The Killin Local Committee have been actively supporting many events in the community throughout the last few months.


We started our fundraising efforts in June, at the Music Festival, holding a coffee morning during the community choir event in the McLaren Hall, raising £746.43. In July, we supported the


Sponsored Bike Ride



Know your Defib

Killin Surgery PPG thought it may be useful for everyone to bone up on the whereabouts of their local defibrillator machines:-

Killin - it is just inside the porch of the Falls of Dochart retirement home and has a smart new sign

Crianlarich - it is outside the village hall

Tyndrum - it is at The Green Welly **Ardeonaig** - it is outside the hotel. If you wish to get training or a refresher course for the defib. and/or basic first aid, please get in touch with our local paramedics who will be pleased put together a group.

Hospital Appointment Times

If you are given an early appointment time at Larbert, making a ridiculously early start necessary, you can ask that this be changed to a later one without a long delay for treatment. Every clinic has a directive for this to be done in our postcode areas. This similarly applies to an appointment that is too late to allow for getting home by bus, if this is how you would be travelling. If you have any problems with this please let me know. All I need is the name of the clinic concerned.

The hospital cars have been working very well for a year now and are currently trying to enlist drivers from the Crianlarich/Tyndrum area and Ardeonaig, to avoid the 'dead' miles between these pick up areas and the village.

The survey focuses on questions about banking in your area, personal banking habits, and banking experiences. It follows the recent closure of bank branches in Bannockburn, Bridge of Allan, and Dunblane which have further reduced the bank branch coverage across the constituency. The survey also tries to find out what services people are using and how the Post Office banking services are being used.

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

Community Action Plan

The Strathfillan Community Action Plan is now underway and we need you to come along on 2nd November to give your views on the future of the communities of Strathfillan..

For those of you who are not aware, a Community Action Plan (CAP) is a document, recognised by public agencies both locally and nationally, that sets the direction for the community in the coming years. As well as being crucial for the community to successfully source funding for our own projects, it will be a clear statement of the wishes of the community with regard to service delivery, spatial planning, and management of the natural environment. The CAP process means that the community can very clearly say what we do and don't want to happen in the next few years and it will indicate the level of community backing for the actions set out.

Our first big public event will be held from **11am** on **2nd November** in Crianlarich Hall. The day will be a chance to see what we have achieved over the last five years and there will be a workshop from 12 – 2.00pm which will enable a conversation about the issues in the community and what the direction of travel should be for the next 5 years. This is not the only chance you will have to contribute but it will set the framework.

Adopt a Tub Scheme: Thanks to everyone who has worked so hard to fill and look after the plant tubs across Strathfillan. They are still looking great. Lower Station Yard: We are slowly working our way towards a potential plan for toilets and parking improvements in Crianlarich, and will consult the community in the next couple of months. We hope to get as many views as possible, and will be consulting directly and through our Facebook Page, Strathfillan Community. Please keep an eye out, as we really need your views on the suggestions put forward, as they will determine whether the project goes ahead or not.

Bike Skills Park: Some great news! We have been awarded funding through the Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park Community Grant Scheme for the next phase of the Bike Skills Park. This includes producing a final detailed plan based on the concept design, providing costings for the build of the project, and obtaining planning permission. We should have this phase

completed by March 2020, meaning we can then focus on securing funding to build the Bike Skills Park. This is a really exciting project, and should be a real boost to the Strathfillan area.

Small Grants Scheme 2019: The Trust would like to draw your attention to our Community Gain Small Grants Scheme. If you are a community group in Strathfillan and are looking for a small amount of money to help buy materials, run a project or other activities, then please contact Kelly at the Trust. 19th August Meeting

The meeting was attended by seven Council Members, Jeremy MacDonald, Stirling Councillor, Michelle Flynn, Community Link Officer, and six members of the public.

Glen Lochay Development: A public meeting with the SSE will be held on Monday 16th September.

Breadalbane Park and KAT

Report: The new Viking Swing has been installed in the Play Park and is proving very popular. Work is needed on the drainage in the play area and it was agreed that this was maintenance work and therefore the responsibility of Stirling Council. The fact that Colin Hay and Amanda Clark are members of both the Community Council and the KAT Board allows good liaison between the Committees on such shared interests.

Community Grant: Killin was unsuccessful in applying for £5000 as it got too few votes.

