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Editorial

It is good to relax and enjoy the episodes of fine weather, see the influx of visitors and hope that the remainder of the season will boost local businesses. You will have seen or heard about LIVEPARK. planning for the future of our National Park. If you haven't, take a moment and look at a copy in the Killin Library. It is a consultation about the Park Plans for the next five years "where new homes should go and where new businesses will be supported". The Park is a big place and Killin a small sliver sitting at the edge of both the Park and Stirling Council. Killin needs space to develop as well as attract tourism. Killin's heritage was in retail, industry and hospitality. Hospitality has been retained but four of the five mills and other industrial remnants, "economic opportunities", have been changed to other uses. So it is good to see that this term comes up in the plan and it is an opportunity for the community to make its comment. One opportunity described is for development around the Station Road Depot and on the area south of it for business to "address visitors' needs via parking. toilets, information and signage". It is with sadness we learn that PFK Performance Centre has to move to Callander as it could find no opportunity to expand to meet local needs here in Killin. Is Park planning inadvertently driving business out of the countryside? The major opportunity listed for the future is around the approved biomass plant at Acharn. It has been identified, Site MIR 80, as a Rural Activity Area. 'If you go down to the woods today' you may find a site suitable for industrial development about three kilometers from the centre of Killin. This Plan is a draft only but it needs you to make comments to help the planners, who probably don't live here, make the final version. Perhaps, as mentioned by Martin Earl and reported in the Killin Community Council Minutes, a business forum for Killin would be better placed to identify and defend business opportunities in Killin. Attempts in the past to create such a forum have been unsuccessful but perhaps the time has come to try again.

It is with great sadness that we hear of the death of Dr Ankie De Laat who worked in Killin from 2001 as a general practitioner until her retirement in ----. She was a much-loved doctor who always had time for her patients and supported them assiduously when they were ill. She allowed patients with major on-going problems to disturb her, out of hours, rather than leave it to paramedics or others on call. She will be fondly remembered.

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Killin Medical Practice Update

In the move to improve services to patients, more changes are being made at Killin Medical Practice and some of these will already have begun in May.

Dr. Watson is continuing as normal and Dr. Syme will now be working four sessions a week instead of two. Locum doctors will fill in to make up the rest of the time of the now twodoctor practice. Where possible these will be doctors who have been before although, due to a shortage of locums, this is not always possible. A salaried doctor has been advertised for with a closing date of 30th May and it is hoped that he or she will be in place by September/October. The prescription service is changing to providing medication for a two month period instead of the current one month and this will mean patients need order only every two months. A 48 hour period will still be needed before collection at either Davidsons or News First.

Training of staff is progressing well

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and Practice Nurse Jamie Anderson is taking on child immunisations. She and Health Assistants Alice and Marie will all be undertaking INR testing. Alice and Marie will soon be taking blood samples but patients will be reassured to know that they will not be let loose to do so without training and initial supervision.

New dedicated Health Care Assistant clinics for taking height, weight, blood pressure, urinalysis, phlebotomy and INR testing are being set up at flexible times to suit patients' availability where possible. Annual reviews for chronic diseases will in future be covered in two stages – in the first instance baseline checks by the Practice Nurse or a Health Care Assistant followed by a GP visit a week later. For more efficiency, patients with more than one chronic complaint will be checked for them all at the same visit. ... The Practice website –

www.killinmedicalpractice.scot.nhs.uk - has been updated and provides such things as health advice on injections for travellers. Suggestions of what else to include would be welcome.

KMP is discussing with community councils to find ways in which services could be improved under current constraints and still plans to set up a Patient Focus Group to help solve any problems and suggest improvements. Some interest has been shown in this but the involvement of more people would be welcome.

And finally – if anyone is interested in acquiring an aquarium, please contact the Surgery which has decided to get rid of theirs. **MM**

Recent changes to welfare benefits, the continuing recession, rising fuel bills, mounting debt and stagnant wages have all contributed to an increase in local people seeking advice. Stirling District CAB'S SKINT team are fully trained citizen's advice advisers, specialising in financial advice. Working in partnership with Macgregor's Cafe we aim to bring practical help and advice on a range of issues to the Killin area.

The partnership will be hosting a fortnightly drop-in service commencing 12th June between 10.30 and 2pm. Stirling Citizens Advice will be available for all types of advice and will also offer a variety of other services including information sessions on topical subjects (e.g. help with fuel bills over the winter).

