Editorial

KAT Report AGM

KAT held their AGM on Saturday 12th March in the Killin Hotel. There was a good turnout of members. The new KAT Board is: Ron Allner – Chairperson, Pat Hayes – Vice Chairperson, Mark Beaumont – Treasurer, Jay Allen, Keith Mayo, Charlie Grant, Davy Fettes Co-opted Directors are; Rosemary Simpson and Angus Inglis Company Secretary – Theresa Elliot Members had the chance to hear about the work KAT has been doing during this past year and ask questions.

Rosemary Simpson gave an update on the internet café, Franny Morrison on the day to day business of the Old Mill and Theresa Elliot on the KAT projects. Our guest speaker was Alistair Grimes from SKS Scotland, the Old Mill business consultants, who talked about their role in helping KAT put together a funding application to Big Lottery and gave some of the findings from the Mill questionnaire.

KAT would like to thank all who attended the AGM, the community for their continued support and everyone who volunteers on the KAT projects, especially the Old Mill. Without you we could not do everything that we do.

Breadalbane Park

There is no update on when the sand slitting will be carried out, but we are hoping it will be done in spring. KAT are aware of the areas that are still flooding and hoping that the sand slitting will address this issue. As part of the funding requirement we need to show how the improvements, to date, have made the park become a better space. There is a short questionnaire that is being distributed around the village in various ways. Please do complete one for us.



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Internet Café

The internet café has re-opened after a winter break in February. For the first few weeks the sessions were being run by me or Kay to ensure it would keep running until we found a tutor. Our new tutor, Angela Hanvey, started with us in March and made a good impression on all who attended. Angela has a wealth of computer and technology knowledge and is looking forward to meeting you. The café is a drop in and runs every Thursday 11am to 3pm in the Library. Sessions cost £1.50 per hour and 50p for a tea/coffee and biscuit. The library is also open then for people with a library card to take out or return books and for photocopying and printina.

Killin and District Sport and Leisure Club

The Sports and Leisure Club will be open from April to October. An agreement has been made with the Killin Hotel for the hotel to hold a small stock of equipment and take money for people wanting to use the facilities. The agreement will be reviewed on a regular basis to ensure it is working for both the Club and the Killin Hotel. Hire of the pavilion space can be booked through Fiona Boath on 01567 820122.

Old Mill Development

Thank you to everyone who completed a survey - we had over 100 responses. SKS Scotland are in the process of analysing the data but from initial feedback it seems to show nothing surprising. We are working to submit our application to the Big Lottery -Growing Community Assets Programme by the end of June 2016. There is a lot of work to be carried out but most of it is information gathering.



Stirling Council

KAT have signed an agreement with Stirling Council for them to fund KAT for me to act as a link between Stirling Council and the communities in the Breadalbane area of Crianlarich, Tyndrum, Killin, Balguhidder, Strathvre and Lochearnhead. This will involve: Being the first point of contact for the 3 Community Councils in the Breadalbane area and attending their meetings when required. Assisting with the development of the Community Test Site in the Strathfillan and Killin area, e.g booking venues, encouraging participation, highlighting areas of concern coming from the community. Promoting and encouraging community involvement in key Council activities.

This agreement started on 1st January and will run until 31st December, though will be reviewed regularly and, if successful, could be rolled out for longer.

Summary of March Meeting

Tilhill Forestry: Representatives of Tilhill Forestry provided a presentation of their current plans for commercial forestry at Morenish. 62% of the trees planted will be Sitka spruce and 14% Norway spruce with an anticipated harvest in 35 to 40 years. Concerns were raised about the impact of logging lorries on the Dochart Bridge. The company would inform Stirling Council when timber would be transported but any impact on the Dochart Bridge would be the responsibility of SC. Basic surveys have been carried out by Tilhill Forestry and they agreed that when an Environmental Impact Assessment has been carried out a copy will be provided to Killin Community Council. A number of questions were raised regarding the impact of this commercial planting on the many local businesses

which rely on tourism and who would take responsibility for ensuring an integrated approach. In particular the impact on significant views was discussed. Cameron Maxwell (Forestry Commission Scotland) said that they would consider this when looking at Tilhill's plans.

