

hillwalkers, who had come off-route and become cragfast within dangerous ground on Ben Lui. A coastguard helicopter was utilised to ferry members up the hill including picking up Callander members from the helicopter refuelling site in Killin due to traffic issues between Tyndrum and Crianlarich.

What seemed from the initial briefing to be a relatively straightforward incident was more complicated and time consuming than hoped. Whilst safety roping the casualties downhill, loose rocks were dislodged with the casualty receiving a minor cut to his head. But it also led to one member of the team receiving two fractured toes from a rock falling on his foot. This incident goes to illustrate the risks that our hills can throw up and especially so for ourselves when we are operating in ground that walkers should not be in. Our member is recovering well.

Training

To ensure we remain safe in difficult situations and terrain, training is essential to keep our skills up-to-speed and that information is shared to all members. As we progress into the summer months, the training we undertake changes with water awareness and crossing moving water which some of you will have

We have also undertaken line search and casualty recovery training in numerous terrain from woodland to

Furthermore, we are beginning the process of doing Driver Familiarisation training for all members to ensure we are also safe when driving our team vehicles. This is primarily focused around defensive driving and weeding out bad habits.

The historic Steamship Sir Walter Scott has been named the **Flagship of the Year 2025** by National Historic Ships UK, a prestigious accolade recognising excellence in maritime conservation.

The honour coincides the Steamship's 125th anniversary year. As part of the award, she will proudly fly a special Flagship pennant and display an historic Flagship of the Year 2025 plaque throughout her sailing season on Loch Katrine.

Delighted by the recognition, Managing Director Gordon Allan paid tribute to the Steamship's dedicated team at Loch Katrine:

"This is a great boost for the charitable trust that for the past 20 years has looked after the steamer, and for all the engineers, crew, and support staff who keep her sailing and in pristine condition. 125 years on from her launch, it's a great accolade for this much-loved Steamship, enjoyed by the many

thousands of visitors who step aboard each year."

The award adds to the excitement at Loch Katrine ahead of a special Steamboat Festival taking place from 6th–8th June to mark the 125th anniversary. The event will feature a flotilla of smaller steamers, special cruises, and family-friendly activities onshore at Trossachs Pier.

In presenting the award, National Historic Ships UK praised the Steamship for her enduring service—operating three passenger cruises daily on Loch Katrine—her cultural significance in celebrating the legacy of Sir Walter Scott, and the remarkable fact that she is still powered by her original triple-expansion steam engine after 125 years.

Gardening

A group of children at Killin nursery have been given the opportunity to participate in the Play on Pedals programme, an early years cycling training programme developed in partnership with Cycling UK, Cycling Scotland and Play Scotland.

Play on Pedals aims to give children the opportunity to develop their independence, gross motor movements, social skills and supports children to maintain a healthy lifestyle through fun, safe and engaging games and experiences.



As a result of a funding bid, the nursery was kindly gifted a balance bike and a helmet to support the delivery of Play on Pedals.

The children have been learning the different parts of a balance bike and their functions, how to maintain and look after a balance bike as well as how to stay safe by wearing a helmet and assessing their surroundings before each session to identify and remove any potential risks.

Through group discussions, the children have identified their favourite sessions to take part in, such as 'Sea of

Sharks' and 'Walk the Plank' which they have taken part in numerous times since

the start of the programme.







Transition to Primary School

We are in the midst of our transition programme that supports our children to build relationships with staff and become familiar with the school environment before starting Primary 1 in August.



The children continue to regularly take part in a range of experiences such as Read Write Inc – a programme designed to support children in developing reading fluency and

comprehension, spell and write with confidence and learn to articulate their ideas and understanding.

The children all have buddies from Primary 6 who will support them throughout their time in Primary 1. To help develop their buddy relationships there are plenty of opportunities to play in the playground together, share story times and golden time together.



Know your bells - Join us and get In Step with Nature!

The sight of a Bluebell wood can lift our spirits and give us a mental and physical boost. Around half the Bluebells in the world are found in the UK. Also known as Wild Hyacinths they thrive in broad-leaved woodlands where the trees grow far enough apart for light to reach the ground.

