Emergency Services "Fit For Purpose"?

More concerns are raised by personal stories in this issue (page 4). Why do FVHB not see that this problem will not go away nor will confidence be restored until they enter into a meaningful dialogue with local representatives? Meaningful here means listening and taking action on the major concerns. Instead they have failed to let local representatives know details of the out-of-hours system. They have misinformed or omitted information from the discussion and failed to establish a rapport to the extent that the Community Council Chairmen do not feel their contributions are even considered. The meetings do however allow FVHB to declare to Quality Improvement Scotland that they have regular 'discussions' with local representatives in this area.

Why Come to Killin?

This area is an attractive destination for holiday makers and tourists for more reasons than any one of us understands. It is awash with resources, mountains, scenery, rivers, lochs, farms, organised events, forests, wildlife, special habitats, historical artifacts, archaeology and cycle tracks to mention a few. What brings people to Killin? Are many just passing through? Soon all houses in Killin will be circulated with questionnaires and we will be asked about how we would like Killin to develop in the future. This gives us all a chance to influence how Killin is likely to develop. How proactive can we be? Do we need to look at the needs of visitors so that we can develop their areas of interest? Should we encourage those interested in our local history, family history, crafts, produce, and facilities to stay for a while to enjoy their pursuits? 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Paramedics Good - System Flawed

Two years should be enough for the Forth Valley out-of-hours service to sharpen its act and respond to local anxieties and emergencies. We have been talking to two friends who had the misfortune to have lost their husbands with acute illnesses over the past two months. They both feel that, while it is likely that the outcome would not have been different, the episode could have been managed more efficiently and humanely. They are both extremely grateful for the help they received from the paramedics, professionals and others at the time of their husbands' emergencies and for the community support they have received since. They hope this publicity might lead to improvements in the way the emergency service is organised.

Steve Wolsey

Sarah Heward-Wolsey recently moved to this area, married Steve Wolsey and set up a thriving business. On the 21st May their life together was dramatically cut short when at about 10.10pm she and Steve went to the Ben More bar after work. Ouarter of an hour later Steve experienced severe abdominal pain, and collapsed. The paramedic arrived within 10 or 15 minutes and attempted to resuscitate him. As the paramedic was alone, he had to seek the help of others present in the bar to collect equipment from the vehicle and help with cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). Fortunately an off duty policeman with CPR training was called and they were assisted by their friend and the landlord of the Ben More Hotel. This activity continued for about 40 minutes until

an ambulance from Arrochar arrived. Eventually all resuscitation was stopped and the paramedics cleared away their equipment and left. Sarah was left standing in the bar unsure of the reality of the situation and still concerned that Steve might be breathing. She was reassured that he was indeed dead. The police then questioned her as is usual when a sudden death occurs and she arrived home at ten minutes past midnight. The following Tuesday she was telephoned and asked if she wanted a full postmortem on her husband or an external assessment. Sarah found that a difficult decision and said that she really wanted to know why he died and also wanted to see him again before the funeral. Surprisingly the Death Certificate gives the cause of death as Hypertensive Cardiovascular Disease.

Mure Smith

Sandra and Mure Smith lived in Tyndrum. Mure had numerous admissions for heart failure and was awaiting quadruple bypass surgery. On 6th June he rapidly developed acute breathing problems similar to, but worse than, previous episodes. 999 was dialled at 7.45pm. The local firemen were called as they had helped on previous occasions by providing oxygen. The paramedic arrived in 30 minutes. He was unable to attach electrodes from the cardiac monitor to Mure's chest as Mure was sweating profusely. It was apparent to the relatives that there was not much that the paramedic could do alone. An ambulance did eventually arrive to take him to Stirling and



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death was certified at 8.30pm. Sandra was not aware when he left on the ambulance that he might die. No one explained to her the details of what had happened or checked to see how well she could cope. On her return home from Stirling she was interviewed at 1.20am by police as Mure's death was treated as a sudden death.

