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Editorial

Designing Your Future

The Breadalbane Area Community Plan is available in the Killin Library ready for your inspection and awaiting comments.

Local ideas are important when it comes planning for the future which is why your input is so valuable. The Plan explores ideas likely to enhance the quality of life for locals and visitors. It addresses the issues of traffic, roads, road safety, public transport, school buses, car parking, road spending, winter gritting, tourist trails, cycle paths, litter, alien plant species, and hedgerows. Other items such as community facilities, planning and affordable housing are still in the pipeline.

One example, the problem of Glenogle road closures strikes a common chord as does bullying on school buses, both of which can have serious consequences. Road mainternance is a concern. We all know that the Ardeonaig Road is not up to the standard required to support articulated logging vehicles. Coincidentally the Accounts Commission report stated in 2005 that "The Council's road network is in a serious state of disrepair following years of under-investment. Stirling is one of only four councils where more than 20% of the roads network has deteriorated to a point at which it needs resurfacing to prolong future life. The Council has chosen to spend less than half its GAE (Grant Aided Expenditure) allocation on roads maintenance. This makes it one of only three councils spending such a small amount" If you are interested in helping to design Killin's future please contact Suzanne Player. See articles pages 14 and 24.

Out-of-Hours Saga

Two years after the responsibility for covering emergencies in the out-ofhours period devolved to Forth Valley Health Board, the arrangements are beginning to resemble the service promised at the public meeting held on 8th July 2004. In their meetings with the Health Board, the Community Council Chairmen have tried, over the years, to obtain a detailed description of the proposals, but because of the metaphorical distance between officials and those representing the public, the meetings were not as informative as we would all have wished. We are still not sure if a detailed plan on paper actually exists. The meeting on Monday 27th proved slightly more productive. At last the training of paramedics will pay off and at least one will begin dealing with minor injuries and ailments in the community so that many patients will not have to travel to the Out-of-Hours Centre in Stirling. Space in the Nurses Clinic is to be allocated for paramedics as a treatment room. This is planned to start in August this year. Paramedics tend not to want to come to work in Killin. This is understandable and due in part to the lack of available housing. Housing emergency workers is no longer a Stirling Council priority. One of our ambulance workers travels for more than 100 miles to Killin and back for his shift. Surely an agreement can be reached or flat/house rental obtained.

We were pleased to hear that paramedics are using their contacts and links with hospital when they need advice for problems that go beyond their usual training and we are reassured that air ambulances will continue to be used when they are the most effective response to an emergency. We were told that helicopters are not as expensive an option as we all thought. As always we are grateful for the excellent service given by the individuals in the front line. The minutes of this meeting are available in the Killin Library. **WA**

Drama Review

The district heat of this competition was switched from Fintry to Killin because of renovations at the Fintry venue. The opening play presented by Killin was "A Jolly Sinister Jape". This was a veritable cornucopia of comedy, suspense, drama and crash dieting. Susan McRobbie excelled as Fatty, a born again weight-watcher on a thwarted mission of revenge. Her colleagues, Bill and Suzanne McAlpine and Gordon Hibbert, were equally good as her foils. The lighting lacked mood and atmosphere but this was a fine play. Thornhill Players followed with "When A Man Knows" a tale of holiday romance, AIDS, betraval and vindictiveness. It was bleak and uncomfortable watching. It was noticeably longer than Killin's production and would have benefited from some vigorous cutting. The final Friday night play was "A Familiar Face". Killin's Glenda Mardon and Gill Hunt featured in a marvellously vibrant comedy. The simple scene of a couple of tables and chairs was cleverly embellished with a few extra props, the most significant being a human head in a bottle. Their timing was perfect, so important in comedy. This was as good

a performance as I have ever seen in the McLaren Hall. A sure winner we all thought.

