Editorial

A welcome to our newly elected Stirling Councillors for Trossachs and Teith: Fergus Wood, SNP, Alycia Hayes, SNP and Martin Earl, Conservative. In view of the current financial climate they will be under pressure from the community to deliver and from the Council to exercise restraint, not an easy line to tread. We hope the Old Mill will be on the agenda for the first Stirling Council Meeting and that there will be support for the community plans to obtain the property. (page 6)

There was a good turnout for the Duck Race, held this time on the River Lochay. The ducks were launched from the Pier Road bridge and finished close to the slipway by the Killin Hotel, where the lucky ducks were given a big welcome. Could the intrepid ducks be blazing a trail for the reinstatement of a raft race? (page 34)

The Internet Cafe and Learning Centre reopened recently in the Killin Library supported by Stirling Council funding. The fact that it is very busy shows the need for the service. (page 6)

Clanscape is to be replaced by an event that will include stalls, stands and community activities. (page 15)

Tourist Information is a major priority that is currently being addressed by the Killin Tourism Forum and information boards for the Heritage Trail, supported by a CARS grant, have now been installed throughout the village. We need things to attract and involve visitors now that our major tourist destination, the Breadalbane Folklore Centre, has closed. The good news is that plans are afoot to open it as a community resource that will also serve visitors, provide some information about Killin and allow some access to the building.

The other major visitor and community infrastructure, the Breadalbane Park, is still in the slow process of obtaining community support which will allow the community to make plans and obtain funding to improve the drainage and vehicle access to enable the Park to be used in wet weather for all the important activities that take place in Killin. At the initial meeting a wide range of changes were suggested; play park improvements, more seating, picnic area, circular walk, bike and wheelchair friendly area, some skate park facilities and new goal posts for football and rugby. MacGregor's Market

A new lease of life is being planned for two of Killin's empty shops. Killin Community Enterprises, a newly formed, local not-for-profit company, (page 4) is undertaking to re-open the former MacGregor's grocers and garden shop under the name "MacGregor's Market". We wanted to keep the association with this long standing local business name, but change it slightly to reflect the broader range of activities planned. The first task is to establish a new Tourist Information Centre (TIC) in the old garden shop which seems appropriate, as this used to be the TIC location prior to being in the Old Mill. It is hoped that the TIC will be opened by mid-June, once the requisite legal matters have been finalised. As well

as providing information for visitors to the village, it will also provide community information for residents and provide a small café and publicly accessible toilets. The neighbouring shop, the former greengrocers, will reopen as an outlet for locally produced food as well as supplying a range of organic and fair trade wholefoods not currently available in the village. The ultimate aim is for the shops to be run for the benefit of the local community and hopefully managed by them. It joins the growing network of community managed village shops that have arisen as a consequence of the current economic recession and the need for remote communities to have more control over the local resources that they are dependent unon

The shops, therefore, need to be responsive to local demand and to try, as best they can, to meet local needs. Customers will be able to influence what is sold but will also be encouraged to participate actively in the day-to-day running of the shops. It is hoped that will this provide an outlet for local food producers and also provide local employment and training.

The TIC will be independent with a remit to try and keep visitors in Killin, promoting the local area with all its attractions, events and facilities. This is one of the issues raised in the new Killin Action Plan - how to keep visitors here longer, encourage them to return and also how to attract them in the quieter months.

The new Killin Tourism Forum is a collective of local tourism businesses who are trying to do just that, using joint marketing and collaborative working to maximise visitor numbers. Our aim is to complement existing shops by selling things you can't buy anywhere else in the village. We will also have a small meeting space or the café itself available for evening meetings. We hope it can become a resource for the village, contributing to the local economy, providing indoor and outdoor space for groups to use and bringing a new vibrancy to the Main Street.

Goodbye Clanscape - Hello Fingalferly!

