How else can they make decisions that take local opinion into account?

#### Volunteers Needed

Sadly, not enough people volunteered to stand for the Community Council at the recent elections in October so we no longer have this level of local government to represent Killin and Ardeonaig.

#### What does this mean?

There will be no opportunity for a community view of planning applications to be made. Stirling Council, National Park and many other organisations will have no body to consult with on plans or decisions which may impact on our community.

There will be no insurance or organisation of the Christmas Tree. Killin loses its direct connections with Stirling Council Officers and it will be more difficult to know who to contact about matters of concern. Consultations on licensing applications, roadworks, road closures etc will no longer have a forum for discussion within the community.

Yes, there is a second opportunity to elect a Community Council in February/March 2014. A minimum of six people is needed to form the Council with the full complement being twelve. If more than twelve people submit nominations, a postal ballot will be held.

The Community Council will then serve for just under four years until October 2017.

Like us all, Killin Councillor Alvcia Hayes is concerned about the lack of progress on the Post Office and feels that the matter is urgent and needs to be resolved as quickly as possible. The Post Office has informed her that they cannot go into the reasons for the unexpected temporary closure although these are outwith the Post Office's control. They appreciate we are keen to see a permanent solution and they are also committed to this. Meantime a temporary solution is that a mobile post office is providing some service for customers. They will keep us informed of any developments.

A mobile Post Office is visiting Killin McLaren Hall carpark on Tuesday from 3.30 to 5.30 pm and on Wednesdays from 4.30 to 5.30 pm.

#### **KAT Report**

The Project Development Support Worker and the Mill Manager have both added a more professional approach to the management of our projects. Their reports leave me with less to cover here

#### Space Audit

In line with the Killin Action Plan Theresa will conduct a study into what facilities are available for residents and visitors to Killin. This will include private establishments open to visitors and will help the Trust identify what additional facilities are needed for community activities. If your establishment comes into that category you may be contacted.

#### The Public Toilets:

You may be aware that KAT is seeking an answer to the problem of public toilet closure and does not have the annual income of £8,500 required for each toilet block. You may also be aware that Stirling Council stated that they intend to close both public toilets. The Trust received a grant from the Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park to look into the problem and identify how it could be solved. It has been agreed that we can obtain help for a

feasibility study to look into a wide range of aspects of the problem, of having or not having a public toilet, from the effect on the environment, the community, businesses, visitors, health, and so on. Any amount left over from the £10,000 grant will go towards some aspect of toilet provision. If the exercise identifies a feasible way to provide a cost neutral public toilet, then it could be a reference document for other small rural communities. The study will seek your opinions. If you wish to have a copy of the background information please email or contact the Killin News. If you have the answer please let us know. The Killin and Ardeonaig Community Development Trust Directors are very appreciative of all the wonderful support given to the Trust projects by the community and by the many visitors who come here regularly. #### **Project Support Worker's Report** Breadalbane Park

The group has applied for BIG Lottery Community Spaces Stage 2 Funding and we should know the outcome early 2014. The cost of the Park Project has been spread over 3 phases and the application to the BIG Lottery is for phase 1.

#### Phase 1

This phase will include the sorting of the drainage by renewing all the old pipework around the Park. This should make it usable all year round. Hard standing is also being put in at the entrance of the park and by the round house. There will be a path network to allow Landrover size vehicles to have access around the Park to the hard standing at the round house. Larger vehicles will only be allowed to use the hard standing near the entrance area. This is the best way to protect the new drainage system. up to a good standard. Sonya has developed a plan to renew the heating and lighting and put toilets into the building. She is also looking at the possibility of putting in a lift and the feasibility of using biomass for the heating system.

#### The Changing Year

It's turned cold at last. Time for this year's young to be prepared. One of my sons was watching a young eagle happily flying over the hill when it was set upon by an ambush of hoody crows. Suddenly the parent eagle appeared and, with a few whooshes of wings, the crows were seen off.

Another stay at home is the blackcock. Some of the places you may be lucky enough to see some are in Glen Lyon, between Aberfeldy and Dunkeld and on the Trinafour road to the A9. The latter is having a lot of pylon work done at the moment and a couple of go-ahead blackcock have been seen utilising the controversial Beauly to Denny line as a handy perch.

In a recent study by The Game Conservancy of Berwyn Moor in North Wales it was found that black grouse numbers had declined by 78% between '83 and '02, red grouse by 54%, lapwing become extinct, curlew declined by 79% and golden plover went from 10 birds to 1. The only remaining black grouse population in Wales lives on one keepered area of the moor. While some have left for sunnier climes, some, like us, have to stay put. At least some have a watchful parent still keeping an eye out. Help is hopefully on the way for Scottish wildcats. S.N.H. have heritage lottery money to raise awareness and neuter feral cats to stop further inbreeding. Start panicking Killin moggies – the plan includes Tayside! The Scottish Wildcat Association would prefer money to be spent on captive breeding.

