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Editorial

The changing face of Killin

Shortly the wraps will come off the new council flats and more houses will be added to Killin. This would indicate that Killin is still growing in the face of the current recession that has closed businesses and reduced local public transport opportunities for those unable to drive.

Information circulating in the village that the Post Office is about to close permanently came like a bolt out of the blue. If that were so it would make Crianlarich our nearest post office and give us a 27 mile round trip to post a parcel. Everyone uses the Post Office and it will make the elderly and disabled even more disadvantaged.

We are informed that the Chemist Shop development is to go ahead. This will have repercussions on the local doctors' surgery and is likely reduce the number of doctors in the village as prescriptions form an important part of practice income which will be lost when the new chemist shop comes on stream. We all have concerns for our local general practice. It is an institution upon which we all rely. We expect that these and other problems they are facing are temporary and will be resolved soon, meanwhile we give them our full support and good wishes for the future.

As one shop opens it seems that another closes. We are sad to see that Swords is up for sale and can only hope that a new venture takes its place.

Having started with a wholefood café, tourist information and sales of arts and crafts, the Community Interest Company, MacGregor's Market now sells a range of vegetables, dairy and other products. It is good to see a new business bucking the trend.

The Old Mill Thrift Shop has had a good season and has been well used by locals and tourists. Thanks to the LL&T National Park the trees and bushes around the Old Mill have been cleared giving a much better view of the Mill and lades. It has again uncovered two of the arches of the Dochart Bridge allowing more of that Category A listed structure to be seen.

Rural communities can really make changes. The Birks Cinema in Aberfeldy is a shining example but it doesn't stop there. Well done all those Killin fundraisers who regularly raise money for important causes.

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Post Office

Killin was shocked to read the notice see right which appeared on the Post Office door and all sorts rumours began to fly round the village. Why was it closed? Is the closure permanent? The only agreed facts are that Killin needs its Post Office and 'something must be done' to keep it open.

Anne McGuire, our MP, has been told by Post Office officials that it has been closed due to circumstances beyond their control, that this was not a planned event and that they are actively investigating all options available in order to get the branch open again as quickly as possible. To

this end they are in discussion with potential temporary subpostmasters.

Bruce Crawford, our MSP, has issued a press statement saving he has also been in touch with the Post Office seeking an urgent update on the matter. emphasising the importance of postal services to the large rural served by Killin Post Office. Stirling Councillors Martin Farl and Alycia Hayes are also chasing up developments and are fully behind the need to keep our Post Office open. Assurances have been given that Killin is of strategic importance to the Post Office Service and it is keen to re-open ours as soon as possible and that the building's ownership would not cause problems'. Martin Earl has consulted the Access Criteria for the Post Office network which says that, in return for its package of funding, the Post Office is committed amongst other things



to, "95% of the population of every postcode district being within six miles of their nearest post office outlet".

We hope that by the time Killin News reaches you a solution will have been found and the anxiety and distress caused to everyone by the closure to everyone will be over. If not, we can at least get stamps from News First or the Library.





It has now been confirmed that, despite the feeling in the village, an appeal against the new pharmacy has failed and Davidsons plan to open on 1st March. The dispensary at the surgery will run down its stocks over the next six months and the two dispensary jobs will go. The Practice would like to thank everyone for the support they received in fighting this innovation but, having lost the appeal, they are now looking forward to establishing a good relationship with the pharmacy which can provide additional medical help to patients.

Surgery

Rumours have also been circulating for some time about changes at the Practice. Killin News has been told that Dr Holden remains off work and that Dr. Syme will be reducing his number of sessions at the practice from November prior to possible full retirement next year. Dr. Watson will be staying with the practice as will Dr Cairns, so we will not be losing a doctor. Fiona Buchanan, Practice Manager for 20 years, has left and will be greatly missed by colleagues and patients alike. A new part-time Practice Manager is being sought.