Clanscape, a National Park initiative, started in 2003. While we tend to think of it as a Killin event, it has actually been an annual event in several communities within the National Park. For various reasons, the National Park has had to review the level of input it is able to give to "our" Clanscape, with the result that the management of the event has changed hands. The National Park will still be very much involved, with marketing and staffing the event, but the organisational side of the event now lies with the community. Killin Community Enterprises has volunteered to co-ordinate the event, with assistance from various other individuals and groups having also been offered. While change can be difficult to manage, it also offers opportunities for potential improvements, increasing the appeal of the event to a wider audience, bringing more business to the village and making Killin a destination not to be missed. Current tourism statistics show that a huge proportion of visitors to Scotland want to experience traditions, local culture and food and drink. Clanscape has offered all of these in the past; we want to build on that. We have a beautiful location, a rich cultural

The intention is to widen the scope of the event by having activities happening in more of the venues around the park. The Killin Hotel has agreed to host live music: the Sports and Leisure Club are planning a family fun day and a small Farmers' market is planned in the park area. The other thing that has to change, since we are taking over management of the event, is the name. The original aims of Clanscape were to:

- show how the landscape in the Park area has been 'developed' by humankind over the era and still is being used and lived upon.
- * show how humankind is tied more closely to nature than most people consider and show that some of the 'ye olde' methods are now coming back into fashion for land management e.g. coppicing and green woodworking

It's an earthy theme, so an earthy name seemed to fit. Given that Fingal's Grave is said to be in the park, we decided to include him and add a good Scots word to the title. One word titles for events are easier to manage, so the new name for Clanscape is "Fingalferly". What does "Ferly" mean? As an adjective it means "strange, wonderful". As a noun it means "a wonder, a novelty, a curiosity". If Fingal could see the events in the park, he'd surely think they were just this; a bit strange and curious!

Killin Community Council May

Martin Earl, Alicia Hayes and Fergus Woods were elected at the recent Stirling Council elections. They were not present but should be in the future.

Biomass: The plan is to continue. There are still no concrete ideas for heat source usage. Some larger sites' plans have been scrapped as they required the importing of timber from outside their area.

Roads: Road resurfacing starts 21st May. Main Street will be done between Craignavie Road and McLaren Hall. The crossing will be done later. A different contractor, considered better, will be used this time. The Ardeonaig road has been put off again. Glen Ogle will be shutting 3 times at night through the summer for emergency repairs, with probable shuttles every 2 hours.

Play park: There are 2 grants for goalposts from SC and Rural Housing. Alma Walker has funding for other aspects of the park. There is a possibility that there will be no Killin Show in the park. Using other local fields presents a problem of having livestock restrictions prior to the event. There were conflicting

ideas on who was now responsible for taking park bookings for events. KCC pay for the electricity at events.

Breadalbane Forum: The next meeting is 28th May 2012.

Cemetery: The bothy/mortuary has been removed and left at an acceptable standard. SC says the stand pipe should be replaced with some kind of rain harvester with a tap which would be eco-friendly and cost effective. Vandalism has increased their expenditure, though this is not the case in Killin.

Signage to Pipeline: On going

Turning Circle: SC are happy to hand over maintenance to the Killin Floral Society with a map outlining the areas.

Phone Box: Still no satisfaction in getting a door for the phone box. Tim Frost can try the people who deal with pavement issues for a possible direct number in BT to establish a straight line of communication.

Planning: No planning issues.

Folklore Centre Signs: These are still in place and should be covered/removed or replaced with more appropriate signage. The council are to empty the bin at the Mill.

Coach Parking: An irate bus driver raised the question of people parking in the allocated bus park at Monemore.

Fingal's Stone: It was common opinion that a story/info board for Fingal's stone would enhance the experience of viewing - at present it is just stone with very little attraction. A grant may be possible from the National Park.

Heat use from Acharn Biomass **Plant** Two meetings have been held to

discuss the use of low grade heat that will be emitted from the biomass plant at Acharn that is due to be commissioned in 2014. This will be heat with a temperature of up to 35°C, useful only for aquaculture or horticulture. Opportunities arise for business to use the free heat source as the heat could be ducted to a field across the road or used in an area adjacent to the plant. Wood drying and fish and tomato farming were discussed, as were issues of local markets, local interest, investment opportunities, light exposure, water abstraction and volunteer support.

