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Editorial

At least the days are becoming brighter as Spring approaches even if doom and gloom is the order of the day. Nothing can surprise us now. Even the fishing opening seemed to be less well attended than usual.

Local Tourism

The prospect of an increase in home grown tourism as the popular overseas destinations become less attractive might lighten the gloom of local service providers. Killin has such a lot to offer, much of it hidden from public consciousness or known only to those who live here. We should let it out into the public domain to help discerning visiters choose Killin as a venue. The Homecoming offers an opportunity for us to offer more to visitors. We can help by "putting Killin on the map" (p.16), advertising local businesses, supporting local providers and making Killin an attractive choice. The Tourist Association meeting identified the importance of our historical roots for visitors to research their family history and to examine the many important historical artefacts in our area. Many other communities have developed a tourist industry on a fraction of the resources available here.

A few years ago a leaflet in the form of a business directory for visitors was produced. It would not be difficult to maintain a small directory in electronic format available to all businesses in Killin to print or send electronically to their clients. Visitors coming to Killin need to know what they must bring and what is available here. Artists, craft workers and others who work from home could also be represented. Involving more people in the process would increase the distribution of the leaflet.

KAT Energy Meeting

The talk by Michael Carr of Energy Agency in the Killin Hotel was received with some enthusiasm. While the attendance was less than expected, the response indicated that an energy project, led by KAT, would be beneficial. From the response of those present it is likely that the majority of Killin residents would agree to have their energy use assessed. Much of Killin consists of old housing stock which is difficult to insulate and has solid stone walls but even in such cases measures can be taken to reduce energy use. Some residents are likely to opt in to the scheme attracted by the prospect of a free consultation and thermal imaging assessment, where some will opt to have free loft and cavity wall insulation installed. For some the prospect of saving over £250 per year on heating costs might encourage them to participate. The consultation and insulation costs would be financed by government and other charitable funds. It could be accompanied by an educational programme involving the school. The government would gain the benefit of public co-operation in striving to achieve its carbon emission targets. Now the Directors of KAT need to decide how they wish to proceed.

Rural Midwife Cover

Strathfillan CC describe the new arrangements for midwife cover (p.11). This has already been experienced by mothers in Killin. The midwives, stationed in Callander, now cover a very large area. It is reported that the midwife is more likely to be late arriving for clinics. There is no longer the continuity and close contact that patients were used to under the old system and the postnatal 'daily visits' are no longer daily. Infant feeding, especially for first-time mothers, may suffer and mothers turn to bottle feeding from lack of support and advice. The mother/midwife relationship used to be central to the process of managing a baby. To whom does the worried first-time mother now turn - NHS24?

Killin Mountain Rescue Team

2008 was another busy year for KMRT, with 29 incidents spread over the months. The Team spent nearly 1000 person hours involved in search and rescue, helping 39 people and one dog. The busiest month was November with 7 incidents. Search and Rescue Helicopters were involved in 12 incidents, assisting with Team deployment, searching and recovery of casualties. Thanks to John Morris for maintaining the statistics for the Team.

Details of incidents are: 12 people lost, requiring search and rescue; 9 people overdue turning up before search initiated; 6 people with leg injuries and 1 person serious multiple injuries requiring rescue; 4

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people +1 dog crag fast, requiring rescue; 3 people with medical conditions requiring rescue; 1 vehicle accident, requested assistance; 3 well intentioned false alarms, requiring search.



The longest search - 250 person hours - was in February, for 2 people lost in thick mist on Ben Ledi. The Team attempted to locate them at night, unsuccessfully, using whistles and lights. In the morning and in worsening visibility, down to 5m, the whistles proved more effective. A faint response was heard and the two missing walkers were located and escorted off the hill.

The Team uses the "Light and Sound" search technique to locate missing people, assuming they are able to respond in some way, either with a torch, whistle or shouts. This technique allows them to cover the ground quickly in small groups, targeting recognised walking routes. The system is to walk the route, stopping every 150m to blow whistles and shine torches. The Team then listens and looks for a response. The emergency signal is six blasts on a whistle (and/or light flashes) repeated every minute. The response to the emergency signal and the search signal is three blasts/flashes. The two lost walkers on Ben Ledi were located by this method, their whistles heard 650m away. Spotting a light on a dark

hillside is also very helpful. One night, a casualty was located by him using a mobile phone, the light from the tiny screen being seen 1.5km away by the searchers!

