



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Editorial

The cold dark days are here again and even the most reluctant shopper is beginning to realise that Christmas is nearly upon us. Killin is quieter with fewer visitors about and this is when those in the tourist business set about any changes or improvements which need to be done before next season. The village can also take a clear look at itself and consider how it appears to outsiders and what changes either have to be made or would be desirable. Change is inevitable whether we like it or not and many changes are made to us rather than by us but where possible we should have our say.

The question of a new pharmacy is topmost at the moment and the public meeting will have given us the chance to thrash out the pros and cons. There are always those for and those against any change but no-one can be sure either way how things will work out after a decision - the unexpected always has a part to play.

There is one thing, however, on which everyone is agreed. We do not want to lose the public toilets. It seems incredible that in the 21st century it is proposed to go back to pre-Victorian times and areas of the village will be fouled because of lack of provision for a basic human need. Fortunately discussions are still going on and perhaps a solution will be found.

Outside the village another development is planned by the National Park on Glenoglehead which will provide public loos, as well as a hot food outlet, overnight camping places and a campervan park. (Check exact wording) Will this help Killin? Will it be a threat to the village? Or will it have no effect at all? This will no doubt be a matter for great discussion over the coming weeks.

Meanwhile the future of the Old Mill is still under discussion. The Council first proposed closing the Mill four years ago but kept it going a further two years because of the community interest in acquiring it. It closed last year but the Killin and Ardeonaig Community Development Trust (KAT) opened a thrift shop there on a three month trial basis, run by a group of volunteers. This has proved successful financially and it will open again next March on a longer lease once a business plan has been agreed with the Council. Applications will be then made for grants. The volunteers involved in the Mill are united in their enthusiasm for the project and this is attractive to the visitors and generates positive thinking about the Mill future.

Volunteering there has also been a good way for people new to the village to get to know residents and become part of the community. The more people who get involved, the more momentum will be generated to make acquisition of the Mill a long term success.

In the world outside there are many problems about which we can do little but for the moment at least we can take time off worrying to enjoy the coming festivities with families, friends and our community. **MM**

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A Pharmacy in Killin?

Forth Valley Health Board has accepted an application from Davidsons Chemists to open a pharmacy in Killin. If this happens the Medical Practice in Killin will no longer be able to dispense drugs and this would potentially have a devastating effect on our medical services. Whilst we appreciate the skills a pharmacist can bring to our medical services and we currently work with pharmacy colleagues in Callander and Aberfeldy, we feel that, as we

are in a remote and rural area, this application should be refused, just as a previous application in Aberfoyle and Drymen was refused a few years ago for similar reasons. If a Pharmacy opens in Killin:

- 1 Doctors will not have access to drugs outwith normal working hours.
- 2 Doctors will no longer be able to provide a full course of drugs to remote patients in Crianlarich, Tyndrum and Lochearnhead when we visit them and will not have quick access to a range of specific medications for terminal care patients.
- 3 Patients will have to pick up their prescriptions from our Medical Practice then go to the pharmacy to get their medications.
- 4 It is not clear whether the pharmacy will dispense to the patients in the more remote areas of Crianlarich, Tyndrum and Lochearnhead. If not, how will they get their medications? (Forth Valley Health Board is unable to tell us.)

Killin Medical Practice itself will be under threat because:

- 1 We will lose a GP so patients will have much longer waiting times to see a doctor and care will be compromised.
- 2 Staff will be made redundant.
- 3 When Dr Syme retires, the Practice will no longer be so attractive to an incoming doctor which could mean a once three-doctor practice would have only one doctor and patients might have to travel to Callander or Aberfeldy for medical services.

Services in the Killin areas would also be under threat because:

- 1 FVHB currently has one pharmacist per 4,500 people. As a pharmacy in Killin would provide one pharmacist for

approximately 700 people. We do not feel that would be financially viable in the long term so the promised opening hours could be reduced and the pharmacy could end up closing. The Killin Medical Practice would have already lost its dispensary so patients would then have to travel to Callander or Aberfeldy to pick up medications.

- 2 The pharmacy would also be directly competing with other shops in the village which may suffer in the current economic crisis.

Except for opening on a Saturday morning, the pharmacy proposes to provide the same services that the Practice already provide. Time is short and support is vital to make authorities aware of our feelings on this very important matter affecting us all. Points of interest from Killin Community Council November Meeting

Glenoglehead Development

Grant Moir, National Park, presented information on proposed

Glenoglehead development. This is part of the Five Lochs Plan designed to reduce damage, vandalism and contamination resulting from free camping in the National Park and comprises a new car park, overnight car park with motor home spaces, toilet facilities and an associated kiosk together with a BBQ seating area and fire facilities.

It is hoped that the development will replicate the success and savings achieved at East Loch Lomond.

Glenoglehead is the last piece of this development and will not come to fruition for a couple of years. Access for cars to the cycle track area will be curtailed to discourage wild camping in the vicinity of Glenogle Cottages.

The project is considered to be sustainable because of the overall benefits demonstrated by the original East Loch Lomond project.

Killin Community Council has requested more time to obtain details and make a considered response. It was acknowledged that there had been a deficiency in local consultation. The Community Council would like to receive your comments on this development.

