Breadalbane Park

Phase 1 of Breadalbane Park has been completed with a handover meeting between KAT, the design team, MW Groundworks (contractor)and Stirling Council. There are a few things in the play park that need addressing - one of the springy animals is broken and the springy seesaw base is loose. The contractor will reset the seesaw. Stirling Council bought the springy animals for KAT in 2011 and kept them in storage until we started work on the park. Stirling Council have contacted the manufacturer and they will be sending a replacement seat which they will fit. The wooden elephant has been removed - Stirling Council are going to refurbish it and it will be returned once this work has been carried out. The maintenance of the whole park is now Stirling Council's responsibility and they will be spraying the paths to kill the grass and weeds growing there. Stirling Council are also going to see if they can find some money to try and sort the drainage at the roundhouse to stop the large puddle forming when it rains, to replace the guttering, paint the seats and remove the graffiti. There is no guarantee that they will be able to do this work this year, but we are hopeful they will. Other areas on which we hope to

Other areas on which we hope to work with Stirling Council are: Wild flower seeding, orchard tree plantingand looking for further funding for phase 2.

Dog Mess in the Park

It has come to our notice through people mentioning it to either Sheila or Ron Allner that the amount of dog mess in the park has become a serious problem People must realise this is a serious risk to young children's health and several have

gone home covered in it. The Park is a recreation area, not a convenient dog toilet. Stirling Council are going to put up notices at the entrances to the park to remind people to pick up after their dogs. They will provide the Community Council with spray to put on any dog mess found in the park so that we can see the extent of the problem. The street cleaning team will also inspect the park weekly. There are free dog poo bags available from Killin library and the fine for not picking up after your dog is £80.

Old Mill Development

We have received planning permission for all the external works (lift and biomass housing) and are still working on the Big Lottery application which will be submitted by the end of August.

Killin and District Sport and Leisure Club

The arrangement between the Sport Pavilion and Killin Hotel is working well and more people are using the facilities than last year.

100 Club members this year are able to use the facilities for free - they just have to take their letter to the Killin Hotel and sign the register and collect equipment. Even if you have your own equipment, please still register at the Killin Hotel as it gives us a record of how many people are using the facilities and this will help with future funding applications.

Internet Café

The numbers have been steady over June and July which is great to see, with a lot of new people coming back to learn more about their laptop or device. All are learning quickly and are enjoying the experience of using a computer or

tablet. The sessions have given them confidence to go away and explore their device to see what more they can do.

The café is a drop in and runs every Thursday 11am to 3pm in the Library. Sessions cost £1.50 per hour and 50p for a tea/coffee and biscuit. The library is open for people to use during this time, if you have your library card, for taking out books and returning them, photocopying and printing.

Windows 10 workshop

Free upgrade to windows 10 had to be done by 29^{th} July 2016. If you have completed this upgrade but are still finding it confusing, you can attend a workshop at the Library on Thursday 18^{th} August 1-3pm to take you through the basics of using Windows 10. Cost £3.00 with free Tea/Coffee & Biscuit)

Killin and District Telephone Book

Since the 1970s a Killin and District Telephone Book has been published every two or three years as a useful tool for local people which has also raised money for good causes – initially the Kirk and latterly the Falls of Dochart Retirement Home.

Killin News volunteers have produced the last several books and last year we started a new one but production was interrupted by the flooding of our office and our temporary move to the Killin Hotel. Coming back to it now, we have been wondering whether or not there is still a need for such a book in the digital age when people have address books on their own phones. Working on the book takes a lot of time and is not exactly exciting so we wouldn't mind a bit not doing it! Everything has to be checked several times and, in order to make the book as comprehensive as possible, in past years we have spent a lot of time phoning, sometimes several times, people who were in before and haven't returned a form. Quite frankly we have better uses for our time.

A straw poll, however, showed that people do value and use the book so we are proposing to go ahead but with a slightly different system.

We are not sending out any more forms for people to fill in.

We will put together the information from forms received last summer and will publish a list showing IN BLACK the numbers received or confirmed last year.

IN RED will be the names of people in the last book who have not returned a form

If your name is in red and you want an entry you can mark it 'As Before' or make an amendment.

For a new entry put your name, address and telephone number on a piece of paper and leave it with the list.

Lists will be placed in Killin Library, News First and Crianlarich Store shortly after this Killin News comes out. There you can check your entry and amend it with any changes since last year – and tell us of people who have left the area or died.

The lists will be collected on Saturday September 3rd and production of the book will begin after that.

WE WILL NOT BE PHONING people whose name is still in red and if we find too many red entries are left unchecked, we will then decided whether or not to go ahead.