Could it be better?

The highly skilled paramedic in the Rapid Response Vehicle (RRV) works alone. The plan requires that he or she deals with the emergency situation until the ambulance arrives. It is very difficult, if not impossible, to perform all these activities alone. The paramedic has to clinically assess and support the patient, perform immediate life saving procedures including CPR which is more usually performed by two people, collect equipment from the vehicle (more than one journey), set up monitoring equipment, control the scene and keep relatives informed, all at the same time. Support from another paramedic or ambulance technician is needed. Having to depend on the presence of whoever by

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chance happens to be in the vicinity is not a realistic option. We feel that a double-manned ambulance, one of whom is a paramedic, would be an improvement and provide greater reassurance to both patients and the paramedic involved. The RRV should be used only where it can be rapidly supported by another ambulance. Being suddenly bereaved is a great shock and it is difficult to think rationally. Bereaved people need to understand what has happened, why their loved one has died, and what needs to be done next. For an individual this is a rare and very distressing event. The bereaved need to be assessed to ensure that they are able to cope and are not likely to be a danger to themselves. Formerly this was part of the responsibility of the General Practitioner and is now replaced by this new system.

Some days later the paramedic told Sarah he was aware that Steve died very shortly after he arrived but he was not allowed to pronounce life extinct so had to continue CPR for a stipulated length of time. These attempts went on for about an hour. Surely continuing resuscitation well beyond the point of usefulness is even more distressing to the relatives. Police were involved in both these events as they were considered as sudden deaths. A sudden death used to mean that in the doctor's opinion there was insufficient evidence as to why the patient died and the doctor was not

prepared to sign a death certificate. If, due to the patient's state of health, death was considered likely and the sequence of events leading to the death supported that likely diagnosis, the doctor would usually be prepared to sign the death certificate and there would be no need for police involvement.

As doctors are now rarely involved out of hours police are more likely to be routinely involved and deaths, no matter how predictable, will be treated as "sudden deaths".

It is time to make changes to improve the system for paramedics and patients. Forth Valley Health Board informed the Health Meeting some months ago that a feedback form is sent to all who use the out-of-hours emergency service and that there are very few complaints. We wonder if the form is distributed here in the Killin/Tyndrum area. If you have used the service John MacPherson the Chairman of the Community Council would like to know if you did indeed receive the form. So far we have not found anyone who has.

VISTA The Next Version of **Microsoft Windows** www.microsoft.com/windowsvista/

The computer industry has been eagerly awaiting the launch of Microsoft Vista the newly developed operating system

replacement for Windows XP. This is due for release over the next few months and will revolutionise the computing experience.

Nowadays, nearly everything is stored on a computer documents, photographs, music and even TV programmes and films. All your interaction with others is likely to be stored on a computer somewhere and a lot of your shopping and banking is processed on computers. Windows Vista will provide a brand new interface to computing and will change the way you use your computers for the better, helping you to manage your information and media more easily.

Other Microsoft products are also being upgraded. The Office suite of programs has been re-written and currently Office 2007 is under testing.

Now this is all well and good but it has consequences for some of us. Firstly, we will need to get used to the way in which Vista and Office behave. The user interface is different and, in some situations, we may need to be taught how to use the system. Most modern computers should be able to run Vista and Office 2007, but some machines will need to have more memory (RAM) installed to bring the system memory to at least 512MB the minimum required to run Vista. Older machines are unlikely

to be able to run this new software and will not be able to benefit from the latest applications and functionality of Vista. If you are about to buy a new computer, then I strongly recommend you ensure that the machine has at least 512MB of memory and I would urge you to consider having as much memory as you can afford. This should enable you to move to Vista when it becomes available without the need to add expensive hardware.

Currently Vista is planned to be released for the business community around November, with a scheduled release date for home users next January. I have no indication of pricing at this time but will let you know once I have further information.