Training is an essential part of Team skills. The team trains twice a month, one evening and one day. In November 20 members attended a First Aid course. On the way home from the course the Team were called to assist a casualty with a broken ankle, who had slipped half way up

Ben A'an. Eager to use their new found First Aid skills, the Team rushed to the scene to assist, only to find our local Community Paramedic Practitioner in situ treating the patient! The Team were left to do the stretcher work.

Enjoy the hills, remember your whistle and torch and tell someone where you are going. Be safe.

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Killin Community Council Meeting January

Northern Energy: An application for a plant at Acharn will go to planning within the next 2 months. Fergus Tickell has offered to speak to the KCC again outlining the application.

Road Maintenance: Although the roads department has had a team in the village painting white lines on the road, still no zig zag lines have been painted on either side of the pedestrian crossing. Paul Owens will speak to the department to try to have this done as an urgent matter. **Rural Housing**: The planned development for new build housing

in the village will go ahead. There is no time scale.

Flooding: Flooding is still a problem in the school playground. Other areas have improved following the work that has been done.

Health Service: A meeting took place with Bruce Crawford, members of the KCC and members from Balfron. Clarification of the Ambulance statistics is still awaited. Killin now has ambulance cover at weekends from Callander. The presence of double crewed ambulances has been reduced in Killin. More paramedic personnel are being recruited.

National Park Local plan: The draft version of the Local Plan is now available for viewing. There will be a copy in the National Park office in Callander from 27th January. Consultation meetings will be held to allow discussion. The nearest meeting for Killin will be at Lochearnhead on January 27th. Planning permission has been granted for the Transerve truck park.

Christmas Tree: The tree was supplied by Gordon Aitken and put up by Stitt Bros. The lights which cost £227 have been well received by the village. There was only one minor incident of tampering which did not cause any damage. A cheque for £60 will be sent to the Episcopal Church for electricity. The lights will be stored in Douglas McRobbie's store. Thanks to all concerned.

Community Profile: Volunteers are required to update the village profile. Anyone interested please contact Lesley Campbell at the National Park.

Bench at Manse Road: A couple of sites have been identified for a replacement bench. Further discussion to take place.

KAT: A presentation by Michael Carr of the Energy Agency will take place on 23rd January at the Killin Hotel.

Planning: Railway Cottages at Killin Junction: passed by Planning. From March all NP planning applications can be done on line and full plans will also be accessible. Youth Project: As Alan Hewitt has resigned there is a need for someone on the committee to be responsible for Youth issues. **RAF**: The RAF would like to talk to local communities about the need for low flights in areas such as Killin. Suzanne will contact both neiahbouring communities to see if it is sensible to arrange a meeting for all in one venue.

Community Profile: Volunteers are needed to update this important work. Contact Lesley Campbell of the National Park for details.

Petitions Panel: This committee deals with decisions made by organisations including local Councils, NHS, Police, Health Boards, the Fire Service and others. It can respond to community suggestions as to how policy can change for the benefit of the community by organising petitions.

Alien Species: Stirling Council want to address the problem of alien species such as Giant Hog Weed, Japanese Knotweed and Himalayan Balsalm. A local volunteer is needed to liaise with the council. The letter is to be passed to John Holland of EAK.

Missing sign: The sign for Monemore is missing.

Red Squirrels: Tim Frost would like to be informed of any sightings of dead Red Squirrels on the road. He needs an OS grid ref. and a date when sighted. This might help with signage to help motorists slow down in areas where road crossings are the cause of death.

Fire Fighters: A change in the way local fire fighters will be recruited is to come into force. At present volunteers can present as "Retained Fire Fighters" or be "Volunteers". The Volunteers do not need the same level of training and do not receive a retainer fee. This is to change and all are to be recruited as "Retained Fire Fighters"

Junction by Ambulance Station: A new pavement has been built on Station Road approaching the corner by the Ambulance Station. No drop kerb has been built into the areas where wheel chairs and prams might need to cross the road as is standard practice in any council built pavement.

