

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BBC Filming in Killin and District

We only heard about it by accident. Word got around (as it does in Killin, often without Killin News!), that the BBC were trying to find accommodation in this area for 80 or so members of a film unit. After some enquiries, it turned out they were going to film part of a Christmas special episode of "Jonathan Creek".

Needless to say, the 80 odd people had to be accommodated in Killin, Crianlarich and Tyndrum. They also had a HQ consisting of about 7 base vehicles, i.e. office, stores, and technical vehicles in the rear car park at Tyndrum. It was there that I met Bart Bailey who told me the story, and allowed me to take photographs at one of the film locations.

The episode has the title of "Satan's Chimney" and stars Alan Davies (as Jonathan Creek) and Julia Sawaltha. The total number of people involved on an average day is between 60 and 70: Producer, Director, Assistant Director, 2nd Assistant Director (!), Design, Lighting, Wardrobe, Make Up, not to mention the many camera operatives, sound engineers etc., etc. Incidentally, they filmed for 11 hours every day!

The filming which I was allowed to witness for about 2 hours, will probably occupy only a few minutes of actual screened time. It was a shot in a shallow Highland river, not far from Bridge of Orchy, and involved the two main actors Alan Davies and Julia Sawaltha, paddling through the stone (he with wellies on – she in her bare feet!). In the story line, they come across a dead body which Julia nearly stands on. They shot the scene umpteen times until the Director was satisfied. All I could discover was that it was the boy of a dead magician - they would tell me no more!! Be sure not to miss the show at Christmas time.



The other interesting thing is that the film will be made in two places, the Killin area and Darlington Castle. They wanted the outdoor shots to be done with Scottish scenery, the indoor scenes would be shot later in the Castle. The whole drama would then be 'married' together by computer – and you won't even see the joins!

Altogether an impressive taste of drama, filming, painstakingly and carefully constructed, and very expensive in terms of the numbers involved and the time taken.

The Producer is Verity Lambert, Director Sandy Johnson (a Scot) and the script is by David Renwick.



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Strathfillan - "By The Way"

The Strathfillan Community Council held a meeting in Crianlarich village hall on Wednesday 3 October 2001. Ronnie McKenzie, Route Manager (NW South) Bear Scotland Ltd. attended the meeting to answer any questions raised. Several current problems were raised and noted. BEAR have promised that the roads will be gritted before the school bus travels from Stirling. They advised that everything should be reported through the free telephone number, because it gets logged and must be dealt with.

Raymond Bissett, Landscape Co-ordinator for Bear was due to attend this meeting, but didn't arrive.

A grant was received from Green Force Campaign for tubs and plants to brighten up the area around the notice board in Crianlarich. Thanks were extended to Jock Henderson for doing the planting. A Community Grant has been promised to enable the notice board to be replaced.

Jock attended a police seminar where the use of CS gas was demonstrated. He explained how impressed he had been, and appreciated that it is less damaging to the victim than a truncheon, whilst at the same time it offers protection to the officer. Every officer in Central should now be carrying a CS gas canister.

We received a letter from the Stirling Assembly detailing the members of the new Executive Committee. As part of its commitment to facilitating collaboration with Community Councils, the Stirling Assembly had included provision in its constitution for the election of Community Council delegates, to act as a focal point for groups of Community Councils. There are no Community Council delegates from the Highland Area and Eastern Villages. Murray Dickie is acting as a short-term contact for our area. By-Elections will be held in October, so by the time this appears in print, we may well have a representative.

Mobile phones and cartridges can be donated by phoning 01324 678900 and will benefit Strathcarron Hospice.

A Development and Community Safety Group meeting (part of Community Planning) was held in Balquhidder village hall. The presentations were Rural Community Issues by Colin Roxburgh, Community Futures, and Rural Business Survey by Ian McGhee, Rural Stirling Economic Partnership. The workshops discussed rural development over the next five years, and many very interesting points were brought up.