Pharmacy Plans

An application has been made by Davidson's Pharmacy to establish a pharmacy in Killin. This is a very unusual request in a community of under 800 people as that number is not considered to be viable for a full time pharmacist.

The Killin Surgery will be required to stop dispensing to Killin residents, as a pharmacy takes precedence in these decisions, and residents will be obliged to go to the pharmacy to have their prescriptions dispensed.

The surgery will no longer have a trained pharmacy dispenser and dispensing to the outlying regions will

probably not be sustainable. The number of doctors in Killin is dependent, to a degree, on the practice being a dispensing practice so it is likely that doctor numbers will be reduced with an increase in waiting times for appointments. It was also suggested that the practice would become less attractive for future incoming General Practice applicants should a doctor retire.

The basis for accepting the pharmacy in this circumstance will be judged by Forth Valley Primary Care Trust and based on it being "necessary or desirable for the adequate provision of pharmaceutical services in the neighbourhood". Guidelines include "evidence of local deficiencies in the services". Decisions are made on the facts of each individual case.

The Pharmacy intends to set up in what was Pride of Place. Should the pharmacy fail or withdraw, the Killin community will need to look further afield to have their prescriptions dispensed.

The various concerns expressed included:

*access would be difficult for elderly or disabled drivers who would be required to park on the narrow busy Main Street;

*emergency prescriptions for terminal care patients at night or out of hours would be difficult to obtain from the nearest duty emergency chemist, probably in Stirling;

*Davidson's Pharmacy, having been invited by the practice, were not present to give their views;

*there has not been any local consultation. (Apparently, we hear, local consultation has taken place - 25 people have been approached for their views.)

Forth Valley Health Board may be swayed by public opinion. Martin Earl gave the community his support. The open public meeting will have taken place before this issue of Killin

News comes out. Make sure you pass on your opinions to the Killin Community Council and send your comments, before the 7th January, to Primary Care Contractor Services (Pharmacy), NHS Forth Valley, Room 300A North Wing, Viewforth, Stirling, FK8 2ET.

Job Reference Numbers

We were reminded that every Council repair job has a job reference number. When reporting to Stirling Council it is always wise to take a note of the number to quote should the problem not be resolved.

Public Toilets

Martin Earl informed us that Stirling Council policy is to close down all public toilets once a comfort partner is in place. He reported to Lesley Malkin (Stirling Council) that one of the two comfort partners, both situated near the Dochart Bridge, has reduced opening times to winter hours. In his opinion it would have been better if comfort partners were located at each end of the village. Lesley Malkin's usual process is to remove or sell off redundant toilets quickly but she has agreed to delay this until June next year.

The next Killin Community Council meeting will be held on Tuesday 15th January.

The Old Mill

The Mill Project ran from 1st July until 30th September. The time and patience of fifty volunteers and the supply of articles for sale with craft sales, group work and donations resulted in an income of £5,860. £2,112 in expenses was deducted giving a profit of £3,748. This will go towards acquiring the Old Mill for the community and work on this continues. The project was designed to help us show Stirling Council that this community can responsibly sustain the building. It also has to demonstrate that the community can acquire £59,000 to undertake repairs that are needed, some urgently, develop the building to make it suitable for community use and provide an income stream sufficient to maintain the building for the future. So far we have had enthusiastic support for our project. This process is a test for the community and for Stirling Council who are working with us to ensure that the business plan we present will satisfy Stirling Councillors. Many problems have surfaced. Who could have anticipated that activities in the Mill would be dependent on the proximity of the public toilets without

which business in the Mill will have to cease? The Council has informed us that the toilets will close for good in December but we hope there are ways around this. The trial period has been tedious and tortuous but we hope the results will be well worth all the effort. In summary, we are seeking sources of funding and trying to obtain assurances from funders that they are keen to support us for the repair of the building, to help us to develop it to make it suitable for the community to use and be independent of the toilets. We must show that we can generate excess funds to cover the costs of running and maintaining the property. We plan to employ a part time manager for two years to develop the business and to increase the income year by year. Thank you all for your generosity and your help with this project.

Report from the Mill Group

At the start of October Stirling Council offered a further three month lease to the Old Mill community project, to enable them to get their business plan completed. This will be submitted to Stirling Council in

February and meanwhile funding is being sought for re-furbishing and repairing the building.

Opening hours were reduced, as the holiday season had come to an end and the number of visitors had slowed down. However, a good number still visit and make a significant contribution to the income.

It is pleasing to see that support from the villagers has not dwindled and donations are still coming in almost on a daily basis. Many people from Killin and surrounding villages continue to use the thrift shop and visitors still come in for information about the local area. It is clear from feedback that the majority are enthusiastic about the mill project and its aims. They also appreciate the information volunteers give them face-to-face and the time that is spent talking to them. The first floor continues to be used to exhibit arts and crafts and as a small meeting place and class room. Eleanor Murray held a story telling session which was very well received by locals and visitors. The Callander USA group met there to discuss the possibility of supporting Killin to develop a USA group for our village.

