

C60 Killin to Callander Bus Timetable Revised Extra Return Journey Added On Weekdays

After many requests from users of the C60 and discussion at the C60 Promotion and Marketing Group meetings run by Stirling Council, an extra return jouney during the day has been added to the timetable from Monday to Friday. This started running on 15th September.

The extra journey leaves Callander at 10:15, arrives Killin at 10:59, leaves Killin at 11:05 and arrives back at Callander at 11:53. The revised timetable is below.

Thanks to the Group and Stirling Council for getting this extra journey running.

It's now important that we make use of this extra service which we've been requesting.

The extra C60 bus from Killin will also connect with the 59 McGills bus to Stirling leaving Callander at 12:00.

If you're looking for a short, relatively level walk that little ones or those less able can enjoy, the new 'easier access' path at Dùn Coillich Community Land could be what you're looking for.

Thanks to support from our trainees, modern apprentices, volunteers and multiple school parties we now have a new, low-level figure of eight path,

offering direct access from the main car park and opening up the beauty of Dùn Coillich to even more members of our local community.

The gentle gradient provides nearly a kilometre of firm, defined walking along the Glengoulandie Burn,

weaving between a variety of beautiful, maturing trees as it goes. On its way it passes our rare wild apple tree - and if you want to take a breather there is Hamish's bench to rest on and look out over the burn.



Callout Summary

Our relatively quiet spell of callouts was broken in good fashion with 3 callouts within 24 hours of each other.

The first callout was a full team callout at 3am to search for a missing person in the Crianlarich hills. A coastquard helicopter assisted in the search but whilst ferrying members higher up the hill, a team member spotted the casualty all in black. This keen eye spot saved hours of searching and ensured the casualty returned home safely. The second callout was in the afternoon of the same day for Callander members to assist in a technical rescue of a person who had fallen at the Bracklinn falls. The members present worked with the Fire and Ambulance service to facilitate a technical rope system to haul the casualty on our stretcher to onward medical attention. A third callout came in just before midnight for a walker lost in the Crianlarich hills. Using software



called SARLOC, it was discovered the

casualty was in the same vicinity of the missing search earlier that day. With the assistance of Glen Falloch estates we were able to ferry two members up to the casualty and then brought down via Argocat.

Another highlight was for a female with a suspected broken ankle after descending the steep south slopes of Stob Binnean. Team members were already training at that time in Balquiddher Glen so the rescue was

assisted with first aid cover at the Killin Agricultural show and it was a lovely day to be out greeting people. Our marshalling duties were also put to good use at the Killin 10K but it was also a delight to cheer on the 3 runners who undertook the run whilst fundraising for the Team. In total they raised over £1000 for their efforts and we are extremely grateful for their hard work.



Multiple other people have been raising funds for the team in the Summer months, which will enable us to continue in our procurement drive of replacing personal protective equipment for members such as helmets and ice axes.



the Big Shêd

We were very fortunate this year to be funded by the SSE's Hydro Community Fund, which celebrates the achievements of Scottish Hydro, funding not-for-profit organisations "supporting residents in the community council areas which proudly host our hydro assets". The Big Shed is in the Glenlyon & Loch Tay Community Council area, which has the Lawers dam. The Finlarig Power Station means organisations in the Killin Community Council area are eligible too.

Our installation of an air source heat pump, solar panels and some battery storage is now complete and we've had one electricity bill since then. Great savings! However, so far we've only been able to compare electricity used in the cold, wet July 2024 with that used in the hot dry July of 2025, so it may be a bit too soon to crack open the champagne.

Also this summer, Fi Lumsden from Aberfeldy held a most relaxing and enjoyable yoga & outdoor meditation in the building and in the surrounding countryside. The Big Shed is a lovely space for wellness retreats of all kinds, as well as celebrations: a

bright, modern eco-building with excellent facilities, sitting in a beautiful spot adjacent to the Ben Lawers National Nature Reserve, with views over Loch Tay.

The Big Shed is at Tombreck on the north side of Loch Tay, about 6 miles beyond Killin. It's on the main road more or less directly across the loch from Ardeonaig. It's a volunteer-run building owned by Loch Tayside Community Interest Company, and run for local communities, though it is also available to people from elsewhere (at higher rates!), which helps cover the running costs.





Saplings

The Trust would like to thank and congratulate all the participants and parents who attended any of the Saplings Sessions this summer. We had 6 great sessions involving pottery making, cycle skills development, a woodlands activity day, canoeing, an outdoor day in Dalmally and even a trip to Auchingarroch Wildlife Park. Every session delivered a fun and enjoyable day of activity for the children who attended!

