Killin Mountain Rescue Team

Callout Summary

Once again winter has been a passing season with some periods of extreme winter conditions on the hills, spaced out by benign sunny periods or warm, thawing conditions. This has meant we have been kept somewhat busy with callouts, as the conditions have been catching people out, or been challenging to negotiate. Some of the highlights have included two walkers cragfast in deep snow on Stuc a'Chroin. This required some technical ropework and searching to ensure safe extraction from the deep and steep snowy ground.



Two rescues have occurred on Ben More, one nearly at the summit of the hill and requiring a long stretcher recovery. Thanks go to Lomond MRT and the Coastguard helicopter team

for their assistance.

We also had a callout near the summit of Ben Lui which again required the assistance of the Coastguard helicopter as well as Oban MRT to bring to a safe conclusion.



As a point of note, the majority of our winter rescues have been completed in the dark. With this in mind, always carry a head torch until well into the Summer months as any minor mishap can take longer than expected to rectify.

Training

The fickle nature of our winters is also having an effect on our ability to complete winter training as effectively as we would wish. It can take many years to gain the necessary personal winter experience to operate in demanding and difficult conditions over steep and hazardous ground. Additionally, we have to train ourselves in the skills unique to mountain rescue such as avalanche rescue and recovery, winter rigging and rescues in winter conditions. To overcome these challenges, we once again undertook a Winter Training weekend in the Cairngorm Mountains delivered by mountain professionals. Using local guides means we can utilise their experience to get the most out of the conditions.



Everyone fully enjoyed the weekend and it also enables members to have a rare social get together too.

Winter preparation

We hope winter is behind us now but our mountains can still get sudden blasts of winter conditions especially so during the Easter break.

Iconic STILL Sculpture Returns to Loch Earn

The beloved STILL sculpture, created by renowned Scottish sculptor and environmental artist Rob Mulholland, has triumphantly returned to the waters of Loch Earn, offering locals and visitors alike the

After an absence, its return was made possible by the efforts of St Fillans in Bloom, the local volunteer group dedicated to enhancing the village's beauty and appeal, alongside support from community members and funders.



"The return of *STILL* to Loch Earn is truly a gift to the village and to everyone who visits," said Audrey Gavigan, Treasurer of St Fillans in Bloom. "This sculpture has a special place in our hearts. It not only

reflects the stunning landscape around us but also represents the resilience and creativity of our community. We're delighted to bring STILL back to St Fillans, where it can inspire and captivate all over

again."

Rob Mulholland, the artist behind *STILL*, expressed his excitement to see his sculpture back in Loch Earn, saying, "I created STILL to symbolise the physical and spiritual relationship between humans and the natural world.

The figure is purposefully static in stance reflecting the awe and power of nature. It's incredible to witness how the sculpture has resonated with the people of St Fillans and visitors from far and wide. I'm deeply honoured that STILL has found a home here, and I look forward to

seeing how STILL continues to engage with the community and the landscape."


There are amazing habitats to discover, all within easy walking distance of the village including woodland, wetlands, rivers and Loch Tay.

Crianlarich Community Garden

Thanks to the volunteers who came out to help install our new furniture in the Garden. We now have 12 new ground beds, 3 elevated beds, and a hot composter. The Garden is looking great, and we have space to accommodate lots of new gardeners. If you'd like to take on a bed or would like to get involved in some capacity, please get in touch with Sheona@strathfillancdt.org.uk We have a range of new information leaflets and growing guides, so even if you've little experience in the garden, you will be able to get involved!

We'd also like to say a big thank you to Ian Macpherson for completing the repair of the Community Garden perimeter fence. It's made a huge difference to the look of the garden and makes for a more welcoming sight as you enter the village.

We really hope that the investment delivered through the Growing Food Together fund has kick-started a renewed enthusiasm within the community for the Community Garden. We have really enjoyed being part of the Growing Food Together programme, and we are delighted that it has provided us with the resources to ensure we can meet a growing interest from the community. We'd like to say a big thank you to the Green Action Trust for working with us to deliver this project!







Woodlands

Good progress is being made in our Native Woodland expansion project in the Tyndrum Community Woodland, as part of the Wild Strathfillan Project. We have been granted felling permission to fell 7.14ha of the remaining conifer stands, leftover from the previous plantation. This will remove the largest remaining stands of non-native conifers, which will be re-planted with a mixture of native species such as Scots Pine, Birch, Rowan, Alder, Willow & Hazel.

