Editorial

An article on planning page 32 mentions that while most of Killin is in a conservation area new building development in the vicinity of Killin could be allowed in those areas where planning jurisdiction comes under Stirling Council. Could Glen Lochay and the area leading up to the Perth Council border become an extension to the village? Killin is just in the Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park with its perimeter abutting Stirling Council and close to Perth Council areas. The community is a major stakeholder in any development and needs to be represented. It is understandable that holistic plans for the development of Killin are difficult to achieve but cooperation between all parties is vital for a sustainable outcome for the future of Killin and environs. Adding local opinions to this mix requires an element of dedication by local people, for example to travel to remote venues for consultation exercises at the expense of work, to find, read and fully understand the complex presentations in remote offices or on line and to send personal opinions in to the various planning authorities. Planning controls are important for the future prosperity and viability of businesses. Killin is a special case for many reasons not least because the three planning authorities each have differing agendas with consultations at different times.

The Community Futures consultation identified the need for a local business support scheme and business action group. Such a group would be in a strong position to support the Killin Community Council and represent the planning needs of the village to help it to achieve a sustainable future. While individual businesses in Killin are fully taken up with day to day activity, working hard to survive and develop, much could be achieved by joining forces to establish a consensus on planning matters.

The representatives of the National Park and Stirling Council both wish for what is best for Killin but being remote, not living and working here, not being part of the community they, in common with many others who make plans for Killin, do not understand what "living in Killin" is all about. The responsibility lies with us, the people of Killin, to inform them of what we want in terms of local planning. The National Park communicates with adjoining councils and is represented on their committees that deal with housing strategy and development. It is a pity that the Stirling Council consultation came separately from that of the Park. I am informed that comments made in reply to one will be shared but still feel it is worth while replying to them all. Maybe the time has come to develop a simpler way to talk to communities and identify local needs.

What next for the Old Mill?

As most readers will be aware, it was announced in early Spring that the Breadalbane Folk Lore Centre in the Old Mill at the Bridge of Dochart was to be closed with immediate effect. Such was the concern of the community that Stirling Council decided to open it after Easter but just for this summer and with reduced hours. The present use of the building as a Tourist Information Centre and Folklore Museum no longer attracts enough paving visitors to cover the cost of running the building and numbers are continuing to fall this season, so it

cannot continue as it is. At the beginning of June two members of the Killin Community Council and two members of the Killin and Ardeonaig Trust (KAT) met representatives of Stirling Council's Tourism, Marketing and Rural Development Service and Stirling District Tourism Ltd. to discuss what happens next. Stirling Council, who own the building, could sell it or lease it to the community through KAT but only if it could used for a project which would be self financing. In June/July a leaflet was distributed in the village asking for ideas and this provoked a number of interesting suggestions and much discussion. A majority felt that:

- 1 Nobody wants to see the Mill closed
- 2 A Tourist Information Centre is vital to the village BUT it should be a Killin Tourist Centre promoting Killin's attractions, events and businesses and the Mill is not necessarily the best place for this
- 3 A Heritage Centre to display various artefacts is still desirable As we know that the present combination of Tourist Centre and Heritage Centre is not cost effective, other ideas or combinations of ideas have to be considered. Other suggestions (including some

The ideas that had then come in were discussed at a second meeting of the group and it was felt that there was sufficient interest in the building for Stirling Council to allow more time to be given to finding a solution. The group is to be widened to include, if possible, representatives from the National Park, the National Trust for Scotland and someone with experience of local tourism. There is no quick and easy answer and it may be that in the end we have to think the unthinkable to keep the building or accept that it is sold. Further ideas are welcome. мм

Killin Community Council Meeting July 14th

Ballechroisk Housing: Tony Teasdale of Rural Stirling Housing and Glen Murray, Architect, presented plans for six houses at Ballechroisk. Planning application has been made. Work should begin at the end of the financial year and take a year.

Resignation: Darren Webster has resigned as he is leaving the village. There are now two vacancies which will be filled at the elections for the Council due this autumn.

Killin News reports of Community Council meetings :

The official Community Council Minutes are sent to Stirling Council and not the reports that appear in the Killin News.

Village Officer: No action has been taken by Stirling Council who say that no-one has come forward for the job, although at least two people have submitted their names as candidates. Stirling Council to be asked to stop wasting time and either make the appointment or say they will not do so.

Roads: The Roads Department say that the repairers are contracted for two years and should remedy any defects in the work. They will be contacted by ClIr Ffinch about inspection and repair. A hole in the pavement by Monemore was subsiding again after a recent 'repair'.