Public access was also raised. Tilhill Forestry will be leaving a peat track open and could provide a path along the lochside when planting in the area that is liable to flooding. The gap between the road and planting could also provide a path.

Questions were also raised regarding deer fencing. Tilhill Forestry plan to erect a deer fence on the south side of the road but not on the north side. where they will control deer numbers but will not be part of the Deer Management Group.

Tilhill agreed to organise an open meeting for the public in Killin and will inform Tim Frost of the details. They will also organise on-site meeting for anyone who wishes to discuss their plans.

Acharn Biomass Plant: Andrew Vince (Clean Energy Ventures Operations Management Ltd) provided an update on the power plant which will now comprise 10 small units run on a shift pattern with 16 employees. The footprint of the site remains the same.



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Scottish Woodland are currently taking down trees and removing stumps and the aim is to start work on the plant on 2nd May 2016. The initial work will be carried out by the Robertson Group from Stirling and the aim is to complete this and be operational within 12 months.

The plant uses advanced gasification to generate electricity and heat from timber. Any ideas for using the heat locally to benefit the community can be discussed with Andrew Vince and he has a suggestion that he will bring back to the Community Council when he has considered it more fully.

The noise impact was questioned. Andrew Vince is looking to reduce noise, in particular by using an electric chipper rather than a diesel chipper.

The impact on the Dochart Bridge was also discussed. Timber would not be transported through the village by the Biomass Plant but if a timber company was bringing timber through the village anyway the Biomass Plant would try to use that.

Local jobs were discussed and Andrew Vince confirmed that the Biomass Plant would aim to fill as many of the 16 jobs as possible locally.

Andrew Vince will come back to the Community Council in May and July to provide updates on progress and discuss options for using the heat for a community project.

Police Service of Scotland **Community Council Report:**

Anti-social behaviour: Disturbance in Main Street Killin led to two local males being reported to the Procurator Fiscal. There was a disturbance outside the Killin Hotel

A man was arrested and charged with drink driving after a crash outside the Co-op in Killin.

Forestry work is going on in various locations. Motorists should be aware and reduce their speed.

reassurance: Extra attention will be paid to the Main Road during the start and finish of the school day. A local officer visited the nursery and Primary One class.

Other: There have been a number of break-ins in Doune and Callander. Owners of property and vehicles are encouraged to check security. Smartwater packs are still available at the Police Office.

Several local Mountain Rescue team members assisted the recent search on Ben Nevis.

PC Fleming assisted the search near Durisdeer with his SARDA dog. Local officers are dealing with Firearms Licensina Enquiries.

Dochart Bridge: Despite being in the schedule, there has been no progress in improving sight lines or road markings on the Dochart Bridge or re-instating road markings at the Bridge End. Lix Toll road markings have been done.

Scottish Water: Bruce Crawford has raised this matter with Scottish Water who responded that their obligation is only to provide 1bar of pressure and that they have reduced the pressure to protect the infrastructure. Charlie Grant will gather information about all local businesses affected and Councillor Earl will speak to Bruce Crawford to see if more can be done.

Community Liaison Officer: Theresa Elliot is now in post in a pilot scheme until 31st December 2016. Her role is to provide a link with Stirling Council and bring services from the Council to the community.

Killin to Crianlarich Road: There are a number of potholes on this road which have not been dealt with despite being reported two months ago. The new Area Manager is George Fiddes. Breadalbane Park: The wall on the left hand side of the park entrance has sustained significant damage at the weekend. S. Inglis will check as it is unclear whether this is the responsibility of SC or the householder next to the park. Date of next meeting: Tuesday 10th May 2016, 19.30 at Killin Primary School.

