The Ben Lawers Historic Landscape Project

Highland Landscapes contain hidden evidence for past change. Whether driving along the roads or walking through the hills of Highland Scotland, the tumbled ruinous remains of abandoned stone-built houses and farmsteads are an all too familiar sight. These evocative ruins are a legacy of rural depopulation stemming from a combination of changes in land tenure during the agricultural improvements, the attraction of employment in growing industrial centres, opening of better communication routes, emigration and of course enforced clearance from land. Understanding these landscapes, and how they changed over time, is key to understanding the history of Scotland.

The Ben Lawers Project, undertaken between 2002-2005, has just been published as a Scottish Internet Archaeology report. Entitled "Ben Lawers: An Archaeological Landscape in Time", the report presents the results of this landmark research project undertaken on the National Trust for Scotland's property of Ben Lawers on North Loch Tayside. The project was one of the biggest of its type in Scotland.

Volunteers on National Trust for Scotland Thistle Camps undertook over 22 weeks' worth of excavation over four seasons, supervised by professional archaeologist from GUARD, Dr John Atkinson, director of GUARD Archaeology Ltd. He said "Evidence dating back to the Mesolithic era around 9000 years ago was found but the focus of the project was the last 1000 years". Excavation of over 80 trenches investigated a wide range of sites from turf-built medieval structures, pre-improvement fermtouns and late 18th/ early 19th century stone-built single tenancy farm units built on the old outfields. The remains of faint traces of turf-built structures dating to the 11th-13th centuries AD was a major discovery for this part of upland Perthshire. Derek Alexander, Head of Archaeological Services for the Trust, said "The survival of medieval turf structures, above the limit of later agriculture, was one of

the most exciting parts of the project. There is the potential that other buildings survive out there as yet undetected". John Atkinson said "The evidence from excavated shielings highlights their lack of permanence, from the makeshift roofing arrangements to the lack of material culture and even, in some cases, the apparent absence of hearths. In dating terms the

evidence suggests that the tradition was certainly active in the 16th and 17th centuries and probably came to an end towards the end of the 18th century, although occasional use may have extended beyond this". A detailed mapping survey of the mountain revealed over 2000 individual structures and 300km of stone dykes, earth banks and trackways. This wealth of upstanding archaeology is complimented by the sheer depth of documentary information held in the records of the huge Breadalbane Estate of the Campbells of Glenorchy. "Publication of the Ben Lawers results is a major leap-forward in our understanding of upland landscapes and is likely to be typical of many other parts of Scotland" said Alexander, "It is fantastic that the report is available on line and so is freely available to everyone from university researchers to interested locals".

Killin Community Council Notes of Meeting 14th March

Police Report January to March Anti-Social behaviour issues : A number of issues were investigated during the period.

Fraud: Gumtree & eBay offences are becoming more regular, please be aware and use PayPal where possible.

Theft: Tayside area reported machinery worth £30,000 being taken from a farm in Auchterarder. Please ensure your equipment has security markings.

Roads: A few short blasts of winter conditions caused several cars to slide off the road and minor collisions.

Missing Person: 15yr old girl failed to turn up to school, reported missing by her parents. The girl was found safe and well a few hours later. **Social Media**: A number of enquiries about Instagram and Snapchat. Photos of a teenager in a state of undress were sent to 'Friends' unbeknown to her. It is a criminal offence to distribute indecent photos of a child on social media. Parents need to have a close control and focus on their children's social media accounts.

Domestic disturbance: Enquires carried out and a male was and charged and a report was sent to the Procurator Fiscal.

Mountain Rescue: A local male from Tyndrum became lost and disorientated in forest paths. He was later found safe end well. **PC Iona Frickleton** will be back from maternity leave in May and will continue to be stationed in Killin.

White Lining: Ambulance Depot lines need doing. No follow up from Alicia Hayes. Martin Earl wants Theresa Elliot to send him all the areas needing doing, plus more signage to be at Dochart Bridge. Water Pressure: Said to be bad every day.