Breadalbane Park

Connan Design Associates have been employed by Stirling Council to produce a design for the Park based on ideas generated from the Park support group. They met up with the group on 8th November with a digital site model in three dimensions that incorporated the results of the last meeting. This was discussed by the group and will go out to public consultation soon. A meeting will be advertised nearer the time.

Priorities include, park drainage and the Play Park but the proposed developments are much more extensive than that.

Sports and Social Club

Discussions continue between representatives of the Sports Club and Stirling Council about the future of the Sports Club building when the 21 year lease ends on the 31st March 2013. Stirling Council have declared that they would be happy to see the

leasehold transferred to the community provided they can be assured that the building can be repaired and maintained by the community.

Project Officer

The application to fund a part time Project Officer to help KAT manage and coordinate the Sports and Leisure Club developments, the Breadalbane Park drainage, other Park developments and do an audit of spaces that could be made available around Killin is still in the process of seeking funding. This is not to be confused with the Old Mill application for the part time manager mentioned above.

Public Toilets

At the meeting to discuss the provision of public toilets in Killin we were informed by Stirling Council that as they have two Comfort Partners in Killin they can cease public toilet provision and close the toilets at the end of this year. A Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park representative and Martin Earl, Stirling Councillor, were also at the meeting and we hope some agreement can be reached before we see similar unhygienic problems to those that occurred when toilets were closed in the past. The two Comfort Partners at the top end of the village are to be well signposted in the village.

Windows 8 is released

Windows 8 was launched on 26 October and is now installed on all new computers and Windows tablets. As mentioned in previous articles, the look and feel is different to all previous versions of Windows, as it is really designed for touch screen devices and not for a mouse and keyboard.

The current advances in technology and the launch of Windows 8 now marks a revolution in the way we use our computers. Soon the mouse and keyboard will be ancient and we will use voice to command and drive our computers and touch screens to control the display.

There will be a steep learning curve if you move to Windows 8 and this might be too much for some people – but the changes are the way the industry is going and at some stage it will be important at least to try to get used to it.

If you decide to upgrade your existing computer to Windows 8, then you should be aware that applications and programs on Windows XP will need to be reinstalled, although Windows 7 applications "should" run on Windows 8 (according to Microsoft).

It will now be increasingly difficult to find a new computer with Windows 7 installed and impossible to find one with XP or Vista. If you believe you need to keep Windows 7, VISTA, or Windows XP systems (for instance in your business network) then you should consider your options before it is too late.

Windows 8 is designed for modern devices including Windows phones, tablets and all in one computers. These will benefit from its new user interface as it is geared up for touch screens. However, older laptops will not be able to use all the Windows 8 features due to the limitations of the mouse.

New features within Windows 8 include :

Skydrive, which is an internet storage facility for you to use to back up your data

Microsoft Store – where you can download "apps" for Windows 8

Integration with Microsoft Office 2013 (early days yet, but big promises have been made)

Email/Calendar/Word Processing handling

Personally I am cautious about any new launch of operating system, as history has shown that it takes a while for bugs to be fixed, and security loopholes mended. But we will see.

Shopping for Christmas

It is that time of year again and we are looking to find new technology for our loved ones as gifts for Christmas. As the past 12 months have seen rapid changes in the way we use our computers/phones/tablets, I believe we should now be looking at using Smart Phones and Tablet computers for internet access whilst on the move and other touch screen devices for fixed locations. The age of the desktop for home use has now passed us by.

My only concern is that Windows 8 compatible devices are new to the market and, perhaps, will become cheaper as they become more popular – but this will not happen before the end of the year.

But for me, I will be looking for a "convertible" device, which is a touch screen tablet, but one that has a removable keyboard – so it can also be used as a laptop.

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Frost Report



Friends and Foes

I was sitting having my morning coffee in the garden, as we retired folk do, when a chiffchaff came to the feeders. After a moment or two he must have mistaken me for a tree as he came down and sat on my knee and stayed there for quite a while, until my coffee was cold at any rate. On a similar occasion it was the regular pheasants who came to my attention. There was a commotion amongst them as a sparrowhawk was diving down attacking one of the hen pheasants. One of the cock pheasants sprang into action attacking the sparrowhawk till it retreated.

Another interesting encounter took place on a wet day with a gale force westerly wind in the stag season at Glen Falloch. We were spying fairly low down the hill when a bird dived past at high speed. The next second we realised why. An eagle was chasing it. The bird was a guillemot - these are sometimes blown into this area in stormy weather. On my way home I found him by the roadside, alright but a bit traumatised. I was able to move him to a safer spot from which I hope he found his way safely back to sea after the storm.

While we were away in Speyside recently we observed a pheasant totally perplexed at a different encounter. The said hen pheasant was feeding on the fallen scraps below a bird feeding table when six red squirrels charged along chasing each other around the table at full pelt. All the squirrels looked paler and greyer than the ones here. Maybe it was their winter coat but ours still seem very red and I have noticed that many along the south side of the loch have a very dark, almost black band along their backbone and tail. I wonder if any work has been done on locality colour variations.

