For those not familiar with how a Safari Supper works here is a brief explanation:As host you decide how many people you can seat at your dining table, including yourself,

and then cook for that number i.e. 6, 8 etc. You then make a three course meal for that number of people. Guests stay for only one course before moving onto their next venue. All this is organised in advance and, as host, you merely give out the details of where they go next to your guests when they have finished their part of the meal at your house.

As guests or travellers you have to purchase a ticket (not always easy as they normally sell out quickly) and also each person takes a bottle of wine to your first host.

As a taxi driver you are shuttling some of the travellers between venues, which won't be further than either end of the village and then to the Killin Hotel, where everyone i.e. hosts, guests and drivers meet up for coffee, drinks and raffle.

# **Update on C60 Bus Service**

Below is a summary of a letter sent by David Brown, Public Transport, Stirling Council on 9th October to Killin Community Council in response to feedback from the recent consultation exercise held in Killin and attended by some Crianlarich and Tyndrum residents as well as Killin locals.

People's priorities were as follows: Fix the C60 service.

Anything that extends the service to Crianlarich and Tyndrum would be good, provided the number of journeys doesn't reduce too much. It would reduce from 6 to 4 journeys per day.

A 'shopper bus' on Saturdays would be great on top of the C60 but is no substitute for it.

DRT can supplement the C60 but is no substitute for it.

In all communities pre-booking of Demand Responsive Transport (DRT) by 3pm on the previous working day was unpopular. The council said it "cannot see a way around this without an upgraded IT system because short-notice, same-day booking that meets the Council's audit requirements cannot be achieved cost-effectively using a system that would become dependent on telephone calls, rather than the once-a-day manifest that pre-booking by the previous working day enables us to use." However the council is now in discussion with Kingshouse Travel Ltd about a possible continuation of the

discussion with Kingshouse Travel Ltd about a possible continuation of the C60 service until at least the end of March 2018, having been informed that some people have expressed an interest in training as Passenger Carrying Vehicle (PCV) drivers with Kingshouse Travel Ltd.

In addition, the council stated that "Some funding is available for pilot schemes to improve rural transport. One of the improvements proposed (before the C60 situation developed) was to run a 'shopper's bus' on two Saturdays per month from Tyndrum to Stirling, extending to Springkerse Retail Park. Putting this service in place on top of the C60 (or its direct replacement) would enable us to retain the current C60 daytime frequency, while offering a direct through service at a frequency appropriate to the likely level of demand. It would be best to introduce this service no later than early December 2018, to make it available for pre-Christmas shopping"

# Stephen Kerr MP, letter to residents

Here is the latest information I have available regarding the C60 service.

Two people have come forward interested in taking the course to train as drivers. This requires successful completion of the Passenger Carrying vehicle (PCV) course. Should the course be successfully completed they will be awarded with the appropriate licence and be able to drive a bus. It must be stressed that people can decide not to proceed or subsequently decide that this career path is not for them. However we wish them the very best and it is very encouraging that they have come forward. In addition an existing driver who was due to retire in December has indicated he/she is willing to stay on until the end of March 2018. The efforts of Kingshouse Travel to secure additional drivers should be acknowledged and I would add my thanks to them for working to try to secure a future for the C60. Should the existing provision not be viable after the end of March next year, I would expect the Local Authority to issue tender documents to secure a replacement provider.

This may be a complex process with a number of potential outcomes but it appears there is now at the very least more time to find a sustainable solution. Of course Kingshouse may well be able to continue and this may not be necessary.

I am still very keen that there are serious efforts made to improve the route and include Crianlarich & Tyndrum. Should any new contract be required this would be an opportunity to include such an enhancement.

I am also aware of an exercise to introduce a service on a trial basis that runs on two Saturdays per month from Tyndrum through to Stirling. This would operate for an initial set period and tender documents are being prepared by the Local Authority. In last year's budget there was some additional budget included for rural transport and I welcome the foresight of that move that is allowing this project to be progressed.

I will keep you updated as any further information becomes available.

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# Posthumous Award to Graham Wilson from the Russian Arctic Convoys Club (RACC)

The following letter and photos were received from Anna Mckessock, Chair of the RACC

Dear Killin News,

Here are some photographs of the sons of the late Graham Wilson receiving his Ushakov medal at the Russian Federation Consul (Edinburgh) in April this year. The Russian Federation had been searching for information about Mr Wilson, who served on the convoys to Russia during WWII, when I started to help them find 'missing' servicemen. Luckily I came across a newsletter you had produced in 2004

and, thanks to your help, managed to find his sons Harry and Gavin and they were then awarded their Dad's medal.

