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Editorial

Christmas and New Year have come and gone and people are now looking ahead to the coming year and what it will bring. More sunshine and spring flowers will soon cheer up everyone but we still have winter to get through and hope there will be no more extreme weather with the problems that can cause. The Killin year will unfold with the usual annual events – and a new Music Festival – and the many groups in the village, having shared a Christmas celebration, will meet again for their various purposes. Village groups come and go over the years, get smaller and then expand again, even cease to exist for a time and then reform. At one time, for instance, there was no such thing as a book club in the village and now there are three. Groups cover a large number of different activities and interests for all ages and most are run by their members. How keen the members are to help run a group makes the difference to its success. A group of people or even just one person can make a big difference to a cause or a community, as we frequently learn from stories in the news and on the internet. Organisations set up by the community to work for the community at one time would almost always consist of the minister, the bank manager and the local great and good, including a number of experienced people who had retired. Nowadays this is not so. Even if we had a bank manager and a permanent minister, with the later retirement age there are fewer younger retirees able to give time to local groups, so more working people are needed. It is also much more important for groups to have vounger people involved as they, and not the older folk, have the currently much-needed up-to-date knowledge of computers and social media. It would be great if even more of them were to become involved in working for community

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interests in all areas.

Killin Community Council

Police Service of Scotland Community Council Report:

A report was made of noise disturbance at a house in Fingal Road.

There have been 2 incidents of domestic assault, a number of incidents on the railway involving drunken passengers and 5 reported Road Traffic Collisions, one of which was serious.

Severe flooding caused considerable problems on the roads and to shops in Aberfoyle.

Motorists ignoring Road Closed signs cause further problems and may incur a Fixed Penalty.

There have been 2 incidents of theft; scrap metal was taken from Stitt's yard and a trailer from Dalmally. School term has started and extra attention will be paid to the Main Road during the start and finish of the school day.

Owners of property and vehicles are reminded to secure them and be vigilant. Smartwater packs are still available.

The Climate March and Santa Dash went ahead without incident. There were two sudden deaths and a local man from Killin was found deceased in the River Lochay. Condolences were extended to all friends and family.

Road matters:

Glen Ogle Road – the culverts need cleared and there are deep potholes holding water all leading to icy conditions. There is also water running across the road washing any grit away.

Future flooding: There will be 1,000 sandbags at Fire Stations for public use in the event of flooding.

Traffic speed on Lyon Road/ Ballechroisk area: Double yellow lines will be installed where the bin

lines will be installed where the bin lorry had difficulty gaining access.

January Meeting

Dochart Bridge: There has been no progress in improving sight lines or road markings on the Dochart Bridge or re-instating road markings at the Bridge End, Lix Toll or the Ardeonaig Road.

КАТ

A survey of local people's views will be conducted soon as part of the process of applying for a grant to refurbish the Old Mill.

KAT is meeting with the company who carried out the work on the Breadalbane Park to discuss ongoing problems.

DRT

A report is being drawn up, collating all comments and complaints regarding DRT and this will be presented to a Stirling Council Committee Meeting. Local Councillors continue to oppose the reduction in service and continue to lobby for extended booking.

Lantern Workshop and Parade This was successful but the application to the Community Grant Scheme only provided a third of the costs applied for. Some local funding will be needed in future.

Community Conversations

This meeting was well attended and many concerns were raised about Stirling Council's budgeting plans. Following the Chancellor's Autumn Statement, further cuts will have to be implemented and there is therefore a new raft of proposals which the public will be consulted on. **Stirling Council Community Engagement team**

A new post of Community Liaison Officer employed by Stirling Council has been created and is due to start in February 2016. No-one was aware of this post being advertised and Councillor A. Hayes will investigate the process.

Correspondence

The pre-construction phase of the Acharn Biomass plant will begin in the next few months. The Community Council will be kept informed and a meeting will be scheduled soon.

