Editorial

The world outside Killin remains unsettled and unpredictable in very many ways but life in Killin continues as usual. Autumn has arrived and it is not yet time to think about Christmas, although Christmas things are now appearing in some shops. The school year is well started and groups and classes are starting up again in the village, catering for a wide variety of interests. Physical interests are provided by sports like badminton and by yoga, Walk in the Park, etc. Mental activity is stimulated by book clubs, new U3A classes in Killin (and many more in Callander and Forth Valley U3As). There are also many special interest groups - the SWI, crafts groups, the Heritage Society, EAK, etc., to mention but a few. 

The End of an Era



On 1st September Dr. David Syme retired from the medical practice in Killin after exactly 34 years of caring for the residents of Killin and the wider area. A substantial amount was donated for a retirement gift of vouchers to spend on his outdoor pursuits plus a bottle of his favourite tipple. The gifts and a card signed by many locals were presented to him at the Killin Hotel by Kay Riddell, Linda Frost and Alastair and Beatrice MacDonald.

After studying medicine and GP training in Edinburgh, Dr. Syme was working as a locum in Dunkeld when he learnt that Dr Mairi was looking for a partner in the practice in Killin. He came over for a chat and the rest is history. At that time the doctor's surgery was attached to Loch Tay Cottage and he continued to practice there for his first ten years. The present surgery was opened in 1992 by Dr. Syme and Dr. David Blaney. After several changes over the years, the practice is now being carried on by Dr. Watson and Dr. Mill.

I am sure we all wish Dr. Syme well in his retirement and all the best in the future to both him and to the team now running the practice.

**Project Manager’s Report
Breadalbane Park**

Ron and I had a meeting with John Barr – Grass Cutting and Biodiversity for Stirling Council – on Friday 2nd September. John would like to do some wild flower planting and put some orchard trees into Breadalbane Park. It was agreed that it would be nice to have some colour in the park and a small area could be used for wild flowers and some orchard trees. The Council will be renewing the guttering on the roundhouse with a cast iron guttering and cleaning it up.

Play Park

A summary of discussions with Stirling Council since May:
The large seesaw has been taken away to be refurbished and will be replaced as soon as the work is complete - no timescale as yet. Stirling Council will arrange for the four springs left to be covered properly.
Small springy animal seesaw – in July we noticed that the seat of this had broken in one place and cracked in two others. Stirling Council arranged for a replacement seat and one new head. This has been fitted and since then another head has been removed and lost. Stirling Council have ordered a replacement which takes six weeks.
The exposed grid at the entrance could be a trip hazard for small children – Stirling Council will arrange for top soil to be put down. The fence was broken a few weeks ago. Stirling Council has removed the broken fence and assessed the rest of the fencing which is all pretty rotten. The cost to replace it all would be in the region of £5,000 which Stirling Council do not have so they would like to take the fence away. It was suggested that they wait until after a meeting with interested residents who might be

concerned. There are several options:
Replace all the fencing which would need funding from elsewhere than Stirling Council and it might then have to be moved when the park is redesigned.
Fence in the pre-school area which is the long term plan for the park
Have the fence removed but Stirling Council put up a new fence where it is broken going towards the McLaren Hall /chip van. This would only need to be a wire fence rather than something substantial as would need to be around the play area.
If you have any opinion on the options above please let me know.

Old Mill

We submitted our Big Lottery Application for Growing Community Assets on Monday 29th August and now have to wait for their assessment to be completed. The assessment could take a minimum of four months but we are hoping to have an answer by Christmas. KAT would like to thank Sonya Linskaill and her team for all the work they did regarding the building works of the project and SKS Scotland who did a great job in putting together our business plan and helping us pull the application together. Without the support of both professional teams we would not have been able to put in such a good application.

Killin Community Council September Meeting

Acharn Biomass Update: Footpath will be reinstated in 4 weeks.

Security fencing has been erected. The site will produce 5.54 megawatts. Staffing will be from March 2017 and full staff by June. Locals will be recruited where possible and Robertson Contractors may be able to donate some grants locally. E.A.K. will be invited to next meeting.

Road Lining: Both yellow and white to be completed in village in the coming weeks. Tree cutting and new markings at Dochart Bridge to be carried out.

Water Pressure And Sewage Smell: Ongoing with Scottish Water.

Forestry Commission: To be contacted re proposed Morenish Woodland project.

Ardeonaig Road: A stretch has been resurfaced and stretches chipped but there are still outstanding issues.

Street Lighting: Problems appear to be remedied.

