## **Hogmanay Weekend - and next year?**

Killin had a particularly good time around Hogmanay this season, with events on three consecutive nights making a weekend to remember. An excellent concert from Skippinish started things off, followed by the Lantern Walk, the wonderful Hogmanay fireworks at the bridge and then the New Year's Day Dance. As well as entertaining the locals, a programme like this brings in visitors to Killin which benefits hotels and shops in Killin. It has already been rumoured that a Skippinish concert could happen again at the same time next year and doubtless the New Year's Dance, which has been held for many years now, will also be put on again. But what about the fireworks? There has been a firework display at the Dochart Bridge every year now since 1999 and each year it has been Charlie Grant who has been chief organiser. There is much to organise: raising the money, buying the fireworks, getting them set up and set off, arranging insurance, ensuring health and safety requirements are met, traffic control, collecting money at the event and, the least attractive of all, clearing up before next morning all the glass and litter left behind after the event. All this costs money and many items have gone up considerably over the years and are likely to increase even more. Often in the past there have been donations from local business who stand to benefit from the attendance of visitors but such donations have dropped off in recent years. This year's display was particularly spectacular - and cost more. The weather was kind and it seemed there were more people this year. We understand



that the collection was down on previous years. Money for the display has come from the sale of Killin Calendars kindly produced by the Studio, who would like to thank all who helped to sell these, especially the staff at the Bridge End Mill. Apart from that and the collection at the bridge, we have no information on other income or that thereexpenditure other than have been personal donations given to Charlie, which cannot be expected to continue. Charlie has said he cannot continue to be solely responsible and, in order to ensure that this much-valued

annual event continues, more people now need to get involved in running things. A committee could share the different jobs and decide how they are done and by whom. A proper organisation is also more likely to succeed with grant applications. The fireworks are now a part of Killin's year and it would be a shame if this attraction for visitors as well as locals had to stop. Surely anyone helping would get enjoyment from making so many people happy? Please step forward **now** to help ensure another fantastic weekend next year.

## Killin Community Council - Ja

Acharn Biomass Plant: Andrew Vince (Clean Energy Ventures Operations Management Ltd.) provided an update on the power plant. Meetings scheduled in line with KCC meetings. Everything on schedule. Operation & maintenance staff are being recruited. Mechanical and electrical contracts will be fully operational by August 2017 and the plant live as of 5th June. Parts arriving on large, unescorted trucks on dates to be verified will not impact village traffic. A deer fence has been agreed along the Rob Roy Way east of Easter Lix. When cabling and pipes are done, footpath will be reinstated and native trees replanted around site. A suggestion that the excess heat be used for a greenhouse project if suitable land available will be looked at by KAT on behalf of the community. Concerns still about pedestrian safety and measures remain in place to safeguard anyone using the wellused path. The CC will be updated in March.

#### Police Report: Anti-Social Behaviour:

Disturbance in Fingal Road in the early hours of 26th November. Occupant who informed police found all four of his tyres deliberately punctured on the 14th December. Police request anyone with information to come forward. Occupant from Ballechroisk Court discovered his tyre had been punctured on 16th December. Further enquiries revealed a number of antisocial instances of threatening conduct. One male was interviewed and charged at Stirling Police Station. Violent Crime: Police and Ambulance called to New Year's Day House Party in Fingal Road. Report of male having been struck with bottle. Occupants taken to hospital but no serious injuries. Enquiries ongoing.



**Road safety:** Car collision on A82 in Glen Falloch. Male occupant taken to hospital and dealt with by police for drink driving and other traffic offences.

Motorists should ensure vehicles are in good condition to cope with adverse weather conditions. Extra warm clothes and emergency food should be taken for use in emergencies.

**Thefts:** A high value theft at Loch Earn Caravan Site - 4 Jet Skis and 2 trailers taken by at least 2 vehicles including a Transit size van.

Community Engagement and reassurance: ,Extra caution is to be taken with home security. Seek advice from police if necessary. Main Street, Killin at Primary School will be patrolled when possible. Traffic conditions to be monitored at zebra crossing and zig zags. Round house – patrols to be carried out during later hours due to complaints.

Parking issues continue to be monitored with corrective advice being provided to vehicle owners.

#### Other:

Hogmanay fireworks celebrations were well attended by both locals and visitors.

The Jack Russell terrier handed into police before the bells was reunited with its owners the next day. Thank you to the local lady who took care of him overnight.