On Saturday, the evening began with a 'non-competitive' presentation from Stirling's Riverside Drama Club. "Radio Scotland Presents" was a play within a play set in the blitz but the true focus was the sound effects team using the most banal props such as buckets of water. Fiona (the bank) Inglis was supported by Jim Mitchell. Next came "The Doctor in Spite of Himself" an adaptation of a classic comedy by Fintry Amateur Dramatic Society. This was the longest production taking just under the permitted time of 55 minutes. But it was conducted at a sort of breakneck speed and in this reviewer's opinion should have been at least half an hour longer to allow actors time to develop non-verbal forms of expression. It lacked elegance subtlety and timing and was a sadly misconceived production. "Cinderella" by Killin Drama Club rounded up a great weekend in style. It was very much good, old fashioned wholesome family entertainment. Anything that could go wrong did and the few things going right were promptly

sabotaged. It must have been a nightmare for the adjudicator trying to find anything in it corresponding to his checklist of 'good practice', but then I think he may have been holding it upside down for most of the weekend, such was the controversy to come.

Then we all settled down with our drinks and the adjudication began. Myrica Reid received the award for the 'best moment of theatre'. So far so good, now would "A Familiar Face" come first or second? It did neither - it wasn't even mentioned in dispatches. An eerie silence settled over the hall as Fintry and Thornhill took winner and runner up awards. Now this is not just sour grapes. I know there are criteria to be fulfilled, but there is one criterion that should be paramount audience appreciation - and 'A Familiar Face' was well ahead of the competition. Well done Fintry and Thornhill but Killin's little gem of a comedy, although it will go no further in the competition, will go on tour so, if you live in a village near here, look out for 'A Familiar Face' coming you way. It's not to be missed. On June 24th the McLaren Hall will host the Scottish One Act Youth Finals. It should be a great night and worth a visit. Andy Aitken

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Killin Community Council

Meeting held 14th March

The seat gifted by the family of the late D. Clark is to be sited at the pond at the foot of Fingal Road.

Planning: The CC had no comment to make on the application for Pink Cottage requesting to use the Barn for B&B. **Litter:** The Community Service litter clearing work is to go ahead. Perth & Kinross Council are said to be willing to assist with the clean up of the shores of Loch Tay if Stirling Council would help. The CC would write to Stirling Council seeking support for this.

Areas of grass in Breadalbane Park and Fingal Road cut by the Council are to be limited, with more left wild. A decision will have to be made shortly as to whether the grant of £29,800 to Breadalbane Area Community Planning Forum will be divided three ways (Strathyre, Balquhidder & Lochearnhead,

Strathfillan and Killin) or be used to cover the area as one. A meeting of the CCs concerned will formulate a plan before August.

Sylvia Jackson MSP is still in contact with BT regarding **Broadband in remote areas**. The Breadalbane Area Community Plan is to be studied by CC members and comments forwarded to Fiona McLeod. **The local community action plan** should be reviewed in the next couple of months. **Learning Group**: Dr Elaine Turner gave an insight into the new Breadalbane Lifelong Learning Trust comprising the Balquhidder, Lochearnhead & Strathyre Learning Group and the Glen Dochart Adult Learning Group. The drop in Café and Broadband at Tyndrum has proved very successful, with access to accredited courses through Clackmannan and Falkirk Colleges. The Virtual Learning Centre has three directors but is looking for a director for this area. It hopes to have a centre in the McLaren Hall after Easter. Anyone interested should contact Dr Turner or a member of the CC.

Community Trust Update: All were agreed that the Community Council should go ahead with the Trust. The £1,000 grant has been received and this would be used to set it up with the help of Colin Roxburgh. School Transport: A meeting would be held with Stirling Council, First Bus, Kingshouse Hotel, Moira Robinson, Alan Clarke and John Macpherson. It was unsatisfactory for one driver to supervise 50 children on a bus with no seatbelts. Behaviour on the buses has not improved and, as the bus is a service bus, responsibility does not lie with the school. CCTV cameras or adult supervision might be solutions. Pupils who misbehave should have their passes withdrawn, making it parents' responsibility to get them to school. The school should deal with bullying and listen to and monitor complaints. A questionnaire should be put to drivers, pupils and parents. The promised new bus had only been used for a few days.

Breadalbane Health Service Update: The

Petition with the Scottish Parliament was again raised last month and it was agreed to make a further request to the Ambulance Service for letters which they were still refusing to show. Any concerns or comments about the NHS should be passed to John MacPherson as he is the representative on the Stirling Community Health Partnership. He is still pushing for evening surgeries in rural areas.

