For many weeks, working to the strictest of quidelines, members of Killin Drama Club have been rehearsing for their planned Pantomime - Pinocchio, by Doreen Moger. The scheduled dates are 20/21/22 January. For much of the rehearsal period we have split into 3 groups, Primary, High School and Adults and every effort has been made to reduce contact with other groups. It means that this years show will be a little different, but you can count on an exciting evening when you come to join us. The story follows Pinocchio's journey from the workbench to the point where he becomes 'human', includes a visit to the Circus, and also an undersea adventure in the jaws of a whale! We promise the usual Killin Spectacle! Will the audience be arranged as usual? To minimise risk, we have reduced the audience number by over 100 seats each evening, giving a maximum of around 135 as opposed to the usual 250.

Will there be a Bar? Not this year we regret, as we are trying to avoid lots of movement around the hall and queueing. Patrons will be encouraged to BYOB and a glass, and then take all the debris back to your home for disposal.

What about Ice Creams? Vanilla Ice Cream Tubs can be pre-ordered and paid for at the time of booking. They will be delivered to your table at the interval.

What about Ticket Sales? Please see the sketch plan of the hall. For this year, we plan to seat everyone at a table, in groups of 4. Tables cost £32 each for 4 persons—be they adults or children or OAP. If your party consists of only 3 persons, we ask you to invite a local neighbour to join your group.

What about Additional seats? All our planning is for the purpose of keeping everyone safe and we cannot allow seats to be moved.



Village Resident Appointed Stirling and Firth Valley Regional Food Tourism Ambassador

So, what's it all about?

An exciting, brand new programme that aims to put Scotland on the map as a global destination for unique and memorable food tourism experiences and help the food, drink and tourism sectors recover from the effects of the pandemic.

The programme is administered and managed by Scotland Food & Drink and other key partners including The Scottish Tourism Alliance, VisitScotland and The Scottish Government.

I am part of a team of 25 regional ambassadors who span the length and breadth of Scotland. These positions are voluntary and on a two year contract. Ambassadors have been selected to represent a wide cross-section of skills and experience in Scottish food tourism from agritourism, hospitality operators and chefs to writers, social media influencers, drinks experts and food and drink producers.

We will work together as a team on some events and projects and individually on others.

Our main goals are to:

- Promote, support and develop food tourism in Scotland, for example, eat and drink local campaigns
- Provide practical guidance to Food Tourism Scotland on strategy and planning
- Engage with local food networks and interested parties to assess gaps and needs within the sector
- Network further afield to learn from best practice. We will then benchmark and share results
- Engage with young people to listen, learn and inform we need to foster future food tourism champions; identify training and development opportunities for them to become involved in food tourism and connect with formal and informal education platforms to assess needs and interest

I'm currently getting out and about to meet people already involved with various aspects of food tourism in the region. Forth Valley and Stirling is a large geographical area to cover and it's very diverse, so there's quite a lot to learn and get on top of.

I have ideas but they are only that at present. I plan to build at least one

project close to home (in or near to Killin!) as a pilot scheme and, if successful, roll it out around the rest of region or in time, throughout Scotland.

I am still talking to people and working on ideas but here are a few of my initial thoughts:

- Digital visitor information pack for all self-catering accommodation: (issued when bookings are made, to help holiday planning). Create a directory of local food producers; hospitality businesses (pubs, hotels, restaurants and cafes); farm shops, delis and markets and food and drink tourist attractions.
- A recruitment tool kit to help hiring in food and drink businesses: This would be made by food & drink businesses sharing their own best practice ideas with others in a set of monthly updated videos and blogs
- Gluten Free Fortnight: The goal here is to make the region a magnet for coeliacs and those that choose to follow a gluten free diet by highlighting any and all gluten free offerings that exist in hospitality and independent retailers as well as accommodation providers. I have first hand experience of creating gluten free menus and events. Mostly recently, the café team and I held our yearly Gluten Free Fortnight which was a great success. They can attract a significant loyal following that boosts business with customers often travelling hundreds of miles. Customers also often make a mini break and stay over as part of the

I may well modify or change these goals as my journey develops but this will give you a taste.

Killin and Ardeonaig Trust

While some discussions have taken place Stirling Council have yet to fully respond to our request for allotment and food growing space under the Community Empowerment Act 2015. Cllr Martin Earl has now taken the issue up with senior managers and is seeking clarity on the need for the Council to take proactive action to promote and develop food growing opportunities, in order to meet their statutory responsibilities.