We are now seeking permissions to install and upgrade the access infrastructure in the Woodland, to support the felling and extraction operations. We hope this work can be completed over the summer, with felling and restocking taking place towards the end of the year. If you'd like to hear more about the work going on the Tyndrum Community Woodland, please get in touch with our Woodland Officer euan@strathfillancdt.org.uk The Trust decided to close the Tyndrum Shelterbelt after further significant damage was inflicted on the woodland by Storm Eowyn. We advise that members of the public should not frequent the woodland due to the number of dangerous hazards which are present in the woodland. The Trust has decided that the best option for the Shelterbelt is to fell and replant, removing the possibility for continued wind and fell damage. We need to know what the community would like to see the woodland space used for, so please get in touch with our Woodland Officer euan@strathfillancdt.org.uk to have your views heard.

Cycle Path

We'd like to say a big thank you to SUSTRANS (funding) and LUC (consultants) who have completed two further feasibility studies for the Tyndrum to Killin Cycle Path. These studies featured as additions to the *Kirkton to Killin Path Feasibility Study* completed last year, which followed well attended community and landowner consultations. Knee Bends

- » Feet should be hip width apart, toes facing forwards.
- » Bend the knees and push your bottom backwards as though you were going to sit down.
- » Ensure the heels do not lift and the knees do not roll inwards.
- » Come back up to the start position slowly.
- » Use a support if you need to but try first with hands near support but not holding on.
- » Don't go too low, make sure you can comfortably stand again without too much strain on the knees. As time goes on and you strengthen the muscles around the knees with this exercise you may be able to drop lower without discomfort.
- » Repeat up to 5 times, eventually build to 10 times.

We don't provide refreshments but please feel free to bring a take-out from our local cafes or bring your own flask.

Our opening times are currently: Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays midday to 4pm, and Wednesdays 10am to 1pm. We would really like to extend these times to include one evening until 6pm and possibly even Sundays during the summer months. Do you have a passion for fashion, books, art, or vintage and

collectibles? Do you have an eye for merchandising? Do you love having a good sort out? Do you have some spare hours to volunteer? If anything of these sound like you, the Reuse Shop could do with you on board. We have opportunities on the shop floor, windows and displays, in the stockroom and light cleaning.

Pop in for a chat and a look at all the tools and craft items we have. or you can also browse the catalogue at recykillin.myturn.com. Membership is £10 for the year, £5 concession. We also accept donations of tools, which you can drop off at the Reuse Shop.

The Community Fridge volunteers collect unsold food from the Co-op in the evenings now. The advantage of this new arrangement is that we can take items at their use-by date and freeze immediately. You will find these in the freezer in the Reuse Shop. We will put items such as bread and potatoes outside in the mornings when we can, again we would like to recruit another volunteer or two to be able to do this regularly. The aim of our project is to reduce food waste, so please help us to do this by using up any items that you can. Since we began in March 2022, we have redistributed more than 14,000kg of food.



Killin Community Council Meeting

The Community Council meeting on the 4th March was very well attended.

SSE Update

There was a presentation by SSE representatives on the proposed replacement of the generating equipment and associated repair and maintenance work on the Glenlochay power station. This is in addition to the new transformer project in the same area, and both of these major projects will overlap for a period. Although the exterior of the existing building will be largely unaffected, the renewal and modernisation of the turbines and pumps is a highly technical operation, and will require a fluctuating workforce of between 60 and 100 people. SSE plans to fully replace one machine at a time, due to functionality and safety. Work will begin in April 2025, and it is planned to be completed by July 2028. As well as improving efficiency, it will extend the life of the power station by 40 years. This, of course, will lead to a further increase in traffic on the Glenlochav road over the short term, which will only partially subside with the completion of the transformer station. SSE will notify the community in advance of any very large load transits through the village.

Stirling Council Funding

There is to be an 8% rise in council tax. This was seen as the only alternative to significant cuts to local services, though the council will still go into the following financial year in deficit. Stirling is currently considering levying a 'tourist tax' on visitors. This will likely be modelled on Edinburgh's visitor levy, which will come into force next summer, and which will be set at 5% of paid accommodation prices. There is a

consultation process on this under way, and details of how to make your voice heard can be found in our local library.