Killin Community Council July

Acharn Biomass Plant: Contract arrangements will be in place by the end of July. The footpath has now been fully segregated with fencing. The work is about 2 months behind and hoping to start in early August. A further presentation will be made to the Community Council in September.

Police Report: Anti-social behaviour

Domestic assault at Acharn Lodge, 1 man arrested.

Breach of the Peace in Fingal Road. Fixed penalty issued to 1 male. Disturbance assault in a house in Lyon Road. 2 Males arrested.

Road safety

Road policing officer patrolling trunk road network particularly at weekends. Monitoring usual summer complaints of speeding motorcyclists on the trunk roads.

A Honda bike in A85 Glen Dochart tumbled down an embankment on A85.

2 males arrested and reported for Drink Driving offences

Theft

A camera pinched from back seat of insecure car in Main Street. Sheds at Immervoulin Caravan Site in Strathyre were broken into and over £3,000 of machinery stolen. A number of bikes stolen after a break-in at Strathyre Forest Cabins. There is a positive line of enquiry into the theft of over £2,000 worth of whiskies from The Green Welly Stop Whisky Shop.

Community Engagement and Reassurance: Schools out

A 10 year old girl crashed her bicycle on the cycle track near River Lochay and was airlifted to hospital but discharged a few hours later. Summer months and children are out of school and enjoying themselves. Unfortunately one or two local kids appear to be enjoying themselves too much, going by the broken bones. Take care please.

Killin Music Festival: all went well and no reports of any issues.

Tilhill Forestry: Not many people attended the consultation. There will not be an Environmental Impact Assessment unless there are enough

complaints about the lack of one. The project is only just economically viable and the slightest changes could make it unviable.

Lyon Road/Ballechroisk area:
Double yellow lines are needed by
November when parking will be
decriminalised and the statutory
rights for parking transferred to
Stirling Council.

Dochart Bridge: Ongoing. Stirling Council can cut down the trees if they are a hazard to road users and need to issue a 30 day statutory notice before work can be carried out. Parking outside the Smiddy remains a problem as is the lack of markings for cars exiting the bridge into the village.

The LLTNP Ranger Service has not been contacted about a replacement sign warning of slippery rocks on the Falls.

Parking direction sign hanging off its post on the bridge.

Scottish Water: Problem still ongoing. The Laundry has on a number of occasions had dirty water coming into machines and contaminating sheets and has been told by SW to install pumps. SW to be invited to the next meeting. Ardeonaig Road: The 40mph signs

appear to make people think they should drive faster and several vehicles have come off the road. The passing places are really bad and some are unusable or have signs are missing.

Stirling Council sprayed only the Japanese Knotweed by the road side and not what was just over the fence where it has now spread. The area of concern is near boundary to LLTNP and it was suggested that maybe they might be able to come and spray area.

KAT: (See KAT Report page 4) **A.O.C.B**.:

White Lining: There are a number of areas in the village that need the white/yellow lines repainted:

Councillor Earl suggested that the CC request a survey of all lining required in Killin highlighting the ones already identified.

Toilets: Stirling Council are going to spend £20,000 on upgrading both toilet blocks in Killin.

Street Lights: There are now three lights on 24/7, but Stirling Council will only come out if a minimum of five lights need sorting.

Episcopal Church Sign: The sign for the Episcopal church has gone and no one connected to the church knows where it is. Anyone who knows please tell Tim.

Ballechroisk 20mph Signs: Ongoing.

Dog Mess in Breadalbane Park: A continuing problem; Stirling Council are going to put up signs up at the Park entrances and send some spray that the community council can use to spray the dog mess to highlight the problem. The street cleaning team will check the park weekly to clean up any mess found and Stirling Council staff can enforce an on the spot fine of £80 for anyone seen not picking up their dog's mess.

Monemore Gardens: Complaints have been received about the gardens at 1, 4 & 7 Monemore.

Grass Cutting: The grass by pathway from Ballechroisk to Main Street has not been cut and it was also noted that the graveyard grass was getting long.

Minutes Secretary: Killin Community Council has a vacancy for a paid Minutes Secretary. Anyone interested should contact Tim Frost or Fiona Kennedy.

Parking: Bollards have been put up by Stirling Council outside Vision Hair & Beauty and Eureka £1 Shop. This does not allow for unloading access for the two businesses as they can't park on road because it's a pedestrian crossing. Removable bollards a possible answer. Monemore bus park is restricted to buses between 8am and 6pm, but is still being used by cars. Police are driving past and not dealing with it. Until the statutory rights for parking come into force in November this area is being dealt with by the Police who can deal with any vehicle that is seen as seriously obstructive or dangerous parking. After November it will be Stirling Council's responsibility.