One-to-one advice on how to manage your finances, along with practical help to shop around for better deals, check



there are any specific gluten/dairy-free foodstuffs you would like us to stock. Within the next few weeks we should have a few new ranges on offer; more deli products, more chilled and frozen stock, a wider range of cheeses, fish, salads and cold meats. Dolan is also working on an online shopping system, which means we can then offer delivery, which might be of interest to older and less mobile residents. Our customer loyalty card is to be rolled out next month.

We can take orders by telephone or email and deliver to your door. We have a wholesale price list, if your business needs regular supplies of any

any benefit entitlement and deal with debt will be available, as will help to access bank accounts, if required. Stirling Council and Stirling Rural Housing Association will also be available to answer local peoples' questions on housing options and allocation advice.

Access to Housing Options advice will be available alongside the CAB money, benefits, debt, financial capacity and general information/advice sessions at the following places:

Callander Library every second Wednesday 9.30-12 noon, 11th June 25th June, 9th July

All advice is free and confidential and will be delivered by advisers from Stirling CAB, Stirling Council Homelessness Team and Rural Stirling Housing Association (depending on the type of enquiry and your individual preference). particular foodstuffs.

The Post Office will hopefully be taking up space with us soon; we didn't particularly want to take it on but in the absence of anywhere else, we've agreed. We're a non-profit-making organisation, so the fact that it doesn't provide a good income is not so vital; it will provide some part time work. We're quite proud of what we've achieved; a group of local people have built up two small interconnected businesses, without any government hand-outs. 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There can be few people in the Killin area who have not been in the McLaren Hall at some time Since 1936 it has been the venue for dances, films, badminton, dramas, carpet bowls, coffee mornings, public meetings and many other events. It is the largest village hall in the area and very much the centre of activities. In emergencies, such as the landslide, it is the place where people would probably congregate to co-ordinate action and it is a place we have come to take for granted. Archibald MacLaren, retired farmer of Dall Lodge, Killin, died in 1933 and left £9,000 for the establishment of a town hall for the benefit of the inhabitants of Killin. £7,000 was to be spent on the site and construction of "The McLaren Town Hall" and the remaining £2,000 went into the MacLaren Endowment fund to be administered by a specially set up Trust. The initial Trust and constitution were formed in 1936 after construction of the Hall was completed and a constitution was agreed. The five to eight Trustees and their successors would "hold the McLaren Hall in all time coming for the benefit of the inhabitants of Killin and the surrounding district to be used solely as a public hall" for all lawful public meetings. The Hall was to be administered by a Management Committee consisting of the Trustees and representatives elected by the members of frequent users. The present Committee consists of six Trustees, Dr. Syme (Chairman) John Sinclair, Willie Stitt, Chris McLarty, Jane Anderson and Kenny Lang. The representatives of frequent users are Sue Hughes (Heritage), Charlie Grant Carpet Bowls), Tam Bolton (Drama) K. Riddell, Badminton and a member of the SWRI. The Secretary is Yvonne Gillies and the Treasurer and Booking Organiser is Fiona Stewart. This committee is responsible for working together to run the Hall and solve all its problems.

The McLaren Hall

The Hall is now an old building and maintenance is increasingly necessary and increasingly expensive. Income comes from the Hall, the Car Park, the Chip Van, a few donations and some old investments which cannot be cashed. As more and more smaller venues are available in the village, the number of regular users has dropped but use by weddings has increased. In recent years there have been problems with heating - now improved but still expensive to run - and with the house attached to the Hall, which was flooded out in a bad winter and has had problems with the roof. Solving the house problems is taking time and money. Insurance did not cover all the costs and there has simply not been enough money to get the work done as quickly as necessary. However some Trustees and local tradesmen have been working there on a voluntary or deferred payment basis in whatever time they can spare in an effort to finish the work and it is hoped that this will be finished this summer. This should allow the house to be let to bring in more income

Cleaning has always been a problem with users required to clean up after using the Hall and sometimes having to clean up before using it or when it isn't clear who is responsible. Problems with the heating, the kitchen, having to move furniture and equipment have frequently been mentioned, as have problems with making bookings and the Committee is aware of all these.

So what is the future for the Hall? It needs to solve the existing problems and to modernise. Nowadays IT equipment is part of almost any public meeting but all the equipment has to be carried into the Hall so it needs a screen and facilities for a computer simply to be plugged in. Marketing the venue could bring in more weddings. A website would show availability and make booking



on-line immediate, saving a lot of phone calls. And it still needs to be maintained. Most of the problems could be solved with more money, so fundraising events are planned for later in the year.