Old Mart: Rubbish remains after six years and the place is becoming a refuse dump. The builder claims it is still a building site so materials can be left there. Cllr Ffinch to find out how long this claim is valid when no building work is taking place.

Play Park: Cats cannot be kept out. There are no plans for upgrading the area. Claire Noble has been asked to collect suggestions for upgrading which will be costed and a grant applied for to upgrade the facilities.

National Park: The LLTNP is not

joining up with the Cairngorms NP but there will be small boundary changes in the southern part. Any objections should be sent to the Scottish Parliament.

Turning Circle: Some coaches are still turning at the top of the village. **Gents toilet:** This was vandalised at Easter but in spite of frequent reminders Stirling Council has not arranged repair. Cllr Ffinch to find out who is responsible but if nothing is done, the work will be done locally and Stirling Council billed.

Bench at Manse Road: In progress

KAT: Killin Cutting Carbon: The grant application has gone in and a reply is expected soon.

Silver Cottage: Feasibility study

completed and positive.

Folklore Centre: After meetings between representatives of KCC, KAT, Stirling District Tourism and Stirling Council and the circulation of a leaflet asking for ideas for the Mill, Stirling Council felt enough interest had been shown for them to consider selling or renting the Mill to the community through KAT but only if it could be used for something which would be financially viable. Representatives from the National Park, the National Trust and local tourism will be asked to join the group to see if a viable solution can be found. The cost of 'moth-balling' the building would also be investigated.

Out of School Care: Discussions are ongoing.

Dog Warden: One letter of complaint has been received and passed to the police.

McLaren Hall: Anthony Dowling and Don Allan met with the McLaren Hall Trustees who were unable to comment on the eviction as it is an ongoing legal matter. Don said they had provided satisfactory answers to various questions but no further details were given apart from the

fact that Trustees of the Hall are appointed by invitation only. Anyone with questions should raise them at the Hall AGM in the autumn or directly to the Trust Chairman, Colin McRae. The petition presented to the Trust/Management Committee had not been replied to as there was no address on the accompanying letter

Area Health/New Hospital: A recent meeting highlighted again many problems – lack of transport, slip road access, no helipad and ambulance availability. The local councils were sending a joint letter to the Scottish Health Minister about the lack of recognition of these problems. No discussion about the Ambulance Service consultation with patients took place but this will be publicised. (See page 36)

Scottish Native Woods Project: KCC agreed to support an application for financial support to train 4 local applicants as river wardens in Glen Lochay, Glen Lyon, Strathfillan & Glen Dochart.

Breadalbane Park: Stirling Council has raised the bond for the Highland Games use of the Park and the Killin Show from £500 to £1000 to cover damage, although none had been done last year by the Highland Games and the Show damage had been repaired locally.

This would be queried with Stirling Council.

Village signs: There is a lack of signs, particularly at the top of the village, giving information about what was available in Killin. The ownership of various noticeboards would be clarified. A sign for Monemore was missing and should be replaced.

Heart of Scotland **Herb Society**

The herb border has been wonderful this season and full of

colour, texture and scent. Hopefully you have been capturing some of these for later use in the year. Every plant has an optimum period for harvesting its leaves, flowers, seeds or roots and this is an ongoing process that is time and weather oriented. Salad leaves are best picked when young and enjoyed straight away. The aromatic evergreens like rosemary, sage, thyme and savory are best harvested just before flowering as are basil, mint, marjoram and lovage. Most flowers are best collected when just opening and seeds like fennel, dill, caraway and coriander when brown and dry, just before they drop.

Whether you dry, freeze or put your herbs in oil or vinegar, label and date them and then use them throughout the year. Herbs are ideal for enjoying to the fullest from seed, young transplants, full growth and then harvesting and preparation for continued use well past the growing season.

Killin Cutting Carbon

The bid for this project has been sent to the Carbon Challenge Fund (CCF) and the outcome is awaited. Since we started to model the project on a previous project that achieved funding the rules have changed. It is no longer possible for all households to receive free cavity wall and loft insulation other than those on benefits and the over 70s. However we have applied to another fund, ScottishPower Energy People Trust, for funding to benefit all who fall into the category 'fuel poverty', approximately 50% of whom will not be eligible for free insulation. The definition of fuel poverty is when a household needs to spend more than 10% of household income on all domestic fuel use including appliances to heat the home to an adequate level of warmth. This will

also include the fitting of draftproofing.

