As ever, the Killin Music Festival brought fun, laughter, visitors and wonderful music, with a great atmosphere, together in one event. From the main stage events to the smaller tent events and the local bars there was a tremendous buzz of people having a good time. In the quieter venue of Killin Parish Church the service took place at its regular time of 10 am with the usual but celestial church hymns. What was unusual was its format when we were graced with a young singer-songwriter, Patrick Baldwin, who was

selected to play by the Killin Festival Committee and who is just starting out on his music career. He played the piano and sang two original compositions in pitch-perfect tone, a ballad and a Scottish themed song accompanied at one point by his talented brother Rob, on the French horn. Patrick's final piece was a flawless rendition of David Bowie's Life on Mars. Known to be a difficult song to sing he sang it effortlessly. The service continued within this theme with a moving clip/video of David Bowie in front of an audience



of thousands, remembering those who had died of terminal illness, kneeling and saying aloud the Lord's Prayer with sincerity and reverence. This brought us to the sermon by our local Minister, Rev. Russel Moffat, on The Lord's Prayer and the words within it. Do we ever really listen to them when we recite it? It was a poignant part to a weekend in which a wide variety of music was central in deepening community bonds and strengthening faith. 25 Year Anniversary of Tornado Jet Crash in Glen Ogle

Sunday 1st September marks the 25th anniversary of the Tornado jet crash in Glen Ogle in 1994, in which Flt Lts Patrick Harrison and Peter Mosley were tragically killed. We have been contacted by John Harrison, father of Patrick, to let the village know that the RAF will be holding a remembrance service at the memorial stone, located near the carpark at the top of Glen Ogle. There will be a minute's



silence at 12:04pm on Sunday 1st September to mark the exact time of the crash.

The RAF will be sending a team to tidy up the surrounding area ahead of the service.

Many readers in the area will remember this horrific event and the families would welcome anyone who wishes to attend the service and pay their respects to those who died.







Killin Community Council

After a lapse of several months due to a shortage of volunteers, we now have a new Community Council, comprised of a mixture of old hands and fresh faces.

The new Council was inaugurated on 23rd April 2019 and was presided over initially by Michelle Flynn of Stirling Council's Community Engagement team. No sooner had it convened than it was asked by members of the public in attendance to look into the state of the play area in Breadalbane Park. Other issues coming to our attention were the proposed construction of a replacement transformer sub-station in Glen Lochay and the requirement for Killin to develop a new Community Action Plan.

Play Park - Happily we can report that the children's play area is now the focus of some serious attention from Stirling Council. Repairs and maintenance will be prioritised by SDC and improvements are in the pipeline, thanks to the Killin and Ardeonaig Trust.

New Transformer - On 17th June, at the first full KCC meeting, Scottish and Southern Electricity presented their draft proposals to us for the transformer replacement. The original installation, built in the 1950s, is no longer deemed fit for purpose, but due to current technical, environmental and safety considerations, the replacement is likely to have a much larger footprint. There are legitimate concerns that the new sub-station will have a significant visual impact on the area at the head of the lower Lochay Valley and there are some environmental and archaeological considerations to be addressed. SSE agreed to defer the application for planning permission until October, in order to review their draft proposals and investigate some means of mitigating the visual and environmental impact, and to come back to the community with a revised plan. The target date for this is August.

Action Plan - The National Park is driving the creation of a number of local action plans, in collaboration with local communities. In Killin this will be led by the KCC and KAT, working with the National Park and interested members of the public in a 'Community Partnership'. The objective at this stage is to engage as much of the community as

possible in the process. This will involve public events, publicity and, of course, the dreaded surveys and questionnaires. But bear with us. The resulting Action Plan will be a valuable tool to help lever funding and support for local initiatives and projects. It is also important that all constituencies and groups within the local area are involved and consulted; the farming and rural communities, business, the young and the old and the in-between. It is important to make your voice heard, to let us know your wishes, needs and priorities. Be on your guard. There will be an event or survey happening near you sometime soon!

