered affectionately for her quiet good humour, cheerfulness and indomitable spirit, while being sorely missed for her knowledge of and concern for local history and wildlife.

Jessie, remembered how Margaret would collect all the sheep wool from the fences. She would spin it herself, and from the wool, she knitted a beautiful jacket, which was put on display at Moirlannich Longhouse, in Glen Lochay.

Everyone who knew her, especially her neighbours in Fingal Road, send caring thoughts to all the family.

**John Laurie**, a well known local figure, died at the age of 99 on 10 April, 2001, in the Falls of Dochart Retirement Home. Many people have known John all their lives as a constant figure.

Born in Fuinary he married Jean McMillan in 1927 and lived for most of his life in north and west Perthshire, as a shepherd. John was a founder member of the revived Lochearnhead Highland Games after the war, and a Honorary President. He was also active in the Lochearnhead, Strathyre and Balquhidder Highland Society, and its successor the local An Commun branch.

John presented the 'Jean Laurie Trophy' to the Aberfeldy Mod, following the death of his wife, fourteen years ago.

He was ordained as an elder of the Kirk over fifty three years ago, and was also presented with a 50 years long service record. Another certificate of longstanding service (50 years) was awarded on the 100th Anniversary of the Killin Masonic Lodge.

John was very good at scrabble; I remember after he had beaten me, he said, "I've had longer to learn the words!". He had a wealth of anecdotes and sayings, a wonderful memory and a great character. He had a long and interesting life, we will miss him.

Daughter of the late Alexander Stewart and Anne MacDougall, Lillian was born at Crawfordsburn in Northern Ireland, moved with her twin brothers Alex and John, and her parents, to Glen Fincastle, then Tombreck on Loch Tayside. Educated at Breadalbane Academy in Aberfeldy, followed by a college course in catering, she served in the Catering Corps during the War and was posted to various depots in England. After being de-mobbed, Lillian joined Watsons Tobacco in Bristol, which was taken over by W D & H O Wills. When she moved to work in Glasgow, she and her late mother set up home in Rutherglen.

Lillian was a life long member of the National Trust and the RSPB, and was an active member of the Glasgow Walking Club. A keen Scottish country dancer and Scottish historian, Lillian gathered a large library of books, many of which she bequeathed to Breadalbane Academy. Holidays were spent on bird watching, National Trust excursions, or places of historical interest in the Mediterranean.