The Hall is a great asset to the village and a worthy local cause to be supported. It is hoped that the village will rally round in its usual generous way to enable the Hall not only to keep going but also improve what it can offer to the village.

Killin Community Council May Meetin

Meetings: It was agreed that the Community Council meeting would continue at bimonthly intervals.

Speeding Traffic in Lyon Road: No progress has been made. Fiona Kennedy to pursue and copy Martin Earl into the correspondence.

Coach Park: Stirling Council has yet to adopt the coach park and there has been no further correspondence regarding this; once adopted "no parking" can be enforced for the proposed period of 8am to 6pm.

Station Road turning circle and car park: Bear Scotland had been creating problems for buses parking and turning. They have moved the gritting lorries for the summer but they will return in the winter. Bear Scotland will be asked to ensure their staff are not parking in disabled bays

without a disabled permit. Three of the Councillors inspected the area and took photographs following concerns about fly-tipping and an article would be put in the Killin News. Stirling Council is aware there is a problem and has been asked to try for access to Bear's CCTV. The problem of fly-tipping goes beyond Killin but the lack of facilities within Killin had exacerbated them here. Brown bins for cardboard have now been removed but outlying rural areas have still not received brown or food boxes. Large pieces of cardboard that do not fit in the brown box will be uplifted if left beside the box. Brown bin collections will stop each year on 1st November and resume on 1st March.

Recycling: The restricted opening hours at the Callander site were discussed, in particular the lack of daytime opening. Martin Earl will contact Stirling Council to re-visit the opening times and proposing some weekday, daytime opening. He will also find out when the brown box roll-out will be completed.

Road Naming: Main Street does not extend as far as the former Youth

Hostel site, and several names had been mentioned. The Community Council has responded that it is locally referred to as Lochay Road. *

Stirling Council Grant:

The Community Council has received funding of £180 for a Minutes Secretary and £419.21 for administrative costs.

Dog Mess: There has been an increasing amount of dog mess on the streets and also in fields. A second article would be submitted to the Killin News to highlight the issue. A visit by the dog warden to the school and a deep clean of the streets would be arranged. A project by the children at Killin Primary School will be suggested to highlight the problem. The dog warden could also visit the school.

Support for Local Businesses: The question of available support for local business from either Stirling Council or LLTNP was raised. Martin Earl suggested that the Killin Business Community should get together and contact Councillor Neil Benny regarding establishing a Business Development District and what support this would offer.

Park Development Plan: The LLTNP's development plan is to be reviewed. The current local plan and the structure plans covering the Park's area will be updated and replaced by one Local Development Plan. A consultation with the community will be arranged for an afternoon and evening in early June. Development opportunities can be raised and included in the plan. The plan states that 'recent housing development appears to have helped meet housing need and demand for the immediate term' but this was disputed in the meeting where a lack of affordable family homes was identified.

The plan also states that 'A key opportunity exists around the Station

This overall site could accommodate a range of uses and could help address visitors' needs via parking, toilets, information and signage'. However a recent approach by a local business to develop this site, including new and managed public toilets was rejected by Stirling Council. Where an unauthorised development has been reported to the LLTNP, their representatives do have a legal right to go on to land to investigate. However they should, as a matter of courtesy, introduce themselves and ask for permission.

Bridge of Lochay: New signage is required to ensure drivers are aware that this is a narrow bridge, only suitable for single file traffic.

Speed Restrictions: A countdown to the current 30mph speed restriction as traffic enters Killin is being pursued. An extension of the 30mph zone to beyond the golf course is unlikely as it is not a trunk road but it would be possible to extend the 40mph zone.

Notice board: The notice board outside the McLaren Hall belongs to the McLaren Hall and is in urgent need of repair. The Community Council has paid for this previously. T. Frost to contact the McLaren Hall Committee.

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Calling All Dog Owners

Student Travel: An assessment is to be made of the number of students accessing courses at Forth Valley College or in Glasgow or Edinburgh and travelling from the Killin area by public transport and any difficulties they experience.



Parents taking their children to the Primary and Nursery schools and disabled people with wheel chairs have complained about the increasing amount of dog dirt on our streets and paths caused by inconsiderate dog owners. Fouling in our streets and play areas by dogs with worms can cause blindness in our children and, if ingested by pregnant livestock, can cause the animal to abort. All dog owners are urged to clean up after their pets. Poop bags can be obtained from Kay at the library - and

when you have used them, please don't leave them hanging on the trees and bushes!