An area beside the plant could be leased to the community but at present the local enthusiasm and technical expertise to set up a relevant low-risk community business in that location has not been identified. Killin Internet Learning Café



The Killin Internet Learning Café has started up again in the Killin Library thanks to funding from Stirling Council Adult Learning Support of £4,032. This is to assist in the teaching and development of internet skills. In addition it provides an extension for public access to the Library. The facility has been well subscribed since the day it opened showing the continuing need for this service. Old Mill Group and Conservation

Report

Sonya Linskaill has just completed the Conservation Report on the Old Mill. It will be posted on the KAT website.

php This is a detailed study of the history and importance of the Old Mill to Killin, demonstrates its unique characteristics and details the developments that have taken place since it was converted in 1994. Its relationship to the history of Killin, St Fillan, and the healing stones, its stunning setting beside the Falls of Dochart, and its relevance as the last remaining representative of Killin's industrial past are all detailed. Sonya discusses possible uses by the community and the limitations that could be imposed by the building, its listing and planning consents. Main points of interest include:

* The previous planning permission depends on the near location of the public toilets

Any change of usage would require a new Building Warrant with updated requirements and for us to negotiate new Relaxations in view of the restrictions imposed by the "B" Listing. This could involve a great deal of expenditure in alterations. The "B" Listing restricts the way in which the building can be used by the community.

The condition report details work required to maintain the fabric of the building under the headings, urgent, immediate, essential and annual. The urgent work required before purchase and later this year





amounts to £13,000. The remainder of the outstanding work amounts to £40,650 (in the next 10 years excluding routine maintenance). Many charitable funders will not give funding for project maintenance. Stirling Council would not be required to pay back the £5,000 CARS grant to the Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park for the funding it received for the new water wheel if the building were transferred to the community. One model suggested for the use of the building is that it should be in one "ownership" and used by KAT on behalf of the community. That might not require new planning consent. That model could include a KAT office on the top floor, displays, small meeting area/educational space on the first floor and arts/crafts/recycling/information/ reception on the ground floor. Discussions with Stirling Council continue, a proposal has been sent and a decision is expected by Stirling Council in early June. Meanwhile KAT has been offered a rent free lease for three months to run a community activity in the building. The consensus of the Old Mill Group is to run a thrift shop on the ground floor and an area to display art and craft work on the first floor. A decision will be made

when the details of the lease have been discussed by the group and agreed by the KAT directors.

Breadalbane Park Drainage and Play Park

The community is working with Stirling Council to improve the Breadalbane Park. This includes the drainage, access by heavy vehicles, play park upgrade and general improvements to meet the needs of the community.

As funders require a community group to support their park, a Park Users Group has been set up representing existing groups in the community. 25 people attended the initial meeting representing 14 interest groups. 15 people have signed up and are due to meet again to take these ideas further with representatives of Stirling Council. Any others members of the community who have an interest in the welfare of the park are encouraged to join.

Sports and Social Club Lease

Discussions are taking place between the Sports and Social Club and Stirling Council with regard to the possible transfer of the lease. An application by KAT has been sent to Stirling Council and a decision will be made at their next meeting on 6th June. Willie Angus

Follow Killin's Heritage Trail

A fascinating heritage trail has recently been installed in Killin. Its aim is to encourage visitors to explore the whole village beyond the Falls of Dochart and enjoy the rich history it has to offer. Five interpretation panels are located along the length of Main Street. The panels have been designed to illustrate landscape, architecture and local folklore. A leaflet will accompany the trail to guide visitors along the route and expand on these themes. The leaflet is available from local businesses, tourist information centres and Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park offices in Balloch and Callander. They can also be downloaded from the Killin CARS web page at www.lochlomond-trossachs.org or by scanning the code on the panels to smart phones.

Some of the interesting features of the trail include the evolution of the rich mix of building styles in the village, stories of local people who helped shape it and the legends that abound in and around Killin. Photographs taken by the children from Killin Primary school are featured.

