#### **Editorial**

Japanese Knotweed in the Killin, Glen Lochav and Glen Dochart areas, close to the village, is targeted by the Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park. Localised areas of Japanese Knotweed have been identified and treated over the past three years and shown a marked reduction in growth. These will be reviewed vearly for three or four more years as unconfirmed observations indicate that existing rhizomes can live for up to 20 years. Disturbing the site can lead to an increase in growth. If you see or believe you have Japanese Knotweed growing near you and live in the Killin area, please notify Stirling Council as it decided to treat invasive species following the Priority Based Budgeting exercise last year. The knotweed growing in the Turning Circle site made an initial response to treatment after two years. This will be checked again for two or three more years before it can be considered clear.

Superfast Highspeed Broadband is on its way. 216,000 businesses and homes have already been connected at a speed of 80Mbps. Remote hard-to-reach regions are being given a priority. A check on the Scotland Superfast Facebook site indicates that it is coming soon to Killin, the stage before orders can be submitted and orders are already being accepted in parts of Callander. You too could have High Speed Broadband shortly... Openreach vehicles have been seen in the area making the preparations for installation.

"Community benefit" is a financial benefit given to local communities by organisations involved in renewable energy activities. This also includes communities close to a landfill site. For example some of the landfill tax can be paid to local community groups. Similar conditions apply to onshore wind farms and hydro generation schemes. Unfortunately this area was exploited by the North of Scotland Hydro-Electric Board in the fifties, well before the concept of community benefit was introduced, as demonstrated by the dams, power stations, overhead lines and halfempty river beds. The lack of untapped burns and the absence of windfarms in the National Park leaves this community without recourse to benefits of that sort. Now few can remember what Killin was like before the Hydro came.

## Flying By

In 2011, at a time when libraries were being closed, a small book sculpture of a tree growing out of a book appeared in the Scottish Poetry Library with a little note supporting the importance of books and libraries. Subsequently other sculptures, all with similar notes, appeared in other libraries and museums. Among them were a book shaped into a travel chest, containing wings and a miniature book, and another as a birdhouse with nest containing three eggs, suggesting perhaps flights of fancy and the dawning of knowledge which books can inspire. Fifty paper flowers were also left around the Edinburgh Book Festival.

Beautifully and intricately made, all the pieces aroused a lot of interest and speculation about who made them. She is still unknown but a BBC interview held by e.mail revealed she was a woman. She said she made items to suit places she loves and did it anonymously as she wanted people to concentrate on the message rather than the maker. However she did accept commissions and made one for an auction to raise money for Macmillan Cancer Support. This is called Butterflies and was bought by the Mackenzie family. Colin Mackenzie said he didn't see the point of buying something so

interesting and just keeping it in a glass case so he is taking it on tour around Scotland. It has already been to the BBC in Glasgow and will be going to Stromness on Orkney, Aberdeen and Abbotsford and other places yet to be arranged. However Colin has Killin connections and has arranged for Butterflies to be on display in Killin library from the beginning of May until at least the 18th, coinciding from 8th-18th with the Stirling Off the Page Book Festival. This gives everyone here an opportunity to see something very unusual without having to travel very far.

Turning Circle: Sitrling Council would need to meet with the community to decide a parking strategy - if the land is no longer required for parking it could potentially be sold.

Old Youth Hostel site: Traffic management continues to be a problem and the Police will continue to monitor the site.

**DRT:** This is now co-ordinated centrally by Stirling Council, who can be contacted between 9am and 3pm. **Hospital transport:** The Scottish Ambulance Service provides Patient Transport and information on eligibility and the number to call is available from

**Road Repairs:** A substantial pothole has developed around the drain outside the bank entrance.

Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park sign: This is cemented in place and will be removed.

**Hogmanay:** The lantern procession was successful and Alma Walker and all involved were congratulated by the Community Council.

their vehicles are prepared. Any vehicle strikes to bridges should be reported for repairs. The Dochart Bridge parapet will be repaired and options are being considered to reduce vehicle strikes.

Two drivers have been stopped who were over the alcohol limit.

There has been a theft of a caravan

Police are carrying out spot checks of vehicles to deter criminals who are travelling around aiming to steal power tools from businesses and individuals. It is recommended that all power tools are marked and that a description and serial numbers are kept in case of theft.