Morenish Farm Woodland

Creation: Plans for planting Sitka and Norway Spruce have been received from Tilhill Forestry. A letter has also been received from Environmental Action Killin raising concerns about the impact of this both to the environment and to the landscape. Tim Frost will invite Bruce Spalding of Tilhill Forestry to the next Community Council meeting on 8th March and of course any member of the community is welcome to attend and contribute to this meeting.

KCC Accounts: The accounts fo 2014-2015 were approved.

Ardeonaig Road: The French drains, culverts and passing places are all blocked. Tim Frost has informed Stirling Council and Councillor Hayes will pursue.

Hogmanay Fireworks: Councillor Hayes will investigate whether funding is available for this now that the Stirling Fireworks have ceased. Flooding at the Bank of Scotland:

There was a problem with the drain here again. It was noted that maintenance was not being carried out.

Fibre Broadband: The date for this being installed has now slipped back to Spring, yet this is a vital service for many local businesses. Councillor Hayes will send information from the Broadband Advisory Group to G. Mackenzie and pursue an invitation for him to the group. Date of Next Meeting: Tuesday 8th March 2016, 19.30 at Killin Primary School

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

KAT AGM

It's nearly time for the AGM which will be held on Saturday 12th March 2016 from 11am to 2pm in the Killin Hotel. This year we will be inviting SKS Scotland to talk to us about the Old Mill and the work they are doing for KAT. Sonya Linskaill, our architect ,will be there with the development plans for the Old Mill. The AGM is also an opportunity for people to hear what KAT has been doing for the last year.

At the AGM we will also be electing the directors to take the organisation forward over the next year. We have spaces and would be happy for anyone interested in joining our team to contact Theresa before 4th March for more information.

The Old Mill

We have received our development grant funding from the Big Lottery and everyone involved is working hard to ensure we have all the information required to put in a good Growing Community Asset application form.

We have contracted SKS Scotland to develop a business plan for us. Part of their job is to ensure that the community is behind the Old Mill's plans, not just the development plans of the building, but what we are trying to achieve inside the building. The information that is gathered from this survey will be used as evidence for the Big Lottery application, so it is very important that everyone completes a survey. There is a paper survey inserted in the Killin News which can be handed in to the Library, News First, Sheila's Sweet Shop or the Old Mill or you can complete the online survey at

Work is very quiet at the moment. The sand slitting still has to be completed by the contractors. This can't be done while the ground is so wet and so will probably be completed in the spring. KAT is aware that the area around the round house is not draining well at present and is working with the design architect to improve this. We haven't started on phase 2 as the design architect is prioritising phase 1 at present.

KAT needs to report back to the Big Lottery about the park and how local people are using it now. We would be interested to hear from you or a group that you are involved with about your experiences of the park. If you have any photos we could use it would be great to have a copy. You can email Theresa with all your comments.

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The year 2015 slowly subsides into the meteorological morass of many of its months, leaving but little regret for the passing of its, in many ways, un mourned demise.

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Sea Ferrets and Parachuting Beavers

As I write this we are just moving out of a very wet autumn and early winter into a finer but cold spell. Apparently the wet weather is responsible for an increase in Lyme disease, presumably ticks like the damp. We are not sure if the weather or, maybe, fewer hazelnuts this year is causing our squirrels to continue to visit during the Winter. One industrious wee chap has been burving peanuts in plant pots and certain bits of the garden. If he forgets them we will look forward to a healthy crop of peanuts in the summer. We have also noted far fewer goldfinches and siskins at the feeders this year. Have other people noticed the same? Some places have been much less lucky than around here with the extensive floods. In some areas freshwater mussels have been washed out of the rivers onto surrounding land. It is usually criminal to touch them (could be a pearl in there!) but amnesty is given to anyone finding washed up ones and throwing them back into the river. In days gone by you may have found even more surprising water life around as lobsters were once used to bolt rabbits from their holes and were known as sea ferrets. Even more surprising to see would be 65 years ago when beavers were parachuted from over- beavered Idaho into different states of America which needed help in damming for water supplies. Do not worry - all beavers survived unharmed. Presumably none of the 20 plus which have been shot in Tayside arrived in this way. But if anyone knows different please let Killin News have the exclusive. Remember that, although it is legal to shoot beavers, it is illegal to move a

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dead one and SNH must be notified.