National Park Draft Local Plan

The National Park Draft Local Plan was formally launched into consultation on 23rd November Since then there has been a number of local events to let people see what is proposed in the Plan. The nearest for Killin were at Crianlarich (12th January) and Lochearnhead (27th January) If you were not able to get to either venue there is still time for you to comment. The deadline is 28th February. There is a copy of the Draft Plan at the Library or it can be accessed online at the Parks website www.lochlomond-trossachs.org. Why bother? It is true that, under the 2006 Planning Act rules, major planning matters - things like the Trump proposal in Aberdeenshire will be decided by Scottish Government, but believe it or not. there are few of us who will not be affected by whatever is agreed in our own Local Plan. Specific to Killin there is a proposal to amend the Conservation Area and another to designate a parcel of land adjacent to the bottom car park for start-up business units etc. So if you want to make any comment on these, or any other of the policy proposals, you have until 28th February. Once in place the Local Plan will hold sway for five years before it needs to be reviewed. The contact for comments is: Susan Brooks at National Park Headquarters, Carrochan Road Balloch. (Telephone 01389 722600) The Ranger Service has now been re-organised with Rangers taking on a wider range of duties. The Breadalbane area will still be under the control of Senior Ranger Callum McNeill Ritchie.

Last year Operation Ironworks proved to be a particularly successful collaboration with Police, the National Park and Forestry Commission Rangers all working together to patrol known trouble spots and engaging with visitors so that they were aware of how to behave whilst in the Park. Following on from that and other events, a suggestion was made that some Rangers may care to train as Special Constables so that they could work even more effectively with the Police. Some of our Rangers have now volunteered and have undergone the necessary training. All we need now is for the visitors to come so they can put that extra training into practice.

Mervyn's Weather

Thirty years or more ago, late Autumn and early Winter, with a few exceptions, followed a similar pattern to that which we have recently experienced in 2008. November was normally fairly mild and unsettled with the odd brief incursion of colder air. December almost inevitably produced a short cold snap, four or five days perhaps, during the first half of the month. Equally inevitably, the run up to Christmas saw the reestablishment of more balmy conditions - indeed there have been instances when temperatures experienced on the corresponding date in June have been on a par with those of Christmas day. Occasionally, however, in order to prove the rule so to speak, the exception would occur and a white Christmas would delight the children and possibly confuse those who indulge in wagering on the presence or otherwise of a Christmas snowflake! As the New Year approached conditions usually assured a more wintry nature. "As the day lengthens so the cold strengthens". The final weeks of 2008 have certainly "bucked the trend" of Global warming here in

Britain at least.

As one who scrapes a fairly tenuous existence from "the copulation of sheep" the more settled and drier weather of recent weeks has been most welcome for the tupping season, in particular for hill flocks, which instead of having to shelter from gale force winds and driving rain by coorying behind dykes or other bieldy refuges, could spread out under calm and frosty conditions and go about their nuptials in encouraging circumstances.

With so many ramblers roaming the hills nowadays, it is interesting to compare, or perhaps contrast, their mode of dress with that of hill folk of yesteryear. Many, it has to be said, are suitably clad for adverse conditions. Gore-Tex weatherproof clothing is obviously suitable dress. Anoraks too, despite their startlingly garish colours, have wind and rain resistant qualities. There is a plethora of footwear, which can be expensive; though no better than the sprung soled "herds" boots and hill shoes which were de riqueur among shepherds, hill farmers and stalkers, as indeed were the homespun tweeds and thick woollen socks/stockings. Many estates still supply their stalkers and keepers with tweed suits, each estate having its




particular check or "tartan" based on the type of terrain in which the wearer would operate e.g., a brownish/purple tweed for predominantly heathery ground, greyish green for rocky backgrounds, and so on.

At the other end of the spectrum one sees bevies of hikers trotting gaily along the roads en route for the heights with ski sticks, and the regulation maps strung round their necks, but clad in T-shirts, very brief shorts and trainers, surely not realising that a warm sunny day at 300 feet above sea level can change abruptly at 2,500 feet, even in high summer, to gale driven rain or sleet detrimental to their comfort and wellbeing or worse.

consulting on the Draft

Local Plan and Accompanying Documents which are available on www.lochlomond-trossachs.org. An Open Day for people to comment on the Draft Local Plan was held in Crianlarich village hall on 12th January and the NP staff stayed to answer questions raised by the CC. It is hoped that the LP will prove more flexible and decisions would be decided on an individual basis, negating the need to have Strathfillan defined as a settlement. The Breadalbane Summary document is available.

Some members met in Tyndrum village hall with David Lowes of Glenfalloch Estate to discuss the proposed hydro-schemes on the estate. John wrote to the NP planning committee and also to the Energy Consents Unit of the Scottish Government giving our support and mentioning the dispute about the visual impact from Ben Oss and Bein Dubhchraig Gwenn produced a list prioritising the compensatory measures wanted by Inverarnan as discussed at a meeting in the Drover's Inn, Inverarnan. These are:-

Better signage for Inverarnan - Cllr. Fergus Wood has said that he would take this forward.