The Community Council have asked the Stirling Council dog warden could make regular patrols in Killin. The Dog Fouling (Scotland) Act 2003 makes it an offence not clean up after your dog in any public open space, which is subject to a fixed penalty fine of £40.00 or a report to the Procurator Fiscal resulting in a fine of up to £500.00. It is an additional offence for the dog owner to refuse to provide his or her name and address, subject to a fine of up to £500.00. Please take pride in Killin and the surrounding area and if you see anyone who walks away after their dog has done its business please say politely, "you have left something behind" and ask them to clean up their mess.

Flytipping

Since April we have had to ask Stirling Council on two occasions to come and clear the recycling area at Station Road due to fly tipping and people being too lazy to empty bags of cans, bottles, and paper into the proper bins, also cans, etc., being placed in the cardboard bins. Even an aluminium beer keg was dumped and this was not done by anglers.

We are currently working with Stirling Council to see how we can help and we ask for your help in identifying those responsible or we will lose these facilities. It is a true saying that the minority spoil it for the majority. It costs the taxpayer £11 million a year to clear up rubbish left around the countryside by fly tippers - 73% of which is dumped by householders.

If you witness any fly tipping please report it to any community councillor, Stirling Council or the local Police Station. Fines range from £80.00 to £4,000.00 (even imprisonment in some cases). **Fiona Kennedy** KCC

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Breadalbane Park


is nearly complete and the final report is currently being prepared. A summary will be included in the next edition of Killin News and posted on our website.

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
Strathfillan Community Council

Many complaints have been received about the lack of white lines at the pedestrian crossing in Crianlarich, which is now becoming very dangerous. A request to have these repainted urgently has been made to BEAR. BEAR has also been asked to investigate whether a zebra crossing is the most appropriate type of crossing for this location.

The CiA have received £1000 from the Scotrail Foundation towards the purchase of picnic benches for Lower Station Yard (along with the £400 recently donated by RJ Macleod). Three recycled plastic picnic benches have now been ordered and should be in place very soon. A community pride application is being submitted to purchase signage and an additional round tree bench for the site.

Arrangements are being made to purchase bedding plants for the tubs in Crianlarich & Tyndrum and to have these planted and looked after for the coming summer.

Gold Medal

This wee gold medal was handed into Crianlarich Store, from a visiting goldpanner. It was found in the Crom-Allt burn in Tyndrum, just above Brodies shop. The inscription

reads: "Ben Nevis Auction Mart Fort William, Group of 4 Shearling Rams, 1st Prize Awarded to J. Stewart Esq. of Crianlarich, 9th September 1898" The medal is hallmarked 9-carat gold and, although in excellent condition, seems to be missing a small ring from the top. Suggestions are that it would have been worn hanging perhaps from a watch chain, belt or lapel. The finder wanted the medal to be returned to its rightful owners. By asking various local customers and with a little bit of online research, we quickly established that it was likely to have belonged to one



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llan by the Way

Joseph Stewart (1826-1916), parttime proprieter of the Crianlarich Hotel and part-time farmer. Joseph seems to have had numerous additional business interests, including the Royal Hotel in Tyndrum, the Luib Hotel and possibly Suie Lodge Hotel. After the death of his secpmd wife in 1901, Joseph retired to Tyndrum where he lived until his death at the age of 90 (which may explain why the medal was found in a Tyndrum burn).

Within just a couple of hours of the medal being handed to us, it was suggested that Linzi Frost (nee Stewart) of Glenfalloch and her Dad, Jimmy Stewart of Killin, might be descendants of Joseph Stewart. We were delighted to pass the medal on to Linzi, for safekeeping within the family. At the time of writing, Linzi and Jimmy (who was brought up in the Luib hotel) are trying to work out their exact linkage to Joseph. We know that Joseph had 2 sons -Robert and Allister - and also nephews who at one time lived with him at the Crianlarich hotel. If anybody has any further information, then Linzi and Jimmy would be happy to hear from vou!