I should think that the shot beavers were retrieved and their ample fur is now keeping someone warm but not the case with 86 stags which were shot at Li and Coire Dhorcail at Knovdart by the John Muir Trust and left on the hill. Some stags with heads and haunches removed were left to rot on the hill. Stalkers have successfully extracted deer from this area prior to the Trust's ownership. It would appear that there is one practice for some and another for the rest. I wonder if these problems would be solved if lvnx are reintroduced? It is still a proposal as it is said that they would be a tourist attraction. I wonder how many tourists are lucky enough to see a wild stag which we are supposed to be overrun with let alone how many would spot the odd wild lynx amongst our future vast forests. Hot off the press this week the Rural Affairs Committee has raised significant concerns about the introduction of changing tax regulations on sporting estates and wants the government to look more carefully at how sustainable deer management can come about.

On Boxing Day Aileen McLeod announced a review of fox hunting legislation north of the border. In June there was no intention to amend the legislation but, co-incidentally?, the SNP received £10,000 from a group lobbying for changes. The same lady, the Environment Minister, is looking into licensing grouse moors.

Here is a post-Christmas message from Mr. Fox. He enjoyed a juicy pheasant for his Christmas dinner and was not worried about having ingested lead shot. He also took heart from the fact that you are in more danger from lead ingestion from potatoes, coffee, eggs and beer. Tim Frost Apparently.

Helpline for the Elderly

A new service has been developed by NHS Forth Valley and its three council partners following feedback which highlighted that, wherever possible, older people prefer to stay in their own homes

The dedicated 24/7 phone line, which is known as ALFY (Advice Line For You), is operated by experienced nurses who are able to listen to callers' concerns and make sure they receive the right help and support. This could range from offering general reassurance and advice on a wide range of health issues, to signposting callers to relevant emergency social work, voluntary or local services. Staff are also able to book appointments to attend a rapid access frailty clinic at Forth Valley Roval Hospital where a number of tests or assessments can be carried out or arrange for a community nurse to visit an older person at home, day or night, if required. The service, which can be accessed by calling 01324 567247, is aimed at people aged 65 and over. It is estimated it could benefit around 54,000 older people in the Forth Valley area as well as friends, family members and other people who may care for them. NHS Forth Valley has also written to around 3,800 older people across Forth Valley who they think could particularly benefit from this new service.

Meeting minutes are published on village noticeboards and are also available online. If you would like to receive an emailed copy after each meeting, please let Isla Craig know. All CC meetings are open to the public and take place on the 2nd Monday of each month (except August & December), at 7.30pm in Crianlarich Hall. The next meeting is 8th February

Police Report - The wet weather caused no end of calls re flooding and this was declared a major incident over the entire division but primarily in the Callander, Aberfoyle & Crianlarich areas. PC Craig Murray was recalled to duty on a rest day as no one could reach past Loch Dochart due to the depth of water. Due to the weather, drivers are reminded to check vehicle tyres, windscreen washer levels, lamps and carry suitable clothing, a shovel & hot drink in the vehicle when on a long journey. Even if you're in a 4X4 and, if you're unsure of the depth of water in a flood, don't drive through it. If you have to get out, the water is cold and can wreck your vehicle and it takes a long time for the carpets to dry out!!



Outreach Surgery - We are disappointed that the planned pilot Outreach Surgery in Strathfillan has not begun. Killin Medical Practice have written to us stating that they wish to carry out a practice review of the scope of the proposed Outreach clinic. We understand that a survey which will feed into this review will begin in Autumn 2016. In the meantime, the CC are exploring with Stirling Council (who provided the funding for the pilot) & NHS Forth Valley whether there are any other medical services which would be appropriate to pilot as an outreach service.]