We would like to say a big thank you to the session leaders Nicola Lindsay (Pottery Instructor), Ramsay MacFarlane (Trailcoach), Lisa Beckett (Dalmally Youth Group Leader), Sharon Cawston (Loch Lomond & Trossachs Countryside Trust), Matt Brooks (Active Stirling) and the staff at Auchingarroch Wildlife Park. Furthermore, we also give a big thank you to all our session assistants - Charlotte Stirling, Lisa Beckett, Sheona MacLennan and Diane Mailer.

We would also like to say a big thank you to our funders the National Lottery, who kindly granted full funding for this, and last year's Saplings sessions. Our Community Development Officer will be in touch with the participants and parents to get any feedback on this year's sessions. This information is always valuable to us to help improve the Saplings programme.



Woodlands

Finally, the Trust has managed to submit a planning application & prior notification request for installing further forest road infrastructure in the Tyndrum Community Woodland. These works are needed to support the felling operations, which aim to remove the remaining stands of nonnative conifers from the woodlands. The planning works were accompanied by an Environmental Impact Assessment Screening Opinion Request, which has also been made to Scottish Forestry as part of the regulatory requirements to install the forest road infrastructure. We are hoping that all permissions can be granted by the beginning of October, allowing us to get started with the forest road construction works later in the month. Due to the delay in securing these works, the felling of the conifer stands is now scheduled to take place next year. The work to further restructure the Tyndrum Community Woodland as an extensive area of native woodland are part of the Wild Strathfillan initiative.

On the ground, Jimmy has been busy keeping on top of the woodland maintenance, including clearing paths and carparks, extensive vegetation clearance across the woodland area, removing damaged windblown trees and being a helpful presence across all Trust owned and managed land. Jimmy has just recently removed the Forest Classroom in the Shelterbelt, after many requests from locals! He's also aiming to start dealing with the dangerous windblown trees, so if you hear the chainsaw running, you'll know what's going on! 


Keeping strong and balanced at home

This issue we remind you of the importance of good movement around the hips and lengthening the muscles over the front of the hip. A flamingo swing has a double benefit of challenging (and therefore helping to improve!) your balance, as well as lengthening the muscles and tendons across the front of the hip and strengthening the ones across the back of the hip. Do these moves slowly and with control but specifically concentrate on taking the leg backwards.

Flamingo Swings:

- Stand tall and side on to your support
- Swing the leg furthest from the chair forwards and back slowly and with control
- Perform 10 swings
- Turn and repeat on the other leg and for an extra challenge, try to let go of the chair

Touring Forgotten Fleece Tales exhibition stops at The Old Mill

The Forgotten Fleece Tales is on a tour of Scotland for the next two years and is currently homed at The Old Mill in Killin. It is a celebration of the space where art, craft, story and ecology come together. The exhibition features a curated collection of works made using waste or unwanted organic Scottish fleece, and byproducts of industrial fleece processing – including wearables, wall hangings, home textiles, sculptural pieces and interactive experiences.



The theme of "forgotten" fleece binds the pieces together in the form of a unique piece of short fiction written for each creation by folklorist and writer Alicia Anne Adams. These tales draw on aspects of Scottish folklore, history and landscapes, inviting readers to connect more closely with the story of wool - both in the pieces on display, and in their everyday lives.


a wide variety of visitors, with many entering the famously tough 'Hill Race' sponsored by The Real Food Cafe, to the top and back of the Sron a Clachain.

Killin Community Council Report

Recruitment

The Community Council is recruiting two further members, to be co-opted at the November meeting. Anyone interested in representing our local community should email the Community Council at the email address below. Nominations close on 13th October.

The meeting on September 2nd was well attended, and we were pleased to welcome our new Minutes Secretary, Lieke van de Coterlet, who is also a member of the Scottish Youth Parliament. Lieke will be with us until next summer, when we will be sadly losing her to university.

Railway Track

There have been several more donations to the 'old railway track' fund, and we are very grateful to The Stroyans, Infinity Blue, Bear Scotland, Davidsons Chemists, and others. We will continue to seek final funding from national and local resources, and hope to have the final funding in place to begin work in the spring.

Parking & Roads

There was a good and informative discussion about parking and road safety, and it was decided to ask Stirling Council to reinstate the Main Street parking restrictions, with the proviso that there should be a one hour maximum free parking with one hour no return. It was felt that this regime would best manage on-street parking for the benefit of local residents and businesses. We have also agreed to ask the Council to introduce a 30 mph zone from the Golf Course to the caravan park, with a 300 metre countdown at both ends of the village, as is common on the approach to other villages. This was felt particularly appropriate and necessary as there are a couple of

very sharp and unmarked corners on the approach from Aberfeldy, and the transition from 60 mph to 20 mph at the war memorial is very abrupt, and the existing 20 mph signs here are partially obscured by vegetation. These proposals were unanimously supported by all members of the public attending.