Broadband is to be provided by Avanti on contract to the Scottish Government. The equipment is free but the package offered is expensive. Joyce will ask Gordon if the equipment for the now redundant system in Tyndrum would work in Inverarnan.

Low level footpath lighting - Tony will talk to the NP about this.

Upgrade of path to Glenfalloch Farm from village - Tony will enquire about ownership of the land.

Village post box - Gwenn will contact Anne McGuire MP.

Grit bin for village - Tony will talk to Cllr. Jim Thomson about this.

Planting for village areas - Gwenn will apply to the Community Pride Fund.

In Tyndrum the proliferation of signs and the unsuitability of some of them have been raised by local residents. John Riley spoke to Jim Kinnell, Chair of STAG and Owen McKee and a meeting with the tourist businesses took place on 15th January. An enforcement officer has been out to Tyndrum to assess the situation.

The CC discussed the draft letter from Cameron Taylor to Bruce Crawford MSP, Anne McGuire MP, Transport Scotland, and Grontmij (the engineering and environmental consultancy company) regarding the proposed Crianlarich By-Pass. John Rilev has been in contact with Raymond Travers, Grontmij, who is of the opinion that the by-pass will go ahead in 2011-2012. The promised public showing of the route by Traffic Scotland will be mentioned in the letter and it was agreed to hold a public meeting soon after the Transport Scotland meeting to gauge the opinion of the community.

Scottish Government is consulting on 'Climate Change and the National Forest Estate'.

Scottish Government has recently completed a strategic review of LL&TNP. This report is now out for consultation and can be found at www.scotland.gov.uk/topics/environm ent/countryside

Stirling Council has approved the introduction of a Petitions Panel that

will enable Stirling's citizens and local businesses to have a direct route of engagement with the Council's decision-making procedures. Provision has been made in the Council's timetable of meetings for one meeting of the cross-party Petitions Panel in each cycle. Issues that can be considered are in relation to services provided by Stirling Council and any of the Statutory Community Planning Partners. namely: Central Scotland Police, Central Scotland Fire and Rescue Service, NHS Forth Valley, Scottish Enterprise East and Tayside and Central Scotland Transport. Stirling Council is unable to consider petitions that are sub-judice. The criteria outlined in the guidance note have to be met before a petition can be considered. Letter from John Gilbert, Squadron Leader, [Ret'd] RAFCRO [Scotland], asking if we would like him to come to Crianlarich to give a public presentation on why the RAF needs to conduct low flying training in our area and also to answer any concerns we may have. It was agreed to invite him.

We have heard that the ambulance is only based in Killin on 2 days a week and in Callander for the rest of the week and also that the rapid response unit is permanently based in Callander. Tony will check on the validity of this.

Keith Yates, Chief Executive, Stirling Council announced he would be retiring in a couple of months time.

Isla contacted the school about the 20mph flashing sign and the school secretary is trying to get the timings rectified.

Water running down Willow Brae is freezing at the junction with the main road. This could be the result of a blocked drain. Isla will contact Hunter Jamieson, Stirling Council Roads Dept.

Drains belonging to the railway in Station Road Crianlarich keep collapsing and a long term solution needs to be found. Isla will write to Scotrail.

In early December there were no icy roads in Stirling to keep vehicles employed, but still the very icy side roads in Strathfillan were not gritted. Tony will take this up.

There have been changes to the midwifery service provided in Strathfillan to the detriment of pregnant and nursing mothers. The nurses in Killin used to have a dual district/midwifery role, but now all midwifery comes from Callander based nurses. They come to the Doctor's surgery once a week. There in no longer any continuity between the midwife and pregnant mother. They are not visiting nursing mothers daily for 10 days after they return home; it appears to be mainly due to pressure of workload. Some mothers feel unsupported. The Health Visitor is also based in Callander and is supposed to call weekly. This does not always happen. Moira will write to Eddie MacDonald, Community Health Partnership, to express our concerns.



In the last issue we said that we were applying to

the Gannochy Trust for a grant to help keep the Internet Café on the road and I'm glad to report that we have been awarded £3000. We will also receive financial help from Stirling Council who are keen to help maintain this facility in this far flung part of Stirling district.