The Old Mill

The new manager has been appointed - Frances Morrison (Franny). She started work on 4th September and has been 'finding her feet' since then. The LLTNP organised two clear up days around the Old Mill on 14th August and 12th September. Everyone involved worked hard and the results can be seen. We are always looking for volunteers to help out at the Old Mill, either occasionally or more regularly. You could help in the shop, sort stock or, if you have a skill you would like to share, you could hold a class. Age doesn't matter anyone from 15yrs to 90yrs - all are welcome. Breadalbane Park Project

The Breadalbane Park Project is moving forward. The consultation was held on the new proposals on 7th September at the 'Vintage Tea Party'. The proposal is very much scaled down from the original 'Masterplan' due to the cost involved. The main priorities that have come out of the consultation are the drainage, hard standing, path network and the additional play equipment. If successful in the next stage of funding, then we should receive £130,000 from the BIG Lottery. The cost of renewing the drainage will be £80,000, which will leave only £50,000 to complete the rest of the proposal. The Breadalbane Park Group is looking at other possible funding sources.

The next stage for the consultants is

to gather all the information and put together the stage 2 application for the BIG Lottery by 4th October.

Funding Report

Breadalbane Park Community Enhancement Project is funded by Community Spaces Scotland, part of the Big Lottery Fund. Killin has been beset by drainage problems in the park with major events cancelled at the last moment. Stirling Council, Killin Community Council and many community volunteers have worked to resolve it over the last five or six years. After spending a great deal of money there has been a small improvement. Now with the aid of the Big Lottery Fund, City Design Cooperative Ltd led by Richard East are producing the final design for submission for the stage two Lottery application which, if successful, will lead to the completion of the project.

The Old Mill is funded by: Investing in Ideas, again from the Big Lottery Fund. This gives us the opportunity to identify what needs to be done to the Old Mill and how much it will cost. Sonya Linskaill, a conservation architect, won the contract for this section of the funding. The next stage is to seek funding from the Big Lottery to complete the repairs and developments that are necessary. Historic Scotland have granted up to £38,703 towards the repair of the buildina.

The Architectural Heritage Fund will be funding some elements of the professional services. Other Funders

The Play Park has funding from Stirling Council, the Community Fund, the 10K Run and many local contributors. It awaits completion of the Breadalbane Park drainage and development before changes can take place.

Brown Bins

Theresa's post, as KAT Support Worker, is funded by LEADER, LL&T National Park, Stirling Council and the Architectural Heritage Fund. Franny's post, as Mill Manager, is funded by the Christine Mary Hendrie Trust, the Stafford Trust and the Foyle Foundation.

The LL&T National Park are currently funding a feasibility study into the public toilets.

The Internet Learning in Killin Library is funded by Stirling Council. The Killin and Ardeonaig Trust acknowledge the grants offered by funders and individuals and would like to thank them unreservedly for their support. Without them we would be unable to take on any of these developments that will be of great advantage to this community, to visitors and to business in general.

We are in the process of procuring land in Callander to act as a bulking point, which will enable the economic collection of cardboard north of Callander.

We are hopeful that the procurement of the land will be concluded by late autumn (possibly sooner) so that we can commence the rural rollout of brown boxes as planned. The industrial action has added to the need for the cardboard box rollout and we are acutely aware of this and are pressing to do all we can to accommodate a rollout as soon as possible.

We are looking to put out cardboard collection points in villages to be serviced by an independent truck. These, in the short term, will probably arise as a simple wheeled bin configuration, with "Cardboard" signage, until we can get something more substantial.

Collection Points for cardboard are being set up at rural Recycling Points in the following locations:

Aberfoyle, Balfron, Balmaha, Balquhidder, Kingshouse Hotel, Brig O'Turk, Buchlyvie, Drymen, Fintry, Kippen Road, Gartmore, Killin, Old Station Car Park, Kippen, Lochearnhead, Loch Side Car Park and Strathblane. These should be in place in the near future and we'll update you with details as soon as they are available.

Two compost bins per household will be the limit for those who get compost bins.

Glenoglehead Development

A letter has been received from Anne McGuire MP. Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park are proceeding with the development and have apologised for not informing the Community Council correctly about the plans.

Pharmacy NHS Forth Valley have stated that the appeal has failed. **Potholes** No further progress on this. Councillor Hayes will report to Stirling Council.

Village Appearance The flower beds and benches have improved the overall appearance of the village but the bottom car park requires work. The Floral Society have reported that Stirling Council have not been keeping to their side of the agreement made. Councillor Hayes has received a letter outlining work that would be done, but this has not happened.

Street lights A new pole has been installed at the bottom of Manse Road, but not connected. Street lights at Ballechroisk have been on all day.

Puddle at the Wee Bakeshop There has been no progress and Councillor Hayes will pursue the matter.