Killin Mountain Rescue Team were involved in a rescue at Stob Glas near Crianlarich where a retired policeman injured his knee. Flash lights used to identify the group's position prompted numerous calls to police control from concerned motorists on the A82. Driving rain and strong wind conditions meant the Rescue Helicopter could not lower the winchman and had to return to base. Killin MRT personnel were deployed to stretcher the man safely

off the hill and he was takentoo Edinburgh with a damaged tendon.

**Road Lining**: Yellow lines have been done, some white lines remain undone which is causing problems at the Mill as people have no indication of actual road.

Water Pressure & Sewage: Slight improvement but has deteriorated again. Some work has taken place at sewage plant but smell will probably return in warmer weather.

**Planning**: There were no planning issues received. Morenish Woodlands have been approved. There are ongoing issues regarding making the website more user friendly.

**Ardeonaig Road:** Most of the parking places have been done but the culverts remain undone. Hayes to follow up.

Street Lights: Two lights still flickering at Lyon and Station Road.

**Ballechroisk 20mph signs:** Ongoing.

**Electricity in Park**: Ongoing - should be paid for by the Games & Show Committees

**Round House**: Ongoing – police will patrol later in evening, reports of a damaged fruit tree.


**Fireworks:** Charlie Grant to put article in Killin News about funding for 2018 fireworks. They didn't meet criteria for a grant.

**DRT:** DRT agreed to connect Killin area to St Fillans for a better connection to Perth. Councils are considering one large DRT area instead of the split areas.

**Bins & Recycling**: No indication of costing due to the system not yet running smoothly. Many complaints received about bins not being emptied during festive period.

**KAT**: Two funding applications in place with Loch Lomond National Park & Stirling Council for Landscape designer for playpark before

additional funding for actual work can be sought. Fence will be fixed in spring. Theresa Elliot only has funding for a further 3months.

**Priority Budgeting:** No proposals as yet. Items discussed and approved not completed.

**Craignavie Road**: Some potholes have been done. Not considered dangerous but resurfacing should be considered. Sycamore tree considered possibly dangerous has been checked by council and deemed safe. Ivy will be removed and trees pruned. Still ongoing.

Music Festival: will go ahead National Park Sign to warn of slippery rocks needs replacing.

wolf which howls, the lynx which snarls or the beaver which . . . is anyone sure just what noise a beaver makes? We are talking the silent invasion of non-native trees. You may think that SNH and co. have this all sewn up so that the landscape as it should be and its inhabitants, both animal and human, are protected. This would not appear to be the case. Firstly our native forests are under threat according to new evidence. The Scottish Gamekeepers Association has revealed that the threat of nonnative trees has been downplayed by not including hundreds of hectares of native woodland made unsatisfactory by non-native planting. The usual guy who gets the blame for destroying woodland is the red deer. While not claiming that no trees are eaten, red are not the main threat to native woodland. They are essentially forest animals and a species does not evolve to destroy its preferred habitat. Hence the reason why open hill ground where there are deer is called a deer forest. What does add up to loss of income is when large areas are planted with non-native conifers which are nibbled by the deer abd the deer are then shot as it is much cheaper than fencing them out.

We are not talking here of the

There seems to be a political vendetta against the poor red deer at the moment. SNH spent £4.8 million on deer management last year alone. That is your money and mine when sporting estates have managed deer successfully for generations and, in the process,



provided work, preserved our landscape and put millions into the economy. The present and threatened way of control supports more jobs and contributes far more to the economy than the Edinburgh Festival. SNH are continually lobbying the government to legislate to increase deer culls. Have they forgotten that their name includes 'natural' and 'heritage'? Soon the only deer you will see will be on pictures. Tourists pay thousands to witness the wildebeest migrations in Tanzania and Kenya or the Laplanders with their reindeer but, with Scotland supposed to be this year's second destination to visit globally, what chance will they soon have to see The Monarch of our glens? Those of you who read The Oban Times may have read Iain Thornburn's article in which he suggests that Burns was a prophet when writing 'Farewell to the forests'.

The planting of the flow country some years ago caused outrage – too late. Some of the timber

may never be able to be harvested. But never mind – they got their subsidy for planting it. Much more moorland is under threat than we realise. This is an irreplaceable loss of biodiversity and habitat to much wildlife.

Lastly we cannot forget the devastation left by felling softwoods. Locally we only have to pass Lix Toll to see that. Will tourists really want to come and see acres of that? Maybe the answer is to train beavers to be more responsible in their timber

felling, taking only softwoods and leaving native trees! I don't know if they have to get Forestry
Commission licences for cutting down each tree or if they just have carte blanche for anything. They are certainly fast workers as can be seen just outside Aberfeldy on the river bank. One pro-beaver charity in England will sell you a certificate and a beaver wood chip for £70. I picked up quite a few chips at Aberfeldy so if anyone has a spare £70 I will willingly sell them one!