Priority Based Budgeting - Alan and John attended a meeting in Lochearnhead in relation to Priority Based Budgeting. Alan has completed the online survey on behalf of Stratfhillan CC but we will not be spending time writing a detailed response. Instead, we refer Stirling Council to our response from last year, as the points we raised then are still valid. We understand that with the recently announced further cuts to Local Council budgets it is likely that all savings identified in the PBB documentation are likely to be implemented.

Cycle Track - Alan & Isla attended a joint meeting with SCDT regarding the Tyndrum-Crianlarich cycleway. The Countryside Trust have employed a consultant to bring the plans to "tender ready" stage. A potential route has been marked out with orange flags and we are pleased that our community views have been taken into account. We are hopeful that a planning application will be submitted in the not too distant future.

Transport - A number of transportrelated issues were raised. Charlie will be compiling a list of these and passing them as a single request to Transport Scotland/Stirling Council.

Housing - There is land adjacent to Mansefield in Tyndrum which was known to be originally zoned for housing but is not shown as such in the most recent NP plan. We are trying to find out when and why the designation of this area changed.

A Killin Journey in 1921

Part of Letter from Archie Macbeth (Elizabeth Ingram's relative) written 5th July 1921

We have arrived in satisfactory condition at our destination. The journey was not so very arduous, even though we had to wait over three hours at Killin. I will detail the journey for you. When you arrive at Killin Junction, you cross the footbridge to the platform opposite, where you will find waiting for you an engine tied with string to one carriage. You will enter the latter with your baggage and, after the engine driver has dealt with the luggage in the van, you will find yourself hurtling down towards Killin at the dangerous speed of nearly 100 yards a minute, the engine driver carrying on a conversation with all the houses he passes. Fortunately it isn't far to Killin, where you alight on the platform. The first thing to do is to get hold of a porter, tell him of your awful predicament and implore him to take your luggage into his custody, telling him at the same time that you want it put on the bus for Fearnan. You then stroll down the station road, walk straight up the village for about 100 yards, till you behold on the left-hand side of the road a little pink-washed cottage bearing the inspiring message "Teas, Ices, Minerals". Walk round to the back of this and you will find two doors, the further away of which says "Tearoom". Enter this and the good lady who floats about the premises will cater for all the wants of your inner man, or men, since you are not one but many. For 1/4d you will be regaled with tea (ad lib), bread and butter (one slice per head), scones (4 for 3 of you), cakes (one apiece) cherry cake (one portion per person) with a dash of rhubarb jam, a plate of butter, sugar and milk, and pictures on the wall thrown in. After this, if you feel well enough, you may go for a walk through Killin, but you might be as well to go to the garage, which is almost next door and ask him to call at the station for your luggage. This done, and having enquired of the time the bus leaves, you may relax your mind a little and leave the rest to providence. There is no lack of things to interest you in the village apart from the entertainment that may be derived from weighing yourself on the machine in the station waiting room. Be at the garage again by about ten minutes to two or so, as the bus is liable to start at any hour. The bus, by the way, is easily recognised. It is a little Ford, with a roof, and seats along each side.

The capacity is only about a dozen. The fare, payable at Fearnan will come to about 5/- per head, whether the extra is for luggage or no. When we arrived, my friend Macpherson was waiting for us at Fearnan. He helped us to the house with our luggage and spent the afternoon and evening here, giving us much valuable information in return for a cup of tea, an egg and a little salt.

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
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Weather Statistics for 2015 f

The total rainfall recorded in 2015 at the Met Office weather station at Kirkton Farm, near Tyndrum, was 3585.8 mm (141 inches) which was 1057.6 mm more than the 1991-2010 twenty year average (2528.2 mm). This was the highest annual rainfall total since weather recording began at this site in 1991, exceeding the previous record of 3453.6 mm set in 2011. The wettest month was December when a total of 738.4 mm (29.07 inches) of rainfall was recorded; making it both the wettest December and the wettest ever calendar month. The rainfall was above average in all months apart from April, September and October. The 249.2 mm of rainfall in July was the highest ever recorded. A total of 624.2 mm of rain fell during the summer months of June, July and August, which was also a record. The driest month was September with a total of 63.8 mm of rainfall (only 32% of the average September rainfall). The highest rainfall over a calendar Week (Monday to Sunday) was 228.4 mm between the 5th and the 11th January. The highest rainfall in a single 24 hour period (09:00 GMT to 09:00 GMT) was 95.4 mm on the 4th December. The highest rainfall in a single half-day12