Ballechroisk: 20m.p.h. signs are awaiting update .

Dog Warden: To be asked to visit again re fouling.

Monemore: 3 piece suite has been uplifted from garden but ongoing issues with 3 unkempt gardens.

Cemetery: Grass to be cut every 10 days in season except when bulbs in flower.

Police Report: Antisocial behaviour – Drugs warrant executed in Tyndrum, 2 persons apprehended for breach of bail conditions relating to domestic incidents, 1 person charged for disturbance at Lochearnhead Games dance.

Road Safety – R.P. officer patrolling trunk roads monitoring speeding motorcyclists.

Thefts – Enquiries into cycle thefts, repeated thefts from N.T. Lawers car park,

Community engagement – School zig zags and crossing monitored. Motorists spoken to re pavement parking at Myrtle Grove and hairdressers. Highland Games and Agricultural Show caused no issues.

Incidents – Police and Killin Mountain Rescue called in Coastguard helicopter to assist in rescue near Tyndrum Young walker in fluorescent jacket hit by van on Ardeonaig road received only minor injury.

Electricity for the park incurs a standing charge of approx. £100 annually and K.C.C. do not use it. Talks to be had with Games and Show committees.

Trunk Road Emergency Sign Boxes have been located in key places between Callander and Tyndrum to enable quick road closure information to be given in emergencies.

Waste collection: New waste collection rolled out in 8 week period from September 5th.

Litter in Park: Police have been asked to monitor litter in roundhouse.

The Big Shed has been awarded £10,000 by lottery funding to carry out a feasibility study and consultation regarding a 22mile path along the North side of Loch Tay. This is intended to be for walkers, cyclists and horse riders.


Courier Tokens: People to be encouraged to collect minibus tokens from The Courier to win a community minibus.

U3A comes to Killin!

Do you have a particular interest or hobby that you would like to share with other people? If so, the U3A could be the way to arrange that. The name U3A stands for "University of the Third Age". It is an organisation, which aims to help older people to enrich their lives by offering affordable and enjoyable local groups. The name "university" is a bit misleading, as this is not a regulated educational institution; it is simply a group of people who want to share a common interest or maybe improve their knowledge in a certain field. There are no exams involved and no certificates at the end of it. The interest groups are usually led by another mature person with some (possibly extensive) experience and/or knowledge in a particular area. The leaders are not tutors in the normal sense of the word and often have no formal qualifications to teach. They can be regarded as

facilitators, to enable the groups to meet. The U3A is open to all retired or semi-retired people. You pay a membership fee, which in this case is £10 per year, and then you can join as many interest groups as you want. The only extra cost is a contribution towards the hire of the premises where the groups meet; this is usually around £1 per session. The U3A has been running interest groups in Callander for several years, in fact 2 separate U3As have been set up, such is the demand. There is the Forth Valley U3A and the Callander & West Perthshire U3A (C&WP). Between them they run more than 50 groups, with subjects as diverse as Painting for Pleasure, Scrabble, German conversation, Rock Music Appreciation and Table Tennis. Most groups meet weekly, some meet once or twice a month. Now the C&WP U3A has gone further

afield and has set up some groups in Killin; see article below for details. Other subjects could be set up if there is enough interest. The facilitators for these groups are based in Callander and will be coming to Killin once a week (or less often, depending on the subject). All classes will take place at the Episcopal Church (the Tin Church opposite the McLaren Hall), although some or all may in future move to the Old Mill, once its restoration is complete. We are very lucky to have these classes on our doorstep and want to encourage everyone to attend one or more groups. If you wish there was a group on your favourite subject, let us know. Transport - Transport Scotland are considering removing the layby at the Western end of Tyndrum. Charlie will contact Transport Scotland to find out if this plan is still going ahead, and will put in an objection from the CC if it is.

The zebra crossing in Crianlarich is getting very faded again, and consequently more dangerous. Charlie will contact Transport Scotland to request that it is repainted again.

Trunk Road "quick deployment" signs are now operational in our area. These signs should facilitate better advance warning of precise closure points and diversion routes when emergency road closures occur.

Gold Panning - The CC is still trying to clarify the legal position with regard to recreational gold panning in the Tyndrum rivers. Over the summer months responses have been received from the relevant authorities, however the discussion is still "in progress" with regard to the Crown Estate position.

Environment - Thanks are extended to Duncan Lemay for undertaking strimming across many areas of Crianlarich. It was agreed the village looks much better for it. It was agreed that the tubs and planters will be drilled in the winter to prevent waterlogging next year.