Thank you so much for all your help in locating Mr Wilson's family. The Ushakov is the highest honour that is ever given out to the servicemen, so it's a really huge deal for the families.

The Consul General of the Russian Federation, Mr Andrey A Pritsepov, made them very welcome and was

extremely generous in gifts he also gave them, as well as a specially produced whisky (which was commissioned by Mr Pritsepov). I hope you like the photos, the ones in Edinburgh were taken by the Consul and the ones of Mr Wilson were, I believe, his own. There is more information online

# Changing times and seasons

These seasonal scurryings in and out of the woods have obviously not been subjected to a risk assessment as on a recent trip from Ardeonaig to Aberfeldy we saw six squashed on the road. On the same grisly subject, it would appear that two of our visiting hedgehogs have also been subject to road kill

Our resident population of pheasants is being augmented by quite a platoon of incomers. Presumably the shoots towards Kenmore are moving them in our

direction. We are hoping that a few partridge will arrive as they did a few years ago. They usually stay around the garden for a good while as they enjoy sitting on the big rock lookouts.

Mr. Stoat, along with his friends and relations who relocated to Orkney, will be in for a shock as a £64,000 grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund has been granted to aid their eradication. The project is to be run between RSPB and SNH. The stoat is said to be non-native to Orkney and

poses a threat to poultry, the Orkney vole and many birds.

Some good news for those of you worried about polar bears and global warming – scientists have discovered that, once again, sea ice has melted hundreds of thousands of miles below average this year. Don't worry too much about "cuddly bear" either

successfully used to detect poaching, even at night. Unfortunately hardly any poachers are arrested due to bribes being paid.

# **Fire Stations**

Gordon Kerr, Scottish Fire & Rescue Service (SFRS) Station Manager attended the November CC meeting to discuss staffing numbers at Crianlarich Fire Station. Currently Crianlarich Station only has 2 retained personnel which is not enough for it to be fully operational. A minimum of 4

(ideally 5) is required for it to operate effectively. One candidate is going through the recruitment process at the moment, but more are urgently needed. SFRS have no plans to close the Station, but ask for the community help to recruit more retained firefighters for Crianlarich, to ensure that it can survive. An information / recruitment event will be organised between SFRS and the CC anybody aged 18+ who might be interested is asked to come along and find out more, without obligation.

# **Firearms Licences**

The CC are very pleased that the problems surrounding signing of medical certificates for firearms applications has now been resolved and that KMP are now able to provide this service for patients once again.

# **Telephone & Broadband**

There has been no further update from Digital Scotland regarding the potential upgrade to fibre optic broadband for Crianlarich and Tyndrum exchanges. The CC will continue to push this issue with the relevant authorities, and will provide an update as soon possible.

The problems experienced over the summer with Crianlarich telephone landlines has now been resolved, after the intervention of the CC, with assistance from Dean Lockhart MSP. Should anybody experience further problems with landlines please report it to your telephone provider in the first instance.

# **Tourist Information Centre**

The CC were very disappointed to learn that Visit Scotland have permanently closed the Tyndrum Information Centre, along with many others across Scotland. It is understood that visitor numbers using the Tyndrum centre had been increasing year on year. At the time of writing, Tyndrum Village Hall committee are in the early stages of exploring whether the redundant building would be suitable for community use, and the CC have offered to support this in whatever way they can.

# **C60**

The CC were pleased that Stirling Council agreed to the request for a drop in meeting about the C60 bus service to be held in Strathfillan, and that the event was well attended. As a direct result of this meeting, Stirling Council are now looking at ways to provide a direct bus service from Tyndrum to Stirling. We understand that there is to be a trial of a fortnightly "shopper service" on a Saturday, starting and finishing in Tyndrum, although details of this are not yet

known. The CC were also pleased to learn that the C60 service should now be extended until at least March 2018, and hope that a permanent solution will be in place by then.

# **Community Council Tyndrum Meeting**

The next CC meeting will be held in Tyndrum. The meeting will be in The Tyndrum Inn at 7.30pm on Monday 4th December. Councillor Martin Earl will also be holding a drop-in surgery in Tyndrum Inn from 7-7.30pm that evening. No appointment necessary. All CC meetings are open to everybody, it is hoped that the change of venue will encourage more community members from Tyndrum to attend. If the change of venue is successful, future meetings could potentially alternate between Crianlarich and Tyndrum.