We've also been in contact with residents in Callander facing a similar issue and have made contact with the Scottish Allotment Garden Society to establish how other local authorities have dealt with requests elsewhere. In our view the legislation is guite clear on the need for local authorities to take reasonable steps to cater for local needs and demand, which at present Stirling Council seem reluctant to do. It is hoped that some progress will be made soon! Stage 1 funding from the Scottish Land Fund has now been secured. This will allow KAT to fully investigate the condition of the asset and also put together a business plan for utilizing the building for community use. The Scottish Government's Community Right to Buy team have also now received our application for registration of a community interest in the building. Thanks to all those who signed the petitions and indicated support!

Greener Recovery Fund

Disappointingly neither the KAT nor the Killin Community Council bid to LLTNP's Greener Recovery Fund were accepted. We are still waiting to hear which community bids were successful from this fund but do recognise that it was heavily oversubscribed. KAT are now seeking to secure funding from Stirling Council and LEADER to take forward the cycling development and bike trails feasibility study element of the KCC bid, which ultimately aims to access capital funding from both SportScotland and SSE.

In terms of the Old Mill and both the placemaking and activity elements of our applications, KAT are considering other funding sources to take these forward.

Community Place Plan

After a significant delay due to the Covid pandemic the Community Place Plan has now been published and a final version passed to LLTNP. Thanks to all those who contributed to the various consultation and engagement opportunities and especially to Amanda Clark, who chaired the Drafting Committee and coordinated much of the activity.

Unfortunately, part of the Greener Recovery Fund application (as above) was for a Monitoring & Delivery Plan to be produced in order to organise further community-led activity focused around delivery. However with this funding not forthcoming, KAT and KCC will need to look at other opportunities for this.

Copies of the plan will be placed in the library and any comments on the various projects or future actions are gratefully received.

Playpark

Thanks to the fabulous community fundraising activity, Stirling Council have now been instructed to make the purchase of a new basket swing. The Council themselves have also indicated that they are in a position to renew both the springer see-saw and the sand-pit climbing frame thanks to the Scottish Government funding that was announced earlier this year, and our thanks to Clirs Tweed and Earl for highlighting Killin's situation to Council officers. In addition to this the Co-op Community Funding has also now been confirmed which will allow the volunteer team the opportunity to look at another piece of equipment. After a long hiatus, it is tremendous to see progress being made and we look forward to the new equipment being installed in the new year!

Sports Pavilion

Discussions with Stirling Council on the future of the Pavilion continue and have been raised at the highest levels within the Council. Without updating and modernising the current leasing arrangements little progress can be made, and these legal changes seem to be taking an inordinate amount of time to rectify! However, UK Government funding under the Community Ownership fund is being made available specifically for sports & leisure facilities and it is hoped that the possibilities around accessing this funding will focus minds within the Council!

In addition KAT have recently been successful in applying for National Lottery Community Fund funding to appoint a part-time worker in the New Year. This will allow us to help coordinate the emerging youth work & sport programme, as well as look at how the building and facilities are brought up to standard.

A couple from Killin has donated over a thousand pounds from their wedding guests to conservation charity the National Trust for Scotland to help protect and enhance natural habitats after a chance meeting with a ranger. Newlyweds, Diana and Malcolm Gourlay are keen hikers and were saddened to see newly planted trees damaged and litter left by campers on a walk in Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve. It was just then that they had a chance meeting with Helen Cole, Property Manager and Senior Ranger for the National Trust for Scotland. Helen spoke with them about the work the Trust does to restore the habitats of Ben Lawers. This meeting with Helen made Diana and Malcolm rethink their wedding plans - and they decided to ask guests for donations to protect and restore nature on Ben Lawers. Bride, Diana Gourlay, said: "It warmed our hearts to hear about the hard work that the National Trust for Scotland puts into restoring and caring for a place we truly love. We decided there and then to ask for donations instead of wedding presents. In total our loved ones have helped us to raise £1,300 for Ben Lawers."

Their wedding, like many couples', had to be delayed due to the pandemic. They rescheduled to this summer, with an intimate ceremony at Inveraray Castle. Now they've returned from their honeymoon and are back to hillwalking at Ben Lawers.

