Suzanne Player, who has been a major influence on Trust developments, also attended. Two speakers, Joyce Russell from the Strathfillan Community Development Trust and Judy Warburton from the Kilmadock Development Trust

spoke about the achievements made by their Trusts, showing what can be achieved by community action and support. A short video of achievements by two other Trusts left us in no doubt that our Trust has the potential to make a difference to Killin. Some local groups, the Killin Care Trust and the Community Bus, talked about their successes. Representatives from other groups, Killin Primary School, Killin Heritage and EAK explained how the Trust could help their aims

Elaine introduced her proposal to set up a Thrift Shop on the lines of the one set up in Aberfeldy, where the shop runs continuously but is staffed by volunteers who make a profit for the charities of their choice. This allows people to bring items for charity at any time and a place to store items that have not been sold for the next charity sale. Another project seeks to find a place for the vouth of Killin to meet and have activities on a regular basis. Discussion took place during and following lunch and while viewing the displays. While the Trust is a village Trust it is run by its members who are able to vote on substantial issues. While 68 people signed up at the launch, others who wish to have a say in Trust activities or support Trust projects can sign up in the Library where a supply of forms is available. It costs £1 p.a. to become a Member or Associate and Junior membership is free. Full membership is open to anyone who is a registered voter in Killin. The Trust would like to thank all the supporters who came and helped make the event such a success.

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### Computer

#### Buying 2nd Hand Computers – What to look out for

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Many people now choose to buy a second hand computer, typically over the internet, perhaps via eBay. In many cases these are legitimate sales and, if the buyer is lucky, then this may result in a bargain. However, some machines that are being sold do not have legal software installed and, if the buyer uses one

of these machines, then the buyer is actually infringing copyright law. I recently purchased a laptop from an eBay auction and, when it was delivered, it was clear that the installed software was illegal. I complained immediately and after due process I was issued with a full refund. I am sure that the seller would have been warned off, since eBay are particularly keen on stamping out all counterfeit products in their auctions.

I was lucky that I could spot a forgery, but I am sure many people are blissfully unaware whether or not the software on their machines is actually legal.

Microsoft have a policy of providing a

Certificate of Authenticity, (COA) typically a label stuck to the bottom/side of the computer. This COA details which software package (for instance Windows XP) is legal for the particular machine. If the machine does not have a COA, then it is possible that the installed software has been pirated. If you are using pirated Microsoft software, then you will automatically be prevented from updating the software and thus you may be more prone to viruses and other infections.

As always, if you are in any doubt, then please seek expert advice. Broadband Update

### At the time of writing this article

(early May), the Government's plans to enable all the country with Broadband took another step forward.

The following was published on the Scottish Executive website, at the end of April.

"The Scottish Government is pleased to announce that its procurement is continuing to progress swiftly. We have completed our evaluation of the four bids which were received in response to our Request for Tender and a preferred bidder has now been selected. We are now entering further discussions with this company and are aiming to conclude a contract by June.



At this stage we are unable to disclose the name of the preferred bidder, however this will be announced on award of the contract. Similarly, we are not yet able to specify a delivery timescale to any specific areas or regions - this will be clarified post-contract award. We can confirm that the preferred bidder will look to utilise a mix of technologies for delivery of broadband solutions."

This is a good sign, although there are no dates for enabling our internet access – I can't see this happening for several (6-18) months and, quite frankly, I would be surprised if we all had fast internet access before 2010. Saying this, there are other opportunities for broadband in rural areas and I would be more than happy to spend some time discussing these with anyone who is interested.

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### Mervyn's Weather

The NE gale of 22nd March 2008 caused more damage than the combined efforts of all the other gales of the 2007/8 winter. A corrugated iron hay shed, quite a substantial erection, sited 1,000 feet up the hill, which had survived for twenty five years, many previous tempests from SE, SW and west, was lifted bodily and scattered over a wide area by this North-Easterly blast, although well protected from that airt by a high ridge. The manner of the destruction of the building suggests perhaps a "Mini-Twister" so common in Southern USA. A graip and a ladder were lifted clean out of the shed and sheets of corrugated iron, wooden battens and couples were distributed in every direction, some hanging in trees hundreds of yards away, twenty feet up and yet an owl box, to encourage barn owls, was left intact. The wrath of Boreas forsoothe!

During the subsequent cool, dry, and rather barren spell of weather I had come to remember a plant highly regarded by hill sheepmen prior to the general feeding of hill flocks. This is Cotton Grass (eriophorum) known in Gaelic as Sioda Monaidh or Canach. In June over many peaty areas can be seen great swathes of this bog cotton.