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Killin Community Council 11th July

Community Action Plan: A general meeting is to be held in the McLaren Hall on 21st October 2006 from 10 am - 2 pm.

Footpath: The plans for the proposed footpath and pedestrian improvements to Manse Road are available.

Scool Representative: The McLaren High School proposed that an S5 pupil be appointed to the Community Council but no application has yet been received.

Wheelie Bins: Complaints have been received that these are left on narrow footpaths and in entrances to private homes. Christmas Lighting: There will be no grant for lighting and festive activities this year.

Community Futures: There is to be a meeting on Monday 24th July 2006 in the McLaren Hall from 7 pm - 9.30 pm on 'Running a Healthy Community Development Trust'.

West Highland Animation have asked for support for an exhibition promoting Highland Oral tradition, Gaelic Language and supporting minority cultures.

Ambulance & Health Update: The Chairman attended a meeting in Balfron with other Killin Community Councillors. Two new members of staff have been appointed to the Killin Ambulance Station. The Chairman also met the Health Secretary, Mr. Kerr, and is to attend Forth Valley Health Board's annual review in August.

Difficulties in obtaining the emergency

ambulance have been reported.

Litter: Angling Club members met Bill Davit of Stirling Council about litter round Loch Tay. Community service people will help with the clean up.

Grass Cutting: Complaints have been received about the lack of grass cutting in various parts of the village.

Road Closure: The A827 from Lix Toll towards Killin may be closed from 7pm - 7am on Monday 25th September for re-surfacing.

Path closed: The walkway from Fingal Wynd through the Breadalbane Park to the Main Street will be closed for pedestrians on the days of Killin Highland Games and Killin Show.

Funding Proposals for Breadalbane Area: The initial £8,000 to be put aside for the proposed extension to the Cemetery Car Park has been cut to £2,300. Roger Twigg and Charlie Grant to approach the owners of the land. The Community Council will apply for planning permission and agreed to go along with the funding proposals.

Church Monument: This has been made a listed monument by Historic Scotland. It was unclear who actually owned this piece of ground.

Bins as we left them please! Thanks

Killin residents have had their bins 'tagged' by Stirling Council workers in a bid to make the bin collection service more efficient. On 26th June a pilot project using the new refuse collection vehicles was launched which aims to work closely with residents and take advantage of the design of the new bin lorries, which can lift two bins at the same time and empty them in a matter of seconds. Residents were leafleted them about the pilot, and asked if they could:

- *Place bins where the bin crew left them Take care when moving their bin over a kerb or across the street
- *Where possible, place their bin close to the edge of the pavement with its back handles and wheels facing away from the road
- *Make sure waste is safely inside the bin with the lid closed
- *Put the wheelie bin at the kerbside by 7am on day of collection
- *Not put out excess waste (this won't be collected)
- *Please put only garden and cardboard waste in the brown bin It would be helpful if, on collection days,

cars could be parked away from the collection points or on the opposite side of the street to collection points. The crew will leave bins where they should be put out for the next time. To date the pilot project has been a great success, with residents working together with the bin crews to make the service work more efficiently. Residents are placing bins next to their neighbours' bins, ensuring the lorry can pick up in pairs. Transport Issues: A visit from Transport Minister Tavish Scott gives us confidence that many important issues will be addressed including locomotive noise at night, resolution of the 30mph issue in Tyndrum, the 20mph by the Crianlarich school (which has been put out to tender by TransServ) and possibly the pedestrian crossing near the school. Rules pertaining to pedestrian crossings on trunk roads have been overturned in Callander; it is hoped therefore that one will be allowed in Crianlarich across to the village hall.