Groom, Malcolm Gourlay, said: "We love this place. In June we did an epic 18-hour walk through Ben Lawers and the nature reserve.





We're so pleased our friends and family have helped us to care for and protect this place that's so important to us."

Helen Cole, Property Manager and Senior Ranger for Ben Lawers, said: "Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve is home to rare plant species and important habitats. It's designated as a site of European importance for several scarce and declining habitats, but the National Trust for Scotland has been pioneering work to conserve and restore these. The generosity and love of people like Malcolm and Diana gives this vital work a great boost, and so we would like to thank them very much."







Killin Medical Practice

Vaccinations

Thank you to all the patients who attended the practice for their Covid 19 booster. It was so nice to hear the chatter in the waiting room. We appreciated all the kind words of thanks. General Practice is going through a difficult time at the moment and your kind words made all the difference to our team morale.

If you wish to have the flu vaccine or missed our Covid booster clinics, please visit **www.nhsinform.scot** where you will find all the guidance you need there.

Other vaccinations that we aim to address are pneumococcal for the over 65s, this is a one-off vaccination often referred to as the "pneumonia" jag and the shingles vaccine for those between 70 and 79 years of age.

Long Term Condition Reviews

These have had a brief pause again to allow Jamie to administer the Covid boosters here in the practice. We endeavour to maintain our immunisations and not relinguish this service to the NHS Forth Valley immunisation team. This allows the service to be provided locally, in turn utilising the Direct Response Transport service and the Killin volunteer car service that provide transport at a small fee. Jamie is trying to slowly work through all the patients needing to be seen. However, if you are worried in any way and feel that your review should be sooner rather than later, she is very happy to discuss this in an initial telephone consultation and book appointments if it is appropriate. Jamie understands that many people in the community living with long term chronic conditions may be aware they are overdue review and is happy for people to come forward.

Staff

We are sad to announce that Caroline Robertson, our mental health practitioner, has moved on. We wish her all the best.

We would like to welcome Jackie Kiely to the practice. Jackie is our new mental health nurse. She is able to provide support and advice for many common mental health issues including stress, low mood and anxiety. She can offer guidance, support and a range of treatment options or refer you to specialist mental health services. If you call with a mental health concern, you may be directed to Jackie for a review. Jackie is here at the surgery on a Tuesday.

Appointments

Here is a brief outline of how the practice is running at the moment: Our aim is to get you to the right person at the right time. When you call the practice, the administration team will ask initially if you feel the appointment is urgent and if you need to be seen that day. If that is the case then you will be put on a triage list. We also ask our reception staff to ask your reason for wanting to see the doctor. Please call first thing in the morning ideally between 8am and 9am so that we can deal with the issue promptly. Our Practice Nurse, who has been extensively trained in triage over the last 4 years, or a GP will call you back that morning, usually between 9am and 9.30am and take a full history over the phone. If appropriate, you will be seen face to face that day in an unscheduled slot or booked in later in the week depending on clinical need. The earlier you call the practice the better we can organise your care. If you request a routine appointment but feel, for example, a week is too late to wait then the call will again be put on a triage list and a clinician will

reappoint if necessary, depending on clinical need. Not all patients need to be seen in person and sometimes a phone or video consultation is completely suitable.

We understand how unfamiliar this must feel but we have to protect you and our team and feel this is currently the safest way to run the practice in the current climate. Please visit our website at www.killinmedicalpractice.scot.nhs.uk for information regarding the practice.

Polite reminder - if you have or think you may have Covid symptoms, please get a negative PCR test before entering the surgery, thank you.

Please note: We have an email address that we sometimes ask patients to use. Please don't use this email address unless you have been asked to do so.

