Iona Frickleton retained her fastest local female title (48m05s) and 1st Under 18 female was Hazel Donaldson (54m36s). The fun run was also a great success with several local voungsters getting involved and some running with their parents or grandparents. The winners were Emma Lawton and Elliot Veitch. Morna Webster was our only wheelchair participant and wheeled herself around the course in 1hr 35min, a

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great inspiration to everyone watching, she also raised over £700! Frazer Macfarlane of Horizon Ecology very generously donated a cheque for £1000 and several other people each raised over £100, a huge thank you to them and to all those who raised sponsorship money. The money will be split between several local charities and good causes.

Many thanks to the event sponsors – Sarah Heward from the Real Food Café in Tyndrum – and to John Morris and Iona Frickleton who helped with organising the race. But the day would not have been such a success without the many local volunteers and the Killin MRT who provided medical cover and radio communications throughout the event.

The Old Mill

The three month project in the Old Mill is coming to an end. This was set up to form the background to the business plan that will shortly be submitted to Stirling Council to see if they will agree to sell the Old Mill to the community for a notional sum. The project involves running a thrift shop on the around floor. In addition local information is given to visitors to enable them to make the best use of their time while staying in the area.



This includes information about what visitors can see and do along with details about local tourist providers and

businesses. The first floor is set up as a gallery for local arts and crafts with a display of photographs, art work, knitting, needlework, pottery and jewellery for sale. We hope this exposure will encourage visitors to contact local artists and businesses during their stay.

Some educational activities take place in the building, such as felting, photography and life drawing. They are very successful and provide additional income.

We would like to thank all those who are supporting us with donations to the thrift shop and giving their valuable time to staff the shop, organise, clean, tidy and generally manage the area. 84 hours a week of volunteer time are used to keep the shop open every week backed up by many more hours that are not so easily identified in background planning and organisation. We have all made new contacts and friends through volunteering and enjoyed the interactions with visitors. The profit, after expenses, will help with the development of the Mill once the Mill is transferred to the community. It is possible that the community will be able to continue to use the Old Mill following the three month project. Negotiations are still underway with Stirling Council. **Project Officer**

An application has been made to fund a part-time project officer to help manage the Old Mill project, the Sports and Social Club developments and the Breadalbane Park drainage project. LEADER have agreed to fund 50% and further funding is currently being sought.

Leisure Club

The lease between Stirling Council and the Sports and Leisure Club is due to end on the 31st March 2013. Discussions are underway between the club committee and Stirling Council as to how this process is to be managed. **Public Toilets in Killin**

Stirling Council have declared their intention to close the public toilets in Killin as they have done in other areas. They are still seeking "Comfort Partners", that is local busnesses, to take over the role. We are all aware





that tourism is the major business in Killin and that many buses, service and tourist, rely on the local facilities. Many business, Council and National Park officials, visitors, and disabled or elderly people, some of whom travel for over an hour to reach Killin, rely on access to a toilet on arrival. The loss of public toilets is likely to affect tourism and business. A meeting between representatives of the community, Stirling Council and Martin Earl (Stirling Councillor) will be held near the end of October. If you have constructive views on the subject or if closure of the Public toilets is likely to affect you or your business look out for the date of the meeting which will be advertised in all the usual places. This is an important issue not least in terms of health and safety. Would you visit a remote place if you knew basic facilities were not available?



Printing over the Internet

Many of today's printers offer the ability to print over the internet. This is actually a very powerful function as it allows anyone with a smart phone to print their pictures on any internet enabled printer. A good example is taking a holiday snap of the kids and sending the photo to Granny's printer at home. You can even print from your email to your home printer, manage your printer whilst away from home, and send letters and other documents directly to other people's printers, thus doing away with old fashioned FAX technology and its associated costs.

Windows 8 Launch

The launch of Microsoft's new operating system, Windows 8, is

(as we go to print) scheduled for October 26th. A new look and feel, aimed at touch screen use, named "Metro" is Windows 8 new user interface. Existing software, designed to be used by mouse and keyboard, will need to be changed to work with Metro. It is expected that many applications will not have been upgraded in-time for the launch of Windows 8, but these existing applications should still run in "desktop" mode outside the Metro environment.