We will be consulted on the design of the Crianlarich Bypass and need to continue lobbying for improvement in the A82 from Tarbet to Inverarnan.. A letter was received from Scotland TranServ introducing themselves as a joint venture between Balfour Beatty and Mouchel Parkman. They recognise the importance of listening to and forming good working relationships at all levels with all the agencies who can contribute to road management and that by working together the best interests of the road user can be served. Progress has been very slow. We are waiting for a letter from Stirling Council, stating their support for the project as an essential requirement of grant aid foundations.

NHS 24 OOH: John MacPherson, chairman of Killin CC, deserves our great thanks for his efforts to improve the service. There are 2 ambulances and 1 rapid response vehicle [RRV] on call between Callander, Balfron and Killin. 2 other incidents have been documented for the Minister's attention. Minor injuries will be dealt with at the Nurses Station OOH starting in August. Single crewed

ambulances are still being sent out, but 2 new paramedics have been recruited. The Scottish Ambulance Service strategy is to send a RRV with an ambulance following. If the RRV can stabilise the situation, then a stop is put on the ambulance; otherwise it will continue and transport the patient to hospital.

The e-democracy project: The rapidly expanding public access to the internet offers an opportunity to individuals and community groups to discuss issues together and lobby Authorities for policy

Signage: A local business has received a letter asking for removal of signage, believed to be from Stirling Council. They were informed that they could put up brown and white signs which must be purchased from a specific supplier costing £1000, after obtaining planning permission. Other businesses have signage which is not brown and white. Every few years, when signs proliferate, there is a clampdown. There are differences between what a business and a resident sees as a reasonable number of signs. If Stirling Council is unhappy with the amount of signs in Strathfillan, we would request that they work with the CC and the Tourist Association to come to an agreement.

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Sunday 2nd July marked the start of a new venture by Jim and Jean Kinnell at By The Way campsite, Tyndrum. Jim and Jean moved to Tyndrum in 2002 driven by their love of the Scottish outdoors, climbing mountains and walking in the countryside. Experienced in running a hostel in Glasgow, they embarked on their new life here providing camping and trekker/mountain hut accommodation for hillwalkers, climbers and West Highland Way walkers. On 2nd July their latest development at By The Way campsite, a 26 bed hostel, was opened to visitors. This new addition to their business enables them to provide budget quality accommodation for some of the many visitors with interest in exploring local peaks and rock faces and climbing Munros in a variety of conditions. Their hope is that By The Way will become recognised as a good base for serious climbers, walkers and outdoor enthusiasts in the area

The 'official opening', attended by many with a local interest, was appropriately performed by Killin Mountain Rescue Team, with Team Leader Willie Stitt and Teddy Inglis officiating. Jim thanked Willie for the help provided to climbers and walkers by Scottish Mountain Rescue teams and handed over a cheque for £250 for Killin Mountain Rescue Team Funds.

Lin Music

Lin Music died on 9th May in Florida. Although Lin (Lincoln) was born in the United States of America, he moved to the UK as a young American GI during the later stages of World War II. At the end of the war Lin settled in the North of England, where he met and married his wife, Jean (formerly Bogle). After building up and running a successful haulage maintenance and repair company for many years, Lin was looking for a quieter life, and a holiday in a friends touring caravan opened his eyes to the world outside haulage. He decided to open a caravan park. Searching for a suitable site in the right part of the country took Lin from the Lake District to the far North of Scotland and back again, but through a contact in British Rail he heard about a disused railway siding in Tyndrum that was for sale. Lin bought the disused siding and, after a lot of hard work, opened it as Pine Trees Caravan Park. Shortly after this the West Highland Way opened and Lin found he needed to expand, so opened a sister site, Pine Trees Leisure Park, also in Tyndrum. Lin ran these two sites for almost 30 years, before ill health forced him to sell and very reluctantly contemplate retirement. In 2002 he and Jean left Tyndrum and moved to a retirement home in Ilkley, in Yorkshire, where they lived until earlier this year when he realised a long term wish and, with Jean, moved back to his native USA. Lin is survived by his wife Jean, son Mike and daughter Barbara.