Overnight Use of Carparks

Following our report in the Killin News of October regarding the huge increase in motorhome tourism, we have had some feedback, mainly informal through community councillors. The overwhelming response is that the new 'no overnight parking' signs for motorhomes are naff - a good Scottish word meaning tasteless and ill-considered. We have no statistical evidence that they are discouraging tourists but they are certainly not welcoming. The Community Council has established a sub-group to investigate the possibility of creating a 'motorhome friendly' area in the Station car park. This will require consultation with the National Park, Stirling Council and, of course, the local community. Motorhome tourism is a huge growth industry and Killin should seek to ensure it benefits from it. Most of the available facilities for camping, caravanning and motorhoming, with the exception of Maragowan, are miles from the nearest village restaurant, shop or pub. As Killin is a community that relies for a lot of its income on tourist footfall, this has to be addressed. Should we encourage new sites closer to the village? 'Staycations' are the new normal. This is not likely to change over the next couple of years. It is an opportunity that we should capitalise upon - not only in the short term, but by investment and development, in the long term. Summer Activities program

Gregor McKenzie has also resigned as a co-opted member. We thank Gregor for his contribution and wish him well for the future. We also wish to express our gratitude to Andrew Fleming who has recently retired as our local 'bobby', and to Iain Campbell who has retired as Watch Manager of our local fire station.

Christmas

There have been lurid and disturbing reports that Christmas could be cancelled this year. One of the principal reasons often given is that seasonal EU workers are no longer allowed into Brexit Britain. The Community Council has, naturally, sought assurances that such a disaster can be avoided. We were pleased to learn that our own Santa Claus is not from Finland, but Aberdeen, and will be out and about in the village from the 14th of December. Christmas can go ahead! We wish you all a Merry Xmas and a happy and prosperous New Year, But don't expect much in your stocking our Santa is, after all, Scottish!



Strathfillan Seasonal Rangers

Our Seasonal Rangers' pilot has unfortunately come to an end, but we are hopeful that we can repeat it again next year. Bike Skills Park

As with life, everything happens in fits and starts and we have had bit of movement with the Bike Skills Park. We were granted planning permission at the beginning of November, which is great news, and means we can now start moving towards the construction phase. Unfortunately, we were not successful in securing funding from the National Park to employ a Project Officer, however, we

did manage to secure the money through LEADER's new Staffing Fund – so onwards and upwards! We hope to employ someone from December onwards.

Tyndrum Facilities Improvements

The Trust has been working with the Tyndrum Infrastructure Group (TIG), which was formed by Sarah Heward from the Real Food Café and several disability campaigners to install a Changing Places toilet in Tyndrum for disabled visitors. We have managed to secure funding from LEADER to investigate improving toilet and waste facilities in Tyndrum, which should help with some of the visitor management issues raised during the Place Plan consultations. So please watch this space as to what might happen next.

And lastly, a wee save the date. We plan to hold our AGM on Thursday, January 26th, 2022. At the moment, we hope that this will be an in-person event with an option for Zoom for those who either cannot make it or would feel uncomfortable. Changing Places Toilet for Tyndrum

Tyndrum has recently been awarded a £10,000 grant by Forth Valley LEADER to carry out a feasibility study into building a Changing Places facility.

The Strathfillan CDT is custodian of the funds for the project which is currently being jointly managed by CDT and TIG (Tyndrum Infrastructure Group).

As a stake holder in Tyndrum and a passionate campaigner for Changing Places, this is very good news after years of trying to get

the ball rolling and making next to no progress.

So, what is a Changing Places facility and why is it important?

A Changing Places facility is a toilet for people who need to be hoisted onto the loo. This can be a complicated procedure, so a Changing Place provides all the facilities that might be needed in addition to a special toilet.

At present there is no such facility between outer Glasgow and the Western Isles. Imagine going for a drive and not being able to go to the loo from Balloch to Barra. Well, that is the reality faced by people who need these facilities at the moment. You may think this doesn't affect you, however you would be wrong. It may not affect you today, but no one knows what lies around the corner for themselves or for people they love and care about.

I knew nothing about any of this and, as so often happens, became interested and passionate through

personal necessity.

My education and learning started when my Dad became ill with a degenerative neurological condition. Travelling was very challenging for Dad because all too often it meant a humiliating situation of having to wear a nappy, which ultimately meant he didn't want to go out. Another example, my husband's cousin was very active until he was knocked off his motorbike and paralysed.

Many thousands of families are in similar situations through disability, illness or accident.

The quest to build a Changing Places loo in Tyndrum has proven challenging because of the unique nature of Tyndrum.

Some of the issues we face are its small size and despite the huge volume of passing traffic, there are no public facilities (apart from the tiny and outdated public loos and a couple of litter bins), no public open spaces or public buildings, not a single public car parking place and there is no suitable land for sale/lease.