Isla Craig Crianlarich Store Jim, the postie from Tvndrum and Crianlarich, has completed thirty years of service with Royal Mail. Verv unusually, all thirty years of his service have been on the same Crianlarich & Tvndrum deliverv route, always working out of Crianlarich delivery office. 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Frost Report

A Spring in Your Step

At the moment we are all enjoying the change in the weather with spring having well sprung. At home it's lovely to see the return of the house martins and waiting for them to start building their nests again and some swallows seem interested in setting up home in one of my sheds. While out at The Courtvard car park it was the sand martins who were entertaining us as they began to nest in the cracks between the stonework of the little ruin there. I can recommend this relaxing birdwatching activity, especially if accompanied by one of the excellent ice creams. I have spotted a lone swift - swifts are hardly ever seen around here now. I can remember regularly seeing a good number at Boreland 20 or so years ago. The cuckoo hasn't been so much in evidence this year either but, as they migrate to the Congo or even Angola in our winter and return via Algeria, you can't tell what dangers they face there. This migration is as evidenced by Chris who is a tracked cuckoo. But I suppose that this is good news for little birds such as warblers, buntings etc.


Another bird enjoying an increase in numbers is the merlin. According to British Trust for Ornithology data, 78% of areas of increase were on heather moorland keepered for grouse.

On the whole it has been a good spring, certainly the best lambing weather for some time - and certainly better than last year's dreadful season. Lambs at Kilchoan were not having such a good time as the picture which many of you will have seen in The Oban Times evidenced. Whether it's been photoshopped isn't known but in it a sea eagle is flying off into the pale blue yonder with a lamb in its talons. Whether the photo is real or not, the increase in sea eagle numbers is impacting on some rural livelihoods. We must also remember that, even if it may be only a dead lamb being taken, this is the golden eagle's dinner he's pinching.

Another once-rare animal which, according to RSPB, needs control is the pine marten on Mull. It is claimed that they are not indigenous to Mull and so can be controlled. Oddly they have been introduced to other areas where red squirrel populations, not to mention hens, are threatened. My son (and grandson) in Glen Falloch have given up on hens since a pine marten boldly wanders around in daytime eating from the bird table. Another young squirrel-loving grandson is threatening to write to the government about looking into review of pine marten protection.

Maybe introducing lynx which regularly eat pine martens and badgers may solve some problems? This is being proposed by The Lynx Trust who are applying for a licence to reintroduce two pairs to the west coast. They would be free but tagged so that they could be sedated if they strayed. Let's hope they would be controlled as wolves in Provence have had to be. Over 6,000 sheep deaths due to wolves is double the number of five years ago. Wolves have been protected there since 1979.

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Computer



Heart Bleed Virus

One of my biggest worries was realised when in April, a significant (some say worst ever) virus was identified. This is called the Heart Bleed virus and it affects supposedly secure websites. Without going into technical details, it puts a large percentage of internet users in danger of having personal or financial details compromised. This includes passwords used for many secure websites.

If you shop online or use internet banking or have any account with an online service provider, you should check with them to see if their websites were infected with this virus.

I cannot state how devastating this virus could be and I urge you to change passwords for all accounts that are affected and to keep an eye on your bank accounts to ensure no unauthorised transactions have taken place.

Solid State Drives

I have recently installed a Solid State Drive (SSD) into one of my laptop computers. An SSD is a disc which has no moving components and is extremely fast compared to traditional hard discs. The improvement in speed is significant, for instance the time it takes from turning my computer on until the Windows desktop fully loads is approximately 10 seconds. If it is configured correctly, applications can use the Solid State drive whilst running - this, once again, speeds up the computer's performance. However the price of an SSD is significantly more than traditional hard discs. An SSD "should" last longer than a traditional disc, as there are no moving parts, but the technology used means if there is a problem with the SSD then it is likely that all information stored on it will be lost for ever. (With a traditional disc often some or all of the data can be recovered unless the damage to the disc is significant.) I would suggest using at least 2 drives, one SSD and one traditional disc - but please ensure you backup all your data. Saying that, there is a Hybrid drive that is a mixture of traditional disc and SSD. This is ideal for use in a laptop, especially if your laptop only has the capability of supporting one drive. Retirement

As I do not want to spend my time learning about smart phones and tablets and as the industry is moving away from traditional computing towards these new devices, I have decided to take early retirement. This means that it is unlikely that I will be able to provide support for your computers and I will usually refer you to support companies in Stirling or Perth. I thank everyone for their business over the past few years and I now look forward to being a user and not a fixer of technology.