Planning : Renewal consent for Tayview.

Ardeonaig Road: Pot holes need fixing and new passing place signs put up.

Street Lights: Fiona Kennedy to report faults.

Park Electric: Charlie Grant given bill to be paid for by Killin Show and Killin Highland Games.

Round House: Still with mess and broken glass.

Craignavie Road: Pot holes past the 30 sign need fixing.

Xmas Tree lights: £40 Cheque to be sent to church.

LLTNP: Camping signs are up for restricted camping in certain areas. Any increase in normal camping or

damage in this area to be reported to LLTNP.

40 page Consultation 5yr plan for the LLTNP could get things done for the village. Theresa Elliot to ask for hard copies to be sent out.

Waste Management: Two members of Stirling Council Waste Management team attending reported the team is working to get targets met. Calls to get jobs done were not getting reference numbers issued but issuing these by automatic email might be possible in future. The website will be replaced with a new prototype in a few months. Questions were raised about rats being seen at the bottle bank, bin lorry containers left on site and whether the new bin system and the team working seven days a week was saving money. Opening times of the Callander skip are to be reviewed.

Ahead of the Council Elections Fiona Kennedy thanked Martin Earl for all his hard work for Killin Community Council over the last 5yrs. (Minutes for May meeting and AGM were not available at the time Killin News went to print.)

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MAY-HEM

As I write this we are towards the end of an extremely hot and dry spell in May. This has been a fantastic year for the lambing and wildlife seems to be thriving. On the Ardeonaig wildlife reserve (otherwise known as our garden) we have had early fledglings of four or five thrushes closely followed by a similar number of blackbird babies. It is to be hoped that they are not too worn out by childcare to opt for a second brood. There does seem to be more thrushes and blackbirds about both in the garden and along the roadside. We have also noticed several woodcock and snipe in the area and maybe the two mild winters have helped these ground feeders. If so they will be voting for global warming. We have also had visits in the garden by a few redstarts and even a pair of sandpipers.

The pied wagtails are back to nest, we call them the Cherokees as they pop up their heads over the rooftop as if spying out the land. They have found that nesting under the solar panels gives them a cosy home. They all add so much to all our lives and it is so good to see the young people at the nursery taking care of Mrs. Duck and her nest on the wall. We were lucky enough to be there the day that they hatched and see how excited and pleased the children were and how the staff put up a wee slide to allow the ducklings to get to the school pond. That was a rather quick transition from nursery to school but good to see that they were safe this year and Mum was not scared off the nest by cats or crows. Which brings me to the plea for adults to be as responsible as these wee folk and keep dogs very much under control to help ground and low nesting birds and animals such as hares who are bringing up young at this time.

The Ardeonaig hares are still doing their best to repopulate the area. After the mad March hare it seems to be the amorous May hare. We didn't see them mating in the flat area at the top of the Ardeonaig brae but a pair were chasing each other and then disappeared behind a pile of stones for a considerable time. Eric the hedgehog has made it successfully through hibernation and makes nightly visits for food and water. We have not seen him bringing an Erica along but we can hope that love will blossom. The insect eaters in the Highlands should be OK this summer as 139,070 billion midges are predicted, half of which will be females (they are the ones which bite - no comment). That is going to do SO much for tourism! And just who is predicting this? And just who is going to count them to check? At least it will be an easier task for the boffins and keepers who are cooperating in a count of mountain hares which appear to be decreasing. Government rates assessors attended the annual keepers' day at Scone Palace in March. It was obvious that it is not known how the new sporting rates in operation since April will actually work. The assessors did not appear to know how the scheme would be implemented or if charities etc. would be exempt. It is good to see co-operation. The RSPB has finally accepted that moorland keepered for shooting is the place where the curlew is thriving and are working alongside keepers on this. Land managers are now needing to comply with shooting the number of deer as directed by government bodies. It has been suggested

that the closed season for stags is scrapped and the shooting season for hinds is extended.