The feasibility study will look with fresh eyes for workable solutions to the barriers, investigate funding and look at maintenance and management after the loo is open. It's good timing because the Scottish Government has announced a new £10million fund for the

purposes of extending the Changing Places network throughout Scotland. This will be great for those families that desperately need these facilities, the communities they serve and for accessible tourism.

So, finally after several years of not gaining real traction, things are really starting to line up and I believe this project will at last become a reality.

If you would like to be involved or discuss aspects of this project and the Changing

Places network, then please get in touch. I am an enthusiastic supporter of the concept and the work Changing Places and PAMIS do.

Finally, I'd like to say a big thanks to my fellow volunteers on TIG who are all very committed - Kim Kemp, Dougie Peddie and Jonathan Attenbough. They are all customers of the café from outwith our community.

They have kept me going and offered guidance throughout this journey.

Thanks also to Theresa Elliot and Kelly Clapperton-Bates from the Strathfillan CDT – this wouldn't be happening without their help, guidance and support. Additionally, thanks to Anne-Michelle Ketteridge at LEADER for believing in us and the project and finally, our MP, Alyn Smith and our MSP, Evelyn Tweed who have been very supportive and are keen to do what they can to help push this over the line.



Class 2 have also had great fun making and testing paper rockets to see whose would fly the furthest. We talked about what would make each rocket more aerodynamic and streamlined.






"The Lost Village of Lawers" Expanded New Edition is Released

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THE KILLIN CONNECTION

The Last Chief

The passing of Francis MacNab, 16th Chief of Clan MacNab, in 1816, brought a close to the final chapter in traditional Highland society. Despite the end of Jacobitism some sixty years earlier, and the gradual integration of the clan system into the British state, Francis had lived very much in the old manner. He had retained the values of chiefdom to the point of idolatry, becoming something of a celebrity thanks to Raeburn's famous portrait, The MacNab. A raucous and eccentric character, the chief is well remembered for his habits of drinking, gambling and womanising. Even after allegedly fathering as many as 32 children, he remained a bachelor until his death. With no direct heir, the title fell to his nephew, Archibald MacNab, then a 28 year old lawyer. By this time, the clan homelands that once stretched as far west as Tyndrum had shrunk to just a thousand acres around Kinnell House. Worse still, the whole estate was sinking under debts of about £35,000 - roughly £1.5 million in today's money. The honour that Archibald likely felt upon carrying his uncle's legacy soon gave way to sobering reality. To mitigate his debts, MacNab sold off more land in 1823, but it was not enough. A writ of foreclosure was issued and soon the king's officers would be coming to arrest him. Leaving behind his wife and children, MacNab fled Kinnell House with his elderly retainer Dugald, and made his way to London. They boarded a ship bound for Canada, where the lure of a free land grant system - not to mention immunity from prosecution - proved irresistible to a fugitive like MacNab. On his arrival in the New World a month later, the chief marched down the gangplank with the confidence of a free man. He quickly set about applying for a tract of land near the Ottawa River in Southern Ontario, and revealed his plans for creating a new settlement for his clansmen in Scotland. In a formal petition to the Governor of Canada, MacNab requested grant blocks of 100 acres per family and promised to pay for the passage of each settler, subject to reimbursement later on. Title deeds would be held by him for the first twelve months, after which they

would be given to each family on condition of good citizenship. The request was successful and MacNab was gifted 80,000 acres of land to populate. His true intentions, however, were conveniently left out of the discussions.



Lying at the junction of the Madawaska and Ottawa Rivers, the land in question is today skirted by the thousand mile Highway 17, carrying traffic from Toronto in the east to Vancouver in the west. When MacNab arrived here in 1824, he would have known only an eternal landscape of forest and wetland. Few roads yet existed, and rivers were still the only practical method of navigating this vast wilderness. Here, he built a large log cabin called Kinnell Lodge, the first settlement in what would grow into MacNab Township. Transport for 20 families from Killin was soon arranged, and 84 souls left Greenock in 1825 to start a lifechanging journey. After 38 days at sea, the group disembarked at Quebec and began the long pilgrimage, through fly-ridden swamps and trackless bush, to the promised land of MacNab. It was not to be. The terms of settlement agreement was not disclosed to the settlers and instead MacNab contracted a system akin to the feudal days of old. He demanded not only rent but also a proportion of crop yield for every acre cleared. The settlers accepted, unaware that the land had been granted free by the Governor of Canada. For the next decade, they struggled against unmitigated odds with no support. Few had experience in timber felling and poor soil made it difficult to raise