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Badgers bid for mile high club

So spring has sprung, giving us some wonderful sunny, if chilly, days to cheer us up after an unbelievably wet winter. It is said that Valentines Day is when the birds choose their mates and it is certainly more or less that date when the small garden birds begin their songs. For many years it has been on or very near that date that the oystercatchers return to this area. They are usually seen about a week before around Aberfeldy and Dull.

Our squirrels have stayed with us all winter and one was busy this morning repeatedly chasing off a chaffinch who was pecking at the nut crumbs that the squirrel was making. Sometimes it is the chaffinch who is the bully chasing off our long tailed tit from the feeders.

It is also said that in spring a young man's fancy - or a young anything else for that matter. Actually many animals mate well before this time to ensure that the young are born in late spring to early summer so that young can take advantage of the better food supply offered in these months. So stags rut in autumn and calves are born in the following summer

Some species, such as roe deer and badgers and some seals, even have a facility known as delayed implantation. This means that mating can take place at any time (every opportunity taken) and the fertilized egg is not implanted till the appropriate time to ensure that the young are born at the most propitious time. Roe rut July to August with the possibility of a second round in November to December but implantation is delayed for 40 or 24 weeks so that kids are born May to June when the grass and the particularly tasty plants in our gardens are at their best. In the case of the badger,

mating can take place in spring and again in late summer, with a gestation period of nine to twelve months. Embryological studies suggest that spring is the main time for fertilisation but cubs are not born till almost a year later. A couple of badgers with 'the spring feeling' defied the fact that they are usually nocturnal by mating in full daylight at the beginning of March this year. Not only that but they were 1,712 feet up, obviously thinking that they were safe at that height. They were observed during the annual deer count on Glen Falloch. Let that be a lesson to remember. When we lived in Sutherland the stalker told us that folk should remember never to do anything on the remote hills that you wouldn't do in your garden as you never know who (usually a stalker spying the hill with his telescope) may see. I will not tell you the stories which followed. But it would be worse to be like a pair of very passionate badgers which burrowed their sett under a church in Derbyshire and put their own' music' to Evensona.

A recent survey at Chernobyl has found no evidence of a negative impact on deer numbers due to radiation. There are roe, red and elk in the area. Neither is there any evidence that this could be the source of Rudolf's shiny red nose!

The A.G.M. of Deer Management Groups in Kingussie in February was attended by 200 representatives working with deer. The proposed land reform bill and the reintroduction of sporting rates were discussed along with powers for S.N.H. to intervene. It was stated that £140.8m of expenditure in Scotland is dependent on deer management. There are 2,532 jobs in deer management, of which 1,372 are paid. Let's hope that it is sustained. Oil has let the economy down so it is hoped that what we have left is respected.

Our dogs had an exciting day when we took them to get chipped. They were a bit worried as we had been chipping tree branches and they wondered what was in store but had a great time in the end. Dogs' Trust were doing a session at Amulree village hall and we had a fabulous, if snowy, run over Glen Quaich which is a route I can recommend in summer. We saw several grouse, though one was being eved by a kite. There were also flocks of peewits and oystercatchers. Noticeable that they were thriving in a keepered glen! At the hall there was a forest of keepers' vehicles and each one was packed with dogs. They were all very excited but marvellously behaved. Our two, who seldom see other dogs, were spellbound. It was also good to see the donations jars filling up nicely. Since then one dog has been especially affectionate but I don't know if it's a side effect of the chip or an after effect of the meteorite. Just after the flash he went into nervous 'I hear thunder' mode and has not been quite himself since. Did anyone else notice anything similar in their animals due to this? Or maybe he's just waiting for the sort of chips that go with fish! Remember that from April 6th it is law that all dogs are microchipped. Not sure when it will apply to cats!

