

Killin Heritage Society Is Alive And Kicking

I'm not sure if it was the promise of a Judy Forster cake or a talk from John Holland on the history of Scottish sheep farming that tempted nearly 20 people to miss a sunny Sunday afternoon on 17th March to attend the AGM of Killin Heritage Society. However it showed that "the Heritage" was certainly not dormant as some in the village had thought.

Although the Society has not held the traditional speaker evenings this winter, it has been active through three Interest Groups – a Graveyards Group led by Sally Connor, which has joined the "Friends of Stirlingshire Historic Graveyards" which brings together nearly 20 villages aiming to get lottery funding to survey and ultimately restore their old cemeteries. If you have visited the Old Cemetery behind the Killin Hotel you will know that this will be a major task requiring substantial expenditure. Sue Hughes is leading a second group aiming to build up the

Society's existing records into a searchable database of the village houses and shops which can be used, for example, by locals and visitors wanting to research their family histories. Keith Mayo is leading the third group which has been transferring the artefacts and records of the Society into proper storage in the St Fillans church rooms. The aims there are to bring them together in one secure place and to update the cataloguing of the items, so that they can be made available for viewing and public displays.

Those attending the AGM confirmed the Society's officers and committee and charged them with revising the constitution and putting together a programme of events, running on through the Spring and Summer on both afternoons and evenings to make them more accessible. We also hope to arrange some outdoor guided walks to interesting local sites. Events will be listed in the Killin

News and in posters around the village but, if you want to be sure of getting advance notice, please join the Society by sending your email address to

After the formalities everyone enjoyed John Holland's excellent talk, ranging from the old 18th Century Soay sheep, barely half the size of those you see in the fields around Killin today, through to the more commercial flocks of Blackface and Cheviots crossed with Leicesters and the ups and downs of sheep numbers leading to the decline in recent years. When the many follow-up questions got into the details of the subsidy schemes of the Common Agricultural Policy we finally broke up for the delicious tea and cakes.








Killin and Ardeonaig Trust

News First

At the time of going to press, we have been closed now for 3 weeks renovating News First. The renovation has taken a little bit longer due to the illness of one of the key people involved.

The Scottish Land Fund grant was used to buy the building and for renovations.

We have been successful with our Forth Valley and Lomond LEADER funding which will be used to pay for fixture and fittings, the business and a shop manager. We have to go through a few more hoops before we can get access to money, but nothing too arduous.

The Crowdfunding page raised £8,513 and we have £1080 offline donations. WOW! Thank you Killin for your amazing support. We are now just waiting to hear the outcome of funding from The Fore.

Breadalbane Park

We have submitted our application to the Community Green Flag to try and gain the award again this year. Last year we had a face to face meeting with the judges, this year we will be mystery shopped anytime between now and September. Please help us by keeping the park clean and tidy.

We lost one of our poo bag holders, the one by the main gate. This will be replaced shortly and hopefully it won't disappear again.



You can count on us

It is that time of year again, the turn of the seasons and the return of our springtime regulars. One of the first sounds of spring is the frog chorus from ponds, boggy areas and even large puddles as they climb up through their muddy winter homes where they have kept free of frost, respiring through their skin, to find their favourite location in which to lay their frogspawn. In our pond, both frogs and frogspawn were two weeks earlier than last year. The cry of oystercatchers is also a welcome spring sound when they come here from the coast for the breeding season. A couple appeared on the Ardeonaig pier on January 16th, earlier than usual (last year it was on February 3rd), but they did not stay. A group returned on 16th February and have stayed. Also 2 weeks early were pied wagtails, presumably from the South, not the more adventurous ones who migrate to N. Africa. A kite was seen at Ardeonaig a couple of weeks earlier than last year. Unlike over the hill in the Crieff area, they do not seem to overwinter here. Certainly several bumble bees were making the most of early sunshine and warmth on 26th February. We can count on them all to bring spring to us each year. But let's go from counting on them to actually counting them; at this time of year the annual deer count takes place. You may have seen a helicopter above doing some of the counts while footcounts are used in other areas. It all has to be carefully planned so that adjoining areas are counted on the same days to avoid double counting or missing large numbers of deer. All land, including forestry and farmland, is included, not just shooting estates, as the aim is to assess the number of stags, hinds and young, to give everywhere a cull target for the coming seasons. Different areas want different numbers; estates want deer

