

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Editorial

One would think that there would be lots of information to fill this edition of the Killin News. We don't usually have such major happenings between editions but, at 36 pages, it is shorter than usual.

The sadness of being dispossessed by a housefire once again brought out support of a type that is unusual in towns and cities. Offers of alternative accomodation and material support for the two families whose houses were destroyed came in before the fire itself was extinguished. We've come to expect generous offers from Killin where community feeling and support for others appears to come as second nature and defines local"community spirit". (page3) This contrasts with rumours of a threat of eviction shrouded in secrecy, taken on behalf of the village for reasons unknown, that has aroused this very spirit among some people who care for others in the community. We hope this comes to a fair and satisfactory conclusion for all involved. (page 5)

The Sports and Social Club is in a good financial state but needs your help. It requires an energetic, enterprising and imaginative management team to support a wide range of village sports and events. Such a group could seek the services of Active Stirling to enhance opportunities for sports, training and other activities and for a grant to involve a professional to help in the process. The activities of youngsters already involved in tennis, football and Taekwondo indicate that the club could be used to support these and a wide variety of other sporting acitvities. The Killin and Ardeonaig Community Development Trust KAT has taken on new directors including representation from Ardeonaig. The application for the energy project, Killin Cutting Carbon, is in the pipeline but has been subjected to new obstacles placed since the Fintry application. While the effect is to water down the original plans, every attempt is being made to proceed with a plan as near as possible to the original one and to add elements which will leave a legacy that will help continue improvements in carbon emissions and include an element of local employment. Only time will tell if it will be accepted.

He pushed open the door and was met by more smoke and through which he could see flames. Realising it was serious, but not quite taking in that he had also been burnt, he went to ring 999 but, as he did so, the phone went dead when the wires burnt through. However his call had got through - as over twenty calls from other people. As Jock was being given first aid for a badly burnt arm, someone went to tell Hazel, who was at work in the Pound Shop. On hearing that her house was on fire, her first reaction was "It can't be - we

haven't not a fire in the house!" - and she waited until Bob Law could stand in for her before aoina to see. By this time smoke was billowing out of the upstairs window and roof and soon after flames blazed through tiles on the roof and it seemed an age before help arrived.



(Our firemen all have other jobs and not all of them are in the village all the time so how long it takes between the alert and leaving the station depends on how guickly the minimum crew can get there. During the night, when they are all in the village and some are very close by, it can take as little as five minutes.) In fact members of Killin Fire Brigade arrived on the scene at 10.47am, just eight minutes after they were alerted, appliances from Crianlarich, Tyndrum and Callander arrived about twenty minutes later, and one each from Stirling and Aberfeldy after a further ten.

On reaching Monemore the Killin firemen quickly established that noone was inside so no attempt was made to enter the fiercely burning building. The hose was immediately run out and water from the appliance pumped into the upstairs window as they looked for the hydrant on the pavement opposite the Capercaillie for even more water. However the hydrant sign was missing and the hydrant itself had been tarred over black mark for whichever authority responsible - so hydrants at the end of Manse Road and at the Bridge had to be used by the various crews. Not long after the first water went into the upstairs window there was a very scary firework display of bangs, cracks and flashes as the electrical wires and appliances blew in the house and the main electrical feed into the house began to burn down like a roman candle. The danger of electrocution meant water could then be used only with extreme care until the arrival of someone from the Hydro Board who had to be sent for to switch off the power at the mains. Horrified onlookers thought that the water had run out or that the pressure had dropped. The fire was brought under control just after one o'clock, but work continued on the site into the evening by which time