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Mervyn's Weather

"La Fheill Eoin 's an t-shamradh theid a chuthag gu'taigh geamhraidh." "On St. John's day in Summer the Cuckoo goes to her Winter home." This old Gaelic saving is somewhat incorrect. On Loch Tayside Cuckoos would continue calling into July. I have recorded this as late as the 9th of the month. Now the statement is even more adrift as for several years the bird has ceased calling well before St. John's day (24th June) and indeed this year the cessation of "the twofold shout" occurred on 11th June, the earliest I have known. Having said this, on the 11th May at 4.15 a.m., on a glorious morning, the Cuckoo, there was but one here this year, called at least 350 times without a break! Up until the 1980's one might hear five Cuckoos calling simultaneously. Not any more. Fairly recently it was reported that an articulated lorry was stopped en route from Italy to Spain loaded with 28 tons yes, 28 tons! – of small birds, Larks, Finches and Cuckoos etc. No wonder many of our birds are becoming scarce. It is also reported that in Malta a net is stretched across the water to the small island of Gozo to catch passerines. Tim Frost mentions in his Killin News article a dearth of Swallows, Swifts and House Martins. Here at Ardtalnaig we

have our usual complement, indeed Swifts have noticeably increased over the past decade. Other good news is that Black Grouse, nationally showing a decrease in numbers, since my coming to Ardtalnaig in 1950 the count has remained fairly static in the glen, perhaps even a small increase. Oyster Catchers, despite the depredation of Mink, seem to be holding their own as do Sandpipers, Woodpeckers, Goldfinches and Siskins. Larks however are virtually absent, as are Yellowhammers. The latter disappeared when we stopped growing grain and having a stackyard. Ring Ouzels are very scarce and of course the poor old Red Grouse are under great pressure despite vigorous programmes to assist their recovery.

Contributing to the paucity of numbers is the presence of the tick (Ixodidae). These insects, if vivaemic, can cause various ailments to animals and birds, and even though not carrying a virus the sheer weight of numbers can debilitate and even kill chicks. Milder winters have increased both habitat range and virility of these pests. Some measure of control can be achieved through the dipping of sheep and using "Spot-On" or "Crovec" on sheep and other livestock. Deer and hares however, being the main hosts,

cannot as yet be treated, so some

landowners wish to reduce their numbers to break the cycle.


It is perhaps significant that, while it was generally known that the various tick borne ailments affected livestock, it was only when it became apparent that Lyme disease, also transmitted by some ticks, could affect Ramblers and other humans that government bodies began to take note. Let it be hoped that those in power will put their money where their mouth is and provide funding for, not only research into tick control, but also into control of the habitat, bracken and unburnt, under-grazed birch scrub, so beloved of some conservationists. "A dripping May and a warm June makes the farmer whistle a happy tune"! Well, we have had our dripping May and the first half of June was pleasantly settled and warm though as these notes are written at the Summer Solstice, wild showers and a near gale are the order of the day. Perhaps we should keep whistling for a warm and dry July!

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Farming Matters

Where have all the sheep gone?

Is this a question people will be asking in the next few years? Reform of the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) has seen the main livestock subsidy change from one based on the number of animals a farmer had, to one based on the average subsidy received between 2000 and 2002. This historical payment, known as the Single Farm Payment (SFP) is no longer related to livestock numbers. In order to receive the SFP, farmers need to comply with a number of conditions known as crosscompliance. Farmers must keep their land in Good Agricultural and Environmental Condition (GAEC) and comply with a number of specified legal requirements relating to environmental protection, public health, animal and plant health, and animal welfare. EU reforms have been put in place in order to enhance the environment, reduce over production and promote the sustainable development of rural communities. We will see in the coming years whether these aims are achieved here in rural Scotland.