The heritage trail is part of the Killin Conservation Area Regeneration Scheme (CARS). CARS is jointly

funded by Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park and Historic Scotland. Stirling Council also made a generous contribution to the project.

The recent closure of the Breadalbane Folklore Centre means that the heritage trail is particularly important and will provide the many visitors to Killin with a permanent and easily accessible source of information on the history and development of the village. Much of the story and history of Killin and its place in the wider landscape can be told through its buildings and their uses over the years. The interpretation boards and the accompanying booklet will encourage visitors to walk through the village from one end to the other and perhaps persuade them that it is worth staying a little longer in the area or returning at a future date to explore further the wonderful heritage and the surrounding landscape. Mervyn's Weather and More



The oft-quoted weather saws and sayings have come into their own during April 2012. The first few days of April used to be known as "The borrowing days" when it was reputed that this month borrowed these days of the snell winds and unpleasant conditions usually apportioned to March. There is indeed a short poem regarding three ewe hoggs (lambs) returning to the hill from wintering and almost succumbing to the elements when it "snew and blew" vigorously, but they survived. Later on, towards the end of the month, can come "The Cuckoo or Gowk" Storm, coinciding with the arrival of that "wandering voice". In the North-East of Scotland they talk of "The Gab o' May".

March was mainly very warm and sunny, with much growth of grass and virtually unprecedented early burgeoning of trees, shrubs and flowers. Daffodils had been out since February, oaks in leaf 26th March, bluebells in flower on Drummond hill 24th March, while purple lilac is now blooming almost exactly one month


early; many other examples too of precocious nature.

At date of writing (30th April) rain falls steadily with light snow cover above head-dyke level (1300 feet), this preceded by many days of desiccating N.E. wind cutting back grass growth and detrimental to the well-being of ewes and newly born lambs. Perhaps those of us who indulge in the trials and tribulations and the joys - of lambing hill ewes have been spoiled over recent years as the period April - early May has been comparatively benign. Continuing investigations into the place-names of Glen Lochay and moving downstream from Mamlorn, the H.Q. of the large sheep farm situated here is Kenknock, Ceann A' Cnoc - simply Hill Head. Lubchurran, Lub, a bend in a river or burn. Churran could be either Corran - a reaping hook, signifying bent or semi-circular or possibly Choaruinn -Rowan trees. Inish daimh - Island or insulator meadow of stags or perhaps oxen, while Tom Ochrocher (Tom A' Chrochair) would imply the knoll of

the gallows, hangman or villain. Another Inish - island - name further down stream is the island or meadow of sheep, Inish Chaorach. The high hill Meall Ghaordie stands to the north of the main Glen. While Meall is a very common Perthshire word for a rounded hill, Ghaordie has been distorted by Anglicising and it is difficult to ascertain its correct spelling in Gaelic. It is suggested that the word is Giort, a haunch, which seems feasible considering the topography of the hill in question. The wide pass from Duncroisa - the hill of the cross or crossing, through to Glen Lyon is Lairig Breislach - the Pass of Confusion, known by the Grouse Shooters and beaters of Meggernie Estate as "Puzzle Glen". Near the bottom of Glen Lochay is Dal Dravaig - the flat area or dale of sediment or dregs referring possibly to sand/river detritus, deposited owing to this being a flood prone section of the glen.

Taking Control

It is good to see the ospreys returned to Loch Tay. At the beginning of May we saw three from our garden at Ardeonaig but others saw six that day. At the switching station in Glen Lochay there was recently a woodpecker in need of a few paracetamol and maybe some orthodontic treatment as he was determined to drill a hole in one of the pylons.

The black grouse has some allies at last in the Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park. Private estates and farms within the park are being given funding to aid predator control, including purchase of equipment and training in its correct use. Maybe there is a little scientific and common sense coming into being. Instead of conservation groups denial of the necessity of these measures would it not be better to educate their supporters in the realities of wildlife?