It only remains to be said that the Community Council is your community council and members of the public are welcome to attend any or all our meetings, to express their concerns, ask difficult questions or merely vent their fury. Onward and upward.

Community Action Plan

As Andy has mentioned in the Killin Community Council's (KCC) report above, we are now working on our Community Action Plan. This is an action plan driven BY the community, FOR the community and additionally supported by KCC and KAT.

For those of you who are not aware, a Community Action Plan (CAP) is a recognised document that records the needs and wants of a community and can be used for lobbying locally and nationally and importantly to successfully source money for projects.

A Steering Group has now been set up which includes a range of people from our Killin Community and our work is supported and assisted by the Community Partnership which is funded by the Park. The essential factor here is that whilst there is a group of people pulling the plan together, it means NOTHING without the implicit input from the whole range of people who make up our community. The nature of this work is that the views of the various sectors within our community will be consulted as issues emerge - to ensure that we leave no stone unturned.

To ensure that we are able to capture all these needs we will be commencing with a session on Saturday 31st August at the McLaren Hall to which you are all invited. This will provide an opportunity for you to ensure that we know what matters to YOU and what you would like to see changing in your Killin Community. The final plan will reflect the views of the entire community.

The Scottish Government's Local Governance Review and it's Draft

Local Democracy Bill are there to ensure that local communities have a much greater influence on spending, priorities and resources. It is evident that funding applications for projects that are not identified under a Communities Action Plan are unlikely to succeed.

The great news is that the timescale for this is short - the plan will be completed by March 2020 and will be a document that will prove essential in driving improvements for the Killin Community going forward.

Please try and support our first event on 31st August with your input - you and your family and community will be the direct beneficiaries.

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News First

On Friday 31st May we held the official opening of MacGregor's shop. We invited all the organisations who have funded the project, along with local Councillors and local people. Ruby Fulton, as one of the oldest residents at 95 years old, very kindly agreed to officially open the shop by cutting the ribbon.

We invited the winners of the logo competition so we could present them with a tote bag with their own design. It was great to have the girls as part of the shop opening.

Breadalbane Park

The Stirling Council's 'Your Stirling, You Decide' funded 2 projects in the Trossachs and Teith Ward. The top 2 projects were both in Aberfoyle. The Breadalbane Park Project was third and only 13 votes short of being 2nd. Such a shame as we were so close. Maybe next year.

Stirling Council have taken away the swings as they will be installing the Viking Swing in mid July. They will also remove some of the fencing, but will put up a new fence to close in the park where the old equipment is situated. We have applied for Co-op funding and over the next few months will put in further application to other funders. The funding process will continue as and when funding becomes available.

We applied for the Community Green Flag again this year and



just found out that we were successful, which is another great achievement.

If you want to be involved with the Friends of Breadalbane Park Group, our meetings will be advertised on our Facebook page or you can contact me. We meet as and when required.

If you find any problems in the park

these can be reported to Stirling Council, who are responsible for maintenance.

Old Mill

We submitted an expression of interest to Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park for funding to replace the internal lights and fix the sluice gate. We have been successful with this first round of application and will be putting in a full application by the end of July. Once the sluice gate is repaired, the wheel will be able to function.

We will also put in an expression of interest application into the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

We are lucky to have an enthusiastic and dedicated team of volunteer drivers and escorts available to take passengers to their destination. We are pleased to be able to say that so far all requests for transport have been carried out, however near or far, and appreciate the support we have received from the community in making our first year such a success.

Coffee and cake will be provided and we look forward to as many people as possible joining us to celebrate our first year of operation.

Reply to Last Issue's Article "All Things Wild and Wonderful"

I don't think it is all doom and gloom. I agree that there is a decline in many species of birds, mammals and insects in this area and further afield but there are some pluses.

Recently we had a number of narrow banded bee hawk moths feeding on the aubretia, along side peacock, tortoiseshell, cabbage white and orange tipped butterflies and various bumblebees. We have lesser butterfly orchids and marsh orchids. We also have red kites nesting in the Glen, along with ospreys, nuthatches and blackcaps, all of which weren't present a few years ago.