If past experience is anything to go by, there are likely to be many teething problems in the initial version of Windows 8 and I expect that Microsoft will release a "Service Pack" within a few months of the launch to correct any faults found in the new operating system.

New Computers Infected with Viruses

An investigation by the leading software company, Microsoft, has identified that criminals have infiltrated the supply chain and installed viruses on some brand new computers before they even go on sale.

Evidence suggests that one in five

computers or flash drives bought from a specific supply chain in China have viruses installed. These viruses can either capture private information for illegal purposes, including identity fraud, or they send

out enormous amounts of spam emails which are intended to clog up parts of the internet to prevent some internet services from running.

Microsoft have identified whereabouts on the internet these viruses comes from and they will be taking steps to stop this latest attack.

The nature of this attack is worrying, as all Microsoft appear to be able to do is fight the attack once it has been let loose into society and not prevent its release in the first place – thus the chances of this sort of thing occurring again must be high.

Mervyn's Weather and More

Weather wise "summer" 2012 has been given "The Red Card" and "sent off" with few regards. The autumn is now with us plus the wishful hopes of an "Indian summer", a hope which at least in farming circles, is fast becoming a dire necessity. It is however a remarkable fact that in a comparatively small country such as ours, while as it has been recently stated in the media that 2012 has produced the wettest June and the wettest summer for something like 100 years, in some areas such as Eastern and Southern England and possibly S. E. Scotland: in the far north West and in the Western Isles, the reverse is the case with week upon week of dry conditions. While grass growth has once again been lush and prolific overall, particularly in the arable sector, crops are suffering due to excessive damp and sun-starved conditions, not to mention the sodden state of the land, precluding the use of modern heavy machinery. Livestock too are adversely affected by the lack of "sun on their backs". Perhaps it is as well to leave weather comments before they become unsuitable for a family publication and live in hopes for better things to come!

And more ..

Travelling eastwards along the north shore of Loch Tay from the junction with the road which runs over the hills to Bridge of Balgie in Glen Lyon, there is a considerable area between the road and shore of Loch Tay which was at one time divided into many crofts and small farms. Due to amalgamation the names of these are mostly now forgotten though some remain, applied to large units. Kiltyrie Cuil, the corner or angle of drying, tioraidh (probably corn or hav). Carwhin, a unit divided into many smaller plots, one of which is Carie, said by some to signify a mossy place. Tombreck (Tom Breac) the speckled or brindled knoll, where now The Big Shed stands. Craggantoll - the rocks of the holes (cup markings). Cragganester (Creagan Eas Dobhar) - rocks of the waterfall - there is a cataract here, visible from South Loch Tayside near Ardeonaig. Balnahanaid - church town or kirkton. Balnasuim - the township of The Souming or permitted stocking rate for a croft or farm. This farm was worked for many years by David and Muriel MacNicoll.

Community Partnership

The CC welcomed the news that the LLTNP (Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park) Community Partnership (CP) has commissioned a study to investigate opportunities to build on the success of its Apprentice Support Project, looking at three new sectors, including tourism and hospitality, land-based work and local food production. They want to develop proposals to support businesses and skills development for young people within the National Park, creating opportunities for businesses to grow and for young people from National Park communities to live and work in the area in the future.

There was an exhibition on the proposed Crianlarich By-Pass on Thursday 13th September in Crianlarich village hall. A new planning application was submitted. The Strathfillan Community Development Trust

The Strathfillan Community Development Trust and Stirling Council have signed agreements with the National Park, which is taking over control to eradicate Japanese Knotweed on land that is owned by both organisations.

Scotcentral Credit Union (CU)

Gordon Stewart, Vice Chair of Scotcentral Credit Union (CU) attended the BCCF meeting on 6th September. At present the Scotcentral CU is re-branding and will be moving to new premises in the SC One-Stop-Shop in Port Street Stirling in January 2013. RSHA is keen to offer this as a service and would be willing to pay the one-off membership fees for their tenants as the use of the CU to pay in benefits

would ensure payment of rents. It was agreed that January would be a good time to start promotion in Local Newsletters but in the meantime BCCF could start giving general information on CU to get people thinking about the concept. Suzanne was asked if the Scotcentral CU was still thinking about a tie-in with the Post Office; the answer is no, they would like to set up local collection points and train up volunteers to man them probably half a day a week. It should also be noted that a lot can now be done online.

