Good News from Falls of Dochart Retirement Home

Visitors to the home will have seen the huge transformation of the communal areas. We have a new front entrance door. The large windows at the front have been replaced with safety double glazing. The vestibule leading to the front entrance will be painted (when the weather allows) and upgraded lighting will be fitted.

Inside, the entrance hall, the upstairs hallway, the stairs, the TV lounge, dining room and sun lounge have all been re-carpeted. All these communal areas have been fully refurbished and redecorated to give a much airier and lighter environment, whilst retaining the cosiness of the home. The dining room and TV lounge have new furniture and chairs. The TV lounge has still to have more chairs and the lighting upgraded.

This refurbishment has been made possible by the very generous legacy left to the home by the late Dr Mairi MacColl. It is a tribute as to how she regarded the importance of the home in our community. The board of the Killin Care Trust which operate the home are extremely grateful to have received this legacy. Not only has this legacy paid for the refurbishment, it has allowed us to recruit more staff, eased pressure to fill rooms and allowed us to refurbish when empty. It has ensured the viability of the future of the home. Throughout her life and even in her passing, the late Dr Mairi MacColl had the best interests of her community at her heart.

The Home is privileged to receive many local donations which allow us to purchase the "extras" which make life at the home as enjoyable as possible. The Cooperative local community fund has been very generous by donating part of their dividend system to the home. A big thanks to all members who chose us as their charity. The money received is being used to install a new nurse call system which will allow residents to call for assistance from a pager worn on their person. Assistance can be called from anywhere in the home or the garden. Every donation received is gratefully accepted and used to the benefit of our residents. We are a charitable trust grateful to all those fundraisers who work for the good of the home. We are a not for profit organisation. The Directors/Trustees of the Killin Care Trust are unpaid volunteers who meet regularly to form the basis of the policies of the home and oversee the financial budgets and staffing. Some of these Directors/Trustees have been serving for fourteen years since the home was purchased. We would like to hear from anyone who would wish to become a "friend of the home" i.e. do some voluntary work. Perhaps if you have a business background or have a skill or knowledge, you would consider enquiring to join the board. Initial enquiries could be made to any board member. All people working with vulnerable adults must be approved and be willing to be PVG registered. It is a worthwhile cause and satisfaction is gained by knowing you are helping provide care in the community. The long-time future of the home can only be guaranteed if we can recruit a succession of volunteers to take over responsibility for its successful existence.

Although much of the music was unfamiliar to a lot of the audience, the acting made it possible to follow stories of romance, jealousy, murder, grief, comedy and betrayal, involving - but not all at once - a bird cage, jewellery, a chocolate cake and wine glasses, which the cast insisted were filled with wine by the pianist. The items were a good mixture and during the interval over coffee the audience was able to read the details of each piece in the programme – something which helped understand the stories but might not have been possible before or during the performance.

The excellent singing was much appreciated by an appreciative and good-sized audience which, as the technical fault was resolved and the train went off into the distance, was already looking forward to the next Opera Highlights visit.

Telephone Book

As readers may have noticed, the new Telephone Book is now available in Killin at News First, The Post Office, the Library and The £1+ shop and in Crianlarich at the Crianlarich Store, also in Tyndrum at Brodies. This is the 14th local phone book produced in Killin since the first typed and duplicated 16 page version in 1978 costing 15p. The first six versions were compiled by the Church in aid of church funds and since then the Killin News has produced three in aid of our own funds and, since 2005, six in aid of the Falls of Dochart Retirement Home. The last one in 2013 brought in £2006 for the Home. Although printing costs have gone up considerably since the 2013 version, we have not increased the price.

There have been variations over the year, sometimes ads were included and sometimes, as now, just a classified section. The last four versions have included a numerical list so that you can check from a number who has called.

Many people now have mobile numbers instead of, or as well as, land lines and technology is developing rapidly, so maybe more information will have to be included in any future directory, or, perhaps more likely, there will be no need for a physical telephone book. (Those involved in the production of the books would be pleased about that!)

Work on the present version started eighteen months ago and for reasons beyond our control had to stop and start several times. Many things have changed since summer 2015 and, while we hope we have picked them up, we cannot guarantee to have done so and we apologise for any errors.

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OH DEER!