Police Report – Copy of next report will appear in Killin News

Community Action Plan: Amanda Clark reported that work was progressing well and people of all ages had promised to attend the event on 31st August. The plan has a good range of people working on it and will be ready by the end of March. It is an important reference document particularly when grants are being considered.

School Improvements: Work needed had now been done. Nurseries are now required to be open from 8am to 6pm and, while work in Crianlarich School was continuing on the Nursery, the Crianlarich nursery children were coming to Killin School.

Heart 200: A public meeting had been suggested to discuss the Heart 200, and the possibility of combining this with the SSE Meeting on 16th September was suggested.

Road Problems:

Clearance of branches and foliage

overhanging roads and verges from privately owned properties is the responsibility of the owners and not Stirling Council. If the work is not done within 28 days after a letter from the Council requesting clearance, the Council will clear it and charge the owner. It was noted that clearance was necessary in several places, including the Aberfeldy Road, Main Street and Manse Road and that at the Falls of Dochart Bridge, the visibility of traffic approaching the bridge was becoming difficult. The streetlight at the turning into the south Loch Tay Road had been unlit for many months and this would be reported to Stirling Council. The 'sleeping policeman' on the road to the dump had been dumped at the side of the road.

Pier Road: In some places, parts of the wider verges had now been partly fenced off by the owners of the land involved. The only parking and passing place in Pier Road is by the cemetery and rubbish from work in the cemetery had been dumped there and needed removing. More parking places and passing places are needed further along the road as campervans often use the road and park in inappropriate places. There had also been a problem with speeding and a speed limit sign had been requested, but one for 40mph which had been put up had encouraged more speeding and had now been removed.

Parking: It was agreed that a review of parking in the village was needed following complaints of cars being parked on or partly on pavements, on yellow lines and for long periods of time in Main Street. Trouble with campers on the South Loch Tay Road cutting down trees and leaving rubbish would be referred to the police.

Chairman's Report

The meeting of the Community Council held on 19th August was well attended by members of the public, many of whom contributed magnificently to a lively and sometimes boisterous debate. Parking was one of the main topics, which is at its worst at this time of the year – the height of the tourist season. As well as parking congestion on Main Street, there were complaints of pavement parking outside the pharmacy and along the lower stretch of Manse Road where it joins Main Street. The use of passing places for parking, often overnight, on the Ardeonaig Road was a concern, with reports of congestion and occasional minor accidents. Wild camping, in general, is a growing problem, with accumulations of rubbish, damage and the cutting down of live wood for campfires. The police are aware of these issues and are working to address it through Operation Ironworks. Many residents may not be aware of this, partly because the signs are faded, some almost to illegibility, but most of Main Street is a 30 minutes maximum stay zone for parking. Due to the issues raised at this meeting there is a possibility that Killin could see its first parking enforcement efforts for a very long time. Be warned. On a brighter note, there have been a

number of very positive developments, most notably the primary school. Following the Community Council meeting in June, which raised the issue of lack of maintenance of the school, and which was subsequently pursued directly with Stirling Council representatives, a programme of improvement was fast-tracked over the summer holidays. Crianlarich nursery is also undergoing improvements, and both Killin and Crianlarich nurseries will now open from 8.00 am until 6.00 pm. The Viking swing is now installed in Breadalbane Park, and is proving very popular, but there are still issues with the drainage in this area. Killin and Ardeonaig Trust and the Community







Council Updates

Council are to join forces to try to get this remedied with Stirling District Council. Councillor Earl reports that the restoration of the Dochart Bridge underlighting is progressing well, and that new signage for Ballechroisk is in hand.

Village speed limits continue to be a source of controversy and bemusement. No sooner were the new 40mph signs put up, at considerable expense, in Pier Road, than they were taken down. In the absence of any coherent policy from the District Council, we have suggested a 20mph limit on Pier Road with 'walkers and cyclists priority' signs We continue to press the case for an extension of the 30mph limit from the Glebe to the Bridge of Lochay, particularly in view of the recent housing developments along this stretch. Grass cutting on verges and in open spaces such as the park and cemetery is a constant source of complaint, both from residents and visitors. However, we have been informed that Stirling Council is investigating new, more efficient and effective grass cutting technologies. We have been assured that these are not sheep.