The Police Control room at Stirling is now closed and calls are taken in Edinburgh. It will take time for staff to become familiar with all the localities.

Hospital Transport: Dial-a-journey can provide transport to people with an impairment for £9.10 each way. Individuals need to register with Diala journey Tel: 01786 465355. The Community Council continues to encourage feedback through Bruce Crawford MSP. It was noted that once hospital staff are aware that people live far away they are willing to make later appointments to allow time for travel.

**Defibrillator** Ten people have expressed an interest in training to use the defibrillator but there was no update on the purchase of the Public Access Defibrillator. This will be followed up at the next Community Council meeting.

Turning Circle Flower Beds: Stirling Council will be asked about putting down tarmac within this financial year or early in the next one. SC will then provide tubs and plants for the Killin Floral Society to maintain

Road Repairs: Some repairs have been carried out but there are many more areas requiring attention. Stirling Council will be asked about the widespread need for resurfacing throughout the region and the trunk road system and how the reduced roads budget will be used.

**Christmas Lights:** The current lamp posts are in a poor state and new posts would be required if Christmas lights are to be installed on the street lamp posts. This matter will be pursued.

**Electric Vehicle Charging Point:** 

This machine is blocking the pavement. Parking in that space will be restricted to those wishing to charge their vehicle.

**Road Repair**:. Repair works on the A827/080 Allt a'Bhaile Chruim culvert

will be carried out by the Bridges Department from 20th April and will require the road to be closed at night, currently proposed from 19.00 to 07.00 but from 22.00 - 07.00 will be suggested. Temporary traffic lights will operate during the day and it is estimated the work will take 10 days.

Repairs to the railway line path; Complaints were raised about the quality of the work and the condition of the path subsequently and passed to Owen McKee.

**Invasive Species:** Japanese knotweed continues to thrive and extend along the Ardeonaig Road. The matter will be pursue.

**Gritting:** It was reported that gritting lorries are not gritting the last section along the Ardeonaig Road before the boundary with P&K Council, despite turning beyond the boundary. This and the need for grit bins to be replaced throughout Killin will be pursued.

**Next meeting**: Tuesday 12th May at Killin Primary School.





## **Chairman's Report**

This issue, completed before the KAT AGM, will not be delivered until a week after that event. Work on the Breadalbane Park has started and is on course to finish by the end of April. Following that, planning for the next stage will commence. Progress on all major charitable projects is slow and takes a great deal of time especially during the planning, consultation, feasibility, funding application, discussion and tendering processes before construction work starts. It is not always possible to achieve initial aims as the world does not stand still during that time. Inflation, planning regulations, delays, competitive quotes, weather, unexpected legal costs and other hurdles arise and, as with the Park, can lead to reducing the scope of the work. For this reason another stage has been added during which more funds will be sought to add more to the Park and we all need to maintain our enthusiasm. Nobody said it was going to be easy.

We started work on the Old Mill in 2012. The Business Plan was produced in 2014 to persuade the Council to transfer it to community ownership. Now, in 2015, we are about to discuss plans and costs with the Big Lottery. If all goes to plan the repair and building work will start in 2017.

Work with the Sports and Leisure Club to renew the Astro Turf is now going ahead. The full plans for the Club need to be determined if the community wishes for the lease to be transferred from Stirling Council. More years of work and consultation lie ahead.

That is why the Trust needs your support to ensure that it represents you, the people of Killin and Ardeonaig. Volunteers are always welcome. Come and join us and work for the local community.

## **Project Worker's Report Breadalbane Park**

We eventually started on the park on 24th February and the work on the drainage has been progressing despite the weather. We had to put drainage pipes under the road which has been completed so no more traffic lights will be needed and the renewal of the pipe work in the park has now started. As I write this the job is four days ahead of schedule so hopefully this will continue throughout the project. At present

the end date of construction should be Friday 1st May, but seeding of the grass will need to be carried out the first week in May.

Because of the nature of the work being carried out machinery will be digging up a lot of the park, which will cause a lot of mess. The park will be closed during construction for the safety of the public. Stirling Council will be taking some of the play equipment out of the play park during construction so please do not try to access this area or any other area of the park that has been fenced off. KAT apologises for any inconvenience caused to the community while work is being carried out.