I made a list of birds seen on Auchlyne over the year and got to 59 different ones. It's maybe too long to include in this article, but I'm happy to let anyone who may be interested see it.

The following will be controversial, but the decline of many species is partially due to the large numbers of corvids, foxes, pine martens and

Killin SWI Meetings restart on Thursday 3/10/19 at 7.30pm in Lesser McLaren hall. Full programme in badgers that are present. Crows will guarter the ground looking for nests and young birds. Badgers will do the same and if they come across a bumblebee's nest, they'll dig it up to get at the grubs. They are also partial to hedgehogs, and I haven't seen any here for a long time. Pine martens will seek out bird nests in trees and bushes to get the eggs or young birds.

There are far fewer gamekeepers in the area and they have an uphill struggle to control corvids and foxes who, along with protected species such as badgers and pine martens, breed in the large tracts of commercial forestry that are all around us.

There needs to be a happy medium but at the moment our song birds and waders etc don't stand a chance.

On June 25th, the community sport hub met with a particular focus on the key findings of the sports clubs feasibility study. Led by Integratis consulting, who undertook the study, the well-attended meeting considered the study objectives, potential options and recommendations to improve and develop the sports facilities available in the village, and critically

ensure they are fit for the future. The final study is yet to be published, but we expect full coverage to be detailed in the next issue. However, Integratis outlined the kind of facilities other small communities have developed (and the finances behind these) and also highlighted the themes that are emerging from the study, which shows a high level of concern over accessing quality sports facilities, a desire to access external funding, and a strong community support to improve the sports facilities available locally, especially amongst young people.

Strathfillan Community Development Trust July 2019

Tyndrum Community Woodland Bike Skills Park: Our concept plan is here and looks great! Following a Facebook Poll, which saw a fantastic 75% positive reaction, we have had the plans available in the Trust office for the mid-two weeks in June for anyone to come in and see and chat to Kelly. Thank you to everyone who took part. The plans are still up in the Trust office and, although the official consultation period is over, we are more than happy for folk to pop in. We would like to extend a massive thank you to all the funders of this phase of the project: Forth Valley and Lomond Leader; Stirling Council's Community Pride and Crowdfunder grant schemes; and all those who supported our Crowdfunder.

We are now working toward a phased plan to construct the Bike Skills Park. This may take some time as we still need to develop 'shovel ready' plans, seek planning permission, and acquire funding. It may not look like much is happening on the ground, but the cogs are turning behind the scenes!

Adopt a Tub Scheme: Thanks to everyone who has worked so hard to fill and look after the plant tubs across Strathfillan. All the tubs in Tyndrum have been adopted, which is great news. We still have some spare tubs in Crianlarich if anyone fancies taking one or two on, just contact Kelly below. The Trust would also like to announce that we are holding a wee competition for the best kept tub. We have prizes for both Crianlarich and Tyndrum, and an overall cash prize for the best Strathfillan tub. Winners will be announced in September. So get your gloves on and trowels out.

Lower Station Yard: we are still working closely with Stirling Council and the National Park to develop this site. We have had to reduce our plans to fit in with our funding. However, we still hope to provide much needed seasonal toilets and fix the car park drainage issues. When we have plans drawn up, we will bring them to the community for consultation.

The trip included 5 nights in San Francisco with 4 Nights in Los Angeles/Santa Monica. Whilst in San Francisco we had special access to Google, Tesla and Apple. We visited many STEMrelated museums including the 'Exploratorium' with lots of interactive Science and Engineering exhibits. At the 'California Academy of Science', the group experienced earthquake simulators, the planetarium show, the indoor rainforest and visited Claude, the albino alligator. We also walked across the marvel of engineering that is the Golden Gate Bridge and had the opportunity to visit Alcatraz, Pier 39 and ride the antique cablecars.