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The seasons move inexorably onwards. Despite this spring being somewhat haphazard, with the few settled spells short-lived, trees, shrubs and flowers have taken advantage of equable temperatures at times there being little difference in day and night values - which has resulted in the burgeoning of greenery on trees and shrubs and blossoming of flowers occur virtually overnight. Due no doubt to a wet, mild winter and early spring, quality of bloom has been, and is, exceptional with daffodils, rhododendrons, primroses, cuckoo flowers and many others excelling. Obversely, however, in the high places - over 3,000 feet - snow clings on stubbornly, no doubt pleasing those who wish to indulge in summer skiing! The saving is that fog in March (which occurred this year) means frost in May, but so far no frost this month. But there is still time!

And More

As weather wise there have not been any out of the ordinary events, perhaps a few more Gaelic place name derivations might be in order.

The name Ardtalnaig seems somewhat obscure. Dr. Gillies in his 'In Famed Breadalbane' puts forward various somewhat tenuous suggestions as to its origin. More recently someone suggested that the many trial excavations in the search for Gold, Silver and Copper, resulted in the name Ardtollonaig – place of little holes, which sounds feasible. An old Donegal man, something of a Gaelic Scholar, on being gueried as to the meaning of Ardtalnaig replied without hesitation "the dewy height", possibly a distortion of the word dealt (dew). This area is "back lying" so even in high summer the sun does not top the hills to the east until comparatively late, also frost or dew remain un-evaporated.

Tomnadashan – the knoll of the ledge - is the site of a former copper mine. Kindrochit (Ceann Drochaid) Bridgend, the farm just to the west of Ardtalnaig, is in fact erroneous as it is correctly Deich Sgilling – ten Shilling land (Scots), a measure of land and some distance from Bridgend.


Public Speaking

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
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Book Review Sycamore Row by John Grisham



In our book group we each take turns to nominate a book for the group to read and discuss; sometimes leading to very diverse opinions. Sycamore Row was one of those that we all liked but some of our opinions about the plot and characters were divided. It is a sequel to A Time to Kill and both feature as their main character a lawyer called Jake Brigance. In Sycamore Row he takes on the defence of a will written by a man named Seth Hubbard. Seth was a wealthy man dying of lung cancer who trusted no one. Before hanging himself from a sycamore tree, Hubbard left a new will dragging his adult children, his black maid, and Jake into a riveting and dramatic conflict. This will, which Seth has asked Jake to defend, raises far more questions than it answers. Suspicions are raised about why Hubbard would leave nearly all his fortune to his black maid, Lettie Lang. The biggest question for the reader is "What does

question for the reader is "What does it all have to do with a piece of land once known as Sycamore Row?" Reasons to read this book are the interesting portraval of legal proceedings, the colourful characters and their personalities (including the despicable Simeon Lang - Lettie's husband - not to mention the suspense around what Ancil (Seth's younger brother) has to add to the background and history that might explain why Seth left this second will. This is only revealed in the last few chapters making Sycamore Row a bit of a page turner!

If you enjoy a thriller with a difference read Sycamore Row.

Park Grants for traditional buildings

Funding to help repair and restore traditional buildings in Loch Lomond & The Trossachs is available thanks to the National Park Authority. The built heritage repair grant scheme offers support for buildings in the Park that pre-date 1919. Now in its second year, it has been widened to include buildings that are visible from the West Highland Way and National Cycle Route 7, as well as main routes through towns and villages. In last year's pilot scheme nine traditional buildings across the Park benefiting from the grant. Work ranged from the replacement of louvred windows with double-glazed timber sash and case windows, lime pointing and the rebuilding of a dangerous stone chimney, to new traditional-style signage and repairs to a mill lade, a timber building and sash and case windows. The successful projects were in Kilmun, Gartmore, Callander, Killin, Glen Dochart, Tarbet and Balguhidder and included six listed buildings.

The grants are available to help with the external repair of traditional buildings and include:

- *Repairs to traditional windows and doors
- *Re-roofing in traditional materials *Repair or renewal of lead work and
- cast iron guttering
- *Chimney repairs or rebuilding of demolished chimneys
- *Repairs to stonework and render *Repointing in lime of entire buildings or the main or entire elevation
- *Repair of traditional stone boundaries, walls, railings, gates and gate piers
- *Traditional signage (commercial buildings)
- *Shopfront restoration/improvements
- *Decoration, if associated with other works eligible for grant
- *Reinstatement of architectural features e.g. decorative bargeboards, finials, railings, traditional dormers
- *Replacement of non-traditional materials e.g. UPVC windows with timber