#### Old Mill

The Old Mill has been successful in receiving Stage 1 Growing Community Assets funding from the BIG Lottery. We have a meeting with BIG Lottery in a few weeks to talk about how we proceed to Stage 2. The hydro project has received the report for phase 1 from Local Energy Scotland and we have now started phase 2 of the funding which is to develop the option identified in the report from phase 1 to produce drawings of the scheme and look in more detail at the water level being fed into the lade.

On 5<sup>th</sup> March an enthusiastic audience in the McLaren Hall enjoyed a visit from four young singers and a pianist from Scottish Opera Highlights. We were invited to attend a party and, with clever changes of scenery, this linked a mixture of great music from tragic to saucy. There was great appreciation of the singing, the range of emotions portrayed and of the skill of the pianist. Killin is fortunate to be one of the places selected for such performances.







In the manner of a boa-constrictor with severe stomach ache, the jet stream has been writhing and twisting all winter as though in pain, thereby causing a seemingly unending procession of weather fronts to sweep over our islands. For several months conditions have been oscillating between comparatively mild, wet, spells emanating from somewhere around Bermuda or the Bahamas or, on the other hand, colder, wintry incursions originating in polar, maritime areas have held sway. In the latter case cold rain, sleet or wet snow, plus strong N.W. winds are particularly severe on outwintered livestock being not only wet but cold also. Now at the beginning of March this has all culminated in the heaviest snowfall of winter. It remains to be seen whether or not this month will exit in the hoped for manner, "lamb like" or will it defy tradition and

depart angrily? Now however, as these notes are penned, a surge of mild air has arrived banishing the snow completely, with even the highest ground reduced to patches. Having a very volatile climate encourages us continually to complain about its vagaries, although we rarely experience extremes of long lasting heat or cold. At one time it was a recognised fact that Cherrapungi, near Shillong in Assam, was, due to Monsoon rains, the wettest place on Earth, the coldest being somewhere in N. E. Siberia, while various sites claimed to be the hottest recorded on the planet. More recently a treatise on the Andes of South America has suggested that in the rain forest of Peru the average annual temperature is 80°F while in

Southern Chile the figure is below zero °F. In the Atacama desert there are areas where no rain ever falls, while the town of Tutuendo in Colombia lays claim to being the wettest place on earth. So perhaps the inhabitants of the various regions around the Andes have more to complain about than we do! Returning to the norm, signs of Spring are beginning to appear snowdrops, croci and daffodils are already established and oyster catchers have arrived on the shores of Loch Tay, while birdsong is increasing daily as indeed is daylight. Soon we may be complaining of the heat!

## Strathfillan Community Council Transport: Potholes on the

main trunk roads are causing real problems, especially at night. The defects are numerous, varying in seriousness and are located every few hundred vards with at least four between Tyndrum and Crianlarich in both directions. Serious suspension/wheel or tyre damage could result from hitting one at speed. The CC will write to Transport Scotland re potholes and the damage being caused to cars. It was suggested that this could include some photographic evidence. Concern still remains about the gritting/ploughing of the trunk roads this winter. While too late for this year, it was agreed that the CC would write to Transport Scotland with these concerns, in the hope that more budget could be allocated for

next winter There are anecdotal reports of a significant number of minor accidents at each of the roundabouts on the Crianlarich bypass. Fortunately most of these accidents have not required Police involvement, so no formal statistics are available, but it is believed the number is well into double figures. It was suggested that "countdown" signs approaching the roundabouts would be helpful. The kerbstones around the roundabouts are also becoming dislodged. It is believed that the geometry of the roundabouts mean that they are too tight for the large lorries. The CC will write to Transport Scotland with these concerns.

Patient Transport: This continues to be an issue and the CC have not had a response to the letter sent to NHSFV. Bruce Crawford MSP has also written to NHSFV on behalf of

the community. Killin Medical Practice has a list of services which can be provided at Oban hospital and it may be more appropriate for Strathfillan patients using public transport to access these where available.

**DRT:** Stirling Council are consulting

on changes to the way in which DRT bookings are made. Specifically, bookings would be made via Stirling Council rather than directly with the operator. The CC have responded to the consultation asking that the booking office hours are longer than the proposed 9am-3pm Monday to Friday. It is believed that this would cause problems particularly for school pupils and for anybody wishing to book for a Monday. Housing: Rural Stirling Housing Association are proposing introducing a local lettings initiative for RSHA homes in Mansefield, Tyndrum. This would give greater housing priority to people who work/live in/have sourced employment in Strathfillan.