No. 5 was roofless, with its contents a sorry blackened heap in the garden. No. 6 adjoining it was also very badly affected by smoke and water damage and had a hole in the roof. Jock, Hazel and John Guild were homeless and had only what they stood up in. How did they feel? At the time, they say, they were simply stunned. Hazel's worst moment was seeing the roof fall in. They did manage to rescue some old photographs from a sturdy sideboard which had protected them from burning and a fireman also found Jock's golf clubs safe under the stairs. Commenting as he tipped the water out of the golf bag, he said "I see Jock has been in the water again". John is surprised his wine collection has been left untouched in the garden. He knows that it is ruined but thought someone might have been tempted to try it. Looking back more than a month after it happened, all three accept that all they lost were "things" and things can be replaced. The Guilds were put up in the Killin Hotel for just over three weeks and are now temporarily rehoused in No. 1 Monemore. The first time they were again able to cook their own meals was when they really felt that things were getting back to normal. They have been told it will be about a vear before they can get back into No. 5 but are near enough to watch progress. Jock, Hazel and John say people in the village were tremendously supportive and they would like to thank everyone very much for all the kindness, sympathy and offers of furniture and other items which they received. Meanwhile, however, their neighbours in No. 6, whose house is also uninhabitable, are still in the Killin Hotel and have been given no indication about how long they will be there or what is happening to No. 6. мм

Killin Community Council meeting 12th May

Matters arising: The land at Ballechroisk has been purchased by the housing association, planning applications for six houses will be submitted soon and contractors should be on site by January. No village officer has yet been appointed for Killin although Crianlarich, Tyndrum, Lochearnhead and Strathyre all have village officers. Provost Wood has agreed to pursue this

Remedial work on the re-surfacing of the Main Street has still to be done and Provost Wood will find out when. Dochart Bridge was inspected by a road engineer in April because of recurring pot holes and cracks. These faults should be logged with the roads department by observant members of the public.

Planning: The chalets on the land adjacent to the Golf Course have been refused planning permission. The application for the Cost Cutters building has gone to appeal.

Play Park: Dogs and cats still have access and are fouling the sand pit. There is no gate only a grid which does not to deter animals. Play equipment needs upgrading and the muddy surface round the bench area needs scraping and resurfacing.

Breadalbane Park: A meeting is still to take place between the Highland Games Committee, the Agricultural Society and Stirling Council with regard to the poor drainage in the park. National Park: The National Park review has taken place. Any final changes have yet to be decided. The number of board members is to be reduced from 25 to 18 who will be made up of 6 elected, 6 appointed by the Councils within the Park and 6 appointed by the Scottish Government. New Turning Circle: During the holiday weekend camper vans were parked in the turning area. The area fenced off is polluted by Japanese Knotweed and is to be treated. Suggestions for the use of this area should be put in writing to the Council. Community Profile: No applications for the post of researcher on the community profile have been received. KAT: There will be a slight delay in the application for the Killin Cutting Carbon project. This is because the rules now require 3 quotes. Previous applications to the Climate Challenge Fund required only one. KAT now have a new director, Rosemary Simpson, who represents Ardeonaig.

Squirrels Signs: Gavin Skipper the National Park Ranger for Breadalbane is negotiating with the Council to place warning signs by the Golf Course where some have been run over. The Folklore Centre: There are plans for discussions between Killin Community Council, KAT and Stirling Council to see if the Centre can be managed as a community operated facility to be coordinated by Suzanne Player. Winter Gritting: School children in Glenlochay were unable to get to school on some snowy days in the winter because gritters did not go up the glen. There is to be a new policy about gritting sensitive areas if school children are involved. Christmas Lights: The lamp posts in

the Main Street are not strong enough to support cables for Christmas lights. Some lamp posts have been replaced and if they all were, lights could be supported. Provost Wood suggested that a letter requesting new lamp posts should be sent to the Council. After School care: Claire Noble and her group, who are looking at the possibility of reinstating after school care, are to visit Thornhill to see how it is organised in their community. They are also asking all interested parents from Tyndrum, Crianlarich, Killin and Strathyre to complete a questionnaire. Nursery Provision for the under 3s: As a rural community, Killin was funded by the education authority for 12 hours nursery care for the under 3s. This facility has now ceased, forcing working parents either to pay for care or one parent to give up work. Dog Fouling: This is an ongoing problem compounded by the dog bins not being emptied often enough. Anyone who witnesses an owner not cleaning up after their dog should report the matter to the Police and the Community Council by letter. Bridge of Lochav Holidav Houses: The application for 4 apartments to be built beside the Bridge of Lochav Hotel was only permitted if they were for holiday lets. The application would have been rejected if they had been for permanent homes. There is a shortage of houses for local people and Owen McKee was asked why the application could not be for permanent homes for locals. The answer was that the application was dealt with under the rules of the existing local plan drawn up by Stirling Council. A new local plan is under consultation and will be in place by 2010. It would probably favour permanent homes. If the application was resubmitted, it might

Gaelic Place Names: Provost Wood asked for a show of hands in support of replacing signs with dual language names. Those present either voted against or abstained.

