A Voice for Killin

Killin has had no Community Council for the past four months and, unless there are people now prepared to stand, this will continue and be a disaster for the village. The Council is vital as the link between Killin and Stirling Council for local and Stirling Council ideas, objections, plans and complaints to be aired and shared. Without it Killin has no say in what happens here. (Just as an example, there is a current rumour that parking charges are to be introduced in Killin, which could mean having to pay to park whenever we go into the village and would also put off visitors. Do we want this imposed on us without any say in the matter? Comments to Stirling Council via a Community Council carry more weight than anything a resident can say.)

The last Council completed its fouryear term in the autumn when two long serving Councillors, Fiona Kennedy and Tim Frost, retired and five others resigned, leaving only five of the then maximum of twelve. A minimum of six is required and no other nominations were submitted by the required date of 19th October. In mid-January arrangements for appointing a new Council with a maximum of only nine Councillors were announced. New nominations are/were required by 8th February and, if this has been better publicised than it was in the Autumn, it is hoped that by the time you read this there will be nine nominations submitted. Should there be more than nine, an election would be necessary - for only the second time in the last twenty years. If we don't get a Council now, we may not have the

chance again for some time. Killin now has a population of more than 700 and many young and forwardlooking residents. Surely there are nine people here who are willing and able to give time and energy to helping the community? The Council meets only six times a year - and the different areas of community interest or problem can be shared and followed through by individual Councillors in between meetings. Killin Community Council has achieved much in the past, not least by acquiring the Falls of Dochart Retirement Home for the village, and we know from reports in 'Strathfillan by the Way' how much difference their Council has made to Strathfillan, Killin needs a good Council and let's hope we will have one very soon.



Community Sport Hub Update

The Community Sport Hub had their first meeting of the year on Tuesday, January 15th. Although poor planning resulted in a clash with pantomime rehearsals, there was a great enthusiasm and productive discussion had by the smaller group.

Topics on the agenda included progressing plans and opportunities for young people in the area through working in partnership with Callander Youth Project, creating a collective directory of sport and physical activity sessions for signposting and referral, and planning an inclusion awareness session for clubs and groups that would be delivered by Scottish Disability Sport. The hub will also look to be hosting a community event or 'come and try' programme in spring/summer. The sports club will be undertaking a feasibility study in the coming weeks. This process will involve a considerable amount of engagement with the whole community in order to progress and understand the need for future developments and opportunities at the



Dougle has been on hand sharing his expertise and training Katy and the team. News First will need to be shut in late February for about 2 weeks so KAT can carry out renovations. Dates will be confirmed once we know them. MacGregor's will still be selling papers possibly from MacGregor's Market/Post Office, they will let you know

You may be wondering why we have set up a Crowdfunding Page to fundraise for more money? Simply, we haven't raised enough to cover all the costs required. Funders dictate what you can spend the money on and you cannot deviate from that. We were given a grant from the Scottish Land Fund to cover the cost of buying the building and renovation costs. Stirling Council gave us some money to be used as match funding for any aspect of the project. We still need to find money for buying the business from Dougie and Liz.

Dougie and Liz really just wanted to retire before Christmas, so we all came to an agreement that because we had the money to buy the building, we could proceed with this part. We will give Dougle and Liz the rest of the money owed at a later date. This is the money we need to raise and we are doing this partly through: Crowdfunder.co.uk/more-than-a-post-office

According to the 2011 census there are 441 occupied households in the Killin Community Council area. If every household donated £20 then we would raise £8,820 which is so very close to our target. We have extended our end date to mid-February. Please help us with this final push. KAT would like to wish Dougie and Liz a happy retirement.

Post Office Transition to Paper Shop

I imagine there's a bit of confusion out there about the Paper Shop/Post Office plans. I'm confused !! There's going to continue to be a period of upheaval while KAT gets the Paper Shop refurbished and while we wait for the Post Office to organise moving all the equipment down the road. The simplified timetable is thus:

MacGregors are leasing the shop from KAT, primarily to make sure the Post Office and Paper Shop remain in Killin for the foreseeable future and beyond. If you want to be a part of things, in any form, you can. There will be paid work advertised once the two shops are amalgamated; watch this space!

On 4th October Killin Nursery was inspected by the Care Inspectorate. The themes inspected were Quality of Care and Support and Quality of Environment, both of which received a grading of very good. We are delighted that this report has highlighted the responsive care and support which children and families receive within our nurturing environment. It acknowledges the rich play opportunities which support children to develop their curiosity, creativity and imagination. This includes use of the outdoor learning environment and partnership working with members of the community. The full report is available to read on the Care Inspectorate website.

Crianlarich Nursery was inspected on 20th December and we are awaiting their final report.

My thanks to a dedicated staff team who are committed to ensuring that all children receive the very best Early Learning and Childcare.