As ever, onward and upward. The next Killin Community Council meeting will be held in Killin Primary School on Monday, 21st October at 7.30 pm.

SSE Development: The SSE Liaison Team explained more about the proposed development in Glen Lochay. Following feed-back on the first plan, some alterations had been made and new technology was being considered. The main building had been reduced to two storeys with a pitched roof, which was welcomed by the residents present at the meeting. New technology using less toxic methods which would produce cleaner air was being researched and would have to go through health and safety. If it is approved, Glen Lochay could be one of the first to use it but how long this might take was not certain and it would be January before it might be approved. The old transformers would need removing anyway as they are ten years past their replacement date. This might take place between April and October 2020 and would not be an easy job. The plant would have to close down for this but for how long was not known.

Members of the public suggested that trees might be planted to screen the buildings. The SSE was also asked to find out and let the landowner know exactly how much water was being used by the plant as it was thought it could be far more than had been agreed in the 1950s and was having an effect on the burns and fish.

Breadalbane Park: Play equipment painting was going on and fencing was arranged. Damage had been caused to

the Park recently when lorries had been driven in and out without tracking in bad weather and remedial work was required. At the moment a £500 retainer previously charged was not required when bookings were made and it was thought this should be reinstated and tracks for vehicles in wet weather should be required. Stirling Council would be asked to do the remedial work. Drainage on the football pitch had also been damaged as fence posts had been used although this was not allowed.

KAT: The upcoming KAT AGM would deal with queries about Council and Board membership.

Roads and traffic: It was suggested that the 30mph limit sign should be applied beyond the Lochay Bridge up to the Golf Course entrance and/or that there should be a warning on the far side of a single track bridge. The speed limit in Pier Road may be brought down to 20mph. Satnav often takes caravans down The Glebe so perhaps better signage is needed. Parking strategy is being reviewed by Stirling Council area by area and Killin is on the list.

Overhanging trees opposite the Golf Course would be dealt with by the Council if attempts to find the landowner were unsuccessful. The school and the police would be approached about restarting cycling training for children as child cyclists need to be made aware of best practice.



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Changes for Better or Worse.

As mid-September makes us think of autumn, as the nights get longer and the mornings get chillier, there are changes happening. All around Ardeonaig the fields are suddenly silent, as the lambs have been sold and the ewes are having a well-earned rest from the constant demands of their young. The peace is only sometimes shattered by the farreaching call of the greater spotted cyclist!

Another silent creature is our friendly neighbourhood hedgehog. Last year Eric arrived during the summer with a family of two youngsters. After renaming the said hedgehog Erica, we often watched them by the window, feeding on the hedgehog food that we put out. (Please do not give them the traditional bread and milk, as they are lactose intolerant and the trouble is that they can't read the allergy notices!) This year we have seen little of them, except along the road in the evenings when walking family dogs. But just lately, the security light has come on to let us know that we still have hedgehogs around. It also proves that they are capable of either getting through tiny gaps or climbing wire fences. We have seen them doing both in the past.

Less welcome visitors are the caterpillars of the Oak Processionary moth. They have spread across Europe into England (haven't they heard about Brexit?) and are now into the Borders. They not only create havoc amongst oak trees but cause severe allergic reactions in humans if their tiny hairs are touched. So, if you do happen to see one, report it and do not touch.

Not known to be dangerous at all is the brightly coloured Ichneumonid

wasp which has been found for the first time in Scotland by an R.S.P.B. volunteer on Loch Lomond side. Of course, the dangers from that evil little arachnid, the tick, are still there and it is estimated that the problem of Lyme disease may be three times as bad as previously thought and that Scotland is the worst affected in the UK. A mobile phone app. is being developed, by combining satellite data with information from the special dedicated laboratory in Inverness and is being funded by the European Space Agency. In the meantime, if you find a tick on you, don't panic but get yourself a handy proper tick remover and remove the tick as soon as possible. It is often easier and better to get someone else to remove the tick as they often nestle in those hard to reach bits. Some years ago, I was accosted in Glen Lochay by a lady who asked if I recognised ticks, then pulled up her t shirt to show me the offending article - the tick of course. The status of mountain hares is still not resolved. SNH has reclassified it as 'unfavourable'. But the true numbers are unknown and could be anywhere between 95,000 and 700,000. Some sites where RSPB. has counted no hares have contradictory results of 'robust numbers', counted by the Game and Wildlife Conservation Trust. (GWCT) using new SNH methods. This same organisation is undertaking a Scottish-wide census of their numbers, and landowners are being requested to complete forms. Research so far has shown that numbers on managed grouse moors are up to 35 times higher than on unmanaged areas. When all our planned new