Sports & Social Club: At the AGM only one office bearer was prepared to stand. Jill and Colin Higgins have moved away from the village so vacating 2 positions. A meeting is planned for 18th June at 7.30pm to try to establish a new committee.

John Grant: A letter sent to John Grant at the McLaren Hall house by Hill & Robb Solicitors on behalf of the Trustee and Management committee of the McLaren Hall issued him with an eviction order. A petition was presented to the committee in support of John and opposing the action taken. A member of the public asked for more openness by the trustees and the management committee. It was also pointed out that the Hall was the property of the village and the action taken did not have the support of a large number of those present. A sub-group of councillors was formed to ask to meet the McLaren Hall committee to find out why the situation with John Grant has arisen and why meetings apart from the AGM are not open to the public.

New Hospital Access: A meeting is to be arranged to discuss access to the new hospital. This will include patient transport systems, emergency ambulance service and public access to the Larbert site. This meeting will give Community Councillors and Community Development Trust Directors the opportunity to hear about arrangements for transport and services and to ask questions of representatives from Forth Valley Health Board, Stirling Council and the Scottish Ambulance Service. If local people have specific questions they would like to have asked on their behalf, they should pass these on to one of the community councillors. Next meeting: Tuesday 14th July 7.30pm McLaren Hall.

Patient Satisfaction

GP's are required to survey patient opinion as part of our contract. We first did this in 2003, before the requirement to do so.

In February 2009 we surveyed 50 patients per doctor, during attendance at the surgery, asking a variety of questions relating to how we are performing. These range from questions about contacting us by phone to items related to individual doctor's consulting. Thanks to all who took the time to help.

116 questionnaires were returned (77%). We were happy to find that, on all of the items surveyed, we were scoring at or above the average, which is worked out by amalgamating the results from practices across the UK. We think this reflects the hard work put in by the whole team. The detailed report is too lengthy to put here but can be viewed at the practice. Most of the scores are selfexplanatory. We have discussed

the results as a practice. We are always trying to improve. We received lots of spontaneous positive comments. Negative comments were around surgery opening times and Out of Hours care. Sadly, these elements are out of our control so if you want changes you will need to lobby your MSP! On a positive note, we have seen great improvements in the OOH system over time and it does seem to be working much better than in the beginning.

Prescription Charges

From the beginning of April, the cost of prescription charges in Scotland has been reduced as part of moves by the Scotlish Government to abolish them altogether in 2011. The cost of a single prescription has fallen from £5 to £4 and the cost of a Prescription Prepayment Certificate (PPC) has been lowered from £48 to £38 for 12 months and £17 to £13 for 4 months.

Pre-payment applications forms are available from dispensing doctors, you can also order a PPC through the post from the Practitioners Services Division at NHS National Services Scotland or visit www.psd.scot.nhs.co.uk for full details.

Any patients that are exempt from prescription charges may be asked for their National Insurance Number.

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Springtales

There were some lovely warm and sunny days in April promising an early Spring. There was a report of an orange tip butterfly out and about and we saw a lizard out on the hill. He was all the more interesting for having guite a number of ticks on him. They appeared to be the usual sort that inhabits sheep - and humans - so is this a new phenomenon, because there are fewer sheep hosts to hitch a lift and meal from, or is it that we have just never seen it before? There is currently quite a lot of concern about the declining numbers of swifts. Unlike their cousins the swallows and martins who make their nests on walls of buildings, swifts build actually inside cracks and holes in higher buildings. In older pre-war buildings there are suitable air vents etc to accommodate them but newer buildings, often of concrete rather than brick, have very few such gaps; any holes are covered with grills. In some Scandinavian countries there is