Breadalbane Forum There has been no progress with Strathfillan. The cut to the bus subsidy was discussed and the possibility of establishing a Credit Union locally with support from Stirling Credit Union.

DRT is being looked at and there is a commitment to maintain this and perhaps even extend it.

BEAR were present and assured everyone that the service they provide will improve on Transerve. BEAR, Stirling Council and the police are in discussion about the recent road closure at Glenogle and signs will now be kept at Callander, rather than Stirling and the contingency plans for the school will be reviewed.

The Broadband Group is ongoing and Balquhidder are pursuing a number of options.

Overgrown trees at Stitt's yard Councillor A. Hayes will pursue this. Ambulance Depot Bruce Crawford has confirmed that we still have a Rapid Response Unit in Killin.

Traffic Speed on Lyon Road area Brian Roberts has responded and this will go into next year's budget.

Highland Games It was reported that once parking was filled in the field, there were a number of vehicles driving down towards the surgery causing traffic problems. A traffic warden was on duty and people were stationed in the field to assist but further assistance was required.

Taking Community Planning Forward is on 5th October from 10am-2.30 pm and will discuss Community Engagement and the Single Outcome Agreement. Fiona Kennedy will attend and anyone else intending to should let her know.

Youth Group The bill for the Community Bus is now settled and the Community Council have offered the group £100 for a future trip. Planning Proposal to erect a house

at Killin Highland Lodges - Charlie Grant received a copy of the proposal but no drawings have been provided. He has requested a copy and was told these were available online. He again asked for a paper copy and has received no further reply and has raised this with Councillor Hayes. Application to demolish Church Hall No comments

Waste Collection and Processing Councillor Hayes visited the site at Polmaise and was very impressed so has sent a letter to each Community Council recommending a site visit. The brown bin collection will be stopped on 20th September, but no cardboard recycling boxes have arrived in Killin. Stirling Council will provide a two-week extension to try to clear the backlog following industrial action. Free garden compost bins are on offer from Stirling Council. Stirling Council has stated that grev bins can be used until brown boxes arrive.

The opening hours at the Callander Recycling Depot were set in response to a questionnaire and a follow up questionnaire is due soon, which will be circulated widely.

Following the last Industrial Action when brown bins were not collected Stirling Council have said that posters should have been displayed. Councillor Hayes will pass on concerns

and discontent raised. **Trees on Glenogle** These were to be

Trees on Glenogle These were to be cut back. This will be passed to Kevin Campbell.

Ardeonig Road Boulders have been placed in the gateway to Harbour Lights, restricting room for passing vehicles. Stirling Councils have provided reflectors but this has restricted space even further. Councillor Hayes to pursue.

Road level The road level is lower following the re-tarring and is causing difficulty for wheelchair users and others. Stirling Council will be informed.

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Times they are a-Changin'

We are coming to the end of probably the best summer for a few years with weeks of uninterrupted sunshine. Then, once the rain came, everything threw itself into fast growth and now it is reported that there is a bumper harvest. Certainly the trees are heavy with berries and fruit and the ancient walnut tree at Dall is creaking under the weight of nuts. At the moment the pigeons are gorging themselves on elderberries. It has also recently been the season of grouse with the not very glorious twelfth going by almost unreported. There are vague reports that the numbers have been quite good over much of Scotland and Yorkshire but actual numbers are not yet given, with many estates beginning to shoot later than usual.

But we must remember that arouse management enables practical conservation of rare bird populations at minimal cost to the public and is of keynote survival for our remotest communities. With fewer numbers of keepers on the around these days, we see fewer hillsides looking like a patchwork of variously shaded tweeds due to the rotational burning of small patches of heather to produce new fresh shoots for arouse to eat amongst other varying lengths of growth for shelter. This produces a haven for many species such as snipe, dunlin, ring ouzel, black and red grouse, merlin, lapwings, golden plover, curlew and meadow pipits. Certainly grouse numbers have dropped from intensely keepered Edwardian days when, for instance, Ardkinglass estate by Loch Fyne was leased on an annual rent of £1,285 with a bag limit of 350 brace of grouse and 3 brace of blackcock. At that time a brace was worth between

£1.10 shillings and £1.15 shillings (if you are too young to understand this, ask grandad.) Today you would be very lucky to shoot three brace of arouse there. It would be much easier and cheaper to go to Marks and Spencer's as they have now added this to their food range. The other factor affecting the landscape of our hills is of course bracken. A Somerset based company are into producing biomass fuel from bracken. Apparently the carcinogenic properties of the plant disappear as it dies down in autumn and the resulting ash is high in potash so you can use that as well to keep your tomatoes happy. There is no shortage of good quality bracken this year.