Heather Hamilton is to continue as your friendly, helpful tutor and she will be more than happy to answer any questions you may have about what's on offer at Tyndrum Hall. The Internet/Learning Café is open on Tuesdays and Fridays 11am to 4pm.

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Mini Laptops and the Mobile Broadband Myth

I see that some manufacturers have introduced mini-laptops with 9 inch screens - these are ideal for keeping in touch whilst on holiday or travelling around the country. Some retailers are selling these systems with "mobile broadband" incorporated - indicating that you can connect to the internet at broadband speed via a Vodafone SIM card.

If you are looking at one of these machines, please note that here in the rural community, mobile internet can only connect at a very slow speed - in fact the same speed as the old dial-up internet connections we all used to suffer with. The mini laptops are useful computers and are marketed at a competitive price, but please make sure you fully understand the constraints prior to purchase.

Internet Security - Keeping your Anti-Virus up to date

It shocks me the number of people who are still using AVG version 7, fully believing that their machines are protected against viruses. This product has not been updated fully for nearly a year and therefore your computers are very likely to be infected with the latest viruses. If you do not update to version 8 there is a serious risk of your internet passwords and financial details being used fraudulently as a result of a virus.

Similarly, if you have a new computer, it is delivered with 30 days trial software from Norton or McAfee. After the trial period is over, you must either upgrade the anti-virus software or replace it with a free one, otherwise you, too, will be open to infection.

Online Backup

There are now cost effective solutions for you to safeguard your data offsite. Software copies data at prescribed times to a filestore somewhere on the internet. This means your precious data is safe, even in case of disaster. Options are available to encrypt the data so that only you can view its contents. This is ideal for small businesses who have mission critical data that they need to store offsite. If you are interested in this service, it might be worthwhile talking to an expert so that you can maximise your protection yet mimimise your costs.

Rural Broadband Project

The company Avanti who have been contracted by Scottish Executive to roll out broadband for the rural community have been busy in our area. I am aware of several local businesses which have recently had satellite internet connected and all are actively using their newly acquired broadband internet. This is good news for us, and I just hope that we end up with 100% broadband coverage soon.

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The Heat is On

In June 2007 the McLaren Hall Management Committee decided that we should replace our antiquated heating system. Following discussions a plan crystallised with an estimated overall cost of nearly £60,000. Applications for funding were made in consultation with Suzanne Player. We applied to 11 organisations in autumn 2007. Imagine our amazement and excitement when we received our first positive response in November of the same year for £1,000! Our next surprise was in December when a promise of £10,000 was made and we felt quite elated and confident. We had received letters advising us that many committees were meeting in the new year of 2008 so we had to wait for further developments. Along the way we also received non supportive letters but in the end these only amounted to four. In January £5,000 was pledged, in March another £16,000 came our way and in May and June our total reached £45,000. £10,000 was available from our own funds and so £55,000 was available.

in July 2008. We had allowed a window of eight weeks and the hall re-opened for business at the end of August. We can only apologise to anyone who was inconvenienced by this. Our thanks to Kenny Lang, our property convener, who steered this project along with its "prickly problems".

We received donations, some anonymous, which have helped the shortfall and our grateful thanks to these donors. Along with the management committee's sincere thanks to Suzanne, I must give my own personal thanks to her for help with sourcing the funders and compiling the letters to sell our project. I know she had some misgivings about getting the money in time but "it came good" and we should all be very proud of this achievement.

It just remains for us to enjoy our new system and use it wisely and economically. We have a splendid venue which is the envy of many a town and village, and if bookings continue as they have been we shall see many others enjoying it too.



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Putting Killin on the Map



A wiki is a page or collection of Web pages designed to enable anyone who accesses it to contribute to or modify the content. The concept that, with cooperation, altruism and the internet, the general public could create a useful encyclopaedia, has been shown to be effective by Wikipedia which now has over 2.5 billion moderately sized articles on its database. The website www.openstreetmap.org presents a Wiki map of the whole world, freely available without restrictions of copyright that anybody can edit, copy or use. Making copies of an Ordinance Survey map for a leaflet or card to send to your friends or customers to show them where you live or work, without permission, is against copyright law.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{OpenStreetMap}}$ maps have been constructed by enthusiastic volunteers in every part of the world.