A.O.C.B. Cllr. Ffinch would attend to complaints about the lack of snow clearing in Lyon Road, at the doctors' surgery and in Fingal Road.

Sports Pavilion: This is not generating enough money to stay open. Suzanne Player is helping to apply for grants. Volunteers might solve this problem. It was felt that it should to be open in the summer for visitors. Cllr. Ffinch said Stirling Active Trust would shortly be formed and would eventually cover all sports activities in the area.

Twinning: A small town in Poland wanted consideration to be given to being twinned with Killin and this would require further looking into.

Roads: The Chairman had taken people from Stirling Council down the Ardeonaig road to show them the disgraceful state it is was in. Cllr. Ffinch will try to establish a date when the Forestry work will be finished after which repairs can be done. **The next meeting and AGM** will be in Killin Primary School on Tuesday, 9th May 2006 at 7.30pm

Once I graduated I didn't know what I wanted to do but working during university for Direct Line had taught me that Sales definitely wasn't for me!

I was offered a 1 year graduate trainee post in Shetland Islands Council and decided to take it. Shetland is very windy and bleak but also very beautiful and when after 10 months a permanent job was advertised I went for it. I'm now the Lifelong Learning



Officer for the Museums and Archives Service and thoroughly enjoy it. The short explanation of what I do is that I work with people from 3-93 years old so they can learn from our collections. We're about to move into a brand new building that will house the main museum and the archives so it's a really exciting time to be working here.

One of the things I enjoy the most is that I don't have a typical week - I can be visiting schools one day, doing policy work the next and be developing community projects the following day.

I enjoy meeting people and travelling to the different islands. I'm lucky, too, that through work I have visited parts of Britain and Europe that I never would have otherwise, from Uist to Hampshire and Finland.

The worst thing about being here is how expensive and time consuming it is to get to mainland Britain. However despite this, Mum, my sister Janet and I do manage to meet up fairly regularly - though they always fly up – not being brave enough for the 12 hour ferry journey from Aberdeen! **Kirsty Kennedy**





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Frost Report

Chookits and changes

It's the middle of March and at the tail end of the most snow that we have had in quite a few years. We have just finished the biennial deer count and the snow was a great help. If it is clear and bright the deer stand out against the snow and they tend not to move about so much. The amount of snow must have been a bit of a shock for the birds returning from the coast for the Spring. The sea magpies or oyster catchers are around again, they seem to arrive at Ardeonaig a week earlier than Glen Lochay but can be heard and seen all around by mid-March. They spend the Winter months on the Scottish coast where it is easier for ground-probing feeders during the freezing weather. A few curlews are also back and the occasional peewit after an absence of a few years. They are otherwise known as chookits, hence the snow we get at this time of year is called the chookit storm. For some reason there seems to be a decline in their numbers at least on the mainland.

There were a few small packs of grouse on the hill moving from clump to clump of heather which the deer had scraped clear of snow. Some interesting results from Game Conservancy research state that there has been an 80% reduction in their numbers in the last 30 years. Much of this is due to the poor chick survival caused by tick infestation. 15 years ago the average grouse chick carried 0.5 ticks whereas now it carries 9.5. Apart from weakening the bird, the ticks carry the louping ill virus, which is often fatal. This increase is thought to be due in part to climate change as the ticks are active above 7 degrees C. As the climate has warmed the ticks have a longer active season. Another recent factor is the decrease in hill sheep numbers. As there are fewer woolly mops to take up dormant ticks, so the grouse get an extra helping of them. This increases the risk of contracting Lyme disease which can have very serious consequences for humans. Woolly sheep mops also have the advantage of being dipped, which kills countless ticks.

It was nice, on the last day of counting, to see eight black grouse swaying in the treetops in lower Glen Lochay. These shy residents are seldom seen. Even rarer to see are the males strutting their stuff in the mating dances or lecks on flat areas high up on the hill. This will occur later in the early Summer.

I have just been disturbed from writing this by my son ringing to say that he had just shot a fox by his house in a field occupied by two large bulls. The dogs were barking but the fox was not bothered by either dogs or bulls as he



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enjoyed varying his diet by eating the cow pats (or is it bull pats?) They are always coming up with a new surprise.