A letter from Steven Fraser, Customer Service manager (Forth Valley) East of Scotland Water, informed us about the Scottish Executive's intention to merge the existing three Water Authorities into one single organisation, 'Scottish Water'. Jon Hargreaves, current Chief Executive of East of Scotland Water will be the Chief Executive Designate and Alan Alexander, current Chairman of West of Scotland Water is to be Chair Designate. There needs to be a change in the legislation and the new Water Services Bill will be introduced to the Scottish Parliament in September and it is hoped will be passed by April 2002.

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Strathfillan Community Development Trust

2001 has been a year of consolidation and consultation. The Trust's AGM on the evening of Wednesday 28 November in Tyndrum Village Hall is a time for members to review the past year and look to the future.



2002 will, we trust, see our three main areas of work leap

forward: in Crianlarich progress on developing the old station yard opposite the school into something useful and attractive. In Tyndrum, more activities and community events for young and not so young; including action on the 'kickaround area'; and thirdly, linking both villages and both community woodlands, we hope to bring various parties together to create a cycleway.

The Trust projects that work best are those that have an active Working Group of locals who care. Sometimes they do the work, sometimes they give me the work to do, but with invaluable guidance, support and bright ideas. We will, in the coming weeks, be looking for volunteers for new Working Groups for these three projects - please consider seriously whether you can answer the call when it drops through your door.

The Strathfillan Community Development Trust Board members are pleased to



see that (at the time of writing, anyway) both Killin and Strathfillan are highly likely to be within the National Park boundary. Our Strathfillan consultation gave the strong message that not only was a cycle link between Crianlarich and Tyndrum important, but joining it to the National Cycle Network in the Lix Toll area is also on the wish list. This could be the first joint project involving Killin and Strathfillan under the umbrella of the National Park.

On 25 September this year, Killin Community Council was welcomed onto the Community Futures Programme, and as a part of this programme, I was appointed as your Community Agent. My role is to assist you in the development of your Community Action Plan, and to help and guide me in my work, a steering group has been set up.

The Community Action Plan brings together information about the community in a document which can be used to back up funding applications, to inform public agencies, and is circulated to the whole community. Included in the document is:-

• A statement about the communities own vision for its future

• Community facts and figures.

• A listing of the priority projects and actions identified by the community.

As part of the planning process, I am presently conducting interviews with representatives from a cross-section of the community, and I am gathering information for the community profile. The Survey Questionnaire will be going out to every household in November and it is hoped that a Workshop will be held in January next year. The Workshop will be your opportunity to put your view across and to discuss priority projects, and actions which have been pin pointed, and which you think are important.

The final Community Action Plan document will be produced after the Workshop has taken place, and it is hoped that a Report on the Workshop will be sent out shortly after the event.

Tay District Salmon Fishery Board

The annual meeting in Perth was informed of the considerable support for the 'Catch and Release' policy, particularly in the lower beats, where the majority of salmon caught in the early part of the season were tagged and returned. There were also gifted to the hatchery, the required number of salmon to carry out the programme designed to introduce fish to upper areas which are considered in need of an increased number of spawning fish.

The Freshwater Species Study, which was carried out by Killin Members with supervision by Dr David Summers, was considered of value, in that it did give an indication of which types of freshwater fish inhabited the survey area, and what their diet consisted of. This one exercise could not form the basis of what the larger picture may be but was considered useful as a starting point. Thanks were given the to Killin Club for its co-operation.

The Board is now working on seeding sections of the River Lochay and with the Hydro Board is looking at improving the efficiency of the Boreland Lift. The point was made that trout anglers sometimes do not take sufficient care in releasing salmon parr caught when fishing water where these juveniles are present. All anglers have the duty to look after the future of all stocks, so extra care should be taken with all undersized species.

The tagging policy will continue and hopefully next season the loch and upper rivers will see more fish returned. No fish were tagged in this area last year, but confirmed release reports of 9 on the West End of the loch and 1 on the river is encouraging. There were no reports of tagged fish being caught in the Killin area, most seemed to be on the Isla system and the Tummel.