On the theme of control it has now been confirmed that the squirrel pox virus has reached the central belt

for the first time. So it is even more critical to control the grey squirrel. There is also funding available for this

Although the Scottish government and S.N.H. are not going to control the Tayside beavers (this is not an American football team!) It is rumoured darkly that a blind eye may be turned to beaver activity and that any moving over the border will be culled. With the Olympics coming up and the pressures at Heathrow, I can't really see that they will be able to spare officers for border control at Gretna Green.

It's not just animals which are controlled. During the recent Winter storms it is estimated that about 15 million trees were blown down. To put this into context the forestry Commission fell approximately 15 million trees annually for commercial purposes.

There have been bi-laws passed to stop wild camping on the shores of Loch Lomond - bully for them - but will the rest of us around the area have to cope with the fallout from this? If you are desperate to camp in the Loch Lomond area and have no objection to goose pimples or midges, you may like to take up the offer of the naturist (note this is naturist not mis-spelt naturalist) group on one of the islands who are offering free tea and scones to attract new members - be careful not to spill that hot tea! Finally - foxes are causing great concern in Skeaness by killing several cats including Tinkerbell. Maybe the local birds are paying them to do a bit of control? At Glen Falloch my son was out at night after five lambs had been killed. Two foxes were working the field moving the sheep and lambs into a bunch and one fox walking along the wall was so intent on killing that it was not deterred by the human scent blowing directly to it. Needless to say, they did not complete their 'operation' and the killing stopped. **Tim Frost**

Central Scotland Fire and Rescue Service is appealing for more people to join them in helping to protect their local community. The Service is looking to recruit more retained or part-time firefighters at Killin, Crianlarich and Tyndrum Stations and are particularly appealing to people who can provide daytime cover to come forward and offer their services to help bring all three stations up to full strength. All retained firefighters receive a basic payment for being part of the pool and an attendance call-out relating to the number of calls they

attend. Retained firefighters provide a vital service, particularly to the rural communities. They can work full or part time hours in other jobs and although not based in a fire station, when a call comes to their pager, a retained firefighter is expected to respond to their station quickly and safely.

Potential candidates need to work or live in the local area and be able to reach their station within 5 minutes of a call. They will also have to be flexible and consider the impact of being 'on call'.

Retained firefighters work alongside their full-time colleagues, providing a vital service to the local community. They will mainly attend incidents in the Killin, Crianlarich and Tyndrum area but could also be

called on to provide valuable assistance to other areas within Central Scotland.

Often people are not aware of the work of the retained or part-time firefighters but the Fire Service could not function without the vital support that they bring, particularly within rural communities. It is a very rewarding career that is both interesting and challenging and also brings a financial benefit.

Ultrabooks/Tablets/Smart Phones – the future?

The advances in technology, in particular computer processors allow hardware manufacturers to add more power into smaller and smaller devices. I expect that we will soon see what are being called "Ultrabooks" come to the market within the next year. These are highly powerful laptop computers that can also be used as a tablet device. Ultra powerful, very thin and light, these devices are expected to make desktop computers obsolete within a few years.

My only worry about these devices is the more powerful they get, the hotter they will run, and thus they will need significant cooling to ensure they do not burn out or become too hot to use on your lap. The current trend in smart phones is to make the screen as large as possible without compromising phone features of the device. Samsung have now taken this to the limit with its launch of its new smartphone – Galaxy S3. This is a larger phone than usual (137x71 mm – roughly $6" \times 3")$, and has a 4.8" viewing screen. The features of this phone look sensational, but really is it just too large to be used as a mobile phone? Time will tell, I quess.

Fibre Optic Broadband/BT Infinity

BT are rolling out fast Fibre Optic Broadband in Scotland and some of our neighbouring towns are scheduled to benefit from this service. There is, however, still no planned date for us. There is no doubt that our community suffers from the lack of fast broadband, but we will have to put up with it for the time being.

I have used BT Infinity in London, and am really impressed by the speed of the connection – it allows me to download films, watch the TV channels online and use the internet simultaneously with no loss of quality.