Mervyn's weather... and more

Until 21st June (summer solstice) it used to be said one prayed for rain and thereafter it was unnecessary to do so! There is an element of truth in this quote. To mention some of the, weather-wise, more abysmal summers of the 20th century - 1946, 1948, 1950 and 1985 - each of these recorded a week or more of glorious conditions in June after which came weeks of unsettled and dismal weather.

The first week in June 2016 has given us a much appreciated taste of summer after a dark and damp winter and spring. Throughout May biting N.E. winds prohibited grass growth, yet flowering trees and shrubs blossomed extremely colourfully. Hawthorns, azaleas, chestnuts and blackthorn etc., were brilliant until the breakdown of June's "good" spell when the blossom vanished quickly. Bluebells were also brilliant until the rising tide of bracken smothered them. What then will follow the June "week of pleasure"?

Garden birds seem to be more plentiful and hungrier than usual. Goldfinches, siskins, woodpeckers etc., are in abundance plus an almost totally white chaffinch, as well as a pair of red squirrels.

As regards migrant species, oyster catchers are holding their own, as are swallows and house martins, though swifts, of which until recently there were many, are virtually absent as are ring ousels (mountain blackbirds), curlews and peewits. At one time 4 or 5 cuckoos could be heard calling simultaneously from mid April 'till early July. Now one or two call until early June when they are heard no more. Meanwhile the raptors, ground and airborne, "go forth and multiply"!

Recently there has been much media coverage on the Juno probe, which is currently orbiting the giant planet Jupiter and which we are told may investigate behind the bands of gases and mist that surround the planet and the mysterious Red Spot, thereby possibly throwing light on the origins of our own planet. The exclamation "By Jove" is rarely heard nowadays but may come back into fashion. The word "jovial" also has connotations with Jupiter and one could say is preferable to "martial", Mars; or mercurialism - poisonous planet Mercury. Mervyn K. Browne






World War history to Life in the community

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Unveiling Of The Stewart Memorial

Extracts from long report in The Dundee Advertiser, Friday, May 23rd 1890

Yesterday the Stewart memorial erected at Killin by the Perth Gaelic Society was unveiled by Sir Robert Menzies of Menzies, Bart. The day was observed as a general holiday in the village and district, and there was a large turn-out of spectators, including many Highlanders from a distance. The ceremonies began at the Drill Hall, Killin, at mid-day, where a procession was formed, and marched, headed by pipers and escorted by a company of the Killin Volunteers, to the square in front of the Parish Church, where the memorial is erected. Here a platform was placed beside the veiled column, and a space around kept clear by ropes. (Long list of the great and the good and ceremony and speeches) In the afternoon a large company sat down to luncheon in the hall of the Killin Hotel.

After an excellent luncheon, served in best style by the host of Tigh-no-Straid, a lengthy and interesting toast-list was gone through. Songs were sung, poems read, and a very enjoyable afternoon spent. During luncheon the Killin and the Perth Pipe Bands discoursed stirring music.

Strathfillan Community Council

Community Councillors: The CC AGM was held in June. Community Councillors for the following year are as follows: John Riley (Chair), Alan Smailes (Vice-Chair & Secretary), Charlie Urguhart (Treasurer), Mary Anderson, Isla Craig, Falcon Frost, Alastair Mcdonald & Sheona MacLennan. Ian Marrett has been appointed as an Associate Community Councillor with special responsibility for Broadband and Website issues, and Mark Holt as an Associate Community Councillor with special responsibility for Tyndrum issues.

Broadband: the installation date for fibre optic broadband to Tvndrum has slipped from June 2016 until December 2016. The date for Crianlarich installation is not known, but is likely also to have slipped from early 2017. Ian Marrett is trying to find out more information for the CC. **DRT:** The planned improvements to the Strathfillan DRT service being introduced from August are very welcome. It is understood that the hours of operation for the service will be increased to be from 07:00-22:00 Monday to Saturday and that there will be additional fixed timetable links between Killin & Crianlarich. At the time of writing the new timetable has not been published, but is understood to be taking effect from 1st August.

New bins: Concerns were raised about the changes to refuse collections being introduced by Stirling Council and the lack of public awareness of these changes. At the request of the Community Council an additional drop-in information event was organised by Stirling Council.

Health Roadshow: Following the difficulties encountered getting the planned outreach surgery started, the CC & SCDT have been working with Stirling Council and NHS Forth Valley to explore other ways to make access to healthcare easier for people in Strathfillan. NHSFV are hosting a "roadshow" event in Crianlarich (6th September) and Tyndrum (7th September). Please come along to one of these events and have your say - the more views expressed the hetter!