Nine Thousand Year Old Hunting Camp Found On The Slopes Of Ben Lawers

The first meeting of the Killin Heritage Society for the winter season was held on 5 October. Stephen Boyle RCAHMS gave a lecture illustrated with slides, and images covering a survey undertaken during the year 2000/1 of Ben Lawers and the immediate surrounding slopes. The survey, funded in part by EU money and the National Trust, revealed a fascinating history. The results from it will provide the foundation for further work by the National Trust and Glasgow University.

Long before the Roman Empire and the Pyramids of Egypt a group of hunters from Mesolithic times (7000 BC) were pottering about high on the slopes of Ben Lawers. Carbon dating of charcoal in a pot dated at C.7000BC. When you think that this is about 1000 years after the end of the last ice age this is a remarkable discovery.

However, the cumulative evidence of human occupation was revealed by Stephen in his lecture eg., a stone axe "factory" (actually on the Tarmachan range); this latter giving evidence of trade, as the axe type found here has been found on 30 sites in Britain; a chambered cairn and additional rock sculptures in the shape of cup and ring marked stones; remains of bronze age cairns, and hut circles of medieval origins.

The lecture concluded with a picture of the change over from small Highland clachans to the system, brought in by the Age of Improvement in the late 1700's, when the farm patterns we can still see today were established. A summary report will appear on the RCAHMS website for those who are interested. AW

Christmas Message

The traditional message for the Christmas season has been one of peace and goodwill to all people in the aftermath of the September 11 events in America, and the response by America, Britain and others, peace seems to be a remote concept. As I write, we are

uncertain who is behind the Anthrax threat, indeed we are uncertain about so many things. Certainly by the time you read this, the world will have changed yet again. Who knows what will have happened in the troubled areas of the world?

The solutions sought by world leaders depend on strength, yet the Christian message is one based on weakness. The Bible tells us "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." What greater sign of weakness and helplessness could we be given than the babe of Bethlehem? The babe of Bethlehem was not born in surroundings befitting the Son of God, but in the place where animals slept, in a country ruled by a cruel king and occupied by a foreign army.

The Frost Report Frosty Weather - or Not!

Usually we see the first skiffs of snow on the tops in mid September, but this year it was the end of October before they arrived, and at the time of writing there have only been two frosts.

The stag stalking season finished on 20 October and the weather was still very mild, albeit very wet, for that time of year. Usually the last few days of the season are heralded by crisp frosty mornings, followed by bright clear days. Maybe it is the unseasonable warmth, or some other new environmental factor, but the rut did not seem to 'happen'. The rut is the red deer breeding season, when the stags collect up a harem of hinds (females), and spend all their time fighting off challengers. They roar over miles of hillside to tell anything interested that they are the monarch of that particular glen, and finding a little time here and there to mate with their harem of hinds. This event is not often seen (maybe they are shyer than we like to think). But this year, a regular stalking guest and myself, on the last day of the season, saw a stag cover two hinds in the space of a few minutes. We left him to his girls, as he stood with a glazed expression - possibly wondering where to get his next viagra!

The same guest had another unusual experience on another day's stalking. A stag which he had shot rolled into one of those broillaching holes we talked about in the last issue of Killin News. The wet weather had made this hole particularly soft, and soon all that was left in view were the antlers, and it was with quite a struggle that we managed to get it free.

Near Creag Mhor, at the edge of a hill lochan, a heron was standing rigidly still with its long beak pointing vertically skywards. He was watching an eagle overhead and presumably trying to look as least like an eagle's lunch as possible. He stood still long enough and the eagle passed on towards Glen Lochay.

Talking of mild Autumn weather - there were butterflies on the hill in late October and tiny toadlets, no bigger than the end of your pinkie, hopping around. I wonder whether it's likely that they will survive. There are certainly a great many larger toads and frogs still around and not yet down in the mud for the winter.

There are large flocks of fieldfares finishing off the blaeberries on the hill, their purple droppings very noticeable when you are crawling through the heather. As you lie spying the deer, you hear the rush of wings as another flock go zooming overhead. They seem just as hungry - frosty weather or not.