Cities and countries throughout the world are being plotted on the map all the time. Some, such as Amsterdam and Birmingham, have already completed their road networks. Mistakes are sometimes made and these are always open to correction by others involved in the project. There are two main ways in which roads and houses can be identified and drawn. OpenStreetMap has an agreement with Yahoo to use its aerial (satellite) imagery which can be superimposed on the blank map (Slippy Map) and features can be drawn in using the online editor (Potlatch). The result is a fairly accurate representation of what is on the ground. This doesn't work well for the Killin area as the satellite photographs here are rather poor unlike some cities where even parked cars can be identified. Alternatively, those with a handheld GPS can walk along the roads taking continuous recordings and download the traces onto the map via the internet when they return home. They can then draw the lines of the roads on the map and mark in points of interest such as hotels, hostels, churches, mountain peaks, woods and services. GPS accuracy is usually limited to 7 -12 metres, which results in reduced accuracy at higher magnifications, but the results can be improved later by those familiar with the area.

The code of conduct requires that no information is copied from copyright sources. Even street names must be taken from evidence on the ground or other local non copyright sources. Commercial maps deliberately contain incorrect information such as Knockbain Road off Fingal Road in Killin on hostelbookers.com, or Uxbridge Street at the end of The Glebe on Multimap, placed there to prove copyright ownership should a dispute arise.

Openstreetmap provides opportunities for those who are keen to contribute to the world database and those who would like to use the facility for their own purposes. You too can start mapping.

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Food blocks and Fairy dew I'm afraid that there is nothing new to report on the 'ectoplasm'. Scientists are still carrying out studies and are certain that it is a kind of fungal/slime mould living on a jelly substrate. It's what the jelly is that is baffling them. It appears to be reptilian and may be from frogs, which apparently have spawn jelly in their oviducts all year round, which is distasteful to mammal predators, who spit it out. Put together the fact that frogs are amphibians and hibernate all winter, and the theory of little green (reptilian-like) creatures from space still seems to hold up! Probably better than one suggestion that it is fairy dew.

Maybe the fairies have been giving the red squirrels a few lessons as our friends are now enjoying a new and very nutritious food source. In winter deer blocks of minerals and protein are put out to give the deer an extra bite. They are put on tall posts to avoid them being eaten by other animals but, squirrels can climb up the stob and hang on to the underside of the block to get a good nibble. Gavin Skipper of The National

Park is trying to persuade the council to put up squirrel signs. You can help by reporting any red squirrel road kills either to him or myself. Pigeon fanciers are being allowed to trap sparrow hawks in Larsen traps (large wire boxes where food and water can be supplied) and relocate them to stop the now larger numbers of sparrow hawks killing their pigeons. Hooray for the pigeon fanciers but estates are not allowed to do the same to protect pheasants or wild grouse. We must still be very politically incorrect. This may be because everyone who makes rules about the countryside seems to be urban born and bred with no desire to have actual contact with rural life personally. The recent rules that all dead farm animals must be removed and disposed of has meant, as was predicted, that birds of prev are being robbed of food and there are reported instances of buzzards becoming cannibalistic through hunger. What is the sense in protecting a species till its numbers become so high and then removing its food? Maybe crofters and farmers will soon be told to supply clinically clean food stands

with processed rabbit shaped food pellets for the raptors.

The R.S.P.B. has been requesting people to take care not to disturb birds too much in the cold weather as they need rest and a good roost site. Hooray for the birds but could we please extend that to the deer and sheep who also find themselves constantly disturbed by people.

Species Recovery at Ben Lawers

The National Nature Reserve and the National Trust for Scotland property were both established to conserve the rare mountain plants for which the site is famous. Therefore, when one of these species declines to extinction it is logical that steps are taken, if possible, to forestall its demise on the Reserve. A case of such 'species recovery' at Ben Lawers was the highland saxifrage, Saxifraga rivularis L. It is a national rarity, adapted to growing in very cold niches on high mountains.

Anecdotal and photographic evidence indicates that the Ben Lawers population has undergone a significant decline over the 20th century. Since 1981 the few remaining plants have been monitored almost every year. Until 1988 the number fluctuated between two and six, with only two of these being established, mature plants, and the other seedlings mostly failing to establish and grow. In 1988, a third plant was recorded, well-established, growing rapidly and flowering well. It was soon dug up and stolen by person or persons unknown, an unlawful act, showing that this pernicious habit is still a threat to such rare species in the wild. The last two plants were not thriving, rarely flowering and therefore unlikely to produce seed. Soon one had disappeared, probably dead from natural causes.