If you were in Dalmally or the surrounding area around Valentine's Day you may have been treated to the sight of some busy special squirrels. No, it was not our furry friends taking out their loved ones for a nut cutlet. It was three 350 B2 squirrel helicopters refuelling during the helicopter deer count of the Inverary and Tyndrum Deer Management Group. This was part of the national annual deer count in conjunction with S.N.H. Only occasionally are counts done by helicopter due to expense. Usually small teams count by foot, doing adjoining areas of neighbouring estates on the same day and co-ordinating results on the marches (estate boundaries). This was done mid-March in all the local D.M.G.s. It is harder work than riding in a squirrel but you are usually less green at the end of the day, plus a video recording allows more insight into sex, age etc. of the deer counted. Some areas of the Inverary and Tyndrum group did both counts in order to assess the accuracy of foot counts. So far the result in to date seems to show little difference between the two. All landowners, both large and small, are requested to do as accurate a count as possible and, in these days of political anti-deer views, it is imperative that they do so. Any inaccurate or non-information may be fuel leading to increased legislation in this area. The use of drones has also been

piloted by one estate in the area this year to count. There is talk of using thermal imaging in some context in the future. It is thought

Another government form for landowners (again both large and small) to fill in is regarding sporting rates. At the moment it appears that it doesn't matter whether you shoot or not, you will be liable, depending on what is deemed to be on your land. At the moment this appears to include foxes, crows etc. as well as pheasant and co. It is no surprise that the legislation is running behind the intended start date but we are to be assured that it will be back dated. It is also said that the income will not cover the administrative costs. The first appearance of the frogs in our pond was on 20 February, three weeks before last year (oh that global warming!) But they disappeared after the terrible change to colder and very wet weather. We were not sure if they had snuggled back into the mud or had been washed down the pond 'plughole' to the Loch but they appeared again on 6th March and we had great flotillas of frog spawn by the 7th. Oystercatchers appear to be about a week earlier returning than last year. As the Spring progresses, can I give the annual plea to dog owners to take care, as voung lambs and ground nesting birds will soon be about. This applies to the hill also as many young animals are vulnerable. There has been a regrettable increase in dog attacks on sheep in Scotland recently.

At least we haven't got the lynx yet! Although a recent edition of 'Pointless' seemed to think that it



was increasing in numbers in Britain. We do have the beavers but beware - someone investigating an animal on a verge went to look. It was a beaver and it went for him. Dr. Goran Hartman, a beaver expert, said that all animals get scared when cornered and all animals with teeth will try to use them. In Belarus in 2013 a man bled to death after a beaver bit through a main artery. So let's hope that we do not get beavers spreading into urban areas like the foxes have done. But a leading scientist involved in the beaver trial has pointed out that if the beavers are so successful that they need to be controlled, then we may get advantages. Beaver hats and salami are a knockout in Russia and beaver tail soup and stew in Norway. I have a recipe for beaver tail soup - anyone interested? Further suggestions on a postcard please.


Old Mill Report

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Strathfillan Community Council

Transport A meeting has been arranged with George Fiddes of Transport Scotland regarding a number of Transport related issues in Strathfillan. The newly formed Tyndrum Action Group would like to paint and carry out some cosmetic refurbishment of the pedestrian footbridge in Tyndrum (between Brodies and the Green Welly Stop). Transport Scotland had initially rejected this idea, primarily on health & safety grounds. However, it is hoped that a way forward can be found for community volunteers to work under supervision of Transport Scotland. Other issues to be discussed at the meeting will include the tree planting and landscaping of the Crianlarich bypass and roundabouts, and also how to better warn motorists of planned road closures in the area.

Public Toilets the CC has received a complaint that both Crianlarich and Tyndrum public toilets were closed over both the Christmas and New Year holidays. This resulted in large number of travellers attempting to use the facilities in local hotels etc instead. The CC is trying to find out why this closure happened and aiming to ensure that the toilets are kept open 24/7 throughout the year. **Crianlarich Playpark** the CC has asked SCDT to take forward funding applications for new play equipment for Crianlarich playpark. The CC is also working with Stirling Council to ensure that the Council will take on the routine maintenance etc. of any play equipment which is installed.

It was suggested that funding for the second half of the Crianlarich -Tyndrum cyclepath might fall into the criteria for attracting some of this money.