Bluebells are very slow to establish, it can take 7 years from seed to flower and are protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981.

If you are out on a walk, please don't pick them but take some photos whilst taking the time to identify the difference between your Spanish Bluebell, Harebell and The Scottish (British) Bluebell.

Community Rangers

As you know, the Trust unfortunately could not secure funding for our Community Ranger programme this year and sadly some visitors to the Strath are up to their old tricks. Rubbish, gold panning damage,

irresponsible wildfires and wild camping without thought to the environment are now weekly occurrences as the busy season has arrived.

With the exceptionally dry weather we've had, the risk from irresponsible campfires is extremely high. Unfortunately, we had a reminder of the consequences after a campfire accidently set the cattle creep ablaze. Thanks to the efforts of our local fire service, the fire was contained relatively quickly. However significant damage was already done.



Without the regular presence of our Community Rangers, we fear that we will see more events like this throughout the summer season. We don't receive frequent visits from National Park Rangers at this end of the park, and without any ranger presence there is no effective means of combatting such behaviour. We had a mix of species, including English Oak, Hazel, Blackthorn, Hawthorn, Aspen, Grey Willow, & Wild Apple. We also had 20 very young Scots Pine saplings donated by David Price (thanks David!). We decided to plant them in an area which has previously been open grazing ground, so hopefully this is the very start of re-introducing some native woodland species in this area.



Keeping strong and balanced at home

The focus on home exercise this month is strength. This exercise will strengthen the muscles around the knee, helping with arthritis and keeping the joint well protected. You can do this one while you are watching TV or while having breakfast. Ideally do a brief oneminute march on the spot to warm up the muscles first. Try not to hold your breath while you lift the leg.

Front knee strengthener

Sit back in the chair with your back supported and your feet under your knees.



Lift the ankle slowly and straighten (but do not lock out) your knee. Raise the whole leg another inch or so so you really feel the weight of the leg and hold for a slow count of 3. Lower the foot slowly while bending the knee again.

Repeat up to 10 times on one leg then change legs. If you have ankle weights, start with 5 times each leg and progress to more over time. Have a go and let us know how you get on - give us some feedback at dawn@strathfillancdt.org.uk or on the SCDT Facebook page.






Author visit

The Reuse Shop

We are very grateful to anyone who donates to us because it helps us achieve our aims of generating an income to support KAT activities, preventing a large number of items from going to landfill and providing a fun and affordable shopping experience - and we couldn't do that without you lovely lot turning out your wardrobes and cupboards and bringing them to us.

However, we do need to make sure the stockroom is a safe and nice place for our volunteers to work and so, at times, we do have to restrict the amount we take in.

With that in mind, we are trialling a two bag/box limit per person, unless by prior arrangement. This should mean that if you turn up on the offchance with your two bags/boxes we shouldn't have to turn anyone away. There will also be a chalkboard in the window updating people on what we are or are not taking and regular posts on Facebook - The Reuse Shop Killin.

The Community Fridge

Over the past year, the Community Fridge has redistributed 3541.2kg of food. This has been primarily from the Co-op, with some donations from individuals and local small businesses. We have shifted from morning to evening collections since moving to the new shop, enabling us to collect items with a "use by" date that can be frozen, such as ready meals - a freezer was donated for this purpose. Thanks to funding from Hubbub, the Community Fridge network, we will be running a series of workshops in the summer based around recipes using ingredients often found in the community fridge. Look out for more details coming soon on our Facebook page.

The Tool Library

There are now at least 200 items available for hire from the Tool Library, including our latest equipment - a metal, voltage and stud detector, six-inch fence post auger and soft-grip fencing pliers, cordless hedge trimmer, 25m cable reel, compact mitre saw stand, 150kg capacity interlocking plastic dolly, furniture mover/lifter tool, and the muchrequested upholstery/ carpet cleaner. 

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Killin Community Council Meeting

AGM

The AGM of the Killin Community Council was held on Tuesday 6th May. The existing office bearers were all re-elected. Andy Aitken was elected as Chair, Pamela Farquharson as Treasurer, Susan McRobbie as Planning Officer, and Charlie Grant as Vice-chair. The other members of the Community Council are Stewart Inglis, Toni Dowling, Frances Inglis and Jill Lawrence.