We are still keeping some of the pheasant feeding hoppers topped up with grain although the shoots are well over. This helps the pheasants that have lived to fly another day through this leaner time of year and it is a godsend to many smaller wild birds. In their turn the raptors use the feed rides to feed on the small birds. With their keen evesight it is never too long before some species of bird adapts to using a new food source. How many of you regularly have woodpeckers feeding on bird nut feeders now? At the moment a bill seems to be going through to ban tail docking of all dogs. It appeared that a sound case had been put for exemption for working dogs due to the damage that they can suffer from injured tails and problems following necessary amputation, but this sensible proposal will probably be thrown out by town and city based politicians. Farm animals such as lambs, can have tails docked if deemed necessary, be eartagged for traceability and be de-horned. But maybe the politicians just haven't noticed this yet.

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Council Crackdown on Brown Bin offenders

Stirling Council is set to crack down on households that put the wrong type of waste in their brown bin. In future any brown bin with waste that cannot be composted will be stickered to let the owner know that the waste must be removed before the bin can be emptied. The bin will be emptied at the next scheduled uplift a fortnight later. The contact centre will also be alerted that this has happened.

A campaign has been launched to deal with the persistent offenders who continue to use their brown bin for general waste that belongs in the grey bin. Garden waste and cardboard is all that should be in the brown bin. 95% of homes now have the two bin and box recycling system which Stirling Council started in 2003 in order to meet government targets to reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill each year. Failure to comply with these targets in future could mean a financial penalty to the Council of up to £200 per tonne in excess of agreed limits.

The biggest problem is the inclusion of plastic waste in the brown bin. Time and money is spent removing the plastic from the compost and this is a resource that could be better used elsewhere. The Convenor of the Environment Committee said "The citizens of Stirling have played a huge part in helping us to smash the recycling target set by the Scottish Executive a year early. The

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system that we operate now, needs to be expanded to deal with more recycling and we will have to ask households to recycle more. I'd like to thank citizens for their participation so far and request that they keep up their commitment to recycling. Council officers work with families who find it difficult to recycle and where they have spent time in these communities, the results speak for themselves." Last year SEPA reported that Stirling Council had the third best recycling record in the country, with 27.5% of all waste being recycled by the end of March 2005. When only household waste is taken into account this figure rises to 33%. **Corrinne Gallagher** (01786) 443362

School Transport to McLaren High School

Difficulties with student behaviour and safety of the transport provided on the school bus journey to McLaren High School continue to be an issue for the Breadalbane community. A meeting was held on Friday 17th March between Community Council reps from Killin, Strathfillan and Balquhidder and reps from McLaren High School, Stirling Council and the bus companies to allow all parties to express concerns, agree the major issues, clarify the constraints and propose possible solutions. Whilst no definite actions were agreed, there will be smaller group meetings held to follow up on the suggestions for improvements that were put forward. The School would like to urge all students and parents who experience or witness any incidents, no matter how small, to contact them direct, so that they can get a fuller picture of the problems and take appropriate action. Jonathon Anderson, Depute Principal, is the main contact for school transport issues but reports to Guidance Teachers and others are also acceptable as a route to enable the school to resolve problems. Further updates will be given through the Killin News as progress is made in trying to make this a safer and happier journey for our High School students.

Skip Saved for Killin

Just when we were concerned that we might lose the skip in Killin Donald Campbell, Council Worker and Village Officer for Lochearnhead volunteered to give up his Saturdays and manage it and the Community Composting Site for us. Donald came from Lancashire but his roots are in Scotland. He has been in Lochearnhead for four years and recently worked in Killin, in Jake's absence, so will be familiar to most of us. Busy episodes alternated with short breaks as Donald helped those bringing rubbish to the site and by 3 pm the skip was full, showing how useful the facility is to local residents. At a rough estimate, if all those who brought rubbish to the

skip today had to go to Callander, it would probably have needed 30 to 40 carloads with an average round trip of about 60 miles, a total of over 2,000 miles. The saving in terms of carbon emissions, fossil fuels and health and safety is quite considerable and reduces



the likelihood of rubbish lying around destroying our local environment. What do people throw away? The idea of throwing out the car when the ashtray is full has not and is not likely to reach Killin but our consumer society with limited space does throw out many working and useful items that have been replaced which could have given enjoyment to others. Most notable are outdated computers, toys and furniture. The concept of a re-cycling pavilion has been discussed in Killin over the years, as a means of reducing waste, without success. When Donald finds items he considers



useful to others he sometimes places them carefully aside for a while in case it might be just what someone else requires. We both hope the golf clubs pictured here find a new owner before they head off for that final place as landfill. WA