in order to let shooting for income, while farmers and forestry do not want deer competition for grass, crops or trees. It is also important for the animals' welfare that overpopulation does not occur. Numbers counted are sent to area deer management groups of which there are 44 upland Scottish ones and several lowland. These are all collated and submitted to a central Scottish group overseen by S.N.H. As this is a government body, it is important that the interests of landowners of all types are represented. Each deer management group should also have a deer management plan and carry out regular habitat assessments. It can be quite a challenge to count red deer fairly accurately and they are Britain's largest land animal so it is questionable how accurate some other counts are. For instance, until recently gamekeepers have counted white hares in the daytime but the government commissioned a new night count developed by The James Hutton Institute for scientific research, The Game and Wildlife Conservation Trust and SNH. This has had startling results. An instance is that one grid gave a daylight count of 6 hares but a night count of the same area with torches counted 209 hares. Is it possible that this could be the case for brown hares? Or even many other smaller animals. How can so-called scientists say that a certain number of field mice live in a certain woodland? It is probably only possible to estimate a likely minimum or maximum number. This would appear to be far more likely in vast hundreds of square miles of rainforest or the inaccessible high slopes of The Himalayas. We are told that only a certain number of a species remains but who could really know? It would be interesting to know how accurate the published number of beavers is. Even around the shores of Loch Tay there are tightly wooded areas of shore where people never go

and few boats are out at night to see them. As they are spreading, it may happen soon that they meet up with the Knapdale enclosed ones and what will happen then? Will they be friends and invite each other in politely for tea and bark? It is really to be hoped that the latest suggestion that wildcat numbers are too low for them to continue to be a viable species is wrong. To have fairly accurate numbers of how many wild boar are on the loose would be useful, as the threat of swine fever advances across Europe from Africa. Denmark and Germany are putting up a border fence to halt the spread of wild boar and so, they hope, the swine fever. Don't tell Mr. Trump that they are getting on better than him – and you can't expect the boar to pay for it either. By the way have you any idea of the size a wild boar can get to? Males 75 to 100 kilos, females 60 to 80 kilos (or 220 lbs and 165lbs in old money). You really don't want to unexpectedly run into one on a dark night in the woods. You would be in for a big surprise as the song goes. Denmark is the only EU country where pigs outnumber people with 215 pigs per 100 people.

On a lighter note, the proposed space station near Melness may have to be relocated as the Bombus distinguendus bumble bee lives there and only in a very few other places. A Killin resident who lives on the edge of the park heard a stramash by his back door recently. No, it was not Mr Fox this time, but Mr Otter! Maybe those new settler beavers had pushed him out from the river or maybe he was just on his way for a shot at the playpark. If you really need cheering up go to

S4 Safe Drive Stay Alive Experience

Traffic Incidents: Around 1 in 4 deaths on the road are of young people aged 17-24. Safe Drive Stay Alive aim to help reduce this statistic by delivering hard-hitting presentations on the dangers of not driving safely to young people who will soon be learning to drive.