Thinking about squirrels and animals not really recognising a human I can, maybe answer Mrs. Paterson's query in the last Killin News when a squirrel ran up Ian's leg while on the hill. This summer in Yorkshire we had noticed on several occasions that grey squirrels were about quite long distances from woodland. Maybe the one at Auchlyne was just widening the range, indeed thinking that it had found a lone tree and he was investigating in search of some nuts! We are not told how long the squirrel took to decide whether the younger or older of the 'trees' would be the best bet for the best nuts.

On the bird front things have quietened down a bit. This year there were huge flocks of fieldfares and redwings feasting off this year's. For days there was their constant chatter but now they have left in search of further food sources.

The big news at the moment is the spread of Ash die back disease. This is believed to be caused by a fungus that may also affect Scots pine and it is also believed that it can be harboured in garden plants such as lilac, forsythia and privet while these plants are not themselves harmed. Another disease is affecting larch trees and there are plans to fell over 100,000 in an attempt to halt the spread of this disease.

The R.S.P.B. wants to install wind turbines at the Loch of Strathbeg nature reserve in Aberdeenshire. Since the organisation has, itself, objected to many other wind farms, including the 'Donald Trump' one, the plan has come under fire from protest groups who accuse them of using double standards. I expect the reply will probably have more spin than a squirrel's tail.

Provost's Awards 2012

Alan and Isla attended the awards ceremony and dinner at Stirling Castle on behalf of the CiA to receive the Provost's Community Award. Copies are on the notice board and in the shop. The Award will be placed in the Village Hall.

Tyndrum to Oban Path

Alan attended the inaugural meeting concerning the proposed Tyndrum to Oban Path in Oban on 5th November, chaired by SNH. It was agreed that Oban Council should lead the formation of the path and SNH agreed to set aside funding for a feasibility study to be carried out on behalf of Oban Council.

Outcomes for Stirling

Alan attended a meeting on 6th November at Killin regarding the above. Barbara Allen (SC) gave a short talk on Outcomes for Stirling which is a 10 year plan based on the needs and aspirations of the community as a whole. A workshop ensued for the group to express their opinions on rural issues that affect our area with Breadalbane. These issues will be included in the plan.

Car Parking in Willow Square

The proposed parking solution for 12 marked parking bays has met with opposition from residents and tenants alike. Moira contacted Neil Newlands (SC Housing) about these concerns and reminded him that this was not what was asked for in the first instance. A lay-by was requested to ease the pressure of parking. He explained that the LEAP fund would not be able to go this far and that Housing tenants were in a minority therefore requiring house owners to pay a proportion of any major works and it would be highly unlikely for planning to be obtained for such a project. It was decided

that the 'status quo' should prevail in this instance. No further action is to be taken and the residents will have to resolve the issues among themselves.

Police Report by Craig Murray

There have been two reported thefts from properties/vehicles in the area. A report on an attempt to obtain money through false pretences in our area and further north was highlighted. There were two mountain rescues over the period.

Grontmij

Raymond Travers gave us details of the timescales and work patterns during the building of the by-pass. It was assumed that work will start around August 2013 and will last for about 52 weeks. We discussed facilities signage and the removal of the 'Gateway' feature sign at the western end of the village as this does not conform to current road safety designs.

Proposed Pharmacy at Killin

Doctors Syme and Watson along with Fiona Buchanan, Practice Manager, attended the meeting to discuss the proposed application to open a pharmacy in Killin. A robust discussion in favour of our present situation ensued. We will all write letters of opposition to the proposal to the relevant authorities. A petition is available to sign at Brodies,

Crianlarich Store and the Surgery, to name but three places.

Crianlarich into Action

We received funding for the solicitors fees to allow the lease of the Lower Station Yard to proceed. Funds provided by Stirling Council's Community Pride Fund. Planning permission has been applied for the network of paths around Crianlarich.

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Killin Tourism Forum

The Killin Tourism Forum held an open information meeting in The Bridge of Lochay Hotel on Wednesday evening, 7th November. Some 70 tourism-related businesses within the Killin area were invited by email and 12 businesses were represented at the meeting.

Stuart Brain, Senior Grading Advisor with the Perth-based Green Tourism Business Scheme gave a presentation about the nature of the scheme, the benefits of membership and the possibility of marketing the area as a "green" destination. A number of participants stayed behind afterwards to get more details of the scheme from Stuart. Other items reported at the meeting included:

Brown Tourism Signs The National Park will pay for modification to existing signage and improvements to the visibility of the signs at Lix Toll. Hopefully, this work will be completed by March 2013.

The Park is applying (to itself!) for planning permission to erect one of the new stone Park Entrance signs at the Bridge of Lochay.

If funds are available at the end of the Park's financial year, a Welcome to Killin sign may also be erected. Suitable locations for two Tourist Information Points (TIPs) have been identified in consultation with the Park Planning Officer, one incorporating an improved Community notice board. Designs are required before site owners can be approached and planning permission sought. We will shortly apply for funding for two sets of designs and construction of the first TIP.

The Killin tourism web site (www.killin.net) was launched on 1st September. Visits to the site in October were 50% higher than in the first month. Businesses are asked to make use of the site to advertise events, special offers etc.