Because of the subsidy changes, the numbers and types of livestock kept by farmers will be driven much more by market forces than they have in recent years. This is likely to lead to changes in livestock numbers, particularly on the hills, and possibly to changes in the types and breeds of livestock. More productive and economically viable breeds of sheep may replace some of the traditional Scottish Blackface flocks and production may concentrate on the lower more fertile inbye ground. Although land abandonment and undergrazing of the vegetation are not allowed under cross-compliance, sheep numbers on the hills are likely to decline in many areas. This will have a considerable impact on the vegetation and landscape. Some habitats, such as heather moorland, scrub, bracken and woodland, may benefit while others, such as species-rich grasslands, which require grazing in order to maintain their species diversity, .may suffer. We will see what actually happens over the next few years, but I hope people won't be asking 'Where have all the sheep gone?' John Holland

The Killin-donian Challenge

The eleventh Caledonian Challenge took place in June this year. It is a team event for 3 to 6 members who walk 54 miles in under 24 hours from Fort William to Ardlui along the West Highland Way. It is a test of endurance, fitness and teamwork and also a challenge to raise at least £2000 sponsorship by each team for The Scottish Communities Foundation which distributes money to small local charities throughout Scotland.

Falcon, Morven, Cameron and Calum ('The Frosty Four') were generously sponsored by The Hydro Board, Boreland Estate and Glenfalloch Estate and Charlotte (Calum's fiancée) organised a sale in Killin which raised a fantastic £1,200. John Millar from Aberdeen, was so impressed that he matched the amount. Many thanks to a wonderful village for its generous support, especially Wendy, who gave items to sell and her time on the Saturday, and Yvonne, Kim and Alma who helped The Frost Womens Appreciation Society (F.W.A.S).

On the day Charlotte's mum taxied the Frosties to Fort William at 4-30 a.m. for the 7am start and the Frosty parents set off as the support team, itself a challenge.

The Frosties prepared by repeated visits to the toilet as stress began to kick in. They were called to meet the press as they were the first all brothers team - no pressure then! - and the commentator then tried to pair them off with 'The Fat Lassies' team, which spurred them on a bit.

For the first 12 miles to Kinlochleven Morven established a good pace passing a woman with an annoying packet of Tick Tacks only to be overtaken by her following a recurrence of Cameron's old knee injury.

Meanwhile the Frosty support team were admiring the scenery in Glencoe until a phone call told them that the four were 15 minutes from Kinlochleven! Mr.and Mrs. Backup just got to Kinlochleven in the nick of time to mix the isotonic drinks, find towels, dry clothes, bananas and walking poles and put on an expression of being bored with waiting just before the boys checked in. Another competitor's support vehicle had a gazebo, a set of seven non-stick cooking pots and a small generator to blow up something, probably an armchair - no, they already had four of those under the gazebo. The Frosties luckily didn't notice this luxury, just changed, collected food and were off – probably to ensure being ahead of Tick Tack woman! As we

piled several tons of wet clothes into a bin bag, next door were blowing up an inflatable dalek, presumably to identify their van. Well, we had a spotlight on the Landrover.

The team made the top of the Devil's Staircase in about an hour but it's a long slog to the ski centre in Glen Coe and they had to resort to karaoke to take Cameron's pain away (or maybe just replace it with another). The support team arrived at the car park which resembled a Sunday market with stalls a cross between a cafe and outdoor clothing shop. Soon our lookout with telescope on the landrover roof could see them coming.

From Glencoe to Inveroran Morven coaxed Cameron along and tried to persuade him to take his knee support off as his leg was going blue. When they finally reached Strathfillan wigwams we had set up camp knowing this time we would be the posh lot. Morven's beloved comes from there and her mum let us have sole use of a barn. We had armchairs and a well set out table plus all the F.W.A.S.