Maybe this will go further with the reduction in trees due to ash die back. There are 500+ sites confirmed with some not that far from Killin. With this and oak sudden death disease and fungal infections in pine, we may yet see a biomass plant near the village using local bracken. Maybe there would be D.E.F.R.A. subsidies available? Doubtless 'the men from the ministry' would need to 'have a look.'

Hopefully it wouldn't be the man who was tagging wild boar in the Sussex /Kent border and managed to trap himself in one of his own live traps till rescued three and a half hours later. The same man was unable to operate on another occasion when he had managed to sabotage his own equipment. During that time two boar had mysteriously found their way into various freezers and their ear tags into a lurcher and a fox. This was only discovered when the ministry man went to the supermarket and parked next to the 4x4 with the lurcher in and received



a clear signal.

Maybe this ministry man should go to one of the schools taking part in a National Farmers' Union centenary grant-aided project to introduce urban children to the countryside. There are nine projects running in Scotland and if he went to the borders he could even try his hand at milking a life sized model cow. He would get a set of waterproofs and wellies which should make any future ' imprisonments' less hard to bear. Our Mr. Fox has found a new tactic. A Mr. Schofield was attacked while on the loo. He got a nasty shock as a fox poked its nose round the bathroom door, bit him (not sure where!) and grabbed the cat. Don't cry - following a tussle the cat was rescued.

Bring some hope this Christmas

Grass is a requirement of cricketers, footballers, bowlers and gardeners, albeit a commodity which must be maintained short and verdant but for livestock farmers it is a prime necessity. It's abundance or scarcity affects the well-being of livestock and the prosperity of the owners. Even with housed stock, sufficient grass in various forms, hay, silage, haylage etc., must be available. For the hill farmer grass is even more of a priority. Following the miserable summer and autumn of 2012, the quality of grazing had been far from ideal, then in late March and April 2013, following disastrous snowfalls, grazable grass was for some weeks non-existent and worse still coincided with hill lambing.

During May and June conditions improved somewhat, although pressure to reserve some fields for hay or silage resulted in overgrazing other areas. Then in July we experienced "official drought" conditions i.e., at least 17 days without measurable precipitation, which again curtailed available forage. The old adage that "When the rock heads begin to burn, the lamb begins to thrive" probably helped somewhat, and off-set the dearth of grazing.

Now in late August/early September there has been a surge of growth which hopefully will put condition on lambs and calves prior to sale and indeed continues until temperatures fall below 5°C, the threshold for grass growth, and so provide improved conditions for ewes before tupping. All in all then summer 2013 has been the most acceptable since 2006.

Looking back now over the past twenty years or so, say since 1990, those years which produced fairly long spells of "good" Summer weather were, 1995, 1996, 1997, 2003, and 2006 and now 2013. The rest were – well - "also rans"! What the law of averages decrees for future Summers remains to be seen. **Mervyn K. Browne,** Artalnaig

Strathfillan CC Meeting 9th September

Local Services Pilot Scheme: This is progressing more slowly than was hoped. There have been problems arranging contact between the possible local contractors and Stirling Council. It had been hoped that the pilot would start before the end of the current growing season, although this is now looking less likely. DRT: The sustainability of the current Strathfillan DRT service, provided by 24/7 cars is in doubt, particularly during the winter months. Bruce Crawford MSP and Cllr Martin Earl have both been involved with complex discussions involving Stirling Council and Transport Scotland. The main difficulties for Strathfillan DRT are the number of "dead miles" caused by the large geographic area & low population density; and the way in which Transport Scotland administers the BSOG Grant. The CC fully supports need for DRT in Strathfillan, and urges SC to reach a solution as soon as possible.

Community Council elections:

These are being held in November. At least 2 existing Councillors are not standing for re-election, so we urgently need to recruit more Community Councillors from across Strathfillan.