Maybe the wildcat will not be pleased that the idea of reintroducing wolves and bears has again reared its ugly head. Paul Lister wants to erect an electric fence round 50,000 acres at Alladale Estate in Sutherland for them. That may seem a lot but is a wee back vard compared to the areas that they have in the success stories of Yellowstone etc. Mr. Lister says that the introductions would control deer which, presumably, would be fenced in as well as a captive food source. This would seem to emulate a safari park but will the wolves and bears be able to fill in all the required paperwork on deer returns? A spokesperson for The Ramblers' Association says that they are not against wolves and bears but access must be a priority. They may well start to ramble a bit quicker that's for sure.

Maybe there could be an introduction on the island of Canna to control the

estimated 16,000 rabbits - so that's where they all are! All except one which was hopping along Killin Main Street one evening recently. It carried on up into the Tigh-na so maybe it's on holiday. The population explosion occurred after a £600,000 publicly funded cull of brown rats on the island and since then they've just bred like well, rabbits. There are some rabbits around Brae Lodge, Ardeonaig, but they may have to go 'canny' as a large family of weasels is also around. At least for a time they were thought to be living under some of the decking and popping out to play 'king of the castle."

So where has Mr. Fox been? He may be getting a little above his station or maybe it's just the excitement about the royal christening but he has killed two of the iconic ravens in The Tower of London. Now the birds are to have upgraded cages and exercise area to be kept safe at night while still flying free in the day. So the tradition of at least six ravens to protect the tower and the monarchy since the time of Charles II's time will continue. But I have it on good authority that Mr. Tod McFox will not be in the New Year's honours list. **Tim Frost**

## THE OLD KILLIN CEMETERY



The Old Cemetery, which is behind the Killin Hotel, is closed for burials, but members of the public can walk round and read inscriptions, some of which date back to the sixteenth century.

As Lodge Secretary, I have received some enquiries from overseas relatives, who have Masonic connections with Killin and who have family interred in the old graveyard. Most of these are seeking to confirm the connection with Killin and dates etc for creating or filling gaps in family trees.

Photographs are sometimes asked for and it has been difficult to get suitable clear pictures.

This prompted an enquiry to Stirling Land Services to see if some tidying up could be carried out to allow safer access. An exchange of letters and a meeting with Barbara Docherty resulted in the Lodge being given permission, under strict conditions, to carry out work to remove self-seeded saplings and other scrub and clear matted grass to create paths between the lines of gravestones.

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Great care will be taken to carry out this project respecting the memory of those interred and ensuring no stones are damaged.

A risk assessment was carried out and agreed with regular reports to be given on progress and any difficulties encountered. The work has no time span and the more difficult aspects will be carried out when members with the knowledge and skill required are available. Once the trimming and clearing has been done, the condition of the gravestones can be assessed, as any work on these requires specialist care. There are many which require little if any work more than a soft brush to remove moss and similar growth, but some have fallen and others are difficult to read through weathering.

The Lodge Members are all committed to this project working and along with Stirling Land Services, hope eventually to make access safer and allow visitors to look round this historic cemetery. As progress is made the Lodge will keep the grass cut thus ensuring there will not be a return to overgrown stones and making sure the cemetery is always kept tidy. **Alex Stewart** 

#### Footnote

A couple of years ago Killin Heritage Society members and other volunteers spent a lot of time in the Old Cemetery recording readable inscriptions on the gravestones. These records and some photographs, together with the information already collected by Arnold Young when he was Registrar, are stored on the Killin Heritage computer. The work was not fully completed and was due to be finished this winter. The Chairman of Killin Heritage Society, Gillean Ford, is away as we go to press but we are sure that on her return she will be happy to deal with any enquiries.

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#### Strathfillan Community Council Waste Removal

David Hopper, Waste Service Manager, Stirling Council, apologised for the problems that have beset waste management recently. Things had gone wrong very quickly since industrial action started and SC has the right amount of resources to collect waste with very little spare capacity. The work-to-rule meant only about 65% of the waste could be collected so it was decided that not collecting brown bin waste would cause the least upset. There would be one more brown bin collection during November.

Cardboard is still collected from brown bins in this area. SC need to put the infrastructure in place before they can issue and collect brown boxes in this area; the idea is to have a bulking facility in Callander and this will happen sooner rather than later. Cardboard will then be picked up by recycling truck every Tuesday.

