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Who You Are and Where You Live

So far this spring and summer the birds seem to have had a good breeding season. In the garden there are many little beaks being fed. From tiny blue-tits, siskins, robins and sparrows through the medium sized thrushes, blackbirds and woodpeckers to four broods of pheasants. The earliest pheasants seem to have reared five chicks out of an original six whereas the latest

only appear to have one left out of five. Maybe the really dry weather early on favoured them. Though it is always surprising to see how dry they appear after a rain storm. We certainly have a good number and variety of bushes and trees around here to give them cover. Bird parents certainly protect their young bravely and recently we watched a pair of wagtails successfully see off a weasel.

A first for us recently has

from the bird baths. I wonder if other people see this? Animals certainly need the right environment. Maybe that is a reason why the "accidental" introduction of beavers around here has been so much more successful than the planned project at Knapdale which is now reported to "be in need of urgent reinforcement to survive." You would imagine that beavers are probably better at choosing beaver habitats than humans. In spite of this spectacular lack of success the project has been awarded "wildlife success story of the year" by B.B.C. Countryfile magazine.

Of course, there is sometimes the opportunity to use someone else's abandoned des-res. A friend near Coshieville has had a blackbird or thrush's nest reused by a flycatcher. Seems we are all into recycling. The war against red deer seems to be continuing with government organisations claiming that there are too many animals for the ground and

our acres of lovely coniferous nonindigenous trees are at risk. Conversely we are told that Africa is losing its elephants fast and some reports frighten us by claiming that there will be no wild elephants in 10 years. Yet, on a recent trip to Zimbabwe's Hwangi National park there were an estimated 47,000 while it is claimed that the holding capacity for this area, roughly the size of Wales, is only 17,000. This is 100% increase since 1930 when

waterholes were bored. How do you count elephants in such a large area? One way is with drones as we saw one evening. The local elephant family inspected the truck and aerial and seemed very unimpressed beating a hasty retreat into the bush. Mentioning non-indigenous trees – the beech has recently been recategorised as indigenous. Thank goodness they found out before the

indigenous only enthusiasts got their hands, or saws, on them.

It has recently become legal again to dock the tails of certain working dogs within particular regulations. This will save a lifetime of continual injury for many dogs. It is interesting to note that tail docking etc. in livestock such as sheep has always been permitted. Just as it is bad luck if you are a buzzard who lives near an airport where you will be 'taken out' for safety reasons while your friends

in other areas enjoy untold protection.

All the human animals who live on a piece of land have been filling in government forms for the proposed sporting rates. At first it was projected that the rates would bring in £6million per annum, later this was reduced to £3m and now it is thought that it may just break even with administrative costs.

Mr. Fox and his gang have not been so lucky in their living

been so lucky in their living area. Three male foxes have had to be shot on safety grounds in a Sainsbury's supermarket warehouse in

Croydon. After 'animal aid' activists hounded the store over this, it was found that all was done following industry guidelines.

I bet the activists would not challenge the killing of rats and mice in the same area. It just depends on who you are and where you live!

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Breadalbane Park

The friends of the park group have been working with Kelda from Munro Landscape to pull together a draft design for the play area. Sue Hughes and myself went into Killin Primary School to talk to the children about the proposed design. We visited every classroom and spoke to all the children who were at school that day. During the first part of the session we asked what the children would like in the park and then asked for their feedback on the proposed design. The majority of suggestions from the children were in the proposed design and the children really liked the proposal.

We are holding a drop in community consultation day on Saturday 23rd September from 10am to 2pm at the McLaren Hall (Lesser), see below, where you will be able to comment on the proposal.

Stirling Council will be putting in benches and picnic tables around the park.



Internet Café

At present KAT has been unable to find funding to keep the internet cafe open. We have been working with Stirling Council Libraries to look at an alternative solution. Stirling Council Libraries run IT sessions called 'IT and Me, they would like to introduce these sessions in Killin instead of the internet café. The IT sessions run for 2 hours weekly at a time when the library is open. They are informal sessions similar to what KAT runs at the moment. They are run by volunteers who are trained and looked after by Stirling Council. The sessions will be free to everyone.

We are still at early discussions with Stirling Council Libraries, but this is looking like the way forward. We are yet to find a day and time that suits and if this is the way forward it is likely to start in September sometime. We will keep you updated on this.

Community Consultation.

KAT will be holding a drop in community consultation day on Saturday 23rd September, 10am to 2pm at the McLaren Hall (Lesser Hall). We are working with the Community Partnership who are a based within the Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park to carry out a new Community Action Plan (CAP). The CAP will enable the community of Killin to look at their priorities over the next 5 years. Our last CAP was carried out in 2011/2012 and it is time for us to update it.

Alongside the Community Partnership starting to get community feedback for a new CAP, KAT is consulting on projects that it will be progressing this year. By September KAT will be at a stage with a number of its projects for which they will need to gather community opinion. For some of the projects KAT are working with other partners.