Mansefield: John Riley is in discussion with Stirling Council regarding the possibility of a bus shelter in Mansefield for school pupils, and also the ongoing maintenance of the Tyndrum playpark and kick about area.

Pharmacy: We are disappointed that the appeal against the Pharmacy Application was refused. When considering our communities experiences of lobbying successively Larbert hospital, NHS 24 and now this pharmacy, it drives home the fact that this health quango is in no way democratically accountable! Davidsons Pharmacy has made provisional arrangements with the





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Strathfillan by the

local shops so that Strathfillan prescriptions will continue to be regularly delivered to Crianlarich and Tyndrum after the new pharmacy is opened.

Transport: The bypass contract has been awarded to RJ Macleod, and will start on 23rd September for 45 weeks. The site compound will be on Glenfalloch Road, near the existing 30 mph signs. RJ Macleod will put £100 aside for every month they remain "safe and secure" and will donate this money to the community. RJ Macleod will ask Transport Scotland to match the donation.

At the BCCF meeting Alan asked BEAR for better communications from them regarding road works in the area. BEAR have purchased more tractors for snow clearing on footpaths and will hopefully make an arrangement with Stirling Council regarding assisting clearing Council footpaths as well as those on trunk roads. Grit Lorries on the Trunk roads will be bigger than those used in previous years.

Several people have complained about traffic failing to stop at the pedestrian crossing in Crianlarich. This is possibly partly because the white lines are very worn. Cameron to contact BEAR to request that the white lines are repainted.

CiA: Munro Landscape have been appointed as Consultants for the paths project. The project has been slow in getting started, due to BIG Lottery requirements, but is now underway.

There has been little progress on the LSY lease, which is currently with the Stirling Council legal team, but Joyce will chase it up again. Isla will soon be submitting a change of use planning application for LSY.

Crianlarich toilets refurbishment is making good progress. Recently the exterior has been painted, and exterior stonework repaired. The car park area has been cleared and the vegetation tidied. New informative signage for the building has been ordered along with replacement Gents and Ladies signs.

Fire Service: It is 5 months since Strathfillan CC raised concerns about local Fire Service arrangements. The Crew now have protective kit available in both stations (Crianlarich and Tyndrum). If neither station is able to raise a crew of at least 4 people, crew members from both stations will travel to the station nearest the incident, using their own vehicles. This combined crew system has not been tested for real yet. Recruitment for both stations is progressing, with one possible candidate for Tyndrum and three possible candidates for Crianlarich.

The Crianlarich Hall Committee are inviting everybody to join them for a good old fashioned barn dance featuring Killin's own Tarmachan on Saturday 26th October from 8pm in the Crianlarich village hall. Community Council Elections

Community Council elections are coming soon with more than 400 seats up for grabs in 43 community councils across the Stirling Council area.

A healthy local democracy needs robust, active community councils who are not afraid to speak up for their

neighbourhoods. The more effective they are, the greater the difference they make to community life.

Anyone over the age of sixteen can be nominated for the community council elections so long as they are living in the area for which they are standing and on the current Electoral Register.

Alternative proof of residency is required for those under the age of seventeen and not able to be on the Register. Election nomination forms need to be submitted to Stirling Council's Returning Officer by 4.00pm on Friday, 25th October 2013.

Where more nominations are received than there are places on any community council, ballots will be by postal vote. Ballot papers will be issued from Monday 4th November 2013 and must be returned to the Council by Friday 22nd November at 5.00pm after which results will be announced.

Bowel Screening Programme

We would like to encourage and improve the number of people taking part in the 2 yearly national screening programme which invites all men and women between the ages of 50-74 (over 74 yr olds can phone to request a test from the number below) to complete and send in their screening kit. The programme starts at aged 50 as your risk of developing bowel cancer rises from that age. It is important to take part because bowel cancer is Scotland's third most common cancer with often no symptoms in the early stages. If found early there is a more than 90% chance of successful treatment. Home screening prevents 150 deaths from bowel cancer every year but the screening programme only works if people take part in it. We recently have had at least one local patient whose unknown bowel cancer was detected by the screening process and is doing well. The test screens for blood in your bowel motion (poo). This can also be caused by problems other than cancer but it is important to find out the cause. There is no need to be embarrassed as you do the test yourself in the privacy of your own home and clear instructions come with the screening kit. We know it can be a bit awkward to do but it is important to complete the test. Also please come and see us in the surgery if you have any of the following symptoms: Repeated bleeding from your bottom/or blood in your poo A change in your bowel motion pattern lasting over 6 weeks. Severe pain in your stomach that won't go away especially after eating Unexplained weight loss Looking pale/feeling tired If you have any concerns or want advice, even about reducing your risk of bowel cancer, you can either make an appointment to see the practice nurse at the surgery or ring in confidence the Bowel screening Service 0800 0121833