legislation to ensure that new tall buildings are swift friendly. There is sense in this since a single bird is estimated to eat around 80 thousand insects per day. With the northward spread of malaria carrying mosauitoes this sounds good. Could it also help to stop the spread of bluetongue? It would certainly be a lot cheaper than a midge machine! More news on the squirrel front - it was thought locally that there was a hybrid red/grev around but I have it on good authority that this is not possible - and thank goodness otherwise the English reds would have died out. At this time of year, however, they appear to be moulting and sometimes the underfur is a less red colour and individuals do vary as to exact shade of red. (Probably depends on how recently they have been to get their roots done?) We have two regulars at the bird table and, although they have mastered the squirrel feeder, they often enjoy a few Olympic athletic swings on the feeders. The young male has to be careful as he has lost half his tail

somewhere and is learning new balancing moves. Spring is also bringing us closer to the 'big walk' season. There are now so many charity walks with such huge numbers of participants that areas like Ben Nevis are seeing a drastic effect upon the habitat. The charities are gaining but the environment is suffering. Hopefully a new fashion in fundraising will come sooner rather than too late. Maybe sponsor a day path rebuilding?

If you are one of the campers beginning to return for the Summer season then please respect the countryside which you come here to enjoy. When you park please leave sufficient room on the road for locals to have access not to mention the emergency services. While camping please do not ringbark or chop down young trees for your fires and on leaving please take your rubbish, especially glass bottles, with you instead of exploding them on your campfire as seems to be the fashion. **Tim Frost**



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Media Servers

There are widely available products to allow you to play videos, music and show pictures on your computers, your music centres, and even your television. These products can be either software, hardware, or even as part of your television itself.

The basic concept is that you store media files somewhere (typically on a computer) in the home, and then use a computer network to distribute these files to home audio visual devices that conform to the Digital Living Network Alliance, or DLNA standard.

Be careful to ensure your home network has enough bandwidth to carry the video or audio data. If you are intending to use a wireless

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network to stream these data within your home, then you are likely to need the latest technology in wireless networking, i.e. a wireless-N router. Without this type of router, it is unlikely that you will be able to play music or video without the picture or the sound breaking up.

Windows Updates

Many computers that are heavily infected with viruses come to me to be cleaned. Several of these machines have anti-virus software installed, but the persistent viruses are still getting through.

It is not sufficient just to have up to date anti-virus software, you also need to keep your version of Windows up to date. Both Windows XP and Windows VISTA have tools to ensure you automatically download the latest operating system patches. If you ignore these updates, you will put your machine and your data at risk. **Windows 7**

Microsoft is intending to launch a new operating system, perhaps next year. This is currently on trial and the trial (or beta) version of Windows 7 is available for download. Please note that this should only be considered if you are technically competent. There is no support available for this version, and you use it at your own risk

Time will tell if this new version of Windows will be beneficial, but there is a lot of scepticism within the general public whenever Microsoft

releases a new product. Rural Broadband

The Scottish Executive's project to bring broadband to the rural community has suffered recently from poor performance. The reliability has been so bad that many people are wishing they had never signed up for the service. The problem has been confirmed as both technical - with a fault in a satellite - and design, where the expected amount of downloaded data was underestimated.

The service provider, Avanti, is currently working to resolve these issues, but in the meantime, if you have suffered from poor service, then the recommendation is to complain and demand a refund.

I hope that these issues are resolved soon, as this is the only current method for rural communities to get any form of broadband access to the internet. **Mark Lincoln**

They have been asked to take a little more care in any future messages. The Transport Scotland Manager with overall responsibility is Jonny Moran who can be contacted directly on 0141-272-7378 if the problem recurrs.



Antiskid/Vehicle Activated

Signs: The Accident Investigation and Prevention Team (AIP) will investigate the deterioraton in the antiskid surface. The request for Vehicle Activated Signs for Tyndrum will be part of a rolling programme of villages within the North West Unit.

Thank you to Effie and all the volunteers for organising the local litter pick.