Under the CCF application we have sought to train and employ, part time, two domestic energy assessors to support future carbon saving (money saving) ventures. Businesses and those who wish to explore other ways of saving energy or microgeneration will be able to discuss this with our partner, Strathclyde and Central Energy Saving Scotland advice centre (ESSac) who can explain the many ways in which grants and support can be acquired. For example, businesses can receive interest free loans for energy saving procedures repaid over four years. Much of the cost of repayment can be achieved in savings made in energy use. The results of the applications should be decided in early August and if successful, a launch meeting will be held and work starts shortly after that.

Silver Cottage

The Feasibility Study on running a Thrift Shop in Silver Cottage has now been completed. It is very positive and gives full details of what would be needed for the building and the best way of running the business. KAT is now in a position to start applying for grants. The amount applied for to buy Silver

Cottage is based on the present market value and negotiations are currently underway with the owner to buy the property for the village.

Roads

Proposed plans for traffic calming in Tyndrum were shown at a meeting in May in Tyndrum between Jim Withers, Transport Scotland and Derek Donald, TranServ and Community Councillors. We were told that there is no prospect of a 30mph limit in Tyndrum due to rules regulating speed limits which must now be self-policing. A review of all speed limits in the UK is proposed and these may include introducing self-policing dependent on the average speed. Moira has asked Anne McGuire MP to find out more about this review.

Microsoft have announced that their new operating system "Windows 7" will be released on October 22nd. This new softare promises to allow simple connection to bluetooth devices and to other computers in your home/office.

Unfortunately, Microsoft have a poor reputation for releasing unfit operating systems and having to repair bugs in their software after release. This results in poor acceptance of the operating system and leaves a bad feeling amongst computer users. When VISTA was released, there were several features which, although they were technically good, were very annoving to the user - for instance the continual asking for permission to run a perfectly acceptable application.

I hope that Microsoft have learned their lesson, but from bitter experience I am sceptical of this new product and will look forward to testing it out over the next couple of months.

Security Against Viruses and Hackers

In order to give yourself the maximum defense against viruses and hackers, you must have good security software installed. It is not sufficient just to have an anti-virus application - you also need a firewall and an anti-spam system. A firewall protects you from a hacker trying to log on to your computer. anti-virus and anti-spam software protect against infected emails and websites.

Even if you have these types of protection installed and you keep them up to date, you must also allow your computer to download patches from Microsoft - these patches are usually to cure a flaw within the operating system that hackers use to access information on your computer.

Rural Broadband - Support Teenes

I am glad to see that there has been an improvement in the performance of the Avanti satellite systems deployed as part of the Scottish Executive's Rural Broadband Project. but I have been informed that there

can be long delays in getting broken hardware fixed. One case in particular is where a local business, fully dependent upon satellite internet access, suffered from a lightning strike which resulted in the satellite system failing. The first available slot for an engineer visit was 2 weeks after the fault was raised. This seems to me to be an unacceptable delay and I wonder if Avanti have bitten off more than they can chew?

Mervyn's Weather

Spring 2009 has moved inexorably into summer. After a reasonable April, May had not progressed very far when a cold unsettled spell took over. This "blip" used to be known as "The Gab of May" and occurs fairly regularly. The remainder of May then was average in temperature and somewhat wetter than normal, though the last three days produced a taste of Summer, sunny and warm. June complied with the Buchan quote "The Coo quak" the reasonably cold snap early in the month, which was reckoned to make the cows quake and shiver when newly out to grass! The last days of the month brought warm and humid conditions, thereby vindicating to some extent the prognostications of the weather experts of a scorching summer! Incidentally while Central and Eastern Scotland experienced cool, wet conditions early in the month, with a biting east wind, Mull and the Western Isles basked in idyllic sunshine and clarity of visibility. Due to increased rainfall and

generally higher temperatures and humidity the "growth explosion" of all types of scrub and undergrowth, rushes and bracken etc., has been extraordinary. In 1946 I took a photograph, looking into a glen in County Donegal showing the landscape, as one would expect in hill country, uncompromisingly bare and lacking in the cover, each croft, dyke and fank, as well as water course eminently visible. A recent visit in 2007 displayed an entirely changed vista, roads and lanes over hung with greenery, more like Dorset than Donegal! The same syndrome has occurred here in Perthshire.