hour period (21:00 GMT to 09:00 GMT) was 69.6 mm on the 29th December. The total number of rain days was 292 (80%). There were 46 days when there was more than 25 mm of rainfall, including six days when there was more than 50 mm. The lowest temperature was on the 19th January when the temperature fell to -8.8°C. The lowest maximum temperature was also on the 19th January (-0.1°C). This was the only day during 2015 when the temperature failed to get above freezing. An air frost was recorded on 73 days. The 1st July was the

warmest day (24.0°C). Temperatures of 20oC or above were recorded on 15 days. The 1st October was the warmest October day on record (20.0°C).

Sleet or snow was recorded falling at the weather station on 42 days and lying snow was noted on 43 days. A depth of 20cm of lying snow was recorded on the 14th January and 18cm on the 3rd March.

There were nine days when sustained gale force winds were recorded and six days when thunder and lightning were recorded.


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

The total rainfall recorded in Killin in 2015 (2479.5 mm [97.62 inches]) was significantly higher than the 2002-2011 ten year average (1837.1 mm). 2015 was the second wettest year since recording began at this site in 2002 (2011 was 1.0 mm wetter). September was the driest month with only 45.0 mm of rain, while December was the wettest month with 542.0 mm. December was the wettest calendar month since recording began in 2002. Nine months of the year were wetter than average, only April, September and October were drier than average. During 2015 Killin received approximately 69% of the rainfall recorded at Kirkton (i.e. some 1106.3 mm less). The rainfall was higher at Kirkton in all months. Thanks to the Met Office for supplying the data from the automatic weather station at Kirkton.



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

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Breadalbane Adventures

Number 2 - The Balgie Cycle Loop 3 hours - 36 miles

A glorious February Wednesday tempted us onto our bikes for a first ride of the year of any decent length: up Glen Lochay, over "the Kenknock" to Upper Glen Lyon and back by the Ben Lawers hill road.

Several layers were put on and bikes selected that could cope with rough tarmac and winter conditions. The two climbs are strenuous enough to generate perspiration that chills quickly on the rapid descents. Midweek winter closure meant the splendid Bridge of Balgie tearoom couldn't provide much needed calories.

We were three: you know me, mature and on the large side and vou've been introduced to the gazelle. In tow eventually we had the retired solicitor from the North East, mounted on an ancient steed, affecting hypochondria to mask his legendary stamina, ever reminiscing of long alpine days in his youth. The choice route up Glen Lochay depends on wind. The Southern road past Moirlanich is open and delightful, ending in the short pull up on Power Station Brae, which is the hardest part of the Killin 10k August road run. If there is any significant breeze from the West, then take the Northern road, shorter and sheltered in the trees. Past the power station, the road drops to the riverside and swings round to Duncroisk before the bridge over the Allt Dhuin Croisg, where walkers for Meall Ghaordaidh park their cars.

The day was cold not windy and we opted for Moirlanich and thereafter a gentle ride West. Knowing what was to come, we dawdled the few miles to Kenknock which included a stop for a quick coffee and to pick up the venerable attorney, miserable at having lost hens to a predator while

house-sitting.

The Kenknock climb has long been a staple of Highland Perthshire road cvcling. It packs 900ft into 1.5 miles, with steep lower slopes, but is rather a shadow of its former self as the road surface has deteriorated badly and the climb is interrupted by 2 new gates that break the rhythm of athletes like the gazelle. We were warm from exertion but cold from a bit of breeze so carried on through wet lying snow and soon we were at the bealach above the descent to Upper Glen Lvon. In the past the gazelle had been left behind on this section while I generated excess speed from excess kilograms, but it was cold and the surface was scatted with winter gravel. I was teased for being slow and then suffered the ignominy of a puncture, caused by going too fast over the cattle grid at the bottom. Little mercy was shown as my frozen fingers struggled to replace the inner tube.