SNH has carried out surveys on tree damage. If this can be identified as being by either deer, vole, mice, hare or rabbit then it is attributed to them. If the damage cannot be attributed then they will say that it is deer. Very scientific! This all leads to Trump like false news. Certain TV presenters are becoming quite expert in false news. I cannot give names but we watch Springwatch on record with the remote to hand. In this instance a petition was started on line to ban the shooting of lapwings. This species has been protected since the wildlife and conservation act of 1981. I was very disappointed to have no takers for the recipe for beaver tail soup. Apparently in the Middle Ages it was permissible to eat beavers' tails on a Friday as they look like flatfish. I don't have a recipe to hand but maybe you could try panfried (pretty big pan) with a wee bit of wild garlic.

You may have noticed that Mr. Fox has not been mentioned lately. The boys have been trying out new night vision equipment in the nocturnal hunt for him and, on occasions, have been surprised by a reflection off grass which looks as if foxy has a spotlight of his own.

Breadalbane Park

Kat has received funding from Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park, Moving Forward Grant and Stirling Council Community Pride Fund to employ a design architect to help us redesign the play area. The friends of Breadalbane Park Group have contracted Kelda Platt of Munro Landscape Ltd who is based at Tyndrum to carry out the design work. Kelda has met with the group and will be drawing up several design options. We will be starting our consultation with the Primary School on 12th June and from there taking it out to other groups and the wider community. We will try to get as much of the consultation done prior to the school holidays, but will continue again from late August to ensure we talk to as many children/children organisations as possible. We also want to consult with Killin Highland Games Committee, Killin Agricultural Show Committee and Killin 10k being the main local event users of the park.

Old Mill

KAT are in the process of looking at what funding options are available to them to take this project forward. With the unsuccessful Big Lottery application our offer of funding from Historic Scotland has been withdrawn so we need to start from scratch again. Possible funders are the Heritage Lottery and Historic Environment Scotland, but even with these two funders we will need to look at other funders too to put together a whole funding package.

Crianlarich and would like to keep it going, as we see the benefit it brings to all who use it. At the moment the internet café allows for the library to be open an extra day a week so you can come and use the library services as well. A small donation is always appreciated.

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Strathfillan



Strathfillan Community Council

Transport Strathfillan CC representatives held a useful meeting with George Fiddes of Transport Scotland. A wide range of transport related topics were covered, including drainage problems: aesthetic issues at Crianlarich bypass, footbridge and speed issues in Tyndrum, parking problems at Tyndrum Terrace in Crianlarich and safety at pedestrian crossing in Crianlarich. Also discussed were overnight road closures for roadworks and how to inform everyone in advance. The meeting was very productive, and George Fiddes promised to look into all the points raised and report back to the CC.

He also asked that members of the public report any road defects directly to the appropriate authority (BEAR for trunk roads, Stirling Council for other roads). A report number will be given when the defect is reported, and should be kept as this is the best way to follow up the case. If after a reasonable amount of time the defect has not been fixed then Bear/Stirling Council should be contacted for an update. If you are still unhappy with the response, email the CC who shall chase it up with Transport Scotland who have overall responsibility. Please do not make the initial report to the CC and please have details of the defect, report number and dates to enable the CC to pass the information to Transport Scotland.

Broadband The CC have been actively chasing for updates on the likely date of installation of superfast broadband across Strathfillan.

Unfortunately the latest information we have received is not good news. There is no fixed date for the upgrade and even when it does happen the extent of the improvements might be very limited. Most addresses within Tyndrum village may see a small speed increase, however the majority of Crianlarich addresses are currently not included in the upgrade programme at all. The CC will contact Bruce Crawford MSP to ask him to investigate further with Digital Scotland.