#### **Police report**

There have been twenty one calls for Police attendance in Strathfillan area since the last CC meeting: Disturbance 4; Mountain Rescue 3; Road related and RTC 7; Theft 2; Animals 4.

There were about 6 break-ins in Lochearnhead/Balguhidder area and it is suspected that a group travelling through are to blame, probably linked to a series of housebreak-ins in Balfron for which 2 people are in custody. Operation Ironworks has now finished for the year during which there were very few incidents which may be due to the Loch Lubnaig car parks being closed. Fuel was stolen from the Green Welly Stop, but a speedy response and diligent Police work in circulating the details resulted in a person being caught and brought to Court.

#### **DRT Sustainability**

David Brown, SC, has suggested a possible hybrid system, which would include a DRT service in Killin and Strathfillan and provide a timetable system between Crianlarich and Killin and vice versa. The detail has to be worked out but could be operational by the spring.

#### Primary School Bus Shelter in Tyndrum

SC has agreed to install a conventional bus shelter next to the play park in Mansefield which was installed in October.

#### Maintenance of Mansefield Play Area

The roundabout has been installed. A programme of maintenance and improvement work has been agreed, and will be implemented between now and Spring 2014.

## Relationship with BEAR & Road Closures

There had not been the same notification of roadworks etc since BEAR took over from TranServ. A recent closure at 9pm between Crianlarich and Killin occurred at short notice and led to great frustration for locals from both villages. This was disappointing and we hope that in future the excellent relationship which had evolved with TranServ can be realised with BEAR and that trunk roads in this tourist area will not be closed before 10pm.

#### Repairs to Crianlarich Station Platform

Unfortunately, this work will have to

be carried out between 10pm and 6am due to the intransigence of First Rail and this will inconvenience several houses next to the line. Contractors have yet to be appointed but work should commence from October until early New Year but is weather dependant.

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## Unknown Killin

Killin News has been given a copy of a paper on "Unknown Killin" given by Allan Cameron Walker (1894-1975, father of Allan Walker, co-founder of Killin News, and his brother Cameron) to the local branch of An Communn Gaidhealch probably in the 1920's. In it he mentions places 'unknown' at that time, many of which are not immediately identifiable today. If anyone has clues to their whereabouts do please let us know. What follows is Part 1 of 3. Bear in mind that this was written in the 1920s.

It is a regrettable but true fact that here in Killin, a place literally steeped in tradition and legend, very few of the present generation take any interest in many tales and places which really should be the source of much pleasure to them. This may be in a large measure due to the apparently never ceasing and deplorable decay of the Gaelic language and the consequently ever lessening numbers of those able and willing to translate old tales, but may also be caused by the materialistic outlook on affairs which is at present the predominant feature of our national and local life. The days have long gone when the wandering tradesmen occupied the seat of honour by our firesides on the long winter nights telling their tales of Ossian, Cuchullin, and Fingal, and meanwhile we pay homage to the man with the fat pocket book and the woman with the stylish costume, irrespective of what their heads and hearts may, or may not, contain. This paper will not recount any stirring tales of Black Duncan of the Cowl, Francie Mhor Mac-an-Aba but will draw attention to some little known places of interest in the district.

As far as the village itself is concerned, most buildings with a tale attached to them have in modern



times disappeared, but in the Abvrach, that old buttressed place, roofed with Ben Lawers slate, we have a building wherein many a decent Highland man in the far days when the Breadalbanes were Hereditary Sheriffs of Perthshire, spent his last night on earth, ere crossing the Larig in the morning to be hung on the 'Kind Gallows o' Crieff'. All that maybe for no greater crime than the lifting of a cattle beast or the dirking of some inquisitive stranger who had wandered in from the South!

The splendid sycamore tree at the Parish Church which is held to be older than the Church itself is said to contain within its trunk the chains and iron collar with which minor offenders, in the eighteenth century, such as gossips were fixed up on Market Days to be the objects of scorn and derision. It would be a pity to spoil the tree, but they might, with advantage to our present-day community, be brought into use again!


Tradition also holds that the Killin Hotel and the Episcopalian Church are built on land really the property of the Church of Scotland, and that the Hotel Garden and Washing Green form part of the Glebe which once stretched from Dundarroch right along the river bank to where the now covered-in burn which occasionally bursts through in the School Playground and in front of the Institute ran into the Lochay ere the Railway embankment was constructed. If this be true, and it is peculiar that the Hotel should stand between the Church and the Churchyard, those householders now paying annual tribute to Lord Breadalbane for the privilege of having a boat on the Lochay, should really be paying it to the Minister of the Parish!