It is understood that Stirling Council were to undertake a 'deep clean' of council adopted roads across Strathfillan, though there is a lack of clarification as to what this means and entails. Cllr Martin Earl is to investigate this, and find out what has been done locally.

Wild Camping - There have been serious concerns raised about people camping irresponsibly in and around Tyndrum; a picnic bench looks to have been stolen from Tyndrum Community Woodland and unacceptable behaviour has been noted in Crianlarich, including human waste around Lower Station Yard. There are concerns that this will get worse in 2017 when the By-Laws are introduced further south in the National Park.

Strathfillan Community Development Trust plans to arrange a meeting with relevant stakeholders and organisations later this year to discuss how best to manage the situation into next year. It was agreed that a plan should be in place by Spring 2017, and that signs clearly directing visitors to the public toilets should be erected in Lower Station Yard, Crianlarich.

Health - the health event planned for September had to be postponed, and will now take place on 12 & 13th October. Community members are urged to attend this important event, and give their opinions as to whether new technology will benefit health care provision in the area, or not. Trossachs Search and Rescue have offered to run free local defibrillator training courses. This will be considered for later in the winter.

We would like to extend a big thank you to Green Aspirations for providing the workshops and we hope to host more in the future. Thank you to Ellen Cattanach for providing excellent cake refreshments. Our Community Shelterbelt includes Gruffalo Trail, Forest Classroom and picnic areas and is open to everyone free of charge daily from 8am to 8pm. At the beginning of September we hosted another chainsaw course with professional woodsman Ian Holt, so now we have three more local people Lantra trained. Thank you to Ian for providing the course and also to Jim Maier of Strathfillan House for providing a workshop venue.

Sadly, we have to announce that one of the picnic benches from Tyndrum Community Woods has been stolen and that irresponsible campers have regularly been leaving a mess at the Cattle Creep in Tyndrum. This is a very depressing state of affairs but the Trust hopes that we can work positively with relevant bodies in the coming months to better manage the problem in 2017.

Cycle Path On a more positive note, by the time you read this you should be seeing works taking place on the Tyndrum to Kirkton stretch of the Tyndrum to Crianlarich Cycle Path. Fingers crossed that the

In August 1882 the Dundee Evening Telegraph reports "During the two months which have elapsed since the steamers were placed on Loch Tay, many have availed themselves of the opportunity to visit what is undoubtedly some of the finest scenery in the Highlands." Between seventy and eighty farmers from Strathtay, including twentyfour named men and farms, with wives and families sailed up from Kenmore to picnic in the ruins of the Finlarig castle. "On arriving at Killin Pier the party made their way to the ruins of the old Castle of Finlarig, where a capital dinner was served on the green sward. In the afternoon the excursionists engaged in dancing with great spirit, explored ruins of the old castle and adjoining grounds and visited the village, nearly a mile distant."

Frost Report

Autumn Days

On a wet and windy September day it is obvious that autumn is arriving. Maybe it's old age but it appears to be early this year with some bracken, birches and oaks beginning to turn colour at the end of August. The large crop of conkers and rowan berries would tend, according to old weather lore, to suggest a harsh winter to come. The many hazels along the south lochside must be coming into fruit too as our squirrels have suddenly deserted us. Wood pigeons have arrived in the nearby fields and seem to be watching and waiting for the elderberries to ripen while ospreys, swallows and martins have gone on winter sun holidays. Apparently numbers of house martins in England have dropped but the numbers for Scotland have increased. It is not known why but one theory is that the reduction in dairy farming south of the border has led to less mud for nest-building. We all know that there is plenty of mud in Scotland. Maybe we could look at this as a new export now that oil is on the decline.

We seldom see starlings around us but a flock of 139 appeared for a few days, arriving the day before the rushes were topped. Did they know this and that a good supply of bugs would soon be available? Let's face it, birds can navigate the globe more accurately than a satnav. Arctic terns navigate around 44,000 miles per year which equals 3 trips round the moon. Since they live around 30 years this adds up to a lot of air miles. Recent study has determined that some small birds such as robins have a magnetic sensor in their right eye for

navigation. My wife will now be telling her pet robin what a clever boy he is!