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Killin Heritage Societv

At the present time the Society has no permanent home in which to display its collection of artefacts and make other archival material accessible to the public. However, the Society continues to add to its collection by accepting donations of photographs, documents and smaller items, specific to the Killin area. A recent donation is a copy of the book "Skisters – The Story of Scottish Skiing" by Myrtle Simpson, in which Killin and Beinn Ghlas feature prominently. This has been gifted to the Society by folks who have fond memories from their time spent in Killin, working on the "Scheme" in the 1950s. Peter Edwards and Gwyn Saunders often laugh about the times they struggled on skis up Beinn Ghlas, usually in appalling weather! Following a conversation recently in Moirlanich Longhouse, copies of letters and photographs are to be sent to the Society by descendants of a MacNab family which left Killin for Australia in the 1830s. Such items help to build up a picture of life in Killin very different from the present day.

Over the winter, members of the Society intend to complete the transcription of gravestones in the old cemetery and bring up to date transcriptions for the new cemetery. The plan is then to publish these in a booklet which will be available to the many family historians, local and otherwise, whose ancestors are buried in Killin.

The Society begins its 2013/14 programme on Thursday 17th October and welcomes new members and visitors to these talks. Meetings are held in the Lesser McLaren Hall, unless stated otherwise, and begin at 7.30p.m.

Between 1992 and 1995 I worked in a team who were looking into future technologies, including fridges that reminded you to order supplies, self service bank tills, self service checkouts at supermarkets and wearable technology. Most of these technologies are now commonplace and soon the wearable technology will be available. The leading technology companies, Apple, Google and Samsung to name a few, have all announced plans to release watches that connect to your smartphone.

I expect that these devices will be released in time for Christmas, and will also, I assume, be linked to the launch of specific models of smartphones. Typically these "watches" are connected to the smartphone via Bluetooth and allow you to interact with your phone, whilst it is still in your pocket. Would you believe that these watches also display the time! If you are looking to buy one of these devices, please discuss your choice with the supplier, to ensure that it is compatible with your phone.

Protecting your information

MacGregor's Market

The café has now been open for a few months and is ticking over well. There are two full-time and two parttime paid members of staff, five paid suppliers and several volunteers involved in the venture.

We aim to provide foods that are not generally available in other outlets in the village. All our dishes are homemade and, where possible, use local ingredients. Our Quiche and Scotch Eggs, are made almost entirely from local produce (with the exception of things like flour and butter) using vegetables grown organically in local gardens, eggs and pork from local free range hens and pigs. Our soup, bread, rolls and foccacia are all made to order by a local resident. You won't find a white sliced loaf - no need with the "Wee Bakeshop" and the Co-op selling these; but if you want a sour-dough, gluten free or spelt and rye loaf, we have these most davs.

Sales of crafts are steady; anyone who is interested in displaying /selling their wares is welcome to bring items in. Likewise, if you have a poster or flier you need displayed, feel free to hand it in.

At last we have managed to open the fruit and vegetable shop. It's not complete yet, but it seemed sensible to open in part rather than wait to finish all the works. Finding the time, energy and money to get the shop ready has not been easy so I hope you'll bear with us as we put the finishing touches in place. In the first instance, we're simply buying in stock from a few places, to get things going. The next move is to try and source things closer to home but for the time being, we're trying to complement what already exists locally and to price competitively. Much of our stock is cheaper than supermarket prices. Feel free to come and have a look. If you would like anything specific to be stocked, let us know. The next step is to source delicatessen items, fair-trade products and whole-foods. So, if you have a gluten free diet or are vegan or have to avoid dairy products, let us know anything you'd like to have available on a regular basis. At present we order on Tuesdays for delivery on Fridays, so bear that in mind! Anyone with surpluses of fruit and

weg is welcome to bring them in and we'll try and sell them for you! Likewise, if you are a jam or picklemaking enthusiast, bring some in. By law you'd have to register the premises you use for production as a food establishment with the Council, but it's not a complicated procedure. The cafe space is available to use in the evenings, whether for a social evening, a chess club or a scout meeting. Likewise we have a small office space, should you need to have a private meeting, or need a fully equipped office to do some work. Please just ask in the shop or cafe. We can provide weekly veg boxes if you'd like the simplicity of having foods delivered to your door. Likewise, if you want to come in and choose foods but can't carry them home, we'll deliver them for you. We're also compiling a wholesale price list for fruit and vegetables; if interested just pop in to the shop or email us. We're open to ideas for the shop, cafe or outdoor space.