Council Tax & Services

There will be a Council Tax rise of 8.8%, as part of a range of measures designed to help bring the Council's income back into line with expenditure. There will also be a doubling of Council Tax for second homes and some empty properties. The public consultation on a 'Tourist Tax', has closed and we may see a rate of anything from 1-5% levied on all overnight says. How this will be administered or collected has not yet been decided. Despite these measures, the Council will still be in significant deficit, and some further cuts to services may be required. The Libraries consultation has also

now closed and we may see a slight reduction in opening hours and overall service in our own local library. While these tax increases will doubtless be painful for many, the services they fund are essential for the overall wellbeing of our community. And let us not forget that they come on the back of a 'council tax freeze' of nearly two decades. Help and advice is available for those in financial difficulties from Citizen's Advice at the Sports Pavilion on a Thursday afternoon. The Killin Medical Practice also has a welfare advice service by appointment once a month.

Old Railway Path

As detailed in the last edition of the Killin News, the Community Council had been awarded £100,000 from SSE's Hydro Fund towards the restoration of the old railway track running from the station car park to the head of Loch Tay. Taymouth Castle have kindly donated £500 to help us towards our target of £132,000 overall. We will be spending the next few months seeking donations and funding wherever we can find it. If you are interested in helping us raise funds

or making a donation, please email us at the address below. This project will be of benefit to locals and tourists alike, and will benefit our village in a range of ways.

Roads

Our village now has its new speed limit signs, new yellow lines, and the McLaren Hall car park has been ingeniously reconfigured so that, while the available space remains the same, the available parking places have been reduced by about 50%. Amazing.

Changing Places Toil

6½ years after the journey began, we proudly announce that a Changing Places Toilet officially opened on 13 May 2025, at The Green Welly Stop in Tyndrum.

What is a Changing Places Toilet, and why is it important?

Changing Places Toilets (CPT) are fully accessible toilets designed for people who need extra support to use the bathroom safely and with dignity.

They are essential for over 240,000 disabled people in the UK, including those with profound and multiple learning disabilities, muscle-wasting conditions, cerebral palsy, motor neurone disease, multiple sclerosis, and those who have experienced serious injuries or strokes.

Some older people also rely on them. Standard accessible toilets work for

Changing Places toilets provide the additional space and specialist equipment needed, such as:

some disabled people—but not for


- A height-adjustable changing bench and sink
- A ceiling hoist system
- A shower and modesty screen with enough space for a wheelchair user and up to two carers

With medical advances and a growing population living longer, more people than ever need access to these facilities. Yet, there are still not enough available particularly throughout rural Scotland. Without them, many families and carers are unable to go out and take part in everyday activities and explore the country in a manner that others may take for granted. Changing Places toilets offer a safe, hygienic, and dignified solution—making inclusion possible.

Why Tyndrum?

Geographically, Tyndrum is a busy travel hub sitting in the middle of a black hole larger than the size of Wales when it comes to the provision of a Changing Places Toilet.

The addition of this facility opens the possibility of day trips to the north end of the National Park for people living in the central belt. It means those travelling further afield to and from the West Coast and the islands can travel with dignity, and finally it offers locals the opportunity to enjoy some shopping and have a meal in Tyndrum.



Personally, I am delighted that we have succeeded in making this a reality, because I know firsthand what a huge positive difference it will make to people's lives.

When my Dad became ill with a degenerative neurological disease, I learned very quickly about the challenges faced by those with complex needs, and the impact on their families and careers.

It's been a long and frustrating journey, but the result is worth it because it will be life enhancing for those who need it.

The journey started at an Accessible Tourism Workshop organised by The Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park which I attended on 1 November 2018, a couple years after Dad died. This informed and galvanised me to start the quest to build a CPT in Tyndrum.

A lack of awareness and knowledge about CPTs was the first hurdle to overcome, but here the Killin News and social media helped spread the word and create a breakthrough with the next challenge which was finding the land.