The CC has responded in favour of

the introduction of this initiative.

## **Patient Participation Group**

There have been two meetings of the group so far. Although this cannot be a forum for individual complaints, we have discussed issues which appear to be of interest or concern to local people. The object of the group is to promote co-operation between the practice and patients to the benefit of both.

Information: With the many recent changes in doctors and other staff at the surgery, many patients did not feel knowledgeable about many issues. From this it was decided that the newsletter would be put in the Killin News and in other local newspapers as a flyer and notices of closures would be e-mailed to group members in Tyndrum, Crianlarich and Ardeonaig to be put on local noticeboards.

Hospital Transport: The difficulty of obtaining hospital transport was raised and the possibility of re-instating the car service run by locals was discussed. The seriousness of this was also noted by the N.H.S. representative and taken on board. It was noted that this was not just a problem for the elderly but young people also attending e.g. orthodontist appointments. Patients in Tyndrum would sometimes find it easier to attend Oban so the services available there

have been investigated and noted by the surgery.

All Larbert clinics should now allocate you an appointment at a time suitable for travelling the long distance. This should flag up with your postcode and if not then you can ask for a more suitable time. Appointments for surgery may have to be earlier of course.

Surgery Routine: Doctors take surgeries from 8 till 6 with time out for paperwork and some home visits, though these are limited. There are triage slots left in appointments so that a sudden illness can be assessed by a doctor to see if the patient needs an urgent appointment. Every two months there is an evening surgery for working people who need routine check-ups.

**Defibrillator:** The P.P.G. is helping to organise the evening for defibrillator and CPR training. If you haven't seen information on this please contact us. It will be an event made possible by local paramedics, Killin Community Choir and the participation group working together and is potentially life-saving, maybe for one of your family! If you would like to sign up for this or get further information please get in touch with me soon so that we know numbers and can plan further.


I've written a wee bit of it at the top of the page , but I'm no author and it is a great story. After all it has been at the heart of building our present day way of life and democratic government.

## Winter's Tail

Hopefully we are at the end of the snowy weather and like last year, the amount of snow on the hill has been much more than would appear from falls lower down. Maybe this is why more people seem to be getting stranded on the Ben Lawers Road although there is a sign saying that the road is not recommended in winter conditions. One day in January, while going stalking with my son, we found a police car at the side of the road by Loch na Laraig. A little further on a car had been stranded in the snow drifts for some considerable time. After they had been rescued by Lix Toll another car proceeded to try to go where the first car had been stuck but managed to turn and go down the hill. At the beginning of February two cars, each with an elderly couple in (or my age according to my son - old enough to know better anyway) were stranded in the same place. There is no mobile signal unless you walk a good distance in the drifts so how long would they have been there had my son not come along and pulled them out? I would urge such motorists and walkers, even in the summer, to realise that many areas on the hill have no signal and not to rely on this as a safety measure.

As snow drifts up fences it can soon cover them, enabling deer to walk over into areas such as S.S.S.I.s or newly planted woodland. The fence can also be damaged. This means that the deer have to be moved back out by a line of people or, if this is not possible, shot. Discussing this on the radio 'Out of Doors' programme they wondered what the outcome would be if this

happened to the fenced sites proposed for introductions of e.g. wolves.

Of course if we were polar bears we would take all this snowy stuff in our stride. 'But the polar bears are in danger from the ice caps melting' you say. Actually, according to new study results they are doing particularly well being well distributed throughout their range and enjoying plentiful supplies of scrummy seals for tea. After all polar bears can swim huge distances and animals do adapt. The report questions whether the B.B.C. amongst others is guilty of taking a political view.

It's not so sure if the ospreys and kingfishers at Strathallan will have enough time to adapt to T in the Park when it is moved there this year. The ospreys have been provided with an artificial platform 400 metres from their usual nest tree and tarpaulins have been put over kingfisher banks but the R.S.P.B. has not objected. If a keeper wishes to relocate a buzzard nest away from pheasant pens or Joe Bloggs inadvertently strays too near an osprey nest the fat is in the fire.