On a local note I wonder if other people are seeing long-tailed tits at the feeders. We have a little posse of 7 which tend to come for 'afternoon tea' most days at the moment.

I do hear from time to time that people read these articles. But not all probably keep them to read in bed as did the lovely May Graham who, sadly, passed away recently. Many thanks to her humour and letting me use her in many past anecdotes.

## Strathfillan Community Council

Wild Camping: The CC hosted a meeting which was attended by representatives from SCDT, Forestry Commission, National Park, Stirling Council and Police. It was clarified that in most cases there is a legal right to wild camp responsibly and there is little any of the agencies can do to prevent this. It was agreed that the vast majority of wild campers in Strathfillan are responsible and but a minority are causing problems. LLTNP, FCS and the police will all attempt to increase the number of patrols during summer months, but are inevitably constrained by limited manpower and budgets. Likewise it is not feasible to prevent overnight parking on public land, such as Lower Station Yard in Crianlarich or outside the Tourist Information Centre in Tyndrum. Additional signage will be placed around LSY in Crianlarich and the Cattle Creep in Tyndrum, highlighting the location of the village public toilets. Subject to funding, a fence will also be erected at the edge of LSY to try and prevent people using the bushes as a toilet. Members of the public should report specific incidents of anti social behaviour to the Police using the 101 non-emergency number.

Crianlarich Play Park: The climbing frame equipment in Crianlarich Play Park has been removed by Stirling Council having failed a safety inspection and being deemed to be at the end of its functional life. The CC and local councillors are in discussion with Stirling Council to see if a replacement piece of equipment can

be sourced.

**Health:** Following the roadshow event held in October, discussions are ongoing with Stirling Council and NHS Forth Valley about a suitable pilot project in the Strathfillan area but no details have been confirmed as yet.

**Minute Secretary:** The CC urgently require a minute secretary. A fee of £40 will be paid for attending each meeting and writing up the minutes afterwards. For further information please contact Alan Smailes or Isla Craig.



Home-Start Stirling is looking for volunteers to provide support to families with young children who are going through a stressful time or a crisis. This local charity works throughout the area recruiting and training home-visiting volunteers to provide weekly help to families who have at least one child under five. That help may be in the form of a listening ear, advice on dealing with the children or a bit of practical help. Volunteers don't need to have any specialist skills or qualifications, just the experience of having been a parent themselves. All new potential volunteers are asked to complete a course, which fully prepares them for home visiting. Once they have started visiting a family, Home-Start Stirling is always there to give the volunteers any support they need. Volunteering as a home visitor doesn't need a huge time commitment either - just a minimum of two to three hours a week although any other time visitors can give is always greatly appreciated by both Home-Start and the families. 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## **Weather Stati**


**Kirkton Farm** (Met Office Automatic Weather Station), near Tyndrum, Strathfillan

The main features of the weather at Kirkton during 2016 were a wet January and February; a dry and sunny spring (March to mid-June); a relatively damp but warm summer (mid-June to September), which proved ideal for grass growth on the farm; and an unusually dry and comparatively calm autumn and early winter (October to mid-December). The weather was more settled in 2016 compared with 2015, with considerably less rainfall (well below the 25 year average), fewer rain days, higher summer temperatures and fewer storms.

The total rainfall recorded at the Met Office automatic weather station at Kirkton in 2016 was 2382.6 mm (93.8 inches) which was 231.2 mm less than the 1991-2015 twenty five year average (2613.8 mm). The

total rainfall in 2016 was 1203.2 mm less than the rainfall recorded in 2015. The wettest month was January when a total of 441.2 mm (17.37 inches) of rainfall was recorded. The rainfall was above average in January and February, and during the summer months of June, July, August and September. The driest month was October with 83.8 mm of rainfall (only 31% of the 25 year average). The 136.6 mm of rainfall recorded in November was the lowest November rainfall since records began in 1991 (47.6% of the 25 year average). The highest rainfall over a calendar Week (Monday to Sunday) was 235.6 mm between 25th and 31st January. The highest rainfall in a single 24 hour period (09:00 GMT to 09:00 GMT) was 73.6 mm on 28th January. This was the only day in 2016 when more than 50 mm of rainfall was recorded. The highest rainfall in a single half-