On the 6th February, all S4's got the chance to go to the Macrobert Arts Centre to watch this presentation. We travelled by coach, and when we got there, we were welcomed into the main theatre. The lights were off, but multicoloured disco lights danced around the seats and the stage. "Mr Brightside" by The Killers was playing and once everybody was seated, the presentation leaders had us all dancing to The Proclaimers and doing the YMCA! However the morning soon took a dramatic

turn as a video began to play. The video showed 4 teenagers going out for the evening, the car crash they were involved in, and the aftermath of the crash. The video stopped at different points and various professionals, including police officers, paramedics, nurses and firemen came on to the stage to explain their role in helping with a road traffic collision (RTC). Everyone who came on stage had at some point been involved in helping treat people who had been injured or retrieving dead bodies from RTCs and so they all had very emotional stories to tell about their experiences. The firewoman talked about having to use equipment to break doors and even take the roof off cars in order to retrieve bodies, and the paramedics talked about the difficulties of pronouncing a person to be dead and then having to ignore them in order to deal with the living casualties of car crashes. It made the danger of not driving safely so much clearer when we heard stories from the people it affected.

Overall, Safe Drive Stay Alive was an incredibly valuable experience. It really made it clear the horrendous impact that driving dangerously could have on our lives, the lives of the people in the car with us, and our families. I think we all truly learned the value of driving carefully, always wearing a seatbelt, not distracting the driver, and not driving while intoxicated.

Food Matters Killin & Crianlarich Nurseries were one of two Stirling Council Nurseries to appear in the Care Inspectorate document Food Matters. Our ongoing project highlights the 'Hidden Sugars' in foods and the importance of eating healthily.

Some of Our Favourite Stories

It all began with a story as all good things do, where fairy tales become real and take you on a journey of imagination. The children at Crianlarich Nursery have been on a journey of curiosity, discovery and learning, through the stories of the Gingerbread Man and Supertato. The children received a letter from

the Gingerbread Man asking for help as to how he could get across the river safely and not be eaten by anyone. Working together as a team to find the best solution, the children have been problem solving, researching, planning, designing and creating. This has supported them to build on their skills of negotiation, reasoning and investigation. Through a vote, the children agreed on a bridge being the best idea to ensure the Gingerbread Man's safety. They used their writing, drawing and ICT skills to create a poster asking for people to help him. The story has enabled children to consider the moral dilemma of whether it is right or wrong to eat the Gingerbread Man.

One of our favourite stories at Nursery is 'Supertato and the Veggie Assemble'. Evil Peas, who are characters from the story, visited the nursery and stole the 'Super tomato' from our story sack. The children found vegetables in distress in their own home and have been capturing the Evil Peas who escaped from the freezer. Killin Nursery praised by Care Inspectorate

A report by the Care Inspectorate found that staff used their knowledge and understanding of children's individual needs to deliver responsive care and support.

It stated that the environment was bright, warm and inviting to children and families. Attractive displays of children's work helped to create a sense of belonging and celebrated achievement. Children were able to

explore, play in small groups and take part in activities of their choice within well-planned playrooms. There was a strong focus on the use of natural resources and sensory play, supporting children to develop their creativity, curiosity and inquiry skills.

The nursery provides care for up to twenty one pre-school children from the age of two and a maximum of six children below the age of two. Head of Nursery, Elizabeth Hancock



said "We are delighted this report has highlighted the responsive care and support which children and families receive within our nurturing environment. Positive transitions and effective communication with families support children to feel safe and secure".

Children are learning skills to stay safe and healthy and are developing confidence and resilience through outdoor learning.

The report thanked the dedicated staff team who are committed to ensuring all children receive the very best early learning and childcare. Convener of the Children and Young People Committee, Cllr Susan McGill said: "All the staff at Killin Nursery deserve huge credit for this fantastic report which demonstrates that their high quality of care and support is creating a nurturing

environment for children to learn and develop new skills."

Vice Convener, Cllr Margaret Brisley said: "These are really positive findings from the Care Inspectorate. It is clear that the children's voices are heard and valued at the nursery and that there is excellent communication with parents and carers. Congratulations to all the staff."