Something which does not seem to be going so well is the introduction of beavers to Knapdale. Research has been done by Stirling University showing little effect has been seen on rivers and streams in the area. A study by Oxford University found that, of fourteen kits born, only one or two survived and of the sixteen adults released, three died and five are A.W.O.L. Those left were having an effect on some of the internationally important lichen habitat. So our Tay beavers seem to be doing better on their own. Apparently some are wanting the one on the Lochay removed.


Recently you may have heard a helicopter circling the hills for a time. This may have been the local deer count which is done by air every few years. This can give a more accurate count covering 30,000 acres in about 40 minutes. Other years a more traditional count is made on foot by neighbouring estates counting on the same day. Sometimes a helicopter count is needed to cover all the ground. As well as pilot, navigator, cameraman and data recorder, the stalkers are also invited to help. Large herds are photographed to count later. This also enables more information such as number of stags, hinds and calves to be recorded. In densely afforested areas the census can only be done by dung counting.

As the winter comes to an end then so will the daily emptying of the mouse traps in the sheds with the valuable help of my terrier to sniff out the sprung traps. This will disappoint one crow who waits each morning for his breakfast as I throw him the night's catch. I think that he then flies up the brae where our neighbour also sees the dead mice disappear.

We are beginning to see the first of the migrant birds. The pier at Ardeonaig seems to be a stopping off point for oystercatchers with 35 on it one day, one of the few days recently when it's not been underwater. As of 9<sup>th</sup> March we have not yet heard curlew but we have a blackbird doing a very good impression of one. He may be applying for Britain's got Talent.

I don't know if it has been photoshopped but have you seen on facebook the green woodpecker with a weasel hitching a lift on its back?



## New Route for Stuc a' Chroin Hill Race

The Stuc committee are in the process of relocating the starting point of the Hill race. The original starting point is now up for development and we have no wish to stand in the way of progress and would like to give a huge thank you to Mr & Mrs Norrie Beaton, the proprietors, for allowing us the use of their property over the years. The new starting point will be from the recreational grounds [Tennis Court] and a new pathway will be hewed out on to the hill leading to the forest track. By the time this goes to print all remedial work "should" be completed.

This will involve quite a bit of clearance of old trees, large boulders, whin bushes etc and possibly some new drainage where necessary. When it is completed we will have an open path onto the hills, which will be ideal for walkers, locals and visitors and I'm sure a few excited dogs!!!

We will also undertake to clear and enhance the area as a whole, ie the pathway up to the war memorial and the area surrounding the tennis court which will shed much more light and hopefully help dry it out. The start of the new path will also

allow wheelchair access to the court when the refurbishment starts. When completed, the new route will still join the original so will only change the overall distance of the race slightly, but it will create an opportunity for new records to be set, with the old ones set in stone, never to be broken.

The committee has carefully planned this route, which will become the official hill race route and we hope everyone is in agreement with what we are doing. Please remember, we will only use this once a year. This path should be beneficial to the community as a whole but if anyone has any issues regarding this proposed route and would like to air them, then please advise any committee member.

This year's race will be on Saturday 2nd May and as always we are looking for any volunteers to help in any way they can, especially putting up the Marquees on Friday and taking them down on Saturday.



## **Book Review**



This is a real-life novel about author Janette Wall's grandmother, Lily Casey. Lily was born in 1901 on a ranch in Texas and is right out of the western movies I watched with my father as a kid. She's a spitfire woman who never lets life hold her back.

We first meet Lily as child and right away she is something special, as she saves her siblings from a flashflood that spreads across her father's ranch. Her father is a hard man, but she

loves him for it. He teaches her how to survive and expects she'll do just fine. Lily's mother doesn't come on the scene much and we learn she's not really cut out for ranch life, so much so that Lily has to grow up quickly and hard to take care of all the things that need to be done. Lily's father was kicked in the head by a horse as a child and he has a hard time speaking clearly. Lily becomes his "righthand man" for everything from translating to ranch hands and salesmen to breaking horses.

When World War One starts, Lily is only fifteen. Educated mostly by her father, Lily is whip-smart and driven. She sees an opportunity to head out on her own when most teachers have enlisted in the military or taken over their husbands' jobs elsewhere. With her horse and satchel, she sets out on a lone trek to start her career as a one-room schoolteacher and from there her adventures continue. Lily didn't have it easy. Trickery, family misfortunes and tragedy touch her life as they do ours, but she takes her dad's advice when he says, "Most important thing in life is learning how to fall" and "Hope for the best and plan for the worst." Half-Broke Horses is an amazing story of hope during hard times, lots of "life lessons" and a woman who just won't give up.