On the same day that the badgers were spied, foxy was observed having a rough time of it. A line of stags was walking through the snow and one suddenly lowered its head and charged, very narrowly missing its target of a fox who had probably been having a quiet snooze. Something else to be aware of if you're lying out on the hill.

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Mervyn's Old Weather

Something a little different for this edition of the Killin News and a complete change from my usual doleful dirge concerning more recent summer Seasons! I should like to take you back to 1933, when, aged 6 years, I began to take an interest in weather conditions. This interest gradually extended over the years and culminated, for me, in the privilege of being invited to contribute to the Killin News.

The following excerpts are taken from a newspaper article that appeared in "The Impartial Reporter" of Autumn 1933. This publication covers Fermanagh and South Tyrone and describes the Vintage Summer of that year. The article is entitled September Harvest - Finished Minus Shower - Driest Month for 35 Years' and was written by WM. J. Gibson, Meteorological Officer, Warringstown. "September's rainfall was small, the total - which fell on seven days amounted to 1.08 ins. The maximum daily fall, 1.11 ins. on the 19th, fell during two hours, and was the product of a thunderstorm. The total of 1.68 ins. for September is 1.90 ins. below the average of the past 11 years (3.58 ins.) and is .86 ins. below that of the standard period of 35 vears (2.54 ins.) from 1818 to 1913. No words can express the beauty of the past month, and the harvest was finished without a shower. The only rain of any value fell on the 19th, and caused the pastures to resume verdure somewhat. The honeysuckle (Lonicera) blossomed for a second time in 1933, and during September the hedgerows were as redolent with its nectarine odour as in June. The summer of 1933 ended at 12 noon G.M.T. on the 23rd. A remarkable summer it was, if not for anything else for its spells of super-'fine' weather, with which apparently the whole of the Kingdom has been favoured. It is 1911 since there was a parallel - 22 years ago." The article then continues to point out the numerous droughts that occurred from the 13th century onwards "..... when water engineering of the magnitude of the present day was a thing unknown."

"In the 13th century in England, during the reign of Henry III, droughts occurred on no less than nine occasions. Matthew Paris' Chronicle, quoting for the year 1236 states - 'In the summer, after a winter



beyond measure, rainy, there was a constant drought, attended by an almost unendurable heat, which lasted four months or more. The marshes and lakes were dried up to their very bottoms, water mills stood useless, whilst the earth gaped with numerous fissures.'

In 1252 - Great drought in England all spring and summer. During March, April and May the earth was parched by a burning sun. The sun's immoderate heat so burnt the earth that all herbage withered, and meadows refused food to cattle. Because of the exceeding hot nights, there was such an abundance of fleas, flies and gnats that people were weary of their lives."

Mr Gibson then points out that there were fourteen droughts in the 14th century, seven in the 15th, eighteen in the 16th, thirty seven in the 17th century and forty three in the 18th century. During the 19th century droughts occurred thirty three times. "In Ireland in 1818 it was the hottest summer for years. Scarcely any rain fell for the space of nine months, so that springs and rivers dried up. Hot, dry and burning from the end of May until September."

Having just endured "a winter beyond measure, rainy," we can only hope for some "spells of super-'fine' weather" in the months to come. However, we could perhaps do without a drought, along with all the difficulties that would still bring, despite the magnitude of the water engineering of today.

Priority Based Budgeting

The Community Council sent a letter to all local councillors (copied to the Stirling Observer) in support of the parent bodies objections to the proposed merger of the headship of Crianlarich & Killin schools and nurseries. The CC are delighted that Stirling Council listened to the strong views of the local communities on this issue and did not include it in the final budget proposals.

WHW issues

A meeting has been arranged with Gordon Forrester of LLTNP to assess both the WHW pathway from the underpass at the Crianlarich bypass and the Cattle Creep crossing in Tyndrum. These are two issues which the CC has raised on numerous occasions and is frustrated at the lack of action.