day 12 hour period (21:00 GMT to 09:00 GMT) was 52.0 mm again on 28th January. The total number of rain days was 267 (73%). There were 22 days when there was more than 25 mm of rainfall recorded. There was no recorded rainfall between 5th and 16th May (a period of 12 days); and there was only one rain day between 23rd and 5th June. The lowest temperature recorded during 2016 was on 25th November when the temperature fell to -9.5°C. This is the fifth year in a row that the temperature has not fallen below -10.0°C. The lowest maximum temperature was recorded on 8th January (-0.6°C). This was the only day during 2016 when the temperature failed to rise above freezing. An air frost was recorded on a total of 88 days. The highest temperature recorded was on 6th June (26.7°C). June was the warmest month with a mean temperature of 13.64°C and a mean maximum temperature of 17.94°C. Temperatures of 25°C or above were recorded on 3 days (5th and 6th June and 19th July), while temperatures above 20°C (but less than 25°C) were recorded on a further 25 days. Sleet or snow was recorded falling at the weather station on 32 days and lying snow (recorded at 09:00) was noted on 24 days. A depth of 12 cm of lying snow was recorded on the mornings of 17th and 18th January. There were five storms when sustained gale force winds were recorded at the farm (28th and 29th January [storm 'Gertrude']; 1st and 2nd February [storm 'Henry']; 28th September; 23rd and 24th December [storm 'Barbara']; 25th and 26th December [storm 'Conor']); and three days when thunder and lightning were recorded (19th July; 3rd and 19th August).







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
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## stics for 2016

#### Killin

The total rainfall recorded in Killin in 2016 was 1674.5 mm (65.93 inches); this was 162.6 mm less than the 2002-2011 ten year average (1837.1 mm). 2016 was the driest year since 2010.

October was the driest month with only 51.5 mm of rain, while January was the wettest month with 371.5 mm. Five months were wetter than average (January, February, July, September and December). During 2016 Killin received approximately 70.3 % of the rainfall recorded at Kirkton (i.e. some 708 mm less). The rainfall was higher at Kirkton in all months.

## Glen Ogle 33 Ultra

This is an ultra marathon held every November in Stirlingshire. The race starts and finishes in Killin and takes in some stunning scenery which sees runners crossing the Glen Ogle viaduct before running down towards Lochearnhead, into Strathyre and back up to finish in Breadalbane Park. GO33 was first run in 2011, then based in Strathyre, and has quickly become one of the most popular ultras in Scotland. 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
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## Mountain Rescue



Killin Mountain Rescue Team have recently been involved in a Mountain Safety initiative, working with PC Will Diamond from Police Scotland, Lochearnhead, PC Paul Barr from Loch Lomond and The Trossachs National Park, and the Lomond and Arrochar Mountain Rescue Teams. The aim was to raise awareness of issues that the teams face on a daily basis, as well as providing safety advice to visitors to the LL&T National Park, Each year the National Park selects local charities to fundraise for. This year, these are the three Mountain Rescue teams based in the National Park including Killin MRT. First they focused on a "Stay Safe" safety leaflet created by Scottish Mountain Rescue. So far thousands of leaflets have been dropped off in in key locations of the Park area such as visitor centres, tourist information offices, local shops and hotels etc.

All Mountain Rescue teams find people who become lost and unable to navigate themselves safely back, often because they are lost on the hills without a map and compass and try to navigate using their

to navigation using a map and compass. One such app is "OS Locate" produced by Ordnance Survey. This will provide users with their GPS position and in an emergency this can be sent to the rescue teams who can then find them more quickly. We recommend downloading the app before you go out. More information at www.ordnancesurvey.co.uk/shop/os-locate/ Ordnance Survey are also assisting with the initiative and producing posters to promote the app which

will be distributed throughout thePark area. The initiative has also produced a series of three short informative videos, developed by the Mountain Rescue

teams themselves to aid park visitors. The videos show how to prepare for a day in the hills, navigation and what to do if things go wrong. A briefing has also been created, aimed at police officers and staff who may be the first to take details of a Mountain Rescue type incident. The briefing will cover how the teams are called out, what they can do to assist the police and what information is required to allow the rescue teams to carry out their roles effectively.

Every year across Scotland, Mountain Rescue Teams are called out to assist in search and rescue scenarios on a daily basis. Over 800 volunteers provide assistance 24hrs a day, all year round regardless of the weather or terrain. They regularly give up family and work time in order to turn out and assist complete strangers, often placing themselves in great danger and they do this often with little recognition.

It is hoped this initiative will give some recognition to the vital roles that these individuals carry out.

## **Killin and Crianlarich Nurseries**

Both nurseries have recently been inspected by the Care Inspectorate, Killin Nursery on 8<sup>th</sup> August 2016 and Crianlarich Nursery on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2016. We are delighted with both reports which have been graded as Very Good.