Tyndrum Improvements: Mark Holt is working with other Tyndrum residents to come up with a plan for improvements desired for Tyndrum. Mark is planning a public meeting, with the aim of forming an action group to look at issues, priorities and next steps for both the short and longer term. The CC members unanimously agreed with this idea and SCDT will be very happy to provide support when the action group is formed.

Next Meeting: The remaining meetings for 2016 are on Tuesday 6th September, Tuesday 4th October and Tuesday 1st November. Meetings are held at 7.30pm in Crianlarich Hall and all community members are welcome to attend.

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Families

We all know how exhausting it can be looking after a young family so spare a thought or two for our garden birds who have a long day, literally from dawn till dusk, feeding families of half a dozen or so little ones. The voung of the siskins can't sit still and squabble all the time using half the energy that they are gaining from their parents' feeding effort. The voung woodpeckers are sent off to foray for themselves. They have to learn that trying to perch on the side of a metal post is not going to go well and hiding behind a tree trunk does not necessarily mean that your argumentative siblings won't find you and chase you off. The sparrows go about teaching table manners at an early age and line up their tiny ones along the fence in a neat row to flutter their wings to be fed. The chaffinches dump their children anywhere near food to get it over with as soon as possible. Easily the cutest are the young robins in their natty flecked outfits and the newly polished blue tits, although they do seem to frequent the veggie patch for an odd seed and a dust bath. Just recently, on the North York moors, we were lucky enough to see a covey of grouse with a good hatching of chicks. The moors are proving to be a conservation area for curlew breeding too. Last year the curlew was put on the British Trust for Ornithology endangered red list but since then moorland keepers have been supported by the 'gift of grouse' campaign in their Muirburn policy which creates microhabitats suitable for curlews and their chicks. Local grouse chicks also seem to be doing fairly well as there was a large number of crane flies about when the chicks needed insect food. On the high hills locally two of my keeper sons were lucky enough to see a covey of ptarmigan chicks and on one of the high ridges I saw a couple of ring ouzels and about 20 golden plovers and enjoyed hearing their beautiful eerie voices in the silence.

Even more entertaining lately have been the young squirrels. It is evident that they, like woodpeckers, need to learn a lot about garden living and foraging. The other morning we woke up to find a little red face looking at us through the window. He was sitting on a PVA windowsill so it wasn't long before he

fell off. He then discovered that a thin stem of clematis was not a good landing place. We have three young squirrels who occasionally come at the same time and the games of tick amongst the feeders is really entertaining. One youngster often comes alone and I think that his parents maybe ran away from the circus as his antics sliding off windowsills, drainpipes and soft leafy branches are really daring acrobatics. He has mastered the squirrel feeder, so well in fact that he pops in and stays inside till he has eaten his fill, just occasionally popping his head out to check for danger.

One animal well known for babies is the rabbit. On the roadside at Lochearnhead and Crieff you can see the odd rabbit kit and Dall farm sheds has a population. My wife says that she will wage war on them if they venture as far as our garden. The same ban does not seem to apply to the leveret that comes as far as the fence.

One bird which did not appear to have any family ties gave us a bit of a shock. We thought that we had mistaken Loch Tay for Lake Victoria as there appeared to be an egret on the beach. It was a pure white heron. Has anyone else seen it around?

It is to be hoped that both red deer and the human 'folk of the glens' will be able to still raise families in some areas. It is reported in Western areas such as Rhum that red deer are becoming a rarity rather than a regular part of the scenery, according to Iain Thornber writing in The Oban Times. Certainly around here spotting stags and hinds is not as easy as it used to be. In some areas deer of all species are viewed as vermin by forestry companies. Some of our glens, such as Ettrick, have faced the new clearances. Instead of 'the big sheep' coming it is trees. Glens which were once a thriving community of farm and estate workers with a school, church and village hall are now empty - except for the trees and ghosts. They bring work only at planting and harvesting 30 years later but leave the land, in all respects, desolate and empty. Little regard seems to be felt for the farming communities but the recent popular series 'This Farming Life' has brought this to the fore for both rural and urban viewers. The programme

has received the National Sheep Association award for its contribution to educating viewers into the lives of Scottish farming families. Maybe it should be made compulsory viewing for M.S.P.s and the like?