Broadband

It is understood that Tyndrum is due for upgrade to fibre optic broadband in summer 2016, although an exact date is not yet known. It is thought that the Crianlarich exchange will be upgraded in 2017. The CC will continue to monitor the available information from BT regarding these dates.

Toilet Cleaning

An arrangement has been reached with Stirling Council whereby a local person has been contracted to clean both Crianlarich & Tyndrum public toilets twice per day. This is something which the CC has lobbied hard for, and it is hoped that this will



av

result in an improved level of cleanliness, particularly during the busy summer months.



Community Resilience Plan

Cllr Hayes has urged the community to look again at writing a formal community resilience plan. Some of the flooding issues experienced in other parts of the Stirling Council area over the winter have highlighted the difficulties in co-ordinating a community response to a major incident without a written down plan. Sheona has offered to take this forward on behalf of Strathfillan CC.

Community Council Website

After several years of good service, it was agreed that our existing community council website at www.scottishdemocracy.com has become outdated and a more modern style site is now needed. Local resident Ian Marrett has kindly agreed to look at a creating a possible replacement site for the CC. More details of the new site will be available soon. In the meantime, we will continue to use

scottishdemocracy.com. The CC would particularly like to thank Gavin Macnab for all his hard work in setting up, maintaining and administering the site for many years.

Environment

Last year plants for the community flower tubs were kindly donated by Corachie Clematis, although this year we may need to purchase plants for the tubs. It is hoped that the primary school and/or nursery may be able to adopt a few tubs, to help with looking after these over the summer months. Falcon has kindly offered to donate some Scots Pine, Beech & Oak trees which would be gratefully utilised within Crianlarich and/or Tyndrum woodlands.



Killin Hosts Drama Festival

Hot on the heels of a busy January, with Pantomime and Burns Supper commitments, Killin Drama Club knuckled down to the task of learning lines for the annual SCDA Drama Festival, held here in Killin in early

March. Sadly there were not many local faces in our audience, unlike the Panto when we can fill the hall! Seven teams competed in the event which included former British Champions Fintry with their award winning Adult and Youth teams, but Killin held its head high with two very different plays. Opening the event was Helen Wyngard's "Into the Mist" with Glenda

Mardon and Gordon Hibbert playing the roles of Margaret Rutherford and Stringer Davis in a very moving play about dementia in the actress's later life.(photo above) Directed by Lesley Syme, this was a UK premiere, having been performed only in Australia prior to this festival. Book Review Mr Mac and Me by Esther Freud

"Mr Mac" is Charles Rennie Mackintosh and "Me" is Thomas, an eleven year old lame boy who narrates the story which is set during the First World War. Thomas endures a hard life, having an abusive, alcoholic father and a poor hardworking mother who has lost six boys in infancy. They live in an inn in Walberswick, a Suffolk coastal village. It is thought that this coastline is the most likely place for an invasion, so everyone is suspicious of strangers. The Defence of the Realm Act (DORA) - "See Everything, Hear Everything, Say Nothing" is in force. Mackintosh comes to recover from pneumonia and paint flowers, his architectural work having dried up as the government have decreed there will be no new building. He arouses suspicion of being a German spy by wandering along the coast at night, in a great black cloak with binoculars around his neck and is eventually arrested by the local constabulary and held for two days.

This is the crux of the story but woven around are so many other stories. We hear of the war through soldiers being billeted at the inn, refugees from Belgium and the slaughter of the 2nd Suffolk Battalion at Le Cateau. Girls come down from the Scottish Highlands to gut the herring.



Holidaymakers stay for the summer. Thomas has a part-time job working with a rope-maker. His ambition is to go to sea so we have the maritime and rope-making lingos spattered throughout the dialogue. Thomas, with Mackintosh and his artist wife Margaret, develop a quiet companionship. They encourage his love of drawing ships. There are huge differences between their lives – Thomas having so little and having to work so hard helping his mother, whereas Mac and Margaret live a frugal but refined life.