There is no meeting in January, so the first meeting of 2018 will be on Monday 5th February in Crianlarich Hall at 7.30pm.

# **Cambusurich Woodland**

Charles Bushby of Scottish Woodlands and Catherine Walker of Forestry Commission Scotland gave a presentation on a proposed woodland at Cambusurich. This ground has been bought by two Germans who have experience with woodlands in Germany. Charles Bushby said that it was the first time that he had designed a woodland in this way. It has been designed over the last 18 months and it will be a mixture of 31% Sitka, 22% conifers, 34% native woodland and 13% Scots pine. This will be on the open hill above the already designated S.S.S.I. which is already overseen by S.N.H. The new woodland will be able to provide the local biomass with wood over time.

The woodland will be serviced by a road network which will be about 6km long. After two years the wood will have started to grow and there will still be public access to the site. It was asked if an area that gives one of the only views over the loch would be planted. Fencing was also discussed.

Charlie Grant brought up the subject of the water supply to the village and surrounding area possibly being affected. Charles Bushby said he did not think the water would be affected and Katherine Walker said she would talk to Scottish Water.

Charles Bushby gave maps to those who requested them and Kay Riddell is to hold some in the library for interested parties.

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# **The Caerbannog Connection**

"Are you looking for the rabbit too?"
"No, I'm looking for the Holy Grail."
So begins my conversation with two
Monty Python nerds. There's
something quite surreal and comical
about this exchange, standing on a
remote hillside, in the pouring rain.
My worst fears were of knight's
armour and brandished longswords,
but these two look normal; a cheery,
twenty-something couple in dayglo
anoraks and walking boots. Like me,
they're searching for a rather peculiar
copper mine.

To devotees of that infamous comedy

group, the name Tomnadashan won't mean much. It has some geological and industrial interest not something that'll get pulses racing. Ask them about 'The Cave of Caerbannog' and you'll get quite a different reaction. The mine was immortalised in 1975's The Holy Grail as the home of a fearsome bunny that prowls over a heap of human bones. Today, it

attracts fans worldwide brave enough to face the mythical beast.

"Have you seen it yet?" asks the young woman. "We've been looking but I think we were going in the wrong direction."

I tell her that I spotted a spoil tip on the incline – we are close to our destination. We continue climbing and scramble over the tip; a grey, lunar-like scab on otherwise fertile land. On the ledge above are some ruined cottages. Beyond, partially concealed by trees, two giant gaping mouths etched into the rock.

"Oh, there it is," says the young man casually. His partner rushes forward with her camera, exclaiming, "The rabbit is here!"

Luckily this one is quite harmless, all sodden fabric and marble eyes – a tribute left by a previous visitor. In the alcoves of the entrance are more props like coconuts, a goblet and even a Holy Hand Grenade, the device used by Graham Chapman's King Arthur to slay the rabbit. As I enter I am immediately struck by the vastness of the place. Every tiny sound reverberates wonderfully:

exploration) is being mined just north of Aberfeldy. Tomnadashan, on the south side of Loch Tay, was worked for about twenty years towards the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Despite the willpower of entrepreneur John Campbell (who even built his own smelting factory on the lochside) no metallic copper was ever produced. The mine closed down in 1862.

On a lighter note, this abandoned relic has been given new lease of life in Monty Python fandom. Elusive to

sign posts and Ordnance Survey maps, it is still discovered and has become, in ways that Campbell could never comprehend, a shrine to a very funny film. Carved into these orange walls are dozens of catchphrases that'll either crack vou up or anger you as careless vandalism. But if this is how Tomnadashan is

to be remembered, then I'm in the first camp. Say no more. The pilgrimage ends with a beautiful view over the loch. As I walk back to the car, I see the mine disappear once more into the hills, hidden from passing drivers. While this might not

passing drivers. While this might not be the most pretty, accessible or informative attraction in our corner of the world, it is the weirdest – how often do you see that in the brochures?

After discussions with police the doctors at Killin practice are now willing to sign medical forms for shotgun and firearms certificates.



My Aunt was born at St Leonard's, Forteath Avenue, Elgin, the youngest of four daughters to Alexander Low Mustard, solicitor with Messrs Grigor and Young and Eliza Russell Mustard (Ivy, nee Jack).

She went to Springfield Primary School and then to St Margaret's Edinburgh which decamped to Dunkeld during the war. While there she passed grade VI (Intermediate) in

Pianoforte. She became a reporter with a local paper in Elgin.