within the fences will be killed anyway so that they don't damage the trees. This proposed forestry will necessitate putting in hill roads to enable planting and harvesting. These seem to go ahead with little planning trouble, yet farmers and estates wishing to put in roads for access always come in for criticism. Still, you won't be able to see much soon for the trees anyway. What's that saying about 'not seeing the wood for the trees'?

It would seem that nobody has thought to balance the carbon capture potential of the trees with the emissions from the rotting rubble after felling, the months of road building, harvesting and transport. There is also the fire risk of huge tracts of forest, as was seen lately in the Amazon. But some later reports claim that this year was not greatly different from others and that fires occur regularly and it was the unusual wind direction, blowing smoke to the cities, that alerted people.

There are also new reports concerning the tagging of wild birds. Not all retrieved data is necessarily disclosed and procedures have been seen to be lacking in some allegations of raptor persecution. Several bodies are asking for a register of tagged birds, licensing of tagging, transparency of data collected and protocol for retrieval of tags which have ceased to transmit.

I am pleased to report that Mr. Fox has begun a healthier diet. He mugged a shopper in Sidcup for apples and spring onions and one of his estimated 30,000 urban relations stole a garlic baguette.

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Musings From The Manse

Autumn is a time of Harvest for the farming community and a time of celebration for the Church (well at one service at least!). For the farmers it is a serious and important time and can mean the difference between survival or bankruptcy. However, for the majority of people in our country, I would hazard a guess that it is not something even remotely visible on their horizon.

Contrasting Scenarios!

- 1) The church bells are ringing and the population of the village, young and old, male and female, are winding their way up to the place of worship on the hill. The sanctuary is decorated for a festive occasion and there is an air of expectancy and merriment among the people. Everyone seems in a good mood! It is autumn and the annual Harvest Thanksgiving service is about to begin. Adorned with flowers and sheaves of corn, and with vegetable produce from the fields visually occupying center stage, the church is ready for a celebration. And what a celebration this will be! No empty ritual here: certainly not today! The hymns will be sung with gusto, the prayers will be heartfelt, the sentiments expressed, real and genuine. The community will survive another winter. The relief is palpable! The harvest was good: it's safely gathered in; there will be food to eat during the dark, cold months when the snows come and the village is all but cut off from the rest of the world. It is good to be alive! It is great to have hope! That is what makes the act of Harvest Thanksgiving so poignant, personal, and powerful. Life will go on.
- 2) It is Friday night. After searching the kitchen, the children complain "Mum there's nothing to eat! Nothing

we like anyway; there are no goodies". The fridge and cupboards are far from empty but the kids are fussy!. "When are we getting the big shop?" Mum dutifully bundles everybody into the car for an "expedition" to the friendly neighbourhood 24hr supermarket (take your pick on the brand name). They arrive at the brightly lit modern Temple of Consumerism which stands out sharply from the large, dark, expanse of tarmac upon which nestle countless motor vehicles. There is a hive of activity despite the evening hour, and the walkways ebb and flow with shoppers. They collect a trolley and enter the store via the automatic sliding doors which open on their approach. The visual spectacle and sensory experience which greets them on entry should halt them in their tracks for a moment of awe and wonder, but it doesn't - they've seen it all before. It's just a routine visit. The sheer volume and variety of food on offer and display is staggering, but it completely fails to impact the emotions of our modern family on their evening outing. For them, this is a functional trip. They'll soon have what they came for and, no doubt, lots of items that they didn't come for, (such are the temptations placed before us!) and they'll return home. Their attitude is surprising: as the majority of the human race, past and present, would stand agog at this sight. For millions of people who, from the midst of the drudgery and want of life have imagined paradise as an oasis in a desert, or, alternatively, imagined heaven, as a banqueting hall filled with overflowing tables, the spectacle and experience of the modern supermarket would have seemed like a dream, a fantasy. Unfortunately, for most consumers this is not a thought that engages them, nor

spurs serious reflection.