Windows 8 News

It looks as though we may see Windows 8 machines on sale later this year - October has been mentioned in the press. In previous articles I mentioned differences in the way Windows 8 looks and now I

have heard of some changes in the default email application. Current versions of Windows use Windows Live Mail to access and manage emails. In Windows 8 this will change and all developments of Windows Live Mail will cease and a new mail system, fully integrated into Windows 8, will be made available.

This means that when you change to a new machine from an existing XP/Vista/7 environment, you will have to arrange for your emails and settings to be moved to Windows 8, and you will need to learn how to use the new system.

Slow Computers

Once again I am seeing a spate of computers coming to me for repair when the only perceptible problem is that there is more than one security system installed. Whenever two or more anti-virus or security applications are installed on the same machine, one waits for the other to finish whatever it is doing and thus neither of them finishes a task, continually waiting for each other and stopping other applications from running. This makes the computer appear dreadfully slow, often grinding to a halt.

I therefore suggest you check to see that only one security system is installed and uninstall all others. This may well fix your problem, and save you money by not having to call out an engineer to fix the computer.

Ben Lawers shares heritage stories

The story of an expert ecologist charged with the care of some of Scotland's most delicate mountain habitats is showcased in a new series of online soundslides for the National Trust for Scotland. Dan Watson is an ecologist for the National Trust for Scotland covering both Ben Lawers and Glencoe features in the Trust's Scotland's Stories project. He was filmed at Ben Lawers. Scotland's Stories creating 20 soundslides which tell the story of the diversity of the skills of the people needed to tend the places in the care of the National Trust for Scotland and their passion for their vital work to conserve and promote our heritage. The Ben Lawers story features at www.scotlandstories.com The project is intended to raise public awareness of what's involved in caring for the nation's heritage and encouraging people to talk about it too, as outlined in the Trust's strategy "Securing the future of our past" published in August 2011.

100,000 trees for Ben Lawers

Conservation charity the National Trust for Scotland has made a good start on a project to plant 100,000 native trees at Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve. 51,470 'sub-montane' birch, willows, rowan and alder have already taken root on the lower slopes of Meall nan Tarmachan.

The project is part of a long term plan to restore the native broadleaf woodland historically found at Ben Lawers, much of which has been lost due to management for sheep and deer.

Restoring the woodland will continue to enrich the habitat at Ben Lawers, encouraging more insects and wildlife. Visitors will appreciate the more natural landscape the future trees will create with a mosaic of small wooded areas and open hillside. The £250,000 project, which is being funded through the Scottish Rural Development Programme is part of a wider objective to increase biodiversity and enhance landscape value at the nature reserve. Ben Lawers is rich in biodiversity and renowned for its rare alpine plants. However, like many upland areas in Scotland, the effects of grazing animals have restricted some plant communities to cliffs and

inaccessible ground. In Scotland we often think that the mountains are supposed to be treeless, but that is not the case.

For decades now, we have been working at Ben Lawers to restore some of the elements that have vanished from the open hillside. For example, we have several exclosures which boast a wonderful range of trees, shrubs and wildflowers and we are pioneering the restoration of high altitude willow scrub, endangered in Scotland. By the end of 2012, more than 100,000 trees will have been planted in 75 hectares benefiting the environment at the nature reserve for decades to come.

Work to plant the remaining 50,000 trees will get underway later in 2012.

Ben Lawers NNR has been in the care of the National Trust for Scotland since 1950. It is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and a Special Area of Conservation under the European Habitats Directive for the exceptional examples of a number of habitats, rare on a European scale.

The reserve is also hugely popular with hillwalkers owing to its Munros, scenery and accessibility.

Montane plant art on show at Ben Lawers

Artworks inspired by the rare high-altitude plants found at the National Trust for Scotland's Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve will be on show at the charity's Killin office all summer.

The first works by Edinburgh-based artist Anne Gilchrist arrived on Thursday 3 May and have been hung at the Lynedoch, Killin. The artist will then add to the exhibition throughout the flowering season, aiming to have eight paintings in place by autumn 2012.