On the death of her father in 1949 she, her mother and sister Hetty moved to Edinburgh. In 1950 she gained certificates in shorthand at a speed of 100 words per minute and first class in typewriting at intermediate stage and became a medical secretary at Edinburgh Royal Infirmary.

Circa 1953 she and her mother went on the Union Castle line to South Africa for a winter staying with friends in Rhodesia.

After gaining qualifications including Latin, she went in 1957

She taught at West Calder Primary School and then was deputy Head at Danderhall Primary School.

After her sister Hetty bought Pierend in Killin she spent the summers there. She was heavily involved with Liberton Kirk and attended Killin Church. She was a life member of the Friends of Balguhidder Church and for many years attended their summer concerts and with her sister Hetty did the

catering for them for a few years. She was for a time Brown Owl with one of the Brownie Packs at Liberton Kirk and took them on Pack Holidays to Kippin.

After she retired from teaching in 1981, during the summer months she and her sister Hetty ran the Mustard Pot, a tearoom and gift shop in Killin. She also volunteered with the WRVS in Edinburgh.

As already mentioned she enjoyed playing the piano and keyboard. In 2001 she passed with merit in pianoforte leisure play - advanced. She played for services at Braidhills Nursing Home.

She had several dogs and visited care

homes under Therapets with

She enjoyed travelling. In 1994 she went on a pilgrimage to the sacred places of Jerusalem and the Holy Land. She went on two safaris with her niece Vivien Welsh.

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
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# **Book Review**



St Kilda is Scotland's westernmost island. A hundred miles from the mainland, this harsh and barren archipelago sustained a small community for generations until 1930, when a series of unfortunate events forced the inhabitants to leave.

Unlike so many books, films and tv programmes, this account is not

really about the evacuation. Instead, Tom Steel documents the history of the islanders throughout the centuries; detailing how they lived, communicated with the outside world and were perceived by visitors. It was a life of unimaginable hardship. Ravaged by continuous gales (which sometimes caused deafness in individuals) and held prisoner by the tides, the community sheltered in primitive stone houses with next to no furniture. They bred cattle and sheep, but their diet consisted mainly of sea birds and their eggs which were collected by perilously scaling cliff edges. This is as compelling as any survival story, the sense of desperation palpable. Yet Steel suggests that the islanders were comfortable, even happy, with their situation - only because they knew nothing else. However, such was the strength of the community, that some who left for better prospects returned shortly after due to homesickness. Perhaps the most tragic part of this story was the plight of the older St Kildans post-evacuation. Steel writes, "They expected life on the mainland to be the solution to all their problems." The result was the

breakup of families, poor pay,

adapt. For the younger islanders, settling in was much easier and seen as an adventure.

Steel's writing style can be a little dry at times and could have used more atmospheric scene-setting but the photographs inside do an excellent job of humanising the people. At once heart-breaking and inspirational, this book offers a full look at a lost place and time - an island truly on the edge of the world.



Along with others of my era the landmark of seventy arrived recently. I am grateful for the support of my family in celebrating this milestone and especially with the arrival of Lachlan, our first grandson three days earlier. Thanks also for the many

messages of good wishes from both home and abroad. All were most appreciated. Looking back over the years, the railway has gone, the bus service has



altered and of course owning transport has dramatically changed village life. There was always folk ready to help organise events, and clubs were well attended. Co-operation was how things were done. Sadly, some of the original clubs have ceased and others have sprung up and with the everevolving lifestyle, the village has changed to what we know today. Reflecting on the many organisations I have been involved with and the changes in village life, it is worth mentioning how people became involved in projects, and in their way shaped life in Killin, all for the benefit of the community. My personal

involvements have included angling for most of my life and serving for nine years as the local club President. I was on the steering committee which obtained the River Tay Protection Order and still play a very active role. I gave evidence before the Scottish

The Killin Initiative was the umbrella group for the main village events and won the prestigious Thistle Award for the best Village Initiative in Tourism in 1995. We all worked together on The Festival and the Highland Games and put Killin

on the map. Today's Music Festival has a different approach and is worthy of support even from an Old Traditionalist like myself.

Debbie and I were responsible for the Millennium Cairn project, part of the celebrations for the village. The sealed packages it contains will hopefully survive intact until its opening at the dawn of the next century. The ongoing Hogmanay Fireworks began with the celebration on the arrival of 2000. This year the Farmers Country Showdown production team came to the area and recorded many hours of the Killin Agricultural Society Show which is to be part of the new series in 2018. Over the years I have gained a lot of pleasure from being involved with like-minded folk in events.