A new archaeological trail on the lower slopes of the National Trust for Scotland's Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve reveals the landscape's hidden story. Like many hillsides across Scotland, the Kiltyrie slopes of Ben Lawers are now almost completely unpopulated and are mainly used for grazing. This was not always the case - the area was once well-populated by families making their living through farming on the Laird's land. Ben Lawers is scattered with the archaeological evidence including homes, agricultural enclosures and travel routes which tell us how people lived centuries ago on this hillside,.

The Trust has now created the Kiltyrie Hidden History Trail which is a self-guided walk around some of these features. Walkers follow a

wav-marked trail mapped in a leaflet to discover a series of archaeological features on the hillside. The walk highlights the evidence of settlement in the 18th and 19th centuries and how the population and approach to land distribution changed over this period. It is a story very typical of the Central Highlands in particular, but it applies to much of the rest of Scotland too, with similar remains to be found in numerous glens.

At first glance, it might appear that there is nothing remarkable about this spot at Kiltyrie as much of the archaeological evidence is now

covered in vegetation and could be mistaken for a pile of stones, but it actually tells us a great deal about the social and cultural history of this area. We hope that the new trail enables visitors to find out more about the heritage of Ben Lawers, but also that it encourages

them to look afresh at the landscapes around them and see what symbols of the past they can spot there. Kiltyrie Hidden History Trail is located approximately 6 miles east of Killin, below Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve. The site is free to visit and the walk takes around one hour to complete across rough and sometimes boggy terrain. Stout footwear is strongly recommended. **Helen Cole**

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Ben Lawers Water Voles Bounce Back

This season's monitoring has brought the welcome news that the water vole population at Ben Lawers has returned to a typical size of 22 individuals after reaching an all-time low of 9 in 2012. This mammal is an important indicator of healthy riparian habitats but has suffered severe declines across the UK since the 1980s. Upland areas such as Ben Lawers may provide a valuable refuge for the species since the peaty soil is very suitable for burrowing into and they are avoided by animal's main predator, the introduced American mink. Although water voles are particularly secretive and rarely seen it is possible to monitor them by searching for their burrows and feeding signs along the edges of slow flowing streams. Their numbers can also be estimated by counting the number of latrines present at each site.

Opportunities for Young People

Tackling the issue of youth employment in rural areas is at the heart of an exciting new project being developed by Loch Lomond & The Trossachs Community Partnership. Tourism and hospitality, land-based industries and local food production will be the prime focus for a new Skills Partnership in the Park. The aim of the scheme will be to retain young people within the National Park and support local businesses to invest in local talent. The National Park has an ageing population and our existing Apprentice Support Project in the construction sector was the Community Partnership's first step in

Community Partnership's first step in trying to tackle that trend, providing support to eighteen small businesses and twenty apprentices over the last 4 years. Working together to identify local solutions – both for businesses and for young people is crucial. The Skills Partnership will be working with a range of partners, including key training providers, the National Park Authority and local businesses to tackle any barriers to rural skills development and training opportunities. Ultimately, we want to give young people a reason to stay.

Park Businesses

"Robots and other Gadgets – Precision Farming Today and Tomorrow" Dr Christina Umstätter

Dr Christina Umstätter is an animal scientist with a particular interest in the use of modern technology in livestock farming. Christina is based at the SRUC at Kirkton. The focus of her talk will be the use of technology in agriculture and how it might develop in the future. "Introduction to Particle Physics: Present, Past & Future" Stephen Rawlinson (MPhys)

Within the last year the media interest in particle physics has reached new highs with the discovery of the Higgs Boson at the Large Hadron Collider. But what is particle physics and how does it affect us? Is it really worth spending billions of pounds on vast experiments to make a handful of new physical discoveries? To answer these questions fully we will start by looking at the very beginnings of this relatively young science and will look further at the structure of all matter as we know it through to cosmology and the universe we live in.