The 10 mile ride from here to Bridge of Balgie is one of Scotland's real gems. Passing the settlement at Pubil, it winds its way East down the glen with magnificent views of the Northern spurs of Meall Ghaordaidh, before looping North and rising to the junction of the Two Lochs road above Meggarnie Castle. A fast last mile or two brings one all too soon to Bridge of Balgie.

The memory of the tearoom from previous visits was almost tangible, of wonderful soups and cakes. My reverie was interrupted by ascerbic legal wit as our pensioner planned his assault of the next 4.5 miles: the 1,200ft climb to the Lochan Na Lairige. The usual phases of taking it easy and just going steady fooled noone and soon we were perspiring again. This is a great climb (for






those who like going uphill on a bike) as it needs effort but is not too steep to enjoy. Mountain vistas of the Tarmachan range open up round each bend. The route in total has over 3.00ft of climbing so makes for a fairly strenuous ride if done without stops, especially when it's the first of the year. We were glad of the top. Despite the benian weather the reason for our car-free ascent became clear as we reached the high point at 1,800 ft. The road was blocked with a series of sugary snow drifts, each a few tens of metres in length and up to a metre deep, preventing vehicular passage but not our walking the bikes over. Somewhat damp-footed, we emerged from the last of these, a mile north of the Lawers dam. The looming rocks of the Lawers range to the East and Tarmachan ridge to the West are ancient garnet-bearing mica schists and are part of a kilometres scale recumbent fold called the Tay Nappe. Impress your friends by telling them that the summits are upside-down. Smarting from my earlier humiliation, I resolved to descend faster than my companions, though taking care not to puncture again. Inevitably they took this as a challenge and sat on my wheel, calmly chatting away behind me while I parted the cold air. This is a quick descent but needs care; it is popular with visitors and walkers and not all drivers are familiar with it, nor indeed narrow single track roads. At Edramucky the road turns right onto the A827 for the final few miles back to Killin Plans for a late lunch were made as the gazelle and I rode en peleton. We bade farewell to the legal eagle as we sped past Killin Golf Course and he turned back up glen Lochay to count his chickens. Our goose was cooked. **Gnarly Knees**

Obituary

Hetty Mustard 16.5.1926-21.12.2015

Hetty was born at St Leonard's. Forteath Avenue, Elgin, the third of four daughters to Alexander Low Mustard and Eliza Russell Mustard (nee Jack and always called Ivy). The family later moved to Duff Avenue in St Leonard's, where their chauffeur taught Hetty to drive. She became very efficient at reversing and, as driving tests were stopped during the war, she never had to sit a driving test.

She went to Springfield Primary School in Elgin and then to a school in Switzerland which, when war broke out, was evacuated to Wales. Shortly after she moved to St Leonard's school in St Andrews. After her father died in 1949 she, her mother and sister Muriel, moved to Edinburgh.

She trained at Bedford PE college and then taught at Benenden for a short time before moving to Edinburgh University PE department where she rose to become deputy director of physical education. Along with the Director, Laurie Liddell, she was responsible for setting up Firbush Point Field Centre on Loch Tay. In December 1969 she purchased Pier End in Pier Road. That year she told

her mother and sister that they were spending Christmas in Killin and when they arrived in Killin said that they would walk their dogs first and only told them that she had bought the house when they arrived at the gate! She spent every summer there until last summer. She enjoyed the concerts at Balguhidder Church and, with Muriel, did the catering for them for some years. She was a keen tennis player

and when younger regularly played in the Duff Avenue tournament in Elgin. She liked pony trekking and for a time had ponies which were ridden by students at Firbush.

After retiring from the university, for a few years during the summer months, she and Muriel ran The Mustard Pot, a tearoom and gift shop in Killin. She was a member of Liberton Kirk and Killin Kirk and for some years volunteered with the WRVS at the sheriff court in Edinburah.

After her funeral service in Liberton Kirk, she was buried alongside her parents in Elgin Cemetery.




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