Last gasp Conference before Housing Transfer Plan

The plan to transfer the Housing Stock to a not for profit landlord is being prepared for tenants to examine, and will be distributed to tenants doorsteps soon. An official notice by Stirling Council informing tenants of the proposal (Stage 1 Notice) will be issued at the same time. This will mean that a ballot of tenants will take place in the late spring to seek approval for the transfer.

Stirling Tenants Assembly are telling tenants that now is the time for tenants to ask serious questions of the proposals. For example, How much is the rent going to be? What service improvement are we going to see for our money? If we have a five year rents freeze, (inflation only rents increase), are we going to see a hike in the rent charges after that? Tenants should ask serious questions of the proposals so that they can make an informed choice when the ballot arrives. If tenants say no to the proposal, then they remain Stirling Council tenants. If a majority say yes then they will have a new landlord, called Housing Stirling, by the end of 2006. There will be a chance to ask questions at a Conference in the Golden Lion Hotel, King Street, Stirling to be held on Saturday 22nd April, 2006 at 09.30am till 1.00pm with lunch provided. A children's crèche is also available. Speakers from Housing Stirling and Stirling Council will be there, as will speakers from TPAS, the Independent Tenant Advisors. Places can be booked by telephoning 01786 443543.

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Loch Tay Association

The Association held its AGM at the Kenmore Hotel in early March. Meetings had also been held with one of the directors of the Taymouth Castle development group, mostly touching on the use of the loch and its surroundings. He had stated that his company was committed to co-operate with and involve the local community in the project, but, as of the AGM, he was no longer with the company.

Various other Lochside plans had been discussed during the year, some of which



took place in the local park. A display by Phoenix Falconry, which was due to take place outside, simply moved indoors! This was perhaps the highlight of everyone's day, but especially for the pupils from Killin Primary School who joined us at this point and for the adults who volunteered to be trees! The falconers demonstrated just how manoeuvrable their birds are even indoors - whilst at the same time giving an informative and highly entertaining talk.

There was a great atmosphere in the Hall. Stall holders took the opportunity to exchange leaflets and information with others in the room. Local businesses, and a pleasing number of members of the general public, gathered up information for their own use and to pass on to tourists. 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travel along the lochside to Aberfeldy by public transport for a Saturday evening at the Birks Cinema, but in 1976 the cinema closed, due to the decline in public transport and growth in home based entertainment. Having been a bingo hall and an amusement arcade, today the former cinema, sited in a prominent position in Aberfeldy town square, is for sale and a group of local people are campaigning for the building to be purchased on behalf of the community. It would be converted and managed as a community cinema with the intention of showing a range of old and new films appealing to a wide audience of all ages. The facilities at the Birks would also include a café and the cinema group is working with the local 'PUSH' group to further these proposals jointly. PUSH is a voluntary organisation pushing for social inclusion for people with learning disabilities and has developed the concept of a training

café, opened in the Aberfeldy Recreation Centre in December, where 12 people with learning disabilities are working as apprentices. With the imminent rebuilding of the new school, PUSH is exploring different location options, at least for the short term, and the community cinema is an exciting possibility. In order to access funds for purchasing and converting the Birks cinema, a feasibility study is required to examine the building conservation plan, proposals for converting the building, the cost of purchasing and renovation works, a business plan for running the building and last (but not least!) community need and market demand. This is the stage we are at now. The 'Friends of The Birks Cinema' Group would welcome additional support and assistance at the beginning of our journey! 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Killin's Community Future

In 2002 people from Killin and Ardeonaig completed questionnaires and held a workshop to formulate the Killin Local Action Plan as part of the Community Futures Programme in the National Park. This Plan detailed the profile of the community at that time and our vision for the future, with priority actions and projects to try and achieve our vision.