MacNab claimed the timber they felled as his own to sell. In one incident, where a disgruntled tenant sold his timber to a neighbour, the chief had him imprisoned under the charge of theft. The man was released only after friends paid his bail. When MacNab decided to build a new property at Waba Lake, eight miles distant, he enlisted each clansman to supply him with one month's worth of unpaid labour. Through a mixture of threat, political influence and bribery, MacNab's illegal system of serfdom remained free of scrutiny from the colonial government. It was not until 1840, when federal authorities began reforms tackling corruption, that a petition was raised by the settlers and an official investigation into MacNab began. It found that he had charged extortionate interest rates for settlers' passage and expenses, and the accrued debt prevented them from claiming deeds to their lands. He was accused of oppression and fraud, and forced to give up his feudal hold over the tenants. Departing Canada in disgrace, MacNab lived much of the rest of his life in Orkney and died penniless in Brittany, France. He was succeeded by his daughter, Sarah Anne, who was recognised as 18th Chief after a period of dispute. When she died unmarried in 1894, the title eventually settled on the Arthurstone branch of the family, whose descendants still hold it. Today, the town which grew from MacNab's original settlement is called Arnprior. Named by MacNab in tribute to his mother's birthplace, many of the present population are descendants of the settlers who followed their chief across the Atlantic. From the 84 men, women and children who came here in 1825, there now stands a community of 10,000. Toponymy offers a more tangible ancestral link: there's a street, park, school and

Autumn Days and Squirrel Ways

The Summer has flown, along with the swallows and martins and here we are at the beginning of November. Most of the butterflies have flown too, away to wherever they go but there was one hardy red admiral still about a few days ago. The squirrels and many of the small garden birds have returned after a 'spa treatment' detox in the woods and fields eating the wild harvest of nuts and fruit. Some of the returning squirrels are old hands and have their preferred feeding habits but there are a couple of newbies too. One has been adventurous enough to use the squirrel box and saving energy by staying inside till his tummy is full. But it must get a bit fuggy in there as some times his nose pokes out for a breather. Another prefers the sunflower seeds and happily twirls around on the feeder while eating. I realise that many Killin residents are seeing this in their own gardens but I am reliably informed by a young lady who now lives in Italy that reading these things brings back good thoughts of home.

We have two rowan trees in our garden which were loaded with berries but every berry disappeared in one week. Fast work fieldfares and redwings! We were away at the time so they did have undisturbed use of the garden. We were away on the Northumbrian coast and walked quite a few of the beautiful sandy beaches. Despite a lot of people and more dogs per head of population than anywhere else it seems every beach was spotless with not a scrap of litter, a discarded bit of plastic or a doggy poo in sight anywhere. The only blot was a huge building that had been a coal burning power station but which had been 'greened' to biomass,


shame the wood pellets travelled from America and Canada.

The Save Scotland's Red Squirrels group are worried about the sighting of greys at The Birks and on Chapel Road because, as is well known, they nick the food and spread squirrel pox. If you do see a grey in our area the drill is not to scare it off as this will make it harder to capture it. You can then get someone to come with a cage trap to collect it if you phone the squirrel people on 01313127765. There are also worries about the logging of Clashindarroch forest, Aberdeenshire, for a windfarm where some last remaining wild cats live. Eagles are gaining a bit more support as landowners in areas where there has previously been alleged (please note alleged only) persecution of eagles have joined forces with a private conservation group to tag and monitor eagle activity more accurately and openly as previous work has often been kept secret and slewed conclusions reached. So here we are desperately trying to save our iconic indigenous species and many organisations are just interested in rewilding new ones. Even the beavers who are the best lumberjacks in the animal kingdom and let free amongst all these so precious trees. Deer are under sentence of death for this but beavers seem to be congratulated. In S. Africa trees are being cut down to preserve water supplies as the long drought is still continuing there. No-one around here will have failed to have noticed the undergrounding of the electricity lines. A few trees cut down and farmland disrupted to improve the views but if you go just past Crianlarich on the Glasgow road you will see the acreage of precious peat being erased. They say that it will be restored but will the captured

carbon not have escaped by then? Many friends and relations of Mr. Fox have had it good in guieter towns during lockdown but one in England really tried it on. After a break from TV a woman returned to see a bony fox lying on her settee, obviously waiting for Netflix to resume. After a great deal of shouting etc. the fox was finally chased out and the woman resumed watching TV. What she should have done was thoroughly hoover and clean as she contracted canine scabies. She was told that a way of deterring foxes from your garden is with male urine. Not sure if it works but keepers often do this to deter a fox returning to its den. Those of you who remember the late great Fred Simpson can easily believe that this was discovered years ago.