At one time the county road-man would keep his allotted stretch in pretty good shape, off lets kept open, verges and hedges trimmed, fallen branches removed and so on. Nowadays rare visits from a "hit squad" in a truck seems to suffice. In Summer a tractor-mounted articulated strimmer trundles along cutting the overgrown verges. This seems to work fairly well on

Motorways and main roads, but on unclassified roads such as south Loch Tayside the benefits are decidedly limited,



steep banks and roadside dykes constrain any actual cutting to a very narrow strip in some stretches and nothing at all in others, while the odd stone or stones knocked out of a dyke sets the scene for a more serious collapse. Used vertically this strimmer is employed to trim hedges and branches alongside roads, the resultant slashing and chewing produces a raw, unkempt and visually pollutant sight, comparable in some senses to a clear felled conifer wood, this latter operation, which of course is most necessary, is, until replanted or naturally regenerated - a slow process - a blot on the landscape.






Lanarkshire Trials Mcc BOB MACGREGOR

God is everywhere present and our worship should reflect this reality. In Psalm 139 we are told that wherever we go, God will be present for us. "If I ascend into heaven, you are there." Buzz Aldrin celebrated this fact on the moon. Thousands of miles from earth, he took time to commune with the One who created, redeemed and fellowshipped with him. No matter what our situation, God's fellowship is only a prayer away.

Litter louts

Following a recent Bank Holiday, my son and I removed two black binbags-full of litter from a small area near the confluence of the Dochart and Lochav rivers. Three days later I returned and filled another bag with more rubbish. This area is rarely visited by anyone other than anglers as it is relatively remote from footpaths and requires a stream to be forded in order to reach it. The only people that go there are visiting anglers. They leave drinks bottles, cans, lots of plastic wrappers, food waste, rotting mackerel (used as bait), broken bits of equipment, toilet paper and



human waste.

In addition to the litter they break fences and cut down trees; they burn fires and they use the open countryside as their toilet. They also respond aggressively to anyone who dares to question their behaviour, as I know to my own cost.

We want to involve as many people and groups as possible in preparing these documents and will be setting up training, workshops and public exhibitions over the coming months and onwards into 2010. The Community Council will soon be provided with a questionnaire that they can use to get local feedback on local planning and housing issues in this area. The questionnaire can also

Where is the Magic Wand?

Summer has come and with it a return to the perennial problem of litter. Over the last couple of years the Park Authority has poured considerable resources into tackling the problem with very little noticeable difference being achieved. Indeed in some areas the problem seems to have got worse. Why? Quite simply as the Park Authority did more, the Councils started to withdraw. To add insult to injury we found ourselves paying the landfill tax for the rubbish we were collecting. In the present economic climate and with tighter budgets looming for a number of years serious discussions are now ongoing to shift the burden back to those with the statutory responsibility for litter collection, the local Councils. The Park Authority fully recognises that the Park is so designated because of its special qualities and consequently seeks to ensure that extra effort is made to protect it. With that in mind we have and will continue to give help to the councils to tackle the litter problem. What we can't do is allow them to withdraw from their statutory duty. The Rangers are spending more time during the tourist season in meeting and greeting our visitors and in so doing are, where appropriate, getting over the

message that the Park is a special place and needs to be respected as such. Schools, both inside and outside the Park, are being visited as part of a long term strategy to get people to better understand the destructive nature of litter, not only in its effect on the scenery, but also the harm to wildlife. We are finding that children are less likely to be the litterbugs and with that encouragement we are trying to ensure that they don't slip into the errant ways of their elders.


The other major problem heightened during the visitor season is that of Public Conveniences. Strangely there is no statutory obligation for any agency to provide toilets. The Park Authority is investigating how facilities can be provided at tourist hot spots outside villages. One problem we encountered was that there was some difficulty in obtaining a Building Warrant for a composting toilet. Thankfully that problem was overcome so the work continues to see if we can find a solution within our resources.



On 29th June a meeting was held in Killin by Forth Valley Health Board, the Scottish Ambulance Service and Stirling Council with representatives of local Community Councils, Development Trusts, medical teams and police to respond to concerns and questions about access to health services. The first half of the meeting was a presentation from FVHS about a new scheme to be brought in for Stirling Social Workers and NHS visitors to communicate on cases to avoid duplication of visits. (This might be thought to be just commonsense). Some of the questions given to the panel beforehand were then addressed and others came from the floor. Most of the concerns expressed many times before were brought up again and it was soon evident and put to the panel that little, if anything, had been done to address these in spite of so-called 'consultations' with rural areas.

- * There is to be no helipad at the new hospital so helicopters will go directly to Glasgow.
- * There is no confidence that parking at the new hospital will be adequate.
- * Access slip roads from the motorway to the new hospital - an apparent afterthought - were still awaiting planning permission.

Callander representatives, as well as those from rural areas, were concerned about 'their' ambulance (which is also the Killin ambulance) frequently being sent elsewhere and not available locally.