After a 9-hour bus ride to Santa Monica, our trips included viewing the moon and Jupiter at the famous Griffith Observatory and seeing the real Space Shuttle 'Endeavour' at the California Science Centre Michael Limonci and Hannah MacCallum

Central Schools U15 Girls and U15 Boys Rugby

On Wednesday 8 May, both the U15 Girls and Boys squads travelled to Stirling County RFC to take part in 7s tournaments.

The boys reached the semi-final stage against Wallace HS whilst McLaren girls won all four of their fixtures and finished in first place. A number of our players, were part of the Stirling County U15 squad that won the national final at Murrayfield on Sunday.

Archaeological Dig

All S1 History pupils at McLaren High School have been given the opportunity to visit and participate in an archaeological dig in Leny Woods. Staff and pupils were supported in this by Northlight Heritage and Callander's Landscape. Some pupils now want to be archaeologists. This experience was part of the Humanities Faculty's plan to introduce Archaeology two periods a week next year as part of an S1/S2 elective. S2 Moorland Indicators of Climate Change Field Trip

S2 pupils took part in a fieldwork trip on Moor Park Moorland near Drymen recently. Field work experiments involved taking water samples and testing peat levels in the moor. Pupils enjoyed this hands on experience learning how important





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peat moorlands are to help prevent climate change.

Duke of Edinburgh It's the season for Duke of Edinburgh expeditions. Several groups were out recently walking from Loch Venachar over to Aberfoyle, camping nearby in the Dalzell Wood. The second day was a circular route passing Loch Ard.

Biology Challenge

Pupils have done really well this year and we are all very proud of them. We have 3 Silver certificates, 6 Bronze, 5 Highly Commended and 11 Commended

Sponsored Walk

Our annual sponsored walk took place on the morning of Friday 31 May. The walk followed the welltrodden route from the school through Coilhallan Wood toward the fish farm, returning along the Invertrossachs Road. Scottish Schools Athletics

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Today is back to sunshine after a brief dull spell. The Summer so far has been changeable if nothing else. Yesterday, a pheasant brought along a pack of day old chicks in a torrential downpour and hopefully, she got them all safely dried off in the sunshine that followed. Certainly the early warm spell set everything off to a good start. We have been enjoying watching the many new fledglings in the garden. Siskins, blue tits and woodpeckers in their pristine little suits of many colours. The wee robins are a bit more on the smart casual side as they always seem a bit fluffier and are slow to get their red chests. They are often so friendly and appear at your side in sheds and around the garden. Unfortunately, for the first time in about 30 years, we have no house martins or swallows nesting on our walls. In fact, in our area there are far fewer martins and swallows than usual. Maybe there was some storm or other disaster where they spent the winter months or on their journey over here. It is one of those things that still astounds, that such small creatures can navigate and survive their journeys, often from Africa. Many folk would do a great deal to escape a Scottish winter, but your average quadrathlon pales into insignificance compared to these mighty flyers.

Of course, the arctic tern goes to the extreme of doing its pole to pole flight twice a year to take advantage of both Arctic and Antarctic Summers. The ring on one of the well-travelled birds recently found dead in Aberdeenshire showed it to be 32 years old, which means that it will have travelled around 1,500,000 miles. David Attenborough would have a job to beat that record. This equates to almost two return trips to the moon.

Animals unable to fly have been proved to use their feet for many long journeys. Not only the mass migrations of the Serengeti-Masai Mara, but lone journeys too. Mr. Fox's arctic cousin for one. Recently a female was tracked over a journey of more than 3,500km, taking four months and going from Svalbard in Norway to Ellesmere Island in Canada.

Sometimes the animals do not decide on their journeys themselves, and not all have a happy ending. A rhino was recently being flown to Africa but died on the way. Our own Mr. Fox was recently seen trying to round up a ewe and lamb for lunch. He managed to get the lamb into a burn and was going for



the coup de grace when the mum ewe tuned on him and bravely butted him on his way. And they say that foxes will not go for live lambs! The same story went for sea eagles when they were reintroduced to Scotland. After the evidence of the last few years, it is now apparent that they will take live lambs should the opportunity arise. On one of the S.N.H. monitored farms, there has been an extra loss of 181 lambs between 2012 and 2018. We recently saw one or two sea eagles on Ardnamurchan and, with the lack of sheep over much of the area and apparent lack of rabbits etc. you have to wonder what they do eat. Though some birds can surprise; a black backed gull was seen by a photographer to swallow a rabbit!