Public Toilets A meeting has been arranged with representatives from Stirling Council to discuss the frequency of cleaning etc. of the public toilets in Crianlarich and Tyndrum, and to find out why they were closed over the busy Christmas & New Year period.

Concerns The CC received a letter from a Crianlarich resident voicing concerns about the bypass, general roads issues and the material state of the village and surrounding area. The majority of issues raised were discussed with George Fiddes at the transport meeting. One of the points raised was that the CC does not reflect the views of local people. Therefore there is a short questionnaire from the CC included with Strathfillan copies of this edition. Please complete and return this. The CC can only act on issues which are brought to their attention. Next Meetings All CC meetings are open to the public. Members of the public attending will be given an opportunity to raise any relevant issues which they may have. The next meetings will be held on Monday 5th June and Monday 3rd July, in Crianlarich Hall. Meetings normally start at 7.30pm and are finished before 9pm. The CC AGM will be

held at 7pm on 5th June, followed by the ordinary meeting at 7.30pm. All are welcome.

Cycle Path Works for the Tyndrum to Dalrigh cycle path have been completed with the new bridge over the Crom Alt (see photo), so please take a cycle or stroll along the route to enjoy a new perspective of Tyndrum Community Woodlands. We have our fingers and toes crossed that the second phase, from Dalrigh to Crianlarich, will go ahead sooner rather than later - there has been lots of interest! Fraud

http://www.actionfraud.police.uk HMRC and Apple gift card fraud In the hundreds of cases reported to Action Fraud since May last year, fraudsters have been continually requesting victims purchase Apple iTunes gift cards as a means of payment for cons involving Her Majesty Revenues and Customs (HMRC).

The fraudsters are using the following contact methods to defraud people:

•Voicemails: Fraudsters are leaving victims automated

voicemails stating they owe HMRC unpaid taxes. When victims call back on the number provided, they are told that there is a warrant out for their arrest, unless they make payment via iTunes Vouchers.

•**Spoofed calls:** Fraudsters are cold calling victims using a spoofed 0300 200 3300 number and convincing them that they owe unpaid tax to HMRC.

•Text messages: Fraudsters are sending text messages requesting victims to urgently call back on the number provided. When victims call back, they are told that there is a case being built against them for an outstanding debt and they must pay immediately.

Fraudsters are using iTunes gift cards to collect money from victims because they can be easily redeemed and sold on. The scammers don't need the physical card to redeem the value and instead get victims to read out the serial code on the back over the phone to them.

Action Fraud has been working with Apple and HMRC to warn people about this type of fraud.

How to protect yourself

•HMRC will never use text message to inform about a tax rebate or penalty.

•HMRC will never ask for any payment in the form of iTunes Vouchers.

•HMRC will only post out a P800 tax calculations, in circumstances of under or overpayment of taxes, if you're employed or get a pension.

•Payments using iTunes Vouchers may not be recoverable.

•Telephone numbers and text messages can easily be spoofed. You should not trust the number you see on your telephone display as proving the caller is genuinely calling from HMRC.

•Be protective of divulging other personal details such as National Insurance number, passport number and bank details over the telephone.

•If you receive an unexpected call, whereby the caller requests an advance fee in the form of iTunes gift cards, the call should immediately be terminated.

Pharmacy First

Pharmacy First is an initiative by NHS Forth Valley that we have been providing in our pharmacy for over a year now. The service aims to provide quick and easy access to free treatment, if appropriate, for common minor conditions. Previously you would have had to visit your GP. Due to the success of the first year the scheme has now been extended allowing for treatment for more conditions.

There is no need to make an appointment; the pharmacist will carry out a private consultation and then make a decision about treatment. The pharmacist can also provide advice if no treatment is necessary or refer on for timely assessment by a GP.

The conditions we are now able to treat are:

Urinary tract infections (UTIs) Impetigo Skin infections Insect bites Allergic contact dermatitis Bacterial Conjunctivitis Recurrent vaginal thrush

Q&A with Skerryvore

For those unfamiliar with your music, how would you describe your sound?