The climb to Crianlarich raised the pain barrier for them all. Their spirits were lifted as Falcon entered home ground and saw that the local farmer had left a diversion sign claiming the West Highland Way was down a ditch. Going under the railway bridge mental energy was draining and landmarks were not visible with head torches but again spirits were lifted as they outpaced others who had not brought torches so when the boys went ahead those behind went in the ditch, if the sounds could be relied upon. As they approached Beinn Ghlas they knew that they were 2 miles from the finish at Ardleish. They had seen themselves through together without a cross word till 500 yards from the finish when Calum stopped dead as he thought he saw a fox which made Morven ricochet into him and the ditch. It was probably a ghostly foxy come to haunt the Frosties and get its own back. They checked into the finish and boarded a speedboat to cross Loch Lomond for the presentation of medals. Well done boys! We are proud of you and especially for your

teamwork in all staying with Cameron. Their time was 17 hours 41 minutes. They finished 79th, 80th, 81st and 82nd out of 1,479 who started. (Over 400 dropped out.) Well done Killin for your wonderful support.

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
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Killin and District Sports and Leisure Club Open Day

Would a community cinema really be a viable business in Aberfeldy?

To answer this question and others, the Friends of the Birks group, with a grant from Perth and Kinross, have engaged St Andrews based cinema expert Ron Inglis. He spent a day in June meeting group members and will be working with us until mid July, when his final report will tell us whether the idea is a good one.

Ron has worked on a wide range of cinema projects across the UK and we were enthralled as he described modern digital cinema technology that would enable even a small cinema to show blockbuster movies the day they come out in London, or even premiere in Aberfeldy! No waiting in line while the big cinemas hold the large film reels for the first few weeks of a release. Digital technology, according to Ron, will be almost standard by 2007 and a real boost to small cinemas in remote locations! It would also offer versatility - a varied programme over the week and possibilities of live broadcasts of events of all sorts from around the world. Aberfeldy is a small town and the possible catchment area of up to 30 miles does not cover many people so, despite digital technology, would this be enough to ensure the venture is viable? Ron was clear that this would not normally be considered sufficient to run a small cinema but he also knew of other small cinemas that do manage to run in similarly challenged positions, so it is not impossible. Much would depend on having a really good manager, who would actively market the cinema to locals and visitors, and an adaptable space and system that would enable flexibility. Everyone agreed that a café as part of the project would be essential.

Ron will be working with us to develop the initial project outline and, if it looks realistic, then the Friends of the Birks will really have their work cut out, raising more funds for surveys, architects plans, planning permission, etc. - and for buying the building. So, easy really.....

Over the summer we are going to work within the community to assess interest in the project. We plan to hold a stall at the Aberfeldy Show on the 12th August. If you want to know more please contact

Aliens from down under


Have you got New Zealand flatworms in your garden? I and several others in Killin, have.

I found mine under black polythene sheeting laid across the bare earth. A small patch of mucous like material, the remains of an earth worm, with a horrible looking creature curled up nearby - a flatworm. They are easily killed by dropping into salt-water solution. Do not handle them as they can cause skin irritation.

If you find one, don't panic, their only prey is the humble earthworm - a favourite food of moles, hedgehogs, shrews and many birds. Thanks to the flatworms moles are now extinct in the area from Dunoon to Loch Eck.

Flatworms are found on the surface in damp places, such as under plastic sheeting, flat stones or plant containers. Detailed information can be obtained on the defra website.

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
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



Aspens of Killin



Aspens were once very common in Scotland but have become rare. They can be recognised by their small circular shimmering leaves, which move in the lightest of breezes, and by their vivid brilliant yellow colours that persist, looking like patches of autumn sun, after many of the other autumn leaves have fallen. At that time all the remaining sites of the few surviving aspen trees around Killin can be easily seen. Aspens in Scotland rarely produce seed, possibly because there are now so few trees left and many groups of aspens are clones of a single tree that may be either male or female. As aspens become less common so the flies and insects that depend on them become rare and endangered. The large patch by the cemetery car park is an excellent local example and is a part of Killin's diminishing heritage.