Tyndrum Café Sci (2012/13)

Café Sci (Café Scientifique) originated some years ago in France with the aim of enabling local communities to enjoy learning about science in a friendly and informal atmosphere. Asking questions and sharing ideas and experiences is an important feature of a Café Sci meeting.

Strathfillan Community Development Trust has hosted a branch of Café Sci in Tyndrum Village Hall since 2005. Four meetings have been arranged for the next session.

Wednesday 17th October

"Uncovering the secret life of the sparrowhawk" Sarah Watts (BSc) Ecological Science graduate Sarah Watts recently undertook a study of sparrowhawk nesting behaviour for the University of Edinburgh, RSPB and the Lothian and Borders Raptor Study Group. Despite being one of Britain's commonest raptors, sparrowhawks are seldom glimpsed for more than a few seconds at a time. The talk will provide an introduction to this enigmatic species by discussing sparrowhawk ecology, behaviour and breeding biology, as well as its sometimes controversial relationship with songbirds. Current research into the sparrowhawk's recent colonisation of urban areas and its behaviour at the nest will also be explored.

Wednesday 21st November

"Tales from the old Rhodesian bush" Brain Hughes will describe his experience of living and working in the bush on Reserves, including the inevitable 'exciting' encounters 'at the sharp end' with wild animals. The talk includes the big five species, stars of the African fauna.

Wednesday 20th February

"Tea planting in India" Chris Sclater will describe his life as a tea planter in India, including the manufacture of tea, the types of tea, and touch on some possible health issues.

Wednesday 20th March

"The experimental basis for understanding infection" Professor David Crompton (FRSE, parasitologist and formerly of Cambridge, Glasgow and Cornell Universities, and WHO expert) Until the middle of the 19th century most educated people in Europe including physicians - held bizarre ideas about the causes of the diseases that afflicted the population. We now no longer suffer as people did then thanks to vaccines, antibiotics and medicines developed once infection was understood. What is The Guild?

This year is the 125 th anniversary of The Guild - so what exactly is it? With around 30,000 members throughout Scotland from Shetland to the Borders (plus a few in Europe) The Guild is one of our country's largest voluntary charitable organisations. In 1896 a Guild bazaar raised £1,000 to build a hospital in The Puniab. Building on this type of early work the project partnership was launched in 1997 where six specific aid projects are supported by the Guild over a three vear period. Since its inception this has raised over £3.5 million for badly needed help both at home and abroad. Our new cycle started this

The Guild

August and projects range from 'Comfort Rwanda', Mary's Meals in Liberia and Scottish women from depressed areas learning from Indian women, to art therapy and housing action at home.

Locally we have chosen to support 'Out of Africa into Malta'. This current problem occurs when families try to escape the war and terror of North Africa. Many thousands drown on the way (yes, thousands) but many of the survivors land on the comparatively small island of Malta. Here they have to live in overflowing detention centres in appalling conditions. The project will consist of The Guild working with Red Cross Malta and St. Andrew's Church of

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Home and Away

There is a new website about deer and deer management which was designed by Stewart Stevenson, then minister for the environment and climate change. It is designed to help children to learn about deer and deer management. The interactive deer zone is composed of games and activities and encourages further work alongside deer managers and chefs to gain the full story from hill to plate. It is the first wildlife resource specifically designed for The Curriculum for Excellence and can be found at www.education.scottishvenison.info. It is good to be in there with a 'first' but I do wonder if any influence was put on the matter after a certain young Frost at High School was elected to talk to the minister about the value of rural studies in the curriculum? I often get snippets of local squirrel news and something which a local lady told me lately may be of use to others. She feeds and loves watching the squirrels in her garden but was a little perturbed when they began to look a bit mangy and off colour. Having in mind that they often dug up and chewed the bulbs in her garden (sorry for the negative publicity furry guys) she put out cloves of garlic. It seems to have done the trick as the squirrels' fur has much improved. But just beware if one gets too close that it doesn't breathe on you.