I loved the way Freud told the tale through the eyes of Thomas. He is a lonely boy, desperate for adventure. Whereas the villagers are suspicious, he looks for pictorial examples of Mackintosh's buildings and wonders if he has been sent to design their own fortress.

I learnt so much about the lives and works of Mackintosh and Margaret. Freud cleverly tells us historical details through letters sent between the two. I love a book that makes me do my own research afterwards and this one certainly did. I saw Mackintosh's beautiful paintings of flowers, which are part of the story, and paintings from his time in France in his later years. There is a lot more to Mackintosh's work than his fantastic buildings!

Moirlanich Longhouse

Not far up Glen Lochay, the National Trust for Scotland cares for Moirlanich Longhouse, a 19th century byre dwelling indicative of many of the cottages that would have existed in this area, with its distinctive cruck frame construction.

It is open to the public from May to September for two afternoons per week and is staffed by volunteers mainly from the Killin Heritage Society. It is one of the few visitor attractions locally and an important example of our heritage. We desperately need new volunteers to share the load, particularly on Wednesday afternoons but also for Sunday afternoons. We open from 2pm until 5pm and the National Trust for Scotland will provide training and support to ensure all our guides have information and stories about the property and daily life to share. Volunteers work in pairs, one to greet visitors in the Display Hut and one within the house. With a reasonable number of volunteers, we aim to allocate everyone a slot to cover roughly once a month-5 times per year. Volunteers are then entitled to free entry to all National Trust for Scotland properties and a 20% discount in NTS shops.

Fresh Air in Killin?

Walking up Main Sreet these days is becoming an unpleasant and unhealthy experience as there are several car owners in the village who leave their car engines running whilst in the shops or when sitting in the car waiting for a passenger to finish at the shops. An empty running car is also an open invitation for any passing thief, so for your sake and ours, please turn off your engine.



We all recognise this monument as part of Killin but how many of us know anything about it? It stands in front of the Killin Hotel but is also in front of the Parish Church and in fact the connection is more to the church. The Gaelic inscription on the front offers little clue to most people but the one in English on the back tells us it was erected in memory of the Rev. James Stewart, 1700-1789, Minister in Killin for 52 years, who made the first Scottish Gaelic translation of the Bible. The monument was put up by the Perth Gaelic Society - it doesn't say when - and they have been responsible for its upkeep ever since.

Stewart Memorial

From an excerpt from the Minute book of their society in 1928 we learn of the expense of two guineas ' for the upkeep and repair of the Stewart Memorial in Killin'. In 1964, however, the Killin An Comunn Ghaidlaiach apparently contacted the Perth Society 'regarding the bad state' of the memorial.

At the beginning of March this year an elderly gentleman was seen on a ladder hard at work cleaning the monument and putting pots of bulbs around it. This was John Rennie, the Chief of the Perth Gaelic Society, who is now in his eighties. He explained that the Society had for an unspecified number of years paid £10 a year to 'someone in the Killin Hotel' to look after it but he didn't know who or whether the work had ever been done so had decided to come and look for himself. As the few remaining members of the Perth Gaelic Society are all in the same age group as he is, Mr. Rennie is hoping that the task could now be taken over permanently by an organisation or person in Killin and was hoping to talk to the Minister about this. Neither the Church nor the Hotel seems to be sure who owns the land the monument stands on.

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A Carer's Story

I looked at the advert again. Time and Space: for carers by carers that's what grabbed my attention. I never thought of myself as a 'carer' it sounded too formal, too distant. All I did was look after Paul when he needed me. I knew he experienced mental health problems when we married, but back then it didn't seem to affect him really. Things are different now; he needs me more than ever, especially since he was made redundant. It's enough to make anyone depressed, but it hit him hard. Paul was a proud person, liked to look after his family. Now he's no job, no money and is unable to get out of the depression that gripped him. The advert said get support for vourself from someone who understands. I knew I needed support; things were starting to get really on top of me. I was anxious about money, the roof over our heads, and trying to keep some semblance of normality for our kids. Paul's admission to Larbert Hospital was the final straw so the next morning I called Time and Space and arranged to meet them. I was nervous but I'm glad I did it, as it opened a new chapter in our lives.