At least the farming families do not vet have to contend with wolves bringing along their pups for lamb dinners. In a simulation, wolf numbers stabilized at 25 per 1000 sa, km, after initial expansion. This is comparable to unmanaged populations in Bialowieze forest in Poland. Yellowstone has 100 wolves in an area a tenth of the size of Scotland and is held to be a shining example of good practice. The wolves kill 22 elk per year. The cull of red deer in Scotland is over 110,000 per annum. Divide 110,000 by 22 and you get approx. 5,000 wolves needed. Do the maths and you will find that Scotland just isn't big enough to sustain enough wolves to control deer numbers. Take into account large urban areas also - or should we consider urban wolves as they do have dangerous urban coyotes in Vancouver?

It is Mr or maybe Mrs Urban fox, who is looking after her family this week. On a late night stroll from Asda in Edinburgh one of our grandsons came upon a fox. Apparently it was very partial to hand-fed Fridge Raider snacks! He said that he didn't like to tell it what he often did in his holidays!! 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Kindrochit Challenge

On Saturday 9th July, the 16th Artemis Great Kindrochit Challenge took place, on a day when the challenging weather conditions pushed the participants to their limits. It's one of Scotland's toughest one-day endurance events, and over the years has raised over £7 million for Mercy Corps and Mary's Meals. This year's total is expected to be £200.000.

The Quadrathletes competed in both pairs and relay teams starting at Kindrochit (Ardtalnaig) with a 1.35km swim across Loch Tay, followed by a 24km run over the seven Munros in the Ben Lawers range (including 2,500m of ascent). After an 11km kayak back to Kindrochit, they jumped on their bikes and cycled the 54km circuit of Loch Tay.

Despite open water temperatures of just 14 degrees Celsius, one participant set a new event record for the swim section, crossing the loch in just 17 minutes and fifty-one seconds. Jake Hewlett and Neilson Rutherford both finished in first place after the swim, with a rounded up time of 18 minutes.

Winning times were 8hrs 51 mins for the Male Team, 11hrs 46 mins for the Female Team and 12hrs 45 mins for the Mixed Team. Each team over the final finish line chopped a watermelon in half with a claymore sword and the night ended with a fabulous fireworks display and a ceilidh, led by live band Heid. WildFox Events would like to thank all the local landowners, mountain rescue teams from across Scotland, volunteers from Mary's Meals and Mercy Corps, and the sponsor Artemis, without whose generous support and continued loyalty the event would not be possible.

Alistair Ferguson 13.5.48–18.4.16

My husband died on 18th April in Strathcarron Hospice .

He was born in Falkirk and spent his early years in rural Greenhill near Bonnybridge, with his parents and elder siblings Mary and Tom. The family then moved into the town and Alistair began to play truant from Denny High School, However when he was 15, he was persuaded to join the Royal Navy and this was the making of him. He trained as a radio electrical mechanic, spent eighteen months at HMS St Angelo, Malta, on his way to becoming a petty officer radio electrician. He volunteered for the submarine service and in September 1972 crossed the Arctic Circle in the nuclear submarine HMS Dreadnought. He studied and gained A level English Language and Literature GCE, but found time to gain a glider pilot's licence and be a founder member of Dolphin Hang Gliding Club. His naval character was described as very good throughout and when he left the service in May 1975 his commanding officer described him as a "cheerful, enthusiastic man who should do well outside the Royal Navy". He continued to study with the Open

University and gained membership of

Management before beginning a two

year course in teacher training at

the Institute of Supervisory

Putteridgebury College in

at the Royal School for Deaf Children in Margate, qualifying as a teacher of the deaf in June 1979. His next move was to Milton Keynes where he was a maths and science teacher at a special unit for hearing impaired children at Stantonbury Campus, meanwhile setting up home with me in Banbury. Always missing his beloved Caledonia, he next accepted a post in the Gorbals, Glasgow, as senior lecturer at Havfield Rehabilitation Unit for deaf adults. Alistair spent many an evening hosting at our quest house in Callander, serving his free homemade wine at dinner or making elderberry and apple iam for the breakfast tables. In October 1989, this quiet, modest but popular man, finally decided to run away with me to Gretna Green for a wedding ceremony over the anvil, celebrated with friends and family. Lifelong student and always accepting a challenge, he embarked on a third career, qualified as a financial advisor and set up Alexanders Finance Ltd in 1996. Alistair was too busy to retire, but when we moved to Killin for a guieter life, he spent more time enjoying the countryside when walking our golden retrievers or fishing for salmon. He loved holidays abroad, ballroom dancing and meetings and trips with the Submariners' Association. Last November, his bravely born idiosyncratic pulmonary fibrosis deteriorated and in March, cancer was diagnosed. He is sorely missed by his son Murray, his daughter-inlaw Shona, granddaughter Daisy and grandson Comhnall and by me. 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

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
Sports Day