So beware - don't put your bum where a fox has sat and if, gentlemen, you are on fox deterrent duty, please check that no-one is looking.

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
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Musings From The Manse

Remembrance And Hope

On the 27th of October we gathered at the Cenotaph for a special rededication service of the memorial. The turnout was exceptional and the memorial itself was looking great thanks to the dedicated work of the committee and volunteers in preparation for this event. It was a double centenary commemoration; first the belated tribute to the establishment of the memorial itself in 1920, and secondly, the marking of the founding of the British Legion in 1921. Movingly, there was a roll call of the fallen whose names adorn the monument by some of the children from the local primary school. Their young voices provided inclusivity to the occasion and brought an extra poignancy to the service that was already heavy with pathos and emotion. There were 34 names read out (28 from WW1 and 6 from WW2). The names of the Crew of the RAF Tornado which crashed in 1994 in Glen Ogle were also mentioned as was our own Timothy McColl who went missing whilst on active service with the Royal Navy in 2012 and who tragically, has never been found. We tried to imagine what the crowd who gathered there 101 years ago would have been feeling at that first dedication service. After four years of the most cataclysmic war in history up until that time, a war whose dark hand touched every community in the land without restraint or remorse, the people of Killin, no doubt like all others in the country, could only breathe a huge sigh of relief with the Armistice

of November 1918.

Unknown to them their trials weren't over and for the next two years the ravages of Spanish Flu spread yet another dark cloud over the landscape. Yet life continued as "hope springs eternal in the human breast." It has been said, "History is not just what happened but the way what happened is remembered." The WW1 poet Siegfried Sassoon asked of his own generation "Have you forgotten yet?.....Look down, and swear by the slain of the War that you'll never forget." (Aftermath 1919). That question is perennially relevant. In our own small way we have honoured the sacrifice of those who lived before us and their legacy to us. Far from glorifying war or celebrating militarism, nationalism or imperialism, (as is the accusation from some quarters) Remembrance Services are the opposite of that. We fully acknowledge the folly and tragedy of war but also the fact that freedom and democracy and the greater good sometimes require it. We do not live in a perfect world and evil exists. but every remembrance service, whilst acknowledging the past, also looks to the future. At the end of each service we pledge to go from the place of remembrance to do our individual and collective best to work in ways both small and large to make the world a better place. It is a double focus; looking backwards to the past in acknowledgment and gratitude but then looking forward to the future with faith and hope.

All of which brings me to Christmas. It is quite fitting that we move in

November from Armistice Sunday with its testimony to the brokenness of our world and the human race, to December and the celebration of the birth of our Saviour. The Christmas story is not sentimental, rose tinted, idealistic, or in any sense "nice." Yes Christmas cards can present it in a fantasy-like setting with an otherworldly glow about it.

The reality was different indeed. It takes place in "occupied territory" under the jackboot of Rome. Revolution is in the air! There is social and religious unrest. In the midst of this in a peasant backwater concerning two towns Nazareth and Bethlehem there is a shocking incident concerning a teen-age pregnancy, family shame and public scandal. Surprisingly, surrounding this story are also spiritual visions and claims of fulfilled prophecy! Whatever we make of that story today, it lit a candle in a dark place and that light has never gone out. It is however, mainly ignored. In the movie epic "Lord of the Rings" Galadriel says at the beginning of the film "Some things that should never have been forgotten were lost." The Judeo-Christian tradition has influenced Western nations in ways that are not even understood or acknowledged yet our cultures and societies would be very different today without that influence.

It was Nietzsche who wrote "Those seen dancing were thought to be mad by those who couldn't hear the music." Will we hear the music of hope this Christmas?



"It's great to be developing a great team within the business and we are really looking forward to the time when we can get into the Killin practice and can start seeing patients."

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