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Tell us about the origins of the band. How did you all meet and start playing?

Daniel and Martin (Gillespie) are from Tiree and had lots of experience playing there for parties, ceilidhs and so on. Fraser (West) has holidayed on Tiree since he was a youngster and was a brass musician who also played drums. They got together playing in the pub in Tiree. Fraser's pal Alec (Dalglish) joined in and they toured the West Coast during summer holidays, playing in pubs and other small venues. From this, 'Skerryvore' was born.

Have you played Killin Music Festival before? What can we expect from your live show?

This is the first time for the band at the Killin Music Festival, though not the first time in Killin. People can expect a high energy performance, with a mix of songs and tunes, all delivered expertly by a group of enthusiastic performers.

You've also toured the U.S. and China. How have audiences overseas responded to your music?

Audiences in the U.S. have pretty different expectations from here in Scotland. They want to be entertained more than just listen to quality music, so we have to deliver differently. Their response is great. They love seeing Martin in his kilt and, strangely, think it's perfectly okay to investigate what he's wearing beneath it!

What's the name of your latest release? What's it about and why should we listen?

We're still working on our newest album and it doesn't yet have a title, though we've got a couple of suggestions. We're excited that it will introduce listeners to our expanded line-up, including top piper, Scott Wood (of Red Hot Chilli Pipers). It will be a mix of tunes and songs and will capture our on stage energy.

Why is it important to keep traditional Scottish music alive?

Scottish traditional music has gone through something of a resurgence over the last five to ten years, with loads of quality musicians coming through. We share our roots with many other world styles. It's important we retain our uniqueness, but it is also important that it keeps evolving.

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Staff raise funds for local Mountain Rescue teams



Three Mountain Rescue teams are to benefit from a cash boost of nearly £5,000 thanks to fundraising efforts by staff of Loch Lomond & The

Trossachs National Park. The Arrochar, Lomond and Killin Mountain Rescue Teams will split the £4,786 between them to help provide vital search and rescue services.

Each year the staff at the National Park Authority choose a charity of the year and this year the three Mountain Rescue Teams were chosen, with staff running a series of events and activities throughout the year including running a marathon, quiz, Great Scottish Swim, cake bakes, tea and toast mornings and a very popular tuck shop.

A cheque for the funds was presented to members of the three teams at the National Park Headquarters in Balloch this week. Mountain Rescue teams are run completely by volunteers to provide a round-the-clock search and rescue service, often making the difference between life and death for those in trouble across Scotland's mountains.

Gordon Watson, Chief Executive of Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park, said: "The National Park is visited by around 4 million people each year and includes many popular mountains and walking routes such as the West Highland Way. Unfortunately, from time to time people do get into difficulties on these routes. These teams of volunteers are able to deploy immediately, at all times of day and night, all year round, in all weathers, to get to people who are often in life-threatening situations, so the service they provide is absolutely vital.

Queens, Kelpies and Eagles



Have you ever heard of the Loch Tay kelpie? It is said that it waits on the banks around evening, a majestic white horse with deadly intentions. Often strangers were so enchanted by this creature that they climbed on it and were led away to its aquatic lair, only to be immediately devoured – a gruesome, if popular, myth in Scotland. Today, while floating above a 500 ft abyss on the new Loch Tay Safaris cruise boat, we're not taking any chances.

"The Loch Tay kelpie requires to be fed and appeased," our guide explains, smiling wryly as he holds up a small jar of oatmeal. "So it's a little offering we make so we can get back home again safely. What you do not want is for it to lose its temper and come drag you off."

When he asks for a volunteer, we look at each other reluctantly. One brave soul comes forward. With a handful of fare, he leans over the side of the rib and cautiously scatters it on the water. We sigh in relief. We'll be staying dry for the rest of this trip.