In late March/ early April when hill grazings are at their lowest ebb, desiccated and unpalatable, this herb known in its earlier stage of growth as Blackhead or draw-moss, due to its black flower head and very dark green stem, which if pulled up discloses a white succulent stalk, is much relished by grazing animals. It is full of protein, sufficient to bridge "The hungry gap" between winter and spring. Many an old Blackface ewe with an almost skeletal frame has, with recourse to draw-moss, survived April blizzards to hear the cuckoo and rear a sturdy lamb. An old Donegal hill man would often say "Nuair eirigh a'canach is beo na caora!" "When the draw-moss starts growing the ewes will live!" Any sheep grazing containing draw-moss carried a premium in value.

To the uninitiated, areas of mountain and moorland often appear valueless and uninspiring track of bleak country, probably better, in their opinion, to be "blanket forested" with conifers. Perhaps in some granitic areas of unmanaged wall to wall heather, (outwith the flowering season) this could be partly true.

Once I overheard a holiday family from the midlands of England sav

"That moost be 'eather, not very nice is it and there's an awful lot of it."! In areas which have more fertile underlying rock, Limestone, Sandstone, Epidiorite etc. and perhaps a damper climate, the spectrum and variety of plant life increases dramatically - from the grey green of a Nardus sward to the more vivid shades of agrostis, deschampsia or the mosses surrounding springs and "green flushes" plus many other less prominent species such as the carnivorous fly catcher, sundew, and of course the dominant moorland shrubs, the three varieties of heath. As one moves uphill to more mountain conditions the scene undergoes change until reaching sub Alpine tundra-like conditions which are a world of their own. Many years ago, in what was "The Braan Bar" of Amulree Hotel, an old keeper friend, alas now long gone, wandered up to me and with an aura of "John Barleycorn" said, "Man! Mervyn, when I step out in the morning and smell "The Hill" t'would not matter supposing I had a hundred wives!" As a fellow hill-man I understood. Mervvn K Browne

### Strathfillan Community Council

Local Plan Issues Report: This was the main topic of discussion. Selected sections of the minutes relevant to Strathfillan were sent as our response to the consultation.

The Lower Station Yard Project: Our local Councillors have managed to get Stirling Council to agree that we do not have to find another site suitable for housing. We have 5 years in which to finish the project. We either have to buy the site at open market value or lease for 15+ years. The open market value will be in excess of £100,000, which would make the project unaffordable. We do not know what the lease would be. **Rural Stirling Housing** 

Association: [RSHA] has suggested that perhaps we could have a joint project with both housing and play/sports facilities on the site. RSHA can now allocate houses to local people under the local letting initiative. Stirling Council can nominate for 50% of the allocations but have indicated that they are prepared to discuss the possibility of local connection depending on the circumstances at the time. RSHA would consult with the local community about type and design of any proposed houses before development. The Housing Needs Survey currently being carried out by Rural Housing Services will



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answer some of the questions about need and type. Strathfillan Trust and CC would be involved with the design of the whole site. RSHA has now written to Stirling Council saying that they would like to be involved in a split project. Stirling Council is also looking into the possibility of siting the MUGA [multi use games area] in the school playground.

**Bypass:** The main topic at the 12th May meeting was the by-pass and how Crianlarich can use it as an opportunity to develop and encourage visitors. A meeting is being arranged for Monday 2nd June in Crianlarich village hall at 2pm. It is hoped that local businesses and residents will get involved and come with a list of ideas.

The Stirling Public Partnership Forum [PPF]: has identified 4 topics for discussion which they would like us to put in order of priority and the first one will be debated in 7th June. Our choice was Out of Hours Health Service, new hospital at Larbert including transport issues, the Stirling Community Hospital [including provision of out-patients] and Orchard House development. We will be responding to the Scottish Government CC Working Group Consultation on the proposals for a draft model scheme for CCs. The main thought was that they are trying to make it too regimented and that the Stirling Council model is very good and does not require alteration. We received a joint statement from

### Community Partnership Successes

A children's playpark created out of boggy waste ground has become the latest success story for a scheme that has raised millions of pounds for villages within Loch Lomond and The Trossachs National Park.