Concerns have been expressed by visitors about the appearance of the village (empty shops; derelict buildings; unattractive frontages). The need for a community initiative to make the village more attractive (flower baskets; winter lights) is apparent.

Ring of Breadalbane Explorer

The Ring of Breadalbane Explorer bus service was launched on 17th July, travelling both clockwise and anti-clockwise on a Killin – Aberfeldy – Crieff circular route. The pilot service, operated by Kingshouse Travel, ran four days a week in each direction until 16th September.

A total of 1,400 passengers used the service in the nine-week period and it attracted a lot of positive comment and reviews, appearing on BBC Scotland's *Out of Doors* radio programme and *Landward* TV programme. Political figures such as Roseanna Cunningham, MSP, and Mike Williamson, P&K councillor, promoted the service actively in the local press.

The feedback forms returned by travellers indicate a 50:50 split between tourist users and local residents, suggesting that it has both a tourism benefit and public transport function. The service was rated as either "Excellent" or "Good" by 97% of travellers. The benefits of the service included the outstanding landscapes and walking and cycling opportunities access by the service and the major visitor attractions served by the bus. 68% of passengers would not have made the journey if the Explorer hadn't been running. 23% would have made the journey by car, evidence of carbon saving.

Unfortunately, such a rural service can never be economic on fare revenue alone and requires considerable subsidy. The finance for this year's pilot trial came from Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park, Stirling Council, Perth & Kinross Council, Perth & Kinross Countryside Trust and Scottish Enterprise, together with Explore Aberfeldy and about a dozen private businesses spread throughout the Breadalbane region.

The Breadalbane Tourism Co-operative is now preparing plans for 2013 and beyond, in an effort to obtain long-term funding.

Off-duty Dog to the Rescue

About 1.30pm on 15th October, Constable Andy Fleming returned home to Killin Police House, after being out with his family. It had been a dry and sunny morning but, despite the autumnal sunshine, the temperature was very cold. He let the family dogs (including Mountain Rescue Search Dog, Dugald) out into the garden and shortly afterwards Dugald began to bark frantically at the rear of the police house. The persistent barking went on for several minutes and Andy went out but there was no-one about. However the dog continued to bark which was unusual for him to do without good cause. Andy quietened the dog and then heard soft cries for help and moans nearby. Looking around, he discovered his neighbour, Mrs Margaret MacDonald, lying flat on her back on the gravel in her back garden. Clambering over the fence, he hurried to assist her and with some help Margaret was able to get back onto her feet and walk back into her home, where medical assistance and an ambulance were called and she was taken to hospital. Margaret, who has mobility problems, was extremely cold after falling several hours earlier and lying there unable to get up. Her cries for help had gone unheard until Dugald came to her rescue. 2 year old Dugald, a black Labrador retriever, is a Mountain Rescue Search Dog with SARDA (Southern Scotland) and is trained to detect human scent in open spaces. Although this wasn't a 'dog find' in the traditional sense, the remarkable aspect was the persistent way Dugald reacted to the cries for help, using his deep booming bark to draw Andy's attention to Margaret's plight. Happily she has since recovered and returned home.

In the October issue of the Killin News there was a photo of a large 'House Spider'. Although I can't definitively tell you what species it is, I can tell you that there are five species of 'House Spider' found in Britain. These large bodied, long-legged, brown spiders spin a sheet web that leads to a tubular retreat. The Common or Domestic House Spider (*Tegenaria domestica*) is the smallest of the five, with a body size of up to 10mm, and is found throughout Britain, including my house. The spiders you see most often running across the carpet are males, searching for females. They have longer, more agile legs than females, as well as having bloated pedipalps (the two appendages at the front of the spider that make it look as if it is wearing boxing gloves) and more elongated abdomens. Females that reside indoors can live for several years on the same web, with some living for as long as seven years in rarely disturbed places. The Giant House Spider or Cobweb spider (*Tegenaria gigantea*) is more commonly found in southern England where it occurs in houses and out-buildings as well as outside. Female Giant House Spiders can have a body size of up to 18mm in length and a leg span of around 45mm, with males having a slightly smaller body, but a leg span of up to 75mm. There is a closely related species (*Tegenaria saeva*) that is more common in the north and west of Britain that is similar in size to the Giant House Spider and can be found in similar environments. My best guess would be that the spider photographed by the Lang family is a male *Tegenaria saeva*. The largest of the house spiders is the Cardinal Spider (*Tegenaria parietina*) which can have a body size of up to 20mm. This species is restricted to southern England. It gets its common name from the legend that the spiders living in Hampton Court used to terrify Cardinal Wolsey.