The staff team attended training during the November closure days. This included the development of Communication Environments and under three's training. Continuing professional development supports staff to gain new knowledge and develop practice. A further opportunity for training in February includes 'numeracy', 'developing curiosity', and 'investigation and discovery'. Everyone at Killin and Crianlarich Nurseries was very busy in the lead up to Christmas.

The Parents' group ran a 'Christmas Lights Competition'. Congratulations to the winners

Work To Begin On Water **Mains In Crianlarich**

Scottish Water have announced that they will be upgrading 222 metres of pipe work in the Crianlarich area, along Station

The £120,000 investment comes after calls from Stirling MSP Bruce Crawford for a permanent solution to be sought following repeated bursts of the water main leaving many properties without running water.

It is hoped that this work will reduce the risk of further disruption by burst mains.

Commenting, Bruce Crawford said: "This is very welcome news indeed and Crianlarich locals will welcome this investment to fix the problem. The water main through the village had burst four times in as many months last year, leaving many homes and businesses without water for periods of time. It was clear that the situation needed more than just a plaster to fix the problem."

Crianlarich **Phone Lines**

Stirling MSP Bruce Crawford has written to BT

to raise his concerns over a "pitifully poor" phone service in the Crianlarich area. He had been contacted by a number of locals, including community councillors from the area, who had highlighted the scale of the issue. There are concerns that the exchange point itself is no longer fit for use and he has called for BT to take urgent action to restore a reliable phone service for landline users in the area as soon as possible. Mr Crawford commented "Local residents are right to be frustrated. They loyally pay for their line rental, and expect to receive a working service in return. On many occasions, this simply isn't happening. One resident told me that he lost his connection eight times in one day."



Book Review


The Dam Builders: Power from the Glens

by James Miller

It beggars belief that electricity came to the Highlands a mere seventy years ago. The same year that the tiny village of Tomintoul 'switched on' saw the development of the first digital computer, the breaking of the sound barrier and the Polaroid camera unveiled to the American public. The world emerging from the ruins of the Second World War was one of rapidly evolving science and technology, social and economic reform. In Britain this manifested in the creation of the NHS and the nationalisation of the rail and coal industries. Living standards were improving; convenience and



luxury in the home essential. As one eyewitness sums up in James Miller's *The Dam Builders*: "The idea was that people coming home from the War



would get better things." Looking north, the British government sought to resurrect the neglected Highlands by means of hydro-electric power, resulting in a massive thirty-year construction project of dams, power stations, tunnels and power lines from Killin to Caithness.

Miller's book is the deeply human story of one of Scotland's greatest post-war achievements. Beginning in the early 20th century when electricity was a commodity enjoyed only by rich landowners, it chronicles the foundation of the North Scotland Hydro-Electric Board and the life of its passionate founder, Tom Johnston, whose vision was to literally give power back to the people. Along the way we meet a myriad of fascinating characters: surveyors, engineers,

dambuilders, tunnel tigers,named so for their talent of drilling tunnels in record time. The new schemes (Breadalbane, Glen Affric, Cruachan,

> to name a few) became a world in themselves, employing thousands of workers and drastically swelling the population of nearby communities. Away from the remote Army-style work billets, these weekend destinations presented new opportunities and challenges. Pubs, dancehalls and cinemas flourished. Around the same time, local police forces upped their recruitment drive. In one humorous anecdote, an eyewitness recalls some workers buying new suits for a night out only to sell them the next day after gambling away all their wages.

Beyond entertainment, the men and women on the schemes were playing a vital role in

the modernisation of the Highlands. The days of the Tilley lamp and peatfired range were soon gone. By the time power came to most households in the 1950s, people were already queuing up for the latest appliances like electric cookers and fridges. Johnston's vision of keeping a public resource in public hands had at last been realised but his ideas of a Highland powerhouse were unfulfilled. Industry did not flock to the region rather, the dams became unexpected tourist attractions. The environmental impact of the schemes was, and still is, a source of debate. However, in an age where we are striving for renewables, it is important to remember the pioneering work of *The* Dam Builders.

W H Auden said "A culture is no better than its woods". Come along to the AGM and see how this philosophy is being supported at Dùn Coillich, since 2002, when the land was purchased on behalf of the community. Over 220,000 native trees have been

planted as a key part of the restoration of a healthy ecosystem. HPCLT also looks after the Wee Birks Field in Aberfeldy, where there are already established trees. This area will be kept as an open space for public enjoyment, perhaps with some seats and some additional native flowering trees.