We decided to restore a viable population by propagation and planting, but the poor flowering performance of the last plant left us with a dire shortage of potential seeds. The nearest population was on the NTS property at Glencoe and was healthy enough to spare some seeds for our use. After some precautionary research* to test the suitability of this population for translocation to Ben Lawers (a long story), seeds were collected under permit. It took a few years to produce strong plants for planting**, six of which were placed in the same area in 2004. It was not possible to check them until 2006, by which time the last original plant had also died. However, all the new plants had survived, with four thriving, and a new plant that had grown, presumably from one of the transplants beside which it was growing, and which was flowering well. A second group of six plants was placed at a new site, to try to evade the collectors, but these six plants failed. Another six were placed at the original site in 2007, so that in 2008 we had 12 plants growing well, some flowering and fruiting, giving us hope that the population might sustain itself into the future, and that the proven extinction has also failed. Ongoing monitoring is necessary to show whether this hope is realised, or whether further action might be needed.

How might climate change affect such a species? Intuitively it sounds like a threat to species adapted to some of our coldest places. However, no confident predictions can be made, but a discussion of that complex issue is beyond the scope of this report.

One of the wettest opening ceremonies for some years heralded the start of the season. At both Auchmore and Morenish the day got off to a good start and at least two fish were caught later.









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

The aim of the project was to improve the knowledge and skills of practices and primary healthcare practitioners in the area of patient safety and clinical risk reduction and involved a small selection of practices from both NHS Tayside & Forth Valley. This pilot project was short listed for a Health Service Journal Award 2008. which was presented at the Grosvenor Hotel, London. This is an annual awards ceremony celebrating the best innovations within the NHS and was attended by 1300 candidates hoping

to win one of the 18 available awards. The shortlist was packed with inspiring examples of healthcare at its very best. Developing patient-led services, improving safety and tackling health inequalities were just a few of the themes that shone through in the work.

There were 8 projects short listed within our group with the eventual winners being Salford Roval NHS Foundation Trust. NHS Tayside & Forth Valley were very highly commended and ended up in the runners up spot, flying the flag for Scotland in an event very much dominated by the bigger trusts from England.

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
Group Captain D.E.B.Dowling AF.C. 1930-2008

David was born in Runcorn and spent his childhood mainly in Cheshire and during the early war in Fairbourne, Wales, before going to Malvern College, which he left in 1948 to go to RAF College Cranwell. There he qualified as a pilot and embarked on a career that took him all over the world including Norway, Turkey, USA, Peru, Thailand, Singapore and Hong Kong where he was Station Commander during the Communist troubles in 1966 and 1967.

In 1957 he met his future wife Ethel in Canada and they married in 1958. His son, Anthony, was born in Wales in 1959 and twin daughters, Jenny and Susan, in 1961 on the Isle of Man.

During his career he flew 36 different types of aircraft, from Tiger Moths to VC10 airliners. In between and after his flying posts he was undertaking Command and Training duties. His final posting in the RAF was to a training job at RAF College Cranwell where it all began. During his career he received the Air Force Cross, the Queen's Jubilee Medal, the Peruvian Cross and the Borneo Medal.

He retired in 1981 and the same year inherited his father's farm in



Wales which had been part of his life since he joined the RAF as, whenever possible, he would go there to help out. However it proved too small to be viable so in the early 1980s David and Ethel toured Scotland looking for a larger farm resulting in the purchase of Kinnell in 1986 and their 32nd, final and biggest move together, involving 5 removal vans, 2 cattle lorries and an artic.

David took an active role in the estate business right up to his death

and worked quietly on committees and organisations locally to try to preserve the "essence" of Killin and Loch Tay and to improve local services. He took a wider view as many MPs will testify. He liked this area and had a great respect for the local community whom he found always helpful and generous. David was the local representative for the Earl Haig Fund and over the last 17 years collected for the fund. He had many hobbies and one of his greatest loves was sailing. He would often set sail from Oban on his vacht with his family out to explore the West coast.

With four of them living next door, David always had time for his five grandchildren. He very often did the school run and enjoyed joining in the local politics discussed at the school gate.

In October 2008 David and Ethel celebrated their Golden wedding anniversary at Kinnell, and this included a 6 course Victorian dinner with all the family.

The lives he touched were many and he will be greatly missed by his family and all who knew him.