Both applications to the **Community Pride Fund** for refurbishing entrance signs to Crianlarich and enhancing Inverarnan, were successful, each receiving £1000; Gwenn Hunter has been busy trying to organise things for Inverarnan and is well on the way to getting everything in place.

NHS Forth Valley Community Newsletter tells of a new service for heart attack patients. Called optimal reperfusion patients will be diagnosed and taken to hospital within 90 minutes or treated with a clot-busting drug after diagnosis by the paramedic.

Changes to the Scottish Planning System are coming into force: All Scotland will be covered by Local Development Plans [LDP]; but only 4 city regions, Aberdeen, Dundee,



Edinburgh and Glasgow will be covered by Strategic Development Plans [SDP]. New requirements ensure that CCs are kept up to date with plan progress and have an opportunity to shape the development of their community. Initially main issue reports will be prepared focusing on big decisions and including options and alternative approaches. Prospective applicants for national or major developments can carry out a pre-application consultation [PAC] with communities. This becomes compulsory after 3rd August. From 3rd August 2009 the new planning system will be in operation in addition to the above:

- 1 weekly list giving more information to CCs
- 2 21 days to respond to neighbour notification
- 3 pre-determination hearings
- 4 more information on how decisions were made when CC has made representation on an application

From the minutes of the meeting on 11th May

John Riley has been trying to get someone in Scottish and Southern Electric [SSE] to follow up with the promise of community benefit for the Caorach hydro scheme by Loch Dochart, and has now learnt that they will be happy to brief Strathfillan Community Council on the progress of the development (now consented and due to commence construction later this vear). They will also be in more of a position to discuss community benefit at that time and will contact us over the summer months to establish when would be suitable Moira Robertson will meet tenant representatives from across Scotland and Alex Neil, Minister for Housing and Communities, on 12th May. Isla Craig has been in correspondence with Bruce Crawford MSP regarding the proposed Crianlarich by-pass and the lack of consultation with the community. Bruce is proposing to call a meeting

in Crianlarich in late May or early June and invite Transport Scotland. John Riley and Moira Robertson attended a meeting on the proposed Glenfalloch Hydro Schemes with David Lowes and local residents. The proposals appear well thought out, will not be unsightly and will have the backing of the Community Council.

Inverarnan Community received £1500 from the Scottish and Southern Electricity substation to spend on plants and tubs to improve the area.

John Goodale and Moira Robertson attended a NP seminar on Energy Efficiency and Renewables

on Energy Enclency and Renewables - What can your community do? It was very interesting and could be advantageous to our village hall committees. Community Energy Scotland, who previously only operated in Highlands & Islands region, has recently won the contract for the whole of Scotland. They will come out and audit community buildings and give options on more efficient energy systems. They should have staff in place in our area soon.

One of the success stories of a community taking things into its own hands is the Falls of Dochart Retirement Home here in Killin Those who visit there know that it is a well run, cheerful place and the residents are happy, so it is gratifying, but no surprise, to learn that a recent inspection report from the Scottish Commission for the Regulation of Care rated the Home very highly. It was given 'Very Good' for Care and Support and for Environment and 'Good' for Staffing and for Management and Leadership.

Running a Home nowadays is a lot more than having good staff and feeding and caring for residents. New regulations from Health and Safety or European standards frequently demand more action or paperwork. Staff must often update their experience in various areas by attending courses, records must be kept in particular ways or, as happened some time ago, all doors had to be expensively replaced. You may have wondered why the garden and carpark at the Home have recently been dug up. This was because a different type of pipe from the gas tank to the boiler was required by new rules. Sometimes conforming to such requirements

can be unexpected and costly so the Home is extremely grateful for the financial support it receives from individuals, often anonymously, from legacies and from events in the village. Thanks to such gifts, which are used primarily for the direct benefit of the residents, they are not disadvantaged by unexpected demands on the finances and the Falls of Dochart can continue to maintain high standards and remain a valued asset to the community.