In wildlife management it is often difficult to decide what is important and there don't seem always to be equal rights in the sight of many organisations. When a webcam recording of a buzzard taking an osprey chick in Aberdeenshire was put to the R.S.P.B. as a reason to lift protection on the 20,000 breeding pairs of buzzards in Scotland, there was no reply. Apparently, though birds are supposed to be equal, some are more equal than others.



The first muntjac in the borders have been reported and S.N.H. have recommended a 'shoot on sight' policy. This must be because they are an introduced species since the Tay beavers have been left in peace, as indigenous. S.N.H. have, however, conceded that the beavers may have to be controlled in future as in other countries due to the damage caused.

Our wily foxy friends seem to think that they are more important than other species – and therefore able to travel free. One evening last month a cub strolled onto a Circle line tube



in London and sat on one of the seats. It got off at the next stop but there is no record of it having a ticket- even though it was probably eligible for half fare. Not so amusing was another recent incident in

London when a fox was found in a baby's bedroom having caused £1000 worth of damage by chewing toys etc. The baby was not in the room so was O.K. but his feeding regime may have suffered a bit as one of the items chewed was a breast pump.

I thought you might like to see the newest 'adopted' member of our family. He is a giant mountain gorilla called Rukara who lives with his family about 12,000 feet up in the Bwindi rainforest in Uganda. We recently spent the most amazing and unforgettable time with them. They are rather bigger than foxes, much furrier and unbelievably placid and friendly. This is an experience to be recommended to anyone preferably when a little younger than us - then you won't be called 'Old Silverback' by the airport quards!

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Loch Tay pupils plant woodland at Ben Lawers



Pupils from schools around Loch Tay helped to plant a brand new hazel wood at one of the National Trust for Scotland's most important countryside properties in Perthshire last week.

Kenmore and Killin Primary pupils ioined expert staff from conservation charity the National Trust for Scotland to plant a new native broadleaf wood at Balnasuim Wood on the slopes below Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve on the site of an old conifer plantation. Sponsored by travel firm Rabbie's, 40 pupils and staff from the two schools planted trees over the two days. A further 28 pupils from Edinburgh's Leith Primary also travelled to Ben Lawers to help with the project. The project is the latest push in decades of work undertaken by the

Trust to re-establish important native species in the area – the charity is pioneering the restoration of high altitude willow scrub, endangered in

Scotland. Once established, the wood, which will be mainly hazel, will be coppiced by the Scottish Crannog Centre for use in its weaving and education activities. As part of the project, the pupils also visited the centre to learn more about its work and try out hazel weaving.

Ben Lawers is widely known for its outstanding range and diversity of arctic-alpine species and vegetation types. It is important for the very large number of nationally rare or scarce montane plant species that it supports, including vascular plants, lichens, and bryophytes. It also has an outstanding diversity of invertebrates with many nationally rare or notable species.

Wallpaper at Moirlanich Longhouse

A unique conservation project is underway at the National Trust for Scotland's Moirlanich Longhouse. The modest, corrugated iron roofed cruck framed cottage was built in the early 19th century and was home to the Robertson family until 1968. It gives an unrivalled insight into country living in Scotland in the 19th and early 20th Century with its intact period interiors, including the many, many layers of wallpaper which have been added to the walls over the years. These layers start with newspapers from the end of the 19th century, followed by layer upon layer of patterned paper - whether these were purchased locally or passed down from a local big house, we do not know. Over the years the weight of paper and leaks from the roof have detached areas from the walls, but following last year's repairs to the corrugated iron, Helen Creasy and Anna Trist from The Scottish Conservation Studio have been to Moirlanich to repair some of the damage.

The major task to be tackled was to put back up the layers of paper that formed the ceiling of the box bed in the small bedroom off the kitchen. The layers of papers were attached at one end and partially on the back

wall, but the majority was resting down onto the bed. The layers were too heavy to be pasted back up to the rough uneven boards of the bed's ceiling so the plan was to attach it back up to the boards using thin steel wire and Perspex rods and after much puzzling and manoeuvring the desired result was achieved successfully.

Staining on the left side of the hanging lum had occurred from water leaking through the roof and in the ceiling two large dark swellings where debris had fallen. There was also unsightly damage to the ceiling of the right side of the chimney.