The oil on board pieces depict montane flora of Ben Lawers and are 90 by 120 centimetres square in size. Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve is one of the most botanically rich mountains in Britain, Ben Lawers is widely known for its outstanding range and diversity of arcticalpine species and vegetation types. It is important for the very large number of nationally rare or scarce montane plant species that it supports, including vascular plants, lichens, and bryophytes. It also has an outstanding diversity of invertebrates with many nationally rare or notable species.

The exhibition at the National Trust for Scotland office in Lynedoch, Killin, runs from May until the end of September and entry is free. Opening hours vary, so check ahead with the office on 0844 4932136.

Kate has had the privilege of joining a working group to develop a framework that will support educators to provide an even better service for our youngest children. These are based on the Scottish Governments key principles for prebirth to three "Relationships: Responsive Care; Respect and Rights of the Child". A Growing Business

At a time when many shops are closing, it is good to see the opening of the Garden Shop next to the bank. It is now again possible to get a choice of plants and gardening necessities locally and to have flowers made up for special occasions. This is the latest - and unintended - addition to the other services Dani and Mick Grant already provide in the village. Dani originally trained in catering and hotel management at Glasgow College but wanted to work for herself so suggested to her parents that they bought a hotel and she would work with them for a year before going off round the world. Seven years later she was still working with them at the Clachaia in Killin. Her next venture was buying with Mick what is now Breadalbane House and transforming it into a questhouse, the first in Killin with all en suite rooms, TV and evening meals. (In their first season they were fully booked from their opening in May until the end of September and all from passing trade. Those were the days!) They ran that business, as well as a taxi service, for ten years while also bringing up a family. Mick was already a plumber and took over A.C.Fraser



plumbing.

They next acquired Websters Power Tools (later the Wee Bake Shop and now Kirsty's Kitchen) and there had a small hardware shop and gas agency, a pet food shop and Mick's workshop (now PFK Performance). They started a £1 shop where the laundry now is and this later moved to the present site of the £1+ shop. Twenty years ago they sold

Breadalbane House and moved across the road over the Co-op and, when that moved out, they combined the hardware and the pet food shops there under the AC Fraser and Eureka names. You can get almost anything in there and what they haven't got they will almost certainly be able to get for you within a few days. When presented with problems they will always try to help find answers some of the more unusual things Mick has been asked to do are to adjust an articificial leg in a vice, remove a fish hook from a dog and cut off a ring (not from the dog). Eight years ago they decided they needed to be able to get away from Killin for some peace and quiet and they bought a flat in Garelochhead. Within a short time they found themselves opening a £1 shop there - again an unintended venture. So it was really no surprise when they started a Garden Centre here providing services where they don't exist is becoming addictive! Dani says their success is only possible thanks to the excellent staff she considers they are lucky to have. May the new Garden Shop flourish for them all and for Killin.

Book Review

The Black House by Peter May

Last month this was our chosen book. From the cover you might think it rather dull but you'd be wrong! We all gave it a big thumbs up and some of us have already purchased the sequel, The Lewis Man and are finding it just as exciting.

The central character is DC Finn McLeod who was born and brought up on Lewis and is sent to see if there is a connection between the murder he is currently investigating in Edinburgh and the virtually identical murder that has just happened on the island. He is

confronted by memories from the past . He meets old friends, including his first love, and reignites some old feuds as he tries to get to the bottom of this latest crime. As usual in all good murder mysteries he unravels lots of lies and deceit along the way.

We were all kept interested right up to the end in the many twists and turns as the mystery all unfolds on the annual gannet hunt on the Island of Sula Sgeir 'the rock' where the startling truth is revealed.



The adjudicator said that on initial reading of the play she wondered how it would work as it had little to commend it. However, she was full of praise for the cast, as through careful characterisation and excellent teamwork, they were able to make much more of the play than appeared in the script.

At time of writing, we have not had the marks back so we don't know where we were placed, but we all enjoyed the Macrobert experience, and once again we have put Killin on the map!