Buses

The 'pilot' C60 bus service has had a good summer, and appears to be cleaning its own boot, to murder a well-known aphorism. There will now be an additional return run in the late morning throughout the winter, which should be in operation when you read this. This will enable users to visit Callander more easily for appointments and shopping and vice versa to Killin. This is a welcome development, particularly as it demonstrates Stirling Council's growing confidence in the service. Additionally, Scottish Citylink and Ember are now stopping at Lix Toll, though this service must be booked in advance. Both go to Edinburgh via Doune, the Raploch on the edge of Stirling, and Edinburgh Airport. Timetables and other information are available online or from our local library.

Sewage

There are dismaying reports of sewage spilling out onto the junction between Station Road and Lyon Road. This has been a recurring problem for years and Scottish Water did make some improvements to the drainage system in this area a few years ago when the new Co-op was flooded on its opening week. Needless to say, this is an area of heavy footfall, both local and visitor, as it is the principal access to the Co-op and, I would hope, an embarrassment to Scottish Water, as

much as it is to the village. We will be meeting with Scottish water, along with affected residents, to see if this problem can be finally resolved.

Lix Toll Fuel

The situation at Lix Toll remains unclear. The damage caused in January which forced the closure of the fuel pumps, has still not been fixed. Our local Stirling Councillor, Martin Earl, has been pursuing this on our behalf with Certas, the operator, but there is not yet even a vague idea of when, if ever, this fairly vital service will be restored. We will however keep pressing on this issue.

Killin And District Volunteer Car Scheme



The Car Scheme continues to be used regularly and we are pleased to say that we have been able to fulfil all requests for journeys. We are always looking for new volunteer

drivers, especially in the Crianlarich and Tyndrum area. If you can drive and have some spare time you could be doing some very worthwhile volunteering. Please consider becoming a Volunteer Driver. You will receive 45p a mile for the journeys you do, to cover the cost of fuel and wear and tear on your vehicle. This is the amount HMRC allows you, so your tax is not affected.

Without the Car Scheme many people living in our community would struggle to get to appointments and for some it is the only time they get to leave their homes. The drivers make an enormous difference to people's lives and they also benefit from the social interaction between themselves and their passengers.

The current Chair and Secretary have decided that they will not stand for re-election, as Trustees, at the next Annual General Meeting in December 2025. "We have thoroughly enjoyed working alongside the other trustees, volunteers and drivers since 2018, and have put in a lot of effort to keep the car scheme running smoothly. 

(KBAC) was
founded in
1881. It is one
of the oldest

angling Clubs in Scotland. Our anglers fish on The River Tay System which is covered by the River Tay Protection Order. The club focuses on ensuring our ethos revolves around our environment, encouraging sustainable and responsible fishing.

We have memberships for Salmon, Trout, and Coarse which can be fished for at various periods throughout the year.

One of its founding members Peter Ross invented (in 1890) one of the most famous Wet Fly patterns to date (also our club's logo).

Warmer Weather

The Club would like to mention that due to the high temperatures this year coinciding with the severe lack of rainwater, the river temperature was rising. This is a concern, especially if anglers are fishing for Pike.

"Pike, despite their ferocious appearance, are surprisingly delicate creatures – especially in



summer, when water temperatures are high and oxygen levels are low. At this time of year pike require extra careful handling."

pacgb.com/pike-conservation is a fantastic website for anyone



wanting to know more about pike and fishing safely for them. The Club would ask all of its members to treat fish carefully and handle with respect. The Committee made the hard decision to cancel the Pike Outing on the loch this year, and also made the decision to stop pike fishing in the rivers until the temperatures dropped. This was a learning curve for all the committee members and we had to learn about temperatures and oxygen levels within the river system, and the impact this has on all types of marine life.

Youth Fly Fishing

The angling club has been working in conjunction with the Killin Youth club, teaching the children how to fly fish, water safety and to enjoy the outdoors.

The club managed to get some anglers to go along to Orchil trout Fishery to help coach and mentor some children from the youth club after their fly fishing lesson. I have to admit that the conditions on the day were lovely, sunny and not a breeze about. Unfortunalty for fly fishing, this is some of the worst conditions and as a result very few fish were caught. The kids still managed to have a good time and as a result the club had more under 18s on the next trip to the fishery than it has had in years.



The biggest change for the Club this year has to be the replacement of the Jetty. The committee had agreed that the jetty needed to be brought up to regulation with new handrails



and to make it safe and asecure, and as a result a lot of other items that need to be worked on, have been put on hold. The club approached different Contractors with A&J Palmer taking on the build.