Grants are available for up to 50% of the eligible works, to a maximum of \pm 5,000. Funds are, however, limited. Most people look forward to the arrival of warmer weather, but it is important to think about how to enjoy the summer safely. Summer can bring a number of alments - from sunburn to insect bites and stings. We have a range of remedies available that call help relieve your symptoms. SUNBURN

- Most people love the feel of the sun on their skin but too much sun can lead to sunburn, which is extremely painful.
 Excess exposure to the sun increases your risk of developing skin cancer, and if you have skin that burns rather than tans, pair skin, or work outside, you are more at risk. Babies and young children are especially vulnerable because of their delicate skins.
 If you do develop sunburn, take a cool shower, and apply an aftersun cream, a simple moisturiser, or calamine cream to the
- affected areas. Stay out of the sun until your skin is completely better
- Drink plenty of water to replace the fluid lost through sweating and to cool down. Don't drink alcohol because it will dehydrate you furthe
- If your sunburn is severe and your skin is blistered, see your pharmacist or doctor.

BITES AND STINGS

You can be bitten by a variety of insects, including midges, mosquitoes, horseflies, wasps, bees and ants. Some people react more badly to bites and stings than others. The area of the bite may swell and appear red, or be itchy or painful. Redness or swelling usually clears quickly, but some people are very sensitive to stings and can develop a severe allergic reaction. If you have a very severe reaction – difficulty in breathing, dizziness, vomiting, or swelling of the face – seek medical attention immediately. All Davidsons Chemist branches are able to administer emergency medicine in such an event.

Treatment:

- Wash the area with soap and water and apply an antiseptic cream.
- Do not scratch insect bites, as this may increase the risk of infection.

- A wide range of sprays, creams and lotions can be used to help ease a bite or sting. Painkillers, such as paracetamol or ibuprofen, can also be used to reduce the pain. If you have a bad reaction to an insect bite, ask your pharmacist for tablets containing an antihistamine.

Try using an insect repellent to protect yourself from insect bites, especially when sitting outside on summer evenings. Look for repellents containing DEET.



HOLIDAY HEALTH

Whether you are going away abroad or locally, make sure your child's childhood vaccinations are up to date. Check with your local community pharmacist for any vaccinations you may need before you go abroad on holiday. Ensure you take a first aid kit, including anti-diarrhoea tablets and fluid replacement powders for upset stomachs. Also make sure you have enough sunscreen for you and your family.



HAYFEVER

Hay fever is a common allergy that occurs between the early spring and autumn. Usual symptoms are:

- a blocked or runny nose
- red, itchy and watery eyes
- Tetrequent sneeping
- tching of the root of the mouth
- Wloss of smell and taste

Wild Fish Review

The review of the present management of Wild Fish Species, announced at the opening of the River Tay Salmon season is well underway and the group is due to report to the government minister in September. All aspects of the present way fish stocks are managed, along with views on how the future management structure may develop, are being aired at meetings across Scotland. Many riparian owners are concerned about the problems in present fishing access and the need to reshape the future control and management of this natural resource. Considerable changes are possible and it is up to concerned groups and individuals to make their views known and try to influence the future legislation to get rid of much of the present complicated system. Angling for all species needs a management system which is acceptable to custodians and localised management who have an understanding of what is required to conserve and protect, and the legal power to make it work. In addition the website publishes monthly updates on progress and insight into what issues are relevant to individual rivers and where there are common concerns. Angling Clubs, all organisations and

Angling Clubs, all organisations and individuals who have concerns about the future of wild fish are encouraged to make use of the website to make their views known.

The outcome of this review is likely to form future policy leading to a new Green Paper for debate on how the future of our wild fish species will be managed and the process funded.

Obituary Jane Kirk Stewart 28 July 1926 - 20 April 2014

Jane was born in Chrvston, Lanarkshire and was the youngest of five children. On leaving school she went to Coatbridge College for secretarial studies and initially worked in a factor's office in Renfield Street in Glasgow. She then moved to the Brickworks in Bridgeton as a secretary and pay clerk. She married Ian in 1950 and they lived in Riddrie, Glasgow, where in the late fifties she purchased an outfitters shop which also sold wool, etc. She and Ian moved to Bishopbriggs in 1966 and sadly Ian died nine months later in 1967. After Ian's death, her sister Bunty moved in with her. In 1975 Jane purchased 7 Grey Street, Killin and they both decided to take early retirement. They moved there in January 1976 and did Bed and Breakfast until 1984. By this time they were taking a very active part in village life. They held office in the WRI, the Guild, the Bowling Club and the Art Group. Jane was a talented allrounder. She knitted, crocheted, embroidered, painted and did tapestries. She was well known for the toys she made and always had a

wonderful display at the Art Show. She was also a great baker and her caramel and pineapple cakes were to die for. After Bunty died in 1997, Jane thought that she should downsize and in 2001 she moved to Dochart Road where she spent her last remaining years surrounded by excellent neighbours.