Roads

The village is now a 20mph zone for most of it's length, though the 40mph zone from the caravan park to the golf club remains. The Community Council has been campaigning, on behalf of local residents, to have this reduced to 30mph, and we hope this will happen soon. Concerns have been raised about the safety of the school crossing. Sited, as it is, immediately after an awkward bend in the road, it has been suggested that more and better signage alerting drivers should be provided. The school has requested that a Stirling Council traffic officer comes to review the situation and make recommendations. Work is due to start on renewing the road markings in the village, and it is hoped that this, along with the reduced speed limits and other improvements, may make the village a little safer for all

Maragowan "Hedge"

The overgrown conifer 'hedge' at the caravan park continues to blight local residents. Originally planted as a hedge, a couple of metres high, to provide a sound barrier and some privacy from the road, this has been allowed to grow to 15-20 metres in places. The resultant thinning out of the lower limbs means that the hedge no longer fulfils its original purpose – it merely casts the houses on the other side of the road into almost permanent shadow. The Community Council will continue to support the residents in their efforts to remedy the situation.

Old Railway Path

The Community Council has been awarded a grant of £100,000 for the complete renovation of the old railway line from the Station Road car park to the head of Loch Tay. This will provide a permanent, durable, all-weather path suitable for pedestrians, cyclists and buggies, and will be a valuable addition to the village's amenities. We still require a small amount of top-up funding, and we will be pursuing this over the coming months.

Minutes Secretary

We are once again looking for a Minute Secretary to attend meetings and take the minutes. This is a paid position and will be remunerated at £50 per meeting. Anyone interested should email

Trossachs Explorer



Last summer, the Trossachs Explorer took to the roads, allowing visitors and residents to travel to areas of the National Park usually only accessible by car.

The pilot project aimed to reduce car dependency, and provide an accessible, sustainable transport option for visitors, residents, and workers.

Since then, an independent evaluation by University of Strathclyde, based on 29 stakeholder interviews, 195 public survey responses, insights from 11 Volunteer Rangers, and ticket data, has provided a detailed assessment of the pilot's impact. Key findings include:

- ✓ Improved accessibility making remote trails & destinations more reachable
- Strong community & business support boosting local connections
- Convenient & reliable travel offering an easy, friendly alternative to cars
- Environmental benefits supporting sustainable tourism
- Positive branding creating a trusted, high-quality transport service.





Next term, with the lighter nights, we'll hopefully get outside a lot more to enjoy some outdoor activities!



Frost Report

The Squirrel and the Dishcloth Reading this title, you could be forgiven for thinking that a previously unknown Beatrix Potter story had been discovered. But 'No', this is both true and recent. Towards the end of January we heard a strange scratchy noise in an open shed. This proved to be a red squirrel repeatedly trying to pull a dishcloth off a nail. The cloth had been left there to wipe bird feeders etc. but Tufty obviously had a different use in mind. Eventually the cloth was free and Tufty rolled it up and, clutching its find to its chest, set off. She was seen heading to the beech woods with the prize now in her mouth, presumably to have the softest and cosiest nest in the area. I am not making the politically incorrect assumption that Tufty is female on her nest building behaviour but the fact that we had seen her tummy well stretched out

Only Tufty and a couple of other squirrels have returned to our fastfood outlet so far this spring. Hopefully some more will return as usual as their Winter stores are depleted. Though there is the worrying observation brought to mind by an Ardtalnaig neighbour, that there seem to be fewer red squirrels around here. Hopefully this doesn't prove to be true as they are having to fight both the danger of squirrel pox and an increased number of hungry pine martens. Squirrel pox has been identified in reds in Bridge of Allan, one year after being noted in Dunfermline.

Apart from the return of the squirrels, other signs of Spring have sprung. A lone oystercatcher stood

on the Ardeonaig pier on 18th January

(10 days earlier than last year), it disappeared then a flock of thirty plus arrived on same pier on 21st February and continued their annual rave together for a few days before going off to find nest sites. The rave (or is the current term 'gaff'?) appeared to be a little spiritual as the loch was high and just over the pier so the birds appeared to be walking on water.



And so the Spring continues with frogs appearing at the beginning of March, frogspawn by 11th and very early baby newts in the pond. Now, in early March the snowdrops are still looking lovely, daffodils blooming and tulip buds are almost ready to burst. Harry the dog alerted us to one animal which was not quite ready for Spring when he saw a white creature bounding across the field. This was a stoat still in its Winter ermine outfit. It had probably been listening to the forecast of more snow. So, the annual circle of the seasons comes around again as it has done for millennia. Always the same but always slightly evolving. The Natural World!