After the distorted paper coverings and the debris behind them were removed, the area was repapered, firstly with some layers of fresh newspaper and then with

smooth white papers. The dark staining on the chimney breast was reduced using a steamer and soft cloths to wipe away the stains. In the 'best room' the planks in the ceiling had been moving, causing the whitewashed paper to tear and lift. Paper was pasted back as far as possible and larger splits and gaps in the ceiling were covered with strips of white paper. Overall, the interior of the building is much improved and next season we aim to reveal more of the back bedroom to our visitors.

The wallpaper work is the latest in a series of conservation projects to take place at the property. Last year, the iron roof was repaired and work to the building's walls also took place earlier this year.



Last autumn a team from the Glasgow Paranormal Investigators followed up tales of ghostly sightings at Moirlanich Longhouse by spending a night there with a range of equipment to detect unusual activity. Turing their vigil they reported hearing the sound of walking in the hall, a white light and a hand appearing at the back window, as if someone were walking down the back of the house and a dragging noise in the byre.

Psychic members of the group felt the presence of a young boy and his father, an old man and a name



sounding like Lackie, but they also reported sensing a number of possible violent incidents: a daughter, who died giving birth, being buried around the back of the house; a man being threatened with a pitchfork; a hanging and a person

being beaten close to death. Any ghostly tales from Moirlanich will be gratefully received at the NTS office, Lynedoch. Any more volunteers for the rota for Moirlanich?



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
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Progress On Birks Cinema



While many people have relaxed on holiday or been glued to the Olympic Games over the summer months, progress on work to bring The Birks Cinema back to life as a modern state of the art facility in Aberfeldy has continued apace. Building firm Hadden's have made 'brilliant' progress inside the building and a new trading arm of the project has been established.

The amazing cooling labyrinth is in place inside the cinema - a whole series of pipes laid in concrete under the auditorium, accessing the well of 'coolth' under the building, so that on fine summer days when we need the auditorium to be a little cooler, we can draw cool air from deep below the floor. And now that the pipes are buried in concrete they will never be seen again! The foundations for the internal walls are in place and we are beginning to see the shape of what is to come. It is very, very exciting. During August the roof began to be replaced - and this required scaffolding around the entire building, which unfortunately means that the Chapel St bus stop has needed to be temporarily moved for a few weeks. Our apologies for any inconvenience caused by this. Recruitment of a General Manager of The Birks cinema is underway and a new Trading Board, The Birks Cinema Ltd., is in place with Charlotte Flowers as chair.

At the first full Board meeting, the room was full of amazing local expertise, enthusiasm and experience.

Bogus Callers

A new scheme has been introduced by Stirling Council Social Services and Central Scotland Police Community Safety Department to help people who may be at risk of bogus callers stay safe in their homes.

The Telecare Bogus Caller Scheme supports vulnerable people who may be distressed or threatened by an unwelcome intruder. An electronic community alarm unit is installed in the home, connected to Stirling Council's 24-hour contact centre. If someone calls at the front door and manages to talk their way in, perhaps with the intention to steal, the resident can send an automatic, silent message for assistance to the contact centre at the touch of a button.

Contact centre staff will contact the police and stay silently on the line to monitor what is going on.

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Obituary



Johnnie Mudd 1922 - 2012

Johnnie came from a mixed heritage and could claim some Scottish blood as well as Swedish. She remained very proud of her Nova Scotian background and was troubled this year as to whether or not she should renew her Canadian passport. She was the voungest of five siblings born to Ernest and Susan Johnson - hence the nickname Johnnie. After High school in Westville she trained as a nurse in Halifax. Johnnie always had a deep religious commitment and pursed her career through the United Church of Canada. Her first posting was to Cold Lake, Northern Alberta where she cared for a local population of Inuit and First Nations people - what we used to call Eskimos and Red Indians. Added to the nursing duties was growing vegetables and pickling them for the long hard winter to accompany fish or moose.

After three years she enlisted in the overseas missions and after studying theology and Hindi, was sent to Ratlam in India. After a three week voyage she arrived in Bombay - quite an adventure for a girl from Westville, Nova Scotia.