Official Opening of the S T Connell Library

Following months of hard work from both staff and pupils we were delighted to welcome Douglas Connell to open the new S T Connell Library on Friday 3 March 2017. The library is named after Douglas's father, Samuel Thomson Connell, who was appointed as Principal Teacher of English and History at McLaren High School in 1948 and retired in 1976 after 28 years as Head of the English department. When asked what he taught, his invariable answer was "pupils". In his retirement speech, he said that his greatest reward was to develop



the intrinsic talents of his students and to see the fruition of these talents – all the time, as he put it, with the essential ingredient of

humour. He was born in Ayrshire on 17 January 1913 and studied at the University of Glasgow from where he graduated MA, B.Ed. He taught in Glasgow schools before and after war service and then settled in Callander which was his home for the next 38 years. In 1949, he married Hazel, also a graduate of the University of Glasgow but in the sciences rather than the arts, and who herself subsequently became a teacher of chemistry, biology and physics at McLaren High School. They had two sons who were educated at McLaren High, sometimes being taught by both of their parents.

Mr Connell was known to his family and friends as Thomson and, out of earshot, to the pupils as Sammy. 
It was with huge excitement that McLaren High School was announced as taking 2nd place in the Debut B Category, collecting the prize of a shield and £300 from Ms Davidson.

Breadalbane Park

After several months post Phase 1 of the redevelopment of the Park and with the arrival of the snowdrop, the Friends of Breadalbane Park have reconvened to concentrate on the play area of the Park (Phase2). The whole job will be done taking time to consult with the school children, the Tiddlers, Toddlers and Nursery children and their parents, the Uniform groups and any other interested parties. 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The Killin Railway

On 1st April 1886, the Killin Railway opened to the general public. Five miles long, it ran from Killin Junction on the Callander-Oban line via Killin to Loch Tay. Over it's short distance, it passed Rob Roy's remote hideouts, an ancient burial ground of Clan MacNab, and a ruined medieval castle; crossed two formidable rivers, and skirted the sandy banks of the placid loch. The line cost £20,000 to build and took over two years to complete.

There had been much fanfare at the opening. On a frosty spring morning, a group of high-ranking officials from Edinburgh and Glasgow departed from their train at Killin Junction station and were greeted by the Earl of Breadalbane, railway directors and other local gentlemen. Although connected to the Callander-Oban line and serviced by the Caledonian Railway, Killin Railway was an enterprise of Lord Breadalbane, who had raised capital through local landowners. The whole party then entered the train and travelled towards Loch Tay. For many on board, seeing the Falls of Dochart for the first time - hearing the roar of water through the open windows - must have been truly awe-inspiring. Where before travel had been limited, the railways opened up so much of the Highlands to the citydwelling Victorian tourist.

At the loch side the party exited the train and inspected the station and steamer pier, which Lord Breadalbane had constructed in



conjunction with the new railway. The steamer service, notably 'The Lady of the Lake', sailed to Kenmore from where a stagecoach could take passengers to Aberfeldy and on to the Perth-Inverness line. Afterwards, the party headed back to Killin and, preceded by a pipe band, marched into the hall adjoining Killin Hotel. Here, toasts were made to Lord Breadalbane and business partners. Sir James King of Campsie said in his speech, "For the first time the village of Killin had been placed in direct communication with the capitals both of Scotland and of England. It was connected with the great railway system of the country, and by means thereof the prosperity of the place would be very much promoted."

Along with the steamers at Loch Tay, the Killin Railway had opened up an area of thirty miles. It also brought huge benefits to locals. In March 1886 the Glasgow Herald reported, "The inhabitants of Killin will be able now to get their food and other supplies brought to them at a cheaper rate than was the case when they had to be carted from Killin Junction."

For those involved in its construction however, it had not been an easy journey. With the survey of the line completed in late 1882, Lord Breadalbane announced that the railway would be open for the next tourist season. This was wildly optimistic, and inevitably work did not begin until the



following year. The task was given to contractor Lachlan MacDonald, but quickly his company ran into financial difficulties, having underestimated the cost of concrete used to build the viaduct over the Dochart. Unable to pay his workers and with debts mounting, MacDonald declared bankruptcy and his contract was terminated. His replacement, John Best of Glasgow, eventually finished the line in 1885.

Nevertheless, the railway was hailed a great success at the opening ceremony and was undoubtedly responsible for turning Killin into a tourist hotspot. Sadly today it is no more, having fallen victim to the Beeching Axe in 1965. The track bed is now a footpath. There are only a few spectral reminders of what once was: the platform at Killin Junction, carpeted by grass and weeds; the scrawny, lurching telegraph poles; the concrete sleepers laid to rest in mossy blankets at the side of the path. It is not difficult to imagine the day that the first steam train graced this route, its carriages filled with excited Victorian holidaymakers, looking at a new world unfolding.