The kelpie is just one of many myths and legends around Loch Tay. A mile away from us, sitting in the shadow of the mighty Ben Lawers, are ruins of an old village, once home to infamous soothsayer The Lady of Lawers. Further east is Sybilla's Island, after Queen Sybilla of Normandy, who was allegedly buried there (her actual resting place is Dunfermaline Abbey). People have lived around these shores for 9,000 years - the lines between history, heritage, nature and folklore have blurred.

We embarked on this journey from Kenmore. The weather was warm and still, ideal conditions for sailing. A sleek, comfortable and high-tech vessel, the Iolaire ('eagle' in Gaelic) carries twelve passengers and has two crew: guide Jamie Cairncross and skipper/co-owner Donald Riddell. Donald's great-grandfather was the owner of the original steam boat which served as an anti-submarine vessel in the First World War. Once moving, the Iolaire did indeed glide like an eagle. Despite the serenity of the loch, it has a violent history. Clan Campbell also held residence on Sybilla's Island, albeit less peaceably. "They basically ruled from here right across to the west coast," says Mr Riddell, "Either you did what they said or you were taken out." Further up is the old steamer pier, built from local timber. This was a service point for steamers carrying mail to the opposite bank. It is believed that you could post your letter to Ardeonaig on the south side and it would be in Glasgow the following day, where you would expect a reply the day after that - faster than today. Just beyond the pier are the remains of an ancient crannog, partially revealed in low water levels.

An experienced diver, he has investigated the ruins himself and has even found small artefacts left over from the Bronze Age. The reconstruction is now at the Scottish Crannog Centre, which we pass on our return. It is extraordinary to think that humanity continues to thrive here after so long, the loch being as essential to people's livelihoods as it was thousands of years ago.

As we pull into the harbour, a gentle rendition of Loch Tay Boat Song plays, a perfect end to the trip:

"When I've done my work of day, And I row my boat away, Doon the waters of Loch Tay..." Michael Gardiner

Medical Matters

Make the most of your Minor Injuries Unit

Many local people with minor injuries automatically head for the Emergency Department at Forth Valley Royal Hospital but did you know you can often be seen and treated more quickly at the Minor Injuries Unit (MIU) at Stirling Community Hospital? This also frees up staff in the Emergency Department to treat patients with more serious injuries who require immediate care.

NHS Forth Valley's MIU is staffed by emergency nurse practitioners who can provide treatment for a wide range of minor injuries including minor burns and scalds, infected wounds, sprains, cuts and grazes. Staff can also examine and treat minor injuries to the eye, ear, head and neck areas and can arrange X-rays for suspected broken bones. Although the unit is based in Stirling, it offers treatment to patients over the age of one from across Forth Valley. No appointment is necessary and the MIU is open 7 days a week from 9am - 9pm. Babies under 12 months old with minor injuries should be taken to Forth Valley Royal Hospital.

Our Practice Nurse Jamie Anderson is currently receiving training in minor ailment management. This will enhance her role within the Practice. As you know, we operate a triage system for requests for unscheduled appointments and therefore you may be seen by Jamie, a GP, a Paramedic Practitioner or signposted to the Pharmacy. The Minor Injuries Unit can treat:

-minor burns and scalds -infected wounds

- -sprains and strains
- -cuts and grazes
- -minor eye injuries

-minor ear injuries (not infections)

-minor head and neck injuries -suspected broken bones (staff can arrange X-rays and apply plaster, if required)

It cannot treat:

-babies aged under the age of one -minor illnesses (including coughs, colds, sore throats)

-back or hip injuries

-injuries which happened several days ago

-old injuries which have recently got worse

If you are unsure whether you should attend the Minor Injuries Unit then phone first on 01786 434036 to check with local staff.

Smith the joiners to start a career as a joiner; it then became known as F. Smith & Son.

When called up for National Service dad wanted to go and fight for his country in Korea but unfortunately he was too young. He joined the Royal Engineers and was based at