Securing a site was a significant issue because of the lack of any publicly owned land or existing infrastructure in Tyndrum, but when The Green Welly Stop came forward and offered to get involved with a suggested location on their land, this

was a game changer.
In 2020, I set up The Tyndrum
Infrastructure Group, an OSCR
registered charity, as a vehicle to
manage this project and recruited a
board of first-class volunteer
Trustees

Naively, I thought the funding would be straight forward after the difficulties of finding a plot, because of a manifesto pledge made by the Scottish Government in 2021, but it was not to be.

So the journey to build it continued, the search for the money involved thousands of emails, countless meetings, a public consultation and petition, throughout which we were spurred on by the support of some fantastic charities, individuals and organisations. Eventually, we succeeded in securing a grant large enough to build the facility which came via Stirling Council from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

This project demonstrates people power in action. It's about collaboration and relentless, focused, teamwork in the pursuit of a common goal.

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Annie MacNee

1943-2025

Annie was born on 19th February 1943, to Alec and Joana Murray, in a tiny crofting community called North Tolsta on the Isle of Lewis. She was the oldest of six children. Her siblings were, Ishbel, Donald, DA, Iain and Marjory and she wore the badge of oldest sister with pride keeping in regular contact with them all, throughout her life. Growing up in North Tolsta she spent a lot of time with her grandparents and shared

happy memories of taking the cattle out to the shieling, and bringing home the peats.

At 16, Annie left the Island and came to Oban to work in the hotels. She met Duncan, her husband to be, when working at the Lochearnhead Hotel. However, she wasn't sure he was the man for her at this point. It was only when she came back to Lochearnhead after a spell working as a 'clippie' on the buses in Stornoway that she gave into his charms.

Annie and Duncan were married in 1965 and settled in Killin where they had 2 children – James and Johanna. Annie continued to work in hotels and she and Duncan always put James and Johanna first, ensuring that they never wanted for anything.

Although Annie and Duncan were happy in Killin, in common with many other islanders, Tolsta was always 'home' and Annie went home every year. When home she would do the rounds, visiting all of her relatives and friends, always making sure that she was in touch with the latest news. Connecting with people was really important to Annie.

In Tolsta and in Killin, Annie knew everyone and knew everything about everyone (or at least it seemed that way). Any trip to the shops would need extra time for all the stops to chat to people on the way. Annie immersed herself in Killin life and was an active member of the community. As well as the SWRI she was a church elder, a Brownie leader, was on the Lochearnhead Games

committee and laterally took Gaelic classes.

When Annie joined the SWRI she quickly earned a reputation for her home baking. Her pancakes were legendary and regularly won first prize at the Killin Show which brought her immense pride. She would regularly bake for older people in the village, always interested in and looking out for neighbours and

were coming there would always be a stack of fresh home baking with plenty of leftovers to allow for 'food parcels' to be taken home.

Annie never lost the Gaelic although apart from the regular calls home to her brothers and sisters, this was most regularly heard when she was shouting at the cat to get out of the house! Unsuspecting visitors were often amazed to hear her launch into

her native language which caused her great amusement.

Annie was born to be a granny. She was thrilled when Naomi came along, followed by Lewis, Finlay, Morna and Sean, then great-grandson Tommy. Annie was incredibly proud of all her grandchildren and what they had achieved. Her face lit up when they walked in the front door to visit. They all have their own happy memories of time spent with their granny. Whether taking trips on the train to Glasgow from Crianlarich, baking pancakes, watching TV programmes that Mum and Dad didn't allow, or going out for lunch and her coming home with half a cheese toastie in her handbag.

She was known to her grandchildren as Granny or Granny Pancakes and to others in the village as Granny Annie. There was nothing else in this world that brought her more joy than her grandchildren. They are her beautiful legacy.

friends, putting others needs above her own. Annie's kindness and generosity were unsurpassed.

Annie's soup and clootie dumpling were regular fare at the annual New Year's Dance in the Masonic Hall. She loved being in the kitchen and being part of all the fun and getting the 'crack'.

When James and Johanna started bringing friends up to the dance in their teenage years, Annie would cook full breakfasts for everyone who had slept overnight (usually on the living-room floor). Annie loved nothing more than having a full house.

No-one ever left Annie MacNee's house hungry. If she knew visitors

Annie was many things to many people.