We have the winners from the 2016 competition opening the proceedings each night with "Callum, Connor and Fergus" (young musicians from McLaren High School) on Friday and "The Deadly Winters" from Edinburgh on the Saturday. This year the festival shop will be located at the Sports Pavilion. Please remember each ticket holder will need to visit the shop to exchange their ticket for a wristband before entering the main stage in the hall. We cannot give out wristbands for others – they must be attached by the team. The shop will open a few days prior to the festival to allow wristbands to be attached earlier in the week.

Thank you to all those who supported the Rock and Roll Bingo evening. It was well attended and a substantial profit of £550.00 was made.





BOOK REVIEW



Sarah Waters does not disappoint... Her latest novel is set in 1922 Camberwell, a smart middle class area of London. This is a time of social change and Frances Wray and her mother are still suffering the losses of this period being left to run a large, once grand house with no domestic help. Frances is doing the jobs previously carried out by a livein maid. As well as scrubbing floors, cooking and lighting fires, she also keeps the household accounts. Frances' father has died leaving them financially insecure and her brothers have been killed in the war. Hence the need for the two ladies to take in paying guests who come in the form

of Lilian and Leonard Barber, a young, newly married, working class couple who arrive in a van piled high with all their goods. Leonard is rather too cheeky if not a little inappropriate for Frances but she is attracted to Lilian from the start and finds her life changing under her influence. They become close and exchange confidences. One night after a family party at Lil's family home, with dancing and plenty of drinking, they return to the house and their friendship blossoms into an intimate affair which Sarah Waters handles tastefully. In the second half of the book there is a violent death and an Old Bailey trial but I have no wish to spoil it for you!

Sarah Waters is a skilled writer who brings her characters to life and captures the era and the place beautifully. In particular the old house, which is rich in atmosphere, its 'outside privy' accessible through the kitchen and half-landings where Frances and Lilian frequently bump into each other. I have read and enjoyed all the novels by this author and The Paying Guests may not be her best but our Book Club enjoyed it just the same.

It is early evening in spring. The sun is resting atop the white fangs of distant mountains, painting the valley golden. Stretching across this vista, a forest quivers in the cool breeze. Below it flows the river, dark, serpentine. A few tiny cottages litter the hillsides - the only human structures amid the wilderness. No sound is heard but for birdsong, an

A Walk through Glen Lyon Yet this was a mere stroll in a very

large garden. For as wild and remote as Glen Lyon seems, it is strictly maintained by the Meggernie & Lochs Estates. There is livestock farming, tree planting and annual deer culling, as well as new path networks opening for walkers. According to the information board at the walk's start, this "sympathetic

lonely, a place where the only moving presence is the wind. There is in fact a close-knit community here, with a primary school and church. During my walk however, I saw not a soul. The path to the viewpoint is a gradual ascent through dense pines and up a small bald ridge. Heavy moss and splintered rock cover the terrain, and

eternal fanfare of whistles and chirps rising high above the trees.

As I drink the air and gaze out at Glen Lyon's regal splendour, the romantic musings of Sir Walter Scott swirl around in my mind. Here is "the longest, loneliest and loveliest glen in Scotland", and in this amber-tinged light, those words do it only a small justice. The glen has many

nicknames, but perhaps the most inspiring - and accurate - is 'Valley of the Sun God', after Lugh, the Celtic deity. It could not have lived up to this name more than the day I climbed the viewpoint above Kerrowmore Wood near Bridge of Balgie. There was indeed

something almost supernatural in watching that beam of sunlight glide across the vast green corridor from Fortingall to Loch Lyon.

From one end of the glen I noticed the landscape as a process of cultivation: flat, olivehued fields, chequered conifer quilts, old boundary walls. Progress at Acharn Forest Biomass Site



Acharn 6MWe biomass CHP plant

The Acharn project will comprise an advanced gasification combined heat & power ("CHP") plant totalling 6MWe in capacity. Fuel supply will be provided from the surrounding catchment by established suppliers in the form of locally sourced virgin biomass.

Softwood will be chipped and dried on site before being fed via conveyors into a series of 10 gasifiers. A superheating process creates the required gas to power turbines that feed energy back into the grid.

Expected to generate 44.65 GWh each year, the site will be able to power 13,530 homes. This biomass project will offset a considerable amount of CO2, 21,889 tonnes, the carbon footprint of 4,864 average UK homes.

The construction and then operations and maintenance of the plant are expected to generate a number of direct full time jobs.

After the Games there will be a dinner at the Killin Hotel for our clan and after the dinner, there will be a Ceilidh open for the whole village at no charge.



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