Cononish Gold Mine

Stephen Kerr, MP for Stirling, who visited the Cononish Gold mine near Tyndrum earlier this year, has welcomed the news that all preplanning conditions have been met by the operators, Scotgold, and that production is planned to start next year. He was accompanied by local Cllr Jeremy McDonald and met Scotgold Non Executive Director, Chris Sangster, who took them on a tour of the mine, which on construction will become Scotland's first ever commercial gold mine. The mine, situated in the Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park near Tyndrum, is estimated to contain up to 200,000 ounces of gold, worth around £200 million at today's prices. The owners, Scotgold, have ensured that the operation is as environmentally friendly as possible and will also ensure that the landscape is protected during operations. The mine will operate for up to 17 years, depending on the rate of extraction. The company hopes to create sixty jobs and have pledged to invest £500,000 in direct payments to the local community and to assist in creating a visitor centre should such a facility prove

Walk in the Park is a friendly group of people who get together on a Wednesday morning to enjoy a short 45 minute stroll in or around Killin. At the beginning of the New Year we are often thinking how we can embrace a healthier lifestyle. Perhaps it could be as simple as getting out more for a walk. Walking is one of the best forms of exercise, it's completely free, does not need any special equipment (except comfortable shoes and a coat) and almost everyone can take part.

Walking with a group provides a safe and supportive environment for exercise in the beautiful countryside on our doorstep. We also enjoy a social time with the other members, there is an opportunity as we walk to catch up with old friends and make some new ones along the way. The walks end with an optional social time in Shutters, Capercaillie

or Bridge of Lochay Hotel.

Our walking routes are mostly on flat paths with good surfaces and are risk assessed prior to the walk. Supported by trained volunteer walk leaders, new members can start off at a slower pace or walk a shorter distance to build up confidence and stamina.

Along with the health walks, Walk in the Park run a strength and balance programme. 

Musings From The Manse

Jesus, The Bully Wee And Everyday Heroes

In footballing terms I am a "Hibee" having followed the Edinburgh team since 1968. It is just like being a Christian, we need a lot of faith, hope and perseverance! My first match at Easter Road that same year, saw St Johnstone beat us 1-0. After a long sojourn in the North East where I only saw Hibs if they played Aberdeen, I decided in 2004 to take my youngest boy Peter for a day out to the capital, have some great food, and visit the hallowed ground for the opening game of the new season. Yes, we lost to Kilmarnock 1-0. Oh the joys! Then I moved to Edinburgh in 2008, to a congregation on the east side of the city full of fellow Hibees. Great times were had by all. Friendship and banter at the match on Saturday and fellowship and banter at the church on Sunday. I miss those days. Of course I was in Edinburgh when we won the Scottish Cup in 2016 after 114 years of trying. Unfortunately, on the day of the cup final, Brenda and I were on a train to London to meet my daughter's future in-laws and when Hibs paraded the cup in the capital the following day, I was on the train coming back from London, Bummer! On a more serious note, we have,

On a more serious note, we have, these past four years, been commemorating the centenary of the Great War of 1914-1918. This has meant I have thought long and hard about my grandfather and all he experienced during that time. I am so grateful to have the treasure trove of stories he shared with me about that conflict. Yet there was another topic very dear to his heart and about which there was another boxful of stories. My grandfather was a great football fan and supporter of

Clyde FC. A Glasgow man born and bred, he eschewed the lure of supporting the big clubs Rangers and Celtic and was fiercely proud of his working class roots and the team he followed. Clyde are affectionately known as the Bully Wee. This nickname probably has its roots in the Victorian slang "bully," meaning first-rate/good/worthy. The "wee" is self-explanatory given that Clyde were not one of the bigger clubs. Despite living in the shadow of their bigger neighbours, Clyde have often punched above their weight, winning the Scottish Cup three times. Their support is passionate and dedicated, with a strong sense of identity and history. They also have a strong sense of destiny and a hopeful confidence of future success. A bit like the Christian Church! I have no doubt that Jesus was seen as "bully" by his fellow Galilean countrymen and certainly the revolution he began was initiated by a small band of ordinary "bully" men and women who also had a strong sense of identity and destiny. It was their passionate commitment and dedication that helped change history. The Church began as a small and lowly group living in the shadow of the Empires of the world but for 2,000 years it has punched well above its weight and in so many ways, still does. My grandfather was an elder in the Kirk and some of his most moving stories were of him

for a lot of its history it has had an unholy alliance with power and privilege too. That thankfully is

Tombreck Affordable Housing Project

Unique Rural Housing Project Creates a Buzz...

In Highland Perthshire, incomes are low and house prices are high. The lack of affordable housing in the area has consequences for the sustainability of our community. This is made worse by ageing demographics as houses are bought as second homes, or for retirement. More affordable rural housing, would result in more opportunities for business start-ups and entrepreneurs, and could reverse the trend of young people moving away.