She was a loving mum, granny and great granny.

She was a caring sister and auntie. She was a loyal friend, neighbour and colleague.

She was good and she was kind. She was salt of the earth. She was loved so very much and we will all miss her.

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

Rural Idyll?

Looking around our countryside we see that it is so beautiful. My wife maintains that the view along Loch Tay coming from Kenmore on the Ardeonaig road, just about at Margbeg, is the best view in the world.

Life is a little different today from Constable's Haywain painting where the romance is shown but none of the drudgery and misery of the farm labourers' lives.

Similarly, today our picture postcard views do not, regrettably, portray the current threats to rural life. In Ardeonaig we have a thriving community spirit for example, but what will happen if all the farms and farmers disappear? What will there be? Probably a few oldies like me and a bigger rash of holiday and second homes. Oh! and a lot of trees.

I don't want to depress you, but hasn't the time come to have a rethink. A recent article by Andrew Conon in the farming section of the Courier sets out the political problems. Inheritance tax, often a lack of Scottish/British produce in supermarkets, misleading farm labelling and the devaluing of food by extreme marketing offers.

May this not be a good time to rethink as we celebrate the 80th anniversary of V.E. day when the land girls had thoughts of going home and everyone was proud of having been able to feed the country through the war years. When my age group was growing up in the years that followed, we looked forward to June when we would see the first strawberries of the season as imports were not on the go. And avocados? We survived without them.

Unfortunately, the world's politically unstable situation also makes it necessary to rethink our reliance on imports.

The tree invasion is so ill thought out. Not only are they taking over farmland but their legacy of ugly piles of rotting wood and the dry brush of bracken encourages more wildfires. These not only add more carbon to the atmosphere, but we will soon need more firefighters in rural areas. Oh, we can't because no able-bodied folk will be living in the countryside any more. The oldies etc still left will probably all be ill from Lyme disease from the increased tick population in the brush!

Alongside the tree invasion is that of the rewilders. Lovely idea but shame about the reality. It now has to be recognised that sea eagles take lambs, there is photographic evidence. The same with badgers. They are all lovely creatures but there has to be a balance.

On Benbecula the hedgehog population has expanded so much that there is fear for the eggs of ground nesting birds. Why are Mrs. Tiggywinkle and co. so successful? Wait! Are there any badgers on Benbecula? No! So I wonder if there is a connection? The plan is to round them up and bring them to the mainland. The rewilders could introduce badgers to the island to control them but no, wait, they would eat the eggs too.

Deer culls are needed to protect grazing (and trees) but some landowners are not adhering to cull advice and Loch Choire in Sutherland has been the first to be issued with a Deer Act section 8 and have numbers forcibly reduced. You'll never guess- acres of trees have been planted and the absentee owner gets a 'financial incentive' for this. It was a wild and remote area of open hill and moorland with its accompanying wildlife which has been changed for ever. And, incidentally, where we once lived.

But amongst the gloom there is the natural world to cheer us up. We need to be positive like one of our resident cock pheasant who is still parading around defending his realm although fighting has caused him to lose all his tail and neck feathers.


It is said that the best thing for our wellbeing is being in nature. Easy to believe as the Spring once again brings the migrant birds. We had a blackbird nest fledge and leave home in the middle of April, but the martins and swallows didn't return to us till the beginning of May, much

later than reports from the village. The martins haven't nested with us for a couple of years but seemed interested this time. But they are not about today so maybe we are abandoned again. The local ospreys are not yet so visible this year but are here. Friends at Ardtalnaig were treated to a low fly past by them.

If being in nature doesn't do enough for you then you may need a glass of beer or whisky but get it now as once all those grain fields are planted up with frozen trees (true, this is being piloted) there will be no grain for alcohol. Maybe 'Grassmen' hoodies should have the slogan 'No Farmers No booze'? may attract the politicians more than their current 'No farmers No food'

Mr. Beaver would like to add that eating trees definitely makes you add to methane pollution. See his You Tube video where he hops out of the river to 'break wind.'







we can in one day. Guided by experts, we'll be bird watching, botanising and butterfly hunting with a bit of pond dipping on the side...