After a couple of weeks the jetty is finally finished and it looks brilliant. Not only is it safer to use, the handrails are up to the correct height, and no longer an eye sore.





Lochay Transformer Replacement Newsletter

October 2025

The construction of a new substation compound, including building to house indoor equipment as part of SSEN Transmission's 132kV transformer replacement project adjacent to Lochay Power Station continues to make progress.

Safety is always our first priority at SSEN Transmission and with this in mind, we ask that you please remain vigilant of signage or direction around the construction works and do not enter our working areas.



The final cable ducts have been laid, which allowed Global our civils contractor to complete the new access road.

This was a critical part of the project to allow us to move from civils to electrical works.

We are now preparing for the next phase of the project.



Upcoming works

With the cable ducts and new road laid, we move our focus to the electrical phase of the project. By the end of September, we saw the completion of a section of overhead line being diverted underground around the substation also during September we continued assembling the structures and associated parts within the substation along with earthing within the control building and substation. Delivery of the substation standby generator is due in October.

The Next Generation

At this time of year we see all the new youngsters now leading their own lives. The large number of new animals are now going about their business, sometimes with great inquisitiveness like the young birds, especially the blue tits who randomly find themselves in the house having investigated an open window or even in the, thankfully unlit, log burner after investigating the chimney. One has been investigating the keyhole cover on a door but has, as yet not managed to get through the keyhole. This is the first generation of blue tits to take advantage of the sunflowers which have now gone to seed. The sparrows have been continually busy with repeated clutches of the next spuggy generation. They are said to be getting scarce so we must have half the population. Speaking to neighbours in Ardtalnaig they seem to have the other half. So there are flocks of them queueing up to have a go in the bird bath. If you remember they loved the warm water in the Winter for a hot tub but now they are going for cold water for a wild swimming vibe. We are drawing the line at installing a mini sauna. Just how the young squirrels find their way to the feeders on their own we are not sure but maybe they follow the scent of older and wiser relations. They certainly seem to follow the same paths. Nick (short for Nicholas the nippy nut nicker) has really taken to the box of monkey nuts in shells and is in, out, away and back again at lightning speed. I timed him the other day and he made a foray each minute, presumably till his tummy was comfortably full. The last few years

squirrels have shunned the boxes and their healthier assortment of nuts and seeds but this year they must have been watching Jamie Oliver on their tablets or something and going for the healthier option. After watching crows homing in on the sheep's supplement feed buckets I'm hoping that the next generation won't be big muscley super crows. The farmers have enough to cope with without that.

Farming, especially cattle and sheep farming in the hills and uplands, is becoming more and more difficult and the next generation of farmers will have some hard decisions to make. There are record low profits so it's no wonder that the number of breeding sheep in Scotland is the lowest on record. Nor that there is a vast difference in numbers selling at Lairg compared to 20 years ago (from 35,000 to 15,000). When we lived in Sutherland in the early 70s Lairg was often bursting at the seams with buyers from all over Britain and the world. Now, for much of the year it's a bit like a ghost town in the wild west and just lacks the tumbleweed blowing along. Instead of feeding livestock our land is being dotted with wind turbines, being rewilded, sold for carbon offsets and 5 million more trees are being planted in Britain, 75% funded by The Woodland trust and Lloyds Banking Group. Not only does this impact on food production but provides fewer jobs so rural areas are becoming depopulated. Second clearances. Agriculture minister Jim Fairlie is trying to support farmers and says that he does recognise the difficulties. He is also recognising the

positive impact of field sports to the rural and agricultural economy. Also let vegetarians and vegans realise that they still need fields and farmers to grow food. Just how many oats does it take to make a pint of milk?

There will also soon be new vegetarians as research begun in America in 2020 has revealed that some tick bites can result in the victim becoming allergic to meat of all kinds. One type of meat that you may not fancy anyway is blue meat from some wild boars in California. They have been eating rodent poison dyed blue. The livers of condors, bobcats and black bears have also been found to contain the poison, but they haven't turned blue. It would probably be safe to eat meat from the estimated 2,500 wild boars in Dumfries and Galloway, an increase of nearly double in 50 years. Maybe the next generation will be seeing them sold at Lairg sales. The next generation of sea eagles is making waves as a new young female had killed, and taken over the nest from, the oldest introduced female - one featured on a past Springwatch no less! Maybe she is the one accused of taking Shetland foals. Mr Fox has been feeling the housing crisis as there are an estimated 10,000 feral foxes in London. He took up residence in a Sue Rider charity shop and had a nice rest on a sofa after causing a great deal of damage. So maybe KAT and the Reuse Shop need to be wary of the increase in badgers wandering around the cemetery field, Fingal Road and the Old Mart.