The inspection in Killin focused on Summer transitions and experiences, partnerships with parents, other professionals and the community, as well as staff performance and leadership opportunities.

The inspector recognised how well the two nurseries blend smoothly and successfully during holiday periods, ensuring continuity of care and support for children. Building new friendships and engaging in different types of play, together with experiences gained from engaging with the local community, were recognised as extremely good practice. The inspector reported that excellent community partnerships helped firmly fix the nursery and the children's place in their local area. She also acknowledged the work we are doing in building relationships with the retirement home.

The inspection in Crianlarich focused on care and learning experiences for children under three, promotion of positive behaviour, induction and support for new staff and impact of staff learning on outcomes for children.

The inspector recognised the nurturing environment where staff offer praise and reassurance for children whilst supporting them to make choices and develop their independence. Positive behaviour is actively encouraged and children are supported to think about positive ways to act and respond to others. The inspector reported that induction information is being delivered at a more gradual pace, allowing new staff more time to gain a deeper understanding of requirements.


In Killin, walks are held on a Wednesday morning, meeting at 10.20am.

## Book Review



This story begins in rural Wales, moves to India and eventually to Switzerland. A young Welsh girl, Mair Ellis, finds a gorgeous Kashmir shawl when clearing out her family home. It had belonged to her grandmother, who accompanied her missionary husband to India in the 1940s. Mair's curiosity is aroused and she decides to retrace their travels.

The narrative then reverts to 1941 and we learn what actually happened to her grandparents. This is a tale of the everyday lives of the British in Kashmir, who live on wooden

houseboats and spend their time relaxing and enjoying themselves drinking, dancing and gossiping - in the comfort of their Club. In sharp contrast, not far away in the villages, dire poverty reigns eternally. The story focuses on three couples in particular - their friendships and their lovers, their hopes and their fears, their joys and their sorrows. Eventually the war in Asia reaches them and the menfolk have to go away to fight against the Japanese. Of course war changes everything. Piece by piece Mair manages to put her family history together and, in so doing, finds a future for herself. So vivid are Rosie Thomas's descriptions of the incredibly slow and dangerous journey through the snowy, awe-inspiring passes high in the Himalayas and the beauty of the lake at Srinagar, in the heart of the Vale of Kashmir, that I felt I was actually there, experiencing for myself all the amazing sights, smells and sounds of the region. Colourful scenes and believable characters combine in this powerful story which manages to be simultaneously heartwarming and heart-breaking. Written in an easy style, "The Kashmir Shawl" is altogether a most enjoyable read. Recommended.


Macnab News

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## The Fire Service needs you!

## Who turns up in a fire engine when a call for help is made?

A firefighter of course. In the Strathfillan area, Killin, Crianlarich and Tyndrum, it could easily be someone you know. Each station is crewed by Retained Duty System (RDS) Firefighters. These are individuals who live or work close to specific stations and can commit to providing an emergency response service for that station. Most of them are women and men whose primary employment is in another field but, in addition to that, provide the same range of emergency service as their full time firefighter colleagues.

The role of an RDS Firefighter is challenging and demanding. There are stressful and hazardous situations to be faced and they are required to deal with these while providing comfort and reassurance to members of the community. Call numbers vary for Retained stations, with some responding to over 800 calls a year and others responding to fewer than 50. The role of the fire

and rescue service has changed in recent years with firefighters working to reduce the number of fires, fire related deaths and injuries through a range of Community fire safety initiatives. Many Retained Firefighters play an important role within their communities by helping to promote fire safety messages, giving fire safety advice to schools and other organisations, as well as carrying out free home fire safety visits.

## Crianlarich Community needs Fire & Rescue responders

Following a recent recruitment campaign for Retained Firefighters, The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service received an encouraging response from communities in Killin and Tyndrum. Unfortunately the same numbers have not come forward from Crianlarich and its surrounding area.

The station requires people in the Crianlarich area now who could take on the challenging role and are willing to learn new skills. Applicants must be over 18 years of age and in

good health. They must be able to provide suitable availability and be capable of responding to the station, located in the centre of Crianlarich village, within approximately 12 minutes when alerted.

The service provides extensive initial training which is supported by fortnightly training nights held at the station. Successful applicants will develop skills in the use of breathing apparatus, ladders, road traffic collision response, working at height, rescue from water, fire behaviour, first aid, trauma care, large goods vehicle driving and more. The station is also in need of people with good leadership potential, following the retirement of WM Jim Allardice in August.