Of course the bird in the news in August is the grouse. Numbers vary greatly from area to area and from year to year and this is mainly due to weather conditions during the breeding season. This year many areas of Yorkshire have had low numbers but there seems to be a healthy number in the Glen Quaich area. When going to the Moy game fair in August we saw a splatter of a dozen young and old birds by the A9 which had probably flown into a lorry. Of course each year brings new accusations of raptor killing to preserve game. At one estate a raptor group took unhatched golden eagle eggs to test for toxins but asked no permission from the landowner to do so. The politeness of working together does not always happen. Ravens seem to be doing well - too well for some as they were recently seen killing a couped sheep

In an attempt to protect ground nesting birds The Cairgorm National Park Authority has recommended that dogs are kept on the lead during the nesting season. It would be good to extend this as livestock worrying by dogs increased by 55% during lambing, with each incident usually involving the death or injury of 2 or 3 animals. And this is before we get the promised lynx! New studies point out that the spruce plantations of Scotland do not allow the cover necessary for covert stalking of prey so the lynx will have to run and chase. This means that the smaller, sicker and poorer animals will be caught and these are more likely to be roe, sheep and

lambs than red deer. Game birds such as capercaillie and black grouse will also be taken. Maybe they would fancy the odd toddler since, when a lynx recently escaped from Dartmouth Zoo, children were kept indoors at the local nursery till a team of tranquiliser marksmen and a helicopter managed to recapture the animal. Gorgeous as they are I don't really want one in my garden. It's always interesting to see the change in attitude when a more urban area is implicated. Similarly with ticks and Lyme disease. Little has been done over the many years that country folk have 'managed' ticks but now that they are appearing in urban areas there is a great panic, especially now that it is known that dogs can get Lyme disease. Well over 40 years ago in Sutherland the pony boy had been sitting on the hill waiting with the hill pony for some time. In the evening he felt itchy and the other gillies took over 100 ticks from him. It leaves me wondering if sheep and deer get Lyme disease. Answers on a postcard please.

With many of our feathered friends away till next year, we will soon see if the 'berry forecast' is right and the winter hard. Even our young hedgehogs, who put on the security light at 10 o'clock each night as they amble about eating bits fallen from the bird feeder, will soon be hibernating. Mr Fox will still be around but not if he lives on an RSPB reserve as they shot 412 in 16 months. So you see, it's not just wicked gamekeepers!



The Royal Visit to Killin



On Queen Victoria's first visit to Scotland in September 1842, she visited Auchmore in Killin. In her diary she records "Our row of sixteen miles up Loch Tay to Auchmore, a cottage of Lord Breadalbane's, near the end of the lake, was the prettiest thing imaginable."... "The situation of Auchmore is exquisite, the trees growing so beautifully down from the top of the mountains, quite into the water and the mountains all round, make it an enchanting spot. We landed and lunched in the cottage which is a very nice little place." Anyone seeing photographs of Auchmore House before it was demolished in about 1960 would hardly think of it as a cottage but that

Auchmore House was built a long time after Victoria's visit. No photographs exist as far as we know of the house in 1842 but a recent visitor to Killin, Kyra Gosling from the Netherlands, was interested in the history of the house and found on the internet a contemporary report of the Queen's visit in the Illustrated London News. This refers to the view from Auchmore being "unquestionably superior to that from the east end" [of the loch] and describes the house in size and accommodation as being "a mere Shooting Lodge". The report also included various drawings of the visit - including the one above of Auchmore House as it then was - with an enormous flag and a guard of Highlanders. Like its successor, it still looks to be a little bigger than most of us would refer to as a cottage!



Book Review



The Road to Little Dribbling by Bill Bryson

20 years ago Bill Bryson went on a trip around Britain to celebrate the green and pleasant land that had become his adopted country. He originally hails from Des Moines, Iowa but married a British girl and settled here. The resulting book, "Notes from a small island", became the best selling travel book in the UK at that time.

Our book club decided to read something completely different from our usual fare (which is fairly varied in any case) so we embarked on the book that he wrote to mark the 20th anniversary of that first book. "The road to Little Dribbling" has also spent considerable time at the top of the best sellers list recently. The author heads out on this brand new journey to see what has changed.

Following a route he dubs The Bryson Line from Bognor Regis to Cape Wrath by the way of places that many people never get to at all, Bryson sets out to discover the wondrously beautiful, magnificently eccentric, endearingly unique country that he thought he knew but doesn't quite recognize any more. Yet despite Britain's occasional failings and more or less eternal bewilderments, he is still pleased to call our rainy island home. Not least of all because of the cream teas, a noble history and an extra day off at Christmas. The author obviously has many fans and it must be down to his witty observations, writing ability and the fact that he is not from these parts. "To see ourselves as others see us" as The Bard would have said. The book had a mixed reception when discussed but did get everyone talking. There was a bit of disappointment about the fact that he wrote very little about Scotland, in fact, the only place covered at all was Cape Wrath. It is however a great source of travel facts and would be a perfect travel companion if you wanted to attempt all or part of his route. It is also hilariously funny and as quoted in The Times "Not to be read in public for fear of emitting loud snorts!"