She worked with Canadian and Indian Doctors in the operating theatre, trained local nurses and provided care in isolated villages. She also ran a children's home and had thirty children who all contracted measles at the same time. It was in India that Johnnie met Stanley, who was working about 40 miles away as an Engineer. One Sunday in every month the mission held an English service which was well attended by the engineers and the friendship between Stan and Johnnie blossomed. Eventually Stan took the plunge and proposed to Johnnie under a moonlit sky at the Taj Mahal. She had nursed in India for five years.

Married life started in Bolton with Johnnie working part time in Accident and Emergency at the Royal Infirmary. Some three years later their daughter, Beverley Anne, was born bringing great joy to their new household. The family life continued in Portishead and Johnnie became a school nurse and laterally ran the recovery unit in a local hospital.

As retirement loomed and always up for a challenge, Johnnie and Stanley moved to Killin to be near their daughter and young grandchildren, Sarah and Struan. There was about two foot of snow when they arrived in December - I quess Johnnie thought she was back home in a Canadian winter! They launched into the Bed and Breakfast trade making lots of friends who returned year after year, eventually closing the doors when she and Stanley were both in their eighties. Even in later years their life revolved around the church and the social groups in Killin.

The final chapter in Johnnie's life also gave her challenges and a chance to make new friends amongst the carers from ILS team, especially Karen, Jackie, Frank, Liz and Jane, (lots of giggling could be heard from upstairs), Jan, from Crossroads who took Johnnie out or chatted with her at home and the local medical and nursing staff, Cilla, Evelyn and Susan and Bruce the hairdresser who always brought a smile to her face. Everybody who came played such an enormous role in Johnnies final chapter.

Johnnie had a passion for life and a concern for mankind. and she filled every day of her ninety years.

Book Review Sleepyhead by Mark Billingham

This book was one of the titles that we received from World Book Night. It is the first book in the 'Tom Thorne' series and in 2011 was made into a Sky drama series, 'Thorne', starring David Morrissey. 'Sleepyhead' is fast paced, well written, descriptive, emotional and disturbing. It provides great characters and a detailed story. 
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Lochtayside Hill Races October 13 th/14th

The event was started to encourage hill running locally, to get visitors to Killin and to raise funds for Cancer Research. It's nice after three years to be achieving those aims.

The races are organised with the local hill running club, Lochtayside, the Killin Outdoor Centre and great support from the Real Food Café's Sarah and Alan who are stalwarts in supporting local sporting events. The first race is Meall Nan Tarmachan - at 9.7 km and just over 700m a great route - a mixture of path, cross country and Landrover track. Times take from 48minutes to 2 hours. 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Police Report

Killin Search & Rescue Dog

On 25th August local Killin policeman, Andy Fleming and his black Labrador Retriever, Dugald, successfully passed an assessment at Balloch Country Park to become a Search and Rescue Dog Team. The assessment was organised by members of SARDA (Southern Scotland) - Search and Rescue Dog Association - who train and assess dog teams. The successful dog teams are then placed onto the 24 hour call out list and respond to requests from Police and Mountain Rescue Teams throughout Scotland to search for missing people. Andy and Dugald had barely made it home after a full days assessment. when the team's first call out was received, to assist in the search for the elderly farmer in the Carron Valley near Stirling. The team responded that night and worked into the early hours of the morning and on several successive days afterwards, to help search for the man. Working alongside many other search teams from the 3 Mountain Rescue Teams - Ochils, Lomond and Killin, the weather conditions had deteriorated significantly, as forests, open moorland, fields were extensively covered. Unfortunately the elderly man has not been found and police enquiries are continuing.

Drugs dog at work in Killin

On 11th August a Central Scotland Police Dog Handler paired up with local officers to carry out Operation Ironworks Patrols in the Killin section

During the shift the officers included patrols at a variety of wild camp sites in Glen Lochay and South Loch Tay near Killin

Happily many of the visitors and people camping were law abiding and no issues were found on this occasion

Other locations were also visited. within the National Park, where the drugs dog was put to work. Positive indications from the dog suggesting recent use of illicit drugs led to a number of campers being warned on Loch Lubnaig.

These Operation Ironworks Patrols are carried out regularly over the Summer months to dissuade anti social behaviour and vandalism at our lochs and rivers.

Constables Andy Fleming and Iona Frickleton, as locally based officers, look after the rural communties in and around the Killin area

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

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
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More Help for Carers