Within a couple of weeks I met Sarah, my peer-mentor. I was worried we wouldn't get along but as it turned out we have a lot in common – both of us



have kids of similar age and support husbands with mental health problems. She's been a massive help. I can talk frankly to her about my life and my feelings of guilt and resentment. She doesn't judge me. Instead she encourages me to think 'what do I want for my own life?' It was quite hard at first because it made me realise how much I had let slip, especially my friendship with my oldest friend. However, it gave me a fresh start and some personal goals to work towards. They wouldn't sound like much to other people, but they are really important to me. Life is improving. Paul is getting support now, but a large part of the change is within myself. Having someone to talk things over with and who is interested in me is comforting. I've met new and interesting people who have similar stories to share. I've even got back in touch with my old friend - something I would never had thought possible awhile ago. Things aren't perfect, whose life is? My life is getting better and the black clouds are liftina.

As residents of Killin, we are blessed. some may say cursed, by the opportunity to share our lives with some wild and occasionally zany characters. They come in all shapes and sizes. Sadly we cannot rely on them always being around as they, like us, are all hugely sensitive and vulnerable to the changes in our environment that are now worldwide. Already we are missing the plethora of brightly coloured, delicate butterflies and the background chorus of bees buzzing in our gardens. We may not enjoy being chased by wasps or bitten by our friendly midges, but we really do need them all. Our seasonal house martins bring unwelcome piles of excrement to window ledges beneath their homely creations, whilst some local swallows clearly have a sense of humour. nesting beneath the shutters at Shutters Restaurant and, if we pause to peer upward at the right moment, we may be privileged to see the youngsters being fed. Further entertainment may be had by

listening to the cacophony of sparrow chatter whilst walking down Main St. Even the annoving presence of an army of ants on the garden path can be fascinating if you sit and watch their amazing organisational skills and transport systems. The thrushes always relish the chance of a juicy free feast from insects such as these. Depending on where you live in the village, we await our personal favourites returning to the same spot each year, like the wagtails that nest and feed precariously near the rushing waters of the Falls of Dochart, or the noisy oyster catchers who take over at the head of the loch. Regular features include our raucous rooks living in multi-storev luxury atop the trees growing on the island at the Falls. They can be nightmare noisy neighbours, especially at nesting time when they see themselves as the equivalent of strongmen, attempting to carry huge loads of gnarled sticks, particularly from back gardens along Gray St. Their failure in these gallant efforts litters the roofs and road with sticks, adding to the usual large splats of "guano" on roofs and windows of both houses and vehicles, a fun time for all. Watching them feeding their eventual offspring who

are bigger and fatter than their parents, can provide much pleasure on a dreich day. Just now, traffic chaos is being caused by our friendly neighbourhood ducks enjoying a daily stroll/snooze in the middle of Main St. Some of us share our gardens with frogs and toads, perhaps hedgehogs and red deer, pine martens, foxes, badgers and red squirrel families with their hilarious antics and skilled acrobatics. Local enthusiasts enjoy the challenge of fishing our rivers and loch, especially the thrill of catching a good sized salmon or trout, a habit shared by the ospreys who frequent Loch Tay. Red kite remain rather shy of Killin, seeming to prefer the deep south of England and mid Wales. where feeding stations abound, but we can spy them and the rarer golden eagle if we lift our gaze skyward at iust the right moment. Do our healthy population of beavers and otters also keep an eye out for them or are they trying to avoid being spotted by Tim in case they feature in his next Frost Report? We now eagerly await that magic of hearing the songs of our curlews and cuckoos and spying the first returning swallows. Lets hope the midges are friendlier this year!