Wednesday 19th March 2014

"The Environment of the Forth Estuary" Donald McLusky (Formerly of the Department of Biological and Molecular Science, University of Stirling) The Forth estuary stretches from Stirling to Queensferry. Over several centuries it has been subject to exploitation and degradation. Approximately 50% of the intertidal area has been removed for a variety of purposes and at the same time the population and industries have discharged their waste into the estuary. Despite this (or because of it?) the Forth estuary has remained as a productive natural environment supporting large numbers of birds and fish. In recent years substantial efforts have been made to reverse the centuries of decline and the Forth estuary is now cleaner than it has been for over a century.

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Community Pride Fund

The Community Pride Fund 2013-14 is now open for applications for Stirling 2014.

Funds will be available from the Community Pride Fund during the financial years 2013/14 and 2014/15. All grants must be spent in full by end December 2014. Applications will close in November 2014, with decisions for this final round being made by early December 2014. This will still enable communities to deliver their project and spend the grant award before the end of December 2014. Only the Community Pride Fund is available for Stirling 2014 projects (Community Grants Scheme is not available). Therefore if a community group which is not incorporated has an idea for a 2014 project, they must work with their Community Council or Community Development Trust to develop the project and the application. The application must be submitted by the Community Council or Community Development Trust. Applications should show how they celebrate a different 2014 theme. Themes

Communities may wish to organise more than one event during 2014. Recognising the importance of 2014, more than one application per community will be accepted, if Community Pride funds allow, provided each application celebrates a different 2014 theme or event.

However, we do want to ensure that all Stirling's communities have the opportunity to benefit from the funding. Thus, if 2 or more applications from the one community arrive early in the process, they may at that stage be asked to prioritise, with the subsequent applications being considered later in the process as funds allow.

Community Pride Fund will of course continue to support 'regular' applications - not all the funding will be allocated to Stirling 2014. As with any Community Pride funded project, any Stirling 2014 projects that communities are developing must be fully inclusive and aimed at all sectors of the community, without political or religious bias.

Multiple communities may wish to work in partnership to deliver one larger project. Applications for funding will be considered from each of the communities working together (from the Community Council or Development Trust), provided they are seeking funding for a distinct, local element of the project, can demonstrate the local benefit and have realistically costed out their own element of the project.

All applications will be considered on their own merits and taking into consideration the availability of funds, and, where external funding is also required, what progress has

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Book Review

Island Wife by Judy Fairbairns

This is an autobiography by Judy Fairbairns who, at the age of nineteen, marries a man ten years her senior and settles on the isle of Mull. When they first arrive on the island they have no money and live in a large old house without any modern conveniences, often cold, damp and miserable. Her husband turns out to be a workaholic who can turn his hand to anything and make a success of it. After some years as a farmer he ends up setting up whalewatching trips on Mull which becomes a lucrative business. In the years that follow Judy organises the family (they have five children), looks after sheep, horses, dogs, runs a guesthouse and does numerous other tasks. Life is really hard for her and she gets very little support from her husband. This leads to increasing levels of frustration and unhappiness, culminating in a nervous breakdown and Judy leaving the family and the island. It takes several months before she gets the energy back to face life on Mull again and even longer for the family to settle back to normal life.

I enjoyed this book because it is not so much a story about the hardships



experienced by family members but mainly an intensely personal account by a woman surviving emotional turmoil, misunderstandings and loneliness over a period of three decades. It is very well written. You can just imagine all the upsets she describes in the book. I'm sure most women will recognise some aspects in their own lives and for that reason it will probably appeal especially to them. On August 25th 2013 Judy Fairbairns appeared at the Bridge of Lochay Hotel in front of an audience of the combined book clubs in Killin to discuss this book, which had just been published. She talked openly about all her trials and tribulations in the book and most of the audience were very surprised to see her husband there as well! After so many negative comments about him in the book it was brave of him to appear, especially because the audience was all female! It did prove, though, how the couple have overcome many of their difficulties and their communication has improved

Both of them stayed on until well after Judy's talk and enjoyed a glass of wine with the audience. It was altogether a very enjoyable evening. Judy's book is highly recommended!