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Mervyn's Weather ... and More

That brief spell of settled weather which is an almost infallible feature of mid-October and which was once known as "St. Luke's little summer" has come and gone on cue. The Saint this year however was rather grudging in his provision, there being but two days of brilliant sunshine, the remaining four or five being, although rain free, dull and drab. To one, among many others, who has experienced the dramatic evolution of farming practices since World War II, it is a far cry now from the horse-drawn harvesting implements, mowers, turners, rakes, and "Tumbling-Tams", for the hay crop, reaper-binders, corn carts and so on for the grain harvests. Nowadays it is round-baling of hay and wrapping and baling for haylage/silage, while combines, ever increasing in size, deal with corn crops. During the miserable weather conditions of 2012 it has been interesting to see some of my neighbours snatch, with literally minutes, rather than hours, to spare, crops of silage and indeed some hay,

from the jaws of the next fast approaching weather front by dint of considered observation of impending conditions plus efficient use of speedily operating baler and wrapper. **... and More** Continuing our journey eastwards from Balnasuim, along the north shore of Loch Tay, we come to Croft An Tygan – Croit An Taghain – the croft, or perhaps hillock, of the Fomarts i.e. Polecats or Pine Martens. Overlording the above is the mighty bulk of Ben Lawers, at 3,984 feet the tenth highest mountain in the British Isles. There are several derivations for the name of this peak - Beinn An Latha Ur – "the mountain of the new day" due to the summit being the first visited by the rising sun. In Manx gaelic there are several hills in The Isle of Man called Cronk Ny Airey La - the equivalent of Cnoc An Eirigh Latha in Gaelic – the hill of the rising day i.e. dawn, which could add credibility to this suggested translation. Secondly Beinn Labhair – loud sounding or loquacious,

possibly due to the noise of the Lawers Burn or noisy winds. Finally the word Ladhar meaning hoof-shaped seems as likely as any. Coir'Ladhar is a huge cirque on the eastern side of the mountain, more indeed of an amphitheatre, bounded on the South side by the eastern ridge of Ben Lawers itself and on the north by the "Munros" of An Staic – the steep one, Meall Garbh – the rough hill - and Meall Gruaidh – the hill of the cheeks - (alternatively Meall Ghreigh – of herds, mainly horses). There is a correlation to Ben Lawers in the Garbh Chrioch – "the rough bounds" in Western Inverness-shire – Ladhar Bheinn, also hoof shaped and also with a large east-facing corrie, Coire Dhorcaill – the dark or mist filled corrie.

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Work on the Birk's cinema has been coming on in leaps and bounds in recent weeks. The old roof has now been removed and replaced, walls repaired, some additional steel reinforcing introduced and holes punched in where the new floor to roof windows will face out on to Chapel Street.

Internally, the necessary modifications have been made to prepare for the installation of the mezzanine floor, the under-floor cooling structures have been completed and the auditorium wall built. Our contractors are broadly on schedule. We anticipate that the work will be completed in February and the cinema will open for business around Easter next year. Our cash flow is broadly as expected and, thanks to the generosity of our funders, we have sufficient funds to complete all the work.

At our AGM at the end of August, Charlotte Flower stood down as Chair, having completed her full term. Following Charlotte's

retirement, I was voted in as the new Chair. It will be a hard act to follow but, having been involved with the project for over three years now, I have had the opportunity to work with Charlotte and the rest of the team during that time and I am confident that together we can see the project through to completion of the cinema and beyond. Charlotte is now Chair of the trading company "The Birks Cinema Ltd." (TBC), which has been established as agreed at the EGM earlier this year. The Board of TBC met for the first time in July and is now in the very final stages of recruiting a Manager for the cinema; we expect the successful candidate to be in post at the beginning of December, in time to take forward the recruitment of other staff and volunteers as well as influencing the final fit-out of the building and making the necessary preparations to open for business.

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
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Senior Awards Ceremony


Soft Play Party



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New Illustrated Booklet on the "Lost Gardens of Perthshire"

An attractive new colour booklet describing some of the old gardens of Perthshire has been written by David M. Robertson and published by the Friends of Perth and Kinross Council Archive. The book is illustrated by old photographs and postcard pictures and tells the story of a small selection of old gardens from around the County which are now either entirely lost or greatly diminished.

The ten gardens which are featured in the booklet include the former pleasure grounds of the Dukes of Atholl which attracted visitors to Dunkeld in the 18th and 19th centuries, the Japanese Gardens created at Dundarach House in Pitlochry at the beginning of the 20th century and the stunning terrace gardens which graced the mansion of Dunira near Comrie between the two World Wars.


Killin residents will be particularly interested in the accounts of the largest vine in Great Britain which

once grew at Kinnell and of the former Perth Nurseries on the slopes of Kinnoull Hill (which may well have supplied the vine).

Other lost gardens to be featured are those of Fisher's Hotel in Pitlochry, Methven Castle and Strowan near Comrie, as well as Seggieden (once the home of one of Perthshire's leading naturalists, Colonel Drummond Hay). The booklet also recounts the story of the Great Michael plantation at Tullibardine which was the subject of recent archaeological research.

Mr Robertson says he wanted to capture something of the spirit of these old gardens from such few illustrations as remain and to introduce the residents of the County to this previously neglected aspect of their heritage.