After a fall in February she went for two weeks respite to Aberfeldy Cottage Hospital where she spent five weeks before being moved to Ninewells where she was found to have underlying health problems which led to her passing on Easter Sunday.

She was a wonderful aunt to all her nieces and nephews and their children. She was dearly loved and will be sadly missed. Thank you to the nursing staff in Aberfeldy Cottage Hospital and Ninewells for their care. Special thanks to the late Dr de Laat and the nursing staff in Killin for the exceptional care and attention she received from them over the last five years.

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The 'hop on, hop off' Ring of Breadalbane Explorer bus service recommences on 1st June, running every Tuesday, Wednesday, and Sunday until 19th October 2014 and extending its timetable to include Saturdays during July and August. The Explorer service takes passengers through the stunning highland scenery of Breadalbane, passing through beautiful towns and villages and stopping at key visitor attractions along the route. The service is also highly popular with local residents having a day out or as a public transport service. The Breadalbane area is actively promoted by the Breadalbane Tourism Co-operative who developed the Ring of Breadalbane Explorer service and have won a Visit Scotland Scottish Thistle Award for their innovative approach to opening up the area to visitors. The service connects Crieff, Comrie, St Fillans, Lochearnhead, Killin, Kenmore, Acharn and Aberfeldy on a circular route, providing easy access to the area's top tourist attractions including the Birks Cinema, Auchingarrich Wildlife Centre, Dewar's World of Whisky, the Scottish Crannog Centre and Highland Safaris. Running both clockwise and anticlockwise four-times daily to a scheduled timetable, the bus offers visitors and residents the means to have a perfect day out in Breadalbane, accommodating space buggies and well behaved dogs at no

extra cost. With their 8-bike trailers

and passing by many popular walk locations, the Explorer buses open up the area to linear walks and cycle routes which otherwise can only be undertaken using two cars. A hop-on, hop-off adult day pass costs £10, (under 16s £5). Under 6s travel free. Single tickets, return tickets and 10-journey tickets are available and Scottish concession passes are valid.

The 2014 Explorer service is funded by Transport Scotland Bus Investment Fund, Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park, Perth & Kinross Council, Tayside and Central Scotland Transport Partnership (tactran) and the Breadalbane Tourism Co-operative. 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Thínk about ít

The all pervasive media (no criticism intended) in our lives, especially the internet social media, means an instant and widespread adoption of any new idea, fad or fashion. The latest is the now universal use of the word 'iconic.' An ikon, from the Greek, is an image, until recently mostly a religious image depicting, for example, the face of Christ, his Mother Mary, or one of the early disciples and fathers of the Christian church.

More recent 'iconic images' I have seen or heard described as such, are, a bottle of Coca Cola, a torn American flag, the Red Road multistory flats in Glasgow that were to be blown up to start the Commonwealth Games, E=MC², the human genome, plus any number of pop-sportsmen/women, and so it goes on.

The original 'icon', the religious image, often inlaid with gold, would usually have taken hundreds of hours to produce, every detail prayed over and meditated on because it represented a deeply held expression of faith and belief in God. Words do frequently change their meaning, for example the word 'marriage' is undergoing a fundamental change from what it meant only a few years ago. My only concern about such changes is that the original meaning was often an expression of something that really mattered to those who used it and so what they hold most dear may thereby be devalued, even if only as they see it.

That's a problem we have to live with. What I wonder though, is whether we are wandering ever closer to the place where nothing much matters at all as long as 'it works for me.' I believe that it is so important that we, both individually and as a community, make fundamental decisions about what really matters to us and live our lives in the light of those decisions, no matter the cost.

As I look around me at this springtime of the year, I cannot but believe that our *given world* is a gift of our creator, however we see that 'iconic image' (God I mean). I also believe it is living with the truth of that 'given' that matters most for each one of us, and for all of us together.