## **Professor David Daniel Blanev** 24.7.1956 - 31.1.2015

David was born on 24th July 1956 in Edinburgh. He was the eldest child of parents Daniel and Beatrice. His father Daniel was a painter and decorator, whilst Beatrice concentrated on raising the family.

On completion of his schooling, David was accepted to do medicine at Edinburgh University. He had initially intended to study Law "but on a whim" chose medicine, a decision that benefitted many. On completion of his studies, David became a GP based initially in Dedridge, Livingston.

In 1989 he decided to combine his work with his love of rural life and ioined the GP practice in Killin. This was to be his place of work for the next ten vears.

He loved his time in Killin, especially the many friends he made there. He fondly remembered his time as an amateur dramatist, trying to get his lines right and woefully getting them in the wrong order each night. He was touched by the generosity and forgiveness of folks who were at the end of his 'jokes', notably the FitzGeralds and residents of Craignavie Road, and grateful for the patience of those watching out for Rainbow as she wandered into yet another house for a biscuit or two.

Combining his passion for running and the countryside, he was an accomplished hill runner and proud of his Ben Nevis race result of 2hr 20min! His love of the hills. mountains and the outdoors drew him to running the hills as often as he could. He became an experienced and knowledgeable mountaineer. He ioined the Killin Mountain Rescue Team, where he could offer his valuable skills both of knowledge of the mountains and his professionalism that came with being a General Practitioner. He recalled how, at a Killin Mountain Rescue team AGM the

item of women being admitted to the team was discussed and dismissed: "women would distract the men and they were also afraid of blood". Goodness how David laughed at that idea, more so in today's climate. David said he always felt humbled by the requests of many to 'please return to work' in Killin. He missed the 'family' of Killin and being part of it and felt like a returning son each time he went back. David's love of the mountains and lochs was the reason he retained a home in them even after he had moved on professionally. Not a visit would pass without an ascent of Sron a' Chlachain.

David's professional interest lay in Medical Education, striving to support and improve medical practitioners' skills. He became Director of Post Graduate GP Education in South East Scotland, and moved to Edinburgh in 1999 with the family, working for NES and became Associate Post Graduate Dean there. Eager to ensure he had a continued understanding of GP issues on the front line. David never gave up his clinical duties and continued a day a week in an Edinburgh practice. He was academically gifted achieving no fewer than 8 post graduate degrees, culminating in a doctorate in medical education in 2009.

Tommy MacGregor 10.4.1930 - 15.2.2015

Tommy MacGregor's sudden and sad death has shocked so many in Killin where he was so well known from the late 50s until regionalisation when he held a contract with Perth & Kinross and drove the hard working roadmen from Ardhulerie on Loch Lubnaia side

to Tvndrum and the Falloch and into Killin and Morenish. The main depot was at Maragowan. It was a very busy road during that time with many trucks carting sand and gravel from Callander and Comrie to Glen Lyon and Ben Lawvers, buses transporting workers from the hydro scheme home to the cities and all the fish lorries from Mallaig travelling to the south. Tommy was a mechanic and helped so many people whose vehicles would have a breakdown during day or night - no mobiles then. He was affectionately known as 'the Spanner'. He kept Glenogle pretty clear during the winter months and if needed got help from Dunblane or a tractor from Glenogle Farm - no pot holes or choked drains in those days. Tommy lost his dear wife Betty after fifty happy years and then his much loved son Ewan was killed in a tragic accident three years ago. Alan William Skelton 1939-2015

Alan William Skelton passed away suddenly but peacefully at home with his family on 12th March 2015, aged 75. Loving husband of Helen and a much loved father. Known in the village for his distinctive laugh and sense of humour, Dad still worked for Later Life Training at Silver Cottage, Main Street. Much as he joked that I would not let him retire, he still very much enjoyed being part of the business, having been the main Administrator since we first set up in 2003 down in London.