Two different scenes representing two different worlds: The first could have been taken from anytime over the last two millennia up to the 19th century or even, in some places, the first part of the 20th century; the second, of course, is contemporary. My, how things have changed! Most likely by the time you read these words, Killin Church will have celebrated our annual Harvest Thanksgiving service. This will have been an opportunity, whether religious or not, to remember our farming community and to respond with gratitude to the sheer giveness of life, remembering how fragile it is and how blessings come to us in the ordinary everyday things that we often take for granted.

Every time we sit down to a meal prepared for us, let us just pause for a short moment and realise that it could all be so different. Life is too short to miss moments of gratitude.

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

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Obituary

Janet Laurie (nee Robertson)

16th October 1948 - 13th August 2019

Janet was born on October 16, 1948 at Aberfeldy Cottage Hospital, the younger daughter of Alistair and Helen (Nell) Robertson of Ben Lawers Farm. It was quite an idyllic upbringing. Although there was no electricity or telephone, girl guides or swimming lessons, there were gorgeous views

and so many places to explore and play in, not to mention pet lambs and hens to feed. During the summer, life was busy with friends and family visiting from the city, but in the winter, it was quite isolated, with barely a car going by on the road from Killin to Aberfeldy. Janet attended primary school in Fearnan and then Breadalbane Academy in Aberfeldy. She attended cattle sales at the Killin Mart, dances in the McLaren Hall and games of golf with her father on the beautiful Killin golf course.

But entertainment was found mainly in Fearnan and Aberfeldy, with regular trips on the Saturday evening bus to Aberfeldy to go to the pictures at the Birks Cinema. In 1964 Janet left school and Lawers at the age of 15 to go to Perth, and after passing a Secretarial Course, she worked in various offices in

Perth as a shorthand typist and clerkess for the next four years. But the draw of home was strong and she returned most weekends to Lawers to spend time with her parents and her Auntie Nettie who ran Ben Lawers Hotel.

In 1968 she moved to Glasgow, where she worked as a secretary in the Contracts Department of the BBC for the next seven years.

Football was a major interest in Janet's life and she started, at age 11, attending St Johnstone matches at

Muirton Park with her dad. Following St Johnstone wasn't easy and among the disappointments, she saw St Johnstone lose finals or semi finals on at least 10 occasions!

All that disappointment was washed away on 17 May 2014 when they won the Scottish Cup...now there's a lesson

in perseverance!!

In 1974 she married Iain Laurie and their children, Helen and Robert, were born in 1976 and 1979. For most of their married life, they lived in Houston in Renfrewshire.

In 1978 Alistair sold the farm, and he and Nell moved to Manse Road in Killin where they had a very happy and fulfilling retirement. From that time on, Janet and family came regularly to Killin and got to know many people in the village. Both she and Iain loved to golf and played the

Killin course as often as they could, even winning the Open Mixed Foursomes in 1988. Killin became a regular and much loved part of their lives and even after her parents died, she and Iain continued to visit and enjoy the camaraderie of the golf club and the village.

Sadly Janet was diagnosed with MS in 1988 and for many years she fought the disease and kept busy working and volunteering, while being a much loved mother to Helen and Robert, and granny to Alexander and Fiona.

But even as her health deteriorated towards the end of her life, she still enjoyed day trips to Killin, sitting in her wheelchair outside the clubhouse looking up the 9th hole or going around the course on a buggy, enjoying the gorgeous views.

5th August 1933 - 27th June 2019


Sandy was born in Falkirk and, after a brief stay in Glasgow, moved to Killin when he was 4 years old.

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Ken Chew 24th August 1945 - 25th July 2019



My partner, Ken Chew, was born on 24th August 1945 in Edinburgh and died on 25th July 2019 in Forth Valley Royal Hospital, Larbert, after a short illness. He grew up in Newporton-Tay, went to Madras College in St Andrews and then to University in Aberdeen where he studied geology and specialised in oil and gas. Ken was very active in student politics and was for some time the president of the students' union.

After his PHD he stayed in Aberdeen and worked two years for BP. He then moved to Ireland and took up a post as lecturer at University Galway and later joined a consultancy company in Dublin. Ken lived for 12 years in Ireland. When his company closed the Dublin office in 1987, Ken moved to Switzerland to work for its Geneva office. He lived for 19 years in Geneva, where we met.