Fearnan, The story of a Highland village of Northern Perthshire

This newly published book tells the story of the people who lived in the offshoot of Fearnan from Neolithic times to the present day. It is suggested that the name Fearnan was first used when the crannogs were established. The story really gets under way when Robert Robertson of Struan was given Fearnan as a freebarony by James II for his assistance securing the killers of James I. In 1766 the Robertsons were replaced by the Campbells and their tenure lasted until 1922 when the Marquis of Breadalbane died with no heirs or money. Fearnan was not exempt from the 19th Century clearances but the building of the present crofting village reduced the number of families cleared. The book then deals with the fundamental changes in education, church and

family life throughout that whole period. These were difficult and challenging times for the residents of Fearnan, with the forced introduction of the English feudal system and all that it entailed. However the period from the 1870's until the Great War would have been the best time. The final section, from 1922 until the present day, records some of the significant opportunities, problems and disputes which the villagers faced with the change from a tenant to a property owning community: and over these last years to one mainly of retired people and holiday homes.

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What is a Credit Union?

There has been growing local interest in Credit Unions but they remain a bit of a mystery to many people. Credit unions let people and organisations in a local community save and borrow money. They are owned and controlled by their members, so they have no outside shareholders to pay and are run by volunteers elected by the membership. Any profit that a credit union makes is used to develop the credit union and provide a return to savers.

Saving with a Credit Union

Credit unions are licensed deposit takers, authorised and regulated by the Financial Services Authority. They are fully covered up to the standard limit (£85,000 from January 2011). They can now pay interest on savings, which will mean that people will be able more easily to compare the rates of return with other savings providers and it will help credit unions attract more savers.

New rules mean that organisations themselves can join a credit union (up to a maximum of 10% of the members) and use the financial services it provides. A community group or local employer, for example, may now be able to use a credit union to manage its money, with the added advantage that the money is kept in the community

Borrowing from a Credit Union

When someone borrows from a credit union, they are encouraged to save too, meaning that by the time they finish repaying the loan their savings will have grown as well.

Loans from credit unions are generally cheaper than loans from most other providers for smaller amounts and do not incur set up fees, administration costs or early redemption fees.

Many credit unions loans, for example, will cost 1% a month on the reducing balance of a loan (an APR of 12.7%). This means that if you borrowed £1,000 repaid over one year, you would repay £1,067 in total. Credit union loans come with no hidden charges and no penalties for repaying the loan early.

Is there a local Credit Union?

From January there will be more information available about a Credit Union in Stirling which will be open to members from this area. This will be publicised in a variety of ways throughout the community.

If enough people are interested it might be possible to have a local collection point for the Stirling based Credit Union so that people can access these services without travelling too far.



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WRVS Volunteers Wanted

Lend a helping hand!

Most people will experience situations in their lives where outside help is needed, maybe due to disability, ill health, family circumstances or accidents. As we get older the likelihood of these situations occurring will increase.

Fortunately we can often rely on friends or family to help out. If they are not available, neighbours may step in. In a village community like Killin this happens a lot and it is a credit to the inhabitants that there is such a strong community spirit.

But there may be times when a person needing help comes unstuck: the neighbour he or she relied is no longer able to help for various reasons. There will also be people who live in remote rural spots who require help or even just a bit of company.

For all these occasions the WRVS Community Support Services was set up. Most people know the WRVS as the ladies at the café in the hospital, but the WRVS has become one of the biggest charities dealing with the needs of older people. It has in recent years undergone a massive reorganisation and can now offer a range of "good neighbour" services. WRVS has secured additional funding to offer this service. What is required now is a good number of

volunteers to carry out the services. At the moment I am the only volunteer in Killin and we are very keen to increase the numbers. Both men and women of all ages are welcome. As a volunteer you may be asked to drive an elderly person to the GP surgery, the hospital or the hairdressers etc. They may need help filling in forms and a volunteer could assist with this.

If you are an older person and would like to register to use the Community Support Services then please phone the Stirling office on 01786 450750. For driving roles you must have your own vehicle. Mileage expenses are reimbursed at 45p per mile.

To talk about volunteering please call **Jennifer Kaney at the Stirling office on 01786 450750 or Jennifer.kaney@wrvs.org.uk.** Jennifer is the service manager responsible for the Killin area and is a lovely person to deal with, very committed and always willing to help. Or if there is anything you want to ask me first I can be contacted on **(01567) 820068.**

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Obituary



Iain Gordon Fraser

3.8.54–24.8.12

Iain Gordon Fraser, better known as Jock, was born in Aberfeldy Cottage Hospital in early August 1954. He was raised in Ballechroisk and attended Killin Primary School followed by McLaren High School, Callander. Jock was a happy, easy-going child who enjoyed fishing and playing football. He was popular in school and throughout his entire lifetime. He spent summers at his Aunt's farm in Keltneyburn, cementing his love of animals and having a little flock of lambs of his own, which he kept in a field near Dochart House. Jock enjoyed every aspect of life but was particularly interested in football. His footballing career began at McLaren High where he played for the school team and progressed to Killin and Breadalbane football clubs. Later in life, he took great enjoyment from coaching his boys, David and Neil, and latterly his joy was complete when watching his grandsons, Frankie and Georgie, kicking around a football. Of course, he was always an avid supporter of Rangers Football Club and could usually be found with a Guinness in hand whenever they were playing! On leaving school, Jock entered his father's business, AC Fraser and Sons, and served his time as a