Just across the Lochay from the Hotel, in the field commonly known as the Show Park, the Great Montrose camped with his army during his brilliant campaign of 1644. In that year also, he burned Killin from end to end, and laid waste all Breadalbane.

It was here too, that Dorothy Wordsworth saw growing the finest oats of her lifetime. Save for local volunteers, the field was unoccupied by a military force from the days of Montrose down to the visit of the Scots Greys in 1907.

#### Computer



My first word of warning when considering giving a gift of a computer/phone/tablet or similar devices is to check what the person actually wants or needs. It will be a complete waste of your money if you buy nephew Johnnie a Samsung S4, when all of his technology suits an iPhone. The S4 will be up for sale on eBay before New Year.

Also, be careful what you get for your money – for instance, most entry level devices have limited power, or will be out of date on Boxing Day. Certainly if you are buying for a child at Primary School, then their needs will not be as much as those for the teenagers.

If you are buying for someone who is technically aware, then you really have to check with them as to what levels of power/disc space/memory and other functionality is required, otherwise you are in danger of buying them a device that is less powerful than their existing one. Then eBay will beckon once again. Nowadays the trend is to move to hand held devices, i.e. Smart Phones or Tablets, and only the dinosaurs amongst us (me included) carry a laptop computer.

It is just as important to select the correct device as it is the correct operating system – with iOS for iPhones, Android for other phones/tablets, and Windows for laptops/ultrabooks and some tablets. The main reason is that the person receiving the gift is likely to have made previous investments in "apps" or software or hardware which are only compatible with a specific operating system.

Please remember that the value of all technology devices will depreciate faster than your brand new sports car, and will be out of date by February. So don't be upset if young Fiona is looking at new phones at Easter wondering if she can trade in her ancient 3 month old device for the new iPhone12

When it comes to Smart Phones there are many excellent devices, with Samsung and Apple leading the way. However, Android is the most common operating system as it is used on many hardware platforms. A word of warning though. Many of the latest features are no good for us as we do not have the mobile network infrastructure to support "4G" broadband mobile internet – we are lucky if we even get "3G" speeds.



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Thus take care not to buy a device that has features that just will not work in our area.

I believe that the Market Leader for Tablet operating systems is Android, but there are some reports that Apple iOS is still a contender. What is clear is Microsoft Windows has a lot of catching up to do. Traditional Computers/laptops are becoming less commonplace in the market. It is very difficult to find a 17" laptop suitable for my needs, for instance. Our new Sunday Lunch Group has proved popular and on 29th Ardtalnaig



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
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#### st Perthshire U3A

## Tree-mendous transformation of Kiltyrie

Young people from Killin were out planting trees on 9<sup>th</sup> November in the latest stage of a project intended to restore native broadleaf trees on the lower slopes of the National Trust for Scotland's Ben Lawers. Members of the conservation charity's Green Team – a young naturalist's group for local children to take part in a series of nature and conservation-related activities – planted individually protected oak trees at Kiltyrie, about 6 miles east of Killin. Generously funded by the Edinburgh-based Small Group Tour Operator Rabbie's, this is the latest development in a programme of habitat improvements which has been underway for several years.

This latest donation from Rabbies means the Green Team can carry on with the reintroduction of native broadleaf trees to this farmed landscape. This is important for the

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biodiversity of the area and also enhances the environment for visitors who are coming to enjoy our recently installed archaeological trail too. Members of Rabbie's staff have volunteered previously at this site to build protective deer fencing and plant trees around a small pond. The company, which runs tours to some of Scotland's best-loved beauty spots, has well-established environmental credentials and is keen to 'give something back' to Scotland's heritage and to the communities and places that help make their tours so successful. Ben Lawers is widely known for its outstanding range and diversity of arctic-alpine species and vegetation types. It is important for the very large number of nationally rare or scarce montane plant species that it supports, including vascular plants, lichens and bryophytes. It also has an outstanding diversity of invertebrates with many nationally rare or notable species.

#### 20's Plenty



Margaret was born in Glasgow and following a very brief spell at Duke Street Hospital, quickly found herself in the countryside with her parents Donald and Martha. Margaret's father was a shepherd and his working life resulted in the family moving around Perthshire from Dollar to Little Glen Shee, thereafter to Langside (between Braco and Comrie) and finally to Harperstone, Sherrifmuir, where Donald completed his working life before he retired to Dunblane with Martha. Margaret enjoyed watching and helping her father at work and the challenges outdoor life provided. Her brother Calum appeared on the scene during their time at Langside in September 1953, after she sadly lost her

vounger sister Sheena to meningitis in March 1950. Margaret attended Braco Primary school, and completed her schooling at Crieff. She left school and commenced work as a nurse, thereafter changing career path to enjoy hotel work, becoming Head Housemaid at Dunkeld Country House (now the Hilton Dunkeld). Margaret didn't have any hobbies as such, but did enjoy baking, walking and reading – and particularly enjoyed the New Year get together at Auchlyne Farm!