It was lovely to revisit a favourite area. Although it is far busier than when we first went there over 50 years ago, it was good to see that it still has its guiet bits where you can watch otters and seals and have to stop the car while a pine marten has a scratch in the road. Like the brave ewe, female humans can also show great courage. Women are on the front line of the poaching war. With elephant and rhino horn being worth more than cocaine, it is a dangerous job to work against organised international groups working in ways akin to drugs smuggling or people trafficking. It is women who run and protect a rhino reserve in South Africa. I was certainly impressed in Zimbabwe on seeing young women returning to their hut at dawn from their poaching patrols carrying their AK 47 rifles. Another method being employed to try to tackle this problem is the drilling of the rhino's horn and the injection of an indelible pink dye and anti-tick serum which would cause nausea and vomiting in humans and so renders the horn unsaleable. GPS trackers are fitted at the same time. Some areas are not doing so well, such as Loch Etive where the escaped farmed rainbow trout will cause a threat to the brown trout, salmon etc. There is still concern about the effect of accumulated waste around the farms causing pollution. Lochs are to be treated with caution by dog owners giving their pets a cool down in the warm weather, as many are polluted and dogs have died after drinking only a little of the water. Now to mention' beavergate'. Following the sighting of the beaver crossing the Dochart bridge at 7.45 one morning, it

Dochart bridge at 7.45 one morning, it is rumoured that The National Park will be putting a beaver crossing on the bridge. As the beaver seems to be very relaxed, as though it does this trip regularly at this time, look out for the special flashing green lights?

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Killin Music Festival rocks it again this year

Killin Music Festival rocked their idyllic highland village setting once again this year with another array of exciting, up-and-coming Scottish bands.

Crowds assembled across three days in the beautiful spot at the head of Loch Tay to be part of the area's annual gathering, with over 150 musicians and artists taking to the stage. One enthusiastic festival goer from Doune said "you look around, and everyone is just givin' it laldie – it's the most authentic festival I've ever been to".

Among the great performances, Elephant Sessions had the crowd pulsing, audience members raved that the music was felt through the soles of their feet, shaking the hall cobwebs loose. Kinnaris Quintet took the audience on a journey with their heartfelt strings, ranging from soothing relaxed numbers to riveting renditions that re-energised the crowd.

The festival will now invite Man of the Minch to take a place on the main stage line-up for next year. A group of young people from the village have formed the band The No Marcs, delighting audiences at this year's festival. With an undoubtedly bright future ahead of them, this young band's enthusiasm is one example of how the music festival is inspiring and encouraging the next generation of musicians. 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At the Water's Edge

Early Iron Age settlement around Loch Tay

At the Water's Edge has conducted the second season of a two-year project that has investigated the later prehistoric settlement landscape of Loch Tay. Directed by Michael J Stratigos and W Derek Hamilton (both of the Scottish Universities' Environmental Research Centre), the project has been funded by the Royal Archaeological Institute with support from the University of Glasgow.

In Loch Tay there is exceptional Iron Age settlement evidence in the form of 18 crannogs, 9 of which have confirmed Early Iron Age phases, but terrestrial settlement in the same area firmly dated to the Early Iron Age is virtually absent. This project has targeted the few surviving potentially Early Iron Age settlement sites to test whether there is a bias in the survival and identification of Early Iron Age features and, with this new insight, develop an understanding of settlement patterns and social history in this region from c.800-400 BC.