Obituary

Kathleen Brodie (nee MacDonald) 1925–2016

Kathleen passed away suddenly but very peacefully at home in Tyndrum on Tuesday 26 July 2016. Aged 91 years, she was beloved wife of Malcolm, dearly loved mother of Carole and Allan, mother in-law of Yvonne and sister of Alistair, Marie, David, Robbie and the late Houstan and Bill.

Kathleen was born in Upper Dounreay, Caithness. On leaving school, her first job was the Northern Bank in Thurso. From 1942 to 1945 she worked in the ICI Munitions Factory at Powfoot, Annan as a key part of the war effort. In 1946, she journeyed north to Scapa Flow in Orkney for her next job. She then returned to Caithness, the Royal Hotel, Thurso, where she worked until 1954. driver for hotel girls going to the dancing, took her to Crianlarich. Thinking he was driving far too fast, she complained about the driving. Whereupon she was promptly told, "If you're not happy, then get out

and walk". She didn't and was still with him 60 years later. During their courting years, she worked in various hotels, stretching from Inverness to Callander. They married in March 1958 at Bridge of Orchy hotel and in September 1959, their first child, Carole was born. In November 1962, Allan was born to complete the happy family. During her married life Kathleen was a key figure in G A Brodies Store in Tyndrum. Her excellent book-keeping skills came in very useful in the family business. She was still doing accounts right up to the day before she passed away. Her joys in life were her family, doing crosswords and the family pet, Tammy. She bravely fought ME for the last 30 years of her life. Our heartfelt thanks go to all the staff in the support and medical agencies, the Killin Medical Practice, Crossroads (West Stirlingshire) and Independent Living Services.

Obituary

William Alexander Foster (Bill) 23.05.1930 - 09.08.16

Bill was born part of a bustling, lively family of six children. His mother Jessie and his father Alexander, who was a stonemason, lived in a house in Killin built by Alexander's own hands. Bill went to school in Killin, leaving when he was fourteen. He initially took an apprenticeship with a plumber. He stayed with them for two years proving himself to be a good worker before moving on to other employment in the Killin area. At that time there were dances in all the local villages and Bill and a friend bought a motorbike together to make it easier to get to these dances and it was in Comrie that he met his future wife Eileen. They married on the 30th October 1954. Bill at this time was serving with the RAF so instead of enjoying the first years of marriage together, he was down south and Eileen was living with her mother in Comrie. His hopes of making a long term career in the RAF were thwarted when the medical officer turned him down on account of his dermatitis. Soon afterwards Bill and Eileen rented a corner shop in Stanley and later they took over the running of the Moor of Rannoch Hotel where Bill

did all the odd jobs, looked after the guests and manned the bar. By this time Linda, Shirley and Bob had arrived. After a couple of years the family moved to the Auchlyne Estate, where Bill took a job as a Gardener and Handyman. After a few more moves, the family finally settled in Lyon Road, Killin, in 1971. Bill had returned to the plumbing trade and by 1969 he had landed a good job with the water board. He was responsible for the public water supply in a wide area and was often seen around the local area with his wee van. He remained with the water board for twenty-six years doing the job he loved so much until his retirement in 1996. At no time in his life was Bill without a job. Through his and Eileen's hard work they were able to enjoy many family holidays. They also enjoyed many overseas holidays, the real highlight being their trip to Malaysia, their treat to themselves on Bill's retirement. After Eileen's death in 2012 Bill's horizons shrank a little but he still had plenty of interests in life, including gardening and reading numerous books.

One of his proudest moments was when he managed to travel with Bob to the MOD training centre in Essex to see his only granddaughter's passing out parade as an MOD Policewoman. Although he had the usual aches and pains of advancing age and suffered from arthritis in his ankles for years, it wasn't until June 2015 that his health began to deteriorate. Then in his last two months he became acutely ill and had to be taken into Forth Valley Hospital and then Strathcarron Hospice. Throughout the weeks of his illness he really wanted to be at home and this he was able to do, although after a fall at home on the 31st July he was readmitted to hospital where he slipped peacefully away on the 9th August. He will be missed by all his family and friends.