Margaret was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis ten years ago and life became more difficult for both her and George and they fully appreciated and valued the support nearby friends provided. By the time George retired, Margaret's condition had deteriorated and a purpose built house was provided by Stirling Rural Housing at Ballechroisk, Killin. Being in the village provided access to much needed support and, although Margaret was obviously in discomfort, she always had a cheery smile for everyone and adopted the attitude that there was 'always someone worse off than her'. Being granny to Jamie also provided a welcome distraction. Although her body had started to fail, Margaret's mind was always as sharp as a tack and she particularly enjoyed the banter with the carers and friends. Margaret was much loved and will be missed by family and friends.

Mary Reid was born in Aberdeenshire in 1923 and was brought up around the villages of Ovne and Old Ravne, Mary walked over two miles to the local school where she excelled and regularly come first in most subjects. In 1937 at the age 14 she left school and took up employment with the Clark Fish Merchant family at their home in Manchester. She stayed there for four years then returned to Aberdeen with the Clark family. By this time she had acquired an English accent, much to the annovance of her father.

The war was now underway and when Mary was working in the kitchen of the Aberdeen house, an armed trawler in the harbour, whilst loading coal, accidently fired its large deck oun. The shell entered the house through the front door, went up the hallway, ricocheted off the kitchen wall and exited out through the back wall injuring a neighbour. Luckily Mary was unhurt. It was around this time that she first met her future husband John, who was serving in the Royal Navy. Mary then volunteered for the WRNS and spent most of the war years stationed at the Roval Naval base at Scapa Flow. Mary and John married in 1946 and for a time lived in Cardiff where John worked at the Steelworks. Duncan was born in Cardiff but because of poor housing at that time they moved back to Scotland where John got a house and a job at the Fettercairn Distillery. Mary's other two sons Roger and Randy were born in Fettercairn.

In 1954 John left the Distillery and stared working on the Lawers Hydro Electric Scheme at Killin. When that was complete the family moved into a Hydro House at Ballechroisk. With the family growing up Mary started work at the Co-op butchers and became a dab hand at making Co-op

Bangers. She worked there with Colin and Ginge Campbell, Jimmy Taylor and Jim Callan, until her retirement. Mary and John bought GlenGarry House on Main Street and, after a lot of hard work carrying out renovations, they moved there in 1970. 

Have you ever watched young babies trying to walk? They tend to walk on tiptoes as they are carefully supported by a loving parent. Yet before the year is out their feet firmly connect them to the earth. In the *Carmina Gadelica* I came across this verse:

This night is the eve of the great Nativity Born is the Son of Mary the Virgin The soles of his feet have reached the earth, The Son of glory down from on high ...

What a lovely way to express the coming of Jesus - saying that the soles of his feet have reached the earth. He truly came and dwelt among us. The next verse begins with praise

The peace of earth to Him, the joy of heaven to Him, Behold His feet have reached the world ...

As a youngster he worshipped with his family and the local community - as one of our hymns reminds us



we all seem thoroughly to enjoy together so what better recommendation could you ask for. A family catastrophe leaves Jacob Jankowski homeless, penniless, and numb just before taking his final veterinarian exams. In desperation, he literally grabs the first opportunity that comes along-a slow-moving circus train. His expertise with animals is quickly apparent to Marlena, the top performer and also to Uncle Al, the relentless opportunist and owner of the show. Marlena's sadistic husband, August, resents Jacob's intrusion into his circus menagerie and his violence ignites the plot.

When Uncle Al buys Rosie the elephant, both Jacob and Marlena fall in love with her, even as they try not to fall in love with each other. But Rosie turns out to be "stupid," seemingly unable to live up to the promise of a headlining elephant act. However, when Jacob discovers her secret, everything changes and the story stampedes to a shocking climax.

The narrative swings easily between the past and present - between the naïve 23-year-old Jacob in the circus and the crotchety old widower he becomes in his 90's. He now lives in a nursing home, alone with his guilt and memories all locked up. When a little circus sets up nearby, Jacob hobbles out to see it and his memory of his time with the circus comes flooding back.

I was very quickly drawn into this book and found it difficult to put down as it had the right level of suspense to have you wanting more. Jayne Kerr