For years, residents of Benmore, Kilmun and Strone in Argyll had struggled to raise the funds necessary to transform the only flat piece of ground for miles into a place suitable for children to play. Their appeals for money proved unsuccessful until the National Park's Community Futures programme offered support. It helped residents to form a **Community Development Trust** that, working with the Park, was then able to access £140,000 worth of funding. A total of 20 Community Development Trusts operate across the National Park and between them they have raised more than £6 Million since the Park was formed in 2002. As well as play parks, the money has helped to achieve a variety of projects including building footbridges and funding for Callander's thriving Farmers' Market.

Hundreds of Community Development Trusts exist across Scotland but those within the Loch I omond and The Trossachs area have been uniquely successful thanks to a decision taken by the Park when it was formed. At the outset it set up a team of support staff dedicated to helping local communities achieve their ambitions and that move has paid real dividends. The National Park has taken its cue from the communities themselves and given them the impetus they need to turn their plans into reality. Through its Community Futures programme, local people have been given the support they need to make things happen. There is a dedicated team within the Park that is committed to making things happen, giving support and also encouraging links between all the communities so that they can learn from each other.

#### A mixed bag

Writing this in early May we are in the midst of the fox denning season. We have been out on the hill almost every night during the last few weeks starting out in time to be at a den by nightfall and sometimes waiting till first light in the morning for the fox to come in. It's tiring but a privilege to be able to witness the night on the hill. It is noticeably quieter than in years gone by as the approach is now not very often marked by the warning cackle of the grouse to one another as foxy goes across the hill. Another sign of the dramatic decline in grouse numbers. Some of you who are as old as me will remember the song including the words 'coffee coloured people by the score'. This was foretelling that in the future all nationalities and ethnic aroups would become so mixed that they would lose their individual identities. This is precisely what is happening to the Scottish wildcat with the encroachment of people into the previously remoter areas of the highlands. The wildcat has been interbreeding with introduced

domestic cats to the extent that there are fears that the gene pool will become extinct or that our best hope is a breeding pair or two in zoos. To this end there have been appeals recently for cat owners to take a more responsible attitude to having their pets neutered and also preventing so many cats becoming feral in an attempt to slow this interbreeding down. The true Scottish wildcat is indigenous to our shores and is a beautiful and untameable animal whose descent is similar to the lynx while the domestic cat was introduced from a line bred from Egyptian cats as seen on the ancient Egyptian tombs. On a less dramatic but equally worrying scale there is the introduced Spanish bluebell, which is crossing with the British wild bluebell. The incomer has straighter stems and more bell-shapes flowers. Woodland needs to be relatively undisturbed for several human generations before bluebells can thrive so it would be a shame if they were changed at the end of the line. It is unlikely that the latest craze for

introductions - the moose - will interbreed with the red deer. Actually the newcomers may not stand much of a chance, as they are proving to be wreckers of the habitats to which they have been introduced - though this has happened with the sika deer. In many areas of Scotland, including the local Killin area, sika have interbred with the red deer and hybrids are not that rare. It is often difficult to tell even in the larder and tongue samples can be sent for D.N.A. analysis. The sika is an altogether uglier deer with a squarer face so it would be a shame for our handsome monarch of the glens to lose some of his good looks. But the hinds, apparently, go for the sika's rugged not-so-good looks. So it's not just the usual dangers to our wildlife that we have to be aware of but also just the lifestyle changes that can make dramatic differences to the purity of our wildlife.

#### Zebra Crossing

Moving the Zebra crossing is too expensive. Police attending the meeting agreed that it was in the wrong place and Fergus Wood suggested a letter from them would help to persuade the roads department to move it. A visit by the Collision Prevention Unit and a report with recommendations to the Council would also help the case.

#### Village officer

The Hall Committee have applied to the leaseholders, Stirling Council, for financial help towards resurfacing.

#### Park Play Area

Dogs have been fouling the sandpits as the fence surrounding the play area has fallen down. The council has been informed that repair work is a priority.

#### Tyre Dumping

Lorry tyres have been dumped by the side of the main road to Crianlarich.

#### **New Council administration**

The new Council administration will focus on economic development and tourism. A Chamber of Commerce is to be formed from the over 600 businesses in the Stirling area. A twinning arrangement is to be set up linking rural areas in Scotland, Co Mayo in Ireland and Northern Ireland with a view to sharing experience and learning from each other. ### **Operation Ironworks**

A six-month operation aimed at tackling anti-social behaviour at some of Scotland's most stunning beauty spots was launched in March. Operation Ironworks will cover Loch Lomond and The Trossachs National Park and will provide high profile patrols in a bid to promote responsible behaviour in the countryside and to deter antisocial behaviour and criminal offences from being committed.