Two of the handful of likely later prehistoric settlement sites were investigated as part of the Ben

Lawers Historic Landscape Project at Croftvellick and Tombreck. Our project is re-examining the material recovered there and may provide further chronological precision. Additionally, we have also carried out excavation at Easter Croftintygan,



near Lawers and Ardnagaul, near Killin. Work at both of these sites between 17-28 June 2019 has revealed further evidence for when and where people were living around the shores of Loch Tay in the Iron Age.

We will have to wait for laboratory analysis to be sure exactly when

Ardnagaul and Easter Croftintygan were in use, but the excavations have provided us with substantial information on the kinds of structures which were built. At Ardnagaul, we have very substantial stone walls, about 1.3m across which

had well-laid facing stones along the interior. Within the interior, a number of post holes were found, and at the bottom of one, the tip of the post was recovered evidently waterlogged since it was placed there as much as 3000 years ago. At Easter Croftintygan, our excavation revealed a substantial ditch and external bank which may have had a turf superstructure. The interior of the Easter Croftintygan house contained a number of post holes which would have supported a roof of some kind and spreads of

charcoal from a central hearth. With this new information, in addition to the work we have been conducting on the crannogs in Loch Tay, we expect to be able to develop a better understanding of how settlement developed and changed in the Iron Age.

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Musings From The Manse

Since I came to Killin in 2016, two things have confirmed that I'm getting old. First, the invitations from the local Doctors' Surgery to get the Winter Flu jab! The second has been the death of some of my favourite rock artists these last few years, who have passed away whilst still in their sixties, the decade that I am now well into myself. So much for the Biblical hope for "three score years and ten" maybe I should take the jab! One of my favourite rock artists was Tom Petty. I loved his "rebel" attitude, and his great music and lyrics. Comparisons have been drawn between the role of rock and folk musicians over the last 50 years and the Biblical prophets. It is a comparison not without its merits, as both groups were outsiders and radicals who often spoke truth to power, and their words were often critical of the established institutions of their respective societies. Politics and religion were often in their sights. A famous quote from Tom Petty was "No-one gets Jesus more wrong than Christians!" Wow! That's hard, but I'm sure we all know what he meant by that. A wee bit like Ghandi's famous phrase - "Two thousand years of Christian love is enough to frighten everyone!" Again, this is hard to hear but easy to understand. Once again, the same theme is being played out, that there is a vast difference between the Founder and his Followers, with the latter compromising, misrepresenting or undermining the original message. It also helps us to understand subsequent European history. Cultural critic Peter Hitchens has long maintained that the major decline in European Christianity began in 1914 with the Churches supporting the lunacy of the Nationalisms and Imperialisms which led to the catastrophe of World War 1. I always find Remembrance Sunday a poignant time. My Grandfather fought in the First World War and lost his three brothers at the battle of the Somme in 1916. He himself was severely wounded and invalided home - shades of the film "Saving Private Ryan". My question has always been, where was the Christian Church in all this? Given the influence (at least potential if not actual) of Eastern Orthodoxy, Roman Catholicism and Protestantism in the nations of Europe at that time, why was War not avoided? Well the Churches weren't speaking to each other and the Politics of the day trumped the universal claims of the Gospel. Dreadfully sad! Yet it would have taken a very brave Clergyman to have raised this from the pulpit in any of the European churches including our own. In a contest between Flag and Cross the former was always going to win.

A number of years ago I read a story about a Minister in one of the Southern States of America during the Civil Rights protests. Already warned by the Klu Klux Klan regarding his sermons on this issue, a group of masked men broke into his study one Saturday night and dragged him from the house. His body was found in a nearby river the following day. He left a young wife and children behind. As someone who at that time had a young family at home and was often in my study on a Saturday night, I was forced to ask myself what I would



have done in that situation. I imagine that not just for me, but for all of us, we can only ever answer that question when actually faced with the situation. None of us are perfect, we have our weaknesses, faults and failings as we share this common humanity with all its limitations. Yet history shows that ordinary people can often do the right thing when called upon.

Perhaps that is the hope for the future of our troubled world. Following Jesus, truly following, has never been easy. That is why we have a Cross as our principal symbol. I wonder if Tom Petty would agree.