Nurseries & Retirement Home Generations Working Together

Killin Nursery and The Falls of Dochart Retirement Home have been working together on a regular basis over the last two or three years. Prior to that the children only visited the home on occasions such as Easter and Christmas. Research highlights the benefits of generations working together and with this in mind the nursery and the home began weekly visits. This has blossomed and both the children and the residents look forward to the regular interactions. These sessions are planned and led by Kayleigh at the nursery and Stephanie at the home. The children and residents are consulted about what activities they would like to take part in and they have the opportunity to evaluate the experience. The benefits are evident, for example, learning from each other, having fun, having a sense of well-being and purpose, developing respect across the generations, reliving childhood memories, helping to reduce loneliness and isolation, the list is endless.

Kayleigh, Stephanie, Mandy and Elizabeth have recently joined the

Generations Working Together Network and have taken part in training. They also attended the annual conference in Glasgow where interesting keynote speakers included Christina McKelvie MSP, Minister for Older People and Equalities and Jackie Kay, Scottish Makar, to name but two. The work that is being carried out across the whole country was showcased and is commendable.

Generations Working Together was established in 2007 with funding from the Scottish Government. They are a nationally recognised centre of excellence supporting the development, promotion and integration of inter generational work across Scotland. It is exciting to be part of this and to see the possibilities for our community, encouraging and supporting positive interactions across the generations, developing a rich culture of learning and working together for the benefit of all.


about to start on the same basis. All it requires is the enthusiasm to get together and pool information on a favourite subject and a new group has begun.

Free Local Debt-Help Service Celebrates Five Years Of Saving Lives

A free local debt counselling service is celebrating 5 years of helping Highland Perthshire people sort out their finances.

Aberfeldy Parish Church launched the CAP Highland Perthshire Debt Centre in partnership with UK charity Christians Against Poverty (CAP) in January 2014 and since that time they have helped over 40 people and their families.

Angela Hanvey, CAP Highland Perthshire Debt Centre Manager, said: "This is a celebration, but it is also a thanksgiving for the evictions that have been stopped, relationships that have been salvaged, families released from the pressure of debt and lives saved from suicide over the last 5 years. For me, it's an amazing position to be in and sometimes very challenging too. We see people often at the lowest point but then we get to see that burden taken away and so many other issues addressed - that is a great joy."

She added that she and her team of volunteers provide a unique, free, face-to-face service in the community, backed up by financial experts at CAP's head office, who create a budget for each client and negotiate with creditors.

The Kindness of Strangers.....

We are now into our 10th year as the fortunate owners of the Bridge of Lochay Hotel and every year we discover new and interesting facts and memorabilia pertaining to the hotel and its history.

When we celebrated our 250th Anniversary, four years ago, I spent a couple of days at the National Library of Scotland in Edinburgh researching information that would help shed new light into the past owners and hotel history. More recent history is much easier to

establish with the internet - but anything more than 100 years old is harder to find.

During this library search I was lucky enough to discover a little blue handbook entitled

'Handbook of General Information and Motor Runs in the District' which had been published by the then owner, John C Cameron. It appears to date before 1945 although I have not been able to establish precisely when it was published. Owing to National Library rules I was unable to copy more than a couple of pages, and searches to find a copy anywhere else failed.

Imagine my delight when one day a small brown envelope arrived in the post. In the envelope was a lovely letter from Emma Pearson, whose late Great Aunt (Iris Donaldson) had passed away after living in Killin for many years. Going through her possessions Emma discovered a copy of the little blue handbook, and a couple of postcards which she decided to send on to us. She cannot



have known just how much this would mean to us and we owe her a great big thank you! (There is a copy available in the hotel should anyone like to take a look - it is a lovely little book with photographs

and maps and advertisements from local businesses and runs to 48 pages. It really must have been quite innovative when originally published.) That was in January 2019 - and just a few weeks prior to that we had received another (larger) brown envelope. This time the envelope contained a card from a gentleman in Plymouth and enclosed with this was a small watercolour. He found the painting in an old frame that he had been 're-purposing'. There was an old label

on the back that read 'Bridge of Lochay Inn, March 1877. Salmon Fishing.' It is the first image that we have seen of the hotel with a Horse and Cart and with the old stables in their original condition.