It will be run in conjunction with rangers from Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park Authority and Forestry Commission Scotland. Strathclyde Police and Tayside Police will also provide assistance in the National Park where it covers their force areas.

Crimestoppers Scotland are also supporting this initiative. There will be 42 different initiatives targeting issues such as speeding, parking problems, traffic issues at Rowardennan and Balmaha, litter offences, theft, vandalism and noise disturbance. High visibility patrols will be carried out by officers on bikes as well as officers from the Road Policing Unit, Dog Section and Underwater Search Unit. The mobile police office will also be used at various locations, trained wildlife crime officers will be deployed, and traffic wardens will ensure traffic problems are kept to a minimum.

The leader of the operation is Sergeant Joyce Greenhorn. Her aim is to make sure people can visit and enjoy the natural beauty this area has to offer without falling victim to crime or causing an annoyance to others. There have been problems in the past with tents, cars, BBQs and bags of rubbish being abandoned. Trees have even been felled in order to have a fire. That is not acceptable especially when there may be firewood lying nearby. Operation Ironworks is also about educating the public about what is expected from them. They should take their litter home and abide by the bylaws. Motorists should also be aware that if they park on Urban Clearways they will receive a fixed penalty. The National Park will be policed by local officers who have local knowledge and know the problem areas. Every loch accessible will be patrolled. Working in partnership with the police and the National Park will maximise resources, provide wide ranging benefits and help get the most out of the initiative. 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### Dr Hamilton (Tony) Weaver 1918 - 2008

A brief synopsis of a long and productive life spent mostly in the service of others.

Tony was born to parents of Scottish extraction in Loughborough. He went to school there, and later graduated from The Edinburgh University School of Medicine in 1940. In 1941 Tony married Patricia, his first wife. Together they had three children, Anthony, Michael and Fran. Eventually there were to be 9 grandchildren and 7 great arandchildren.

After qualifying as a Doctor and gaining experience in Midwifery at Rob Royston, Tony enlisted in the R.A.M.C. He served mostly with the eighth army, firstly with Montgomery in Egypt and later in Italy with the Field Ambulance. He seldom spoke of these experiences which must have been horrific, but every year, together with others, he attended The War Memorial Service to remember old comrades

After the war, following a brief period as a G.P. in Bridlington, the family moved to Peterborough where, together with Bob Smith, Tony built up a very busy practice, thriving today with a complement of 9 doctors. In addition to a busy practice life of 33 years duration, he served as a County Councillor (unpaid) for 15 years and was



Chairman of Social Services for 14 of those years. He was co-founder of the Peterborough Marriage Guidance Council, governor of 3 schools and the medical officer of Peterborough United, known as "The Posh". He had a life-long connection with The St John Ambulance Service and became a Commander of the Order of St John.

In 1978, because of Patricia's ill health, Tony took early retirement and moved to Killin, where she had lived during WW2. Following Patricia's death, Tony married Audrey and they lived a full and happy life. In later years he developed Dementia, a curse for some and a cruel thief of personal talents, abilities and intellect. Prior to the onset, he was gregarious, sociable and outgoing. A gifted public speaker, he had a splendid singing voice. He helped Dr Mairi on occasions in what was then a busy single handed practice. After 10 years of delivering the Killin News, he became the oldest paper boy in action.

He was Chairman of the Vestry at St Fillans church for several years, and later served as Treasurer.

A keen angler, Tony was Chairman of The Killin Angling Club for several years and was instrumental in securing a precious Salmon beat on The Dochart for the club.

As old pals died or moved away, his interest in angling waned, as did the desire to kill. He could never face eating his catch.

Tony revelled in the camaraderie of the senior golfers. A lively, cheery, noisy bunch dedicated to the pursuit of that elusive scratch score and the celebration of many birthdays plus any other excuse for a jolly. He was a regular attender at Shutters Restaurant where the group known as "The Killin Society of Higher Thinkers" (so named by the late Allan Walker's family) meet regularly at 11am to put the world to rights!

To the end, Tony was a gentleman, kind, courteous, loving and so very proud of his family. He will forever be a good memory to cherish and sustain those left behind.

There is also worship at Morenish Chapel and a monthly service in the Falls of Dochart Home. Some people meet in smaller groups for prayer and encouragement.

The church is still proclaiming the message, still caring for others, and as in the chapter of Acts mentioned earlier "the Lord is adding to the number". We believe "the Spirit is moving"!