Dad was born in Abbassia, Cairo, Egypt. His father was a Major in The Royal Artillery at the time. He was a boarder at Steyning Grammar School in Sussex and went on to study Civil Engineering at Manchester University. He first worked for Taylor Woodrow as a site Engineer, and one of his first jobs was the Marriot Hotel (previously Albany Hotel) in Glasgow. He met my mother, Helen, in London and they married in 1967 and had just celebrated their 48th Wedding Anniversary where he jokingly asked for his lifetime achievement medal. Mum and Dad lived in Ealing, West London, most of their married lives. Dad worked as a Structural Engineer in a small London based firm, FJ Samuely and Partners, for the most of his working life. On retirement, as he had always been a bit of a workaholic, he first went to work in a local Garage and then, when I set up Later Life Training, he became the full time administrator. His attention to detail, warmth and sense of humour with all the students and hosts for the training courses we run meant they all felt that this small family business training provider was right for them. He cut back his working hours in 2004 when he first fell ill whilst on holiday in Rannoch. In 2006 we made the decision to move up to Scotland and found our true home in Crianlarich. He continued to run the business until we took on David Riddell, although kept his hand in almost full time until the office moved to Killin two years ago,

when he started working on a more part time basis. He had started spending more time enjoying the beauty of the area, a particular favourite was Glen Lonan where we often stopped to picnic on the way to do our shopping in Oban. Despite many operations over the vears (Ninewells, Edinburgh) and a cloud of uncertainty over just how long he might be with us, Dad absolutely loved living here and said everyday was a bit like a holiday with the spectacular surroundings and the wonderful people. Mum and I are thankful we made the move and his final years were so happy, full of laughs, friends and of course, special memories. His laughter and teasing will be sorely missed but we are so grateful that we were with him and that his passing, although untimely, was so quick and peaceful. There will not be a funeral as Dad bequeathed his body to medical research, so Mum and I will attend a memorial at St. Andrew's University. We ask that you just enjoy your memories of this special man and raise a glass in his honour. Many thanks to David, Jennifer, Kirsteen, Louise and Jen for all their help and support since the office moved and of course, recently. Our thanks also to Dr Syme for his time and support with Dad over the years. We are grateful to everyone in Crianlarich and Killin for their kindness and making us feel we were amongst family. In particular, our wonderful friends and neighbours, Ray and Sue Nixon, Tom and Louise Coffield, Isla and Brian Craig and our wonderful postie Jim, for their support since we moved here and with recent events.

#### Dundee Courier 3rd March 1882

The friends and neighbours of Mr. Alexander Stuart of the Hotel, having resolved upon giving him a day's ploughing, on Friday morning a large turnout of ploughs was on the ground by 9 o'clock, and by 6 o'clock a large amount of good work had been done. The wants of both men and horses were well seen to throughout the day.

#### Glasgow Herald 25 September 1885


Highland Coach Horses – Great Annual Special Sale of over two hundred brougham and matching carriage horses, draught, van and harness sorts, cobs and ponies, comprising a stud of twenty valuable posting and coaching horses, withdrawn for the Killin and Loch Tay Coaches, the property of Alexr. Stuart Esq. Killin Hotel, Perthshire and sold on account of the near completion of the Killin Branch Railway.

Glasgow Herald 12 March 1886 Important to Coaching and Hotel Proprietors, Post Masters and Others 8th April, Killin Hotel at 12 noon. Messrs. Hutchinson and Dixon have received instructions from Alexander Stuart Esq.Killin to sell as above the whole of his Coaching Plant, Harness and Coaching Horses comprising :-Three Coaches, to carry Twenty Passengers each: One Coach, to carry Sixteen: brake, new, by Messrs. William Kinross and Sons, Stirling: Two Omnibuses, one as good as new, to carry Sixteen and Twelve respectively: One Two and One Four Wheeled Dog Cart, Two Wagonettes, one Reversible to a Stanhope: Also EIGHT POWERFUL SHORT-LEGGED COACHING HORSES, 15 to 15.5 hands high, and from four to nine years old: sets of Four-in Hand, Double, Single and Pony Harness, Odd Harness etc. (Sold in consequence of the Opening of the Branch Railway Contract to Killin on the 1st April).

Note – the Horses are all in the Best Hard-fed Seasoned condition, and will be in constant work up to the 1st April. The Coaches were newly done up last season, and are all in splendid order.