plumbing and heating engineer. Following the completion of his apprenticeship, he moved to Canada, where he spent a year working with Alistair, his brother. In 1985, Jock left Killin and moved to London where shortly after his arrival he met Geraldine in the Three Blackbirds pub. They were married in 1989 and were blessed with two boys, David and Neil. Jock worked with several companies in London during his career and was very well known for his work ethic, his pride in his work and his infectious and bubbly character. It was always known when Jock walked into a room as the laughter and hilarity that he brought with him were ever present. His ever ready supply of jokes and stories kept everyone laughing, ably augmented by his colourful vocabulary from which no-one was safe! Throughout his lifetime, regardless of where in the world he was, Jock never lost sight of his roots. His family, friends and acquaintances were always aware of where his heart lay and he returned frequently to visit his mother and friends in the village. In 23 years of marriage, Jock missed only two New Years in Killin claiming Hogmanay was simply not the same anywhere else. Jock's illness began suddenly in May 2010 when he was admitted to hospital as an emergency. Unfortunately, during that admission he was found to have prostate cancer, which had spread to other parts of his body. He bore his illness with great courage and fortitude, managing to maintain his unique sense of humour to the end. Throughout his illness, Jock and Geraldine received exceptional and enormously kind support from their many friends throughout the country, which helped them to bear the huge burden that they faced. Jock's funeral took place in London on 6th September at the City of London Crematorium. Reflecting his

popularity during his lifetime, there was standing room only as people came from far and wide, including Killin, to say goodbye. This was followed by a wake at Jock's local, "The William" pub where many a glass was raised to a sorely missed husband, father, brother, friend and workmate. He would have loved to have been there. The London funeral was followed by a memorial service in Killin, which was equally well attended by many from the village and surrounding area. Many also travelled from London and further afield for this service. A further wake took place at the Capercaille in Killin, where the stories and reminiscing continued into the small hours. The combined collections from these two services amounted to £2,400, which Geraldine has decided to split between MacMillan Cancer Support, St Barts Hospital and St Margaret's Hospice, Whipps Cross. All three of these organisations offered great support to Jock during his illness. In addition to this amount, Jock's employer H20 is also carrying out a collection of money and some of his workmates are running the Brighton Half Marathon, early next year in Jock's memory. Geraldine, Flora and family would like to give their heartfelt thanks to everyone who has supported them throughout this incredibly difficult period. The generosity has been overwhelming, with offers of accommodation, baking, cooking and support in so many other forms. They wish to thank Reverend Lincoln for his comforting service in Killin Parish Church and also Mrs Chisholm, the church organist. For those left behind, my Uncle Jock will never be forgotten and will be sorely missed. A light has gone out but our memories hold him close in the hope that we will one day meet again.

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Obituary

Judy Holden

1962–2012

My sister, Judy Holden (nee Cockburn), who had lived in Killin since 1999, passed away at Strathcarron Hospice on October 3rd. After a private funeral at Perth Crematorium, a memorial service at Killin Church on Saturday 13th October was followed by a celebration of her life at the Killin Hotel. The church was all but full and people struggled for elbow room in the hotel conservatory afterwards – a vivid testament to the high regard in which she was held by family, friends, neighbours and former work colleagues alike. Judy – or Judith as she was in the family, and as I still think of her – was born in Kirkcaldy just over fifty years ago, in September 1962. She went to the West School in Kirkcaldy and then began a daily commute to Mary Erskine's in Edinburgh, as had our mum a quarter of a century earlier. After leaving school she studied Dietetics in Glasgow, but that wasn't for her, and she expanded her horizons au-pairing for a year in Switzerland, where she also learned to ski.

On her return to Scotland she studied Nursing in Aberdeen and began her career as a nurse on the Isle of Wight, where she met her first husband, Tomas, and where their son Daniel was born. They moved back to

Scotland and lived in Bridge of Earn. After Judith and Tomas separated she met Chris, her second husband and father of Katie and Anna. The family lived first in Errol, then moved to Killin in 1999 when Chris became a GP here. Judith worked for several years in the local primary school, but as her marriage with Chris ran into difficulties she updated her nursing qualifications. She was on the verge of taking up a post based in Callander when tragically, in July 2010, her brain tumour was diagnosed.

Despite a gruelling course of radio and chemotherapy over the autumn and winter, she still managed to cheer on the Scotland rugby team at Murrayfield, and raise a significant amount of money for a new scanner for the Western General in Edinburgh. With the help of family and her many friends in Killin she moved into her flat at Ballechroisk Court in spring 2011 and relished being in the centre of the village. That summer she was well enough to be able to return to Switzerland with her three children to visit our relatives there. Her health remained good until the start of this year and, even as it declined over the summer, it was never an option for her to cancel the 50th birthday party she had been planning since the start of the year. It went ahead, with her active participation, at the Killin Hotel on a fine afternoon in mid-September. Shortly afterwards she was admitted to Strathcarron Hospice, where she received excellent care from the nursing staff and was surrounded by family and friends until she slipped peacefully away. The last two years of her life were not easy, but she maintained her good spirits, and was greatly helped – practically, emotionally and spiritually – by the kindness and attentiveness of her friends and neighbours in the village.

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
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Crossword by Scorpio