Tombreck Farm

(www.tombreck.co.uk) is on the North side of Loch Tay, and the Tombreck Action Group (TAG) was formed in 2003 with a vision for the future: "To work as a farm, and to diversify into other activities so as to include other people, and to provide housing and employment at a sustainable level." The question was 'how could a farm, which 150 years ago supported several families, be vibrant and productive once more?

After many developments and much building work, Tombreck Farm is now home to over 20 people in nine separate households. The oldest resident is in his late 60's and the youngest is just 9 months old. There is also the Big Shed community building owned by the Lochtayside Community Interest Company (LTCIC) (www.bigshed.org.uk), which hosts weekly yoga sessions as well as regular concerts and other community events. There are several small businesses on site, doing everything from crafts to architecture.

Tombreck Farm has recently been inviting applications from new farmers and growers who wish to farm in an agri-environmental way, and a new housing co-op is part of the overall vision of getting people, especially young people, back to living on the land.

The Tombreck Action Group has obtained funding from the Scottish Government's Rural Housing Fund for a Feasibility Study to explore options for new affordable houses on the farm, the housing being for local people in housing need as well as new farmers and growers. The feasibility study is now well underway and will report back at the end of March.

In early December a post on Facebook publicising the Tombreck Rural Housing Co-op and inviting more people, especially young people and families, to get in touch, was met with much excitement. Within 24 hours over 6,000 people had seen the post and that number is currently approaching 15,000! The post went all over the world and the interest has been massive. This idea has touched and excited people at a deep level, even those who are unable to participate due to circumstance, age or location.

Although delighted by the response, it's a small farm, and the group had to be closed at 10 potential new households. There is a waiting list, and anyone interested in being involved now or in the future is welcome to join it. If you are local and/or with a land based business idea please get in touch. Weather 2018

Kirkton Farm (Met Office Automatic Weather Station), near Tyndrum, Strathfillan

The main features of the weather at Kirkton in 2018 were a cold, snowy but relatively dry January, February and March; a dry spring; a hot and sunny June and July, with record breaking temperatures; a wet autumn; and a relatively mild December.

The total rainfall recorded at the Met

Office automatic station at Kirkton in 2018 was 2475.6 mm (97.5 inches). This was 138.2 mm less than the 1991-2015 twenty-five year average (2613.8 mm). The wettest month was November with 351.2 mm of rainfall. The rainfall was above average in June, July, September, October and November. The driest month was May with 67.6 mm of rainfall (only 48% of the 25 year average). February was also particularly dry with only 123.8 mm of precipitation (49% of the 25 year average). The highest rainfall over a

calendar Week (Monday to Sunday)

recorded. The total number of rain days was 269 (73.7 %).

The lowest temperature recorded during 2018 was on the 21st January when the temperature fell to -11.3°C. This was the lowest temperature since January 2011. The lowest maximum temperature was recorded on the 28th

February (-1.2°C). There were three days when the temperature failed to rise above freezing (7th January, 28th February and 1st March). An air frost


temperatures of 20.45°C and 20.26°C respectively. Temperatures of 25°C or above were recorded on 12 days (two days in May, seven days in June and three days in July), while temperatures above 20°C (but less than 25°C) were recorded on a further 26 days.


Sleet or snow was recorded falling at

the weather station on 36 days. A snow depth of 24 cm was recorded on 22nd January. There was no snow recorded in November and only two days of snow in December.

There were four days in 2018 when sustained gale force winds were recorded at the farm (19th September, 28th and 29th November, 15th and 18th December); and there were six days when thunderstorms occurred (3rd, 7th, 8th and 9th June, 27th July and 19th September).

The total rainfall recorded in Killin in 2018 was 1688 mm (66.46 inches); this was 210.5 mm less than the 2002-2016 fifteen-year average (1898.5 mm). May was the driest month with





was 181.2 mm between the 22nd and the 28th January. There were four calendar weeks when the total rainfall exceeded 100 mm. The highest rainfall in a single 24 hour period (09:00 GMT to 09:00 GMT) was 72.8 mm on the 8th October. There were five days when more than 50 mm of rainfall was recorded (22nd January, 17th September, 19th September, 7th October and 8th October) and a further 20 days when more than 25 mm of rainfall was

was recorded on a total of 86 days. There were no air frosts recorded in June, July or August. The highest temperature recorded was on the 28th June (31.6°C). This was the highest temperature ever recorded at Kirkton and the first time a temperature of over 30°C had been recorded. June and July were the warmest months with mean temperatures of 14.46°C and 15.20°C respectively, and mean maximum

only 37.5 mm of rain, while November was the wettest month with 300.5 mm. During 2018 Killin received 68.2 % of the rainfall recorded at Kirkton (i.e. some 787.6 mm less). The rainfall was higher at Kirkton in all months.

Thanks to the Met Office for supplying the data from the automatic weather station at Kirkton.