Former Youth Hostel Association site Killin Provisional Tree Preservation order was made on the thirteenth of November 2008 because:-

The National Park Authority has recently been alerted to tree clearance works being undertaken within the grounds of the former Youth Hostel Association site in Killin. The landowner has stated that work is being undertaken with a view to developing the site for housing, although no current planning consents exist for the site. The remaining trees on the site make a significant contribution to the amenity of the area and setting of the existing Victorian villa on the site as well as forming part of a wider belt of woodland that forms the backdrop to the north western part of the village. In order to ensure that adequate consideration is made of the contribution that the remaining trees can make to the amenity value of any future use of the site, it is considered expedient to serve a Tree Preservation Order to protect the trees

A certified copy of the Order and map may be inspected at National Park Headquarters, Carrochan, Carrochan Road, Balloch, G83 8EG between the hours of 8.30 am to 4.30 pm Monday to Friday.

You may make objections or representations to the Planning Authority in terms of Regulation 7 of the Town and Country Planning (Tree Preservation Order and Trees in Conservation Areas) (Scotland) Regulations 1975 as amended by the Town and Country Planning (Tree Preservation Order and Trees in Conservation Areas) (Scotland) Amendment Regulations, 1981. REGULATION 7

(1) Every objection or representation to the Planning Authority with respect to an Order shall be made in writing, shall state the grounds thereof and specify the particular trees, group of trees or woodlands in respect of which it is made. 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

In late January 1956, during the tense days of the Montgomery, Alabama bus boycott, civil rights leader Dr Martin Luther King Jr. could not sleep. A threatening telephone call had terrified him. So he prayed, "I am here taking a stand for what I believe is right. But Lord, I must confess that I am weak now, I'm faltering, I'm losing my courage. Now I am afraid.... The people look to me for leadership and if I stand before them without strength and courage, they too will falter. I am at the end of my powers - I can't face it alone."

Dr King later wrote, 'At that moment I experienced the presence of the Divine as I never experienced Him before. It seemed as though I could hear the quiet assurance of an inner voice saying, 'Stand up for righteousness, stand up for truth, and God will be at your side forever.' Almost at once my fears began to go. My uncertainty disappeared. I was ready to face anything."

The rest is history. Dr King wanted to see people of all colours free of the damage done by racism and prejudice. The recent election of President Barack Obama is the fulfilment of Dr King's dream.

If we face opposition when we're trying to do what's right, we too may cry out to the Lord. He alone is our "rock of refuge, a fortress of defense." (Psalm 31:2) He is a reliable source of strength and protection. When we trust the power of God, we experience peace, not panic. Ladd Fagerson



Does your organisation need anything?

The CFSLA Payroll Lottery (Clackmannanshire, Falkirk and Stirling Local Authorities) is made up of the employees of all three participating councils and the Police, Fire and Assessors Service as well as Forth Valley College. Cash is raised by way of a voluntary monthly prize draw. After paying out the prizes, the remaining money is used to help mainly local groups. Funding is normally in the form of equipment, materials, etc. We only give cash in exceptional circumstances.

The CFSLA Payroll Lottery donated over £10,000 in 2008 to local community organisations and local, national and international charities. It donated equipment and supported council staff fundraising efforts to a wide variety of organisations including scout groups, youth football, playgroups, community newspapers, cancer charities, hospices, overseas orphanages etc.

The committee meet 4-5 times annually to decide which applications to support with the profits of their monthly payroll lottery. The lottery is open to all employees of the 6 organisations above and to former employees. Staff can apply for additional help with their fundraising efforts and organisations can apply for equipment to help them maintain or improve the services they offer. The next meeting will be held on 11th February 2009 but organisations can apply at any time.

More on Electoral Roll

The new Register of Electors (Voters Roll) published on 1st December shows an increase in the number of eligible electors in the Forth Valley Area as 222,616, an increase of 3924 over the last published register on 1st February 2008.

Over 12% of households have not yet returned the annual form but the number of households responding increased and the additional electors registered will now be able to vote in any future elections including the European Parliament Election on 4th June 2009. There has also been an increase in the percentage of voters who have chosen to withhold their names from the Edited Register of Electors hoping to lessen the amount of junk mail they receive.

In Killin the total electorate is 782, of whom 202 (25.83%) opted out of the Edited version and in Crianlarich/Tyndrum the total electorate is 248, with 88 (35.48%) opting out.

The Local area 1st December Register of Electors is available to view in local libraries and the full Register in the Council headquarters and the office of the ERO. Anyone who has still to register or needs to notify the ERO of a change of address or name can obtain a form in their local library or download a registration form from www.saa.gov.uk/central or