Nearly 4 years have passed and many of the actions have been achieved, others are still in progress and some have not happened for a variety of reasons. During that time there have been changes within our community: new housing in Fingal Road; closure of several shops; NHS 24; dissolution of some community groups.

At the same time there has been the development of Area community planning with the opportunity this provides for us to try and influence service delivery within our community, coupled with budget cuts within the service provider organisations.

All these things together are changing our experience of living here and it feels that the time is right for us to review where we are now and where we want to be in the future.

Negotiations are currently taking place with the National Park and Stirling

Council about what shape this review might take and how it might be funded. The main outcome is that in the early summer Killin will probably be the first community within the National Park to take part in a review

This will give everyone an opportunity to have their say in how they would like our community to be in the future. Perhaps even more importantly, it will give everyone a chance to share both the positive and negative aspects of life here. Many groups within the community are struggling at the moment with a lack of volunteers to help run and sustain them this review of the Local Action Plan will be an opportunity for everyone to hear about the problems and offer their expertise and assistance. Newcomers to the area will also hear at first hand how they can contribute to community life. Before this Review of the Local Action Plan, it has been suggested that a direct appeal for volunteers to take part in community activity might be a good place to start. Killin and District Art and Craft Group

Since its formation in 1974, the Group has run an Exhibition at least every second year in early August. The Group wish to make it clear that they are not disbanding but merely suspending their activities until they are able to reform. It is possible the way ahead may be to change the format and content of future exhibitions e.g. perhaps using more photographs in place of paintings.

£9 Million for New National Park HQ



The National Park "Green Plan" for its new headquarters has been submitted for planning approval. To be located at the roundabout junction of Carrochan Road and Lomond Road in Balloch, the plan is for a two storey curved timber structure with a stone and glass frontage,





twin pitched slated roofs and a central glazed atrium. It will have meeting and conference facilities available for use by community groups and partner agencies. The green elements include a structural frame made from Scottish Douglas Fir, local timbers for secondary framework, Scottish oak veneers, a biomass boiler as the main heating source, natural ventilation, sheep's wool insulation, a reed bed drainage system, natural slate, stone and paving. This, together with high levels of natural light will provide an example of how buildings can be constructed using local materials and reduce carbon emissions.

sold their produce at the livestock mart in Killin, which usually was a good day out. Most days he drove his "Wee Gray Fergie" tractor either feeding beasts or working in the fields. When ploughing he made sure the furrow was straight and true. He was a regular attender of the local ploughing match and show where he enjoyed "the craic" very much. Johnny took part in many local activities and was a keen green and carpet bowler in which he was very successful. He was a longtime member of the Killin Curling Club and was its President for 22 years. Not so long ago the RCCC presented him with their 50 year membership medal. His other activities included being a Special Constable for several years and a member of the Killin Mountain Rescue team. He was also a founder member of the Killin Young Farmers Club and an office bearer in the National Farmers' Union. Johnny had a good and full life and had many friends scattered over a wide area. He will be sadly missed. **Douglas Willison**

While Stirling Council Libraries have fifteen static service points around the 850 miles of Council area, for other users there is the Mobile Library service. Two vehicles cover thousands of miles each year and provide an excellent service to those in outlying communities. Mobile Librarian Nelson Busby is in charge of the service and calls it an unbelievably rewarding job. "It is always nice to see our regular customers" said Nelson, who has worked with the service for over 20 years, "and it is especially nice when new people move into a community and come along to join". The service visits around 54 communities and 16 schools on a fortnightly basis, as well as ten nurseries and five sheltered homes. The vehicles carry an excellent collection for people to choose from. At any given time there are around 3,500 items on the vehicles and we try to make sure that the stock is changed regularly. The vehicles stock adult, junior and talking books, videos and DVDs. Nelson is very excited about the future of the service and is already looking forward to 2007. There will be two new vehicles in February 2007. While the existing vehicles won the prestigious Delegates Choice award at the International Federation of Library Associations Mobile Meet in Glasgow,