Mill Moments

A shift in the Mill is never the same twice. There are quiet times and busy times and often memorable moments. People come from all parts of the world - even one from Russia - and conversations are sometimes conducted in sign language, usually with a lot of laughter, particularly so with a recent deaf and dumb group. Some people like to chat while others avoid eye contact, make a quick tour round and exit. The wheel is always the focus of interest and its gentle background rumble makes it easier for visitors to talk to each other and, when there are no visitors, it is companionable for the volunteers.

Many Macnabs of various spellings and nationalities call in for the keys to the island and have tales about their ancestors. A McDiarmid came looking to find his roots and said his father had worked in a Killin mill and had lodged in a 'White House'. After he'd left to go to the Old Cemetery and Kenknock, we discovered a document mentioning a Finlay McDiarmid who was the miller in the 1880s – rather too long ago to be his father but maybe a relative.

Another visitor was an American who was writing a book about St. Fillan. Why on earth was an American writing about St. Fillan? Because he was a professor at an Agricultural centre or college in the States and had learned there that St. Fillan had

some link with cattle. He was delighted to find the Healing Stones and to be directed to St. Fillan's Pond and Old Priory at Kirkton Farm with its agricultural connection.

There was a phone call from a gentleman with an Indian accent asking for the Mill address. Although he said he was looking at a Google map, he couldn't seem to find the Mill. Eventually, after a lot of mutual misunderstanding, he mentioned Breadalbane Folklore Centre and all became clear. He was actually updating the Google map – which now correctly shows the Old Mill.

Sometimes visitors are looking for specific things such as 'anything with a sheep' - blue curtains - a wine rack

or wellingtons. Sometimes they bring items such as a glass cone or a giant midge net to the desk to find out what they are – and we all have fun trying to guess. Items for sale are very varied and you can be sure that the weirdest objects will be snapped up with delight by someone. Trash or treasure, whether you're looking to buy or sorting things to price, there's always something of interest at the Mill.

thank you to everyone who attended the Trust's EGM on June 14th at Crianlarich Village Hall. There was a good turnout and lots of proxy voting forms were submitted. We are pleased to announce that there was unanimous agreement for the Trust to convert from a Charitable Company to a SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation). You will see very little difference on the ground, and the Trust will be undertaking the same role and activities as before, but it means that the Trust's governance has been simplified and more in keeping with current charity regulations and standards. meeting will be given at the September CC meeting, and in the


next edition of Killin News.

Mobile Phone Coverage - Several community members and local businesses attended a focus group session run by OFCOM to discuss mobile phone coverage (or lack of!) in the area, and the problems this causes for individuals and businesses. This is part of a national OFCOM study into mobile coverage in rural areas, and it is understood the formal report of the findings will be available on the OFCOM website later in the year. Unfortunately the way in which the market researchers recruited focus group participants was very haphazard, so some people who may have liked to attend did not get an opportunity to do so. However, those who did attend feel that the researchers left with a very clear idea of the problems experienced across the area.

Health - Work is still ongoing with the NHS and Killin Medical Practice to try and get a pilot "remote access" project launched. The original intention of an outreach surgery is no longer realistic. However, it is hoped that a remote access scheme would allow for regular monitoring of certain long term conditions, and also reduce the number of times patients

need to travel to Larbert for short follow up consultations.

CPR Training

On Monday 8 May The Sandpiper Trust came to the McLaren Leisure Centre to teach every McLaren High School pupil from S1 to S3 the lifesaving skill of CPR. Paramedics from The Sandpiper Trust were accompanied by the Trossachs Search and Rescue team, Callander Fire and Rescue and a local GP BASICS Responder in this combined effort to empower pupils to help others in emergency situations. Over three hundred pupils, staff and parents learned together as they attended sessions led by emergency first responders – an excellent opportunity for a small, rural community.

The Sandpiper Trust works to help save lives in Scotland both through the incredible work they do in fundraising to provide emergency equipment to rural Scottish locations and through educating people in preparation for emergencies. Keri Fickling from Sandpiper told us on the

day "CPR is really important because if someone suffers a cardiac arrest, and their heart stops, for every minute that nothing happens their chance of survival decreases by ten percent, so if we can start early CPR then we can increase peoples' chance of survival really easily – everybody's got the tools to do CPR: their own hands"; highlighting exactly why learning CPR is so valuable.

The teams encourage everyone to learn CPR and offer free training. Both charities can be followed and supported through their websites and social media pages,

Local mud run The Lanrick Challenge also offers a brilliant experience which raises money for The Sandpiper Trust and Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance. This year's Lanrick Challenge will take place on Saturday 5 August and registration is now open!

Pipe Band Workshop

McLaren High School hosted its first ever McLaren High School Pipes and Drums Workshop on 4 June. The School's pipe band, which has gone from strength to strength since it was set up by pupil Callum Hall two years ago, wanted to ensure a lasting legacy for the pipe band, and it was agreed that the best way to do that was to ensure that children start playing pipes and drums at Primary School. 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
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


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Callander Cinema New Season

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