A brass plate found by Jimmy Gauld was presented to the Heritage Society recently. The plate has a gap in the metal probably suitable to have a hasp fitted so could have been fixed to a work box. The words on the plate read "Wm Robertson plumber Killin". An exploration of the census returns gives some details of the family who first appear in the 1891 census. William aged 37 is listed as the head of the household; occupation plumber. His birth parish was Kenmore but the parish of Kenmore extended to the Killin area so he probably was a local. His wife Catherine aged 37 is from Killin

parish. She was probably a widow with a son when she married William as there is a William Ferguson, her son identified in the school record, age 12 also living in the house. The other children are Peter 5. Donald 4 and Alex 1. Peter Robertson age 31 also a plumber lives in the house and is a brother to William. Ten years later in 1901 the household has been increased by another child John. William Ferguson lists his occupation as a postman. Two girls. Margaret and May, were born after 1901. All the children are in the Killin School register and entered the school

between May 1891 and Dec 1913. This probably establishes when the family arrived in the village. The leaving details for the children from the school suggests that the family moved to Errol GΔ



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Respect the Park

Operation Ironworks, the six-month operation aimed at tackling antisocial behaviour at some of Scotland's iconic beauty spots and which is part of Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park Authority's Respect The Park programme, was launched in April. The initiative, led by Central Scotland Police and run in conjunction with rangers from Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park, Forestry Commission Scotland, with Strathclvde and Tavside Police forces, provides high profile patrols in the countryside.

During the six months there will be over 70 different initiatives carried out by the three forces targeting antisocial behaviour issues which are often alcohol-fuelled, including damage to property, irresponsible fires, litter, road safety and wildlife and environmental crimes as well as noise disturbance.

High visibility patrols will be carried out by officers on foot and motorbikes as well as officers from the Road Policing Unit, Dog Section and Underwater Search Unit. Mobile police offices will also be used at various locations and community traffic wardens will ensure traffic problems are kept to a minimum.

Four National Park rangers will bolster the police presence and a newly appointed National Park police officer, Central Scotland Police's Constable Paul Barr, will deal with all aspects of wildlife and environmental crime within the whole of the National Park area. Operation Ironworks proved to be very successful last year in helping to reduce the impact of antisocial behaviour in the beautiful Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park. This year the partnership is building on the work and lessons from last year to improve facilities educate visitors and enforce the law. so making the National Park more eniovable for all visitors. The community who live and work around the area, as well as visitors, deserve to enjoy this beautiful part of Scotland without worrving about their safety or security. Unfortunately there is a small minority of people who can spoil the enjoyment of the National Park for others. The National Park is there for all to enjoy and it's important that the minority are not allowed to spoil it through alcohol-fuelled antisocial behaviour. Speeding vehicles, particularly motorcycles, cause specific concern for the



communities over the summer months and the Road Policing Unit will be targeting those who are irresponsible on our roads. To report matters of antisocial behaviour, contact Central Scotland Police on 01786 456000 or information can be given anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

Lambing Policy

As the recent spell of good weather has encouraged many people to head out and enjoy the countryside, NFU Scotland (NFUS) and Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park Authority are asking everyone to take special care around lambs and calves and to be careful not to disturb them.

This time of year is one of the most important and busy periods for livestock farmers throughout the National Park as lambing and calving is under way. Both organisations are asking people to keep dogs well away from vulnerable young and pregnant animals. The sight of young lambs in spring is a joy shared by everyone visiting or living in the countryside, but it is essential that people follow the Scottish Outdoor Access Code and heed local advice from farmers. In particular, dogs should be kept well away from sheep because even if no lambs are present, pregnant ewes are extremely vulnerable to disturbance.

Doug Stewart, Access Officer for the National Park Authority, said "We want to encourage everyone to be responsible when walking their dog. Follow the Outdoor Access Code guidance and avoid taking your dog into fields where sheep are either lambing or lambs are present. It's always best to carry a lead just in case you need to control your dog closely.

The Park Authority will continue to offer help to farmers and land managers this spring and provide them with advice and signs to put up in popular areas at lambing time. Laminated signs in A4 and A3 size and individually worded to suit are an effective method of providing guidance for the public on the presence of livestock". 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
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Killin and District Sports and Leisure Club