While in Switzerland, Ken always talked about Scotland with warmth and passion. I knew he eventually wanted to go back to his country. When his company was bought by another and started laying off people, he feared for his job and decided to have a Plan B. This involved moving back to Scotland and running an accommodation business. For several years he

showed me pictures of potential properties he found on the internet and slowly but surely, his dream became ours. He never lost

however, and several years later, in

2006, we decided to move to Scotland anyway. Ken worked very hard, not only for Morenish Mews, our self-catering

accommodation business near Killin, but also for tourism in the area. He quickly became involved in

several tourism related groups and was the chairman of the Breadalbane Tourism Cooperative, now called the Breadalbane Tourism Circle, that ran the Ring of Breadalbane Explorer Bus for 5 years. The wooden waymarking finger posts indicating access routes to the head of Loch Tay are another testimony of his efforts to promote tourism. They are the result of his contacts with The Friends of Loch Lomond and the Trossachs who offered a grant to cover the cost. Geology was not only his trade, but also a passion he wanted to share. He spent hours preparing for the U3A geology course that ended with a very successful field trip in Glencoe last

A couple of weeks before he died, we went to the Southern Uplands to look for rocks and fossils for a second series of talks he was planning for the autumn. He was very excited about it, but sadly fell ill.

Ken was passionate about skiing, loved fishing and tended a beautiful vegetable garden. He cared about the environment and had a very strong sense of justice. He loved his three children and six grand-children who visited regularly from Ireland. I think I can safely say that he was very happy **Catherine Huber**

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

Taste of Autumn

Autumn is a time instinctively linked to our senses. We are all familiar with the sights, sounds, smells, and particularly for those with a curious palette – tastes of this wonderful season. In literature, autumn represents change, maturity, reflection and, unsurprisingly, ripeness. While it is a season of colder days and longer nights, it is also the perfect time for foraging. The fields and woods are positively teeming with free food. Plentiful and easy to find (at least until the birds and squirrels take notice!), wild edibles can make a great addition to many dishes, or can even be the whole dish itself. In fact, it is quite possible to plan breakfast, lunch, dinner and dessert around a successful day's forage, as outlined below.

Start the day with a nutritious breakfast. Hazel and beechnuts, chopped or grated, go well in homemade muesli. Toast them with rolled oats in the oven for 15-20 minutes. Serve with yoghurt and freshly picked brambles. If Tetley's and PG Tips aren't rustic enough for you, then a novel alternative is heather tea. Made from dried flower-heads, this was said to be Robert Burns' choice of brew. For lunch, you might want to make use of the last nettles this year.

Though shrunken and slightly withered at this point, they still make a lovely, earthy soup. Serve with a thick slice of sweet chestnut bread. Remember not to confuse the sweet chestnut with the horse chestnut which has a smoother shell and is poisonous. Shell and grind in a blender. Mix resulting flour with ordinary wheat flour, usually half and half, along with water, yeast and sourdough starter, until you have the dough. Refrigerate overnight and bake in medium oven for 30 minutes.



Now for the main event. No autumn feast is complete without mushrooms. Although this side of foraging carries obvious risk, you don't need to be an expert to identify the more distinctive fungi and with a little homework you can soon spot the differences. The chanterelle, for example, is fairly rudimentary and its bogus counterpart is usually offensive in flavour only. One of nature's true delicacies, the chanterelle is

wonderful fried in butter and garlic, but for a more substantial meal is delicious with tagliatelle or risotto. Other edible mushrooms of this season include cep and hedgehog fungus. A decent collection would go a long way in a pie or stew. Last but not least - dessert. Brambles are everywhere at the moment and it would be a real shame not to make the most of this quintessential autumn fruit. If jamming, brambles are excellent for bread and butter pudding. They are also great in crumbles (mixed with a few crab apples, another staple of autumn). For a quick and easy topping, boil the fruit in their own juices for about ten minutes, strain and then boil the juice for a few minutes more with sugar, lemon juice and a little pectin. The result is a kind of syrup that can be served over ice cream, pancakes, etc. A savoury option is Rowan jelly, made in the usual way to jam but with a slightly bitter, marmalade flavour. Rowan berries are best picked in October when they are red and ripe, but before they begin to soften. Ideal for cheeseboards (especially Wensleydale) and reputedly, schnapps and liqueurs. Maybe one to save for Christmas!

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