This picture is currently being framed for us and will also be on display in the hotel.

We do love learning more about this great old building's history and thank those people who have shared their findings with us. If you come across anything that you think might be of nterest please let us know.



Heated exchanges seem to be everywhere with interruptions and "talking-over" the other person the usual tactic. Sometimes you wonder why the presenter is even there as they often seem irrelevant as well as being ineffective as referees in the exchanges.

From politics to sport and entertainment, from road rage to internet websites and social media, from activists and campaigners of all sorts to newspaper articles, books, radio and TV shows, everyone seems to be at war! Now don't get me wrong, many subjects are important and people are right to feel passionate about certain issues, but we are in danger of making this into a spectator sport, or turning many people off completely, with their subsequent disengagement the result of cynicism and scepticism. This is, sadly, counter-productive to a healthy society. Recently, I heard the following quotation. "Some folks need to take a chill-out pill and even better some people need to choke on theirs!" Despite being funny it does make the point that we often see the problem in other folks and not in ourselves. I grew up in a working class housing estate so the "red mist" can come down on me very quickly...not ideal if one is wearing a clerical collar! When I was young and wanting to change the world I was the proverbial "angry young man" but now, as my wife often reminds me I'm just a "grumpy old git." Over the years I

have often meditated on the Bible verse "Let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to anger, for human anger does not work the righteousness of God." (James 1:19, 20). This has helped me on many an occasion. Before we get angry or annoyed with others regarding what they do or say let us remember a few things. First, people can be just as passionate as we are on a given subject and just as perplexed at us as we are at them. In a democracy that is allowed. Second, we rarely know what is going on in someone's life and what they are dealing with. So before we react strongly and negatively to their words or actions it is always wise to give them the benefit of the doubt and cut them some slack. Hopefully we will receive the same consideration from others when we need it. Third, although it might be hard to contemplate, there may be occasions when we are "wrong": it is just that we don't know it! Fourth, we may be responding to what we think someone said, wrote or did, but we don't have the full story or the full context. Interpretation requires both of these, plus accurate quoting, something often ignored, misused and abused by the media in quite unprofessional ways. The result is a storm of social protest or criticism where the whole issue grows arms and legs and consists of further responses to original responses to a misguotation or misrepresentation or misunderstanding of what actually was said or written...if you get my gist! Fifth, we need to beware of the weaponisation of words. When I was a child there was a ditty which went "sticks and stones may break my bones but names will never harm me." Unfortunately, that is not true.

"Words" can wound deeply and disturbingly. Whenever a teenager commits suicide as a result of online bullying we realise just how true and awful this can be. Characterassassination is commonplace online and in the media and it shows the darker side of humanity. We need to beware of the personalisation of any criticism we have regarding an issue or subject that we hold strong opinions on. Lastly, it is always wise, after anger or annoyance has been aroused by someone, to pause before we respond. This can be as simple as taking a deep breath or counting to ten when in the presence of the offending person or, alternatively, "sleeping" on it if we are thinking of sending an email or making a phone-call.

Do it later, we might be surprised how different the response can be because of this.

Life is often messy and complex and to navigate our way through requires wisdom and grace. May the Good Lord grant us these.

News From Start Up Stirling Local Foodbank and Crisis Support

2018 in a snapshot

Over 116,000 meals provided via 1299 referrals to the Foodbanks, which supported more than 2400 individuals over a third of which were children.

Mobile Foodbanks expanded to provide over 28,000 meals to those who cannot access Foodbanks. Our rural deliveries

incorporate the whole of Stirlingshire from Tyndrum to Strathblane.

145 Starter Packs were handed out to help people settle into new tenancies and 109 Welcome Packs to help those in temporary housing.

Over 240 Emergency Food Packs and 329 Toiletry Packs were distributed to help the temporary homeless.

We had a great festive appeal this year. We received over 21 tonnes of food and £27,600 in donations. A huge thanks to all who donated.