Large flocks of geese have been having trouble orienteering on the very misty mornings and taking a few turns around the Glen before finding their bearings.

At the start of the hind season (directly after the stag season ends) a couple of hinds were shot early in the day and left to be collected later. When we returned, an eagle was sitting on one of the carcasses in the process of enjoying a free meal (wonder if

it was the same poor guy who didn't spot the heron?). It reminded me of a good many years ago in the North watching an eagle who had done the same thing and was so heavy that it took him four attempts to take off.

Regardless of the temperatures, the trees recognise the time of year and are shedding their beautiful colours. On several mornings while feeding the pheasants - and the large number of small wild birds who are attracted to the feed rides - the larch needles have been drifting down like tiny snowflakes making their golden yellow carpet on the ground.






Student Of The Year

ervyn's Weather

It is almost inevitable in the British Isles that the opening gambit of conversation on meeting someone will refer to the weather. Weather affects everyone in varying degrees, even city commuters and office workers must decide whether or not to carry their umbrellas for the short dash from



car to their place of work. At the other end of the scale those of us in close contact with nature and the elements are more or less ruled by the vagaries of weather. How boring it must be to meet up with a Bedouin or Tuareg in the arid wastes of the Sahara!!

What then of the three months classified as "Summer 2001", June, July and August? While the rainfall total was well below average the incidences of reliable "good" spells were painfully scarce. Thus at long last, towards the end of August, came the hoped for "Indian Summer". While this was a somewhat insipid example of the phenomenon, with any dry spells lasting two or three days at most, it did give those of us who indulge in the somewhat dubious exercise of haymaking, and who had resisted the urge to embark on it earlier in the season, a chance to secure some good quality, though late crop.

By end of September, now well into Autumn, conditions had reverted to "normal" and indeed the period 30 September to 29 October produced something like 11 inches (275 mm) of rainfall, thereby recouping somewhat the earlier deficit. Those of us who go "a chasing the wild deer" have had an unpleasant stag stalking season with humidity, east wind and torrential rain the order of the day. Indeed, it has been a noticeable trait that most of the precipitation has occurred accompanied by stormy winds with an easterly component due to the centres of low pressure having taken a more Southerly track than normal. These low pressure areas often became static in the North Sea, thereby giving South East England, an area being generally flat and lacking in runoff, and thus more susceptible to flooding than we in Perthshire, a repeat of the floods of AD 2001. However, due to centralisation of roads authorities and lack of the old style roadman on his beat, there are times, particularly on unclassified roads, that one could be forgiven for imagining that one is driving alongside the Crinan Canal!


The Nicht's The Nicht St Fillans & Comrie Children's **Music Drama Group**

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

Tay Liaison Committee

Another fairly eventful year draws to a close, one that has seen the overall numbers of angler's fall as a result of Foot & Mouth restrictions. However, progress has been made with the booklet publicising where and when to fish on the Tay System, going to press shortly. This information provider is aimed at visiting anglers and can be purchased through the web and at sale points throughout the area covered by the Protection Order.

To raise funds, the TLC is having a competition; the prize is six nights' dinner, bed & breakfast with five days fishing, and the lucky winner staying in Killin. This is aimed at all anglers and details are advertised on the web, and in fishing publications.

Further progress is being made with a riparian owners group being formed in Glen Lyon. Information will be coordinated, and the duty wardens and bailiffs will have closer contact with the glen beats, and respond to assist. Meetings will also be taking place with a number of riparian owners, throughout the system, who have previously not permitted easy access to trout anglers. If, as is hoped, the outcome is successful, then additional water will be under new agreements, some of which will be accessible with permits, and parts an exclusion zone for special reasons.

The warden training session at Dunkeld, was well supported by the Killin Club. David Dunkley, Scottish Executive, was present, and he enlightened us to how the decision-makers interpret the Acts, and how changes are made.

The Green Papers will all be in by the end of October, and we await to see what the future holds for the trout angler.




Highland Games