Protecting this planet is supposed to be the job of politicians and ecologists but they are all planning for another conference, COP 30 and guess where? Belem in Brazil. Shame they are building a 4-lane highway through the Amazonian rainforest for it! There will be around 50,000 hypocrites arriving mostly by plane. Kind of puts the guilty feeling of taking a wee holiday jaunt to the Algarve into perspective.

Maybe they will discuss the 'garbage mountain of Delhi'. A 200-foot-high mountain of rubbish covers over 7 acres (50 football pitches apparently) emits toxic run off, more methane than 500,000 cars and the smell that you would expect. People were crushed in 2017 when there was an 'avalanche'.

On a slightly more fragrant note, an ice age fly has been discovered in a loch at Mar Lodge. Its nearest known neighbours are in arctic areas of Finland, Norway and Russia. Every day is a school day!

Jim Fairlie, agriculture minister for Scotland recently spent a day on the hill with a local deerstalker. He went in with the whole stalk and was willing to observe and learn about this area of land use. He even took a turn on the drag rope. (For those not familiar with stalk-speak, a drag rope is an old but still used method of getting the shot stag or hind off the hill using just your own strength pulling it along the ground.) Unlike previous similar invitations to Green MSPs it was good to see this taken up.

I'm not sure where Mr. Fox is taking his Easter break, but he may go to stay with relatives in Orpington in Kent. A chap on his way home from Tesco was fox mugged for his stick of garlic bread. The foxy population there must be getting more international tastes or are they worried about vampires?

Textile Project Update

You may know that the Crannog Centre has a fragment of textile which was found at the Oakbank Crannog. This is a magnificent gift to us from the Iron Age crannog dwellers as it tells a story of great skill and craftsmanship. It is a woolen fabric of extraordinary fineness, woven as a twill (much like modern suiting fabric), although after 2500 years in the mud, the original colour of the textile is a mystery. This piece of textile is at the centre of our current conservation project. On February 4th, AOC Archaeology came to collect this fragment to take it for preservation work. 20 days later, on February 24th, we received the exciting news that the textile was ready! Our team is working alongside UNESCO RILA and Maryhill Integration Network on a larger project which will be unveiled later this spring. This even includes a brand-new case for the textile to be displayed in.

Forge Update - It is Back!

On Valentine's day, while visitors enjoyed our special event day, I completed a major project: the new forge. This was a replacement for the forge hearth we used last year which sadly could not be used this year. The base of the forge was made by mixing five parts gravel sand, one of horse dung, and one of clay. The base was thicker than the base of the old hearth. This was partly to make it last longer and in order to raise up the overall height of the hearth. After the mixture was put in place, it was fired using a small wood fire in order to dry out the mixture.

After the base was ready the main wall between where the fire is and where the bellows sit was built. There is a hole in the middle of this wall which allows air to travel from the tuyere (the nozzle the air comes out of) into the heart of the fire. The main wall off the forge was put together by mixing three parts sand, one part horse dung, and one part clay. After being fired, the forge hearth was ready to be used with charcoal, which is the main fuel used for metalworking in the iron age.

Helping Hedgehogs - and AGM Notice

It's the last talk of the season for the Pitlochry and Highland Perthshire branch of the Scottish Wildlife Trust on Monday 21st April at The Tryst, 7.30pm – and if you want to help our hedgehogs, you won't want to miss it!

The talk will be preceded by our local Annual General Meeting at 6.00pm - everyone is welcome to review the previous season's talks and share ideas for future programmes.



The construction of a new substation compound, including building to house indoor equipment as part of SSEN Transmission's 132kV transformer replacement project adjacent to Lochay Power Station continues to make progress.

Safety is always our first priority at SSEN Transmission and with this in mind, we ask that you please remain vigilant of signage or direction around the construction works and do not enter our working areas.



Progress on site

Construction works are progressing well as depicted in the photo above. The main structures are now erected, underground ducting for cabling has been installed within the substation compound, the building externally is now complete with the internal fit out ongoing and the substation road has been started.

Upcoming works

Our civil works contractor will complete their works including the erection of the substation fence, installation of cable ducts out with the substation, laying the road, erecting the perimeter fence, building the freestanding wall, and completing landscaping. The electrical works will progress with the installation of indoor and outdoor plant.


